



## School Board Discusses Athletic Facilities at MCHS

After some discussion, the Madison County School Board voted to begin work on the weight room facility at Madison County High School as soon as the school year finishes up at the end of May. Equipment for the weight room has already come in and is being stored in other areas of the school, and the projected timeline for the facility calls for it to be completed by September, when the 2013-2014 school year begins.

Another project, renovating and upgrading the concession stand at the football field, adding some

square footage and increasing the number of restrooms to bring it up to code and into compliance with the ADA, was originally scheduled to begin in May as well. However, the work timeline projected that even if construction began immediately, it could not be completed until October, halfway through the high school's football season.

Some board members discussed delaying the project until after December, when the Cowboy football season was over, then beginning work in January, when the stadium would not be so heavily used. Even with baseball, softball and tennis going on in the spring, the concession stand would not be used nearly as much, and past projects at the school had shown that construction projects during the school year could be worked around class schedules and student traffic.

The total cost for the weight room is approximately \$90,000, and the concession stand work is estimated at approximately \$200,000. The Class of 66 has made a sizable contribution toward the expense of the concession stand, and Andy Barnes, Director of Finance, added that the district was looking at other ways to pare down the cost even further, mostly by reducing the number of restrooms. Superintendent Doug Brown said that he was also trying to solicit donations from other sources to add to the contribution from the Class of 66.

School Board member VeEtta Hagan said she thought the board had agreed at their last workshop to form a committee to solicit donations, rather than

having one person responsible for fundraising, and asked why the concession stand project was being delayed yet again, when it had been approved last year, and everyone had agreed that it was in the best interest of the general public's health and safety.

"Why is the weight room taking precedence?" she asked.

Board member Kenny Hall replied that the concession stand had to be delayed last year because the district had to do the science lab, and the proposal to delay the project this year was due to the fact that it couldn't be finished before football season. Football fans would have to make their way past construction equipment and use porta-potties for the first half of the season.

"I know something needs to be done, but the equipment came in for the weight room," Hall said. His proposal was to do the weight room first so the equipment could be moved out of other rooms, then move on to the concession stand after football season was over.

Superintendent Brown stated that with the extra time, he believed the concession stand project had a real chance of soliciting more donations, using a committee to do the work per Hagan's reminder, because the stand would have space for advertising and listing contributors' names.

Barnes added that by delaying the concession stand until after December, the expense could go on next year's capital outlay budget.

## Three Arrested In Madison On Drug Charges

Madison County Sheriff Ben Stewart reports that on Monday, May 6, the Madison County Sheriff's Office Interstate Criminal Enforcement (I.C.E.) team stopped a 2006 Dodge Charger for committing two traffic violations on Interstate 10 in Madison County. The Charger was driven by Mark Joseph Grittner of Boynton Beach and occupied by passengers Courtney A. Baethke of Lake Worth and Kevin Joseph Carbone, also of Boynton Beach. As Deputies approached the Charger a strong odor of marijuana was detected. Deputies completed enforcement actions for the traffic violations then conducted a probable cause search of the Charger and all occupants. During the search, deputies located numerous glass vials containing cocaine, numerous plastic bags containing marijuana and a plastic bag containing several ecstasy and oxycodone pills. Further search discovered more than 100 empty plastic bags consistent with the size and type commonly used to package cocaine and marijuana for sale along with two digital scales that contained cocaine residue. The various narcotics were concealed throughout the vehicle and on the occupant's persons. The narcotics and paraphernalia was processed and collected. Grittner, Baethke and Carbone were each arrested without incident. The Dodge Charger was seized in accordance with the Florida Contraband Forfeiture Act. Arrested and charged were: Mark Joseph Grittner, Courtney A. Baethke, and Kevin Joseph Carbone. All were charged with possession of cocaine with intent to sell, possession of marijuana, possession of Ecstasy/MDMA, possession of a controlled substance / Oxycodone and possession of drug paraphernalia.

## Rainfall Varies Across District During March

Rainfall averages across the Suwannee River Water Management District (SRWMD) were mixed during March, with certain areas receiving below their long-term averages and others receiving typical totals for the time of year.

So indicates the latest hydrologic conditions report from the SRWMD. The report shows the average rainfall across the district in March was 2.96 inches, which is 64 percent of the long-term March average of 4.52 inches.

Meanwhile, the average rainfall for the 12-month period ending March 31 was 60.87 inches, or 6.26 inches higher than the long-term average of 54.61 inches.

The figures show Madison County received 3.86 inches in March, compared with the March average of 4.36 inches. Madison County received 59.29 inches during the last 12 months, or 102 percent of the annual normal. Jefferson County, meanwhile, received 3.73 inches of rainfall in March, compared with the March average of 5.72 inches. The county received 57.39 inches of rainfall during the last 12 months, or 102 percent of the annual normal.

River levels generally rose and then fell steadily after cresting, with late month storms in South Georgia causing slight rises in flows at the end of the month. The Aucilla River, for its part, remained at or above flood stage throughout the month.

Lake levels, for their part, remained stable throughout the month, with the exception of Snead Smokehouse Lake, which rose to its highest level since Tropical Storm Fay in 2008.

## DASH Your Way to Lower Blood Pressure

Whether you are trying to control high blood pressure or working to reduce your risk of high blood, following the Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension (DASH), is a proven meal plan to lower blood pressure. May is National High Blood Pressure Education Month, so let's talk about proven strategies that will help reduce high blood pressure. Consumers are often confused by products on the market that claim to reduce blood pressure and many over the counter products are not researched and proven to be effective. A researched based meal pattern that have proven to reduce blood pressure is the DASH meal plan.

Conducted in the early 90's, DASH was a scientific dietary study to determine if a diet plan without medication could reduce blood pressure. The study was funded by the National Institute of Health and conducted at Harvard, Duke, John Hopkins and Louisiana State University. Results showed that both men and women eating the DASH plan experienced a significant drop in both their systolic and diastolic blood pressure readings.

The DASH eating plan emphasizes fresh fruit and vegetables and low fat dairy products. It is moderate in total fat and low in saturated fat and cholesterol. It also includes whole grains, poultry, fish and nut. It also recommends reducing salt and sodium intake.

Starting on the DASH eating plan is easy. It requires no special foods and no recipes to follow. Here are some tips to help you get started:

Make gradual changes like adding a serving of fruit or vegetables at lunch and dinner.

Gradually increase your intake of fat free and low fat dairy products to 3 servings a day. If you eat large portions of meat, cut them back by a half or third at

each meal.

It only takes 6 oz. of meat each day to meet your protein requirements so eat less. Three to four ounces. are equal to the size of a deck of playing cards.

Try two or more meatless meals each week. A combination of a grain and bean will give you the same eight essential amino acids of meat or chicken.

Try serving casseroles and stir-fry dishes, which have more vegetables, grains and dry beans.

Eat baked or grilled fish during the week, but limit bottled marinades, they are often high in sodium.

Eat fresh fruit, raw vegetables, or low fat and fat free yogurt for snacks.

Use herbs and spices to enhance the flavor of foods..

Eat out less often, restaurant foods are very high in sodium, sometimes giving you more than a day's worth of sodium.

Make one or two changes each week. Eat a variety of foods and cut back on serving sizes. If you are under a doctor's care for high blood pressure, be sure you take your medication and follow the doctor's recommendations. Your efforts to reduce sodium intake will help you overall health.

## Catching Up With Anthony Beckham

I had just left the sanctuary of Beulah Baptist Church, when I saw him. It had been maybe eight or nine years since we had seen each other and I had written a story on Anthony Beckham and his Power Unlimited team for the newspaper at the time. His wife, Jennifer, was speaking at Beulah later that evening and he had a box of her books and DVDs in his huge arms.

"Hey, Anthony," I said and immediately he and I began talking about when we had last seen each other, as well as Madison County High School Cowboy and Florida State University Seminole football. We also talked about the NFL draft, which had seen former Madison County High running back Chris Thompson drafted by the Washington Redskins that every day. Anthony recalled having Chris and his then middle school teammate Jacobbi McDaniel go onstage with Power Unlimited back then. (Jacobbi took a redshirt this year at Florida State and will return for the 2013 season.)

Anthony and Jennifer Beckham have ministries that include outreaches to children. Anthony and Jennifer travel with a team called Power Unlimited and Anthony and his fellow Power Unlimited members rip Jacksonville phone books. They break chains. They bend steel. Jennifer and Anthony both share the message of hope in Jesus Christ and talk about self-esteem. A former Disney princess, Jennifer has a separate ministry where she speaks mostly to groups of women across the United States. She may be speaking to a group of 15,000 business executives one day and be in the little town of Lee, Florida the next speaking to a group of 40 people.

Known as Rev. Hardbody, Anthony is 100 percent drug free and he sports 20-inch biceps and can bench press 465 pounds. He grew up in poverty in front of a junkyard in Zolfo Springs, Florida. Though he grew up, surrounded by violence, drugs and alcohol, Anthony sought something higher for himself and others. Saved at 11 years old at a Vacation Bible School, thanks to a Sunday School bus ministry, Anthony began helping other friends see the love of Christ in him when he would give advice to those who sought it from him by backing up the advice with Scripture.

When Anthony and I spoke last Saturday evening, I was amazed at the memory that the man had. His wife gave an excellent program that had me and several of my friends at the altar. (I went to pray for a family member who needed it. I'm not sure why the others were there, but God knows their needs) My talk with Anthony, which may have went on for 20 or 30 minutes more after his wife's service ended will be forever etched in my memory. It was a conversation with a great friend and with a great Christian. I hope that we see each other again before another eight years passes by.

Jay Lee, speaking as a parent and a member of the general public, asked about the \$200,000 price tag on the project, and asked if the board had approved the project without knowing what they would be getting, but Hall assured him that they had looked at detailed plans and schematics, and the sum of \$200,000 was an estimate of how much money they would need to have the work done. Hall also reiterated that they would look into how they could reduce that cost while still remaining in compliance with ADA and code requirements. The \$200,000 was based on a "worst-case scenario" regarding number of needed restrooms, and that was the single biggest factor driving up the cost.

Hagan said that she wished to go on the record as stating that she believed the concession stand was more important, for the health and safety reasons she had previously spelled out, and that she objected to the project being delayed yet again.

The final motion was to proceed with the weight room as planned, then revisit the concession stand after Christmas break, and take another detailed look at plans and prices.

The board voted 4-1 in favor of the motion, with Hagan casting the dissenting vote.

observed signs of deception and indicators of criminal activity.

Based on the observations K-9 Max was deployed to conduct a free air sniff on the exterior of the Chrysler sedan. K-9 Max gave a positive alert for the presence of narcotic odor on the passenger and driver side doors as well as the trunk. After completing the enforcement actions deputies conducted a probable cause search of the Chrysler. During the search a small plastic bag containing cocaine and marijuana was located in the front center console area. A large shoulder bag was located during the search of the trunk and was found to contain a large amount of U.S. Currency. The currency was

packaged in a manner consistent and indicative of a drug courier's method to transport currency to be used in drug transactions.

Both Price and Anderson denied owning the currency or knowing who the owner was or how the currency got into the car. The currency was seized in accordance with the Florida Contraband Forfeiture Act. An official count determined the currency to total \$43,120.00. Alex Leon Price was taken into custody at the scene and charged with possession of cocaine and possession of marijuana. Additional charges are pending for Tiresias Darnell Anderson as the investigation continues.

As for groundwater levels, they generally rose in the northern and central parts of the district and fell in the southern part.

The National Weather Service Climate Prediction Center's three-month outlook indicates a probability of below-normal precipitation throughout June in north Florida.

The SRWMD continues a Phase I Water Shortage Advisory that urges consumers to refrain from unnecessary water uses.

The hydrologic conditions report is a compilation of water resource data collected from radar-derived rainfall estimates, groundwater and surface water levels and river flows, among other sources.

## Records Broken at 55th Annual "Pot" Williams Golf Tournament





The Madison County Cowboys manned the field in the first round of District on April 23, and faced off against Taylor County. The Cowboys downed their opponent for a 5-1 win.

Madison outscored Taylor 2-1 in the first inning, added another two runs in the fourth inning, and brought in an additional run in the seventh inning for the win.

As a team, at the plate, the Cowboys had a batting average of .250, with 34 plate appearances, 28 at-bats, five runs, seven hits, three RBI's, two doubles, five walks, nine strikeouts, one hit by pitch, one reach on error, one fielder's choice, an on base percentage of .382, a slugging average of .321, and four stolen bases.

On April 25, the Madison County Cowboys went into the District Final against Florida State University (FSU), and the Cowboys attacked the Seminoles for a 9-3 victory, to stand 16-9 on the season.

FSU drew first blood, bringing in one run, but the Cowboys answered in the third inning, bringing in four runs. The Cowboys then outscored FSU, 2-1 in the sixth inning, and 3-1 in the seventh inning for the title.

As a team, at the plate, the Cowboys carried a .250 batting average, with 34 plate appearances, 28 at-bats, nine runs, seven hits, seven RBI's, three doubles, one homerun, four walks, 11 strikeouts, two hit by pitches, one reach on error, one fielder's choice, an on base percentage of .382, a slugging average of .464, and two stolen bases.

DJ McKnight had a batting average of .500, with four plate appearances, two at-bats, three runs, one hit, one double, two walks, one strikeout, an on base percentage of .750, a slugging average of 1.000, and one stolen base.

Akevious Williams had a batting average of .250, with four plate appearances, four at-bats, one hit, one RBI, one double, one strikeout, one fielder's choice, an on base percentage of .250, and a slugging average of .500.

Jake Latner had batting average of .500, with four plate appearances, two at-bats, one run, one hit, one RBI, one walk, one hit by pitch, an on base percentage of .750, and a slugging average of .500.

Taylor Howell had a batting average of .250, with four plate appearances, four at-bats, one run, one hit, two RBI's, one double, one strikeout, an on base percentage of .250, a slugging average of .500, and one stolen base.



# USDA Announces 45th General Sign-Up for the Conservation Reserve Program

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced at the National Pheasant Fest and Quail Classic that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will conduct a four-week general sign-up for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), beginning May 20 and ending on June 14. CRP has a 27-year legacy of protecting the nation's natural resources through voluntary participation, while providing significant economic and environmental benefits to rural communities across the United States. Under Secretary Vilsack's leadership, USDA has enrolled 11.7 million acres in various CRP efforts.

"Since the 1980s, the CRP program has established itself as a benchmark in voluntary conservation efforts, providing American producers with assets to address our most critical resource issues," said Vilsack. "Last year, during one of the worst droughts in generations, the CRP proved vital in protecting our most environmentally sensitive lands from erosion. Emergency haying and grazing on CRP lands also supplied critical feed and forage for livestock producers due to the drought. And the program continues to bring substantial returns to rural areas, attracting recreation and tourism dollars into local economies while sustaining natural and wildlife habitat for future generations."

Additional sign-ups for continuous CRP programs-such as Highly Erodible Land Initiative and Initiative to Restore Grasslands, Wetlands and Wildlife-will be announced in spring 2013.

Currently, about 27 million acres are enrolled in CRP, which is a voluntary program available to agricultural producers to help them safeguard environmentally sensitive land. Producers enrolled in CRP plant long-term, resource-conserving covers to improve the quality of water, control soil erosion and enhance wildlife habitat. Contracts on 3.3 million acres of CRP are set to expire on Sept. 30, 2013. Producers with expiring contracts or producers with environmentally sensitive land are encouraged to evaluate their options under CRP.

Producers that are accepted in the sign-up can receive cost-share assistance to plant long-term, resource-conserving covers and receive an annual rental payment for the length of the contract (10-15 years). Producers also are encouraged to look into CRP's other enrollment opportunities offered on a continuous, non-competitive, sign-up basis and that often provide additional financial assistance. Continuous sign-up dates will be announced at a later date.

Over the past 27 years, farmers, ranchers, conservationists, hunters, fishermen and other outdoor enthusiasts have made CRP one of the largest and most important USDA

efforts. CRP continues to make major contributions to national efforts to improve water and air quality, and to prevent soil erosion by protecting the most sensitive areas including those prone to flash flooding and runoff. CRP has also helped increase populations of pheasants, quail, ducks, and rare species, like the sage grouse, the lesser prairie chicken, and other grassland birds. Highlights of CRP include:

CRP has restored more than two million acres of wetlands and two million acres of riparian buffers;

Each year, CRP keeps more than 600 million pounds of nitrogen and more than 100 million pounds of phosphorous from flowing into our nation's streams, rivers, and lakes.

CRP provides \$1.8 billion annually to landowners-dollars that make their way into local economies, supporting small businesses and creating jobs; and

CRP is the largest private lands carbon sequestration program in the country. By placing vulnerable cropland into conservation, CRP sequesters carbon in plants and soil, and reduces both fuel and fertilizer usage. In 2012, CRP resulted in carbon sequestration equal to taking about nine million cars off the road.

The Obama Administration is leading a host of federal agencies in the America's Great Outdoors initiative to develop a 21st century conservation agenda and reconnect Americans to the outdoors. At the same time, USDA continues to enroll a record number of acres of private working lands in conservation programs, working with more than 500,000 farmers and ranchers to implement conservation practices that clean the air we breathe, filter the water we drink, and prevent soil erosion. Since 2009, USDA has enrolled more than 50 million acres into the Conservation Stewardship Program to incentivize the most productive, beneficial conservation practices. And USDA's work in the Chesapeake Bay watershed, the Mississippi River Basin, and Gulf of Mexico are among 19 initiatives applying the most effective conservation practices to increase agricultural and environmental returns. USDA science is also helping to focus work in areas to reduce problematic nutrients making it to rivers and streams by as much as 45 percent.

Explaining the group's three core principles, choral director Lee spoke of *Discipline*, apparent in the smooth, orderly way the choir members moved quickly on and off stage, and responded to the director; *Music*, delivered in pleasing harmony and with attention to detail; and *Love*, a concern for each other that knows when to say no to a friend to pull him back from trouble.

The well-rehearsed singing included a wide range of songs such as "America the Beautiful," "Gracias a la Vida," a Spanish-language song from Chile, and "Precious Lord, Take My Hand" with added lyrics that included words and phrases from Dr. Martin Luther King's "I Have A Dream" speech.

There were also fun numbers like "No Bad News" from the movie, *The Wiz*, which incorporated a little choreographed staging into a high-energy, crowd-pleasing musical vignette.

It takes a lot of hard work and long hours of rehearsals to make something look and sound so good, and the Boys Choir of Tallahassee is up to the challenge.

Hats off to all the performers, but especially to Madison's own – Kammeron Joseph, Xavier Dobson and Cantrell Davis, for their talent, hard work and performance.




