Federal Court Rejects Trump Administration's Bid to End DACA

Orders Full Reinstatement of DACA Program If DHS Can't Improve Upon Explanation for Termination

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), the country's original civil rights organization, celebrates a huge victory for DACA recipients around the nation. A federal court in Washington, D.C. found legally insufficient the memorandum issued by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) terminating the DACA program and struck down the memorandum unless DHS can offer a stronger basis for ending the program affecting hundreds of thousands of undocumented immigrants.
Federal Judge John Bates said the decision by the Trump administration to rescind DACA was "virtually unexplained and as such "unlawful." He gave DHS 90 days to provide a legally sufficient explanation. If DHS fails to provide an explanation that meets legal muster, DACA will be vacated in its entirety and DHS will be required to maintain the program for current enrollees and to accept and process applications from new enrollees who meet the program's eligibility rules. Decisions from other federal courts have mandated that DHS temporarily continue the DACA program as to current enrollees pending further action in those cases. Judge Bates's decision represents the first time that any court has vacated DHS's "Rescission Memorandum," thus potentially allowing new enrollees to participate in the program for the first time since DACA was terminated.

SENATOR DARRYL ROUSON CALLS ON GOVERNOR TO FIX RIGHTS RESTORATION PROCESS

Tallahassee, FL - On April 25, 2018, Senator Darryl Rouson (D-St. Petersburg) thanked Governor Scott for heading his call for an emergency meeting of the Florida Cabinet, which sits as the state's Clemency Board, to fix the fatally flawed voter rights restoration process for convicted felons.
U.S. District Judge Mark Walker's permanent injunction declaring Florida's rights restoration process in violation of the 1st and 14th Amendments should serve as an opportunity to fix the one million, five



hundred thousand Floridians who have completed their sentence and paid their debt to society. "Either we have a department of corrections that helps felons reenter society, or we should call it a Department of Warehousing where every felon becomes a Hester Prynne wearing their own scarlet letter," said Sen. Rouson. "It is past time Florida has revised and repaired its anachronistic and broken voting rights restoration process for felons," stated Senator Rouson. "Governor Scott should use this opportunity to remove the onerous required waiting period of restoration of voting rights for all felons and make voting rights restoration automatic upon completion of the sentence." Florida is one of only two states where voting rights are lost until completion of a sentence and a mandatory waiting period. Nebraska has a two year waiting period while Florida's is five to seven years depending on offense. "This isn't just a voting rights issue—it's a civil rights issue," said Senator Rouson. "Selectively restoring voting rights on overly broad and vague criteria with no strict timeline, procedural safeguards or clear standards for restoration of rights denies First Amendment protections guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution."



State Senator Audrey Gibson (D-Jacksonville) and State Representative Tracie Davis (D-Jacksonville) presented a \$356,000 mock check to Edward Waters College for the start of the second national College Promise Program. During the 2018 Legislative Session, Senator Gibson and Representative Davis worked hand-in-hand advocating for state funding for the program which creates a pathway for low-income, first time in college students to attend four-year institution to earn their degree. The funds will be used to bridge gaps in resources from other forms of financial assistance to cover tuition for the entire four years for roughly 100 incoming students. This allows the students to graduate debt free.

“Every individual who wants to start and finish their four year education to a higher level should be able to do so and not carry a load of debt through their own retirement. Working with Representative Davis in the House yet again was great!” said Senator Gibson. “So excited as the State Rep. for the area and an alumni of Edward Waters College to have been part of the team with Senator Gibson to secure this funding for such a great program. College Promise is the second program in the nation providing a debt free pathway to higher education for first time students. This is the future of higher education and funding is critical to its success,” said Representative Davis.

Governor Scott: Jacksonville Area Ranks Third In State For Job Creation

On April 20, 2018, Governor Rick Scott announced that Florida businesses have created more than 1.5 million jobs since December 2010. The Jacksonville area added 21,200 new private-sector jobs in the past year, creating the third-highest number of jobs among all Florida metro areas. Jacksonville's unemployment rate was a low 3.5 percent in March, down 0.5 percentage points from a year ago. Statewide, Florida businesses created 12,500 new jobs in March.

Governor Scott said, “With more than 21,000 new jobs, families in Jacksonville should have confidence that Florida is the best state in the nation to succeed and raise a family. Over the past seven years, Florida has demonstrated that cutting taxes and eliminating burdensome regulations creates jobs and opportunities for businesses to grow and succeed.”

The industries with the highest growth over the year in Jacksonville were leisure and hospitality with 4,500 jobs and trade, transportation, and utilities with 4,100 jobs. The Jacksonville area once again rounded out the top five metro areas in job demand, with 19,971 openings, and had the fifth-highest number of openings for high-skill, high-wage STEM occupations with 5,365 online openings. As of March, Florida's unemployment rate is at 3.9 percent, a drop of 6.9 percentage points since December 2010; this drop is faster than the national decline of 5.2 percentage points. In the last year, 132,000 people entered Florida's labor force, a growth of 1.3 percent, which is greater than the national labor force growth rate of 1.0 percent.

A new Government Accountability Office (GAO) report released last month, “K-12 Education: Discipline Disparities for Black Students, Boys, and Students with Disabilities,” reminds us once again that suspensions and expulsions continue at high rates and offer grave risks to students. The report by this federal monitoring agency reviews data from the Education Department's Civil Rights Data Collection on school discipline trends across the country, provides a more in-depth look at discipline approaches and challenges faced in five states, and reviews past efforts by the Departments of Education and Justice to identify and address disparities and discrimination. The GAO reminds us all of the profound ways school discipline affects students and can impair both their childhood and adulthood. For example, “research has shown that students who are suspended from school lose important instructional time, are less likely to graduate on time, are more likely to repeat a grade, drop out of school, and become involved in the juvenile justice system.” It also notes children experiencing school discipline often have behavioral issues affected by challenges outside the classroom, which are often more acute for poor children – especially children of color, who are more likely to be poor. The report makes a strong case that there is still much work to be done and we must insist that this administration keep moving forward with solutions – building on what we know is working. We must resist current attempts to move us backwards and instead protect students from discriminatory practices. There are good superintendent-led examples out there to build on. The GAO's analysis examines six categories of discipline: out-of-school suspensions, in-school suspensions, referrals to law enforcement, expulsions, corporal punishment, and school-related arrests. It examines the data by race/ethnicity, sex, disability, and poverty level, and included studies of illustrative school districts in California, Georgia, Massachusetts, North Dakota, and Texas. Overall, the GAO found that Black students, boys, and students with disabilities were all disproportionately disciplined in the 2013-2014 school year (the latest available data) and that disproportionality is widespread and persistent despite the level of school poverty, type of disciplinary action, or type of public school attended (e.g., traditional, magnet, charter, alternative, or special education). A closer look at some of the sobering findings:

- Race not poverty explains the disparities in discipline. This report is the first time discipline rates were analyzed by poverty level, and results show that race is a more important factor in discipline decisions than poverty. Even in the most affluent school districts, 7.5% of Black boys had been given an out-of-school suspension compared to 1.8% of White boys. On the other hand, disproportionality “was particularly acute for Black students in high-poverty schools, where they were overrepresented by nearly 25 percentage points in suspensions from school.”
- Black students represented 39% of students suspended from school even though they accounted for 15.5% of all public school students. These disparities can be seen as early as preschool where Black children accounted for 47% of students suspended from preschool even though they were only 19%

of all public preschool students. Black boys have the highest rate of out-of-school suspension overall and Black girls have the highest rate of all girls.

- Boys were two-thirds of those disciplined, though they accounted for just 50 percent of all public school students. Even as early as preschool boys accounted for 78% of children suspended from preschool but were only 54% of all public preschool students.
- Students with disabilities represented 25% of students who have been referred to law enforcement, arrested for a school-related offense, or suspended from school but accounted for just 12% of all public school students. School districts included trauma, mental health issues, social media (including bullying and other conflicts), immigration status, gang involvement, drug use by students or parents, lack of parental guidance and support, and situational barriers like transportation, jobs, and responsibilities at home among the many challenges that affect student behavior or attendance and can lead to discipline issues. There is a clear recognition in finding after finding in the report that more attention and resources are needed to help schools reduce disparities in discipline, not less. That overall finding is critically important now as Secretary of Education Betsy DeVos seems intent on the Department doing less rather than more to protect children from discrimination in suspensions and expulsions and other areas and reversing what progress has been made. In 2014 the Department of Education and Department of Justice jointly released an extremely helpful school discipline guidance package to address these kinds of inequities in school discipline and reinforce the meaning of the non-discrimination requirements under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act. Yet the Education Department under Secretary DeVos now threatens to withdraw that guidance. The Children's Defense Fund strongly supports the 2014 guidance package and the GAO report's findings help reconfirm why it must remain in place for our nation's children. The guidance reaffirms the obligation school districts and those directly serving students have to ensure discrimination does not interfere with a student's right to learn and succeed. It makes clear to all superintendents and other administrators, teachers, aides, parents, and students that students have legal rights to be free of discipline policies that push students out of school and can promote serious inequities in their educational opportunities. The law in this area is clear and has been for more than 50 years; the guidance brings legal protections together with practical steps districts can put in place through their school discipline policies and practices to comply with these nondiscrimination requirements. It has helped communities recognize and praise good policies and challenge the bad. Positive discipline practices are key to ensuring all children are treated fairly and all students can feel respected and supported in safe schools where they have equal educational opportunities. The Children's Defense Fund has been highlighting the disparate impact of school discipline policies on children of color and poor children since the publication of our 1975 report, School Suspensions: Are They Helping Children? Too much of what we learned then remains true today. It is critically important that the 2014 Title VI Guidance be maintained and that it not be made easier for schools to push children of color, boys, and children with disabilities out of school with impunity in a disgraceful race to the bottom. We must not in any way weaken our efforts to move forward to create a level education playing field for all children.






"Dr. King was right when he said that the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice," said NAACP President and CEO Derrick Johnson. "Our nation made a promise to protect undocumented young immigrant and this administration attempted to renege on that promise, but justice prevailed."

The NAACP and its co-plaintiffs successfully argued that the defendants failed in their efforts to articulate a legally sufficient justification for refusing on the commitments extended through the DACA program to DACA-eligible undocumented immigrants. Plaintiffs in the case also alleged that the Trump administration violated the Due Process Clause of the Fifth Amendment, the Equal Protection Clause of the Fifth Amendment, and the Regulatory Flexibility Act by terminating the DACA program, but the court's ruling was confined to the plaintiffs' Administrative Procedure Act claims.

The NAACP filed its case in September of last year against President Trump, Attorney General Jefferson Sessions, DHS Secretary Elaine Duke, U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement and the Department of Homeland Security, in defense of people of color eligible for the DACA program. The NAACP was joined in the case by two of the nation's largest labor unions- the American

Federation of Teachers (AFT) and the United Commercial Food Workers (UCFW). Later Princeton University and Microsoft Corporation filed a similar case that was joined with the NAACP case.

"This is a major win for advocates for justice and a compassionate democracy," said NAACP General Counsel Bradford M. Berry.

There are approximately 800,000 DACA recipients across the country, including some who are NAACP members, and many more who are DACA eligible. The vast majority of DACA registrants and those eligible for DACA are people of color. More than 80% of registrants are of Mexican origin, according to a report from the Migration Policy Institute; about 36,000 immigrants of African origin were also immediately eligible for the DACA program. Additionally, the report shows that over 20,000 undocumented youth from the Dominican Republic and Jamaica are eligible for DACA.

"Ending the DACA program was neither right nor lawful. Given the unstable political climate our clients and the other Dreamers faced, it's great to know that their education and livelihood will be able to continue without the looming threat of deportation," said Joseph M. Sellers, Partner at Cohen Milstein Sellers & Toll, PLLC, who served as lead attorney for the NAACP in the case.

Golf Club Calls Police on Black Women Members for Allegedly Playing Too Slow

The five women, one a local NAACP president, say it's a clear case of racial and gender discrimination.

Five Black women, members of the Grandview Golf Club in Braddock, the oldest public golf course in York County, Pa., decided to meet on Saturday for a round of golf. The outing ended with the club co-owner, who is white, calling the police on the only Black, female players on the course because they allegedly played too slow and did not want to cancel their membership and leave.

Sandra Thompson, 50; Myneca Ojo, 56; Sandra Harrison, 59; Carolyn Dow, 56; and Karen Crosby, 58, are experienced golf players, having played on courses throughout the country, nationally and internationally. They are part of a larger group of local women known as Sisters in the Fairway, which has been around for at least 10 years.

Thompson, an attorney, is the president of the York branch of the NAACP and the vice chair of the county Democratic Party. In a Facebook post on Sunday, she said that she and her friends "know golf etiquette and rules," and the group was harassed and discriminated against because they are Black and women.

"We, the only all African American group and the only all women golf group on the Grandview Golf Club's course, were discriminated against, refused the benefits of our membership, were told to vacate the premises and had the police called on us," she wrote.

"When I arrived, I asked permission of the clerk to play with five people because

five is not always allowed. Permission was granted. Grandview was backed up, so we did not start until about 11 a.m., an hour after our tee-time. We did not complain."

Thompson said that former York County Commissioner Steve Chronister, the father of Grandview's co-owner Jordan Chronister, spoke on behalf of the club and harassed the group twice, starting after they teed off on the second hole, saying they weren't keeping up with the pace.

"I felt we were discriminated against," Ojo told the York Daily Record. "It was a horrific experience."

Ojo is the director of diversity and inclusion at the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission, according to her Facebook page.

She said the elder Chronister was "extremely hostile."

Thompson said to him, "Do you realize we're the only Black women on this course, and you're only coming up to us? We paid, we want to play."

She said he "walked off in a huff."

Harrison said she spoke with a Grandview golf pro at the same hole, who said the women were fine as they were keeping pace with the group ahead of them, according to the newspaper.

"Our group was distraught at the accusations and continued wrongful treatment, so three stopped play after we finished the front 9, at about 1 p.m. With five people, we finished the first 9 in about two hours even with disruptions," Thompson wrote on Facebook.

They took a break and Thompson and Ojo resumed play at hole 10.

"The group behind us just arrived, so we waved them on to play before us," Thompson wrote. "However, they told us to go, because their group members wanted a beer break."

She also took cellphone video describing the incident, where you see the men returning with drinks and food.

Chronister, his son and several other white, male employees then told the women that their break between the first and second halves of the course was too long.

"They wanted us off the course," Thompson wrote. "They didn't want us as members offering to refund our membership."

The men then called the Northern York County Regional Police to remove the women from the course. Thompson said the police were "respectful." The authorities conducted interviews and no one was charged.

"We were called there for an issue, the issue did not warrant any charges," Northern York County Regional Police Chief Mark Bentzel said in a statement. "All parties left and we left as well."

J.J. Chronister, co-owner

of Grandview and wife of Jordan Chronister, said she called the women to personally apologize.

"We sincerely apologize to the women for making them feel uncomfortable here at Grandview, that is not our intention in any way," she told the York Record on Sunday.

The same day, the golf club said in a statement on Facebook that "several of our members had an experience that does not reflect our organization's values" and "we are disappointed that this situation occurred."

However, on Monday, the golf club issued a second statement, which wasn't apologetic, saying, in part, that the women didn't follow the rules:

"In this instance, the members refused to leave so we called police to ensure an amicable result. The members did skip holes and took an extended break after the 9th hole.

"We spoke with them once about pace of play and then spoke with them a second time. During the second conversation we asked members to leave as per our policy noted on the scorecard, voices escalated, and police were called to ensure an amicable resolution."



Jaguars Unveil New Uniforms and More at State of the Franchise Event

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — During the annual State of the Franchise presentation on April 19 for the Jacksonville Jaguars, new uniforms were unveiled, plans for the stadium were announced and the future of the surrounding area revealed. Jaguars owner Shad Khan, team president Mark Lamping and executive vice president of football operations Tom Coughlin were in attendance.

The most anticipated news would be the unveiling of its new Nike Vapor Untouchable uniform. According to Steve Ziff, Vice President, Marketing and Digital Media, the Jaguars uniforms are reverting back to a "more classic, timeless look," having removed much of the gold color from its uniforms and helmets while emphasizing its teal and black colors. Starting with headgear, the new all-black helmets have been designed with high-gloss paint and will feature the updated logo on either side of the helmet. "JAX" will appear on the front panel and "JAGUARS" on the helmet's rear, white bumper.

There will be three different jersey options to choose from (black, white and teal), three pants options (black, white and teal) and two sock options (standard, color rush teal). In addition, the logo has been repositioned and now rests over the player's heart on the jersey. And, for a cleaner, sleeker look, there will be no outlines on the numbers or accents on the pants. Fans will have the opportunity to purchase brand new jerseys on Thursday, April 26 at the team's Uniform Launch and Draft Party at Daily's Place.

"Jacksonville deserves the best. Our fans deserve the



best. Our fans have earned the best," said Khan.

Also at the event, the Jaguars announced they have sold 7,500 new season tickets for the 2018 season, no doubt a positive by-product of the team's success in 2017. In addition, it was reiterated that the 2018 NFL season will begin with a stadium name change. EverBank Field will now be known as TIAA Bank Field since it officially acquired EverBank in June 2017. City Council unanimously approved the name change on March 27, 2018.

Other highlights included the Jaguars becoming the first NFL franchise to open a doggy daycare park at their stadium. Pet Paradise, now the Official Pet Services Partner of the Jaguars, will staff and run the dog park. The dog park will be



located at the south end zone fan deck and will be staffed with a veterinarian.

Adding to the excitement, the Jaguars announced that Jacksonville's homegrown band, Lynyrd Skynyrd, will end its "Last of the Street Survivors Farewell Tour" at the new stadium on September 2. Kid Rock and Jason Aldean will be among the "special guests" appearing with the band.

In a big-picture move, the Jaguars announced that they are working with the Baltimore-based development firm Cordish Cos. on a \$2 billion project to transform downtown Jacksonville and the area around TIAA Bank Field. Cordish specializes in large-scale revitalization projects in urban areas. At this

point, there is no timeframe when the plan will come to fruition. However, the plan includes a convention center, hotels, a renovated marina, and plenty of space for future development. It's also possible that residential housing could end up being part of the final plans. The project is being viewed as a long-term plan for major development of the Shipyards property and beyond near the stadium.

The project helps ensure that the Jaguars remain a focal point of downtown Jacksonville and the entire Jacksonville community for many years to come. Khan described the development as "absolutely paramount" if the team is going to be a stabilizing force in the area economically.

With their playoff hopes on the line, the Devils would get a goal of their own from veteran forward Patrick Maroon to cut the deficit to one. To the Devils trailing late into

the third period, they would bench Schneider for an extra man to try to come up with the tying goal.

However, the Lightning would take advantage of the Devils' vacant net, as forward Ryan Callahan would score an empty-netter with 1.7 seconds remaining in the game and end the first-round series.

With the victory, the Lightning will await the winner of the Boston Bruins and Toronto Maple Leafs series to compete in the second round.
