## Clyde Alexander Joins the County Commission

Appointed by Gov. Rick Scott to represent District 4 (replacing Alfred Martin), new County Commissioner Clyde Alexander took his seat on the Board of County Commissioners for their first meeting of 2013. Commission Chair Wayne Vickers took a moment to formally welcome Alexander to the board, and the latter replied that he was glad to be there and glad to be able to serve Madison County once more. Pre-



viously, he was a long-time member of the Madison County School Board.

Wednesday's meeting was short, and much of it was devoted to determining utility easements for Tri-County Electric along N.E. Captain Buie and N.E. Hickory Grove Roads, where Tri-County will be putting in underground utility lines serving the future location of the First United Methodist Children's Home.

Underground cables would be cheaper to install than overhead, mainly because of a lesser need to clear trees and other overhead obstacles, but the main problem was that the county had no maintenance maps on hand showing how much right-of-way it had on either side of the roads. The roads in question had been paved many, many years earli-

er, and the maps were either misplaced or had never been drawn up originally. County Attorney Tommy Reeves advised that the commissioners could go ahead and approve the concept of an easement or license for the utility company, while he researched the matter and the area was properly measured and surveyed for a new set of maps. The commission voted unanimously to approve the concept and draw up new maps for all of N.E. Capt. Buie Rd.

The commission also voted to add four inches of limerock to stabilize S.E. Bandit St., which joins two paved roads, Dale Leslie and Brisby. Road Dept. Director Lonnie Thigpen also reminded the Commission that repairs to the Myrrh Street Bridge would have to be done this year as well, another

Now that the holiday season is over; most people make a New Year's resolution to drop a few pounds and get fit. You may have freely indulged over the last six to seven weeks only to find you've picked up a few pounds and now you want them gone. Sometimes, we are too hard on ourselves when we're trying to lose weight. We restrict the food we eat, forgo getting together with friends if food is involved, and take the joy out of eating through a limited diet.

When trying to drop a few pounds, it is better to aim for a gradual weight loss of no more than 1/2 to 2 pounds per week. Sometimes all it takes is modifying your current eating habits. For example, if you reduce your food intake each day by 500 calories and increase your physical activity, which helps burn calories, you will be able to achieve a 1 to 2 pound loss per week.

Alice Henneman, R.D., Extension Nutrition Specialist at the University of Nebraska recently shared a few strategies for easy changes that will reduce your daily caloric intake without starving. Each change will save you about 100 calories.

Modify your milk - Instead of drinking two cups of whole milk, switch to two cups of 1% lowfat milk or skim milk. The nutrients are comparable, but you are saving calories.

## Easy Ways To Cut Back on Calories

- Drink a diet soda instead of a regular soft drink and save 150 calories. A better option yet, is to drink water.

Dress, don't drown your salad - If you've been using 3 or more tablespoons of dressing, try cutting back to 1 1/2 tablespoons of dressing or less. Or experiment with some of the reduced calorie versions - even then, your salad will taste best if "dressed" not "drowned".

Watch your bread and spread - Limit the amount of bread and spread eaten before the main course to one serving when dining out. You always can eat more later if you're still hungry.

Count your cookies - A single medium sized cookie easily can have about 100 calories. Often we eat two or more before we realize it. If you feel you're not getting enough "crunch" by limiting yourself to one cookie, try eating an apple instead - the calories are similar and you are getting more nutrients.

Be size-wise with fast food - Calories from

fast foods add up quickly. If you are eating fast food, change a few of your ordering strategies. Skip the mayonnaise, order the smallest size of fries and split them with a friend. Instead of fries, consider a side salad with a fat-free or reduced calorie dressing. It's still important to check the calories on the salad dressing.

All of these strategies will help reduce your total calorie intake for the day. If you continue to use these practices you will begin to experience weight loss without feeling hungry all day long. For more information on nutrition, contact the Madison County Extension Service.

### About Gun Control Discussion

Senator Feinstein is introducing a bill to restrict sale of military assault type weapons and the devices that reload automatically. The question: what about those types of weaponry already in private ownership? That leads to realizing that it's the finger on the trigger, not the weapon that threatens us. Do we as a self-governing people have the common sense and courage to require special license testing for these purchases by individuals? Require legal commitment to keep all unattended firearms in locked storage - with heavy fines for not reporting theft? Impose severe penalty on the owner when a child's play injures or kills with a family handgun?

Our old days of having the shotgun and the 22 leaning in the corner until needed to kill a strayed moccasin or rattlesnake - or for a coon hunt - are memories for an exhibit at The Treasures of Madison County. Today's reality is a bus-riding student having a handgun in his backpack. And a sixth grader returning to the school grounds to randomly fire his rifle. And mentally disturbed shooters using a public gathering place for compulsive killing. We now are shocked by mass shootings of innocents, leaving it to the police to be concerned about urban gang killings or individuals taking out drug debtors or a nasty neighbor. Far-off, isolated incidents, not really affecting us? Or self-deception?

Contrast our attitude about the other potential killer we tolerate: every car on the road. We test and license every operator. We register cars, insure them, lock them when not in use and safeguard them from an unlicensed person having unsupervised access. We do not prevent the production of vehicles which can kill people. We make and enforce laws for their safe use and control, with clear responsibility on the owner.

We can use equal common sense about all weapon ownership. Firearms mis-use is not just the problem of a distant small town or an urban slum. The challenge is for Madison County, Florida and for the people's government everywhere in America.

# MCCS Carries Lights Around The Lake For Sandy Hook Tragedy

The sun hasn't gone down yet when Tyhesha Fogle, Elizabeth Shaw and other adult volunteers begin gathering at the playground beside the circular road that goes all the way around Lake Frances. Fogle, who came up with the idea for the service, and Shaw, both fifth grade team teachers at Madison County Central School, quickly set up work at one of the picnic tables, getting ready for the candlelight service and walk around the lake to memorialize the 26 victims of the Sandy Hook Elementary School tragedy, the children who arrive with them are playing on the swings as the adults quickly get to the task of organizing the supplies and the volunteers who are setting up for the candlelight service on this chill Friday evening before Christmas.

It is the winter solstice, and there is a definite bite in the air as the temperature drops with the gathering of evening shadows. Around the lake, the reds and browns of late fall are slowly graying into black as the sun goes down, and the reddish light begins to fade from the horizon. Over the lake, a fat half-moon hangs in the dark blue sky. Below, a reflected moon ripples on the lake's surface.

More people arrive as the adults begin inflating white balloons with helium. They tie white ribbons to each one, with green paper angels attached to the other end, each angel inscribed with the name of a child or teacher who died at the Sandy Hook Elementary School tragedy a week earlier.

In front of the playground, a row of posters with the victims' photos, each lit by a small battery-operated light, faces the lake. At the picnic tables on the playground above, the adults are assembling battery-operated candles for the children to carry safely. Many of the adults will have wax candles in small paper cups.

On either side of the playground area, police cars have quietly blocked off the street so the parents and children can gather in safety.

Everywhere one looks, there are candles. It is obvious that there has already been plenty of preparation for the candlelight vigil. All around the lake, luminaria glow in small white paper bags. Votive candles line the railings around the dock and the handrail along the playground above the assembly area. The votives flicker like fireflies, but keep burning.

It is a way to help the children understand a little about the tragedy that happened so far away at another school, say the two teachers who lead the vigil, a way of helping them connect somehow with the children who are now gone. Most of the children gathered at the lake, MCCS students, are not much older than the ones who died.

How to make sense of such coldblooded violence and grief, so close to Christmas, a season of joy and light, is a theme addressed by several who

speak to the gathering. Miss Bernice Robinson, who leads one of the opening prayers, gives thanks for the "special touch of love" the Lord has lain on the hearts of the volunteers and calls upon the Him to send joy to everyone in their time of darkness, especially during this time of Christmas when they need the joy and light of the season more than ever.

Two students, Violet Wolfer and Kennedy Fogle, read a poem for the children who died, and Kennedy's little brother Maurice leads everyone in another prayer.

Then, it is time for everyone to walk one lap around the lake in remembrance. With candles and balloons, the children, parents, teachers and other adult volunteers line up behind one of the cars and begin slowly walking in a clockwise direction. A police car brings up the rear, silently flashing red and blue lights.

Evening has now turned to night. There isn't very much wind, and in the nearly still air, the children's voices gradually fade into the distance as they walk farther and farther away, releasing the balloons into the dark sky, one by one, each balloon carrying with it a paper angel with the name of a child or teacher who died at Sandy Hook.

By the time they are a quarter of the way around, they cannot be heard at all. As they round the turn, the line spreads out along the opposite shore of the lake, a line of candles glowing so faintly that the ones who hold them cannot be seen. The dark water of the lake is still enough to reflect the tiny row of slowly-moving candles, faint and ethereal, intangible as ghosts, fainter than even the pale stars in the sky competing with the light of the half-moon. Seen from across the dock, they seem to hover in the darkness between the votive candles on the dock railing in the foreground and the sky at the edge of the black trees on the far horizon. Moving so silently in the far distance, they look incredibly fragile, as if they could wink out of existence at any moment.

Over by the playground, it is eerily quiet except for the occasional soft conversation of two police officers, waiting for everyone to return safely.

One wonders what is going through the children's minds. Do they feel the heavy weight of human mortality as their parents do when something like this happens, or do they just know that something bad has happened, somewhere far away? Do they feel the same fear as their parents? Do they ponder how such evil can exist? Or do they feel more safe and reassured than anything else, because their parents have rallied around them?

As they come around the final turn, the children's voices gradually become audible again, and they themselves gradually become visible, their bodies taking on substance once more as they emerge from the darkness into the light of a street lamp beside the playground.

If it is difficult to know what the children are thinking, the adults hardly know what to think about such a horrific event, either. As School Superintendent Doug Brown begins to speak, he acknowledges that it is difficult to find words. He wonders aloud what Christmas morning will be like for the families struck by the tragedy, something the parents gathered by the lake cannot begin to fathom, either.

"All I can say is, savor every day you have with your children," he said. "Savor every moment." No one could possibly know for sure how many days they will be granted with their children, he continues. Murmurs of heartfelt agreement move quietly through the crowd.

He asks that everyone gather in a circle and join hands for the final prayer. As he speaks the words of final benediction, a young woman about a quarter of the way around the circle to his right, hugs her children close, resting a hand on one child's shoulder as they stand there, part of the circle, savoring that one moment in time.




## Remembrance Of Things Past: Jerome Wyche

There is an old saying, "There is no place like home." Regardless of where you go and no matter how long you stay, I have found that there is truth in the statement. Having been born and raised in Madison, I have been afforded the opportunity to remember what it was like before I entered the United States Air Force in 1966 at 17 years of age. I had returned home on several occasions, for short visits and finally relocating home permanently in 2000. We all remember our days in school, which is where we spent a majority of our time as we were growing up. Those were some of my best memories, and even now, as I drive past what once was Madison County Training School, you can almost hear the voices of teachers, both past and present.

Even though my parents, the teachers and others in the communities and villages that I grew up in seemed to be strict, their efforts were not in vain. I see some of them now and will always thank them for instilling in me the values that have taken me around the world almost three times. In the earlier years, I seem to have had a sense of entrepreneurship, always trying to earn enough money to go to the theaters for the Saturday evening matinee, or help out at home. I would spend time collecting and selling bottles, raking yards or cutting firewood for someone.

I'm not sure that I could have ever imagined Highway 90 being four lanes, or Bunker and Paramore Street being paved; the area where I grew up. The thought of Madison, Florida, having a third and fourth stoplight was never envisioned. When looking back through those years and thinking how difficult things appeared, there is no comparison to things that we enjoy today. It wasn't until I was 12 years old before we had electricity and indoor plumbing. The evening chores were standing orders of business; put kerosene in the lamps, get firewood and water inside before dark. When you finished your chores and ate supper (now called dinner), and finished your homework,

you were lucky to be able to listen to the radio.

The ringing of the church bells on Sunday morning signaled the beginning of the weekly worship day, or the toning of the bell during other times signaled the passing of a community member. The 10-cent stores were known for their chocolate covered peanuts and sugar coated orange slices. I can still remember seeing some of the older men checking their pocket watches as the city siren sounded at 12 o'clock and at 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

Coca Cola was the popular soda pop and if you drank the contents from the 8-10 ounce bottle too fast, it would cause your eyes to well with water. During the summers, when school was finished, the only jobs that were available were those in the agricultural setting. I was able to earn enough money to help purchase school clothes for the next year. US Keds were once the tennis shoes of choice, but would later take a back seat to the more popular All Stars.

After graduating from high school and entering the United States Air Force, life offered me a worldwide menu of cultural exposure. There was so much to see, to do and so much to learn. There was an entirely new world at my fingertips and I have had the good fortune of seeing a large majority of it. History always was one of my favorite subjects in school, but now, in the reality world, there were real borders beyond Madison, Florida. World travels have taken me to East and West Germany, France, Greece, Holland, Italy, Turkey, Sardinia, Holland, Spain, England, Czechoslovakia, Wake Island, Philippines, Guam, Saigon, Japan and through 43 of our 50 states, including Hawaii.

After a successful career of 21 years in the United States Air Force, I would spend the next 12 years in Phoenix, Arizona. I would enjoy 12 years in the vocational education setting teaching juniors and seniors for seven years and the remaining five years as a department manager.

After returning home for good in 2000, although it didn't take long, I had to reacquaint myself with the communities that I grew up in. New businesses had sprung up; old ones had disappeared. Several full service gasoline stations, including lube and oil change, tire repairs and tune-up services were non-existent. Several food chain stores had faded out, or names had been changed and Winn-Dixie had been relocated a number of times. New schools and sub-divisions had been built, some older churches had structural facelifts, streetlights, sidewalks and infrastructure had been extended in almost all communities. Highway 90 is a comfortable four-lane traffic route, managed by four stoplights. In remembrance of things past, Madison has undergone some growth spurts, having lost some qualitative things, but gained in others.

There are several historic icons in the communities in which we live, but one will always remain constant, "The Four Freedoms Monument." The "Four Freedoms" should always be a remembrance by all, both past and present.

The edge of the gown caught fire and the flames rapidly enveloped her, burning her thigh, arms, body and face. The little girl is under treatment at the Madison County Memorial Hospital.
