## School Superintendent Lou Miller Retiring At End Of Term

After serving two terms as Madison County's School Superintendent, and after working for 38 years altogether in the education field, Lou Miller officially announced Tuesday, March 5, that she would not run for a third term and would in fact retire from the Madison County School District when her current term ends in November of this year.

Citing her family's wishes and her own desire to spend more time with her children, grandchildren and her husband who has already been retired since 2007, she stated in her official announcement, "I always advocate 'family first' and so I honor this family decision."

She has no specific plans in mind for retirement, but she spoke fondly of her two adult daughters, her 16-month-old grand-

son in Ocala, and her 4-month-old granddaughter in Greenville, and looked forward to being able to spend more time with them. Then, there are things she and her husband have always wanted to do and places they have always wanted to see, and now there will time for all that. She has also been active in her church for years, and now she will have more time to devote to church programs and activities.

Looking back over her eight years as school superintendent, she recalled some of the high points, one being that all the public schools in the district were now fully accredited, which was not the case when she began as superintendent eight years ago. One of her goals was to see all of Madison's schools receive full accreditation.

## Sheriff Ben Stewart Addresses County Commission About Caboodle Ranch Operation

"I'm being called a Nazi, and that's not the case," said Sheriff Ben Stewart at the March 7 County Commission meeting.

Referring to the fallout from the Caboodle Ranch Operation of the previous week, he added that he was being bombarded with angry calls from people all over the world and wanted to update the commissioners as to the facts of the case and where everything was at as far as the investigation.

The Feb. 28 search warrant served at the Caboodle Ranch Property and subsequent arrest of owner Craig Grant on animal cruelty charges "came about in conjunction with the county ordinance (passed a few months ago) and was presented to the state attorney's office in December." The MCSO was needed to spearhead the operation.

Stewart added that complaints about the Ranch had been brought before the Commission on previous occasions, adding that the 700 cat-gathering operation would have overwhelmed Madison County's two-person animal control department, and he was grateful to have had the help of the ASPCA, an organization he described as a "common-sense, middle-of-the-road group." He also expressed gratitude for the dozen or so other agencies that came in at the request of Madison County Animal Control Director Jamie Willoughby to help with the roundup.

## Eat Right With Color

tion from your calories. Dietitians stress your body needs the right fuel for daily activities. The best way to get what you need is to enjoy a wide variety of nutrient-rich foods from all of the food groups each day. This insures you are getting a daily intake of carbohydrates, protein, vitamins, minerals and other essential nutrients.

Eating in moderation will help keep a balance of calories. Most of us take in more calories than we burn during daily activities. Often the culprit is empty calorie food and beverages that are high in sugar and fat, but low in nutrients. Portion control will help balance your intake without cutting favorite foods completely out.

Find a balance between food and physical activity. The USDA 2010 Guidelines for Americans recommends physical activity every day along with eating right. Regular physical activi-

ty for a minimum of 30 minutes a day helps with fitness, weight management and reduces the risk of chronic diseases. If you can't do 30 minutes, aim for 10 minutes of physical activity several times a day.

If you have a computer, USDA has a great website at [www.myplate.gov](http://www.myplate.gov). You can customize a daily food guide for your age and weight and set up a free personal food tracking account to help you record daily food intake and physical activity. For more information on food and nutrition, contact the Madison County Extension Service.





grant money awarded to the Madison School District, which gave the district a lot of resources to work with.

There was also the progress the district was making, as everyone worked very hard toward school improvement.

"Even though it doesn't look that way when the state rankings come out, every year there has been some improvement in almost every school," she said. Lee Elementary has maintained a "B" grade, but accumulated a higher number of points in that grade category. Pinetta has been an "A" school for the last five years, but has also increased its number of points as an "A" school. The high school has gone from and "F" to a "C" and Greenville from an "F" to a "D." Another thing she is pleased with is that 99 percent of the teachers are now highly qualified for the subjects they teach. Very, very few are still teaching outside their field.

There are things she will miss as well, after 38 years in the education field. She'll miss the children, of course, after all those years of working with them and being around them. She'll also miss the camaraderie of working with her colleagues.

"When you're part of a collaborative team, the folks you work with become like family," she said.

What won't she miss? After thinking about it for a moment, she answered, "I won't miss the negative opinions of public schools. Negativity is very tiresome to me."

"My heart has been about this job," she added. "Education is such a great career. Teaching is a great calling. My life's work has been a great calling for me."

"This was a very organized, very professional operation," he added. "They're the most organized group I've ever seen, with the equipment they had and the way they worked."

The cats were fine, he added, and being treated in the shelter in Jacksonville where, "they're apparently receiving better care than they've ever received in their lives...they're not being shot, they're not being stomped on...their little kitty houses are not being destroyed."

Right now, he told the commission, they are evidence in a criminal case. After the case is resolved, the cats would be released for adoption.

County attorney Tommy Reeves pointed out that because the ASPCA came in to handle the roundup and care of the cats, the ongoing investigation was being done at no cost to Madison taxpayers. So far, the APSCA has spent in the neighborhood of \$300,000.

As for PETA, "I understand that a lot of folks don't like PETA...they did their own undercover investigation as any civilian group could have done, on their own, but it was not at my request and they are not part of the operation."

Animal Control Director Willoughby added that his department's role was an ongoing one; every Friday on his day off, he was traveling to Jacksonville to volunteer at the shelter where the cats were staying.

The county definitely had an asset in the ASPCA, said Stewart, and the county might soon receive a grant to continue fighting animal cruelty.

The year 2011 took the Yeomans house by storm, when he suffered a heart attack. This was the beginning of a long train of bad news, as the doctors announced he had cancer as well.

His heart attack was addressed by surgery to place a stint in his heart. The doctors found cancer in his left lung and removed his upper left lobe. Yeomans also has cancer in his lymph nodes, and is currently awaiting treatment.

With these medical issues pressing against Yeomans, the medical bills are stacking. His prescriptions are very costly, and currently, he is unable to work, and therefore, does not have insurance.

A concert has been scheduled for Saturday, March 10, beginning at 7 p.m., featuring LifeSong. All proceeds raised will benefit Yeomans and his ever-increasing medical bills.









## Remembrance Of Things Past: Tim Sanders

Whether it was sliding down "the bowl" or skating around the courthouse, Tim Sanders' memories of Madison are extensive. Being born and raised in this lovely county, Sanders' roots here are deep.

Sanders attended Madison Elementary School through the sixth grade, and Madison High School from seventh through twelfth. In high school he played for the football, baseball and basketball teams. Back in those days, the high school teams weren't the Cowboys. They were the Red Devils. "Everyone knows how successful the football team is now. Well, back in those days we weren't so successful. In my three years on varsity we might have won three games, and tied a few. Almost all of our away games were homecoming games. Back then we were an easy win, and made for a happy homecoming for the other team," recalled Sanders.

Growing up, Sanders had a very large extended family. He stated, "I was very blessed with my family. I had a lot of aunts, uncles, cousins, grandparents, everything. It's heartbreaking to see the conditions that children are raised in now. Working in the juvenile court I see the way that some children are brought up compared to the way I was brought up, is heartbreaking."

When he was a child, Sanders spent a lot of time at school or working. He worked for his Uncle Dick Baker at his Standard Oil Station. The station was located where the New York Life building is now. During the school year, he would work on Saturdays and half the day on Sunday. During the summer, he would work more often. "I really enjoyed it. I was able to interact with the older people in Madison and that was really special. I am still friends with some of those people today. They always made me feel special."

He also recalls working for Mickler's Laundry and Dry Cleaning on Saturdays, which was located across the street from where the post office currently sits. He and his cousin would run the laundry route. They would go to Greenville, Aucilla, Capps, Jasper and many other places to pick up and drop off laundry. "We got 10 percent of what was made that day. Some days, we would only get \$5. When I

was 16 years old I had just bought a Browning Sweet 16 shotgun from Mr. James at Western Auto. I had to pay him at least \$5 a week to pay off my shotgun. Back then, there weren't Visa cards or anything, just a handshake and my word. But often times I would get paid from Mickler's and go straight across the road and give the money to Mr. James," remembered Sanders.

For fun, Sanders and his friends would go up town and skate around the courthouse. "There would be 20 or 30 of us skating sometimes. I would leave home after breakfast, maybe go back for lunch and then get home sometime after dark. We were always outside playing. We would also go to 'the bowl' with boxes and rub candle wax on the outside of our boxes. We would sit on the boxes and ride down the bowl. The wax made us go even faster."

## Remembrance Of Legacies Past: Mama Warren's Cinnamon Roll Recipe From Greenville Primary School

Inez Warren, known as "Mama Warren" to the children, was the cook at Greenville Primary School in Greenville. She retired from there after 17 years of service.

When she retired, then-School Superintendent Gene Stokes presented her with a Distinguished Plaque of Retirement at the monthly School Board meeting.

Her daughter, Ruth Ann Warren Wheeler, was kind enough to find this recipe at the request of this writer. If anyone wants to make this themselves, they should have a very hearty appetite or a huge family or be expecting a lot of guests for a party. If not, this recipe needs to be converted and may smaller, since it is for 20-24 dozen cinnamon rolls:

Items needed: two cups of shortening; 10 eggs, one cup dried skim milk; one ounce of salt (two tablespoons); one-half pound yeast (dissolved in one-half gallon

of warm water); nine quarts (or eight pounds) of flour; nutmeg, mace, vanilla or any type of flavoring (one tablespoon each of whichever spices you choose and three or four tablespoons of vanilla extract).

Cream the shortening, sugar and eggs. Add dried milk and mix well. Add salt and some liquid with about one-third of the flour. Add the balance of the liquid and flour. Knead until the dough leaves the side of the pan, cover and leave it to rise again. It is believed Mama Warren added four tablespoons of baking powder to the mixture.

"Mama was one of the best cooks ever," said Ruth Ann, who lives in Keystone Heights with her husband, Gene Wheeler. They have three children who live there, Steve Wheeler, Stephanie Griffis and Pam Saxon. Their other son, Greg, lives in Tennessee. They also have 12 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.
