Most Of Greenville School's Missing Items Found

At its June 18, meeting, the Madison County School Board Members, particularly VeEtta Hagan, who represents the Greenville District and fellow board member Karen Pickles, insisted on first launching a district-wide search for a list of 25 missing items before writing them off and filing a police report. The items, including a copier and several computers, had turned up missing from Greenville Elementary, and had an aggregate value of about

\$116,000.

By the July 2 meeting, after a search of all other schools and buildings in the district, most of the items had been located, and matched up to property numbers on the missing items list. About seven or eight items still remained unaccounted for, with a total value of about \$2000.

After reviewing the list of items found and those still missing, the board voted to file a police report on the property that was still unaccounted for.

In a separate action, the board amended its

agenda to include an update of the damage the Excel school building had sustained over the past school year. As things currently stand, one of the board members is trying to set up an inspection of the building with a member of the B.E.A.R. Center and an outside third party expert who can tour the premises with them and provide an estimate on the cost of repairs.

The board voted to hold final payment to the B.E.A.R. Center pending further action of the school Board.

School Board Approves Plans For Renovation

Architect Will Rutherford of Clemons, Rutherford and Associates, gave the school board an enthusiastic update on "Phase Three" of the plans for Madison County High School's proposed renovation, complete with two large, full color renditions of what the newly refurbished facility might look like.

The existing facility, completed in the early 1980s, would have not only an updated look, but updated capacity to handle all the new technology that has exploded onto the scene since then. The Florida Department of Education is providing funds for the renovation, and the next required step in the multi-step process of DOE's approval is for the Madison County School Board to send the department a letter certifying that Rutherford had delivered the plans and other "Phase Three" documents to the board members and that they were complete and in compliance with building and safety codes.


Those plans, Rutherford told the board, contained everything that would be done to renovate Madison County High School, including carpet, ceilings, walls, paint, new kitchen equipment and whatever else the facility required...a list documenting everything on campus that needed to be changed and updated.

Greenville Fire Rescue To Flush Hydrants Beginning July 13

Greenville Fire Rescue will begin flushing fire hydrants on July 13.

Residents will need to let their water run, if they are seeing rusty or dark-colored water. They need to be cautious when washing clothes, especially lighter-colored clothes or whites. If the water does not clear up within 15-30 seconds, the residents should call Chip Hakili Washington at (850) 556-0272.



Fire Chief Washington said the fire department flushes hydrants for many reasons including:

- Flushing ensures the hydrant is working properly and informs fire personnel of any problems in the hydrants' operation, such as leaking, no opening or closing, etc.; and
- Flushing of hydrants is required by the Insurance Service Organization (ISO) to maintain the fire department's ISO ranking.

July Is National Ice Cream Month

Summertime and homemade ice cream just go together. Since July is National Ice Cream Month, let's look at the safest methods for making homemade ice cream. Eggs are often an ingredient in recipes, my mother's recipe called for six eggs, uncooked, added to the liquid mixture. But in recent years, researchers found Salmonella infections were on the increase due to the use of raw eggs in ice cream, so recipes have been modified. The problem is that most people stick with those traditional recipes, ignoring the recommendation to skip raw eggs as an ingredient.

Alice Henneman, Nutrition Specialist with the University of Nebraska Extension suggests you protect yourself from the danger of Salmonella infection by finding a homemade recipe using a cooked egg base, pasteurized egg substitutes or eliminate eggs altogether.

Egg substitutes, may be liquid or frozen, contain only the white of the egg, which doesn't contain fat and cho-

lesterol and are readily available at the supermarket. These products have been pasteurized and work well in the place of raw eggs. Whole eggs can be used, but must be cooked to reach a temperature of 160° F when tested with a thermometer. At this temperature, the mixture should coat a metal spoon.

For an eggless ice cream, try this recipe:

- Eggless Vanilla Ice Cream
- 2 cups milk
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 cups whipping cream or half and half

2 teaspoons vanilla
Combine ingredients and stir briskly about two minutes until sugar is dissolved (Undissolved sugar crystals may be a cause of large ice crystal formation.) Pour into a 1 gallon ice cream freezer and freeze according to manufacturer's directions.

Declaration Of Independence

Lord North, British Prime Minister, told the Parliament, of the Kings strategy on America. "We are no longer to dispute between legislation and taxation; we are now only to consider whether or not we have any authority (over) there. It is very clear we have none, if we suffer the property (tea) of our subjects to be destroyed. WE MUST PUNISH, CONTROL, OR YIELD to them." (3/14/1774, 13th Parliament, 7th session, pp. 1163-4.)

Thomas Jefferson

We, the people of the States, needed exposure of the crimes committed against us. So Thomas Jefferson, on July 4, 1776, submitted these "crimes of the King" to a candid world. Congressman John Randolph, of Virginia, characterized that indictment as "A Black Catalogue of Crimes." (4/2/1810 Register of Debates 1227).

He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless these people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our People, and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in time of peace, Standing Armies without the Consent of our legislature.

He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil Power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their acts of pretended legislation:

For quartering large bodies of armed troops

among us:

For protecting them, by a mock Trial, from Punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States:

For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world:

For imposing taxes on us without our Consent:

For depriving us in many cases, of the benefits of Trial by Jury:

For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences:

For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighboring Province, stabling therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies:

For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws, and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments:

For suspending our own Legislature, and declaring themselves invested with Power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us.

Fork in the Road

We are not descendants of fearful men. When we saw our duty, we acted. We walked the line. We have not always resorted to our defenses when we were trespassed upon, but we need to look to our beginning to see into the future.

After the DOE's Phase Three approval, Rutherford said he would like to go through the school facility with the faculty, staff, and others who used the building and worked there, to help plan for proper current technological demands. It was one thing to be in compliance with building and safety codes, but another to be up-to-date with the current technological needs.

In the second of two drawings, Rutherford shows what the high school's new entrance might look like.

As a "for instance" of what he meant, he referenced the former agricultural lab area that had been converted to classroom space for the CNA and other med-tech training programs. The windows and door spaces had been filled in to create solid walls, but it could be upgraded to be more like an actual hospital room or emergency room, something much more similar to the environment where the students would be working in someday.

Another "for instance" was the tech labs that had all their computers running off two circuits. What was ample for the technology that existed 30-plus years ago, falls short of the demands of modern technology.

When it came to technology, the current building was "down here," said Rutherford, holding his hand down low, then raising it higher. "And it needs to be up here."

He also wanted to design for flexibility in the school, with classrooms that could double as lab spaces when needed, and find ways to upgrade the energy efficiency of the building to cut future utility costs, which now run at about \$210,000 a year.

Finally, he unveiled the two large drawings he had brought in, looking at two main aspects of the schools exterior: the bus drop and the main entrance, as example of how the new "look" of the building ought to "establish that pride in place you would want to be."

The bus drop featured a dramat-

ic looking half-barrel roof covering to make it "pop" and stand out as the place where the buses were meant to go. The main entrance also received a similar dramatic treatment to make it stand out as the face the building would proudly show. The current main entrance, tucked into the wall he said, reminded him of a "Raid roach box, where the roaches go in but they don't come out," eliciting a few chuckles as the board members responded to his growing enthusiasm during the presentation.

The two drawings would be changed, tweaked, modified, or whatever the board decided to do, said Rutherford, who estimated that he had worked about 36 hours straight on the drawings, something he hadn't done in many years, and he could still look at them and see things that he thought should be done differently.

"If DOE gives you \$15.8 million to build a school, it should look like \$15.8 million," he said.


In response to a question from School District Attorney Tommy Reeves about an estimated timeline, Rutherford replied that it all depended on DOE's approval process, but it looked like the facility would be completely redone and ready in the fall of 2015.

School board member VeEtta Hagan smiled as he concluded his presentation. "Thank you for being so excited by this project," she said, to nods of agreement from the others.



Kiwanis Seeking To Aid Elderly Woman

The Kiwanis Club has spoken several times of partnering with other civic clubs in the county, as has the Rotary, in order to take on bigger challenges that would be beyond just one club by itself.

Now there is a need calling for just that kind of cooperation among different organizations.

A 75-year-old woman and her family, within the city limits of Madison, live in a house with no indoor plumbing. The family has used an outhouse or porta potty for the last 50 years, by the lady's estimation.

However, the problems don't stop there. The house is decaying from floor to ceiling with wood rot and termites eating away at the foundation, floors and walls. The roof leaks and is caving in. The house is beyond repair and needs to be demolished and replaced.

City of Madison Code Inspector Juan Williams and Code Administrator Mary Graham spoke to the Kiwanis Club about the woman's situation.

The structure should be condemned, and ordinarily that was what the City would do, Williams told the club. However, there were no funds in the city's budget to put her up some place else until her house could be either replaced or she could find somewhere else to live.

"We don't want to condemn it and put her on the street," said Williams.

The woman and her family are living on about \$765 a month, meaning that renting an apartment would probably not be within their means.

Instead, Williams, Graham and Kiwanis Club President Jerome Wyche presented the situation to the club's membership to discuss possibilities of what could be worked out with a cooperative effort among several organizations and individuals who could help or who knew of other people and/or organizations who had the resources to help.

Currently the USDA is offering a \$7500 grant to go toward replacing the house, if the city can find enough people and organizations willing to help out. The deadline is July 8, but that deadline can be extended if the USDA sees that there is indeed enough community involvement to warrant the extension. So far, one local company has offered to help with the demolishing, and a local plumbing company has offered to donate the indoor plumbing fixtures. An account – the Willie M. Washington Donation Account – has been set up at Madison County Community Bank for individuals who wish to contribute.

"It sounds monumental, and it's much bigger than we are as a club," said Wyche.

However, reaching out and networking with other clubs and organizations, including the Madison Shared Services Coalition with its extensive networking possibilities would help, as would enough volunteers to hammer nails and saw boards.

"We'll explore all avenues," said Wyche. "Here's a major community project to help someone, and that's we're about."

The CARES farmers were recognized by Florida Farm Bureau President John Hoblick and Florida Deputy Commissioner of Agriculture Mike Joyner at the UF/IFAS Suwannee Valley Agriculture Extension Center in Live Oak. Herschel T. Vinyard Jr., Secretary of the Florida Department of Environmental Protection; Don Quincey, Suwannee River Water Management District Governing Board Chairman; State Representative Halsey Beshears; State Representative Elizabeth Porter; former State Representative Dwight Stansel; Dr. Nick Place, Dean of Extension UF/IFAS; and Russell Morgan, Natural Resources Conservation Service State Conservationist were among the dignitaries who spoke at the event.

Florida Farm Bureau and the Suwannee River Partnership (SRP) created CARES to help agricultural associations, public agencies, institutions and farmers increase public awareness of the outstanding natural resource management by Florida's farm families. Farmers who receive CARES awards voluntarily imple-

ment conservation best management practices (BMPs) designed to protect and save water.

Below is a list of this year's Suwannee River area honorees and the counties in which their operations are located:

Roger West Farm (Alachua), Ashby Green Farm (Alachua), Smith Brothers Farm, (Alachua), Allison Farms (Columbia), Sloan Walker Farm (Jefferson), Anderson Farms (Jefferson), Billy and Corliss Smith Farm (Gilchrist), Mervin Hines Farm (Gilchrist), Taylor Farm (Gilchrist), Lane Farms (Levy), RBT Farms (Levy), Usher Farm & Timber (Levy), Young Green Acres (Madison), Joseph Family Farm (Madison), George Ross Farm (Suwannee), Weaver Farms (Suwannee), James Reaves Farm (Suwannee), K&S Farms (Suwannee), and Cooper Farms (Suwannee).

Farmers who implement BMPs through the SRP, which administers the CARES program in the Suwannee and Santa Fe river basins, save an estimated 1 billion gallons of water annually and achieve a nitrogen reduction of about 3,250 tons per year. The SRP has set aside approximately \$2 million for water quality and quantity conservation practices for fiscal year 2013-14.

"These agricultural producers have demonstrated that they care about the environmental integrity of the natural resources they manage through the use of advanced technology and environmental practices," said SRP Coordinator Hugh Thomas. "Such practices conserve our groundwater and reduce nutrient loading in our rivers, streams and springs, and at the same time allow farmers to maintain their profitability."

Some of these technologies and practices include:

Retrofitting center pivot irrigation systems with low-pressure, low-volume nozzles to increase irrigation efficiency and decrease water use.

Irrigation management practices that guide irrigation scheduling and soil moisture testing so that farmers know how much and when to apply irrigation based on crop and soil needs.

Using fertigation systems to reduce the amount of fertilizer applied during a single application and provide for a more uniform application of fertilizer to improve the application efficiency.

Fitting tractors with GPS mapping technology that targets fertilizer and chemicals to crops, thus preventing application of excess nutrients to surrounding soil.

Nutrient management plans for proper handling of animal wastes and fertilizers.

Farmers in the CARES program participate in one of several BMP programs established under state law. Participating agencies help farmers select and implement farm plans which include nutrient and irrigation management. To maintain CARES status, farmers must continue to operate and maintain conservation practices over time.

Since its inception in 2001, the CARES program has recognized more than 550 farmers and ranchers statewide for implementing these practices.

Budget Check Up: Tax Time Is The Right Time

Every year, nearly 150 million households file their federal tax returns. For many, the process involves digging through shoe boxes or manila folders full of receipts: gathering mortgage, retirement, and investment account statements; and relying on computer software to take advantage of every tax break the code permits. It seems a shame not to make the most of all that effort.

Tax preparation may be the only time of year many households gather all their financial information in one place. That makes it a perfect time to take a critical look at how much money is coming in and where it's all going. In other words, give the household budget a check-up.

Six-Step Process

One method for doing a thorough budget check-up involves six steps.

Create Some Categories. Start by dividing expenses into useful categories. Some possibilities: home, auto, food, household, debt, clothes, pets, entertainment, and charity. Don't forget savings and investments. It also may be helpful to create subcategories. Housing, for example, can be divided into mortgage, taxes, insurance, utilities, and maintenance.

Follow the Money. Go through all the receipts and statements gathered to prepare taxes and get a better understanding of where the money went last year. Track everything. Be as specific as possible; and don't forget to account for the cost of a latte on the way to the office each day.

Project Expenses Forward. Knowing how much was spent in each budget category can provide a useful template for projecting expenses moving forward. Go through category by category: Are expenses likely to rise in the coming year? If so, by how much? The results of this projection will form the basis of a budget for the coming year.

Determine Expected Income. Add together all sources of income. Make sure to use net income.

Do the Math. It's time for the moment of truth. Subtract projected expenses from expected income. If expenses exceed income, it may be necessary to consider changes. Prioritize categories and look to reduce those with the lowest importance until the budget is balanced.

Stick to It. If it's not in the budget, don't spend it. If it's an emergency, make adjustments elsewhere.

Tax time can provide an excellent opportunity to give your household budget a thorough check up. And taking control of your money could enable you to put more of it to work pursuing your financial goals.
