JAIL TIME FOR ZIMMERMAN? **GIRLFRIEND CITES DOMESTIC ABUSE**



Shellie Zimmerman told Katie Couric during a televised interview that her infamous husband who killed teen Trayvon Martin is acting "like a monster." She said she hopes there are "no more casualties" caused by her husband's erratic behavior and that he is a "ticking time bomb"

This came three days after Zimmerman was arrested again. This time he was charged with aggravated assault, battery, and criminal mischief after threatening his new girlfriend with a shotgun and smashing a glass table during a domestic dispute. He has since been discharged.

"I hope that there's no violence, but he does seem like a ticking time bomb," said of her husband, who she has filed for divorce from as of Tuesday. "I know I'm certainly afraid. I just hope that he can get, maybe, the help that he needs to deal with his situation, and the no one else will be hurt.

JTA Relaunches OTTO As Skyway Hits the One-Millionth Trip for 2013



The Jacksonville Transportation Authority (JTA) relaunched its On-Time Transit Operations (OTTO) campaign - following the re-opening of the Mathews Bridge - designed to improve on-time performance and enhance customer service.

The first step of the campaign focuses on six of the most heavily traveled routes - AR6, CT1, CT2, K2, L7 and M5 - which represent 50% of JTA's daily ridership.

The route improvements, originally scheduled to begin Oct. 7, were delayed when the Mathews Bridge was damaged after being hit by a cargo ship. All lanes were closed until bridge repairs were completed. Launching OTTO has been one of the JTA's top priorities

"Our customers make 42,000 trips a day on JTA buses. They depend on us to get to work, school and medical appointments – so it's important to be on time," said JTA CEO Nathaniel P. Ford, Sr (pictured), "Through the OTTO campaign, we will analyze each route - starting with those most impacted by delays and develop solutions for our customers

"In March, shortly after I joined JTA, we began evaluating our routes and found that one of the biggest factors impacting our on-time performance was outdated time sched-ules," said Lisa Darnall, vice president of JTA Transit Operations, "Many had not been adjusted over the years, despite the growth that has occurred in Jacksonville. And we're not stopping after these six routes - we have already begun work on schedule adjustments for the next six routes, which will be announced in January

In addition, JTA will soon pilot-test a NextBus system that will allow customers to track when the next bus is due at their stop - via the web, a smart phone app or phone call - saving them valuable time.

Many factors contribute to on-time performance, including mechanical failures, driver behavior, customer behavior, traffic, accidents, detours and weather, according to Darnall, "Improving on-time performance is a team effort, and JTA is working with operators, mechanics, staff, our partners such as the Florida Department of Transporta and even our customers to ensure that everyone understands how they can contribute to a more timely bus system.

I am proud of the team effort I've seen from our operators and staff to implement OTTO, and the progress we've made," said Ford. "As JTA furthers its quest to attract more riders and become a regional transportation leader, we will continue to make excellent customer service a priority. Our next on-time performance milestone is to be

consistently hitting 75 percent by June 2014."

Meanwhile, on Friday, JTA celebratde an important milestone as the expected one millionth trip this year was taken on the Skyway

The JTA's Skyway system is an efficient and vital mode of transportation for our Downtown community." saidFord. "As we reach this important highlight for 2013, we want to personally thank our Skyway riders for their continued support and ridership." JTA staffers were at each of the eight stations between the hours of 6:30 and 8:30 a.m. and then again during lunchtime hours of 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. handing out thank you stomers riding that day to express gratitude for being loval customers

FAMILY DOESN'T WAIT FOR COPS: RESCUE WOMAN, KILL KIDNAPPER



Bethany Arceneaux, 29 is alive after her baby's father held her hostage for two days, torturing her. When found by her in an abandoned house, the woman was being stabbed by Scott Thomas, the estranged father of her two year-old who had snatched her from her vehicle and left the toddler behind.

The Louisiana family got in their cars and six of them arrived at the abandoned house after receiving a tip. They kicked down the door and found her bloody from stab wounds but alive. During a confrontation with Arceneaux's brothers, cousins and uncles, Thomas was shot as he allegedly attempted to kill her.

"She's shook up, she's sliced up, but she's alright," Ryan Arceneaux, a brother of the woman told media. "We found her. We went and got her in that house. We kicked doors down. It was like a movie unfolding."





Ray Charles

honored as Postal Service unveils stamp St. Augustine Record

Surely the spirit of music legend Ray Charles was on hand at Monday's unveiling of a U.S. stamp in his honor at the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind as the school's Outta Sight Band raised the roof with Charles" "Hit the Road Jack."

"You really moved me this morning," FSDB President Jeanne Glidden Prickett told the group that includes instrumentalists and vocalists, all sight impaired.

Outta Sight moved a lot of people — literally; their songs had U.S. Rep. Corrine Brown, D-Jacksonville, the signing interpreter and half the people seated in the audience moving to the beat.

Toe tapping aside, holding the unveiling of the commemorative stamp at FSDB made perfect sense — Charles attended the school until he was 15.

"He was a very special musical artist with several ties to the area," said Charles J. Miller, United States Postal Service district manger for the Gulf Atlantic District. All of those ties happen to be within the district that includes North Florida and Georgia.

Born in Albany, Ga., in 1930, Charles and his parents moved to Greenville, Fla., when he was an infant. He enrolled at FSDB in 1937 after becoming blind at the age of 7. At FSDB, he learned to read Braille and played a variety of musical instruments including the

piano, organ and clarinet, said Prickett.

When he left at the age of 15, it was because of a chance to begin performing. Along the way he dropped his last name, Robinson; that, Prickett noted, was because boxer Sugar Ray Robinson was rising to prominence and he didn't want any name confusion.

A composer, singer and pianist, Charles came up with a unique pop music style that continues to influence and is considered the creator of the soul music genre. A 17-time Grammy winner, he was given the Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award in 1987 and won a number of other honors before his death in 2004. Charles is the third to be honored in the USPS's Music leons series.

Miller noted another honoree, Frank Sinatra, once described Charles as "the only true genius in show business."

Speakers also took the time to salute the uniqueness of FSDB.

William L. Proctor, chancellor of Flagler College, a former state legislator and longtime FSDB board member and chair, spoke of the "extraordinary place" and the committed faculty. Proctor also saluted the band, adding it was "a bit challenging" to follow them especially after their rendition of Charles' version of "America the Beautiful" and his "Georgia On My Mind." FSDB junior Daniel Tanner was lead vocalist for both numbers.

National Football League players enjoy a healthy fan following while they are active players. However, when the playing days are over, the crowds tend to get smaller and smaller, eventually disappearing over a period of time. Stump Mitchell has never experienced that feeling because he has an uncompromising loyalty when it comes to his fan base.

As a ninth round draft choice from The Citadel, Mitchell played nine seasons in the NFL as a standout running back with the Phoenix (now Arizona) Cardinals. He would go on to become one of the greats as a running back and kick returner in Cardinals history. Mitchell is the Cardinals all-time leader in combined

vardage with 11,988 yards and is the holder of yardage with 11,988 yards and is the noticer of the number two position in team rushing history with 4,649 rushing yards. Mitchell's franchise records include number of kickoff returns (177) and yards (4,007). He also amassed 14 100-yard games. What many may not be aware is that Mitchell at one time was the single owner of the NFL record with 13 punt returns and kickoffs in a single game (the record was later tied, but still stands).

stands). As a popular Cardinal, Mitchell still enjoys a loyal fan base. Hailing from Kingsland, Georgia, whenever the Cardinals played teams in the southeast region (Atlanta, Tampa Bay, or Miami), Mitchell enjoyed even more support because his family and friends traveled to those locales to cheer him and his team to victory When he finally hung up the cleats, if the thought of not having a good support group in inought of not naving a good support group in his post playing days entered his mind, those thought were very short-lived. When the Arizona Cardinals arrived at EverBank Field recently, Mitchell enjoyed the support of approximately 75 fans that traveled from Norfolk, Virginia, Orlando, Florida, Atlanta, Georgia, Kingsland and St. Mary's, Georgia, At least 30 of the fans tailgated before the game as they awaited the opportunity to watch Mitchell's Cardinals face the Jaguars.

During a brief downtime in his schedule, Mitchell has a smile on his face as he speaks about those who are coming to the game to show him love and support.

"The people who are coming to see me, for the most part, I grew up with them. Also, their parents had a big impact on the person I am today. Often most people get to a certain level and for-get where they come from. That has never been me and will never be me."

Although Mitchell is well-known in the surrounding community for his athletic exploits, many are unaware of just how much of a humanitarian Mitchell has been as a player and in his post-playing days. It is known that Mitchell has purchased uniforms for youth

teams and provided financing for teams to travel. Also, since he has been a head coach on the collegiate level, Mitchell has reached back into the South Georgia and North Florida areas to provide opportunities for players who may not have be able to be offered a chance to play football at other schools.

During a brief timeout in his busy schedule, Mitchell spoke of the role models that sur-rounded him as a youth who were an inspiration that led to his giving back to the commu-

I never forgot where I came from. There were many individuals who have played a part in my success", says Mitchell. "And that's why I feel led to do what I do for other. As a youth,

I was challenged by the Glovers (Alvin and Donald) who helped me to become a decent football player. I idolized Rickey Anderson, who showed me the ropes as a running back. Other role models for me were Mayor Kenneth and Peggy Smith, Harold Anderson, and Leonard Taylor are some who played a role in where I am today." Hearing Mitchell spoke of his background and

how he has grown into a fine young man.
Every time Stump has been in the area, whether

as a player or a coach, I am going to be there to support him. I have always been proud of what he has done and more proud of what he does for

Johnny Robinson had a glowing endorsement of Stump's impact on the community.

'It's hard to put into words, but the impact that Stump has on me has been long lasting", says Robinson. "As a family person, he has been instrumental in my family and my business. He is the biggest hearted person one could ever meet. He is always giving of his time, of his gift, his treasure that God has blessed him.

Although there many who can attest to Mitchell's love for his family and friends, very few can match what Eddie "Cricket" Smith has witnessed. Smith has known Mitchell for over 50 years and to hear him speak, one would be led to believe that they are actually brothers.

"Stump is always thinking of home and looking out for everyone. It is hard for Stump to say no. He is always working hard to get the kids to the next level because he has been there and knows what it takes to get there", says Smith. "Although he has not been a coach at the high school, he is a solid supporter of Camden High

Making the drive from Orlando, Florida with his family, Eliseo Ortiz stated he would not have missed a chance to see Stump Mitchell back on the Cardinals sideline. "I am very proud that Stump came back home to the Cardinal family", says Ortiz, "As a former resi-dent of Phoenix, I got the chance to see Stump as player and now I get to see him as a coach. It makes me feel good to know that he came back home to give what was given to him. Seeing him as a coach tells me he supports the Cardinals and the state of Arizona."

Before arriving to Arizona, Mitchell ended a head coaching stint at Southern (LA) University. Mitchell speaks glowing of the current senior class, whom he recruited. In part two of this story, how Stump gave back through his days of being a collegiate head coach will be revealed

Carson Palmer's Career Outing Dooms Jaguars 27-14

Veteran QB Carson Palmer threw for a season-high 419 yards to go with a pair of touchdowns as the Arizona Cardinals downed the Jacksonville Jaguars, 27-14, to claim their third straight win Sunday.

"Defensively, the first drive was a little disappointing," said Jacksonville head coach Gus Bradley. "We had some things with personnel and miscommunication but after that we settled down pretty good."

The Jaguars scored touchdowns on each of their first two possessions with a 62-yard pass from QB Chad Henne to tight end Danny Noble and a oneyard touchdown run by running back Maurice Jones-Drew.

yard touchdown run by tunning back Maurice Jones-Drew. On 4th-and-1 from the Jacksonville 38, Henne faked a handoff and threw to wide open Noble, who made the catch and scored on just the fourth play from scrimmage.

Noble's touchdown catch was the first of his career and first touchdown for the Jaguars at home in 2013. Noble is one of six players in NFL history averaging 60-plus receiving yards with only one career reception for a touchdown.

The Jaguars' Jordan Todman returned a kickoff 59 yards. Clay Harbor's 21-yard catch at inside the five set up Jones-Drew's touchdown.

It was Jones-Drew's 80th career touchdown 67 rushing, 11 receiving, two on returns. He became the 54th player in NFL history with at least 80 touchdowns and now has rushing touchdowns in back-to-back games for the first time since

November of 2011.
He finished with 14 carries for 23 yards and four catches for 12

Rookie wide receiver Ace Sanders led the team with a career-high eight receptions for 61 yards including a 29-yard reception. He had a career-high six punt returns for 48 yards with a long of 14 yards.

Tight end Marcedes Lewis made his 100th career start Sunday and had 23 yards on three receptions. Former Cardinals' wide receiver Kerry Taylor made his Jaguars debut and had two receptions for 20 yards. Taylor was signed by the Jaguars off Artizona's practice squad on Nov. 4.

Jacksonville led 14-7 after the first quarter before the Cardinals ran off 20 straight points. Carson Palmer's first nine completions went to nine different receivers. He became the first Arizonia quarterback to throw for 400-plus yards since Kurt Warner in 2008. Palmer found Michael Floyd for a 91-yard score. It was the longest of Palmer's career and the second longest given up by the Jags in franchise history.



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
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


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
