Arrest Made In Campbell Homicide Case

Madison County Sheriff Ben Stewart reports that an arrest has been made in the homicide of James Edward Campbell. Investigators from the Madison County Sheriff's Office, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, and the Third Circuit State Attorney's Office have obtained an overwhelming amount of evidence against Gary Givens, 18. The suspect was arrested March 27, and charged with homicide, burglary, grand theft, theft and credit card fraud. Charges are currently pending on a second suspect in the case. Evidence in the case included witness statements from citizens in the community

as well as photographs of two suspects using the victim's vehicle and other items stolen from the victim's home.

Tuesday, April 17- Grades 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 9 and 10 will take Session 2 of the reading test. Grade 6 will take Session 1 of the reading.

Wednesday, April 18- Grades 3, 4, 5,

7 and 8 will take Session 1 of mathematics. Grade 6 will take Session 2 of reading.

Thursday, April 19-Grades 3,4 and 5 will take Session 2 of mathematics.

Tuesday, April 24-Grade 5 will take Session 1 of science.

Wednesday, April 25-Grade 5 will take Session 2 of science.

Monticello Man Gets Own TV Show: Charlie Ward Hosts 'The Outdoorsman Table'

How's this for a must-see television show: a semiweekly program focusing on the great outdoors, natural foods, healthy living and featuring Jefferson County's own native son and quintessential outdoorsman, Charlie Ward.

Titled the "The Outdoorsman Table - Cuisine of the Fare Chase," the 30-minute shows will air on the Pursuit Channel every Sunday and Wednesday at 6 p.m. and 7 a.m. respectively, beginning this Sunday, April 1. That's Channel 240 on Dish TV and Channel 608 on Direct TV. (The first show, a sneak preview, actually aired on Wednesday morning, March 28.)

As Ward explains it, each show will focus on a different part of the country (including Jefferson County, north Florida and South Georgia); explore the hunting, fishing and food-gathering opportunities in these locations; and offer savory ideas and recipes for the best preparation of the freshly harvested game and plants.

Meaning that each show will be divided into three segments, identified as the gathering, the preparation, and the lifestyle component.

The gathering may entail anything from pompano fishing off the Gulf Coast of Florida, to elk

hunting in the rugged mountains of Montana, to fruit-and-nut picking in the woodlands of north Florida/South Georgia.

The preparation, meanwhile, will feature Ward and friends — many of them well-known chefs — preparing their favorite dishes from the freshly harvested wild game and fruits and vegetables. Whenever possible, the food preparation will be filmed right on location.

The final element aims to bring the two preceding segments together and root the experience in natural and healthy living, emphasizing the connection between the two.

"Our show is about creating a lifestyle that supports aspects of living off the land and nature's pantry," Ward says. "An interested viewer can see a connection in the game we hunt and the lifestyle that is possible through proper foraging and gathering. Following the guidelines for preparation and harvesting, viewers can take their passion for the outdoors to a level that supports a vigorous lifestyle and a cuisine of the fare chase."

A lifetime outdoorsman who shot his first turkey at age six (Ward credits his father, Dr. John Ward, for his love and appreciation of fishing and **Please see Charlie Ward, Page 3**

The good news is spring brings the hope of new beginnings, a reawakening of things that have been dormant far too long...and those wonderful southern rain storms! In recent years, there has been a resurgence in the Back to Basics movements of the 1960s and 1970s that rode in on the skirt tails of the Green movement. All over the nation you see community gardens and farmers' markets making a comeback as well as a push for organic foods and materials to be more readily available. Our own youth community, with the help of adult volunteers, has joined in on this effort by beginning school vegetable gardens. Pinetta Elementary School's 4-H Club, the Pinetta Pioneers, has partnered with the Madison Garden Club over the past year to cultivate a very productive vegetable garden. The Boys and Girls Club of Madison County also has 4-H groups at each of their sites that meet during their afterschool activities. In the past year they have been studying butterflies and their habitats through 4-H Project Butterfly Wings curriculum. These groups have been working with 4-H to begin plans for either a butterfly garden and/or vegetable gardens at each elementary school in Madison County. Not only does gardening teach youth (and adults!) responsibility, team-

work, stress management, and planning/organizing life skills, it also allows youth to reach the four Essential Elements of 4-H:

Belonging- being a part of a group that has a common goal and understanding their role is essential to the success of the group

Independence - learning self-reliance and self-discipline

Mastery - learning a skill that will affect multiple areas of their life

Generosity - sharing the fruits of their labor with their peers

These youth are also able to see almost immediate results of their hard work, which is important in a generation of instant gratification. The knowledge gained by working in a community garden is practically infinite. Youth are able to have hands on experience in the areas of science, engineering, technology, math, history, and so many more! It is of obvious importance that having these opportunities available to our youth expands their ability to gain and refine life skills and achieve high standards

in their academic studies.

hunting), he has fished and hunted almost everywhere in this country, from Alaska to the Florida Keys. He has also trained national champion bird-dogs, participated in national field trials, and managed two large plantations in Jefferson County, where it was his job to lead private hunts and ensure the viability of the land and its wild game population through controlled burns, crop plantings and other land management practices.

Ward has since gone public and begun leading his own independent hunts by way of the Empress Rod & Gun Club, an exclusive, private sporting organization that utilizes two area plantations and offers hunting, fishing, and other sporting adventures throughout this country and the world.

Ward says the idea for the television show originated a little more than a year ago with a video that a friend, David Neck, shot of a turkey hunt that he (Ward) sponsored for a group of handicap hunters on his leased plantation in Brooks County.

Ward says he subsequently discussed the idea with Jack Carswell, who suggested calling and pitching the idea to a Hollywood buddy, executive producer Michael Jaffe, who is credited with producing innumerable television movies and miniseries. Ward says Jaffe was encouraging and helped them to fine-tune the concept by offering suggestions and constructive critiques, especially of the filming. He says his brother, David, was also invaluable in helping bring the project to fruition.

Ward says he, Carswell and David filmed segments for several months but he wasn't satisfied with the quality of the products. Finally, Ward says, he went and hired Seminole Productions at FSU, which he says has done an excellent job of filming the shows.

Ward says 13 shows have been produced so far, with not a few of these set in north Florida and South Florida, which he considers his home base. He wants to promote the area in terms of its natural beauty and bountiful wildlife, as well as its cultural assets, he says. One of the shows, for example, highlights the Monticello Opera House. And another he plans to do next week will feature pompano and flounder fishing in the Gulf and showcase Apalachicola and its cuisine.

"I'm trying to promote Monticello, north Florida and South Georgia," Ward says. "I want to show that here is where I live and this is where the idea originated."

Ward says it was difficult getting sponsors for the show at first. He had to front much of the cost for the initial project. But now that the show has started airing, it is already attracting the attention of some big name sponsors, he says.

"The Networks too have shown interest in our show," Ward says. "It could go to a different level."

He can only keep his fingers crossed, Ward says. Meanwhile, the ideas for new shows keep coming, and that's all for the best, he says.

Conservative Corner

POLITICALLY ADJUSTED TEXT BOOKS COMING SOON!

"Climate Change" is now the battle du jour in school districts across the country. Several national bodies are set to release a draft of new science standards that include detailed instruction on climate change. The Wall Street Journal, for 3/12/2012, ran a story on proposed "standards," last revised in the mid 1990's, now set to be made final by year end.

Once these "standards" are adopted, they will be incorporated into the text of the large textbook companies and then, other smaller presses typically fall into line. Groups preparing the "standards," include the National Research Council, the National Center for Science Education and allowed to participate, the Heartland Institute.

These texts are then typically adopted by each of the States, through their Departments of Education, then being placed on a list, and from which list school districts are then allowed to purchase.

The National Research Council, a part of the congressionally chartered National Academies, drew up last year, the document which will serve as the thesis for the "new scientific standards."

Their premise says that "climate change is caused by man-made events, such as the burning of fossil fuels." Their document says rising temperatures could have "large consequences" for the planet.

The National Center for Science Education, another advocacy group for man-made climate change and global warming, says that it's "settled science." And, as such, the center's executive director, Eugenie Scott, just dismisses critics. "We shouldn't fight the culture wars in the high-school classroom," she says. Talk about a closed mind!

Another organization, the Heartland Institute, is pursuing a competing thesis, by developing as K-12 curriculum, which questions the whole idea of manmade global warming, according to David Wojick, a consultant who is designing the plan.

It will be interesting to see how the media will fall into lock step agreement behind the politically correct "man-made" thesis. This is the year of decision, for the "standards" will be established, and hereafter, resisters predictably will be intimidated and the school districts will, one by one, give authority to the standards, and make them greater than it is, and be used to humiliate and exclude parent input.

One parent has already felt the heat of "the cold shoulder." Rose Pugliese, esq., a lawyer in western Colorado has already asked her local school board to prevent teachers from presenting climate change as fact, saying schools should encourage students to reach their own conclusions.

"Unless we've got conclusive evidence one way or another - and I don't think we'll have that for hundreds of years - I think both sides should be taught. Allow the kids to figure it out for themselves."

The word is that "most climate experts" accept those notions of man-made climate change, as settled science. But many major scientists have not been silenced, fuelling agenda conflicts between citizen/parent and those who control the schools' curriculum.

Radical change is coming. Change agents always want to control what's in textbooks.

A Doctors' Day Salute

History of National Doctors' Day

National Doctors' Day is held every year on March 30th in the United States. It is a day to celebrate the contribution of physicians who serve our country by caring for its' citizens.

The first Doctor's Day observance was March 30, 1933 in Winder, Georgia. Eudora Brown Almond, wife of Dr. Charles B. Almond, decided to set aside a day to honor physicians. This first observance included the mailing greeting cards and placing flowers on graves of deceased doctors. The red carnation is commonly used as the symbolic flower for National Doctor's Day.

On March 30, 1958, a Resolution Commemorating Doctors' Day was adopted by the United States

House of Representatives. In 1990, legislation was introduced in the House and Senate to establish a national Doctor's Day. Following overwhelming approval by the United States Senate and the House of Representatives, on October 30, 1990, President George Bush signed S.J. RES. #366 (which became Public Law 101-473) designating March 30th as "National Doctor's Day."

There are over 800,000 physicians in the United States working in every specialty imaginable. In hospitals, clinics and offices throughout the country doctors tackle tough health issues everyday, treating the sick and injured, and sometimes pulling off the next to impossible

REMEMBRANCE OF ATHLETES PAST

Paul Andrews, formerly of Greenville

Paul Andrews was born and raised in Greenville. His parents were Lamar and Alice Andrews of Greenville. He has two sisters, Sara Henderson and Martha Jane Blair, and one brother, Bill Andrews.

As a young man growing up in Greenville, he was taught at a very early age the importance of work ethics. Paul's dad owned the A&M Grocery Store and had a farm. Paul was taught how to operate the store from purchasing items to cutting meat. In the grocery store, Paul had to clean and stock shelves, and work in the meat department. He had to cut the meat and place it in the display counter. He had to be able to run the cash register and total the groceries. Back in those days, the cash register was one that you had to pull the lever down each time an amount was entered. He was also responsible for bagging the groceries. One of the best things about growing up in Greenville and having a grocery store was that he had the privilege to take the groceries to the individual's home if they did not have transportation. This, of course, was provided by his father. All of the family members learned how to make coleslaw to put on the famous hotdogs that were sold in the store on Saturdays. Another thing about working in his father's grocery store, he was able to work with some of his best friends, Mack Harper and Dennis Miller.

Paul also had to work on the farm. He helped during tobacco, cotton and watermelon seasons. He also had to help feed the cows and hogs.

Paul obtained his Christian values at an early age. He was raised by Christian parents who took him to Sunday School, church, Training Union, prayer meetings on Wednesday night to the Greenville Baptist Church. He was a Sunday School teacher and sang in the youth and adult choirs.

Paul played the tenor saxophone in the concert band and was among the first members of the Greenville High School Band. The school was little, but it was proud.

Coming from a small town meant you knew everyone in town. The neighborhood Paul lived in was wonderful. The kids would get together at night to play "kick the can" and summer softball.

"We could walk to school and to town," Paul said. "We went to the movie theater and it only cost a quarter. Riding around in the car at night was a lot of fun. Everyone would gather at Sidney's Restaurant after a ball game and school. Sidney's was the gathering place for everyone.

Paul played all sports at Greenville High School under the mascot name of Pirates but football was the one that paid off for him. In his senior year, Greenville High School defeated Madison High School for the first time in a very long time. Paul took his responsibilities as an athlete seriously. He was up at the crack of dawn to run almost every morning. Folks in town knew when he was running because the dogs were barking.

Paul related the following: "In my senior year of high school, I was preparing to start practice and getting in shape. While running, I step on a piece of metal, which flew up and hit my knee, cutting a five-inch cut across my knee. The doctor who repaired the wound told my father that I might not be able to play football any more due to the cutting of my knee. Dad shared that information with me and I could see my world come tumbling down because all my life I wanted to be a football player.

"I know you are not supposed to work deals with the Lord, but at that age I was not aware of that. I prayed to the Lord and told Him if He would let me play football that year, then I would do whatever He wanted for me to do for Him. He let me play and I have tired too honor my deal by being available to Him whenever He needed me for the rest of my life."

"While at Florida State University, I was the president of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes," Paul said. "I taught a young boys Bible study class at First Baptist Church in Tallahassee. I also made speeches in some of the surrounding churches in the area. I have been a deacon in the church since I was 25 years old. During my coaching years at Mainland High School in Daytona Beach, I was called upon to speak at different clubs and organizations."

Paul went on to say, "The good Lord has blessed me and my family in so many ways."

On Nov. 12, 2011, Paul Andrews was one of four football players who were

honored at the FSU-Miami game. They were the guests of FSU Athletic Director Randy Spetman. The other three were Steve Klesius from St. Petersburg, Don Donatelli from Pittsburgh and Fred Grimes from Hialeah. They are the only four out of 144 who went from semester one in their freshman year to graduate four years later. They all played in every game of the four years. Paul, who is a high school graduate of Greenville High School, is the first football player from Madison County to attend FSU and graduate in four years.

Notes from Paul's conversation:

- The one play that stands out in my mind was against VPI (Virginia Tech) my sophomore year. I intercepted a pass on the 46 and ran it down to the 20. We went in to score a touchdown and extra point. They later scored, but the extra point was blocked and we won 7-6.

- I really admired my roommate, Bill Tyre, of Sanford. Our junior year, he was short of hours passed and they kicked him off scholarship. Bill loved the game, so he stayed on the red shirt team, but without a scholarship. After practice each day, a few of us would bring something from the training table to give to Bill so he could afford to stay with us. Bill finished his career starting the last two years at defensive tackle.

- We were playing Florida my sophomore year. We only had 27 players dressed out. We did not go out and warm up before the game before Coach Moss wanted us to save our energy. We lost 18-8. The people in the stands were saying that we had not shown up for the game.

- Our first victory over an SEC team was over Georgia. We won the game by a score of 9-3. A lot of people say that was the turning point of FSU football to the big time. They were inside our 10-yard-line several times but never scored. This game was honoring the players' fathers on Dad Night. After the game, there was a big fight between the fans of each team. The sprinkler system was turned on to stop the fight. After I got


dressed and came out of the locker room, there stood my Dad with a three-piece suit soaking wet. I asked him what happened and he said, "We beat them after the game also." We tied Florida that year 3-3.

- After football season, I would come home on the weekend and several of my team members would come over to ride horses at Dennis Miller's house.

- After coaching high school football, Paul went back to college and received his Master's in Administration and became an assistant principal at an elementary and middle school.

Paul and his wife, Cathy, currently reside in Daytona Beach. They have two daughters, Debbie Meddellin of West Palm Beach, and Stacy Ayers of Cabot, Ark. They have six grandchildren. Family is a very important part of his life and he treasures every minute he and Cathy can spend with their children, sons-in-law and grandchildren.

Coming back to Madison County is always a treat. I love to share with my friends in Daytona how much Greenville meant to me when growing up and the support I received from my family and friends.

He also added, "I help my mom make pickles from the cucumbers from my garden."



Marvin Graham: Daring To Make A Difference

There's a man in Jefferson County who dares to do nothing less than to make a difference. When this man is walking down the street, there's not one person that can escape without a friendly smile and a kind gesture. He not only wants to make a difference in the life of his friends and family, but also his church and community and those whom he comes in contact with. This man is Marvin Graham.

Born in Madison County on December 1, 1945, Graham was raised in Lamont and attended school at Green Grove Elementary until the sixth grade. From the sixth through 11th grade, Graham attended the Greenville Training School.

"I was not able to graduate because I had to quit school and work on the farm," Graham recalls. That year proved to be a year of tragedy when his mother was hospitalized and his stepfather became deathly ill. Being raised in a family of five, Graham had to do his part to help the family, and so he began working on the family farm.

"Here we are needing farm work to be done, and our tractor breaks down," he explained. "It would have taken more money than we had to fix it." But a man who heard of the crisis they were in gave the family a tractor so they could continue farming. "I remember it was a Super M Farm All tractor. The best part was, he said we didn't have to pay him until after we gathered the crops. That was a real blessing."

Seeing the hand of God work in his and his family's life was nothing new. At the age of four, Graham experienced a life-threatening illness. The family had heard of a doctor in Pinetta, and everyday for over a month, the family would travel from Lamont to the doctor's office in Pinetta for treatment. "I'm still here," he laughs. "God has been faithful to me."

When the family began to gain strength, Graham decided it was time to leave home and he moved to Florida City. He started working for a farmer from Mississippi who cropped tomatoes, okra and beans. When the farmer returned home to build a vacation home on his farm, he hired Graham to come along and work in Miss.

When he returned home from the Magnolia State, he received a call from Uncle Sam and was drafted into the United States Army. "That was my turn-around point," he stated. Graham only served 21 of 24 months in the Army and was released three months early as a reward for his extended stay in Korea. "In 16 months, I worked my way up to a rank of E5."

On July 4, 1967, Graham completed his time in the service. "I learned a lot in the Army, and I used all I learned in life." Due to his experience of working on the farm with heavy equipment, that knowledge proved to be beneficial to him in the Army and in his first job outside of the service at the Metal Plant in Madison. After two months there, he was made supervisor.

The next couple years he spent working several jobs before landing at Hament Construction, a company based out of Kentucky. This company was responsible for construction on I-10 and I-95 and also did work in Louisiana. It was while the company was working in Louisiana that Graham suffered an injury that would change his life.

At the age of 30, Graham was injured on the job and was paralyzed from the waist down. Doctor after doctor confirmed he would never walk again. "I never believed the news," he said.

"God had been dealing with me a long time about going home and working in the ministry," he admitted. At the time, Graham was making a very comfortable living and was very satisfied with his status in life, and had no reason or logical explanation why he should leave his great job. He knew that God was dealing with him, but the reasoning within himself overruled what God was trying to do.

He could hear the voice speaking to him, "Go home. I want you to go home, but it will be different." Guaranteed 50 hours of pay was

hard to turn down. Graham even used the logic, "A prophet is without honor in his own country," but he admits that wasn't the case.

Graham remained in the hospital a month before his first surgery, which was conducted by Dr. Marcia Book. They performed surgery just to help relieve the pain. But after the surgery, he began to gain strength and feeling in his right leg. "I had to learn how to walk again and I had to wear a brace on my left leg (for about 10 years) and walk with a cane, but I was just glad to be walking again."

Graham once again witnessed God sparing his life when he was returning home. "I was supposed to be on the first ferry to go across the river to the airport in Louisiana, but I decided to ride in the U-Haul truck home instead," he said. "The morning I was supposed to be on the boat, we got word right after it happened that the boat had capsized, and only three people survived. That could have been me."

"As we drove by on the bridge near where the incident occurred, we could see the people on the banks mourning at the loss. It was very touching to behold."

From the time of the accident to age 35, it took Graham nearly five years to finally put the right pieces together. His ministry began which was greatly influenced by two preachers, Bro. Sheeks and Pastor Preston Damon. Graham later served his first church as pastor at his home church, Mt. Olive Primitive Baptist Church in Lamont. After nearly two years, he resigned and ministered several years in different denominations.

"God used that time to show me that it's not about denominations," he stated. He expressed that every church has its problems, so it's not just one denomination or the other. He began as pastor at Harvest Christian Center, a non-denominational church. "We don't want the focus to be on the name over the door, but on the God that we serve."

Graham and congregation held their first service at Harvest on the first Sunday in August 14 years ago, and have made an impact in many different ways in the community.

For the past 27 years, Graham has had an active jail ministry at Jefferson Correctional Institution. The church also offers parenting classes, counseling for different needs, GED classes, clothes closet, food pantry, and mission field experience.

"We're daring people to make a difference in the community," he stated. "We are looking for people who want to be a part of an outreach and we want people who love God." The church is seeking volunteers who can serve as counselors, who are certified to teach. "We want to see retired teachers dust off their skills and come out to help people."

Their mission as a body of believers is to be an outreach ministry that brings salvation to the lost; disciple new believers; to train them up; and send them out on to the mission field. Just as Graham has made an impact on the Monticello community, he is searching for others who dare to make a difference.




