Mobile Home Totaled In Fire

Madison Fire & Rescue responded to a fire at 269 NE Drive-In on Tuesday afternoon, March 26.

According to a report from MFR, the residence of Lakisha Brinson and her family was destroyed in the fire.

Brinson's daughter and a baby were home at the time of the fire. Brinson was not present.

According to Acting MFR Chief Bruce Jordan, the fire was caused by a combination space heater and fan.

No one was injured in the blaze.

New Deal Preservation Society Researching Cherry Lake Farms

Cherry Lake Farm (also known as Cherry Rural Rehabilitation Project) was a New Deal rural relief program initiated by the FERA and the Resettlement Administration (RA) and implemented by the WPA. The project involved moving 500 needy families from Tampa, Miami, and Jacksonville onto a 15,000-acre communal tract. The workers formed the cooperatively-owned Cherry Lake Farms (headquartered in the 1839 former plantation home, the Hinton House) and constructed a school, an auditorium, a co-op store, barracks, a lumber yard, and a mill. Families lived in 170 cottages with phones, electricity and running water, all furnished by jointly-owned utilities.

Monument Request Withdrawn At Present Time

To be revisited later

Five days after a Ten Commandments monument was approved to be placed on the courthouse lawn, the group making the request asked that the issue be removed from a meeting scheduled for Monday evening, March 25, and revisited at a later date.

Apparently, Tom Reeves, attorney for the Board of County Commissioners, had contacted the Liberty Counsel and asked if they would represent the county in case a lawsuit was filed. He was informed that, because of the way the matter had been handled without a plan where exactly the monument would be placed and how to deal with future requests, that Liberty would not represent the county.

The letter requesting the matter be withdrawn from consideration at the March 25 meeting was presented to the board by former County Judge Wetzel Blair, who had presented an appeal to the board to approve the measure at their Wednesday, March 20, meeting.

The tournament will be held at the Cherry Lake 4-H Camp and Madison County Boat Ramp and Picnic Area.


There will be an entry fee of \$50 per boat (two fisherman) or \$25 per fisherman.

H4: Head, Heart, Hands, & Health

Spring marks a slew of family holidays, activities, and school breaks, which offers a great opportunity for extra family time. One particular set of holidays that revolves around togetherness and family appreciation are the Easter holidays. Even if your family does not celebrate this holiday, it is a great opportunity, with most of the schools being on Spring Break, to add in some extra family time and activities. Here are a few examples of some fun inexpensive activities:

Alternative Egg Dying

1. Spread a thick layer of cheap white shaving cream on a cookie sheet or pan. Placing wax paper or tin foil over the pan makes for easy clean up. It also helps you keep from dying the pan!
2. Choose your favorite food coloring (I like the neon colors!). Dribble food coloring across the surface of the shaving cream.
3. Use a toothpick to swirl the colors around in the shaving cream. Be careful not to mix the colors too much or you will lose the tie-dye effect.
4. Roll your cooled hardboiled eggs

(make sure you have properly boiled the eggs) on at the time in the shaving cream mixture. (Tip: Use gloves or sandwich baggies to protect your hands.)

5. Place colored eggs to the side and allow them to dry for a minimum of 5 minutes. Next wipe off the shaving cream and rinse the egg with water. Viola! A perfectly tie-dyed egg!

Backyard Obstacle Course

A great way to encourage family bonding is friendly competitions. Using things like beanbags, buckets, hula hoops, 1x4s for a ground level balance beam, and jump ropes, the whole family can create and compete in your very own outdoor obstacle course. Switch things around and allow each family member or team to create their own course for the others to try their hand at. Set a prize goal for the person or team who has the fastest time or creates the best course (i.e.: picks that night's meal, the next family activity, etc.). This is a great way for the whole family to have a great time together and get in some extra exercise!

"Heads-Up" Bible-Reading Plans for National Day of Prayer Presented at Rotary

For the last four years that Kay Harris has been with the Ministerial Association, she has been heading up projects like prayer walks and the National Day of Prayer for Madison.

"We need mamas and papas and grandmas and granddaddies praying for our children," she told the Rotary Club. "I want to see the United States of America as a safe place where we can raise our children."

She spoke of belonging to the generation that never latched their screen doors at night, acknowledging that those days were mostly gone. "But I still see some of that in Madison," she said, and it was good to see that lingering bit of a more trusting time, something that she has come to love about the community.

"It's gracious," she said. "The word is gracious."

When she moved here from Tallahassee 31 years ago with her husband Ben, she left behind a life that she was so attached to, "It took the Lord three years to get me out of there." It was her home then, the place where her family and friends were, a place where she had already lived one lifetime.

It was the words of Isaiah 55:8-11 that enabled her to finally make the break and come to call Madison her home.

"For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts higher than your thoughts. For as the rain cometh down and the snow from heaven, and returneth not thither, but watereth the earth, and maketh it bring forth and bud, that it may give seed to the sower and bread to the eater: So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: it shall not return to me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it."

It seemed that the Lord might have a purpose for her being in Madison, after all; the first part of verse 12, immediately following, reads: *"For ye shall go out with joy, and be led forth with peace."*

In Madison, "We are in the most beautiful county," she said. "I'm glad I'm not in Tallahassee. I still love Tallahassee, but this (Madison) is my home."

Echoing the thoughts of Jeremiah 29:7, a directive to request the peace and welfare of the city to which she had been brought, she added, "I want to see this community blossom and grow. I want businesses to prosper here."

In preparation for Madison's tradition of reading the entire Bible aloud from the gazebo of Four Freedoms Park, an event sponsored by the Ministerial Association, she is in charge of the sign up lists for people who are willing to read aloud 15-minute segments, one person after another, 24/7, from Genesis to Revelation. Harris asked Rotary members to sign up for 15-minute segments, and added that she would also be seeking people to sign up during the Holy Week services.

The marathon Bible reading begins Thursday, March 28 at 6 p.m. and runs until Thursday, May 2, at 5 p.m., ending just before the National Day of Prayer event begins.

In the weeks leading up to the National Day of Prayer, there will also be several prayer walks each Monday, beginnings at different locations around Madison, the first of which begins at 5 p.m., April 1. Everyone interested in participating in that walk is invited to join the group at the Old Jail.

Other walks include April 8 at the Madison County Courthouse; April 15 in front of the Madison County High School; April 22 at the WMAF Radio Station, on SW Captain Buie Road; and April 29 at the site of the new hospital.

As of January 2013, newly re-elected Alabama Supreme Court Judge Roy Moore says he will not renew the fight over the monument but states: "The true issue is whether we can acknowledge the sovereignty of almighty God over the affairs of our state and our law. That I will not back down from. I will always acknowledge the sovereignty of God and I think we must." According to Christian News Network, he has also stated: "We've got to remember that most of what we do in court comes from some Scripture or is backed by Scripture" and "Without God, there can be no ethics."

cancer and that everyone who participates is making a difference.



Central School Elementary Students Learn Vegetable Gardening

On a sunny Tuesday afternoon, a three-member team from the Florida Department of Agriculture gathered behind the west side of Madison County Central School to begin construction on raised planting beds, with donated lumber and potting soil from Studstill's and donated labor, soil and other material from Ben Brandies and Dallas Collingsworth.

The team, consisting of garden specialist Rebecca Siplak, nutrition education specialist Monica Figuereroa and physical education specialist James Taylor, is part of a three-county effort that includes schools in Hamilton and Gadsden as well as Madison. Partly funded by a Team Nutrition Grant through the Florida Department of Agriculture and partly by community partners such as Studstill's, Ben Brandies and Dallas Collingsworth, the project will have students growing their own fresh vegetables and fruits. With a hands-on project that includes reducing obesity through the physical activity of gardening, the project will help students realize where food comes from and give them opportunities to try new and different foods as they learn about the benefits of nutritious foods; specifically, which ones can make them "smarter, stronger and faster" according to Taylor.

By about the second week of April, the team hopes the beds will be filled with growing fruit and vegetable plants so the students can start appreciating the results of their work. A few weeks later, they'll be able to bring their harvest into the cafeteria and learn how tasty good nutrition can be, hopefully developing the first of a lifetime of good health and good eating habits.

Warriors Lose To Taylor County

The Aucilla Christian Academy varsity Warriors manned the diamond against Taylor County on March 18, and the Warriors lost 10-8 in the neck-and-neck contest.

Both teams scored two runs in the first and second innings. The Warriors commanded the fourth inning, 4-1, to increase the score to 8-5 in Aucilla favor. Taylor County came back and took the fifth inning, 3-0, to tie the score at 8-8. Then Taylor County took the seventh inning, 2-0 for the win.

At the plate, as a team, the Warriors carried a .345 batting average, with 35 plate appearances, 29 at-bats, eight runs, 10 hits, four RBI's, one double, one sacrifice fly, five walks, six strikeouts, one reach on error, two fielder's choice, an on base percentage of .429, a slugging average of .379, and four stolen bases.

Individually, Josh Wood had a batting average of .500, with three plate appearances, two at-bats, two runs, one hit, one walk, an on base percentage of .667, and a slugging average of .500.

Hans Sorensen has a batting average of .250, with four plate appearances, four at-bats, one hit, two strikeouts, and an on base percentage and slugging average of .250.

Russell Fraleigh had a batting average of .750, with four plate appearances, four at-bats, three runs, three hits, one RBI, one double, one strikeout, an on base percentage of .750, and a slugging average of 1.000.

Casey Demott had a batting average of .000, with four plate appearances, three at-bats, one walk, one strikeout, one fielder's choice, an on base percentage of .250, and a slugging average of .000.

Hunter Horne had a batting average of .500, with four plate appearances, four at-bats, two hits, one strikeout, and an on base percentage and a slugging average of .500.

Tres Copeland had a batting average of .333, with four plate appearances, three at-bats, one run, one hit, one walk, one fielder's choice, an on base percentage of .500, a slugging average of .333, and one stolen base.

Austin Bishop had a batting average of .000, with four plate appearances, three at-bats, one run, one walk, one strikeout, an on base percentage of .250, and a slugging average of .000.

Jared Jackson had a batting average of .333, with four plate appearances, three at-bats, two runs, one hit, one walk, one reach on error, an on base percentage of .500, a slugging average of .333, and three stolen bases.

Gus Smyrniotis had a batting average of .333, with four plate appearances, three at-bats, one hit, one run, one sacrifice fly, an on base percentage of .250, and a slugging average of .333.

In the field, Hunter Horne caught one attempting to steal base.

On the mound, The Warriors' pitchers had an earned run average of 3.000, with seven innings pitched, eight hits, 10 runs, three of which were earned, five walks, three strikeouts, 36 batters faced, 29 at-bats, a batting average of .276, an on base percentage of .417, one wild pitch, two hit by pitches, and four stolen bases, on 131 pitches.

Demott was credited with the loss. He had an earned run average of 0.00, with three innings pitched, two hits, two runs, two strikeouts, 13 batters faced, 12 at-bats, a batting average of .167, an on base percentage of .231, one wild pitch, and one hit by pitch, on 37 pitches.

Bishop had an earned run average of 5.25, with four innings pitched, six hits, eight runs, three of which were earned, five walks, one strikeout, 23 batters faced, 17 at-bats, a batting average of .353, an on base percentage of .522, one hit by pitch, and four stolen bases, on 94 pitches.

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Fighting Alien Invaders in Florida Yards

They may not be the deadly, extraterrestrial pod-people plants from “Invasion of the Body Snatchers” but the invasive plant species in many Florida yards are nevertheless harmful to Florida’s delicately balanced ecosystem – some more so than others.

Invasive species are usually aggressive and fast-growing in the state’s mild climate. Taken out of their native habitats and transplanted into ecosystems where they don’t belong, where the checks and balances of their native environments don’t exist, they tend to take over and crowd out Florida-native plant species. When the native vegetation is damaged or gone, the insects, bird, and other wildlife populations that depended on it are affected as well. If the insects leave, the birds leave. With the cycle disrupted, other insects may then take over, with no birds to control them. People start using pesticides to get rid of the bugs and end up adding pollution to the environment, and on it goes.

Like the alien pod-people plants, invasive plants work at transforming – not people, but environments.

Lana Arnold, president of the Tallahassee Garden Club, addressed the Madison Garden Club about the effects of invasive plant species and creating a more Florida-Friendly yard or garden, now that spring is here. Arnold has studied the matter of invasive plants along with the Nine Principles of a Florida-Friendly Landscape for the last eight years, and visited the Madison Club to talk about some of the common invasive plants people find in their yards and how to best get rid of them.

Club members had brought in clippings of plants and shrubs from their yards for the horticultural exhibit part of their annual flower show, and Arnold had identified each by its proper scientific name. If it was a native, it was judged

and awarded a ribbon if it placed; if it was an invasive species, it was simply marked as such and not judged. The types of clippings on display gave a rough idea of what kind of plants, native and non-native, could be found in typical yards throughout Madison.

Invasive plants share four characteristics: 1) they are non-native, foreign to the area; 2) they naturalize rapidly to the new environment; 3) they spread rapidly, or are not easy to contain; and 4) they choke out native vegetation.

The invasive plants are further divided into two categories: “Prohibited” and “Not Recommended.”

Of the now-prohibited varieties, the one plant everyone is most familiar with is kudzu, also known as “the vine that ate the South.” A native to southern Japan, it was first brought to the U.S. in 1876, and later touted for erosion control. It was cultivated for this purpose all over the southeastern U.S. in the 1930s and 1940s. The problem was that it grew too well, too fast (as much as a foot a day), until it had swallowed seven million acres of land. It is nearly impossible to kill and difficult to get rid of. Standard herbicides barely affect it. The mass of vines climb like a green blob, smothering shrubs, trees and entire forests, killing them by blocking out the sun.

Cogon grass is another lesser-known but no less frustrating import that was introduced in the early part of the 20th century. It now infests extensive areas of road sides, parks and open pasture in Florida, Alabama and Mississippi, and several other southern states as well. The grass has a two-to-six-inch flowering seed head, with white fluffy seeds like dandelions, and the blades of grass have off-center ribs. The grass can reach heights of six feet, although three or four feet is more the average. It first appears in circular infestations that appear as light green circles in the summer and light brown circles in the winter, and infestations be readily identified in aerial photographs.

Chinese tallow trees, also known as “popcorn trees,” are another prohibited planting. They grow fast and out-compete native trees, virtually blocking out any sunlight that might reach understory plants. In a stand of mature Chinese tallow, there is no understory. Aside from blocking out sunlight, their fallen leaves contain toxins that can alter the nature of the soil, transforming a diverse forest ecosystem into a single-species monoculture in a space of about 20 years.

Other examples of prohibited plants in Florida include the skunk vine and the air potato vine.

The second category, “Not Recommended” plants, means that while the plants are not prohibited, their use as landscaping is strongly discouraged, as they show invasive qualities as well.

Some, like heather bamboo, or “nandina” as it is sometimes called, are con-

sidered invasive because of the huge amounts of berries they produce; birds eat these berries and spread the seeds from a yard or other landscaped area to a wild nature area. Once heather bamboo becomes established, it is difficult to root out and get rid of, as anyone who has ever hacked away at the tough, matted, intertwining root system of a mature stand can attest. Additionally, all parts of the plant are toxic if ingested.

As landscaping, the pattern and color of heavenly bamboo leaves in different seasons make them attractive; but a better alternative is an infertile cultivar that looks similar and does not produce any berries.

Chinese wisteria, with its showy cascades of lavender blooms, is another commonly seen plant that is not recommended because of its invasive root system, its tendency to take over an area if not kept in check, and its growth pattern of winding around any vertical support. A wisteria vine climbing on a tree will eventually strangle the tree.

A better alternative is “Florida wisteria,” or the purple petrea vine that produces similar-looking lavender flowers, but without the drawbacks of Chinese wisteria.

Other plants on the “Not Recommended” list include wild taro, mimosa trees, Mexican petunias, climbing allamanda, pampas grass, castor bean trees, chinaberry trees, Japanese climbing fern, coral ardesia and the arrowhead vine.

For those who are serious about Florida-friendly landscaping, there are several step they can take, aside from keeping their own property free of invasive plants. They can educate their neighbors, talk to other gardening groups and talk to public officials about invasive plant species in public areas.

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
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
