

CMS Awards Florida Medicare Program 5 Stars

Scholastic Olympian dead at 29



Kamara Jones, the Jamaican-born fencer who represented the USA in the 2004 Olympics is dead. At 10, she left the Caribbean island and moved to New York where she received a full scholarship to Princeton. She was known for going to great lengths to raise funds for her spot on the team.

Said USA Fencing President Don Anthony issued this statement on James: "Kamara James was one of the brightest, precocious, self-assured young people I ever met. From her time as a very young fencer at the Peter Westbrook Foundation to her years at Princeton as an accomplished Olympian she remained warm, caring and confident. Kamara's untimely passing leaves our fencing community very saddened and her spirit, charm and wit will be dearly missed."

James' first Olympics was the 2004 Athens Games when she was 19. She won bronze at the Junior World Championships in 2003 and was a member of the Senior National Team since 16.

According to a post by Eric Rosenberg on Fencing.net, James experienced some mental health challenges: "Unfortunately, mental illness proved Kamara's most unrelenting adversary. Still, just prior to her death, she had resumed a stable drug regiment, was living comfortably and had begun thinking about the future."

EBOLA: NURSE BEING TREATED IN ATLANTA AS NATION GETS FEARFUL



Ebola fears are spreading throughout the United States now that two nurses are confirmed to be infected with the disease after treating the black male patient who died in Texas recently.

Adding fuel to the fears is that a 29 year-old nurse who is now being treated

at Emory hospital in Atlanta, received the okay from the Center for Disease Control to travel after she reported her symptoms.

The nurse, Amber Vinson, had left Dallas to travel to Ohio to plan her wedding with family. She then flew back to Dallas. Her plane took passengers to Fort Lauderdale and Atlanta before finally being detained for inspection.

Other developments with the disease making news this week include:

- The dog belonging to the nurse being treating in Dallas is now in quarantine.
- Dallas hospital apologizes for the way the treatment of the Ebola patient who died was handled.
- Nurse who worked at Dallas hospital goes on Today Show to blow the whistle on the staff not being trained to adequately handle an Ebola patient.
- Fears that Ebola can go airborne is being addressed.
- The Federal Government is being sued by a man claiming the Ebola virus is secretly a biological weapon allowed into the country by the Obama administration to further terrorist interests against Americans of the "Caucasian race and Jewish-Christian religion" according to a new lawsuit filed Tuesday against several members of the administration.

Man who drove car into home after being shot succumbs on scene



On Tuesday, October 14th, 2014, at approximately 10:42pm, Brunswick Police Officers responded to a shots fired call in the 2400 block of Albany Street.

Upon arrival officers located a Volvo station wagon that had crashed through the outer wall of a duplex apartment.

The driver of the Volvo, Nicholas James King was found unresponsive and suffering from multiple gunshot wounds.

King, a 22 year old black male from Glynn County, was pronounced dead at the scene. Brunswick Police Detectives along with members of the Violent Crimes Task Force arrived and processed the scene and canvassed the neighborhood for possible

witnesses.

At this time no motive, or suspects have been developed. 9mm shell casings were recovered at the scene. The vehicle was impounded for further processing and evidence collection. No one was inside of the duplex apartment at the time the Volvo crashed through the residence wall.





FACT SHEET: The White House Launches the "My Brother's Keeper Community Challenge"

In February, President Obama launched the My Brother's Keeper (MBK) initiative to ensure that all youth, including boys and young men of color, have opportunities to improve their life outcomes and overcome barriers to success. As part of that launch, the President also established the My Brother's Keeper Task Force (Task Force) to review public and private sector programs, policies, and strategies, and determine ways the Federal Government can better support these efforts. The Task Force was also charged with determining how to better involve State and local officials, the private sector, and the philanthropic community. In late May, the Task Force released its 90-day interim progress report, which identified a set of recommendations and a blueprint for action for government, business, non-profit, philanthropic, faith, and community partners.

Since the launch of MBK, the Task Force has met with and heard from thousands of Americans, through online and in-person listening sessions, who are already taking action. In June, responding to their commitment announced at the MBK launch, eleven of the nation's leading philanthropies announced \$194 million in independent incremental investments in organizations and initiatives, including programs to enhance school learning environments and reduce young people's interaction with the justice system. In July, President Obama announced new independent commitments by businesses and nonprofits representing more than \$100 million dollars and pledges of support from educators, business leaders, athletes, and mayors aimed at addressing some of the report's recommendations. Also in July, the National Convening Council (NCC) was launched as an independent private sector initiative bringing together leaders from business, philanthropy and the faith, youth, Tribal, local, and nonprofit communities.

On September 27th, the President announced that more than 100 mayors, county officials and tribal nations (full list below) have already accepted the "My Brother's Keeper Community Challenge" ("MBK Community Challenge" or "Challenge"), the next step in organizing and building upon the work of community leaders to improve outcomes for youth in America.

MBK Community Challenge

Today, the White House announced the MBK Community Challenge, an effort to encourage communities (cities, counties, suburbs, rural municipalities, and tribal nations) to implement a coherent cradle-to-college and career strategy aimed at improving life outcomes for all young people, consistent with the goals and recommendations of the Task Force's May report, to ensure that all youth can achieve their full potential, regardless of who they are, where they come from, or the circumstances in which they are born. The Challenge is not a new federal program, but rather a call to action for leaders of communities across the Nation to build and execute comprehensive strategies that ensure:

- All children enter school cognitively, physically, so-

cially, and emotionally prepared;

- All children read at grade level by third grade;
- All young people graduate from high school;
- All young people complete post-secondary education or training;
- All youth out of school are employed; and
- All young people are safe from violent crime.

The Task Force also identified a set of "cross cutting" areas, among them the importance of caring adults being present and active in the lives of children, hence the emphasis placed on mentoring.

The Challenge calls upon mayors, Tribal leaders, town and county executives, encouraging them to take the following steps: within 45 days of accepting the Challenge, local communities convene a Local Action Summit with key public and private sector stakeholders to assess needs, determine priorities, and decide what combination of the above objectives they will tackle; within six months of accepting the Challenge, communities publicly launch a plan of action for accomplishing their goals, which will include a protocol for tracking data, benchmarks for tracking progress, and a blueprint for how the community will resource its efforts.

The White House, the U.S. Department of Education, and the NCC are launching the Challenge. The NCC will provide communities with resources to support their local planning process, assisting them in developing successful strategies for action and tracking their progress. More information, including how local executives can sign up for the Challenge, is available at www.MBKChallenge.org.

Additionally, the Federal government has recently announced a number of programs that address recommendations in the My Brother's Keeper Task Force progress report. For example, the Department of Justice announced a \$4.75 million initiative to invest in training, evidence-based strategies, policy development and research to build trust and strengthen the relationship between law enforcement, and the communities they serve, and through the Smart on Juvenile Justice initiative, awarded \$2 million in three grants which provide training, technical assistance and education to improve the quality of services, end racial and ethnic disparities, and encourage reforms in juvenile justice systems. The Department of Education awarded more than \$57 million in grants focused on improving school climates and keeping students safe. And in September, the Departments of Justice and Housing and Urban Development announced a collaboration between HUD-funded organizations, and civil legal aid programs and public defender offices, to focus on expunging and sealing juvenile records — improving the chances that reentering youth will be able to obtain degrees, find work, and secure housing.

As a 24-year veteran of the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, Ken has served his community in many areas as an officer in





Homeless Man Arrested for Sudden Snatching

At approximately 1:40 p.m., a victim told officers she was first contacted by 53-year-old Victor McDaniel when she was walking towards to Bank of America. The victim told McDaniel she couldn't talk and continued to walk away.

When the victim was walking back, McDaniel came up behind her and said he needed a couple of dollars. The victim told McDaniel she didn't have any money and McDaniel continued to talk to the victim until she advised she may have a couple of dollars. The victim offered \$2 and McDaniel told the victim to give him \$20. He then reached into the victim's wallet and grabbed \$5. The victim told officers she was so upset and yelled at him and McDaniel fled.

Officers was able to quickly locate McDaniel and arrested him. McDaniel was arrested and charged with felony robbery by sudden snatching.

The police department reminds residents and visitors it's safer to give donations to local social services and not to an individual. Police say "Unearned cash is very enabling and does not engage homeless individuals in job and skills training which is needed to end homelessness. Additionally, more often than not, cash is not used for food and housing but is instead used to buy drugs and alcohol which further perpetuates the homeless cycle."

Man Who Flew Fatal Accident Finally Arrested Months Later

Police say 22-year-old Keith Hamm has been on the run since June 4th, 2014 when he fled the scene of a fatality accident.

On June 4th, 2014 at about 9:11 p.m., 61-year-old Anna Melendez was driving a 1997 white Toyota Camry. Anna Melendez's husband, 80-year-old Tomas Melendez, was riding in the front passenger seat of the car along with their son, 24-year-old Daniel Melendez in the back-seat.

At that time Hamm was driving a 2014 silver Nissan Altima. The Altima was an Avis rental vehicle. The Altima ran a stop sign and struck the right side of the Toyota Camry. The Toyota Camry flipped onto the driver side crashing into a chain link fence on the corner of an intersection.

After the collision, Hamm fled the area

on foot and was not located by responding officers.

Tomas Melendez was transported to a hospital where he was pronounced dead. Anna and Daniel Melendez were also transported to the hospital for treatment and was later released.

A tip was recently received that Hamm was at an apartment complex. Undercover units checked the area and Hamm was located sitting inside of a blue Honda Accord and was taken into custody without incident.

When Keith Hamm was located, he was taken into custody on charges of vehicular homicide and leaving the scene of a crash with death.

According to reports, Hamm has prior arrests for drug possession, battery, auto theft, and was just released from prison before the fatality accident after serving a 3 year and 7 month prison term for attempted armed robbery, aggravated battery with deadly weapon, felon in possession of a firearm, and carrying concealed firearm.

Two Arrested for Credit Card Fraud

Police arrested two men who used cloned credit cards.

The manager of a supermarket reported that a man tried to buy four gift cards but had to go through multiple credit cards before he found an active one. The last four digits on the card did not match the last four on the receipt. She provided a description of the suspect and a partial tag number for the van he got into, and made a call. Police responded and found the suspect and the driver in the parking lot. After identifying the suspect as 41-year-old Jerome Stubbs, police learned he had a warrant and determined that the 14 credit cards in his possession were counterfeit.







Stop the Violence!

We don't have control over how people act, but there are things we can still do to help minimize the danger or outcome of something that may be harmful. We must not only take our own actions in consideration, but also those of our children or loved ones. Here are some useful tips:

Start from the source

- Show children how to settle arguments or solve problems without using words or actions that hurt others. Set the example by the way you handle everyday conflicts in the family, at work, and in the neighborhood. Don't forget that common courtesies like "please," "thank you," and "excuse me" help ease tensions that can lead to violence.
- Discourage name-calling and teasing. These can easily get out of hand, moving all too quickly from "just words" to fists, knives, and even firearms. Teach children that bullying is wrong and take their fears about bullies seriously.
- Take a hard look at what you, your family, and your friends watch and listen to for entertainment - from action movies and cop shows to video games and music lyrics. How do the characters solve problems? Do they make firearms and other violence appear exciting, funny, or glamorous? Are the real-life consequences of violence for victims and families clear? Talk about what each of you liked and didn't like.
- Stick with friends and family who steer clear of violence and drugs. And encourage your children to do the same. Research shows use of alcohol and other drugs is closely linked with violence, including the use of guns and other weapons.

Reduce the risk

- Think long and hard about having weapons, especially firearms, in your home. Studies show that a firearm in the home is more than forty times as likely to hurt or kill a family member as to stop a crime.
- Look at other ways to protect yourself and your home. Invest in top-grade locks, jamming devices for doors and windows, a dog, or an alarm system. Start or join a Neighborhood Watch. Check with the police, the YMCA/YWCA, or the recreation department about a self-defense class.
- If you do choose to own firearms - handguns, rifles, or shotguns - make sure they are safely stored. That means unloaded, trigger-locked, and in a locked gun case or pistol box, with ammunition separately locked. Store keys out of reach of children, away from weapons and ammunition. Check frequently to make sure this storage remains secure.
- Obtain training from a certified instructor in firearms safety for everyone in the home. Make sure it's kept current.
- Teach your children what to do if they find a firearm or something that might be a weapon - Stop, Don't Touch, Get Away, and Tell a Trusted Adult.

A CHAT WITH PRIEST

SPOTLIGHT



Playwright Priest Tyaire brought his latest hit to Jacksonville, the stage play "Mrs. Independent" on Friday and Saturday, October 10th and 11th. The show features celebrity cast members Robin Givens of "Boomerang," Dottie Peoples known for the hit song "On Time God," and Christopher Williams known for the hit song "Don't Wake Me I'm Dreamin'."

We had a chance to chat with Priest a couple of weeks ago as he prepared for his journey to Jacksonville.

FS: "So, I'd like to know, when did you decide to become a playwright?"

PT: "I really had no desire to become a playwright. I actually went to school to become an electrician and open up a detail shop about 15 years ago. To me, my path was set, you couldn't have told me then that I wouldn't have a chain of detail shops or an electrical business!"

In 2006, his mother was diagnosed with lung cancer. Knowing she wouldn't have much time left, something drove him to write a story about her life and her accomplishments. By 15, his mother had given birth to 2 children, yet she went on to raise her kids, continue her education, and get her degree at 52 years of age. "Tears of a Teenage Mother" was written in her honor. The play debuted to two sold out audiences. Unfortunately, his mother succumbed to cancer two weeks before opening night.

The power the play yielded caught the attention of an organization in New Jersey, who reached out to him to perform the show for their youth group. Needless to say, His TRUE path was born.

FS: "Talk to the readers about some of the struggles you encountered?"

PT: "Losing everything. I walked away from a lucrative business to explore something in which I had no idea how to run. At the time, I had been in business with my detail shop 10 years and it was going very well." "But I NEVER gave up. Once I realized that I could take a 0.25 ink pen and a \$5.00 pad and people would come and see it. When I wrapped my mind around that concept, I knew I had something."

Priest continued to write, finding inspiration in everything around him. In 2014, his big break came when a national promoter picked up the plays.

FS: "Ahhh, Ok! So from your struggles, (he mentioned loss of a relationship) is that what prompted this play?"

PT: "Well, this story is definitely derived from a true story."

He does draw from a past relationship on a similar basis, not on the same field financially, but more so being unequally

yoked in life. The relationship ended, but yielded a beautiful son.

A question was asked by his assistant Kimberley Brown, "This is another prevailing question that has been coming up in some interviews, what you think men should do to maintain the leading role in the home? Are there certain dynamics the man should walk in to ensure a level of security for the wife regardless if she makes more money or not?"

PT: "Today's woman still have a certain expectation for the man to provide. Men will need to step their game up or meet in the middle somehow". (Schooling, more household responsibilities, etc. to balance the scale.) "A man's biggest cheerleader starts at home. Tearing a man down because he doesn't make the money you are doesn't work."

FS: "Which leads me to my next question, what lesson should women, who are in the position of being the bread winner, take away from this show to remember to keep balance in a relationship?"

PT: "Allow your man to still be a man." "He may not be the provider in a situation, but he ALWAYS has to be the PROTECTOR." "He has to be the king, the head."

FS: "I am excited to see the dynamics play out in this show! This is the first of your shows that I get the opportunity to see, but I'm sure it will not be the last!" "So what final words would you like to leave with your readers? Other than to come see the play!"

PT: I would love for people to look at this guy, who they don't know, who did this because he studied his craft. I bought the plays, watched the commentaries and back stage interviews, listened to how many songs should be in the play, how long a song should be, and when it should be inserted, etc. I just did my homework" "So if I can do it, they can do it as well."

The play, "Mrs. Independent" is an entertaining life learning experience, which gets rave reviews nationally and locally for shining light on a topic that is happening in our lives more often today. The play makes you laugh, cry, smile, and ultimately makes you think about the roles we play as men, women, fathers, mothers, spouses, and as a people. His desire to teach and mold our youth is evident in the local theater students that work the stage from Edward Waters College he has incorporated into the play. Priest Tyaire is definitely a name you will be hearing more of in the theatrical circuit!

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

St Simons' Harrington School opened for Gullah Geechee month

In about a decade, the Harrington School on St Simons Island will be celebrating 100 years since the day it opened its doors for "colored children" to receive an education. It was an era when "slavery" was not a word in history books, but when these young students were likely to have parents and grandparents who were actually born slaves.

Today, the school no longer has students but with people like Amy Roberts, it certainly continues

educating. Each weekend in October, which is also recognized as Gullah Geechee Month, the Harrington School's doors will be open to welcome in history enthusiasts to a part of the past which is sparsely documented.

"We plan to have folks come in from 11am to 3pm Saturdays in October," said Roberts who serves as the executive director for the St Simons African American Heritage Coalition.

"Inside the school is cleaned out," she explained. "In fact, some time ago it was used for a daycare center and two bathrooms along with a refreshment area were

erected but we've since moved them out in order to restore the building to its natural state."

In fact, she says the school which was built in the 1920s needs to be recognized by the state.

"We are working to have this school considered an official historical landmark," she said. "We are talking with the National Trust and other entities to officially secure that because this is a major part of who we are and it needs to be highlighted. As long as I am around, I am going to ensure that we do our best to show that we were a part of the history and legacy of this island."

Former Ware County HS Star Athlete Files \$12.5M Lawsuit Against Waycross Police

Former Ware County High School Football standout Montre' Merritt filed a \$12.5M lawsuit in Federal Court today stemming from an incident involving City of Waycross Police Officer, Cory Gray who assaulted Merritt at gunpoint as Merritt pulled into the driveway of his home. Merritt alleges that he was racially profiled and subjected to excessive and unwarranted force when the officer pointed his gun at Merritt's head and arrested him in front of his home for no apparent reason. Following the arrest, Merritt was cited for an alleged seatbelt violation. Merritt filed a complaint with the Waycross Police Department alleging racial profiling and excessive use of force. Officer Gray was found guilty of using excessive force by the Chief of Police and suspended for 5 days without pay. He was also ordered to take Judgmental Use of Force Training. Merritt is currently attending a four year university on an athletic scholarship and has never been in any legal trouble. He states that he continues to have nightmares and suffers emotional distress from this incident.

The Merritt case was filed by the same Dream Team of attorneys that filed the \$60M federal lawsuit against the Police in Ferguson Missouri on behalf of the peaceful protestors who alleged that their rights were violated when they were assaulted and arrested by police during the protests immediately following the Mike Brown shooting by Ferguson Police Officer, Darren Wilson.

We will also seek out and bring to justice any law enforcement agency that (a) harbors, maintains, protects and/or fails to remove rogue police officers; and/or (b) fails to discontinue the use of any unlawful police practices. If these law enforcement agencies will not voluntarily make these corrections to uphold the rights of law abiding citizens, we will continue to file law suits until all of the victims receive just compensation and the violators are forced into compliance.

Rookie QB Blake Bortles was 32 of 46 and threw for 336 yards and a late TD to tight end Clay Harbor. Jacksonville's Cecil Shorts led all receivers with 10 catches for 103 yards. Rookie running back Storm Johnson out of UCF scored another TD on the ground.

Harbor's catch came with 37 seconds left in the game. The onside kick was bobbled by the Titans and eventually wound up in the hands of a Jaguars player at his own 42-yard line. Three plays later Scobee's kick was blocked at

Harbor, who missed the first three games with a calf injury, has 14 catches for 183 yards in the last three games.

"I had a sense of foreboding. I'm just glad we made a play at the end to win the game," admitted Titans head coach Ken Whisenhunt. "I'm glad to get the win today. It's what we needed."
