



Greenville Council Meeting Draws Heated Debate

The Town Council held a special session this past Tuesday, August 6, to continue discussions concerning advertisement for a new Town Manager and maintenance for the town's cemetery, Evergreen. Both items on the agenda have been topics of contention and have caused a split in the council when addressing possible solutions.

Advertisement for a Town Manager centers on the upcoming budget and if, in fact, there will be

funds to pay a new manager. Two of the council members oppose immediate advertisement because of the possible lack of funds. Interim Town Manager, Jim Parrish, advised that they should know if the budget will support a Town Manager's salary by the end of August, but final budget approval will not be until the end of September of this year. After a heated discussion, a majority vote was made to continue with plans for immediate advertisement. The advertisement will run stating the position is

Playground Equipment Being Installed At New Park

A City of Madison Public Works crew has begun installing additional playground equipment at newly-named Sumpter James Recreation Park on Martin Luther King Jr., Drive.

The playground equipment, relocated from the former playground across from Lake Frances in Madison, will be prepped and painted bright colors once installation is complete. A soft playground surface will be put in place. A border around the perimeter of the playground will give it shape.

The city will soon schedule a ribbon cutting to officially open the park. Until then, the park is a construction site, and the playground equipment is off-limits.

Sumpter James Recreation Park is one of two parks recently named by the City Commission. The other one is Jesse Solomon Recreation Park near Jeanette Circle in Madison. This park features a fishing pond and will undergo a ribbon-cutting in the near future.

Georgia Tax-Free Weekend Set For Friday And Saturday

For those who missed last week's Florida Back to School tax free weekend, or who are still looking for a break when buying back-to-school items, North Floridians are fortunate because Georgia's tax free holiday is this weekend.

The limits in Georgia are slightly higher than they were in Florida. For clothing, consumers can spend up to \$100 per item; for school supplies, \$20 per item; and for computers, \$1,000.

Impulse Buying Can Be Costly

Most of us at some time or another will buy something on the spur of the moment, without a plan or thought. Credit cards help make this practice easy. Money experts estimate that only three out of ten purchases are decided upon in advance, while about half of all purchases are made completely on impulse.

Think of the times you go to the store for one or two items in mind and check out with a full cart. Or you run to a mall on the weekend just to look and leave with a trunk full of sale items. After all, it's a bargain if you never wear it, or so that little voice inside would have you believe.

It takes a conscious plan to gain control of that compulsive habit we call impulse buying. A shopping list is essential whether it is a mental one or a well thought out written plan. Your grocery list as well as your household supplies, gifts, clothing, appliance or home furnishings list should allow some flexibility so you can switch and save, but it is a guide to keep you on track with your purchases.

University of Florida Extension Family and Consumer Economics Specialists, suggest you ask yourself three basic questions to help you separate impulse buying from planned purchases.

Do I need it? The answer to this question can immediately weed out impulse buying.

Will I use it? The answer to this ques-

tion can be misleading. It is easy to convince yourself that you will use most anything, but further analysis will help clarify the answer. Add the questions: "How will I use it?" and "How soon will I use it?"

Can I afford it? This probably is the true test. You can answer this question by asking another: "What will I have to give up if I buy this item now?" The answer to these questions separates impulse items from necessities. They tell if you can have those things you could live without but that would be more fun to have.

To avoid the drain that is caused by impulse buying:

Shop alone. It is usually easier to say no to yourself than to a spouse, child or friend.

Shop when you are refreshed. If you are tired, you won't be as willing to take time to compare prices, to consider uses and to answer the three questions that weed out impulse buying.

Shop for food when you are not hungry. Hungry shoppers tend to buy more.

Shop less often. Consumers who have difficulty controlling impulse buying can avoid the temptation by making fewer shopping trips.

Shop sales, but be alert! Just because it is on sale does not mean it is a good buy for you or your family. Modify your shopping behavior to eliminate impulse buying from your spending patterns.

Excited, I ran to tell my great-aunts who lived down the lane from my Granny the good news. I got to the house and told Aunt Cherry and Aunt Laura I had a new sister: I told them her name was...her name was...I forgot. My five-year-old brain couldn't remember the name of my beautiful brand new little sister.

One of the aunts asked me, "Is it Abbie Gail?" "That's it," I said, excitedly, then realized they had already heard the news before I got there.

I would never forget Abbie's name again. She has been a gift from God that my family has embraced since August 9, 1969.

As a baby, Abbie rarely, if ever, cried. She didn't learn to walk or even crawl very much until she was over two years old. Once Mama was trying to wean her off the bottle and Sally, the youngest child in the family, who would later die from cystic fibrosis, went and got the bottle for her. Sally wasn't old enough to walk at the time but she could crawl and she crawled into my parents' bedroom really fast and raised herself up to their bed, where she knew Abbie's bottle was. She put the bottle in her mouth like a puppy and carried it back to Abbie. Abbie always loved Sally and you could tell that Sally loved Abbie.

When Abbie was six years old,

she underwent heart surgery. She came through the life-threatening surgery with flying colors, thanks to God and the prayers of so many.

I wish that I had the caring kind heart and the personality that my sister does. Though she is mentally challenged and hardly ever talks, she never forgets a friend and they never forget her. A few years ago, we were in Denny's when Abbie walked up to a table where some people were sitting and she was smiling at them. I walked up to the table to apologize and told them she was just saying, "Hello." To my surprise, they said, "It's okay. We know her." They had worked at her school 30 years earlier and remembered Abbie Gail.

Last year, I had stopped at a produce stand in Monticello. Abbie was with me and, as we were walking up to it, a woman was walking out. The woman looked at her and said, "Abbie Gail!" She turned to me and asked, "Is that Abbie Gail?" I told her it was. She told me her name was Vivian Thompson and she had driven Abbie's school bus sometimes and she thought about Abbie all the time and that she had been one of her favorite students.

Abbie has made an impact on so many lives. She has definitely made an impact on mine. She has taught me to be kind and show compassion to those less fortunate and to fight through adversity. I thank the Lord every day for giving me the family that He did and I thank Him for my "baby sister," Abbie.

Open Borders?

Judicial Watch has published a report "A Timeline of the Obama Administration's Four Year-Long Conspiracy to Grant Amnesty to Illegal Aliens by Dismantling Enforcement of Our Laws Against Illegal Immigration." The material for this report was produced through separate efforts by Senator Jeff Sessions and his staff, and the Federation for American Immigration Reform (F.A.I.R.). This report lists 35 incidents of disregard for current immigration law as exposed by the forced release of DHS documents under the Freedom of Information Act, which prove that DHS has abandoned background checks on illegal aliens. Summit,' the leaders continue to promote the scheme as enhancing both 'security' and 'prosperity' in their joint statement following their gathering.

"One of the reasons given for the necessity of the North American Union is the problem of the 'porous' border between the United States and Mexico. The 'solution' is to merge the countries and establish a 'security perimeter' at the south end of Mexico. Hence, the globalists promoting this regional union do not want to solve the illegal immigration problem. Promoting open borders, with all the costs associated with it, is intended to sell the American people on the necessity of a trilateral North American Union. (see: The Late Great USA by Jerome Corsi, Threshold Edition, 2007).

"The regionalization of North America and other regions in the world into ten regions is just another step in the direction of a 'one-world government,'... As Christian citizens who have come into this country legally, we need to uphold the sovereignty of our nation and resist this one-world government that the globalists refer to as 'the New World Order.'"

The so called "Gang of Eight" has spent much time crafting Senate Bill S.744, which has passed that body of government and is now being pondered by the House of Representatives.

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Getting a divorce is a painful, emotional process. Don't be in such a hurry to reach a settlement that you make poor decisions that can have life-long consequences. The most important task you can do is getting your finances organized. Identify all your assets and make copies of important financial papers, such as deeds, tax returns, and investment records. When it comes to dividing up your assets, consider mediation as a low-cost alternative to litigation. Most states have equitable-distribution laws that require shared assets to be divided 50/50 anyway. When a divorce becomes contentious, attorney's fees can accumulate.

temporary and part-time.

The second item of the agenda held as much debate, if not more, on the maintenance of the Evergreen Cemetery. The estate of Council Bush, who was a lifelong resident of Greenville, has been providing maintenance through a private trust provided for the care of the cemetery at no charge to the town or plot owners. Two trustees of the estate were present at the current meeting. The debate of the maintenance began several months ago when the trustees of the Bush estate informed the town of the dwindling funds. They offered to continue to mow but requested help with additional landscaping, such as weeding and edging. The original meeting on the cemetery and decision of the council was to use the Department of Corrections (DOC) for the ad-

ditional maintenance. The second meeting of the council brought concerns from Mayor Kovacherich Arnold that DOC could not be used due to the cemetery having private property by way of deeds on plots purchased. He also stated that after discussion with the DOC Warden that they were no longer willing to help with the landscaping. This past meeting on Tuesday was emotional and tense with members of the council as well as concerned citizens in attendance. Bush trustee, Joe Reams III, addressed the council and stated that the Bush estate was willing to dissolve their maintenance contract and to allow DOC to care for the cemetery in its entirety if necessary to resolve the matter. This left the council with two decisions: DOC would completely care for the cemetery or the town would have to pay for maintenance. After much discussion, a majority vote was to continue using the Bush trust for the mowing and it was unsure about the additional landscaping. After the motion had been voted on, Mr. Reams again addressed the council stating that whether it was voted or not, they were under no obligation to continue, but would provide services as they could, due to the lack of funding in the trust.

The meeting ended leaving strong emotions in both council members and citizens after the voicing of differing opinions.

Talk Show Host Gives Away Babies On Air

Aamir Liaquat Hussain, a popular Pakistani talk show host is known for being fierce in his battle for ratings, but his latest screening has many Pakistanis expressing disgust. His latest stunt was giving away two abandoned infant girls to childless families and has future plans to continue. The Chhipa Welfare Association provided the babies and says they are happy to provide the next. The association is searching garbage dumps and other sites for discarded newborns. Poverty and illness have caused families to discard or even kill babies. A notice on Hussain's website states, "If any family cannot afford to bring up their newborn baby due to poverty or illness, then instead of killing them, they should hand over the baby to Dr. Aamir." The show's producers did not respond to calls and were not clear if the poor families wishing to keep their children would also be helped.

Attack Goose Keeps Meter Reader From Home

In Norsewood, New Zealand, Lyn McConchie, homeowner, called the Norsewood electric company after her bill didn't arrive in the mail. The receptionist informed her that under the notation of "unable to access property" it was written, "ferocious gander" by the meter reader. McConchie says she owns a gander (a mature male goose) who keeps guard when she's away from home and has been known to bite late-night prowlers.

Montreal Man Ordered To Pay Large Sum To Panhandler

In Montreal, a man who called a local panhandler "overweight," a "drunk" and "with no apparent IQ," was later ordered to pay the panhandler \$7,708 by the Quebec Human Rights Commission. The Canadian man wrote the words in an email that he sent to the manager of a liquor store where the panhandler stays a few days a week. The 60-year-old plus woman suffers from a degenerative bone disease and says she panhandles to supplement her social assistance payments. In his email, the man further suggested "solutions" to the city's panhandling problem, including a "Chinese solution" proposing the panhandlers each get "a bullet to the neck and send the bill for the bullet to the deceased bum's family." A liquor store representative said the customer had previously sent hostile emails to the store. The store shared the email with the woman who was advised by police to go to the Human Rights Commission.

London Sewer Collects 16 Ton Mass Of Fat

In London, a British water company removed what they called a "fatberg," which is a mass made up of food fat and wet wipes. The mass was removed from a sewer beneath a London suburb. The fatberg weighed 16.5 tons and could have led to flooding in homes and on the streets if it hadn't been removed. Gordon Hailwood, waste contracts supervisor said, "While we've moved greater volumes of fat in the past, we've never seen a single, congealed lump of lard this big...we reckon it has to be the biggest such berg in British history."

Movie Review: Red 2



Red 2

Starring Bruce Willis, John Malkovich & Helen Mirren

Directed by Dean Parisot

PG-13, 116 min.

A sequel to the surprise 2010 hit, this comedy-espionage romp reunites the original cast of Bruce Willis, John Malkovich and Helen Mirren as a trio of elite CIA assassins forced once again out of retirement to blast the rust off their not-quite-over-the-hill stuff.

As with the first movie, which was also based on the comic-book series of the same name, much of the fun comes from the basic setup of seeing stars well into AARP range rip-roaring away in slam-bang action-y stuff typically done by actors with fewer miles on their odometers.

This time around, Willis' younger doe-eyed girlfriend (Mary-Louise Parker) gets a much bigger role, Catherine Zeta-Jones plays a sultry Soviet secret agent, and Anthony Hopkins shows up midway through

the movie as a British brainiac with ties to a deadly, decades-old Cold War secret.

The movie's title is an abbreviation derived from the special-ops designation given to Willis' character, Frank Moses: "Retired, Extremely Dangerous."

Willis plays his part in the cool, collected "Die Hard" mode that he's been keeping in handy quick-release storage since the '80s. As his partner, Marvin, Malkovich is a colorful, paranoid kook. Mirren, an Oscar-winning actress, seems to relish her role as a regal British spy with a license to kill; the scene where she dispenses relationship advice to Frank over the phone while tidily pouring acid on a recently dispatched body in her bathtub is a dark-chuckle hoot.

But for all the star power of the cast, there's something about the performances that seem a bit weary and dreary, especially when compared to the sizzle of Byung-hun Lee, the electrifying young South Korean star who plays the hit man as-

signed to hunt Moses down, or the ice-cold, muscular menace conveyed by Neal McDonough as the corrupt C.I.A. agent also tracking Moses and his crew as they skip and quip their way through London, Paris and Moscow.

Director Dean Parisot, who hasn't left many tracks on the big screen as he's been steering TV episodes of "Justified," "The Good Wife," "Modern Family" and "Monk," jams all the pieces of this big, bang-bang jigsaw puzzle together, but not everything quite fits. Some of the pacing doesn't work, jokes fall flat, and sometimes scenes seem so jarringly out of place from what just happened seconds before that I'm still wondering if the filmmakers believed that simply seeing John Malkovich in boots, a stupid hat and shorts could somehow swipe your short-term memory clean of things you'd just seen minutes ago.

The original "Red" brought in nearly \$200 million at the international box office, so there will probably be a lot of folks who'll line up again to see Willis and Co. camp it up, shoot it up, and blow it up. But there are likely others who'll find all the blasting, booming and joking about terrorism, bombs, information leaks and torture hitting a little too uncomfortably close to home.

But if "Red 2" starts feeling too real, you can remind yourself how much of a ridiculous flight of fancy it really is. This is a movie, after all, that came from a comic book, the collective age of its main stars is over 300, and no one (not even the esteemed Helen Mirren) can shoot with accuracy from pistols in both hands, out of the open windows of a spinning car, even if it IS spinning in super slo-mo.

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



Youth Adventure Camp Set For August 12-16

The Madison County Sheriff's Office will be facilitating a five day Youth Adventure Camps for girls Aug. 12-16.

The Sheriff's Office started these camps last summer when they hosted their first camp for boys. The boys ranged in ages from 9-16. Captain Mark W. Joost and Deputy Tracy W. Dowdy were the primary facilitators for the camp, but many others helped to make the week a success. The vision for these camps started approximately seven years prior while Capt. Joost was assisting Sheriff Ben J. Stewart campaign for sheriff. Around that time, Joost transported two suicidal nine-year-old boys to a mental health facility in Tallahassee. Sheriff Stewart and Capt. Joost had encountered countless similar situations during their law enforcement careers. Prior to this, Capt. Joost had been facilitating overnight youth kayak, canoe and

hiking trips through his church and both law enforcement officers had been doing weekly Bible studies through a local juvenile detention facility. For many years, the law enforcement officers witnessed the struggles that families in their community had to deal with. For some, it may be single parent households. For others, it may be two parents struggling to make ends meet. They discussed the potential benefits of reaching out to the youth of our community while demonstrating life skills. They felt this adventure camp concept would draw boys and girls away from TVs, computers, cell phones and destructive activities while encouraging a passion for adventure. These law enforcement officers noted an unfortunate dynamic concerning the youth they came in contact with in their profession as well as through the juvenile detention facility.

A large number of these children come from broken homes, homes with preoccupied parents, or homes where both parents are struggling to support their families. Capt. Joost and Sheriff Stewart discussed the positive benefits of a faith-based mini leadership course for the youth of our county. They both felt that this was an important role for them as Christians and also a positive way for the Sheriff's Office to connect with our community. Capt. Joost and Sheriff Stewart wanted to challenge the participants and expand their comfort zones while developing a sense of adventure and a love for the outdoors.

Last year's Youth Adventure Camp included the N.R.A. Basic Rifle class, hands-on firearms training, health and fitness training, archery, live K-9 tracks with the Madison Correctional Institution K-9 team, knot tying, rappelling, hiking, canoeing,

kayaking, swimming, leadership and life skills. Fly-fishing and primitive knife making will also be added to this summer's camp. The camps will take place from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. Monday thru Friday. The camps are faith-based, but all youth... regardless of their spiritual beliefs... are welcome to attend. The Madison County Sheriff's Office concealed carry weapon courses help finance these camps so they are free to the participants. If anyone, or any organization, would like to cook a meal, sponsor a meal, or donate for this camp, please contact Captain Joost. There will be 12 to 14 slots for this camp. Female sheriff office employees will be assisting as chaperones for the camp, but parents or guardians may also be able to assist if interested. 

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

Add roasted tomatoes to salads and pizzas, toss in pasta, or serve on top of bruschetta. Also try them right out of the oven, eased onto individual plates and sprinkled with Parmigiano Reggiano.

Of course, roasting tomatoes is a natural for the peak of the tomato season, but even in the dead of winter, when decent tomatoes seem impossible to find, roasting is the way to go.

Roasted Tomatoes

Roasting concentrates tomatoes' natural sugars and flavors and gives them a buttery rich texture

12 Roma tomatoes or round red tomatoes

1 tablespoon olive oil

1/2 teaspoon coarse salt

Freshly ground black pepper

3 garlic cloves, sliced

1. Preheat oven to 400F.
2. Slice and core tomatoes. Place on parchment-lined baking sheet. Drizzle with olive oil, sprinkle with salt, pepper and sliced garlic. Bake 30 to 60 minutes, until juices have evaporated. Store in a plastic zip-top bag in refrigerator or freezer. You can also slow roast tomatoes in a 250F oven 3 to 4 hours. Serves 6.

We can remember when roasted tomatoes listed as an ingredient in a recipe would have sent cooks scurrying to their cookbooks for an explanation. "Roast" and "tomato" were not words they were used to hearing in the same sentence. Even if they were compatible, they sounded like something best left in the hands of professional chefs.

As it turns out, roasting tomatoes is so simple it can barely be called "cooking." If you can cut tomatoes into halves, arrange the pieces comfortably in a baking pan, and drizzle them with a little oil, you can roast tomatoes. Still, for cooks who are in the habit of steaming and stir-frying vegetables, we were curious about what we might be missing.

For more about roasting, we went to Shirley O. Corriher, a culinary guru who has spent years studying the ins-and-outs of cooking. In her book CookWise (Morrow, 1997), Corriher explains that when vegetables are roasted, the liquid released by their cells immediately evaporates, leaving behind a

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
