





A Few Words About Your Thanksgiving Turkey

In two short weeks, most of you will be putting a turkey on the table. Over the years, I've gotten some very interesting questions about turkeys. People want to take short cuts, or they forget to thaw it ahead of time. That big bird can be intimidating. You don't prepare one every day and most people buy the biggest one they can find and then aren't sure what to do it. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has established food safety guidelines for preparing your holiday bird; so once again, I'm sharing those recommendations with you. Hopefully, it will make your Thanksgiving feast an easy meal to prepare.

How to Buy

Turkeys come in all sizes to fit everyone's holiday meal plan. They can be purchased whole or in parts, suitable for small families or those who have a preference for white or dark meat. They come fresh, frozen, self-basting or pre-stuffed. Most people tend to over buy on the size of their turkey, you only need to figure one pound of turkey per person. This will give you enough for a meal and leftovers for the next day.

Thawing

Thawing a turkey in the refrigerator is the safest method. Plan to purchase your turkey far enough in advance to thaw in the refrigerator:

Whole turkey

8 to 12 pounds	1 to 2 days
12 to 16 pounds	2 to 3 days
16 to 20 pounds	3 to 4 days
20 to 24 pounds	4 to 5 days

Pieces of large turkey

half, quarter, half breast ----- 1 to 2 days

If it's the day before and you forgot to thaw the bird, don't panic. Turkey can be safely thawed in cold water, providing you change the water frequently. Keep the bird in its original wrap and make sure there are no tears, and place in the sink or a large pan and cover with water. Change the water every 30 minutes.

Thawing time in Cold Water

8 to 12 pounds	4 to 6 hours
12 to 16 pounds	6 to 9 hours
16 to 20 pounds	9 to 11 hours
20 to 24 pounds	11 to 12 hours

Roasting

Set the oven no lower than 325° F. Pre-heating is not necessary.

Be sure the turkey is completely thawed. Times are based on fresh or completely thawed birds at a refrigerator temperature of 40° F or below.

Most turkeys come with roasting instruction that can be easily followed. USDA recommend placing the turkey breast-side up on a flat wire rack in a shallow roasting pan 2 to 2 1/2 inches deep. Add 1/2 cup of water to the bottom of the pan. Loosely tent the bird with aluminum foil for 1 to 1/2 hours, then remove from browning. Or, a tent of foil may be placed over the turkey after the turkey has reached the desired golden brown.

If a meat thermometer is not available, it is best to cook the stuffing in a casserole dish. Mix ingredients just before oven cooking and if you stuff your bird, stuff it loosely. Additional time is required for the turkey and stuffing to reach a safe internal temperature.

Cooking times

Unstuffed

4 to 6 lbs. Breast	1 1/2 to 2 1/4 hours
8 to 12 lbs.	2 3/4 to 3 hours
12 to 14 lbs.	3 to 3 3/4 hours
14 to 18 lbs.	3 3/4 to 4 1/4 hours
18 to 20 lbs.	4 1/4 to 4 1/2 hours
20 to 24 lbs.	4 1/2 to 5 hours

Stuffed

8 to 12 lbs.	3 to 3 1/2 hours
12 to 14 lbs.	3 1/2 to 4 hours
14 to 18 lbs.	4 to 4 1/4 hours
18 to 20 lbs.	4 1/4 to 4 3/4 hours
20 to 24 lbs.	4 3/4 to 5 1/4 hours

For safety and doneness, the internal temperature should be checked with a meat thermometer. The temperature must reach 180°F in the thigh of a whole turkey (center of the stuffing should reach 165° F) before removing it from the oven. Cook a turkey breast to 170° F.

Juices should be clear. In the absence of a meat thermometer, pierce an unstuffed turkey with a fork in several places; juices should be clear with no trace of pink.

A pre-stuffed turkey should not be thawed, follow the roasting instructions that come with the bird.

Let the bird stand 20 minutes before removing stuffing and carving.

Goodbye Gunny

I wrote the following note in 1999 to be read at the last reunion my squad would ever have. This get together was to honor my Gunnery Sergeant's 65th birthday. We were several men shy that last time we met, many had passed, some in war and others because they had nothing else to do. Today, I'm the last. I thought I would share this note with you, this being the Marine Corps birthday. I miss you Gunny.

One thing we weren't aware of at the time, but became evident as life wore on, was that we learned true leadership from the finest examples any young man was ever given, a Gunnery Sergeant.

They were crusty men, who had done it all. They had been forged into men who had been time tested over more years than most of us had time on earth. The one I remember most wore gun oil stained covers with scratched and dinged-up insignias. Though some had Bull Durham tags dangling out of their right hand pockets or maybe a pipe and tobacco, mine didn't. But he did have a Zippo lighter that had been every-where, should one of his boys need a light.

Most of them were as tough as a boarding house steak. This is a quality required to survive the life they lived. They were and always will be a breed apart from all other men. They took seventeen year old kids like me and hammered them into Marines. You instinctively knew it had to be hell on earth to have been born a Gunny's kid. God should have given all sons born to Gunny's, a return option.

A Gunny didn't have to command respect. He got it because there was nothing else you could give them. They were God's designated hitters on earth. We had Gunny's with fully loaded Combat Patrol Pins in my day. Hard core men who found nothing out of place with the use of the word "Jap" to refer to the little sons of Nipon, they had littered the floor of Pacific Islands, as payback for a little December 7th tea party they gave us in 1941. As late as 1970, you could still hear a Gunny screaming at you in boot camp. To listen to him because if you didn't, the damn Gooks or Krauts would kill us all.

They taught me in those days, "Insensitivity was not a word in a Marine's lexicon". They remembered lost Marines and still cursed the cause of their loss. They were expert at choosing descriptive adjectives and nouns, none of which their mothers would have endorsed. At the rare time you saw a Gunny in dress blue uniform you saw rows of hard earned worn and faded ribbons over his pocket. "Hey Gunny, what's that one?" "Oh hell kid, I think it was the time I fell out of a hooker's bed, I can't remember, there was a war on. They gave them to us to keep track of the campaigns we had in country."

We got our news from Stars and Stripes, to be honest, we just took their word for it.

Hell son, you couldn't pronounce most of the names of the villages we went to. Listen, son, ribbons don't make you a Marine. "The Purple one on top"? Yea, I remember that one. We knew who the heroes were and in the final analysis that's all that matters.

Many nights we sat in our hooch, wrapping ourselves around cups of coffee and listening to their stories. They were lighthearted stories about warm beer shared with running mates in corrugated metal hooch's at rear base landing zones. The only furniture was a few packing crates and a couple of Coleman lamps. Standing in line at a Philippine cathouse or spending three hours soaking in a tub in Bangkok smoking cigars and getting loaded. It was our history and we dreamed of being just like them because they were our heroes. When they accepted you as part of their crew, it was the highest honor you would ever receive in your life. At least, it was for me.

They were not men given to the prerogatives of their position. You would find them with their sleeves rolled up, shoulder-to-shoulder with you in a stores loading party. "Hey Gunny, no need for you to be out here tossin crates in this rain, we can get all this crap aboard. "Son, the term all hands means all hands. "Yea Gunny, but you're no kid anymore. Marine, when I'm eighty-five parked in the old Marine's home in Gulfport, I'll still be able to kick your worthless butt from here to fifty feet past the guard house with six of your closest buddies. I knew he wasn't kidding, he probably could.

They trained us, not only us, but hundreds more just like us. If it weren't for Gunny's, there wouldn't be a Marine Corps. No one could give birth to a Gunny, they were just born as hot sacking grunts and matured like good whiskey in wood barrels and steaming jungles over many years.

Nothing a nineteen year-old jaybird could cook up was original to these old grunts. They had seen young men come and go for many years and they could read them like a book. "Son, I know what you're thinking, one word of advice, "DON'T" it won't be worth it. "Yes sir Gunny".

Gunny's aren't the kind of guys you thank. Appreciation of what they did and who they were, comes with long distance retrospect. No young man takes time to recognize the worth of his leadership. That comes later when you have experienced poor leadership. It also, comes when you have the maturity to recognize what leaders should be. You then find that Gunny's are the standard by which you measure all others. Gunny's at time butchered the Queen's English, they had been educated by what they did and saw from Copenhagen to Singapore. They had given their entire lives to the United States Marine Corps. In the progression of the nobility of employment, the title Gunny heads the list.

So when we ultimately get to our final duty station assignments and we get to wherever the big Gunny in the sky assigns us, there will be Marines guarding the streets. There will be a Gunny in an old oil stained hat, maybe a cigar clenched in his teeth and a coffee cup that looks like it contains oil standing in the passage way to assign us our bunks and tell us where to stow our gear. Then we will all be young again and the damn coffee will float a rock. Life fixes it so that by the time a kid grows old enough, smart enough to recognize who he should have thanked along the way, he no longer can. If I could, I would thank my old Gunny: "Gunny if you only knew what you succeeded in pounding in this thick skull, you would be amazed". Gunny; save me a rack. When I go, I'd like to see you again, and this time Gunny, I'll buy the beer.

oping this probable cause, a complete search of the vehicle was conducted and discovered \$26,420.00 US Currency and a Glock 9 mm handgun concealed in a natural compartment of the vehicle. The currency was packaged in manner indicative of a drug courier's fashion for transporting currency.

sigh of relief and thanks Jesus Christ for answered prayers for the safe return of Hannah.

November 8, 2009 started out as most Sundays do in our household; with us getting up motivating my two boys to eat breakfast and getting ready for church. Then, giving their two-year-old sister a bath, which was longer than expected so she could play in the water.

I dressed her in a white turtleneck shirt, patent leather pants, a black sweater with white flowers on it and her favorite black boots with leopard print around the top. Grandma dried her hair and I set to the task of trying to get her two pigtails somewhat even. Once finished, we loaded up and went to church. It's a small church, one of many in our community, but, as always, one with a big heart and open arms.

As Sunday School ended, my oldest son and I took my two-year-old to the church nursery, against her wishes. We convinced her that with a Barney movie, that it wouldn't be so bad. My son and I proceeded to the church and joined my other son and my dad in our usual pew. A couple of uplifting songs and prayer and the service was rolling like any other Sunday. The preacher called the kids up front for the children's circle and my dad nudged me, pointing out the window. The lady from the nursery was standing there, waving for me to come outside. I got up and began to exit the church, thinking maybe my daughter had gotten sick or something. This is the point where my world came crashing down.

The lady from the nursery informed me that my two-year-old daughter had been snatched from the nursery by a tall redheaded woman and that she and a brown-haired short lady had sped away with her in a blue car, although in shock, the lady from the nursery was quick witted enough to get the tag number.

I told her to tell my dad, I knew he would watch over my boys in my absence and I took off in pursuit. I called my youngest brother, who works at the jail, and told him to call it in. I then called my middle brother and told him they were headed his way and the chase was on. It didn't take long and the entire county's law enforcement, firefighters and concerned citizens with scanners were all helping look for my daughter's kidnappers.

She was abducted from our church nursery around 11:15 a.m. My mind was reeling while I frantically searched. Who had taken her? Why had they taken her? What were they going to do to my little girl? You see, only two weeks earlier, I had 33 of my troops scouring Orange Park in Jacksonville looking for a seven-year-old girl, that had gone missing and was eventually found in a dump murdered. I met up with a police officer and Sheriff's deputy and relayed information to them as it was coming in from friends and family.

The deputy had me call my soon-to-be ex-wife to see if she was involved. After some coaxing, she admitted that she had my daughter and was taking her to her home, but would not reveal her location. She was the brown-haired short lady. My sister arrived soon after with critical information on the other woman's identification and an exact description of the car.

The deputy took me to the jail so I could complete my official statement. It was there that I truly came to appreciate the concerted efforts and services our local elected officials and law enforcement provide. Because of the rapid, extremely thorough and exhaustive efforts of Capt. Mark Joost, Sheriff Ben Stewart, Tina DeMotsis, Tim Sanders, Judge Wetzel Blair, the many law enforcement officers, concerned citizens and all those who stopped and prayed for my daughter's return, this story has a happy ending.

At 11:15 a.m. on November 8, my daughter was kidnapped from our church nursery, the culprits were diligently tracked down and apprehended at the Jacksonville International Airport, preparing to catch a flight to BWI and at 6 p.m. on November 8, an officer released my very scared and confused little girl back into my custody. I am forever grateful to each and every person who helped return my daughter to my family. Above all, for those who searched, made phone calls spreading the word and those who prayed, THANK YOU and GOD BLESS YOU!

I am very proud to say I am from Madison County, a county with small towns, small churches and big hearts.


One young lady accepted Christ as her Savior and several others made decisions.

Turn Back Time

Let's turn back time to the Great Depression. In Cherry Lake, a farm was created. Workers from the WPA settled the area.

According to text from *FloridaMemory.com*: Cherry Lake Farm (also known as Cherry Rural Rehabilitation Project) was a New Deal rural relief program initiated by the FERA and the Resettle-

ment Administration (RA) and implemented by the WPA. The project involved moving 500 needy families from Tampa, Miami, and Jacksonville onto a 15,000-acre communal tract. The workers formed the cooperatively-owned Cherry Lake Farms (headquartered in the 1839 former plantation home, the Hinton House) and constructed a school, an audito-

rium, a coop store, barracks, a lumber yard, and a mill. Families lived in 170 cottages with phones, electricity, and running water, all furnished by jointly-owned utilities.





Fall ramblings: A season for everything wild



Snowbirds migrating to Florida might be the most obvious signs of the onset of fall for some full-time residents of the state, but wildlife is also keenly reactive to the accompanying seasonal changes that include shorter days and cooler weather. We've written before about cold fronts and their effects on migratory birds, but almost all wildlife responds to fall seasonal changes, though sometimes in dissimilar fashion. So do people.

As for birds, Neotropical migrants are setting up shop locally for the winter or fueling up for a longer trip to the Caribbean or South America. Local bird feeders are being visited by many species, and increased numbers of ducks, other migratory waterfowl and wading birds dot our large lakes, rivers, beaches and freshwater ponds and tidal marshes.

As for birds of prey, northern harriers can be seen actively gliding over marsh areas, and Cooper's hawks will be on the prowl for the new feeding opportunities brought on by the vast migration of smaller bird species into Florida. Eagles are engaged in spectacular aerial courtships, while their osprey cousins rebuild nests, high on a wide variety of naked perches close to their fishing sites.

Not surprisingly, people react to these fall migrations too, by putting out backyard feeders to attract birds. But don't be surprised if your backyard bird feeder creates an ambush

point for birds of prey like Cooper's hawks. That's Mother Nature -- sort of.

Bird feeders also can create health problems for migrating birds, so don't forget to clean your bird feeders regularly with a 10-percent solution of chlorine bleach to help prevent the spread of disease. We owe it to these tiny migrating birds, some having survived a grueling 2,000-mile journey punctuated by bad weather and other life-threatening issues, not to let them become victims of reckless human kindness by feeding them in unsanitary conditions.

To top off the aerobic bird festival, majestic sandhill cranes and white pelicans add to the variety of air show performers taking up winter residence.

Remember, there are good reasons not to feed either of these species, neither of which benefit from the practice. Deliberately feeding pelicans at fish-cleaning stations is illegal. Feeding sandhill cranes anywhere is illegal.

As for reptiles, including native snakes, alligators, turtles and a variety of other cold-blooded animals, the season for high activity is winding down. Just don't forget that though the metabolic rates of cold-blooded animals decrease with temperature, alligators are still capable of acting as apex predators, and all cautions in the FWC's "Living With Alligators" brochure, need to be observed with due respect.

On the other hand,


mammals are quite active during the fall, and that includes the Florida black bear. Although black bears don't hibernate in Florida, they prepare for it by entering a period of activity in the fall, called hyperphagia.

Hyperphagia is a behavior in all black bears that causes them to feed at twice the normal daily rate they need to maintain themselves. This behavior is likely the result of a gene that causes bears to put on weight in preparation for a hibernation period that in Florida, never comes. Here, the caution to residents living in bear country is to secure all trash and pet food in places and in ways that cannot attract a bear. Appreciating wildlife from a distance beats appreciating it from inside your lanai or garage, especially if it's a bear.

Deer, hogs and squirrels are feeding actively, and of course, that signals the onset of hunting season. Hunters were the first conservationists, and like all conservationists, hunters have a vested interest in seeing that all wildlife, whether it is hunted or not, continues to proliferate. Obeying the letter and the intent of the law, and insisting your hunting partners do the same, is a great starting place from which to build an appreciation of all wildlife.

Be you a snowbird, bird watcher, hunter, all around nature lover, pet owner or just somebody who appreciates living in the Sunshine State, fall is a time of thanksgiving and of wildlife. Enjoy!


