Flood Warning In Effect

A flood warning is in effect for the Withlacoochee River near Pinetta (County Road 150). The warning runs from late Friday night until further notice or until the warning is cancelled. The river level is currently 68.5 feet with flood stage at 79 feet.

Woman Sentenced In Insurance Fraud Case

A Greenville woman was sentenced earlier this week for insurance fraud, after faking a slip and fall incident at a local grocery store in 2010.

Assistant State Attorney John Wilson advised that Selina Williams, 23, of Greenville, appeared in court Monday, February 25, to plea to the charge against her. She pled no contest, and was adjudicated guilty by the court.

Williams was sentenced to serve 45 days in the Jefferson County Jail; to pay \$1,200 for the cost of the investigation; to pay \$500 in court costs, and to have no contact whatsoever with the Big Save IGA of Monticello, or its owners.

Recapping the case, Detective Raimund Manzo with the Florida Department of Financial Services, Division of Insurance Fraud reported that he had conducted an investigation and he had reason to, and did believe that Williams committed insurance fraud.

Arthur William Burget is a 40-year-old white male, who stands six feet tall and weighs 160 pounds. He has brown hair and blue eyes.

Burget listed his address as 10671 North County Road 53.

Burget's qualifying offense is a June 24, 2005 Thomas, Ga. conviction for raping a minor.

for the wrecker to come pick up the car, he searched the Mitsubishi again. He opened the package with his penknife and the bomb exploded, killing Jimmy Fulford.

Fulford's lieutenant, B.J. Tinney noted that when officers were moving the car away from the blaze so that it would not catch fire, that Fulford's radio was set to WAFT, a Christian music station in Valdosta, Ga. Officers also noted that Fulford's watch had stopped at 4:34 p.m.

At Fulford's funeral, a tape was played of him singing gospel music the First Baptist Church in Monticello, where he served as deacon.

Lester Watson was convicted of second-degree murder and sentenced to 40 years in prison. Patrick Howell was sentenced to 40 years in prison without possibility of parole for 25 years. Other members of the Jamaican drug posse involved in the murder cover-up were sentenced to extensive prison terms. Paul Howell was sentenced to die for Fulford's death.

CITY TO ENFORCE SIGN REGULATIONS

The City of Madison will increase enforcement of its sign regulations beginning March 18, 2013. City staff will initially focus on signs located in the rights-of-way within the city's Historical District.

The city's Historical District stretches approximately from Livingston Street in the north to Bunker Street in the south and from Duval Street (Hwy. 53) in the east to Parramore Street in the west.

Signs erected or placed in the right-of-way of a street, road or public way are in violation of the city's Land Development Regulations.

Signs confiscated by city staff will be stored at the city's Public Works facility located on Lake Shore Drive near Lake Frances for 30 days. Signs not retrieved by their owners within the 30 days will be disposed of.

Meanwhile, city staff will recommend to the City Commission that new directional signage be installed at intersections within the Historical District, beginning on Range Street.

City staff would design, construct and install the new directional signage. Businesses, meanwhile, desiring to be listed on the new signage would notify the city of their desire and would be charged a fee to help cover the cost of materials and labor.

A proposed mock-up of the new directional signage is scheduled to be presented to the City Commission at April's commission meeting.

Start A New Habit During America Saves Week

America Saves, a nation-wide campaign to encourage people to save money, is this week, February 25 - March 2. This broad coalition of non-profit, corporate, and government agencies help individuals and families save and build wealth. The Extension Service is a collaborator and we are helping to promote the message; through information and education Americans are being encouraged to pay down debt, build an emergency fund and save for a home, education and retirement.

Sounds like a tall order, but it is consistent amounts of money over time that builds up savings. America Saves just released their 6th annual national survey assessing household savings as part of Saves week. The survey revealed 54percent of American households say they have a saving plan with specific goals. Another 43% have a spending plan that includes regular savings. Only 41% of the people surveyed report they save automatically through regular preauthorized transfer from checking to savings.

In Florida, we are promoting the idea to start small and think big. Over time, small amounts of money will grow. One of the first steps you can take is to build an emergency fund. This is money put into a savings for unexpected expenses. It keeps you from putting purchases on your credit card which costs more in the long run because of interest charges. It was estimated last year, Americans averaged spending \$2,000 to cover unexpected bills. Medical bills and car repairs were identified as the top two unexpected expenses to drain family wallets. If a person had \$500 to \$1,000 in an emergency fund, there would be money to meet unexpected challenges without adding to a credit card.

It's recommended you keep emergency savings in a bank or credit union savings account. Keeping emergency money separate from your checking account will reduce the temptation to use it for every day purchases. A regular savings account offers easy access to your money for any unexpected expense you might encounter. Some banks have a minimum deposit to open an account and a minimum balance to avoid fees, so you may need to put money in a jar for a few months until you have enough to open an account.

If you want to build an emergency fund, but just don't have the money, take a hard look at your spending habits. That soda you buy every day or the stops for a quick meal because you are too tired to cook may be draining your wallet. You spend much more than you think, so try eliminating one habit and save the money. Another easy way to accumulate money is to empty your loose change each night; you'll be surprised how much money you'll have at the end of the month.

Start your savings habit today by signing a pledge on the America Saves website. Go to www.americasaves.org and sign a pledge to become a saver. You'll receive tips, news and advice for reducing debt and increasing your net worth. For more information on managing money, contact the Madison County Extension Service.

They knew the name, though, and they told me.

The thing that made this house so special to me, although it was not in the best shape in the world even then, was that it was a home. God gives us families. He gives us homes. In these homes and in these families, God gives us the seeds of hope to plant a garden that will blossom and grow.

There is another house with hope, home and families; it is called a church house. We can go there and learn about Jesus Christ and be a part of His family.

He reported that the Department of Financial Services, Division of Insurance Fraud, received a fraud referral from Mark Overland, Special Investigative Unit, Federated Insurance Company, the insurance carrier representing Big Save IGA of Monticello. He alleged a possible fraudulent slip and fall incident involving Williams in Jefferson County.

On January 14, 2011 Detective Manzo received a notarized affidavit from Overland advising of a slip and fall accident involving Williams, that occurred on February 9, 2010 at the Big Save IGA.

He advised that the Federated Insurance Company received a claim from Ashwin Patel of Sanatan, Inc., Big Save IGA, of a customer by the name of Selina Williams, who claimed to have fallen and suffered an injury in the store.

A copy of the surveillance video taken on the date of the incident was provided to Federated Insurance Company, by Patel. Overland reviewed the video surveillance and observed Williams, along with three other individuals, who approached the area of the alleged slip and fall accident.

Overland observed Williams sit on the floor, stand up, reposition the shopping cart and sit back down. Williams remained on the floor until paramedics lifted her to a gurney.

On October 8, 2010 Overland completed a recorded interview of Williams. She stated that she was pushing the shopping cart and when she let go to grab an item she stepped in water and slipped and fell in the water.

As a result of the fall she reported that she injured her right leg and that she was in so much pain that she could not stand up. She also advised that she could not even straighten her leg that was bent to the knee as a result of the fall. Williams denied standing up at any time after the fall and repositioning the shopping cart and sitting back down.

On January 14, 2011 Detective Manzo received a notarized affidavit from Heather Kaufman, claim representative assigned to Williams' claim. She advised that she spoke with Williams on February 10, 2010 and Williams stated that while pushing a shopping cart, she went to look at an item. She said she took her hands off the cart and slipped in a puddle of water. She complained of injuries to her right leg, right knee and low back. She said she was not able to get up and had to be taken out of the grocery store by an ambulance.

Probable cause in the case was found to be sufficient and County Judge Robert Plaines signed the warrant for her arrest.

Williams was arrested July 26, 2012 and charged with insurance fraud.

Dr. Coffman is currently President of Environment Perspectives, Inc. (EPI), and Executive Director of Sovereignty International. EPI focuses on providing professional guidance and training in defining environmental problems and

solutions based on Judea-Christian principles of stewardship as contrasted with pantheistically-based environmentalism. Pine Tree Quilters Meeting Needs With Baby Bundles

Sarah Freytag puts together five "Baby Bundles" a month at the Pine Tree Craft and Quilters meetings at the UCMC Center, and drops them off at the Health Department for distribution to new mothers who need them.
The "Baby Bundles" project is yet another outreach ministry of the Pine Tree Quilters, and Freytag has lost count of how many bundles she has put together in the 12 years

she's been active with the group. It started off with her assisting the woman who used to do them, "And now I'm doing it," she said.
Each Baby Bundle consists of two receiving blankets, either crocheted, or sewn from soft flannel; two onesies; a sleeper; two pairs of little socks, two safety pins and ten little diapers. All the items are arranged on a beautiful baby quilt sewn by the group, bundled up, taped securely and labeled for either a "boy" or "girl."

The baby clothes are donated, and everything else is either donated, or the group raises money for them by selling a few quilts, as was the case with the socks and diapers.
Nearby, Irene Rowell, Ila Willis and Lanora Zipperer were working on another full size quilt that will soon go to someone, somewhere, in need of a warm, comforting quilt. Rowell estimates that they produce a quilt about every five or six weeks, depending on the size and complexity.
The Pine Tree Quilters have donated quilts to nursing homes, senior facilities and families in need wherever they may be, and they continue meeting needs

J.W. Gibson and George D. Smith closed the deal Tuesday for an 18-acre tract of land east of Madison on US 90 behind the Country Kitchen. They announced plans for construction of one of the

most modern cotton gins in the country. Construction will start in approximately six weeks and the gin will be ready to handle the 1953 cotton crop.

Mayor Van H. Priest turned the first shovel of dirt last Saturday in a ceremony marking the official beginning of construction on Lakeside Terrace subdivision.

March 1, 1963
