Sheriff's Office Wins First Place In Florida Law Enforcement Challenge

Madison County Sheriff Ben Stewart reports that the Sheriff's Office, participating with 12 other agencies of similar size and personnel across the State of Florida, has been honorably recognized. On the 19th day of July 2013 the Madison County Sheriff's Office received an award for 1st place in the 2012 Florida Law Enforcement Challenge (FLEC) and a 3rd place finish in the "Click it or Ticket" Challenge (CIOT).

The Florida Law Enforcement Challenge is a competition based on productivity of the participating agencies for their traffic enforcement statistics during 2012. These enforcement practices help keep the highways of

Madison County safer.

The "Click it or Ticket" Challenge is comprised of four waves throughout the year to remind motorists about seat belt safety and enforcement.

By winning 1st place in the FLEC, the Madison County Sheriff's Office was also in the drawing for a new 2014 fully equipped Chevy Tahoe. The winner of the vehicle was Gulf Breeze Police Department. Gulf Breeze is a department that was in the category of having one - eight officers.

Madison County Sheriff Ben Stewart, Capt. David Harper, Cpl. Jason Whitfield, Deputy Odell Livingston, and Finance Officer Nancy Curl attended the

awards ceremony at the Rosen Shingle Creek Resort in Orlando, Florida. Deputy Odell Livingston was the "Top Producer" out of the Sheriff's Office four patrol squads in 2012.

The Madison County Sheriff's Office was awarded a total of 25,000 points to be used for the purchase of law enforcement equipment. The points are equivalent to \$25,000. Sheriff Stewart intends to purchase additional in car video camera systems, light sets for patrol cars and flashlights for deputies.

The Sheriff's Office will participate in the 2013 Challenge and encourages all Madison County motorists to practice safe driving habits.

JUNE ONE OF WETTEST MONTHS ON RECORD

June ranked as the 14th wettest June since 1932, with rains dropping an average of 8.77 inches across the Suwannee River Water Management District (SRWMD) during the month.

The 8.77 inches, according to the SRWMD's latest hydrologic conditions report, represented 132 percent of the long-term average of 6.63 inches for June.

Tropical Storm Andrea was partly responsible for the increase, dropping between 1.8 and 3.8 inches of rain in

the district in early June.

The SRWMD reports that every one of its counties had above-average rainfall during the month.

June also marked the end of a 12-month rainfall surplus caused by Tropical Storm Debby in 2012.

"Average rainfall for the 12 months ending June 30 was 4.4 inches lower than the long-term average of 54.61 inches," according to the report.

Madison County received 9.84 inches in June, compared with the June average of 6.08 inches. Madison County received 50.26 inches during

the last 12 months, or 89 percent of the annual normal.

Jefferson County, meanwhile, received 6.51 inches in June, compared with the June average of 6.09 inches. The county received 46.40 inches of rainfall during the last 12 months, or 77 percent of the annual normal.

River levels, after steadily falling throughout May, mostly rose in June, peaking at levels much above typical June conditions by mid month. Lakes, meanwhile, remained near their long-term average levels for the month.

As for groundwater levels, these

didn't immediately respond to the rainfall, with less than 40 percent of monitored wells showing any significant increases.

The National Weather Service Climate Prediction Center's three-month outlook shows a potential for above-normal rainfall through September.

"Neutral El Nino/Southern Oscillation conditions are expected into the fall, with no tendency toward either El Nino (cooler and wetter) or La Nina (warmer and drier) conditions," the report states.

Louisiana Did It

House Bill No. 724, Act No. 286
 Governor Jindal signed, and it takes effect August 1, 2013. This effort by Katrina Jackson, was supported by 45 other Representatives and 33 Senators. The following information is found at: <http://www.legis.la.gov/legis/ViewDocument.aspx?d=857458&n=HB724> Act

AN ACT
 To enact R.S. 17:2115.11, relative to student prayer gatherings; to permit student prayer gatherings; to provide conditions; and to provide for related matters.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana: Section 1. R.S. 17:2115.11 is hereby enacted to read as follows: §2115.11. Prayer; student-initiated; conditions

A. Upon the request of any public school student or students, the proper school authorities may permit students to gather for prayer in a classroom, auditorium, or other space that is not in use, at any time before the school day begins when the school is open and students are allowed on campus, at any time after the school day ends provided that at least one student club or organization is meeting at that time, or at any noninstructional time during the school day. A school employee may be assigned to supervise the gathering if such supervision is also requested by the student or students and the school employee volunteers to supervise the gathering.

B. Any school employee may attend and participate in the gathering if it occurs before the employee's work day begins or after the employee's work day ends.

C. Any parent may attend the gathering if the parent adheres to school procedures for approval of visitors on the school campus.

D. The students may invite persons from the community to attend and participate in the gathering if other school organizations and clubs are allowed to make similar invitations. Such persons shall adhere to school procedures for approval of visitors on the school campus.

GOOD JOB LOUISIANA
 Allowing groups to gather for prayer with privileges equal to other groups using school facilities.

FLORIDA DID WHAT?
 CS/SB 98 - Education - Approved by Governor Scott March 23, 2012, taking effect July 1, 2012. This

Bill authorizes “a district school board to adopt a policy that allows an inspirational message delivered by students at a student assembly; providing policy requirements; providing purpose, etc.” (http://www.myfloridahouse.gov/Sections/Bills/bill_sdetail.aspx?BillId=47117)

NOW WHAT? NOTHING.
 Local school districts can approve policies which would allow students to decide whether or not to have an inspirational message given by a student at school events. However, both supporters and opponents expect that this controversial law will have limited impact. The Florida School Boards Association advised ignoring this “inspirational message” law. In 2012, Wayne Blanton, executive director of the Florida School Boards Association, called this a “political bill” for the November elections more than for actual policy.

Warnings of legal challenges were issued to local school districts by the ACLU of Florida, the Anti-Defamation League and Americans United for the Separation of Church and State. The Santa Rosa County School District spent hundreds of thousands of dollars because of lawsuits partially prompted by prayers (inspirational messages) at school events.

After Eight Beers, Man Swims From Canada To Detroit

John Morilla, from Canada, swam across the Detroit River after drinking 8 beers. He claims he was drinking, but not drunk, after being apprehended by the U.S. Coast Guard. Morilla said he's been telling people for 20 years that he was going to swim across the river and he was glad he was able to make it to the other side, but admits it was a stupid thing to do. A neighbor of Morilla's contacted the police after losing sight of him; police then notified Canadian and U.S. Coast Guards. Morilla was charged with being intoxicated in a public place and will likely be fined \$5,000 to \$25,000 for swimming in a shipping channel.

Teen Sinks Stolen Cars In Lake

In Russia, a 17-year old boy is likely to face criminal charges after admitting to stealing 10 cars and sinking some of them in Glinka lake. Divers discovered the vehicles at the bottom of the lake and brought them to the shore. Police are working to assess damages to the vehicles.

Baby Grand Piano Stolen From Hospital

In Toronto, a baby grand piano, worth \$26,200 was stolen in broad daylight. Workers at the hospital said three men loaded the piano onto a dolly and claimed they were taking the piano for a tuning. The piano was donated in 2006. Members of the Canadian Opera Company and other performers used it once a week to perform for cancer patients and their families.

Woman Banned From McDonalds For Taking Horse Inside

A British woman was banned and fined from the Greater Manchester McDonalds after taking her pony inside with her, after being told she couldn't go through the drive-thru on horseback. While waiting in line, the pony relieved herself on the floor. Police reported that, "The sight and smell of this caused obvious distress and upset customers trying to eat, as well as staff members". Other riders in the neighborhood, that use the horse stables or attend nearby riding schools, complained over the inconsistency in McDonald's policy. One rider claimed to have gone through the drive-thru several times on horseback and had always been served.

Rare Zonkey Born In Italy

In Italy, a zebra-donkey hybrid was born at an animal reserve in Florence. The rare hybrid is called a zonkey. Serena Aglietti, whose family runs the animal reserve, says Ippo the zonkey is a mix of an endangered donkey breed and a zebra, and the only one of it's kind in Italy. Your Emergency Fund: How Much Is Enough?

Have you ever had one of those months? The water heater stops heating, the dishwasher stops washing and your family ends up on a first-name basis with the nurse at urgent care. Then, as you're driving to work, giving yourself your best, "You can make it!" pep talk, you see smoke seeping out from under your hood.

Bad things happen to the best of us, and instead of conveniently spacing themselves out, they almost always come in waves. The important thing is to have a financial life preserver, in the form of an emergency cash fund, at the ready.

Although many people agree that an emergency fund is an important resource, they're not sure how much to save or where to keep the money. Others wonder how they can find any extra cash to sock away. One survey found that 28% of Americans don't have any emergency savings at all.

How Much Money?

When starting an emergency fund, you'll want to set a target amount. But how much is enough? Unfortunately, there is no "one-size-fits-all" answer. The ideal amount for your emergency fund may depend on your financial situation and lifestyle. For example, if you own your home or provide for a number of dependents, you may be more likely to face financial emergencies. And if the crisis you face is a job loss or injury that affects your income, you may need to depend on your emergency fund for an extended period of time.

Coming Up with Cash

If saving several months of income seems an unreasonable goal, don't despair. Start with a more modest target, such as saving \$1,000. Build your savings at regular intervals, a bit at a time. It may help to treat the transaction like a bill you pay each month. Consider setting up an automatic monthly transfer to make self-discipline a matter of course. You may want to consider paying off any credit card debt before you begin saving.

Once you see your savings begin to build, you may be tempted to use the account for something other than an emergency. Try to budget and prepare separately for bigger expenses you know are coming. Keep your emergency money separate from your checking account so that it's harder to dip into.

Where Do I Put It?

An emergency fund should be easily accessible, which is why many people choose traditional bank savings accounts. Savings accounts typically offer modest rates of return. Certificates of Deposit may provide slightly higher returns than savings accounts, but your money will be locked away until the CD matures, which could be several months to several years.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporate insures bank accounts and certificates of deposit (CD) up to \$250,000 per depositor, per institution in principal and interest. CDs are time deposits offered by banks, thrift institutions, and credit unions. CDs offer a slightly higher return than a traditional bank savings account, but they also may require a higher amount of deposit. If you sell before the CD reaches maturity, you may be subject to penalties.

Some individuals turn to money market accounts for their emergency savings. Money market funds are considered low-risk securities, but they're not backed by any government institution so it is possible to lose money. Depending on your particular goals and the amount you have saved, some combination of lower-risk investments may be your best choice.

Money held in money market funds is not insured or guaranteed by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or any other government agency. Money market funds seek to preserve the value of your investment at \$1.00 a share. However, it is possible to lose money by investing in a money market fund. The SRWMD continues its Phase I Water Shortage Advisory, urging reduction or elimination of unnecessary water usage.

The hydrologic conditions report is a compilation of water resource data collected from radar-derived rainfall estimates, groundwater and surface water levels, and river flows, among other sources.

The district encompasses all or parts of 15 counties in north-central Florida, including Madison County and the eastern portion of Jefferson County.



North Florida Community College Installs Fourth Public Art Piece On Campus Tallahassee Artist Ira Hill Creates Six-Foot Terrazzo Table Made Of Recycled Goods For NFCC Campus



The latest addition to NFCC's impressive public art collection is a six-foot mosaic terrazzo table created by Tallahassee artist Ira Hill. Featuring vibrant colors and a koi pond theme, the table has been placed at an outdoor study and gathering area for students near NFCC's Marshall W. Hamilton Library. The piece can function as a table or as a sitting area for students and campus visitors.

"We started a public art program in 2009 in order to create a unique experience for our students to work closely with a visiting artist and also to

MADISON, FL – If you take a walk across the North Florida Community College campus in Madison, you will find public art works that include a colorful mosaic mural depicting a forest scene complete with metal sculpture flowers planted in front at NFCC's Hardee Center for the Arts, a metal sculptured sea turtle near the entrance of the college library and a metal sculpture inspired by Florida's regional plants perched upon a hill near NFCC's Van H. Priest Auditorium. Each piece was created with the help of area professional artists who worked directly with NFCC students on the projects.

bring one permanent art work to campus per year," said NFCC Art Director Lisa Thompson. "All of our projects include an environmental theme, whether it be through the imagery and content or demonstrated by the materials used. I am so pleased with Ira Hill's work; it adds a wonderful pop of color and fits right into the relaxing environment complimented by the new rain garden area near the library. I think students will enjoy taking a moment to sit, relax and enjoy the scenery."

The table is constructed of terrazzo, a decorative concrete made of cement, sand and glass, using 100% recycled glass. Hill spent around 60 hours making the table and started with the simple process of sorting and crushing the glass. The process then included creating the specific design, creating molds and polishing the terrazzo stone to highlight the glass aggregate. Terrazzo has a long history in building and is often associated with Art Deco Design.

"I enjoy using terrazzo as a creative medium for three reasons; colorfulness, durability, and resourcefulness," said Hill. "Knowing these pieces are created with recycled materials in a durable medium that will last over time is also very fulfilling."

Hill specializes in cast metals, cast concrete, mold making and metal fabrication. While creating the piece for NFCC, he presented two student workshops at the College, teaching students about aluminum casting as well as plaster mold making.

Hill is originally from Kokomo, Indiana. He received a Bachelor of Fine Art in photography, printmaking and sculpture from The University of Alabama and a Master of Fine Art in sculpture from Florida State University. In 2013 he was awarded an Artist Fellowship with Salem Art Works in Salem, New York. He received the Ed Love Outdoor Sculpture Award from FSU in 2004 and in 2005 was FSU's Master Craftsman Artist in Residence. His art has been featured on the University of Alabama's Mars Field Journal and he was a NICHE Award finalist (NICHE Magazine, Baltimore, Maryland) in 2010.

"I was happy to work with the members of NFCC in creating a piece that compliments the installation space and appropriate subject matter for their outdoor art collection."

Fourteen Madison County Farms have been recognized as Century Pioneer Family Farms, and more are eligible.

To be a Century Pioneer Family Farm, the farm has to have been in the family for 100 or more years. The program, initiated by the Florida Department of Agriculture under Commissioner Doyle Conner, Sr., works to acknowledge family farms for their contributions to Florida's agriculture and economy, and their perseverance in family ownership.

The farm has to have been in continuous family ownership, even if it is not the original acreage or crop. Title to the property must be in the name of an adopted relative of a descendant of the original owner, or the original owner's blood relative.

The farm owners in Madison County are as follows: Hugh W. Blair, W.H. Cason, Jeanette Hadden, Mary L. Johnson, Clifford Leslie, Dewayne Leslie, Donald F. Loper, Waldon L. Richardson, Harvey E. Rye, Sr., James J. Sale, Jr., Edward W. Smith, Jr., W.J. Spradley, Jr., Donnie G. Waldrep, and Albert W. Waldrep.

"One of the most interesting applications I have received was from the Blairs in Madison County," said

Susan Reese, Deputy Director of External Affairs and contact for the Century Pioneer Family Farm Program. "They had the original land grant that was signed in January of 1854 by President Franklin Pierce."

Owners that apply for this program are awarded a certificate and a sign. To apply, visit <http://florida-agriculture.com/business/awards/century/> and download the simple, two-page application and include documentation (land grant, deeds, etc.).

"If you don't already have documentation," Reese explains, "the local Clerk of Courts will be able to help you out."

Reese also lauded Commissioner Adam Putnam, who she says, "understands the importance of recognizing the heritage of our farmers and our Florida's agricultural heritage. He is interested in Florida History in agriculture, and history in general. He has been very supportive of this program."

Reese, herself, is also most helpful, and can be reached by calling (850) 617-7700 with any questions. She encourages applications for those who qualify. The program grants recognition with no cost to family farms and many helpful aides along the way, so "there's no reason not to apply," said Reese.

FSA Helps Farmers In Need

If you are an existing farmer, rancher, beekeeper or any other type of agricultural partner, you probably already know about the Farm Service Agency in your county. If you are thinking that agriculture on some level is something that you would like to explore, then you need to become familiar with the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA).

Mark Demott is the local County Executive Director for the FSA and can help you with the many programs the agency has to offer. Demott stated "whether you rent or own, are an established or beginning farmer, there is a program that will likely be able to assist you with anything related to agriculture." Demott covers five counties and divides his time between two offices, one in Monticello and the other in Madison. The counties he as-

sists are Jefferson, Leon, Madison, Taylor and Wakulla.

The programs offered by the FSA include:

Farm Loans – Farmers and ranchers who can't obtain commercial credit from a bank, Farm Credit institution or other lender can apply for a loan. These loans could be for operating expenses that include livestock, equipment, feed, seed or fertilizer. Ownership loans that purchase or improve farmland are also available. If you are a beginning farmer or rancher, a rural youth, minority or a woman there is a FSA loan for you as well.

Conservation Programs works with farmers and ranchers to protect and preserve drinking water, soil erosion, wildlife habitat, forests and wetlands.

Disaster Assistance Programs provides assistance for natural disaster losses resulting from drought, flood, fire, freeze, tornadoes, pest infestation and other calamities.

Pinetta Farm Approved For Good Husbandry Grant

Serenity Acres Farm in Pinetta is one of two Florida farms that has been awarded an Animal Welfare Approved Good Husbandry Grant. The grant is intended to improve animal welfare and allow pasture-based farmers, such as Serenity Acres, to increase productivity for their operations and to facilitate the growth and success rate for all pasture-based systems. Documentation proves that when farm animals are managed on open pastures, challenges that may be present in industrial agriculture are non-existent. The results of pasture-based farming is, not only, more humane for the animals, but will lead to more nutritious and healthier products for the consumer. Animal Welfare

Approved standards are presently the most rigorous standards for farm animal welfare currently in use in the United States. Every aspect of each species' lifestyle, from birth to death, is checked. Gaining an Animal Welfare Approved seal is hard earned and demonstrates the farmer's commitment to care of the animals, land and their community. Participation in this program is completely voluntary.

Serenity Acres has been awarded the funding to improve mobile housing for their laying hens. Mobile houses are chicken coops that can be rotated around pastureland so that the chickens have access to graze fresh grass, insects and worms. The University of Florida IFAS Extension says that this practice ensures an even distribution of nutrients and pre-

vents loss of grass caused by over-foraging and scratching. Bare spots in grass, caused by stationary chicken coops, can eventually lead to weed and disease problems in the soil, as well as health problems with the chickens. Benefits to the land and health of the chickens are not the only benefit of mobile coops. Eggs and meat coming from pasture-raised poultry are, considered by nutritionists, to be the highest quality in protein sources and in flavor; obvious benefits to the consumer.



Prepare For Summer's Mosquito Invasion

Jamie Willoughby is a busy man, especially this time of year. He is someone that you may not know, but are thankful for, especially during this time of year. He works for the Public Works Department and is Madison County's Mosquito Control Director. Jamie and Clint Whitfield, spray technician, use the department's two trucks to spray and help keep mosquitoes in the area under control. Spraying usually begins in March or April and will end around October; this is peak time for mosquito infestation. A pyrethrum-based pesticide is sprayed into the air to kill adult mosquitoes. To ensure the pesticide is not overused, a state inspector comes annually to check documentation on the chemical, how it is prepared, how it is stored and if it is being sprayed accurately.

- With all the heavy rains that North Florida has been experiencing, Jamie believes that we could be in for an aggressive mosquito season. The buzzing we hear from mosquitoes when they are preparing for attack and the sting of their bites are annoying, but there are larger concerns when battling these blood-sucking insects. There are three important mosquito-borne diseases that occur in Florida, which makes it important to avoid or repel a mosquito bite.

- West Nile Virus can be transmitted to people and horses by a mosquito already infected with the virus, usually obtained by feeding on infected wild birds. Although, a small number of cases have been results of organ transplants and blood transfusions. People infected may experience flu-like symptoms and a skin rash. More severe symptoms could include convulsions, muscle weakness, paralysis, and one out of every 150 infections results in encephalitis. Horses may experience loss of coordination, teeth grinding, lying and rising with difficulty, facial paralysis, and blindness. West Nile Virus can be treated in both humans and horses. There is a vaccine against WNV for horses, but not for people.

- Saint Louis Encephalitis is both a virus and a disease. Mosquitoes transmit the SLE virus, but the person infected may never develop the disease. SLE disease will actually only infect a small percentage of people, however, if the disease is contracted, it can cause very serious illness and even death. Incidence of the disease is greater in people 60 years and older, as is encephalitis, the most severe symptom associated with SLE. August through November is when transmission of the virus is most likely to occur. There is no vaccine for SLE.

- Eastern Equine Encephalitis is a virus, given to mosquitoes by wild birds, where it can then be transmitted to horses and people. Symptoms in horses include unsteadiness, erratic behavior, and a marked loss of coordination. Most people infected with the virus have no symptoms. Some people will get a mild flu-like illness with fever, headache and sore throat. When serious infection of the central nervous system occur, a sudden fever and severe headache can be followed quickly by seizures and coma, which will often result in death or permanent brain damage. There is no effective treatment for EEE. There is a vaccine for horses, but not for humans.

Prevention of mosquito bites is crucial in the fight against mosquito-borne disease. The best way to avoid a bite is to avoid infected areas, wear protective clothing, and wear insect repellent. Help protect you and your family by implementing the list below:

- Stay indoors during peak biting time (sunrise to sunset).
- Wear protective clothing that covers the skin during peak times, such as long-sleeved shirts and pants.
- Wear mosquito repellents containing DEET when outside during peak times.
- Avoid areas that mosquitoes hide; swampy areas, areas with standing water and areas with tall grass, weeds or brush around homes or other buildings.
- Check and repair all screens and screen doors.
- Dispose of empty buckets, pots, old tires, etc. that may be holding water.
- Clip tall grass and weeds near your house and nearby ponds.
- Remove leaf litter, standing water and debris

from roof gutters and pool covers.

- Flush out water in birdbaths and outdoor pet dishes every three to four days.
- If you think you have a mosquito infestation, use the mosquito prevention list above. If you need further assistance you can call Jamie Willoughby at the Public Works Department - 850-973-6495.


