Holiday Weekend Structure Fire

The Madison County 911 Center received a call shortly after 6:30 p.m. on Sunday, May 27, reporting a structure fire. Neighbors were seeing smoke coming from a home at 115 Meadowrun in the Yellow Pines area. Responding units found smoke coming from the front roofline and a window in the rear.

Madison Fire and Rescue had the fire under control very quickly and the State Fire Marshall was requested to come to the scene. Also aiding the fire services were Madison County EMS and the Madison County Sheriff's Office.

Water Shortage Order Takes Effect June 13

The Suwannee River Water Management District (District) Governing Board voted yesterday to adopt a Phase III Water Shortage Order in response to extreme drought conditions. The order, which requires water use restrictions for all users, will go into effect on June 13, the day after the board's next meeting.

Under the water shortage order, restrictions, and some exemptions, will apply to residential, agricultural, commercial, and industrial users within the District's boundaries. This includes all of Columbia, Dixie, Gilchrist, Hamilton, Lafayette, Madison, Suwannee, Taylor and Union counties, and portions of Alachua, Baker, Bradford, Jefferson, Levy and Putnam counties.

"Drought conditions have prompted the need to enact water use restrictions to reduce demands for water and stretch our water supplies during the drought," said District Acting Executive Director Charlie Houder.

The 12 months ending on April 30 had the lowest rainfall total of all May-April periods since 1932, and the 12-month deficit rose to 17.1 inches at the end of April.

Groundwater levels recorded at most monitor wells in the District and some river levels set new record lows for this time of year. As of April 26, Treehouse Spring in Alachua County and Levy Blue Spring in Levy County had no observable flow for the first time in their records. Hornsby Springs in Alachua County was also not flowing, and Poe Springs, Suwannee Springs, Otter Springs, and Alapaha Rise experienced the lowest flows on record. In addition, part of the Santa Fe River near High Springs nearly stopped flowing.

Even with recent rainfall from Tropical Depression Beryl, water levels are not expected to significantly improve, said Megan Wetherington, District se-

nior professional engineer.

Many areas in the District received at least 3-4 inches of rainfall, though localized areas received up to 14 inches.

"While this system provided assistance to our water levels, we do not expect any major improvements in most areas in the District," Wetherington said.

The restrictions mostly target outdoor water use, particularly lawn and landscape irrigation which usually accounts for half of household use.

Following is a list of some of the restrictions that apply:

Residential:

For established lawns and landscapes watering is limited to once per week. The schedule is based upon an even/odd address numbering system as follows:

- House addresses ending in 0 or 1 may only irrigate on Monday.
- Addresses ending in 2 or 3 may only irrigate on Tuesday.
- Addresses ending in 4 or 5 may only irrigate on Wednesday.
- Addresses ending in 6 or 7 may only irrigate on Thursday.
- Addresses ending in 8 or 9 may only irrigate on Friday.
- Residences with no address (community common areas, etc.) may only irrigate on Friday.

Restrictions also apply to the time of day watering may take place. Hours for watering when using sprinklers and irrigation systems are 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. Hours for watering when using a hand-held hose with nozzle are 4 p.m. to 10 a.m.

Additional watering is allowed for new lawns and landscapes for the first 60 days following planting. After that time, the rules for established lawns and landscapes take effect.

Treated wastewater irrigation and irrigation for home vegetable gardens are exempt from the restrictions.

Agricultural:

Overhead irrigation by high

pressure/high volume systems is prohibited between noon and 9 p.m. No off-site application or irrigation water on non-targeted areas is allowed.

There are no restrictions on the use of treated wastewater for irrigation and on low pressure/low volume irrigation systems.

Many of the area's farmers and producers implement water conservation plans and have retrofitted their irrigation systems to increase efficiency and reduce total water use. Systems that have been certified by an independent irrigation laboratory within the past five years prior to the effective date of a water shortage order to be as efficient as practicable or are compliant with applicable water conservation best management practices are not restricted.

Other:

Car washing is limited to once per week on the designated watering day for the location. Fundraising and commercial car washes and the washing of emergency and other first responder vehicles are exempt. Outside pressure cleaning is restricted to only low-volume methods. Outside and inside aesthetic uses of water are prohibited.

Restrictions to lawn irrigation of golf courses also apply. Non-irrigation restrictions apply to commercial, industrial, and water utility users.


In addition to the outdoor restrictions, the District asks residents and businesses to conserve water indoors. Residents and businesses can take simple steps, such as fixing leaks and upgrading plumbing fixtures to water conserving models.

KEEP SUMMER GRILLING SAFE

This past weekend marked the beginning of summer and it wouldn't be summer if we didn't pull out the grills. Meals cooked outdoors always increase during the summer months and the variety of food people put on the grill seems to be expanding. With all of the food preparation in summer temperatures, you need to be aware of safe food handling practices.

Backyard chiefs don't think about it, but in recent years, there has been an increase of outbreaks in food poisoning during the summer months. Bacteria that cause food poisoning is invisible, odorless and tasteless; summer temperatures only increase the potential population explosion. Since it is not appetizing to think about food invaders like E. coli, clostridium perfringens or salmonella, using safe food handling methods will drastically reduce your chances of exposing your family and friends to food borne illness.

Marinate meats in a glass dish in the refrigerator, not the counter. If you plan to use some of the marinade for basting or a dip, reserve a portion separate from the portion you use for raw meat. Bacteria from raw meat will contaminate the liquid and it should be discarded after the marinating time is over.

Coals should be very hot before food is placed on the grill for cooking. A hot grill will assure you that food is cooked at a high enough temperature to destroy bacteria. It takes 30 minutes or longer before coals are hot enough; they should appear to have a light coating of ash for the highest temperature.

Meat should be thoroughly cooked. They best way to check for doneness is to use a meat thermometer; meat should be cooked to internal temperature of 160° F and poultry should reach 180° F. If you don't have a thermometer, visually check by cutting into the meat to be sure the juices are clear and not pink in color. To avoid flare-ups and charred food, remove visible fat from meat.

Put cooked foods on a clean plate that wasn't used to hold raw meat or poultry. Cooking food destroys bacteria, but if you put it back on the same plate you just exposed it to bacteria again. Food safety experts call this cross contamination and it is sure to cause food borne illness.

Perishable foods need to be served hot off the grill. Most food safety expert's advice food should be eaten within two hours. If you are eating outdoors, keep in mind warm temperatures reduce that time to one hour. Leftovers should be promptly divided into small containers and placed in the refrigerator.

Simple changes in the way you prepare and serve your backyard barbeque will greatly reduce your risk for food borne illness. For more information on food safety, contact the Madison County Extension Service.

State Legislatures Count!

We should take time to focus on our important State Legislatures, our front line, even though our media misplaces emphasis on Washington City, just because Congress, still in session, has their job to do.

Recent elections have left Republicans in control of both the executive and legislative branches of 21 States, while Democrats control both branches in 11, with power divided in the others.

IN DEMOCRAT STATES

Maryland and Washington, both controlled by Democrats, both enacted laws legalizing same-sex marriage this year, and Connecticut just voted to repeal its death penalty.

MEANWHILE IN REPUBLICAN STATES

Many Republican legislatures are focusing on fiscal issues, with States like Florida, Kansas, Oklahoma and Tennessee, pressing for tax cuts. But social issues have been the driving force in other States.

For instance, take Tennessee. They passed a bill to protect school teachers, who review "the scientific strengths and weaknesses of existing scientific theories" in areas including "biological evolution, the chemical origins of life, global warming and human cloning."

GUNS AS DEFENSE

Bills expanding gun rights have passed in a number of States. Maine recently joined several others that passed a bill prohibiting restrictions on the right to carry or sell firearms during a declares state of emergency. Arizona enacted a law requiring law enforcement agencies to sell forfeited guns within a year, rather than destroying them, as many local agencies do. Oklahoma enacted a law that will limit the liability that gun ranges face for accidents.

Legislatures have come a long way. Citizens have been, more and more, allowed to exercise their rights as granted by the 2nd Amendment to the Constitution. We should no longer see a front page headline, such as this one, that ran in the Atlanta Constitution on 8/17/1957: "Tossed Salad Dressing - Salt and Mayonnaise Rout Market Bandit"

It seemed that an Atlanta lady grocer salted down a would-be holdup man and then stamped him with a barrage of mayonnaise jars. The would be bandit said, "Gimme your money!" Thinking he might be kidding, she repeated herself. He again, said, "Gimme your money!" That's when she let him have it, with what was "legally" available to her.

People are fed up, and we don't have to take it anymore. And it's our legislatures, and State governments, which are, or should be, our first responders.

OTHER LEGISLATION

Arizona has moved to ban nearly all abortions after 5 months, and Mississippi has stepped up the regulations of abortion clinics to those that hospitals and nursing homes have to undergo.

Gov. Scott Walker of Wisconsin has just signed a law allowing the state's schools to teach about abstinence instead of just contraception.

Right to Work is now Indiana law. This law, similar to Florida's grants one the right to work without paying tribute to a union.

NATIONAL

States are building blocks, but can't do it all. Congress must address the lethal threats of our debts, our unaffordable commitments, and our slow-growth economy.





Remembrance of Things Past: DOUG FINNEY

While Pinetta may seem like a small portion of Madison County to some, to Doug Finney it's the place that holds many of his childhood memories. Finney's first job was for Shadrick Lumber, a hardware store. He also did construction work for Lon Shadrick. When he was a teenager, he worked at the Pinetta Market as a cashier. He also worked at Jimmie's Firestone. He began working at Relief Printing, which is now Corporate Graphics, in 1988, and stayed there for 17 years. He then began selling printing equipment and later opened his own print shop, TD Graphics. He now works for a publishing company out of Tallahassee.

"When I grew up in Pinetta, everybody knew everybody. We never locked our door or took the keys out of our cars. Back then we didn't have cell phones and your momma always knew what you did before you got home," he recalled.

Additionally, you can call 1-866-992-6174 or e-mail questions@DeepwaterHorizonEconomicSettlement.com to find out if a geographic location is included.

WHAT DOES THE ECONOMIC & PROPERTY DAMAGES SETTLEMENT PROVIDE?

The E&PD Settlement makes payments for the following types of claims: (1) Seafood Compensation, (2) Economic Damage, (3) Loss of Subsistence, (4) Vessel Physical Damage, (5) Vessels of Opportunity Charter Payment, (6) Coastal Real Property Damage, (7) Wetlands Real Property Damage, and (8) Real Property Sales Damage. There is no limit on the total dollar amount of the E&PD Settlement; all qualified claims will be paid.

HOW TO GET BENEFITS FROM THE ECONOMIC & PROPERTY DAMAGES SETTLEMENT

You need to submit a Claim Form to request a payment. You can get a copy of the various Claim Forms by visiting the website or by calling 1-866-992-6174. Claims can be submitted online or by mail. If you have questions about how to file your claim, you should call the toll-free number for assistance.

The deadline to submit most E&PD claims will be April 22, 2014 or six months after the E&PD Settlement becomes effective (that is, after the Court grants "final approval" and any appeals are resolved), whichever is later. There will be an earlier deadline to submit E&PD Seafood Compensation claims. The earlier deadline to submit Seafood Compensation claims will be 30 days after final approval of the Settlement by the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Louisiana (regardless of appeals). The exact date of the claim filing deadline will be posted on the website. It is highly recommended that Medical Class Members complete and submit their claim forms promptly. Please read the Economic and Property Damages Settlement notice because you may also be eligible for a payment from that settlement.

YOUR OTHER OPTIONS

If you do not want to be legally bound by the Medical Benefits Settlement, you must Opt Out or exclude yourself by **October 1, 2012** or you won't be able to sue BP over certain medical claims. If you stay in the Medical Benefits Settlement, you may object to it by **August 31, 2012**. The Detailed Notice explains how to exclude yourself or object.

The Court will hold a hearing on **November 8, 2012** to consider whether to approve the Medical Benefits Settlement. You or your own lawyer may ask to appear and speak at the hearing at your own cost. Class Counsel will ask the Court to consider an award of fees, costs, and expenses of 6% of the value of the benefits actually provided under the Medical Benefits Settlement Agreement. Class Counsel fees, costs, and expenses under the Medical Benefits Settlement Agreement and the Economic and Property Damages Settlement Agreement jointly cannot exceed \$600 million. Class members' payments will not be reduced if the Court approves the payment of Class Counsel fees, costs, and expenses because BP will separately pay these attorney fees, costs, and expenses.



License-Free Saltwater, Freshwater Fishing Fun Coming Next Week

The first week of June is National Fishing and Boating Week. This year, start and end the week's festivities by taking advantage of one of Florida's license-free fishing days. Saltwater recreational anglers can fish without a license on June 2 and freshwater recreational fishers on June 9. There couldn't be a better time to get out on the water and try your hand at some of Florida's fine fishing on these two Saturdays.

Thirty-four states, including Florida and Georgia, will have license-free fishing days during the June 2 through June 10 National Fishing and Boating Week, a celebration of fishing and boating.

"Florida's license-free fishing days are an excellent opportunity to share the fun, excitement and togetherness of a fishing trip with the entire family. This also is a great time for experienced anglers to introduce friends to the sport, even if they don't have a fishing license," said Nick Wiley, FWC executive director. "By having these events on weekends, we hope Florida residents and visitors will experience the joy of saltwater and freshwater fishing. We expect many will discover a healthy sport they can enjoy for a lifetime."

Saltwater anglers can try their hand at catching a red snapper, which will be open for harvest in Gulf and Atlantic state waters and Gulf federal waters on the June 2 saltwater license-free fishing day. Want to stick a little closer to shore? Try your hand at near-shore species such as spotted seatrout or red drum.

Now that school is out or almost out and people are in vacation mode, anglers will find June a great time to introduce a child to fishing or encourage a friend who hasn't been fishing for a while to get on the water.

Almost everyone in Florida is within 45 minutes of a freshwater fishing hole. Dawn or dusk may be your best fishing times, but if you go midday, seek out the shadows around piers or fallen trees, or look for bass and bream under floating vegetation mats and in other shaded areas to enhance your success.

Fishing is a low-cost, wholesome form of entertainment, which is why the FWC offers four days when a recreational fishing license is not needed. Can't make the June 2 or June 9 license-free fishing days? The FWC also made Sept. 1 a license-free saltwater fishing day, which not only falls on a holiday weekend, but is during the popular bay scallop and spiny lobster seasons.

Each year, the first Saturday in April and second Saturday in June will be license-free freshwater fishing days.

The state's abundant resources, coupled with responsible freshwater and saltwater fish management, are why Florida is known as the "Fishing Capital of the World."

All other bag limit, season and size restrictions apply on these dates.


