

# Election Night Party Planned At Courthouse

With a 52 percent turnout, "we've got to get people to see the value of a vote," said Madison County Supervisor of Elections Tommy Hardee, who is hoping to get people excited about voting with an old-fashioned "Election Night Party on the Courthouse Lawn," from 5 p.m. until the last vote is tallied.

Years ago, before computers and online technology, election results were posted on a huge chalkboard set up in front of the old Madison Enterprise-Recorder office on Shelby Street. Crowds of people would bring their lawn chairs and gather 'round as results were posted and updated continuously throughout the evening as ballots were tallied and totals were called in.

"When I was a kid, there would be four or five hundred people on that lawn," Hardee recalled of those early No-

ember evenings that made perfect football weather. "Some of my best football games were played on that lawn."

While the children played, the adults socialized and excitement built as more and more precincts called in their results and old totals were erased and replaced with the new ones.

Now, people can check on election night results from their laptop computers. Technology has made it easier for people to keep tabs on who is winning, with automatically renewed results throughout the evening, but the traditional election night gathering was lost in the process.

But this election year, the election night celebration is back.

On the east side of the courthouse, a giant projection screen, set up between two huge pillars, Please see Election, Page 3



# Madison's Jewel In The Crown: The Future Of The Mansion

Attorney Tommy Reeves remembers the condition the Mansion was in when he was a child – a dilapidated state, unusable, with a gas station operating right in front of it.

Today, the Wardlaw-Smith-Goza Conference Center, or "the Mansion" as it is popularly known, is the crown jewel in a collection of architectural treasures, the historic family homes situated among the quiet, tree-lined streets of Madison.

But unlike many of the other jewels in the collection, the Mansion is not owned and looked after by a family.

For the last few years, North Florida Community College has brought the Mansion back to its current state of grandeur. It has been used as a conference center and a gathering place people could rent for weddings, receptions and other grand occasions. Every Christmas, the Madison Woman's Club would decorate every room in elegant Victorian or Dickensian style and hold "Christmas at the Mansion" for the public.

But after NFCC's budget was slashed by the state, it had to make some decisions, one of which was that it could no longer allocate money toward the Mansion. In a word, without intervention, the Mansion would be closed, "boarded up," and its future uncertain.

City Manager Tim Bennett addressed the County Commission at the Oct. 3 meeting to present an alternative, one that has been underway for several months: a city-county staff initiative to provide a source of funding and give the Mansion another chance at a viable future.

Bennett, along with Allen Cherry, Tim Sanders, Tommy Reeves, Clay Snickter, Cindy Vees, Teenie Cave and Deloris Jones, have been working on a city-county interlocal agreement with a proposed

# New County Commission Chair Takes The Gavel For Oct. 3 Meeting

After the passing of the gavel from former Commission Chair Roy Ellis to new Commissioner Chair Wayne Vickers, the latter proceeded with a meeting that included the second required public hearing for Rich Property & Investment Group, a sizable check presented to Madison County and some good news for Madison County's roads, among several agenda items.

Donald Rich of Rich Property & Investment had requested a land use designation change, from Conservation to Ag-1, for 670 acres it acquired from the Suwannee River Water Management District in exchange for another, similar piece of property. The change would allow for farming in part of the area as well as a housing

density on other parts of the property, not to exceed one home per 40 acres of land.

At the first public hearing, Rich had addressed the concerns of a local resident regarding the change in the land use, assuring the resident that water levels would not be drawn down too far by the agricultural irrigation needs, and that SRWMD was satisfied that the water supply would not be endangered, or it would not have approved the swap.

At the second and final hearing, Jeanne Bass, Madison Planning and Zoning, told the Commission that Rich Property & Investment had met with the Zoning board and fulfilled all the requirements for the request. The Commission voted 4-0 to approve the

# Two Not To Appear In Court Oct. 12

Two of those who were listed for a pre-trial hearing in Madison on Friday, Oct. 12, are not on the docket.

Supervisor of Elections Jada Woods Williams' trial has been transferred to circuit court in Tallahassee.

Williams was charged with 17 counts of neglect of duty and corrupt practices for allowing the distribution of the absentee ballots.

Ora Bell Rivers, charged with seven counts of fraud in connection with casting a vote, three counts of perjury by false written declaration, and one count of providing a false report to law enforcement authorities.

The other defendants are all slated to appear in court on Oct. 12 to face charges of voter fraud.

Following the November 2010 general election where Abra "Tina" Johnson was elected to represent District 1 as a school board member, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement began investigating

will display the online results as they come in, just as a computer screen would at home.

Plans so far include bounce houses and food vendors. "We're open to any other ideas," said Hardee, adding that it would be a great opportunity for a church group, civic club or any other organization to raise a little money selling hot dogs, hamburgers or funnel cakes. He expects that there will be about 20 vendor spots available, and interested businesses or organizations should contact Samantha Wise at the Supervisor of Elections Office, (850) 973-6507, email her at [swise@votemadison.com](mailto:swise@votemadison.com) or drop by the office at 239 SW Pinckney Street to fill out a simple form.

The Election Night Party at the courthouse is only one of several voter outreach efforts (including voting drives and "meet-the-candidate" events) the SOE's office has been using this year to stir up excitement and interest in the voting process. They have also held several mock elections, including this week's Homecoming Election at Madison County High School, all conducted the same way an actual election would be, on the same voting machines. MCHS students were assigned a "voter registration" number, which they typed into the system to pull up the grade level candidates they were allowed to vote for (seniors voting for seniors, juniors for juniors, etc.)

"It was awesome," said Hardee, adding that takes the SOE's office about 20 minutes to set up a mock election for any group or organization, whether for fun or education. Best of all, there is no cost involved because the entire process is paperless.

Come on out election night and celebrate an evening of old-fashioned fun.

\$45,000 reserve fund over the next five years to operate the Mansion as an official visitors' center to welcome tourists into the city. The Chamber of Commerce and other tourist-related organizations would rent space on the first floor, with additional revenues contributed by the TDB, the city of Madison and the county, with an oversight committee composed of at least one city staff member and one county staff member to coordinate everything.

The group has looked at how the college has operated the Mansion for the last few years, what its expenses were, and what kind of revenue it could generate through rentals. They would like to see if a city/county cooperative effort would work, with a lease agreement that the county could get out of if the proposal proved unfeasible. "We want to walk before we try to run," said Bennett, and he wanted to see if the County Commission would be interested in the idea before he presented it to the City Commission.

If the idea works, the lease could become a lease-to-own after the five-year lease is up.

"We felt we needed to do something," said Reeves. At the same time, the group tried to "be very conscious of the fact that we are in horrible economic times," and the Mansion is a huge facility that "could easily turn into a money pit." Hence, the effort to limit the county's risk with a lease it could get out of easily. Still, he believed the idea is "worth a shot."

Commissioner Roy Ellis agreed with the effort to "save for public use an architectural treasure of the county and of North Florida."

Still, a jewel or treasure can be a very costly thing, as Commissioner Renetta Parrish reminded the board, urging them not to expose the county to any financial risk in the current economic climate. Even though she would hate to see the Mansion be lost, with contracts, legal fees, agreements, and financial papers that would have to be drawn up, she questioned whether or not this was something the county would want to become involved with.

After further discussion, Ellis made the motion to proceed with the idea and was seconded by Commissioner Justin Hamrick.

The vote was 3-1 to go ahead with the project, with Parrish casting the dissenting vote.

land use designation change.

Frank Darabi, Professional engineer for the Aucilla Area Solid Waste Facility, was pleased to present the Commission with a check returning unneeded money to Madison County. Aucilla Landfill had managed to save nearly half a million in expenses by having staff do much of the major work (liner installation, site prep work, sand layering, etc.) rather than bidding the work out. Aucilla has set up escrow accounts for further continuing costs and maintenance.

The amount of money returned to Madison, \$136,889.06, was based on the county's share of "waste contribution" to the landfill. Darabi and Aucilla Facility Administrator John McHugh made the check presentation.

It has been a long, hot summer for the Madison County Road Department, getting the needed roadwork done and contending with weather issues that included a tropical storm thrown into the mix just for good measure. Commissioners made note of that, and several made positive comments about the department's diligence in maintaining the dirt roads and repairing the storm damage as Road Department Director Lonnie Thigpen presented a price quote from APAC Florida S.E. Inc., to fill in the depression that appeared in the southbound lane of SR 14 after Tropical Storm Debby. Since this is considered a minor job, the Commission voted to accept the price quote and amend the contract with the company (already here with its necessary equipment, doing other road work) to include the repair for about \$7500.

Another bit of good news concerned the bridge over the Little Aucilla River at Lovett, which has been closed for the last several months for major upgrade and repair. It is now wide enough - about 39 feet - for two semis to meet and safely pass each other with room to spare.

"We're finally seeing the light at the end of the tunnel," said Thigpen. The project is winding down to a close with only few details remaining, including putting in the guardrails, adding another layer of asphalt and doing the striping.

In a few weeks, barring any unforeseen complications, the bridge will be open to traffic.


The North Florida Cattle Battle is open to any 4-H or FFA member. There will be buck-

# Clemons Family Reunion Held

Each year, in August, the descendants of Tony and Cernelia Clemons have a family reunion in Madison. Although the descendants have branched out across the United States and abroad, the roots of the family were planted firmly in the town of Greenville, in Madison County, many years ago. The community was named after Greenville, S.C., and was founded in the Sandy Ford area in 1876. Greenville is a quaint little hamlet with lots of farmland. It is also known as the childhood home to rhythm and blues icon Ray Charles. Three of the Clemons' grandchildren were childhood friends of Ray Charles. The ties binding the Clemons family to the small town are in place today as Elesta Clemons Pritchett is Mayor Emeritus of Greenville.

Tony and Cernelia (Howard) Clemons were married on Dec. 22, 1904 as recorded in the marriage records of Madison County. Tony made a living as a farmer and Cernelia was a homemaker. According to several Federal Census records, Tony and Cernelia were landowners and both were educated (they could both read and write). They grew many crops and livestock.

The union of Tony and Cernelia was a fruitful one. They were the parents of ten children: Kirk, Simp, Burton, Walter, Fred, Louie, Hassie, Zera, Tony, Jr., and Bonnie. Tony and Cernelia firmly planted in their children the love of God, education and produc-

tive work ethics. Many days were spent in the schools of Greenville - Coon Bottom, Redding Hammock and New Chapel, as well as mandatory Sunday services at New Chapel Church.

From the stories of their childhood, we learn that Tony and Cernelia's children enjoyed the days spent in their parents' home. When they weren't at school or busy helping their parents on the farm, they enjoyed several pastimes, such as playing baseball and games like hide and seek. They even enjoyed riding the family's horses. There were many hours spent fishing in nearby ponds and picking berries or grapes from the arbors and shrubs that were so abundant. For years, the Clemons children amused their own children and grandchildren with stories from the "good ole days."

Like many Americans, the Clemons family suffered through economic hardships during the Great Depression, even the loss of several acres of land. The family eventually relocated to the neighboring city of Madison - living in one of the homes of E.B. and Ruby Wilson. In 1950, Tony and Cernelia's children purchased 14 acres of land from the Wilsons and built their parents a block home on the property. The property on Little Cat Road is still owned by the family.

Tony Clemons, Sr. (1878-1960), was born on July 13, 1878 to Stephney and Julia (Shacklefoot)

Clemons. Tony and his family lived in the Greenville district of Madison County. The 1900 Federal Census records Tony's mother, Julia, giving birth to 12 children, with only seven surviving at the time. The siblings of Tony listed in several census records were James, Susan, Minnie, Millie, Lillie, Augusta, Hester, Mack and Josie. The family has learned that his sister, Hester, married Cernelia's brother, Harvey. Tony died Jan. 14, 1960 in Madison and is buried in the Oak Ridge Cemetery.

Cernelia Howard Clemons (1885-1954) was born on Dec. 20, 1885, to Henry and Mary (Reddick) Howard. Cernelia was the only girl and the middle child with two other siblings: Harvey and Henry. She was a dedicated member of New Chapel and loved singing and praising the Lord. Her grandchildren recall the tap, tap, tap sound of her shoes during church services. Cernelia died on Feb. 25, 1954, in Madison, and is also buried in Oak Ridge Cemetery next to her husband.

According to Federal Census Records and oral history, the family's surname was originally Clements. It later became Clemons, but some family members preferred Clemon. As they approached adulthood, most of the children left the Greenville area, with only Simp and Hassie remaining in the county. The other siblings migrated to South Carolina, Virginia, Connecticut and Pennsylvania.

## Madison 4-H/Tropicana Public Speaking Competition Slated





## Year-Round Water Conservation Rules Are Now In Effect Within The SRWMD

Though water shortage restrictions imposed by the Suwannee River Water Management District (District) have expired, year-round water conservation rules are now in effect.

After a pattern of heavy rainfall this summer, the restrictions were allowed to expire on Sept. 30. The District declared a water shortage order in June to ease drought conditions. Conditions have improved considerably since that time.

"Groundwater levels have recovered to normal or above normal in most areas and river levels have not been this high since 2010," said Megan Wetherington, District senior professional engineer.

In August, the District received an average of more than 9 inches of rainfall, with accumulations of up to 16 inches in localized areas. On Aug. 26, the Santa Fe River near Fort White experienced minor flooding after it crested at 0.3 feet above flood stage, and the Waccasassa River saw its third highest stage in 10 years. The Ichetucknee River had sustained flows not seen since 2006.

The National Weather Service Climate Prediction Center is predicting a weak to moderate El Niño, which typically means cooler and wetter conditions in the fall and winter.

The water shortage restrictions mostly restricted outdoor watering, particularly lawn and landscape irrigation. Under the order, lawn and landscape irrigation was limited to



once per week.

Since the order expired, residents and others fall under mandatory, year-round water conservation rules. The rules limit lawn and landscape irrigation to twice per week for this time of year, and apply to residential landscaping, public or commercial recreation areas, and public and commercial businesses. In addition, watering is prohibited between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Farmers are required to follow conservation measures included in their water use permit.

"Though the District does not feel it is necessary to prolong water restrictions at this time, we ask that all water users conserve water and help us sustain our water resources," said District Executive Director Ann Shortelle.

# Bears Very Active Right Now

Recently, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) regional office in Ocala received several calls from excited motorists on Highway 19 in the Ocala National Forest reporting a bear sitting alongside the busy road. They were concerned it was sick or would get hit by a vehicle.

When a biologist went to check it out, she discovered a very natural activity: The bear was sitting off the shoulder of the road, stuffing acorns into its mouth as fast as it could. Fearing the bear might be hit by a car or truck, the biologist tried to chase it into the woods to a safer eating spot. Instead it ran up a nearby oak tree and, after balancing precariously on thin branches, began eating every acorn it could find up there.

"We're beginning to get lots of calls from people in both rural and urban areas reporting what they think is a sick or hurt bear because it plops itself down for extended periods and casually eats grass, acorns, berries, insects - really any natural food nearby," said Susan Carroll-Douglas, wildlife assistance biologist for the FWC's Northeast Region.

In autumn, bears in Florida begin a natural process of putting on fat stores for the winter. To do this they require around 25,000 calories a day and will eat anything that's convenient. The easier it is to get, the better they like it.

"It takes a lot of acorns, berries, grass, insects and leaves to make 25,000 calories a day," said Mike Orlando, assistant bear program coordinator for the FWC. "But bears aren't fussy, and they are very smart. It's much easier and tastier to consume that many calories by eating food like garbage,

pet food, livestock food and birdseed that people leave readily available."

What does all this mean to the average central Florida resident, besides serious problems for themselves, their family, pets and the bears unless they make some adjustments?

"If you live in most counties in central Florida, you very likely live in bear country. You may see bears frequently, or not at all, but they are living nearby. During this time of year, even those who rarely or never see bears may find one in their yard or walking around the neighborhood munching on acorns and other natural foods," said Carroll-Douglas.

This is not a cause for alarm, but people need to know what to look for and what they should do if they have seen or suspect bears are nearby. First look for signs of an unseen visit by a bear.

"Signs include garbage strewn all over the place, bird feeders ripped down and seed eaten, livestock or pet food raided, acorns disappearing, footprints that look oddly human-like, and large piles of fecal material, also called scat, filled with acorns, remnants of garbage, corn, and other foods," said Orlando.

Next, if you see a bear or signs of one, take action to discourage it from hanging around. If one is in your yard, the FWC recommends making a lot of noise to disturb the bear and make it move on. Car horns, air horns, banging pots and pans, noisemakers and yelling can all be effective. It's also imperative to get rid of or securely store any source of food that would keep it coming back for more, day after day, week after week, and month after month.

"In other words, if you have garbage out-

side, lock it up; if you have bird feeders up, take them down; if you feed pets outside, pick up the food and dishes when they are finished," said Orlando.

"Many people who finally call to complain about a bear tell us they like the bears coming around and don't mind picking up the garbage, or letting the bears eat the pet food. They just don't like it when the same bears walk into garages, break into screen rooms or hover around school bus stops," said Carroll-Douglas. "When the bears do these things in search of more food, the people want them gone."

It is critically important for people to understand the ramifications for themselves and the bears when bears are allowed access to human-provided food. It is hard to convince people that a seemingly benign action like letting the bears eat and tolerating bears in and around their homes creates a nuisance problem with dire consequences.

"If you suspect or see a bear, it is your responsibility to implement a plan that will foil the bear's attempt to get easy food," Orlando said. "There are many proven methods available, and we're happy to talk to you about them."

"Allowing bears to eat and hang around can mean potential injury to humans and near certain death for bears," Carroll-Douglas said. "It's hard for us to make people understand the correlation between the food source they supply and the nuisance problems they ultimately experience."

It's everyone's responsibility to do the

right thing to help ensure the future of the Florida black bear.

"We've had three or four incidents in the

past couple of years in our area where bears have bitten or scratched humans. Every single case involved human-

provided food, and in the situations where we were able to catch the bear, we had to kill it," said Orlando.

# Turn Back Time

## Madison Native Worked With President's Wing

Believe it or not, a Madison native used to help the President and Vice-President of the United States and other dignitaries by maintaining their aircraft. Jim Pulliam, who was born in the house that he now lives in, was a part of the 1254th Military Air Transportation System, assigned to the President's wing at DC National Airport (now Reagan National).

"To work on the President's wing, you needed top secret clearance," Pulliam said. "I already had secret clearance but I had to get approved by the Secret Service."

Pulliam said that the FBI came to Madison County checking on him and they went to his wife, Laura's, hometown in Kansas doing a background check.

"If I'd had any issues with the law at all, they wouldn't have approved me," he said, "not even a traffic ticket."

Pulliam went into the President's Wing under President John F. Kennedy, all the way through the Johnson administration until right after President Nixon was elected.

"I didn't wear a uniform the whole time I was assigned to it," Pulliam said. "We dressed just like the other employees there did. The only difference was that the Secret Service would come out every day and give us a lapel pin."

Working at Washington National, Pulliam handled four-star command generals; Paul Tibbals, the pilot of the Enola Gay, which dropped the first atomic bomb on Hiroshima; senators and congressmen; and heads of foreign states.

"We were just five minutes from the Pentagon," he noted.

Pulliam was assigned to the Wing just weeks before Kennedy was assassinated.

"I was on duty when President Kennedy was assassinated," Pulliam said. "Security doubled and tripled. There were guards on top of hangars and news media everywhere."

He said that Eric Sevareid, a legendary news commentator for CBS who he knew, was one of the newsmen there.

Pulliam also said that the Secret Service had a limousine parked there, loaded with weapons. The limo was known as the Queen Mary.

Another thing that Pulliam said that he and his colleagues had to do was to handle funeral processions of airplanes.

"I was there when President Eisenhower, President Hoover and General MacArthur died," he said.



"They had funeral processions of airplanes, if you can believe that."

Pulliam said that his job was to do whatever came up to do.

"We didn't have to do much maintenance," he said. "We'd have to change the fuel and handle dignitaries from time to time."

Among the dignitaries were Robert MacNamara and Dean Rusk.

Pulliam spoke of Vice-President Hubert Humphrey, who he said was a very humble and nice man.

Pulliam joined the Air Force in 1952, beginning his service during Basic Training at San Antonio, Texas. Places he was assigned during his service years included Guam, Morocco, Greenland, Labrador, Japan, the Netherlands and Wake Island.

"We traveled quite a bit," he said. His wife, Laura, said that she is a history buff and she really enjoyed living in the Arlington, Va.-Washington, D.C. area.

"We used to go with the kids to Washington and visit the historic sites," she said.

The Pulliams lived near Arlington National Cemetery and the Pentagon during the assignment to the President's Wing.

Jim Pulliam retired from the Air Force, wanting to seek some stability for his family. He, Laura, and their children, Chris, Tracy (now Bowen) and John, moved back to Madison County where Jim took up farming again. Now, he leads a quiet, peaceful house in the home he and his siblings were born in.





