### Click It Or Ticket To Boost Seat Belt Use - Day And Night



Motorists who refuse to wear their seat belts - beware. The 2012 national Click It or Ticket seat belt enforcement mobilization kicked off May 21 to help save lives by cracking down on those who don't buckle up.

The Madison County Sheriff's Office is joining with other state and local law enforcement officers and highway safety advocates across the country to help save more lives by strongly enforcing seat belt laws around the clock.

According to the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, in 2010 nationally, 61 percent of the 10,647 passenger vehicle occupants who were killed in motor vehicle traffic crashes overnight (6 p.m. to 5:59 a.m.) were not wearing their seat belts at the time of the fatal crash, compared to 42 percent during the daytime hours.

Madison County Sheriff Ben Stewart reports that On Monday, May 14, at 7:35 a.m., investigators with the Madison County Sheriff's Office Drug Task Force conducted a traffic stop on a 2004 Dodge Caravan for an equipment violation. The vehicle was traveling westbound on interstate 10 in Madison County.

While investigators were taking necessary enforcement action concerning the equipment violation, they noted several signs of deception and suspicious activity. A consensual search of the vehicle was conducted that discovered five separate packages determined to be

**Dear Savvy Senior,**  
What can you tell me about three-wheeled bicycles? I'm 67 years old and would like to take up recreational bike riding but don't trust myself on a two-wheeler.

**Unbalanced Bonnie**

**Dear Bonnie,**  
Three-wheeled bikes – also known as adult tricycles – are a great cycling option for older boomers and seniors, especially those who have concerns with their balance or stamina. Here's what you should know, along with some tips to help you shop for one.

**Safer Cycling**

If you'd like to take up bike riding, but worry about falling, an adult tricycle is a smart option to consider because of the stability it provides. With a tricycle, you can ride as slow as you want without ever losing your balance and you can put both feet on the ground while seated, which is very reassuring for many older riders.

In addition, adult tricycles are also made

with a low "step through" design making mounting and dismounting much easier than a traditional bike; they come with big tires that ensure a smooth ride; have raised, ergonomic handlebars that are easier to reach and grip; and offer oversize seats (some even have backrests) for comfort and support. And, other than the frame, tricycles use the same standard components as traditional bikes do, so replacement parts are readily available, and repairs are not an issue.

**Types of Tricycles**

There are literally dozens of different types of adult tricycles to choose from with prices ranging anywhere from a few hundred to several thousand dollars. To help you figure out the right kind of tricycle that meets your needs and budget, here's a breakdown of the different styles and costs, along with some popular models to checkout.

**Upright:** If you're primarily interested in a leisurely ride around

the neighborhood for pleasure, fitness or running errands, upright trikes are a good choice. These are traditional upright-positioned tricycles that come with rear cargo baskets and limited gear options usually ranging from one to three-speeds. Some popular models in this category include the Schwinn Meridian Adult Tricycle sold at Walmart and Target for around \$270, the Sun Traditional 24 trike (see [sunbicycles.com](http://sunbicycles.com)) that retails for around \$375, and the Torker TriStar **t h r e e - s p e e d** ([torkerusa.com](http://torkerusa.com)) which costs around \$500.

**Recumbent:** These are the lower-to-the-ground, stretched-out frame tricycles that allow you to recline with your legs positioned in front of you. Available in various styles, recumbent trikes are very comfy, easy on the back and aerodynamic which make them ideal for long rides. See [terratrike.com](http://terratrike.com), [sunbicycles.com](http://sunbicycles.com), [industrialbicycles.com](http://industrialbicycles.com), [trailmate.com](http://trailmate.com) and [bike-mania.biz](http://bike-mania.biz) for a nice variety, but be aware that recumbent trikes are more expensive than upright models, typically ranging between \$800 and \$2,500.

**Tandem:** If you plan to ride primarily with your spouse or another partner, you may want to get a tandem tricycle that comes with two seats (front and back), or you can get a double seat tricycle with the seats side-by-side. You can find these types of bikes for around \$1,000 to \$2,000, at the same websites that offer recumbent trikes.

**Folding:** If you like to travel or if you have limited storage space, tricycles that are designed to fold up to fit in tight spaces are another popular option. The Adventurer Three-Speed Folding Trike which sells for \$390 at [adventurebikes.com](http://adventurebikes.com), Kent Westport Folding Tricycle sold at Target and amazon.com for \$300, and Walmart's Port-O-Trike 3-Speed Folding Tricycle for \$400 are three good folding trikes to consider.

**Electric:** If you need a boost from time to time, electric tricycles are hybrids that have pedals and an electric motor, so you can exercise when you want or you can sit back and let the trike do the work. Some good options include the EW-88 electric trike at [electricwheel-store.com](http://electricwheel-store.com) for \$1,200, and the Cabbike 3 Electric Tricycle offered through [cabbikes.com](http://cabbikes.com) for \$979.

road at night are not wearing their seat belts, and it all too often ends in tragedy," said Sheriff Ben Stewart "Our goal is to save more lives, so the Madison County Sheriff's Office will be out enforcing seat belt laws around the clock."

Seat belt use saves thousands of lives across America each year and the Madison County Sheriff's Office is helping spread the word. NHTSA statistics show that in 2010 alone, seat belts saved an estimated 12,546 lives nationwide.

Yet, too many motorists may need a tough reminder. In 2010, 22,187 passenger vehicle occupants were killed in motor vehicle crashes, according to NHTSA, and 51 percent of them were NOT wearing seat belts at the time of their fatal crashes.

Younger motorists and men are particularly at risk. NHTSA data shows that among teen and young adult passenger vehicle occupants in 2010, ages 18-34, who were killed in motor vehicle traffic crashes, 62 percent were not buckled up at the time of the crash - the highest percentage of any age group. The number jumps to 66 percent when just men in this age group are included.

While this year's Click It or Ticket enforcement mobilization runs from May 21 through June 3, motorists should know that officers are out enforcing seat belt laws year-round.

"Those who choose not to wear a seat belt will feel the heat from our officers who will be out cracking down on Click It or Ticket violators. Motorists should buckle up every time they go out, both day and night," said Sheriff Ben Stewart. "Our officers are prepared to ticket anyone not buckled up...no warnings and no excuses. Click It or Ticket."

the Love to be used for Ten and Under tennis. She wrote, "We applaud your efforts to grow and develop tennis in Florida."

Lisa Flournoy of Madison got the yellow fuzzy ball rolling several months ago when she realized she had no place to play tennis in Madison. "Since the college closed their program, we have no courts," she said. She and Jeanne Bass contacted George English through channels in the USTA.

Flournoy said, "I knew we needed tennis courts in our community. I learned about the grants and went to White Springs to look at their program that runs on Saturday mornings. I knew if we got the equipment, we could have a great program for the whole season."

Although the grant will not provide a court for Flournoy to play on, it will generate interest among children around the county. The equipment consists of lower nets, child-sized racquets, and various colors of balls, plus tape that can be used to design a small court on any flat area.

City Commissioner Ina Thompson (who has formerly taught tennis) and Flournoy are excited about being able to set up a kids' court almost anywhere they find children. Thompson said, "We already have found a space in Lanier Field that will serve this purpose." Flournoy said, "Instead of putting up a court at the rec center and making kids come to us, we will be able to go into their neighborhoods."

Thompson and former basketball coach A. D. Kinsey are planning to attend a workshop in Port Orange to learn details of operating the program. A training workshop for volunteer teachers is set for September. According to Flournoy, it will be free to anyone who wishes to assist, and will be sponsored by the USTA.

Thompson said that Madison Academy has also applied for a grant. "If all the other schools will get their applications in, we will have a great program for our kids in the county," she said.

Flournoy commented, "Because of tennis, my life was changed as a kid. I can't wait to see how other lives are changed now."

Atlantic Regional Conference, with an expected 300 attendees.

It's a balancing act.

According to CDC, one in three adults 65 and older will suffer a fall; if a fall breaks a bone and results in surgery, it often equals a shortened life span. Yet physical activity is vital to maintaining health in older adults, so too much self-imposed immobility to avoid falls is not a good option either.

Kim Sanders, physical therapist for 33 years and owner of Allied Physical Therapy of Madison, spoke at the 55 Plus Club's May meeting, mapping out that middle ground where seniors can stay safe while increasing their physical activity, gaining the strength and improving coordination to reduce the risk of falls. Mobility and safety don't have to be mutually exclusive.

The key is balance. Three major systems affect balance and one of the most frequently overlooked is vision – the eyes gauge the body's position in relation to the horizon. Your annual eye exam is important, as is talking to your doctor or pharmacist about any medications you are taking that could affect your vision.

The second major system that affects balance is the inner ear system that tells the body the position of the head; balance can be thrown backward by looking up and lifting the arm over the head, as when reaching for something on a high shelf or cabinet. Keeping frequently used items at eye level or below can reduce the risk of falling, as can exercises to improve response to the inner ear system: repeatedly looking up, down, and tilting the head from side to side, which can be done while seated or standing and holding onto something.

The third system is the ability to feel the way your feet hit the ground, something you can improve by standing on a pillow or thick folded towel, while holding on to something (this ability is often impaired in people with diabetes/peripheral neuropathy).

If these three major systems are in good working order, the next step is beginning an exercise program to improve strength, balance and coordination.

Simple walking, if your doctor says it is safe, is a good way to build up strength and endurance, if it's at least 30 minutes twice a week. "It doesn't have to be 30 consecutive minutes," said Sanders. "You can break it up into six short walks of five minutes each."

Indoor exercising in front of the kitchen sink is a good option, she added, because it offers a sturdy handhold.

Another simple exercise is lowering yourself into a chair with a slow, controlled movement – the slower, the better – instead of just plopping down into it. Rise with the same slow, controlled motion. While you're in the chair, add seated marching in place, leg kicks and leg lifts. With any leg exercises, if you can do them easily for eight to ten reps, add ankle weights.

Improved ankle flexibility is also vital. Leaning forward against a counter, one foot a giant step behind the other, heels flat on the floor, bend the forward knee until you feel your calf muscle stretching. Hold a comfortable stretch for 15 to 30 seconds – no bouncing – and repeat six times, then switch to the other leg. To exercise your ankles while sitting, flex and extend them repeatedly and rotate them in circles.

For the flexibility in the lower back, lie on your back on the bed, arms outstretched and knees comfortably bent, and allow your knees to flop from one side to the other while keeping your hips on the bed.

Don't overlook posture. When your back is

straight, with your ears over your shoulders and your shoulders over your hips, everything is in proper balance over your feet. "Imagine you're walking on the beach in that little summer bikini and you want to look great," said Sanders. "Straighten those shoulders and suck in that stomach."

Other things that reduce the risk of falling (half of all falls occur in the home) are clearing away floor clutter (books, magazines, purses, shoes, clothes, etc.); making sure small pets are not underfoot when you're moving about, and getting rid of small throw rugs or taping them down firmly with double-sided tape. Install grab-bars next to your toilet, tub and shower and use non-slip mats on tub and shower floors. Have handrails and lights in all staircases, and night-lights in all bathrooms.

Staying active is also great mood lifter and can help improve the quality of sleep at night, in addition to benefiting overall health and retaining physical function and independence for as long as possible.

"Do a little bit every day," said Sanders. "Seriously, it'll get better. Use it, don't lose it."

## Loretta Swit Helps Ayla's Acres With Its First Fundraising Campaign: Final Event Held At The Mansion

"Why animals? When there are so many other great causes out there?" It's a question actor, artist and animal advocate Loretta Swit gets quite frequently. "It's true, there are a lot of good causes out there," she told those at the fundraiser for Ayla's Acres, for which she is an honorary board member. "But animals are the only ones who can't speak for themselves."

She has been a voice for animals for a long time, a time that has also included over two dozen television movies and theatrical releases, the iconic television series M\*A\*S\*H, another series entitled Those Incredible Animals on the Discovery Channel (and later on Animal Planet), Broadway appearances, tours with national theater companies and numerous acting awards, as well as awards for her work with animals and animal welfare organizations.

She appears at several animal-related events a year; the number varies from year to year, not all of them necessarily fundraisers. Sometimes, it may be an animal welfare education/public awareness effort, such as a campaign against puppy mills or other practices harmful or abusive to animals.

The April 29 fundraiser at the Wardlaw-Smith Mansion was the fourth event she had attended that weekend to benefit Ayla's Acres No-Kill Animal Sanctuary, lending her presence and her artistic talents to its very first fundraising campaign. Home to some 320 animals, including a couple of tortoises and a chinchilla, the shelter had come to her attention through her friend Fran Charlson, the sanctuary's Executive Director.

However, far from finding the multiple-event weekend exhausting, Swit said of the Jacksonville-St. Augustine-Madison tour, "I find it invigorating. So many friends come out in support of the animals." Whether it was their generosity with donations or their willingness to volunteer and help provide a voice for those who have none, it meant that a marathon weekend schedule many would have found grueling seemed to have had little effect on her; Sunday afternoon, after all the previous engagements for Ayla's Acres, she spent several hours at the Mansion, posing for photos with fans under the ancient, shady oak trees outside and greeting people as they looked over the tables filled with items for the silent auction, many of which were pieces of her original artwork or prints of paintings she had done – almost all of them depictions of animals. She also had several paintings up for bids in the live auction. "I can't remember a time when I wasn't drawing or painting something," she said.

There were other tables featuring jewelry she had designed, another artistic venture she has been doing for many years as well.

The silent auction also included many items donated from all around the Madison/North Florida region, from residents and businesses, many of whom were also sponsors: a large pot of herbs from O'Toole's Herb Farm, four colorful underwater photos taken just off the Florida Keys several years ago by Alicia and Wayne Conger, handmade bird houses and black walnut display shelves, fishing gear, humane animal traps, gift baskets of gourmet chocolate, trips to resorts in St. Augustine or North Carolina, art works from Jim Glaser, Teresa Segal and Anthony Zelesky, and many other items too numerous to list.

Joining the crowd was Tequila, a large parrot and resident of Ayla's Acres, who rested on Fran Charlson's shoulder most of the afternoon, periodically emitting such realistic cell phone ring tones that a few people nearby reached into their pockets or purses – until they realized where the sound was coming from. To their further amusement, Charlson related that back at the Sanctuary, Tequila's mate, Guacamole, would answer "hello" whenever Tequila "rang."

Another representative of the animal world was an eight-week-old kitten Loretta Swit was fostering. Also named Loretta, the tiny namesake nestled against her shoulder the entire afternoon.

At the live auction, some of the original paintings went for \$400 to \$600; at the cake auction, cakes went for anywhere from \$45 to \$120. Local veterinarian Dr. John Lewis, who has worked extensively with the animals at Ayla's Acres, purchased one of the paintings. Janet Maier purchased the very first cake that went up for auction. Occasionally, Tequila "rang" (and someone would answer "hello" to a round of laughter), but did not submit any bids.

Fran Charlson also spoke briefly during the auction, explaining some the Sanctuary's goals: purchasing a mobile veterinary van to take low-cost spay/neuter services to areas where people cannot afford or are unable to travel to traditional clinics. Another important goal is taking "humane education" into the public schools, starting with Kindergarten and educating an entire upcoming generation of children – about the humane treatment of animals, how to choose the right pet for your family and most importantly, the importance of spaying and neutering pets.

Like the stop-smoking public school education campaigns of the 1960s that had children going home and begging parents to quit smoking, and the recycling education campaigns of the 1970s that had them "bugging their parents to start recycling," Charlson envisioned a similar campaign that would "have kids running home and getting their parents to spay and neuter their pets."

Charlson thanked the numerous volunteers who had helped set up and conduct the event: Brandon Mugge, Shanna Mugge, Jennifer Funk, Wesley Thompson, John Linton, Barbara Funk, Sandy Hovey and Becky Bishop, all of whom were also on the Ayla's Acres Committee with Alicia and Wayne Conger, Chuck Fritz, Dolly Fuhls, Lisa Lesik, Diane Savard and Nedra Wooley. Two of Nedra Wooley's cousins from Ohio were also on hand to help.

Another goal for Ayla's Acres is to bring their highly successful adoption program into Madison. The timing for this has yet to be determined; right now, it is a goal for sometime in the future, to help the adoptable animals find the right "forever homes" with loving families.

For those animals not adoptable due to health problems or behavior issues, there will always be a place for them at Ayla's Acres, as long as people continue to care and come together to provide the support and the voice they do not have themselves – a voice in return for all the things animals bring to people, whether it is the highly trained service animals that aid the disabled, the search-and-rescue animals that aid the lost and injured, or the companion ani-

# May We Never Forget

## The Story Of Joseph Taylor, Jr.: A Real American Hero

If there's anyone that knows anything about sacrificing their time, and even their lives for the freedom of the United States of America, the Taylor family does. Joseph and Hattie Taylor were the parents of eight children, some of who died at a very early age. The father of the family joined the United States Army in the 29th infantry, and served at Camp Gordon, Ga.

"Dad worked on farms and did labor work, so we moved around a lot when I was a kid," Arthur Taylor said. While the family was living in Leesburg, Arthur's older brother, Joseph Alfred Taylor, Jr., followed in his father's footsteps and enlisted in the US Army on August 23, 1941.

"I remember my sister Lessie and I were standing outside waiting for the school bus to come pick us up, and Joseph walks out of the house, walks by us and says 'We'll see ya,' and he continued walking toward town. I was seven years old at the time, and I didn't know where he was going or that he wasn't coming home." Without his parents knowing, Joseph had purchased a bus ticket to McPherson, Ga., where he would begin his career in the Army.

Joseph saw action in all of the major battles, and was severely wounded twice. It was so bad that even Joseph had sent a letter home to his parents stating that when he comes home, they won't be able to recognize him. "They tried to get him to go home, but he wouldn't do it," said Arthur. "He kept telling them 'I've got a job to do.' He was just like my dad in that he wouldn't give up or quit on something."

Their father had done farm work when they were growing up, and it was Joseph's plan that when he returned home from the service his family would buy a 100 acre farm and all work and live on it. "He wanted the family to be together. Every month, Joseph would send all but one dollar of his check home to mom so that when he got out, we could purchase the farm land."

In the midst of World War II, Joseph's unit, Infantry 27, was on the front lines of combat in Luzon, Philippines. Joseph was killed in the heat of the battle on May 8, 1945. "I never knew that morning he walked by me and my sister would be the last time I would ever see or speak to him."

While the family was living in Leesburg in 1946, the Western Union knocked on the Taylor family's door with a telegram addressed to Mr. and Mrs. Taylor. "We were at school and my mom couldn't read, so she had to wait until my dad got home to read what it said." It was through the telegram that the family learned of the death of their son and brother.

"Joseph was always a happy-go-lucky kind of guy," Arthur laughed. A letter that was written on August 14, 1945 by the "M" company commander in the Army to Joseph's sister Mary, highlights his life as always having "a big, pleasant smile for everyone." The letter goes on to say, "He was one of the best and most aggressive soldiers in 'M' company. I remember on one specific occasion he captured a Japanese document from a military Jap that was of great military value to us. He was popular with the other men in the company and had acquired many close friends not only in the company, but in the entire regiment."

Being severely wounded twice in the line of duty made Joseph a two-time recipient of the Purple Heart medal. Other accolades that was awarded on behalf of Joseph was the American Defense Service medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign medal, World War II Victory medal, and the Honorable Service Lapel Button, World War II.

After the death of Joseph, the family

moved to Coolidge, Ga., where they purchased a 100-acre farm in his memory. "We bought the farm because we knew that's what he would want us to do," Arthur recalls. The family ran the farm for a couple of years before returning to Leesburg. They later moved to Nashville, Ga., before moving to Madison in 1949. "Dad was wanting to run his own farm again, so we bought about 50 acres of land about 10 miles south of Madison." The family did later move again, but Arthur and his wife made their way back to Madison in June of 2001.



Service to this country runs deep in the roots of the Taylor family. The father of the family, Joseph, Sr. served in the United States Army. Joseph, Jr. served four years in the service before losing his life in World War II. Arthur served in the Army National Guard for 31 years before retiring. Richard Taylor served in the Marine Corp for 20 years. Arthur's granddaughter, Danielle, served six years in the Army Reserve, spending one year in Desert Storm and one year in Iraq.

Joseph Alfred Taylor, Jr. will forever go down in the history pages as a real American hero.







## Local Teen Barrel Races Her Way To The Top

When it comes to barrel racing, Taylor Killingsworth is at the top of her game. Since the fourth grade Taylor has been barrel racing, and she was younger than that when she began riding horses. "I have always loved riding horses. Then one day my mom asked me if I wanted to ride more competitively. Then she asked if I would rather jump or barrel race," said Taylor. Taylor chose to barrel race and has been competing ever since.

Taylor was in her first competition when she was around 8 or 9 years old. That competition was at Piney Woods in Valdosta, Ga. Then when she got into the fifth and sixth grade, Taylor joined the National Barrel Horse Association Florida District 08 (NBHA 08). Being in the NBHA has allowed her to compete in some of the bigger competitions in the area. She is also a member of the Suwannee County Riding Club. This is a horse-riding club located in Live Oak.

"The district that Taylor competes in is consistently one of the toughest in the state. When they travel to the state show, there are consistently winners from her district," said her dad, Ben Killingsworth.

In July, Taylor will be traveling to Perry, Ga. to compete in the Youth World Championship for barrel racing. In order to qualify for this prestigious honor Taylor had to compete and win at enough races to earn enough points. Being in the NBHA allowed her to compete in the larger races and earn more points towards qualifying for World Competition.

This is Taylor's second time qualifying for World Competition. She did not attend the competition the previous year that she qualified because the competition was in Mississippi.

Taylor has three horses, but she only uses two in competition, the third is too young. The two that she competes on: Kuna, a mare, is an 11-year old quarter horse, and Ranger, a gelding, is an appendix (a quarter horse mixed with a thoroughbred).

"Barrel racing gives me something constructive to do. I enjoy racing and I really enjoy going fast and pushing limits. Racing helps with self-discipline. I just try to be the best I can be and get my horses to be willing to work harder," shared Taylor. "Towards the end of the school year, I have gotten closer to Christ and it has helped me a lot with my self control. I constantly remind myself of my favorite verse 'We can do all things through Him who gives us strength.'"

"I want to continue racing after high school. My ultimate goal right now would be to try to win more in state competitions," said Taylor. "My mom and dad are very supportive of all I do. They are always there for me and encourage me."

Taylor is the daughter of Ben and Christy Killingsworth. She has an older sister, Ashley, and a younger brother, Trey.

To some, Pinetta might be considered a small town you pass through when you're going to Valdosta, but to Allen Shadrick, Pinetta is home. Shadrick has spent all of his life in Pinetta. He attended Pinetta Junior High until he was in the eighth grade. He then went to Madison High School.

While growing up in Pinetta, Shadrick and his friends enjoyed going fishing, hunting and going to Valdosta. "I had a lot of friends in Pinetta. All of the kids in town knew each other and we all hung out together. We would all meet up together on Sundays at the school and play tackle football. We were very close," Shadrick recalled.

Shadrick and his friends enjoyed going to Cherry Lake to go skiing and fishing. They would hang out at The Dairy Bar or Stone Fox, the movie theater and drive-in in Madison and "all of the parking lots in town, until the cops ran us off." They would also go to Coffee Shoals, which was a camp back in the woods that they would camp at or just have bonfires and hang out.

Some memories that Shadrick has of Pinetta include, Mr. Hollingsworth's Store and Gidden's which are both closed now. Allen has served as the chief of the Pinetta Volunteer Fire Department for several years. And has been in the fire department for more than 30 years.

"I remember going to the community center to skate or dance. They had dances on Friday and skating on Saturday. There was always something to do at the Community Center," said Shadrick.

"Pinetta was a great place to grow up. We were a very close-knit community. If you had a problem, you didn't call your insurance company,
