

Macy Fletcher Takes Home Gold In Frog Hop

Those competing in the championship are required to bring their own frog and place it on the mat. Each frog is given one chance to hop; the frog that hops the farthest will be named the winner in that category. Then each categories winner will have a final hop off to determine the Grand Champion. There are three categories: Children, Junior, and Senior Divisions.

The top three winners of each division were:

Junior Division: First Place was Morgan Sevor, with frog "Hopper," hopping a total distance of 3.50'. Second Place was James Dice, with frog "SpiderMan," hopping 3.45'. Third Place was Tanner Platt, with frog "Rusty," hopping 3.35'.

Senior Division: First Place was Caden Newman, with frog "Slimey," hopping a total distance of 2.52'. Second Place was Tyler Platt, with frog "Sparky," hopping 2.42'. Third Place was Catherine Maultsby, with frog "Bob," hopping 2.12'.

In the final round of competition Macy Fletcher, Morgan Sevor and Caden Newman had a hop off to determine Grand Champion. Macy Fletcher and her frog "Hello Kitty" took home top honors with a astounding jump measuring 2.05'.







Nicole Roddenberry Receives Governor's Shine Award

Jefferson County School District Teacher of the Year Nicole Roddenberry, a first-grade teacher at Jefferson Elementary School (JES), was one of six North Florida teachers honored by Gov. Rick Scott in a special ceremony at the capital on Tuesday, April 23.

Roddenberry, along with the other five teachers, was a recipient of the Governor's Shine Award, given by Scott in appreciation of teachers' commitment to improving Florida's education system. The six honored teachers — all 2013-14 District Teachers of the Year winners — represented the counties of Escambia, Okaloosa, Santa Rosa, Walton, Taylor and Jefferson.

"Florida teachers are the hardest working teachers in the world, and our students' results demonstrate their success," Gov. Scott said during his Cabinet meeting in Tallahassee. "Thanks to Florida's great teachers, Florida students are competing and succeeding, both nationally and internationally, and that's why it's so important we reward classroom teachers with a \$2,500 pay raise."

The governor went on to praise the six Shine Award teachers for their daily contributions to students' achievements and later successes in life.

"Every day you help Florida's students realize their potential, fulfill their dreams and embark on challenging journeys toward college and successful careers," Gov. Scott said. "Florida's strong, effective teachers give students an advantage in today's competitive environment. I am proud to present the Governor's Shine Award to teachers who go above and beyond to make a difference in education."

Roddenberry, whose father passed away on the previous Monday, was not at school on Wednesday and so could not be reached for comment. It was school officials' understanding that she also may have missed the Governor's ceremony for the same reason.

A Madison County native who graduated from high school there, Roddenberry is known for expound-

USTA Asks School Board About MCHS Tennis Courts

George English, whose grandfather was a Madison County school superintendent during the 1930's, felt right at home speaking to the school Board members on behalf of the US Tennis Association. English and City Commissioner Ina Thompson had a proposal regarding the high school tennis courts; they are in dire need of repair and resurfacing, almost to the point of becoming a liability, and the USTA has a grant program that would pay up to 20 percent of the cost.

In order to qualify, the school would have to allow members of the community to use the courts after school hours and on weekends. Student body president Christian Griffin said he believed there were currently about five boys and nine girls on the MCHS tennis team.

Madison Trucker Busted

A Madison trucker was busted by deputies in a Jefferson County truck stop recently, and now cools his heels in the Jefferson County Jail.

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office (JCSO) reported that on April 10 Investigator Logan Wilcox and Investigator Daniel Williams were patrolling the Capitol City Travel Center in Lloyd, due to suspicious vehicle complaints.

While in the parking lot, the deputies watched a silver colored car follow a red Peterbuilt semi from the fuel pumps to the overnight parking area for tractor-trailers. Two white males stepped out of the car, looked around for a few seconds, and then climbed into the semi cab.

The deputies watched the semi for about five minute, and then drove up to it. Investigator Williams knocked on the door, and the driver, identified as Beau J. Bierce, 29, of Madison, opened the door. The deputy explained to him that they had some suspicious activity in the area recently.

The deputy noted that the two white males were sitting on the bed in the sleeper of the cab, and stuck their heads up into the front of the cab. Investigator Williams asked them if they minded showing him some identification, and all three of the men handed him their driver's licenses.

Investigator Williams asked the two men to step out of the cab, due to limited sight, and officer safety, while investigator Wilcox ran their licenses. They stepped out of the vehicle and Investigator Williams asked Bierce if he had anything illegal in the cab, Bierce said, "No," and the deputy asked him is he could search the cab for anything illegal. Bierce said that Investigator Williams could search the cab, so the deputy asked him to step out of the cab.

While searching the cab Investigator Williams found and unused syringe on the floor between the driver's seat, and the passenger seat. He then found a syringe full of a liquid, on the

H4: Head, Heart, Hands, & Health \$10 or Less "How To" Series:

Over the last several years we have all found a way to tighten our belts a little further and buckle down our budgets in order to provide for our families in straining economic times. For some of us this seems to get more difficult as time passes. During a recent meeting with our 4-H County Council members a discussion came up about learning to be self-reliant and self-sufficient. These are vital life skills our youth need to learn in order to become successful contributing citizens. Seeing how engaged the youth were in this conversation I wanted to challenge their thought process. I pointed out that although all of their ideas were great and beneficial to them as individuals, how can those ideas be used to benefit others? As these teenagers were pointing out different things they could do to become more self-sufficient while also benefiting their friends, families, and communities, the idea came to me...why not share some of these ideas with the entire Madison community. For the next few months we will explore ways to help you and your families become more self-sufficient with \$10 or less projects.

Part One—The \$10 Container Garden

A garden, however big or small, is a great way to save money, increase health and wellness, and is a natural classroom. Most people think that starting and maintaining a garden is extremely expensive. If you can manage \$10 for startup and \$10 a month for maintenance, you can have your very own easy to maintain garden. Here's how:

Supplies—Contact your local lumber supplier and ask if they have a scrap bin customers can purchase from. Sometimes these scraps are free or very little cost. Remember to look for longer boards and cut to size, this will save you tons of money.

4 — 3ft 1x6 natural wood planks (cedar works best as it is a natural repellent to rot and harmful insects)

4 — 18" 1x6 natural wood planks

8 — 12" 1x2 boards

1" screws

2" screws

Wood glue and assembly tools (drill, saw, measuring tape, square, etc.)

Step 1— Find a permanent spot with sufficient sunlight to place your container garden; assemble container on site.

Step 2— Assemble sides: Lay two 3ft 1x6 planks on the ground with the long ends touching; this creates a 12" tall side panel. Secure one 12" 1x2 board to each short side of the 3ft board combination using your 1" screws. Repeat these steps to create your second long side.

Step 3—Assemble ends: Lay two 18" 1x6 planks on the ground with the long ends touching; this creates a 12" tall end panel. Secure one 12" 1x2 board to each short side of the 3ft board combination using your wood glue and 1" screws; leaving a 1" overhang. Repeat these steps to create your second short end.

Step 4—Attach sides to ends to create your rectangle container: Connect one side piece with one end piece to create a 90degree angle; this will be your first corner. Secure using your wood glue and 2" screws. Repeat these steps with the last side piece and last end piece. This will give you two "L" shaped structures. Now connect the two "L" shapes to create a solid rectangle using your wood glue 2" screws.

Viola! You have finished building your first container garden. Next month learn how to prepare and plant your garden with beautiful plants and nutritious vegetables all year round!

Oklahoma: Check Here to Fight Federal Laws

So you want to do something about this lost decade. Washington City has already proved it can't bring paradise, again, and Oklahoma may have found the key to undoing what's been shoved down our throats.

Yes, State Rep. Joe Dorman, a Democrat, told the House that he had grown tired of seeing Oklahoma spending millions of dollars defending its proposed laws in the courts, and suggested a tax form "check-off" as a way to draw voters' attention to the costs of legal action.

The idea caught fire! The legislators had seen enough of this "capital punishment." You know, that's when the federal government takes your capital and uses it against you.

The idea would create a fund, from which the Oklahoma attorney general, Scott Pruitt, could draw upon, in his defense against constitutional challenges and fighting federal statutes.

Under the proposal, residents of Oklahoma might soon be able to direct a portion of their state income tax refunds to defend its laws against federal constitutional challenges.

The measure sailed through the House last month on an 80-15 vote. The Atlanta Constitution of April 14, 2013 reports that the Senate sponsor intends to bring the bill to the Senate for a vote, before the session ends.

"It's getting more momentum than I expected," said Dorman. "I honestly did not expect the bill to even get a hearing, and here it is flying through.

"But people do realize that we're spending a lot of taxpayers' dollars, millions of dollars in tax-

payer money, fighting these lawsuits," he added.

It's an idea whose time has come! Presently, Oklahoma is in court defending its laws against federal usurpation, including areas like restrictions on immigration, abortion and the use of international law in state courts.

The state treasury would receive the check off money, as a special fund, that the attorney general's office could access "for the purpose of defending the statutes of this state from constitutional challenges or challenging federal statutes."

States launching legal challenges against the federal government is not new, but the effort has particularly gained steam as the States continue to be pounded by an out of control administration in Washington. It's a lost decade by the States, as they try to ward off oppressive "one size fits all" counter-productive rules and regulations forced upon them.

Elected after a 2010 campaign built around a pledge to fight the federal government's intrusion into states' rights, Pruitt created a federalism unit within his office that is currently challenging the tax penalty provisions of the federal healthcare law, Environmental Protection Agency regulations on regional haze and the Dodd-Frank financial reform law.

His office also has either filed or joined challenges on EPA's rules on air pollution and greenhouse gases, and on the contraception mandate in the federal healthcare bill.

Such a law, with such a ready fund, expanded to include Florida and other states, could make Washington City return to reason.

ing the teaching philosophy that if a child is incapable of learning the way a particular subject is taught, possibly the teaching method needs to be changed to accommodate the way the child learns.

"My teaching style is one that is engaging, interactive and challenging," Roddenberry is fond of saying. "I implement differentiated instruction so that each student is challenged at his or her own level."

On March 11, the Jefferson County School Board honored Roddenberry as the District Teacher of the Year. Roddenberry has been teaching first-grade at JES for 10 years.

Others of the teachers recognized by the Governor on Tuesday were Susan Rigby of Pine Forest High School in Escambia County; Heather Erickson-Vaughn of Elliott Point Elementary School in Okaloosa County; Elizabeth "Ann" Thompson of West Navarre Intermediate School in Santa Rosa County; Melissa DiCesare of South Walton High School in Walton County; and Meridith Upshaw of Taylor County Elementary School in Taylor County.

Each year, the state's 67 school districts select a Teacher of the Year, who then gets to compete for statewide recognition as Florida Teacher of the Year. The teacher selected Florida's top educator is chosen on the basis of his or her superior ability to teach and communicate knowledge of the particular subject matter taught, professional development, teaching philosophy, and outstanding school and community service. The most important qualification, however, is the teacher's ability to inspire a love of learning in students of all backgrounds and abilities.

There were a couple of other possible sources of funding that could help pay the cost of repairs, which would be somewhere in the \$10K - \$20K range, according to estimates Thompson had secured, but the district would still have to expect to pay about half the cost.

The MCHS courts are at this time the only tennis courts in Madison County, and if they were resurfaced, they would also need to have the less noticeable "blended" lines that would mark out smaller courts for children's tennis. Pinetta Elementary and Lee Elementary Schools already have the basic equipment, and would like to be able to use the high school courts at times.

School board member VeEtta Hagan spoke up on behalf of Greenville Elementary and the Central School, saying that these two schools should be fairly represented and included when it came to acquiring children's tennis equipment. At that time, she said that she didn't think either school even had information about the USTA children's tennis program.

The school board agreed to consider the proposal when they had had more time to look it over.

bed in the sleeper of the cab.

The deputy stepped out of the vehicle and asked Bierce what was in the syringe, and he said he didn't know. He then walked over to the other two men, and asked Brian Todd Waddle, 25, of Niceville, if he knew what was in the syringe, and he said he thought Bierce had Oxycodon in it. The deputy then noticed what looked like dried blood on Waddle's left forearm. He asked Waddle to show him his arm, and Investigator Williams saw a distinct puncture wound on the inside of his left elbow. The deputy then placed Bierce and Waddle in handcuffs.

Deputy Williams searched the inside of the cab some more, and then walked back out to Waddle. Post Miranda, Waddle agreed to talk to the deputy. He asked Waddle where the pills were that they were using to "shoot up" with. Waddle eventually told Investigator Wilcox and Investigator Williams to look under the passenger side of the mattress in the sleeper of the cab.

Investigator Wilcox recovered a gold colored jewelry box with 12 Oxycodon pills, and one piece of a pill in it.

Waddle said he had known Bierce for a long time, and was buying some Oxycodon pills for \$25 a piece. The deputy noted that waddle had \$25 cash in his pocket.

Post Miranda, Bierce agreed to talk with Investigator Williams. At first, he acted like he knew nothing about the pills, but he later admitted to abusing Oxycodon.

Bierce and Waddle were arrested and transported to the Jefferson County Jail, where they were booked and charged. The third male was not arrested because Waddle said he had nothing to do with the transaction.

\$371 was taken from Bierce's person, and the pills, and syringes were collected as evidence.

Waddle was charged with possession of Oxycodon, and possession of drug paraphernalia. A total bond was set at \$3,000 and he bonded out of jail the following day.

Bierce was charged with possession of Oxycodon with intent to sell, and possession of drug paraphernalia. A total bond of \$30,000 was set, and he remained at the County Jail until April 25.


of the local National Wild Turkey Federation, Wally Davis and Leonard Harris, Emerald Greene of Greene Publishing, Inc. and many others.



Survivor Spotlight: Jane Comer

It is almost impossible to comprehend the changes that cancer forces onto its victims. Cancer affects the sufferers, their families and their loved ones. It's changes daily routines, appearances and so much more. Jane Comer of Madison has faced these changes head on and is continuing to fight hard every day.

In late 2009, Comer was experiencing many worrying symptoms, such as having low hemoglobin, becoming fatigued more quickly and a feeling of fullness in her upper stomach area. In September 2009 Comer's symptoms were given a cause; she was diagnosed with Ovarian Cancer. Later that month, on September 22, Comer had her first post diagnosis surgery at St. Vincent's Hospital in Jacksonville.

Following her first surgery, Comer was placed on IV chemotherapy. She received her chemotherapy from the Pearlman Cancer Center in Valdosta. "My first treatment was intense and it caused me to be weak," Comer recalled.

Two years later, Comer found out that the cancer had spread and was attacking her intestines. She was told that she would have to go through another intensive surgery. In June 2011, at St. Vincent's Hospital, Comer underwent surgery on her intestinal tract.

Presently, Comer has been taken off of the IV chemotherapy and is able to take chemotherapy capsules from home. Cancer and the chemotherapy has changed Comer from an active person, someone who, even up to age 72, was out playing tennis with her

friends and swimming a lot, to someone who is content being at home most of the time. "The chemotherapy takes so much of my energy that it even restricts my going to the grocery store. However, I have been able to attend church at Grace Presbyterian most Sunday mornings," Comer stated. She is also unable to be around anyone who is sick, as the chemotherapy has wiped out her immune system.

"I was very shocked at first upon learning I had Ovarian Cancer. Living with cancer I have learned to trust God more with my every day life changes. I feel his presence in many answered prayers. God has given me the peace in my heart that I feel in my daily walk. Knowing that the Lord is in charge of each day of my life, from birth till we meet in Heaven, has comforted me in times of uncertainty. Leaning on God's care has brought me through many trials in my life," Comer said of her diagnosis.

Comer strongly supports Relay for Life and has high hopes in what the Relay for Life will be able to accomplish. "Relay for Life has really helped other people understand what cancer can do. It has also shown how so much is being done by their research to hopefully eradicate cancer forever. Cancer has taught me to thank my God daily and to pray daily for all He done for me and continually pray for His constant care."

As for the people that have helped her through this difficult time, Comer said, "I have been blessed in my struggles with the best medical professionals, my husband Murray constantly being by my side

and my prayer warrior friends. All of these people along with my son David (wife Christina), my daughter Suzanne (husband Tom Bell) and my grandchildren Sean and Morgan Comer and JaneMargaret and Elizabeth Bell. We also appreciate our many caring friends showering me with cards of comfort and flowers. Also constantly brining meals and the many comforting calls in addition to the prayers from so many friends."

As for her advice for cancer patients, she said, "My advice to other cancer patients is to seek the Lord with all your heart and lean on Him every step of the way. I have spoken with other cancer survivors and received joy from our understanding that the Lord is control of our ways, if we only commit to Him our needs. And trust Him with all our hearts."


