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GREENVILLE'S FARMERS & MERCHANTS BANK CLOSING

After almost 17 years of service, the Greenville branch of Farmers & Merchants Bank will close its doors for the last time on Monday, Sept 30, 2013.

Since October of 1996, a branch of Farmers & Merchants Bank (FMB) has served Greenville from its location on South Grand Street. A full service bank for many years, it closed its lobby and scaled back to just a walk-up ATM and drive-through window a couple of years ago, although people who needed to meet with loan officers and other bank officials could call the bank and set up an appointment.

But soon, the branch will close its doors for good. The final day is Sept. 30, 2013.

The Greenville Town Council discussed the closing at its Monday night meeting, pondering the consequences of being in a town without a bank. There was the matter of depositing any payments people made each day

for city services. Would one of the city hall employees drive to a Madison bank every day, and who would be that lucky person?

The idea of making deposits every other day was discarded, since an earlier audit of the town's finances had resulted in a requirement for daily deposits.

The council discussed whether or not any banks in Madison had a courier service, but those services would handle checks and money orders only. Liability insurance for couriers who must deal with cash "is exponentially more expensive," City Attorney Christine Thurman told the council members, and most banks don't think the expense is worth it; they mainly use the Brinks armored truck company whenever they have to transport cash.

Annual Sales Tax Free Weekend Approaching

It's getting close to time for back-to-school shopping again, and Florida's Department of Revenue is here to help you. There will be a three-day tax holiday that goes into effect from 12:01 a.m. on Friday, August 2, 2013 through 11:59 p.m. on Sunday, August 4, 2013. This means that if you are in Florida and do your shopping during these times, you will be able to purchase qualifying clothing and footwear, school supplies, personal computers and related accessories free of any sales tax or local option tax (also known as discretionary sales surtax).

The sales tax exemption will apply to a piece of clothing or footwear

Greenville's Evergreen Cemetery Seeks A Little Help

The Bush Estate executors have asked for assistance with weedeating around the headstones and other obstacles.

The historical city-owned Evergreen Cemetery lies at the eastern edge of the Town of Greenville, overlooking Highway 90, and like many cemeteries in small rural towns beside a two-lane country highway, it is a peaceful place, surrounded by wooded land and fields.

Cemeteries, however, need a lot of attention and a little TLC to be kept looking nice. They need to be tended, mowed, weeded, picked up, and, if there are trees and bushes, pruned. Even in a small cemetery, that can

mean a lot of hours and a lot of work, especially if it is an older cemetery with upright headstones rather than modern markers that lie flush with the ground.

Sometime in the early half of the 19th century, lifelong Greenville resident Council Bush, a retail merchant and president of the Bank of Greenville in the 1930s and 1940s, decided to set up a perpetual source of funding to make sure that there would always be money to take care of the cemetery, where he would eventually be buried in 1946.

In the years since, the

Bush Estate had provided funds for the cemetery's upkeep through dividends paid from Bank of America stock, until the economic downturn and recession a few years ago. The stock hasn't paid dividends since 2008.

Paul Burnett, Stephen Reams and Joe Reams, III, executors/administrators of the Bush Estate, managed to keep going on funds that had accumulated, but they reached a point where they needed help with keeping up the cemetery grounds. Because the cemetery is owned

Madison County Sheriff's Office Seeks Greenville's Help With Grant

Chief Deputy Epp Richardson of the Madison County Sheriff's Office addressed the Greenville Town Council to request their support in securing an Edward Burn Memorial Justice Assistance Program Grant from the state. The grant requires that 51 percent of the local governments within a county provide a letter of support for the grant.

The \$35,000 grant would have been worth \$100,000 four years ago, Richardson told the council, but things have changed. Economic times are tough, and grant money, needed more than ever by smaller counties during such times is increasingly hard to find.

"I've worked with (Greenville Town Consultant) Jim Parrish on grants for many years," he added. "Opportunities for grants just aren't the same. Grants are disappearing. Some the grants we used to write don't exist anymore." One of the grants that has vanished is the one that used to help fund a part-time position.

The council voted to draft the letter of support and have Mayor Kovacherich Arnold sign it.

Later, Richardson said that everyone was on board with letters of support, including the towns of Lee and Greenville, the City of Madison and the County Commission.

The Edward Burn Grant would fund a portion of the salary and benefits for one dispatcher.

Food Safety Tips For Summer

Warmer weather brings on an increase of food borne illness during the summer months – better known to the general population as “food poisoning.” Many bacteria in foods and the environment can grow very fast at temperatures from 90°F to 110°F. These temperatures are typical summer temperatures in Florida, so picnics and grilling outdoors only increase the potential for illness.

Because bacteria is invisible, it is hard to convince people their summer meals served outdoors need special care. Amy Simonne, UF Extension Specialist in Food Safety and Quality, has a few suggestions for summer food safety.

Wash your hands with clean potable water and soap often, especially before eating or preparing food.

If there is no clean water to wash your hands, use alcohol-based gel to clean your hands.

Keep the hand sanitizers away from small children and follow directions carefully.

When temperatures are above 90°F, perishable foods should not be left out for more than one hour.

Safe shelf-life of perishable food is a combination of time and temperature. Discard your perishable foods if it has been on a picnic table for a long time. If in doubt, throw it out!

Ice is a food, so handle it as you would handle foods. Ice that is used for cooling drinks and other foods should not be used in your drink because it is easily contaminated with juice from raw meat or dirt from items that have not been washed. Put perishable food on ice in one cooler and carry a separate cooler of ice for beverage cups.

If your family enjoys eating homemade ice cream in summer, find recipes without raw eggs. A recipe using eggs should have steps for cooking the egg mixture before it is put into the ice cream churn.

Follow safe handling of fresh fruits and vegetables to reduce the risk of food borne illness. Fruits like cantaloupes and watermelons should be rinsed under running water before slicing to eliminate any dirt.

At family picnics, teach your children and family members the importance of good personal hygiene and serving etiquette to prevent some potential cross-contamination of germs from your hand to others!

“Righteousness exalteth a nation: but sin is a reproach to any people” (Proverb s 14:34). America's only hope is found in this verse. Our nation had a godly founding and a glorious past ...but what kind of nation will our children inherit? ...Righteousness is our greatest need. Alexander Hamilton said, ‘People get the government they deserve.’ Something has happened in America. If we want to know what's wrong, we need to look in the mirror.

America was born in a revival. The Great Awakening swept the land in a flame of righteousness. Out of that, schools were built, principles taught, and character became strong. A newborn nation declared her independence from England and upon almighty God.

by Greenville, they turned to the city to ask for a little help.

At the Greenville Town Council meeting, Joe Reams, III, appealed to the Town Council for that assistance.

"People are complaining because it's not as nicely kept up," Reams told the Council, explaining that they had to cut back on how often the grounds were mowed, but they could continue the scaled-back mowing schedule if the city could step in and do the weed-eating around the headstones and other obstacles. Town Clerk Kim Reams said that the city does have funds to purchase weed-eaters, "But you (the Town Council) have to tell us to use those funds."

J.C. Fead, Director of the Public Works Department, said that he had no problem helping out with the cemetery, it was just that his department has only a few employees with not much time to spare.

Joe Reams suggested asking MCI for inmate labor to help out. The Bush Estate couldn't do the asking because it is a private group, but the Town of Greenville could ask, and Evergreen is owned by the city, so it is eligible. The only caveat is that inmate labor is not as easy to get as it used to be. The council agreed to discuss trying to get inmate help at the next meeting, since, as Mayor Kovacherich Arnold noted, "They're kind of strict about that now."

"Let's work together to try to keep it going," said Joe Reams. "We can keep going for now, try to hang on, try to keep it (the grass) knocked down. Maybe one day, it'll turn around and the stock will pay dividends again. But for now, we're having to tighten our belts like everybody else."

selling for \$75.00 or less, any individual school supply item selling for \$15.00 or less, or any personal computer or related accessory selling for \$750.00 or less. The exemption will apply no matter how many items are sold on the same invoice to a customer.

When it comes to applying the law to transactions, there are some guidelines that a shopper will need to be aware of:

- Groups of items sold as a package, or packages that contain both eligible and non-eligible items, cannot be broken down to make individual items tax exempt.

- Manufacturer's coupons cannot be used to reduce the price of an item to make it tax exempt, although in-store coupons and discounts will apply.

- Rebates that occur after the sale are not eligible, as they do not affect the price of the item purchased.

- If a tax exempt item is purchased and then returned after the exemption period for the same item (different color, size, etc.) there will be no penalty, but when returning the item to receive credit, the full sales price will then be added to the return.

- Items purchased with rain checks and gift certificates, or items purchased through mail order or in layaway are eligible as long as they are purchased within the exemption period.

placement of sidewalks on both sides of Range Avenue between Dade and Macon Streets. The city is researching the cost.

The source of funding for the projects is the city's Tax Increment Finance fund which is available to finance projects within the city's 24-block TIF district. The district stretches from Sumter Street in the north to Macon Street in the south and from Hancock Avenue in the east to Washington Avenue in the west.

TIF financing is a public-financing method designed to help pay for infrastructure improvements.

Additionally, city commissioners and city staff have prepared a list of sidewalk and street priorities outside the TIF district. Funding, as yet unidentified, will need to be located and possibly allocated toward these projects.

Bonds are essentially loans that investors make to the bond issuer, which can be a corporation, government, federal agency or other organization.

As a result, bonds are frequently

this failed to stimulate sustained economic growth, the Fed took a historic step and embarked on a series of "quantitative easing" programs, purchasing both Treasury Securities and Mortgage-Backed Securities in order to push long-term interest rates lower and support financial markets.

QE3, the latest round of quantitative easing, targeted \$85 billion in monthly government bond and mortgage-backed security purchases. These purchases are designed to increase demand for these bonds, pushing bond prices up and interest rates down, boosting economic activity.

At some point in the future, the Fed will have to exit these quantitative easing programs and begin selling off their accumulated bonds. The pace and timing of these sales, as well as the tapering of the Fed's accommodative monetary policy, will affect bond markets and bond investors. As the quantitative easing programs come to an end, demand for bonds is expected to drop, potentially resulting in a decrease in bond values and an increase in bond yields. As the economy shows sustained improvement, the Fed is also expected to raise interest rates, pushing bond prices still lower.

referred to as debt securities since they are a debt the issuer owes to its bondholders. Since investors won't lend their money without compensation, bond issuers promise bondholders interest as well as repayment of the original sum.

Bonds are generally popular with investors who are seeking income and can be an excellent addition to a well-rounded portfolio as part of a long-term financial strategy. In recent years, the Federal Reserve has aggressively sought economic growth through bond purchases and ultra-low interest rate policies. However, these policies will eventually come to an end, meaning bond investors need to understand the potential risks and rewards of holding bonds during a period of interest rate increases.

The U.S. Federal Reserve has the dual mandate to promote economic growth and low unemployment while maintaining price stability (as measured by the inflation rate.) One of the most powerful tools in the Fed's arsenal is its ability to set the "federal funds rate," which is the rate depository institutions lend money to each other. This rate effectively sets all other interest rates used in banking activity, including the issuance of bonds.

"I never intended to be known as the 'SHIP Lady,'" said Diann Douglas of the Madison County SHIP program at a recent Rotary meeting, but after teaching several classes for first-time homebuyers in the SHIP program, they began identifying her as such, and the nickname stuck.

SHIP, the State Housing Initiative Partnership Program, provides funds to local governments as an incentive for them to create and preserve affordable housing, whether through single-family home ownership or multi-family units. SHIP serves very-low-to-moderate-income families.

The SHIP program is the centerpiece in the William E. Sadowski Affordable Housing Act, passed in 1992; funds from the real estate tax are used to create an affordable housing trust fund that serves all 67 counties and 53 CDBG communities, and can be used to assist with down payments, closing costs, emergency repairs, and housing rehabs.

Madison County, where the median income is about \$35,000, benefits from the SHIP program. Some homeowners in Madison who have received help from SHIP are teachers, firefighters and police officers, all of whom are important to any community.

Douglas teaches a first-time homebuyers

class every quarter, a requirement for applicants buying a home through SHIP. The applicants are pre-qualified by a lender and their income is verified by an SREC housing counselor. They locate a suitable, affordable home and secure a mortgage. The SHIP funds are not paid out until the actual closing, and then the closing agent is the one who receives the money.

The program has helped working people and retired people, but all of those who qualify for the program must have good credit and be responsible with money. Classes include guest speakers who talk about money management and the importance of paying down debt, with an emphasis on paying on time and never allowing credit card debt to go over 30-35 percent of the limit on that card. All of these variables go into the "credit score" calculated by the three big credit reporting bureaus, used by lenders to determine whether or not an applicant is a suitable risk for a mortgage. Most lenders want to see a credit score of 640 or higher, out of a possible score of 850 (the highest rating).

"It's a good program that helps get people into homes," said Douglas.

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
