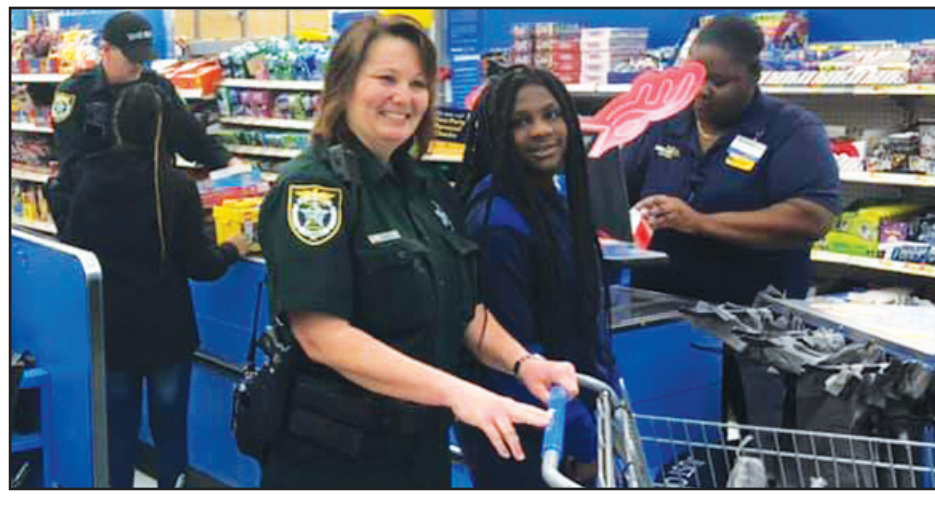




SHOP with a COP

Pemberton promotes HR Director:

Durden selected as assist. administrator

Taylor County Human Resources Director Marsha Durden has been promoted to fill the assistant county administrator position formerly held by new County Administrator LaWanda Pemberton.

During a special meeting held Tuesday afternoon, county commissioners voted 5-0 to affirm Pemberton's recommendation to make Durden her first hire – and right hand – as the county's assistant county administrator.

Pemberton told commissioners that the position was advertised internally for one week and Durden was the only applicant who met the minimum qualifications.

"Marsha has been an integral part of our team for the past 18 months as Human Resources Director, and I am confident that her previous management and budgeting experience make her an ideal fit for our organization," Pemberton said Tuesday.

"Marsha has been a valued member of county staff and will continue to be an asset to Taylor County," Pemberton added.

After the vote, Durden addressed the board, stating, "Thank you so much for the confidence placed in me and the opportunity to continue to serve this county. I do not take lightly the trust you have placed in me."

"I have thoroughly enjoyed my time as Human Resources Director, and

I am very humbled and grateful for the opportunity to continue to serve Taylor County in this new role," Durden said. "I look forward to working closely with Mrs. Pemberton, our county commissioners, fellow county staff members and the public to do everything I can to make Taylor County a better place to live and work."

"You have some big shoes to fill," Commissioner Jim Moody said, gesturing toward Pemberton.

"You have been around long enough to know who you are working for," Commissioner Malcolm Page said.

"I think we have a very qualified senior staff, and I am confident that we are in good hands," Chairwoman Pam Feagle said.

Pemberton said she and Durden are in the process of evaluating their new and former positions to see if there are any efficiencies that can be found to consolidate duties and ultimately save the county taxpayers money, adding that she planned to bring a recommendation back to the county at its January meeting.

Durden has served as the county's human resources director since June 2017, working under the direction of the county administrator to develop policy and direct all phases of the county's personnel program, including: employee recruitment, screening,

placement, training and orientation, compensation, health insurance and benefits, performance review, discipline and terminations, payroll, personnel file management, union contract negotiations and other employee services.

In addition to her regular duties, Durden has served as the county's Records Management Liaison Officer.

Prior to being hired by the county, Durden worked as director of rehabilitation for Genesis Rehab Services at Marshall Health and Rehabilitation Center (2015-17), during which time she was responsible for staffing, payroll, program growth and compliance, budget analysis and management, partner meetings, family consultations and program

Diverse group seeks to reclaim historic cemetery:

Springhill Cemetery restoration begins

Work is now underway to restore a historic cemetery associated with one of the county's oldest churches, and the Taylor County Commission has agreed to offer its assistance to the project.

Springhill Cemetery is located near Green Street at the original site of Springhill Baptist Church,

which dates back to 1853. After the church burned in 1923, it was rebuilt at its current site in 1925, and the old cemetery was slowly reclaimed by the forests of Taylor County.

Kicking off the restoration efforts, much of the old cemetery was cleared of trees. During this work, the county provided a

bin to help with transporting material away from the site.

By virtue of a 1967 special act of the Florida Legislature, the county commission can provide maintenance to privately-owned cemeteries as long as they are open to the public. In the past, the commission declined doing the work with county crews,

saying the land clearing was beyond the level of maintenance allowed by the act.

At its Nov. 19 meeting, the commission was approached by Robert Lynn, representing a group working to continue the restoration work. The group also includes Taylor County Commissioner

Thomas Demps retired educator George Clayton, Springhill Church Pastor Izell Montgomery, Taylor County Historical Society representative Angela Castelucci, Barry and Jane (Parker) Woofter, the Rev. J.T. Taylor, Marshall Combs, former county commissioner Pat Patterson, -- and Diane Whitfield.

Lynn has worked on several other cemetery restoration efforts within the county, including Faulkner and Kinsey cemeteries, as well as the recently-completed work at Cabbage Grove Cemetery, which commissioners agreed to maintain (see related story).

County takes on maintenance of Cabbage Grove Cemetery

Citing authority given to the Taylor County Commission by a special act of the Florida Legislature in 1967, the board recently agreed to assume the maintenance of Cabbage Grove Cemetery.

After discussing the issue

during several meetings and workshops over the past several months, on Nov. 19 the commission considered a formal request from representatives of Oakland Baptist Church, which oversees the cemetery site.

At that meeting,

Commissioner Malcolm Page offered a motion to add Cabbage Grove Cemetery to the list of sites maintained by the county. Commissioner Thomas Demps seconded,

The in-town shuttle visits 22 stops throughout the city each hour from 7:30 a.m. until 6 p.m. Monday through

Friday. A trip normally costs \$1.

The stops include: Super Wash (1403 Hwy. 98 W.), Tidewater Apartments, Walmart, Perry Post Office, Jenkins Community Center, Exxon Station (1203 Byron Butler Pkwy.), Woodridge Apartments, Family Dollar,

Kmart, Winn-Dixie, Southern Villas, Pineview Apartments, Stonegate Apartments, Big Bend Technical College, BP Station (South Byron Butler Parkway), Dollar General, Taylor County Courthouse, Taylor County Public Library, Even Start, Taylor County Health Department,

Premier Medical, Taylor County Senior Center and Doctors' Memorial Hospital. The shuttle makes the loop every hour throughout the day, except from 12:30-1:30 p.m. Annually, more than 17,000 people utilize the in-town shuttle, which is part of the county's Transportation Disadvantaged Program.

County seeking options after bid exceeds grant funds for trail plan

The development of a "master mobility plan" for future pedestrian and bicycle trails in Taylor County is in danger of not being funded after the Taylor County Commission received just one response to its solicitation for consulting firms to bid on the project.

Unfortunately, the \$58,104 bid from CHW Professional Consultants in Alachua was more than \$22,000 over the \$36,000 grant the county received to pay for the project.

The county applied for the grant from the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) in May and was awarded the grant this fall. At the board's Nov. 19 meeting -- during which the bid was opened and the amount announced -- Commission Chair Pam Feagle said she was not in favor of spending that much local money on the project.

County Engineer Kenneth Dudley said that since there was only one bidder, county staff may be able to work with the firm to reduce the scope of work to lower the

cost, as long as the granting agency allowed. He also suggested the county contact DEO to see if there were additional funds available.

Newly-elected District 3 County Commissioner Sean Murphy said the county should seek more information before making a decision on the project.

Acting County Administrator LaWanda Pemberton offered that the issue could be turned over to a bid committee -- consisting of herself, Dudley and County Grants Coordinator Jami Boothby -- to determine what savings or additional funding might be available.

Commissioner Thomas Delps made a motion to follow Pemberton's suggestion, and Murphy offered a second. The measure passed unanimously.

"The master plan project has a great deal of support from Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, Florida Office of Greenways and Trails and Florida Trails Association," County Grants Director Melody Cox said at the board's Oct. 14 meeting, when the commission agreed to advertise for consultant firms.

"This project will assist in the rerouting of the Florida National Scenic Trail along the Taylor County coastline and Steinhatchee becoming a designated 'Trail Town,'" Cox said, adding that most of the proposed trails would be on state-owned land.

According to the bid documents, part of the master plan will address the physical logistics of pedestrian and bicycle facilities, including the impact on any environmentally-sensitive areas, potential landscape management issues, the types of surfaces used (hard or soft surfaces), maintenance of the systems (both short and long-term) and any potential liability issues.

During the discussion held at the Nov. 19 meeting, resident Cindy Moore questioned why horse trails were not included in the master plan proposal. Pemberton said many of the horse-riding opportunities in nearby counties were either private ventures or partnerships with state agencies, adding that she was a "horse person" herself.

A portion of the county's Hampton Springs Park is designated for horse riding.

'The mother church' dates back to 1853

"Before there was a President Abraham Lincoln, before the Civil War and an Emancipation Proclamation, before Florida seceded from the Union, there was the

Springhill Baptist Church in a place called Rosehead that was later to be named Perry."

Springhill Baptist Church, also known as "the mother church" to many

congregations in Taylor County, traces its roots to 1853.

Founding members were free blacks in a time when most African Americans in Florida were enslaved. The

circumstances that made these individuals free are not known, but the church history theorizes they could have been descendants of runaway slaves who came to Florida during the Spanish colonial period, or they may have been runaway slaves who lived with the Seminoles at some point in history.

The original sanctuary was nothing more than a shack made of brush, according to church records

and handed down lore.

A log school house – the first for African Americans in Taylor County – was established in the 1860-70s. A third church building was documented in 1874 and a fourth in 1916. The present church was building in the mid-to-late 1940s.

The Springhill Cemetery is what historians have called the descendant of a "burying ground for colored people" that was designated

in late 1904.

It began with a one-acre tract that, over time, expanded to include several acres. The earliest grave marker at the cemetery is dated 1910.

Older grave markers have been lost to time and it is those areas the newly-established Springhill Cemetery Restoration Committee will focus their efforts. (Please see related story.)

Lynn told commissioners the work at Springhill Cemetery would be spread across several phases over the next several years. While much of the property has been cleared, a quarter-acre section remains.

While the volunteer group has partnered with a local logging company to cut down some of the remaining trees, there are areas where

the number of graves will not allow the use of heavy equipment, Lynn explained.

He asked if the county's road department personnel, as well as the inmate crew assigned to the county, could help with cutting the trees that cannot be reached with the larger equipment.

County Commissioner Sean Murphy asked whether the site has been designated with a historical marker, and Lynn said, "Not yet."

County Administrator

LaWanda Pemberton stated that the county is currently behind on its project list, adding that the county is now limited to having just one inmate crew from the local prison.

She requested some leeway with scheduling the work at the cemetery around the county's other needs should the board agree to help with the project. Lynn agreed and asked only that the work not be scheduled during the heat of the summer.

marketing.

In 2014-15, Durden worked as office manager at North Florida Medical Centers in Tallahassee, where she oversaw program compliance, staff supervision, payroll, inventory, budget analysis and management, program growth and compliance, billing, collections and staff training.

For the previous eight-years (2006-14), Durden worked as program services manager with Early Learning Coalition of the Big Bend (formerly Arbor E&T Early Learning) in Tallahassee, where she oversaw offices in Taylor and Madison counties.

While working with the Early Learning Coalition, Durden was responsible for case management, determining eligibility for subsidized childcare

based on a family's needs, household size and income or school information.

From 2003-06, Durden worked as a business services representative with Employment Connections (Arbor E&T and The Paxen Group) in Madison County.

Durden completed her Bachelor's degree from St. Leo University in 2015 and Associate's degree from North Florida Community College in 2013.

and the measure passed unanimously.

The issue of the privately-owned cemetery was raised several times by former County Commissioner Steve Spradley. At the board's Oct. 1 regular meeting, County Attorney Conrad Bishop said the 1967 special act allows the county to conduct maintenance on cemeteries as long as they are open to the public and anyone can be buried there.

While the Cabbage Grove Cemetery is not an active cemetery, the county could provide maintenance because the grounds remain open to the public for visitation, Bishop said.

"No locked gates," Bishop explained.

He added that the next step would be for church representatives to approach the commission about adding the cemetery to the county's list for maintenance, resulting in the action taken on Nov. 19.

Under a 2008 ordinance (2008-10 Cemeteries), the county currently contracts out maintenance (mowing and weed-eating) on eight local cemeteries, including: Springhill, New Hope, Poor Spot, Pisgah, Spring Warrior, Waters, Shiloh and Stantaland.

Spradley first brought up the subject at the county's Sept. 4 meeting and then again during a Sept. 13 workshop session.

Spradley shared that the Cabbage Grove Cemetery was recently identified as being located on Four Rivers Land & Timber property, but has been since deeded to Oakland Church as a historical site.

"The county does not have to take ownership, but Oakland Church is not willing to take over maintenance," Spradley stated. "Danny Lundy asked me if the county would be willing to assume maintenance because they already pay to mow their own cemetery."

"We have other cemeteries that have been identified – just like this one – that are being maintained by the county. I want to know what law prevents us from maintaining this cemetery if it has been declared one of historical significance," Spradley said.

Demps then brought up Springhill Cemetery,

stating, "We've got to do it for all if we do it for one."

Page agreed, adding, "We need to do it for all and not just one."

At the Nov. 19 meeting,

the board also agreed to assist a group working to restore Springhill Cemetery with clearing debris away from the site (see related story).

I do remember other children at school and church discussing their Santa list.

The boys wanted bicycles, cowboy outfits with guns and holsters or Tinker Toys, while the girls mostly wanted baby dolls with a layette of clothes and a baby bed for them to sleep in or tea sets.

Their wants did not sway me to change my mind, which was firmly fixed on a beautiful Bride Doll.

When Christmas morning finally dawned, I was up with the sunrise to see if my prayer life had produced the doll of my dreams.

In the quietness of the house where everyone was sleeping, I tiptoed to the bedroom door and felt the rush of joy flood my small body as I spied my own personal Bride Doll in all of her beauty standing straight and tall underneath the Christmas tree.

I stood there, mesmerized, afraid to move, lest she might disappear right before my eyes.

Seeing that she was still there -- even after I blinked several times -- and with my heart racing with excitement, I floated to the tree and knelt down in front of her. I stared into her eyes and felt the connection that only those of us that have longed for the perfect gift can know when it is finally within our reach.

All such stories must have a conclusion, and this one does also -- although it was not the ending I would have ever expected.

Just a few days ago, my daughter Vickie and my younger sister Leta and I were discussing our favorite things that Santa had brought us when we were children.

I mentioned my Bride Doll and how she had disappeared without a trace a few years after Santa had brought her to me. With a guilty look on her face, Leta said, "I buried her in the back yard under the lemon tree because you wouldn't let me play with her!"

Can you believe it?!

I reminded myself that Leta was only five at the time of her dastardly deed and that we must let bygones be bygones, but I hope the next time I'm in Perry I don't have the urge to find a shovel and do a little digging to see if my beautiful Bride Doll is still there waiting for me.

My Afterthought is this: *Sometimes we are blessed with a connection that transcends time and space and finds a lodging place in our hearts that lasts a lifetime.*

*"Anticipation, anticipation
Is makin' me late
Is keepin' me waitin'"*

These familiar words are from the 1971 song, "Anticipation" by Carly Simon. While waiting for her date to arrive, she sat down with her guitar and wrote the song in only 15 minutes!

I looked up the word "anticipation" and found an excellent definition in the Cambridge Dictionary. It reads, "Anticipation is a feeling of excitement about something that is going to happen in the near future." Carly Simon must have been very excited about her date that evening for she wrote one of the most popular songs of the year.

Anticipation is at the heart of the Advent season. We Americans don't like to wait. Christmas is coming, but until Dec. 25 we are in the season of anticipation known as Advent. Like the ancient Hebrews longing for the arrival of their Messiah, we too must wait. And while we wait, we prepare for His arrival.

The prophet Micah wrote that the Messiah would be born in a little town called Bethlehem. Bethlehem means "House of Bread." How appropriate that the One who would be called, "The Bread of Life" would be born there. He is the one who can satisfy our spiritual hunger. Jesus said, "He who comes to Me will never go hungry."

And so, we find ourselves in this season of waiting. We are looking forward to celebrating Christmas. We think we are ready for it even now. But, we must wait. In the meantime, we can stop and consider what His arrival means. Words like hope, love, joy and peace come to my mind.

During this wonderful season we stop and consider His first Advent some 2,000 years ago and we prepare ourselves for Christmas.

Remember this -- the manger must lead to the cross. The boards that held the infant Jesus in safety must become the beams to which our Lord and Master was nailed.

We also are preparing for His second Advent. Now that's something to anticipate! Jesus is coming. Are you prepared? Anticipation...it's making me wait.

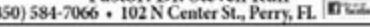

Learn about UWBB changes

United Way of the Big Bend (UWBB) will host grant funding opportunity information sessions today (Wednesday) for UWBB's upcoming 2019 grant cycle. During the sessions, attendees will learn more about funding opportunities in the five priority outcome areas that UWBB will direct program funding, including a demonstration on how to submit a "letter of intent" via UWBB's new online portal.

Beginning in 2019, funding will be directed to programs that closely align with UWBB's five priority outcome areas, including: housing, early learning (to include elementary-aged children and younger), safety net, aging workforce (to include retirees) and skills development.

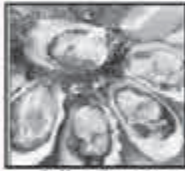
