Beware! Child Seat Belt Laws Are Different In Georgia

Forty-eight of 50 states have laws (other than seat belts) for children older than three years old. Florida is not one of them.

The State of Florida does require those as young as four to five years old to wear a seat belt, if they are not in a child safety restraint seat. A violation for this offense (assessed against the driver of the vehicle) is \$60, plus points charged against the driver's license. Florida children, three and under, are required to be in a safety restraint seat.

A number of child advocates are pushing for tougher laws in Florida, but some people are saying that it may make costs prohibitive for families, who are already cash strapped.

Georgia has stricter laws regarding child restraints in vehicles.

In Georgia, those children, who are under eight years old or 57" inches (four feet, nine inches) or shorter are required to be in a child safety seat. The seat must be in the rear of the vehicle (if available.)

Children older than eight or over 57" tall may wear seat belts.

Madison Resident Ordered To Bring Property Up To Code

A Madison resident has until Jan. 31, 2013 to bring his property, located on Southwest Horry Avenue, into compliance after the City of Madison Code Enforcement Board decided to cite him at their meeting held last Thursday, Nov. 29.

The Board found the resident in violation of the City of

Madison Land Development Regulations, Section 4.7.2 (Permitted Principal Uses and Structures) and the City of Madison Nuisance Ordinance, Article IV.

City Manager Tim Bennett said the resident was conducting a vehicle/equipment repair business at the residence in an area that is zoned residential, not commercial. Uses allowed

are for Single family, duplex and multiple family dwellings, public parks and recreational areas, community residential homes and public and private schools and colleges.

Bennett also said the resident was in violation of the city's nuisance ordinance, which includes a section about "any motor or other vehicle in a wrecked, junked, partially

dismantled or abandoned condition (unless in connection with a business enterprise lawfully situated and licensed)." Another section of the nuisance ordinance encompasses "any building, structure or other place or location where any activity which is in violation of local, state or federal law is conducted, performed or maintained."

School Board Approves New CTE Program For MCHS

Career Training Education Coordinator Sam Stalnaker appeared before the school board Tuesday evening to seek approval for adding another program to the CTE slate of offerings – welding.

Citing projected job growth statistics for the industry as well as possible wage earning potential for industry-certified graduates of the program Stalnaker said he believed it would be a great addition to all the other CTE programs currently in place for Madison County High School students.

The program would require about \$50,000 - \$60,000 start-up money from the school district's capital outlay fund to retrofit the high school's ag/shop facility, primarily adding extra wiring, a ventilation system, and some sheltered outdoor work space to supplement the indoor space.

In today's economy, there is a lot of competition for consumer dollars, so you can find bargains out there. According to the latest consumer news, you need to act early to get what you want to buy. Retailers have bargains, but they are not overstocked and supplies may run out quickly.

Remember the old saying, "It's the thought that counts, not the price of the gift." Plan ahead, so that you have time to enjoy the traditional activities of the holiday season. Set a dollar limit for your gift giving and work from there. People who set a dollar amount always do a better job of staying within their budget.

Here are some great ideas to trim gift-giving expenses:

Comparison shop different retail establishments. See newspaper ads and store circulars for gifts you are considering. Many retailers offer extra discounts for short periods of time; sales like "early bird" or "moonlight" specials, coupons or scratch off stickers for a reduction on your total purchase. These are all designed to get you into the store to shop. See which retailers are running specials and shop where prices are lowest.

Internet sales are fast becoming the way to purchase goods, some companies have unadvertised sales and incentive prices to get consumers to shop online. Many retailers are updating their customers on twitter, a popular way to market sales this holiday season.

Don't rush into a purchase because of an advertised claim of a low price. Know what the regular price is before buying an on-sale

item. Sometimes one store's sale price is another's regular price.

Shop different types of retailers to compare prices. Look at discount stores, catalogs, online, factory outlets, as well as department stores.

CHOKE THE LIFE OUT OF OBAMACARE

... There's still an opportunity for America to stop this disaster by choking the life out of the federal monstrosity. Obama's signature legislative achievement is likely headed back to the Supreme Court.

Just last week, the High Court ordered a lower federal court to take up a lawsuit by the patriots at Liberty University, who claim Congress violated the college's religious freedoms by forcing it to provide federally mandated insurance and requiring payment for abortion-related services.

Liberty University also argues that the individual mandate is unconstitutional because it infringes on the free exercise of religion by forcing citizens to fund abortion.

...This month, federal courts have blocked the Obama administration from imposing its contraceptive mandate on Tyndale, a Bible publisher, and O'Brien Industrial Holdings, a Missouri mining company. The Christian-owned craft chain, Hobby Lobby, is fighting a similar legal battle against the mandate. The company says fines could reach as much as \$1 million a day if it doesn't cover abortion-inducing drugs for its employees. About three dozen Christian companies and colleges are fighting the mandate in court.

The myth of 'free' health care

In June, President Obama said, "[Insurance companies] are required to provide free preventive care like checkups and mammograms ..." The law also subsidizes care for people who pay more than 8 percent of their income for health insurance.

But Obamacare isn't "free." The money must come from somewhere. Even if patients don't pay for their health care directly, Americans face higher taxes to fund the facilities, doctors and services.

...To make matters worse, Obamacare calls for establishment of an Independent Payment Advisory Board, made up of 15 unelected, unaccountable bureaucrats who make a wide range of

health care decisions – including the ability to approve or deny medical treatments recommended by your doctors.

States revolt against Obamacare

It's no wonder so many states are outright refusing to cooperate with Washington on this massive federal power grab.

...For Florida alone, "startup costs 'are projected at \$92.3 million' through next year, and annual operating costs to the state – based on experience in Illinois – could range from \$57.4 million to \$88.6 million by 2016."

States shudder at the thought of being saddled with the cost of running those exchanges, especially when they have so little local control under this federal program. They have until Dec. 14 to tell the Obama administration whether they will set up health-care exchanges or default to a federal version.

In 2010, John Graham, director of health care studies at the Pacific Research Institute, urged states to boycott the exchanges.

"States establishing Obamacare exchanges are making a one-way, lose-lose bet," he wrote. "If Obamacare persists, exchanges will become bloated administrative nightmares."

Obama's federal takeover of the nation's health insurance is unconstitutional on its face. It exceeds Congress' power to regulate commerce among the states. It expands the federal government's authority beyond the enumerated powers listed in the Constitution. It threatens religious liberty, and it imposes an unconstitutional tax on Americans.

If we can't repeal Obamacare in its entirety, let's support each of these efforts to peel away every one of its unconstitutional layers to preserve our liberty, the quality of American health care and the fiscal stability of our nation.



Two Local River Loggers Featured on History Channel's "Ax Men"

"It's the greenest of green industries," says Clint Roberts of the logs he and B.J. Bass pull out of the Withlacoochee River. "And it's premium wood."

B. J. Bass has known Roberts all his life. They grew up together and went to school together in Madison County. Bass got into the river logging business with Roberts when the latter helped him mill the wood for his log-cabin-styled house off County Road 255 near Hickory Grove.

Roberts first started working in the logging business when he was 14, and in later years, worked in a supervisory position at Goodwin Heart Pine in Mycanopy, FL, in 2005 as one of the few people who knew how to grade-saw. Three years later, he got into the river logging business when he realized that there was more money to be made from the logging end than the sawmilling end.

A year later, he had become a certified diver and gotten all the other permits and certifications he needed to have his own crew out on the river full-time, locating and pulling sunken treasure from the water.

Like true sunken treasure, the logs have been there a long time, some since the late 1800s; one of the simplest ways to determine the age of a log is to see whether it has been ax-cut or cross-cut. An ax-cut log would have been felled before the advent of the crosscut saw in 1900, and anything cross-cut was felled afterward.

When the logs were originally harvested, they were intended for Governor George Drew's saw mill on the west bank of the Withlacoochee River near what is now the Suwannee River State Park. Along the way, some of the logs sank, and would remain on the river bottom for decades until the technology and ingenuity came together to winch them out of the water and make use of them.

In fact, says Roberts, anyone standing on the old Highway 90 bridge out there and looking down into the water can see hundreds upon hundreds of old sunken logs still there, but no one is allowed to pull those out; they are in a restricted zone, too close to the state park.

The rest of the river, however, is fair game. Finding the logs may not be easy when the visibility in the dark river water is near zero much of the time, but there are "certain little tricks" to spotting them and determining whether or not they are suitable for logging. Roberts and his crew are very good at it, from finding the log, to marking it with a buoy, to attaching a line to pull it out, to moving the logs to a staging area near a boat ramp they can use, to contacting the board of county commissioners in whatever county they are working to secure permission to use that particular boat ramp on that particular day.

When they do have permission to use a boat ramp, they are always second in line. If someone comes along and wants to launch a boat while they are working, they have to stop and move everything aside until the boat is launched and underway.

Sometimes, if there are shoals between the logs and the boat ramp or the staging area, they have to wait on the weather to bring higher water levels so they can get the logs to where they need to be. There are also sand bars to contend with.

It is as arduous and time-consuming as it sounds, and Roberts and Bass both say it takes a strong dawn-til-dusk work ethic to be successful.

As for the wood they pull from the river, far from being rotted away to nothing, the heart pine and cypress "river wood" logs are still good, usable, premium lumber. For example, flooring made from river wood timber is much more valuable than the usual oak hardwood flooring. As a further example of the wood's highly desirably nature, Bass tells of instances where people have stolen logs from their staging areas while they were getting permission to use the boat ramps.

It is a tough business and also a competitive one; that competitive nature is what the two men expect the "Ax Men" show to play up most dramatically, including a log-off contest between two different logging crews, Roberts' crew and a second crew run by Jimmy Smith. The camera crews shot footage of actual work in progress as well as re-enactments for purposes of demonstration that included showing the difficulties the men sometimes have had with people pirating the logs from a staging area. Bass got to play the captain of his own boat for a couple of days of taping. He also stood in for a log-buyer in another segment, to demonstrate how business deals were transacted.

Neither Roberts nor Bass has seen the finished, edited version of the tape and don't know for sure which segments will be used, but they believe the finished episode will portray the log-off contest as being much closer than it actually was in real life. Roberts' crew pulled 44 logs to the other crew's six.

A "mystery person" who was involved in the show's Florida production

heard of Robert's river logging business and made the show producers aware of it. The producers asked for pilot video of a typical workday for the crew. There followed a year or more of emails and communications back and forth, until this past summer, when the television crew arrived and spent nine weeks of ten-hour days taping the daily operations of both Roberts' and Smith's logging crews. The production team had planned to include the operations of four or five river-logging crews, but the logistics didn't work out, so the production was pared back to just two.

Bass, who owns his own saw mill, is now working with Roberts on his river logging crew. The experience of taping for the show prompted him to get his own diving certification, a process that is not as easy as it sounds. It entails four hours of classroom instruction, and two exams with 85 questions each, which require scores of 80 percent or better to pass.

Then, there are five supervised dives, in pools, in rivers and in salt water, where the divers learn all the necessary hand signals, distress signals, and safety procedures, including how to remove their diving gear underwater and surface, in case they become entangled in an underwater obstacle.

"It happens more often than you might think," says Roberts. It's one of the hazards of the business. There is no telling what else is in the dark water besides logs; it's important to know how to save themselves and come to the surface, then go back down and retrieve their gear if possible.

The new season of "Ax Men" starts Dec. 9, but the Madison part of the show will begin airing the following Sunday, Dec. 16. That's when Roberts and Bass will see how the final, edited production came out.

What Roberts hopes people get from the show is that he takes pride in his work and in a job well done.

"I'm a professional," he said. "This is what I do, and I'm good at it."

Remembrance Of Things Past: Amy Stewart Kendrick

Not many people can honestly say that they were born and raised in Madison County. One of the few who can is Amy Stewart Kendrick. "I was born and raised in Madison. Literally! I was born at Madison Hospital, delivered by Dr. Julian Durant," Kendrick said. She has been a proud resident of Madison for her entire life and throughout her life she has made many strides to stay active in this close-knit community. Kendrick was raised on a farm in Lee, "Or in the Macedonia area, so my grandparents would say." She went to grade school first through eighth at Madison Academy. She then attended Madison County High School and graduated with the class of 1990. After graduating high school, she then furthered her education at North Florida Junior College where she received an Associates Art degree. "Leaving the small town of Madison, the only year I ever lived outside the county lines, I attended Sante Fe Community College and received a Certificate in Cosmetology. I came back to Madison and while working styling hair, put myself through school at night to receive a Bachelor of Science degree in Elementary Education through FAMU." She then began teaching and continued to put herself through school at night to receive her Masters in Educational Leadership.

Kendrick has worked all of her life. "I was cleaning houses and working in tobacco by the age of 14. When I was old enough to work legally, and back then it was 16, I started working for Mrs. Betty Williams and Mike Williams at Madison FRM and The Clothing Gallery. I worked to pay for my clothes, gas and spending." She took the year off from work while going to school for her certificate in cosmetology and then came home to Madison and started styling hair with Martha Whigham at Hair Unlimited. After receiving her BS degree she got her first teaching job at Pinetta Elementary under the guidance of Randall Buchanan. She then transferred to Madison County Central School when it opened. She stayed there and taught for 3 years. After gaining her masters, she went back to Pinetta Elementary School in the leadership position of Curriculum and Guidance working with Beth Moore.

Growing up, Kendrick lived on a farm and she and her siblings had to find things to do. "We didn't go to the movies, arcades or shopping like kids do today. I can remember having friends over and jumping hay bales, or playing hide and go seek. We played a lot with Barbie dolls and baby dolls. When it was tobacco season, my brother and I would shadow my dad, playing up and down the tobacco rows, or running in and out of the water from the irrigation. I can still remember the smell of tobacco in the mornings when it was wet from the night of irrigation. We had to be creative by devel-

oping fun things to do.

When she was younger, between 11 and 15 years old Kendrick and her friends would have dances at each other's houses." Our parents would let us invite a group of about 20 friends over to hang out and watch movies, eat snacks, listen to music and dance." As a child of 16 to 18, "I was not allowed to "hang out" unless it was at a specific place for a specific purpose! The Winn-Dixie parking lot was one of the places for that, and my parents did not allow me to hang out there. It had a bad name for things going on, like drinking and smoking." Also as an adolescent in Madison she remembers when we had the skating ring, located where the Farmers Furniture is now. "Every Friday night if I had done my chores and behaved all week, I could go. Otherwise I had to stay home, which was a fate worse than death. If you wanted to be in the "In crowd" you had to go to the skating ring."

Kendrick was also very active with the church youth group. "Madison First Baptist used to have an old house that was located where cars park in the back now. The house was set up just for the youth with pool tables, ping-pong tables and arcade games. We had "Afterglow" every Sunday night. We would eat, have a brief scripture reading, and then hang out. Good times!"

There were many places in Madison that Kendrick and her friends and family could hang out, but they did not eat out often. "As a child growing up, we didn't eat out much, but on Friday nights my dad would get pizzas from the Stone Fox. On those nights, my little brother and myself would load up with my dad to go see Mr. Jimmy. Mr. Jimmy would give us treats as we watched movies and waited for our order. We loved it!"

Some of her fondest memories happened in Madison. Kendrick spoke of some of those memories, "Growing up in the small town of Madison on a

farm in a large family, such as the Paul Ragans' family, lends itself to many fond memories. Some of my fondest memories are the holiday dinners and the times as a family we got together. We worshiped together; we celebrated birthdays, Christmas, Thanksgiving, and any other holiday that rolled around. Another memory of my youth is spending Saturday's fishing at my family's stocked fishpond. We would fish till dark, and then spend the evening cleaning, cooking, and socializing. It saddens me to see the family unit, as we knew it, end."

Over the years, Kendrick has seen many changes happen in our county. She stated, "There are two ways this county has changed, just as the country has. Used to, your word was your bond. A man could shake your hand and tell you something, and by golly, he did it. The most recent election re-

ally taught me how much we have changed in this area. My grandfather, the late Paul Ragans, taught all of us kids, that even after we are dead and gone, people will remember us for what and who we were. I want to be remembered as a kind, God Fearing, HONEST citizen. Your word does not mean a thing today. Another way I think we have changed is everyone looks for a hand-out. What happened to working for what you want out of life? If you want your children to grow up being law abiding good citizens, then work at being a good parent. If you want to go to school, do as I did and work during the day, and go to school at night. Anything is possible if you put your mind to it. But, the most important thing, is don't rely on others for what you want and stop waiting for handouts!"

In that respect, Kendrick also feels that Madison has stayed the same in many ways. She said, "Where else can you go that people wave at you when they pass by, or turn lost money in that has been found, or prepare food for you when you are sick? I LOVE Madison and these are the things that have not changed in Madison. The small town mentality can sometime annoy you, but it's that same small time mentality that we love so much. I love that as a whole, we still put Christ/Church first, and then family and friends. I love that we have organizations like, Junior Auxiliary, Rotary, Lions, etc, that still do for the poor and need y of Madison. I love that when someone new moves into town, we can still recognize them as being new to town."

Kendrick is the granddaughter of the late Paul Ragans and Annie Ben Ragans. She is the daughter of the late Jack Stewart and Toy Stewart. She is married to Nathan Kendrick and they have two children: Jackson, 8 and Sophie, 4.



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

They also discussed the three-weekend Turkey Shoot fundraiser held in November, and the Christmas project they participated in for Light Up Madison, building a sleigh for the “Winter Wonderland” decorating theme in Four Freedoms

Park.

Several civic clubs had displays in the park, working together with the Woman’s Club, which organized everything and turned the park into a magical place for the Light Up Madison Festival, and the Lion’s Club sled display on the Range Avenue side of the park was created in the spirit of cooperation as well. The sled was built and painted by Lion’s Club members and the four reindeer were loaned for the display by the Madison Trail Riders. Tuesday afternoon, Lion’s Club members added a little something extra - two large burlap bags tied up with huge red bows, donated by Ashlyn’s Rose Petal Florist for the perfect festive touch.
