

Man Wanted For DUI Manslaughter And Vehicular Homicide Turns Self In

Henry Lee Roberson, Jr., who was sought as a suspect in DUI manslaughter and vehicular homicide was arrested after turning himself in on Monday, Jan. 2, at the Madison County Jail.

The arrest involved the death of Jerry Ladarick Miller, 37, of

Greenville on October 15.

According to the Florida Highway Patrol, at approximately 2:30 a.m., Henry Lee Roberson, Jr., 27, of Greenville, was traveling east on U.S. 90 (west of SW Pettis Circle in Greenville) in the eastbound lane. The right side of Roberson's 1995 Chevy Impala exited the

roadway on the south shoulder.

Roberson overcorrected, causing the Impala to travel across the centerline, where it began to rotate counterclockwise as it entered the westbound lane of US Highway 90 in a northeast direction.

The car then exited the roadway onto the north shoulder where it

rotated counterclockwise several more times. Roberson then began to travel in a northeasterly direction along the tree line.

The Impala struck a telephone junction box and several trees with its left side.

The car came to a final rest, facing towards the southwest on the north shoulder of U.S.

90. Jerry Ladarick Miller, 37, of Greenville, a passenger in the car was killed in the wreck.

Roberson and passenger, Jamie O'Neal Hampton, 31, of Greenville were seriously injured in the crash.

Commission Waives Fees For Relay 4 Life Tournament

Tommy Garner, Director of Madison County Parks and Recreation Department, spoke briefly at the County Commission meeting Jan. 4, presenting a request from Madison County Community Bank to waive the usual softball field fees for MCCB's Relay 4 Life softball tournament.

The tournament would be using only one or two fields, for one day only, and consist of five to eight Relay Teams.

Garner added that the only cost would be for the department's time dragging and marking the fields the day before the tournament, and a couple of bags of chalk to do the marking.

Because the tournament is a benefit, raising money for cancer research, the Commissioners voted unanimously to waive the usual \$125 per field rental fee.

However, on another matter, the board split three to two over a proposal made by Commissioner Renetta Parrish to change all the board's meeting times to 5:30 p.m. in order to better serve constituents who wanted to attend the meetings.

Commissioners discussed overtime pay for county employees who got off work at 5:00 p.m. and would have to stay for commission meetings in order to make their reports, as well as noting that the commissioners dealt more with business rather than constituent's issues. Both Parrish and Commissioner Alfred Martin voted in favor of the changes; Commissioners Justin Hamrick, Wayne Vickers and Commission Chair Roy Ellis voted to keep the hours as previously scheduled for the year 2012 - 9:00 a.m. the first Wednesday of every month and 4:00 p.m. the third Wednesday.

Cherry Lake General Store Owners Address County Commission

When the County Commission passed a temporary moratorium last month on any further Internet café type businesses in the County, it included a "hardship clause" for business owners and other entrepreneurs who had already invested a lot of time/money trying to start up such a business, but did not have it up and running yet. The clause would allow them to come before the commission and present their case for an exception.

Jeff and Debra Knox, owners of the Cherry Lake General Store on N. State Road 53 for the last five years, addressed the board of commissioners at the Jan. 4 meeting to request such an exception.

"We've spent the past year trying to find things to supplement our business," Jeff Knox told the Commission, speaking of the impact the recession has had on the business and the surrounding rural area of Cherry Lake. So far, they have added propane sales and they have their pizza ovens back up and running. The third thing they wanted to add was an Internet café, not as a separate entity, but as an extension of the business they already have.

"We were unaware that you were considering a moratorium, or we would have expedited things," Knox explained. They had been closely watching the congressional and state level legislating of the Internet gaming businesses, and that was how they overlooked the local level.

In a letter presented to the board, the Knoxes stated that they have already spent the last to eight to ten months speaking to various technical support people about establishing such a business in an area with limited Internet speed, and had already exhausted a considerable amount of resources visiting other established Internet cafes throughout Florida, testing software and getting estimates for equipment, furnishings, and installation - all before they had even decided to proceed. They were preparing to order their Internet service when they learned of the County's moratorium, and immediately placed a hold on their order.

Even though they are relative newcomers to Madison County, they pointed out that have already contributed to their community in numerous ways, both as responsible business owners for the last five years and as private residents for the last eight years. They have made contributions to Madison County Central School and have also done a fund-raising calendar for the Cherry Lake area, among other endeavors.

With the Internet café addition, they were hoping to generate more traffic in their area to help their business survive.

"We're here today to ask for some relief from the moratorium," said Jeff Knox. Debra also added that the Cherry Lake area currently has no place where people can gather and visit with each other, or sit down somewhere and go on the Internet for other things besides sweepstakes and gaming. She and her husband envision a "nice place with a couch, tables and chairs" where people can gather and see friends, go on the internet, and where kids can do homework,

The first place that the suspects attempted to scam was the Busy Bee off Base Street. The two men walked into the convenience store and spoke as though they were very kind and friendly, normal customers. However, they are anything but kind and normal customers.

The two men reportedly paid for \$10 worth of merchandise with \$50. They then attempted to confuse the attendant and say they needed more change back, saying that they wanted their \$50 bill back.

After attempted to scam Busy Bee, the suspects targeted Love's Truck Stop. It was at this time that the two men added a third suspect into their scheme, a woman. They then traveled across the street to the Red Onion Grill. It was here that the scammers were able to get away with close to \$200.

"They asked me for change and I gave them their change and all I can remember is just being really confused and thinking well what's going on here? Why do they keep asking me for change?" said Leah Buchanan, waitress at the Red Onion Grill.

Commission Supports Workforce Resolution

In response to House Bill 7023, Sheryl Rehberg, Executive Director of the North Florida Workforce Development Board, spoke to the County Commission Jan. 4.

HB 7023, proposed in December, was suggested by Gov. Rick Scott after several accountability problems emerged with some regional workforce boards in the central and south Florida areas, particularly, the Tampa and St. Pete area.

Rehberg spoke of provisions in the language of House Bill 7023 that either duplicated what the Workforce Board already

does to ensure accountability, or removed final authority and control over the board and who serves on the board away from local control - the North Florida Workforce Board serves a six county area, including Jefferson, Madison, Taylor, Lafayette, Suwannee and Hamilton Counties - and puts it in the hands of the governor or the state of Florida.

Rehberg emphasized strongly that the North Florida Workforce Development Board was all for accountability and already had several checks and balances in place to ensure such accountability.

One of the first areas of concern Rehberg addressed was the provision to limit the number of people allowed to serve on the regional workforce boards to the minimum required by federal law, even though the federal law allows local officials to appoint more than that minimum number, if they deem it necessary. If HB 7023 is passed, local officials could not appoint extra members beyond the federally recommended minimum number to serve.

The second area of concern is that all Workforce Board members would be required to file a full disclosure of financial interests. Rehberg stated that all members

Just in time to start New Year's resolutions to improve health and personal finances, the Cooperative Extension system is launching an online Small Steps to Health and Wealth™ (SSHW) Challenge called "Winter 2012 SSHW Challenge." This free six-week program, open to anyone who enrolls online, will be held from Sunday, January 15, through Saturday, February 25, 2012. For those of you who like to learn at your computer, this is a great learning experience.

To sign up for the SSHW Challenge, follow the "Challenges" link on the Small Steps to Health and Wealth™ Web site at <http://njaes.rutgers.edu/sshw/>. Set up a user name and password and download a simple one-page user's guide with instructions about how to proceed. Enroll in the Challenge titled "Winter 2012 SSHW Challenge."

The SSHW Challenge is part of Small Steps to Health and Wealth™, a national Cooperative Extension program developed to motivate Americans to take action to simultaneously improve their health and personal finances. SSHW was built around a framework of 25 research-based behavior change strategies. The Challenge was originally developed in a "paper and pencil" format with printed worksheets and is now available online.

It has been well documented that, when people monitor their behavior and measure how they're doing, they are often inspired to do better and achieve positive results. Partici-

pants in a SSHW Challenge are "on their honor" to report their activities accurately. If they "cheat" on reporting their points, they are only cheating themselves by not following the recommended daily practices.

The SSHW Challenge is based on the performance of ten recommended practices on a daily basis: five that involve health and nutrition and five that involve financial management. Ten points are given for performing each one for a maximum of 700 points per week and 4,200 points for the entire challenge. "The Challenge is a great way to convert ambitious New Year's resolutions, like losing weight and saving money, into daily action steps," notes Dr. Barbara O'Neill, Extension Specialist in Financial Resource Management for Rutgers Cooperative Extension.

The five daily health and nutrition practices are: eat at least 4 cups of fruits and vegetables; get at least 30 minutes of physical activity; drink water or unsweetened beverages instead of sugar-sweetened beverages; eat at least two servings of whole grain foods; and learn something new about health and nutrition.

The five daily finan-

cial management practices included in the SSHW Challenge are: save a \$1 bill (or more) and/or pocket change; invest \$5 or more per day (including automated retirement savings plan deposits); track money spent throughout the day; eat lunch prepared at home; and learn something new about personal finance. The latter activity, for both health and personal finances, can be accomplished by visiting Web sites, attending seminars, or by reading, listening to, or viewing media reports.

Winter 2012 SSHW Challenge participants will have an opportunity to replace one daily health activity and one daily personal finance activity with unique daily personal challenges of their own. "Providing some adaptation of the traditional SSHW Challenge format will make the Challenge more "personal" for participants and give them an opportunity to practice new behaviors if they are already doing all of the 10 pre-selected activities," explained Dr. O'Neill.

As participants enter their personal data, they will see their point totals for each day of the week and for each of the ten activities described above. They'll also see a bar graph that compares their personal progress to the average scores of everyone else participating in the Challenge. Daily motivational messages will also be provided to participants. Paper tracking forms can be downloaded to keep track of daily activities until they are entered online.

Doing even one of the ten recommended daily practices is a great way to get started on the path to better health and improved financial security. much like places that offer free wi-fi to their customers.

"We have greater plans than just what people think of when they hear about Internet cafés," said Jeff. "Mostly the public just hears about the down side of such places."

Their main goal, they explained, is to revitalize the crossroads area at Cherry Lake, a rural area that has been hard hit by the recession.

Commission Chair Roy Ellis explained the Board had passed the temporary moratorium only because "we didn't have a clue what we were dealing with" when it came to Internet café businesses and needed some time to study the matter and decide how to best regulate such places in the future.

County Attorney Tommy Reeves then explained the procedure for filing an appeal, in the form of a letter to County Coordinator Allen Cherry's office. The matter would then be noticed to the public before it is brought before the Board at a public hearing.

The Knoxes had lived in various places all over Florida including Bonita Springs, Ft. Lauderdale and even Homestead, right after Hurricane Andrew, while Jeff was in the construction industry. They bought vacation property in Cherry Lake in 2003 and shortly afterward moved there permanently. When they opened their business, nobody anticipated the recession.

In speaking of the Internet café addition afterward, Jeff stated that the gaming computers would be secured away from minors, who would not have access to them, and that all the computers would have proper firewalls against unacceptable web content.

"We have so many good people out there (in Cherry Lake), losing their jobs," Debra added. "We're just trying to think of things to keep us going and keep our spirits up for another day."

She also praised their loyal employees, three of whom have been with the Cherry Lake General Store for its entire five years of operation. "God bless 'em, they work for hugs these days," she said.

currently file a "short form" statement of such financial interests.

Third, both the chair and the executive director of the North Florida Workforce Board would serve at the pleasure of the governor. Currently, local officials appoint all the members of the Workforce Board, and then, those appointed elect their own chair and executive director. If these positions are changed to "serving at the pleasure of the Governor," then this effectively removes local control - final approval of who serves would rest with the Governor, at the state level, rather than the local level.

Additionally, other provisions of the bill would require that regional workforce boards, after approving their budgets, would submit those budgets to the state workforce board. However, as Rehberg pointed out, "it doesn't say why."

Additionally, the bill requires that the state of Florida will require a statewide brand for all workforce boards.

"We already have that," said Rehberg. Even though each regional workforce board has a different name for its center, all are members of a statewide brand that works for them: "Employ Florida Marketplace."

In response, Rehberg proposed a resolution supporting the accountability that the board already has and stating that the board would support more accountability mechanisms in place, but would object to relinquishing the local control to the state level.

Commission Chair Roy Ellis stated that "we have a very good relationship with our workforce board," and rather than relinquish local control, he would like to protect the rights of local officials rather than turn control of our workforce over to outside officials.

The Commission voted unanimously to support Workforce's resolution.


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Remembrance of Things Past: Robert McColskey

NOTICE OF PUBLIC EXPLANATION OF PLANNED ACTIVITY IN A FLOODPLAIN OR WETLAND
The Town of Greenville intends to undertake a project to be funded by a Florida Small Cities Neighborhood Revitalization Community Development Block Grant (Florida DEO CDBG Contract Number 12DB-0H-03-50-02-N05). The proposed project is to **Construct a new 400 GPM water supply well and underground 10" raw water main from the proposed new water well site generally running south along NW Rivierne Way, east along US Highway 90 West, and southeast along SW Grand Street to the existing Town Water Treatment Plant.** It has determined that it has no practicable alternative other than to proceed with the work. This activity will have no significant impact on the environment for the following reasons:

The construction of the water supply well and raw water main will be on public property or within public street rights-of-way or easements. All construction activities for the short portion of raw water main running within the designated flood plain along SW Grand Street will be in accordance with local, county, regional, state and federal requirements.

Although a small portion of the project is located in the 100 year floodplain, the improvements cannot be undertaken in any other location due to the scope of the project. Therefore, there is no practical alternative. The alternative of constructing a new water supply well at the existing water treatment plant was deemed unsatisfactory because of the high iron content of the existing water supply, and the potential risk of accidental contamination due to the proximity of the CSX rail line. The alternative of running the proposed project outside a floodplain was determined not to be financially feasible. The "no action" alternative would expose the community to an unnecessary and potentially severe public health and safety risk, should one of the existing water supply wells become inoperable.

The proposed improvements conform to applicable floodplain protection standards. The proposed action will not affect natural or beneficial floodplain values, and residents of the community will benefit from the project. The improvements will provide an enhanced potable water supply. Failure to provide these improvements could result in a potentially severe public health and safety problem.

Additional agencies involved in this project include the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Suwannee River Water Management District, Florida Department of Environmental Protection, Florida Department of Transportation, CSX Transportation, LandRail, LLC, and Madison County.

 On or about **January 25, 2012** the **Town of Greenville** will submit a request to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity for the release of **\$600,000** in Community Development Block Grant funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act, as amended, to undertake the previously described project.

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT
The Town of Greenville has determined that the project will have no significant impact on the human environment. Therefore, an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) is not required. Additional project information is contained in the Environmental Review Record (ERR) on file at the **Town Clerk's Office, Greenville Town Hall, SW 154 Old Mission Avenue, Greenville, FL 32331,** and may be examined or copied weekdays **8:00 A.M to 4:30 P.M.**

PUBLIC COMMENTS
 Any individual, group, or agency may submit written comments on the ERR to the **Town of Greenville Environmental Certifying Officer, Greenville Town Hall, P.O. Box 235, Greenville, FL 32331.** All comments must be received by **January 23, 2012.** Comments will be considered prior to the **Town of Greenville** requesting a release of funds. Comments should specify which notice they are addressing.

RELEASE OF FUNDS
The Town of Greenville certifies to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity and HUD that **Elesta Pritchett** in her capacity as **Mayor of the Town of Greenville, Florida** consents to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to the environmental review process and that these responsibilities have been satisfied.  HUD will accept objections to its release of fund and the **Town of Greenville's** certification for a period of fifteen days following the anticipated submission date or its actual receipt of the request (whichever is later) only if they are on one of the following bases: (a) the certification was not executed by the Certifying Officer of the **Town of Greenville;** (b) the **Town of Greenville** has omitted a step or failed to make a decision or finding required by HUD regulations at 24 CFR part 58; (c) the grant recipient has committed funds or incurred costs not authorized by 24 CFR Part 58 before approval of a release of funds by the State; or (d) another Federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR Part 1504 has submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality.
