Three Women Arrested For Battery And Cruelty To A Child

Three Greenville women were arrested for battery and cruelty to a child on Monday, Oct. 14.

According to a Madison County Sheriff's Office report, Deputy Brad Johnson was dispatched to the S&J Deli in Greenville in reference to a large crowd fighting in the parking lot.

The dispatcher notified Johnson that several of the people fighting had sticks, mace and other items.

Johnson arrived at the scene with Capt. Mark Joost and Cpl. Kevin Anderson.

The officers were made aware that the women involved in the fracas were Maxzine Roberson, 26, Valarie Roberson, 29, and Louise Garrison, 23, and that they were at the Haffye Hays Park.

A witness told Johnson officers that the three women had started fighting with the two victims, a man and a woman. A two-year-old, belonging to Valarie Roberson, was endangered in the fight. Family mem-

bers took the child, with her approval.

Valarie Roberson, Maxzine Roberson and Louise Garrison were taken to jail.

A copy of the report was faxed to the Department of Children and Families.

Former Sheriff Joe Peavy Is "A Blessed Man"

"I am really a blessed man," said former sheriff Joe Peavy as he recuperated at his home Tuesday afternoon, speaking of his encounter with a runaway tractor the previous week, while he was working on his farm. After tangling with that tractor and the Bush Hog mowing machine behind it, he lived to tell the tale.

"The Lord must have something else for me to do," is the way he sees it.

About 4:30 p.m. on Oct. 10, he went out to his shed to try to crank the tractor while standing beside it. It started up, but then it began to coast slowly backward.

When Peavy reached over for the controls to try to stop it, he accidentally knocked it into gear. The big tractor suddenly lurched forward and knocked him to the ground.

He was blessed with two bits of incredible good luck: first, that he fell between the two rear tires instead of under them, and second, that the Bush Hog mower was in the raised position, a little over a foot off the ground. Knocked onto his back, Peavy managed to squirm his head out between the right rear tire and the outer edge of the mowing machine just as it passed over him. He recalls the sound of the big mowing blades "whipping around in the air" above him, and just like the old adage, he saw his whole life flash before

his eyes.

The idling tractor continued moving forward, back into the shed, where it plowed through the rear wall and into a cow pen, before somehow turning right and crashing through another fence, into the backyard.

Meanwhile, Peavy had scrambled to his feet, chased after it, caught up with it and switched it off just as his wife, Suzanne, drove up, saw what had happened and told him she was taking him to the hospital.

He knew he had been hit, but, still running on adrenaline, he didn't think he had been hurt that badly and protested that he didn't need to go to the hospital. Then he looked down and saw the blood running from his arms, leg, and middle.

"They took real good care of me at the hospital," he said. X-rays of his skinned-up arms and a CAT scan revealed no broken bones and no internal injuries, but he had plenty of abrasions, cuts and bruises, including one large bruise covering his entire right side. The bigger cuts and lacerations had to be stitched up and bandaged along with the skinned areas on his arms and legs.

By Tuesday, as he sat on his couch, he talked about cows he had penned up the day before and some calves he had taken to the livestock market earlier that morning. Out in the backyard, the tractor was still parked where he had stopped it a few days earlier, with the steering wheel twisted out of shape and the muffler bent over the top. The next day, he said, a man was supposed to come by and start fixing everything.

As a former sheriff for 28 years, a trooper in Madison for 16 years before that, and a paratrooper with the army in World

MPD TO HOST DOWNTOWN HALLOWEEN



Madison County Extension Service Misconceptions About Money May Be Costly

Spending habits are influenced by personal values and attitudes about money. Some people develop behaviors that may not be in their best interest. According to the Institute of Consumer Financial Education, misconceptions about money practices can end up causing financial problems. Let's explore some common misconceptions about money that can lead to financial ruin.

The first misconception some consumers have is that credit cards are money. Because that plastic lets you purchase something without paying cash, it may easily be confused to be the same as money. Credit purchases are actually a debt that you will have to pay later and if it isn't paid in full when the bill is due, interest is added. Ideally, you should charge only what you can

pay off when the bill is due. Extension family financial specialists recommend you charge no more than you are able to pay off within three months.

A second misconception which is related to the first, is to pay the minimum payment on a credit card. A consumer might justify the practice by thinking it leaves more money for other purchases during the month. In reality, the true cost of credit adds up quickly. If you just pay the minimum amount due, you end up paying much more over time. For example, if you charged \$1,000 on a credit card with an 18% interest rate and made the minimum payment each month without adding another purchase; it would take six years to pay off the balance and cost \$1,040 in interest! Yes, you would pay more in interest than the cost of the original purchase. Now, think about the fact that most people continue to buy and leave a balance on their credit card all of the time. The cost of credit is expensive and will keep you in debt for years.

A third misconception about money is not having a savings account. You might think interest rates on a savings account are so low, it isn't worth the effort. Reframe your attitude and think of savings as an emergency

fund. You need money set aside to pay for unexpected expenses like a car or home repairs. If you have no cash in a savings account, unexpected bills will have to be added to a credit card which increases your debt load. So, having an emergency fund will give the money to pay for unexpected expenses and keep credit debts down.

Another misconception people have is to use the equity in their home to increase personal buying power. It isn't wise to pull out the equity in your home to pay off bills or go on vacation. Equity in your home increases your net worth, so leave it alone.

Common sense goes a long way to keep you on track with the way you handle money. Develop a spending plan that helps you live within your income and save for emergencies. You can take a proactive role and direct money where you want it to go. A good financial start is to live on 70% of your income, save and invest 20%, then dedicate 10% for giving. Jacob's Ladder Remembering Robert

Friday, Oct. 18, would have been my brother's 49th birthday.

Born Robert William Bemby, Robert was named after my father and after my uncle Billy, whose birthday he shared. Robert died before he was three years old because he had a problem with his lungs. Robert had cystic fibrosis. Advancements today help people with CF live much longer and I am praying that one day a cure for the disease, which affects both the lungs and pancreas, will be found.

My youngest sister, Sally, died of CF, years later, when she was 20 months old.

Although I was only a little over three years old myself when Robert died and nine when Sally died, I re-

member both of them.

Memories of Robert are hazy and fuzzy but I do remember playing with my first playmate and my first buddy. My parents told me the story of finding the two of us, throwing lemons out the back door. They asked us why we were throwing the lemons out, "Because they're spoiled," we replied. "They're sour."

Robert had quite a sense of humor. A television commercial for Hawaiian Punch was popular back then. In the commercial, a cartoon character would walk up to someone and ask them if they would like a Hawaiian Punch and they would reply, "Yes," so he would punch them. Robert would ask people if they would like a "high wide punch" and then he would punch them, though his little hands were not that strong or hard.

Robert also loved the Nancy Sinatra song, "These Boots Are Made for Walking." He had a pair of cowboy boots and he would tell one of our aunts, "Mamie Ann, these boots are going

to walk all over you." His threat would be met with laughter.

The memory that is most vivid of Robert is when he and I were playing and he said he didn't feel good and he vomited. I can remember feeling sorry for him at the time, although I didn't know why.

There was really no reason to feel sorry for Robert. He got to go meet the Lord before he turned three. He died between Monticello and Tallahassee as he was being transported by ambulance from Madison to Tallahassee Memorial Hospital.

My parents knew the tragedy of losing three children, including the sister that would die before Robert. Susie was born premature and died two months after she was born.

Saudi Arabian Driving Ban On Women Debated

In Saudi Arabia, a campaign to overthrow the ban on women driving has spread rapidly and gained support from some prominent women activists. A specific law does not back the ban on women driving, however, only men are granted driving licenses. Women can be fined for driving without a license and have even been detained and put on trial on charges of political protest. Sheikh Saleh bin Saad al-Lohaidan said women aiming to overturn the ban on driving should put "reason ahead of their hearts, emotions and passions." A judicial advisor to an association of Gulf psychologists, bin Saad al-Lohaidan also stated that, "If a woman drives a car, not out of pure necessity, that could have negative physiological impacts as functional and physiological medical studies show that it automatically affects the ovaries and pushes the pelvis upwards. That is why we find those (women) who regularly drive have children with clinical problems of varying degrees." bin Saad al-Lohaidan did not cite specific medical studies to support his arguments.

Intoxicated Man Falls From Balcony

In Kemerovo, Russia, a man fell eight stories after falling from a balcony, landed on a car and survived. Kemerovo police said the man had allegedly been arguing with his girlfriend while heavily intoxicated when he lost his footing and fell from the balcony. Police stated, "Despite falling from such a height, the man survived and was even able to get to his feet unaided after the fall." The man was taken to a hospital where doctors said he was not seriously injured.

Nude Man Jumps Onto Vehicles At Traffic Lights

In Indianapolis, Indiana, a 37-year-old man was witnessed to be running through traffic nude and then jumping on top vehicles while they were stopped at traffic lights. The man who reported the hopping streaker said the naked man jumped onto his truck and then attempted to jump onto the back of a van, before pulling on a pair of sweat pants. When police arrived, Michael Copeland was observed walking across the street with his pants pulled down, "exposing his full buttocks." Police said Copeland threw a baggie down when they approached and they found a second baggie while searching clothing found on the ground near Copeland, who stated the baggies belonged to him. The baggies contained cocaine and marijuana. Copeland, who had two previous cocaine-related convictions, refused to get in the police van, so his ankles were bound and he was lifted into the vehicle. He was arrested on preliminary charges of public indecency and possession of cocaine and marijuana.

Required Reading: The Economic Report of the President

In March, the White House released its 456-page book, "2013 Economic Report of the President." If you haven't yet made time to peruse this weighty tome, don't beat yourself up. Most people don't take the time to read the report—still others don't even know it exists.

What is the "Economic Report of the President" and what does it tell us about the economy and the future?

In the wake of World War II—and worried that the economy might fall back into another Great Depression—Congress passed the Employment Act of 1946, which established the President's Council of Economic Advisors to analyze government programs and make recommendations on economic policy. It also mandated that the president submit an annual economic report to Congress. The first report was submitted by Harry Truman in 1947.

The report is written by the Chair of the Council of Economic Advisors (a post being filled by Alan B. Krueger) and includes both text and extensive data appendices. It must be submitted to Congress no later than 10 days after the submission of the Federal budget by the President of the United States. Although each report is different, they generally include such information as

- Current and foreseeable trends in employment, production, real income, and Federal expenses
- Employment objectives for various labor sectors

- Annual goals
- A program for carrying out objectives.

Response to the Economic Report is often mixed. Opponents to the administration tend to be critical of the president's approach. They point out that the objectives and recommendations in the report are inevitably influenced by the administration's opinion and policy.

However it's important not to overlook the sheer volume of data provided by the report. This information can help identify the forces driving—or dragging—the economy. For example, the 2013 report provides data and analysis on everything from fiscal policy and health care to agricultural policy and climate change.



AMNESTY DAY 2013

The Solid Waste and Recycling Department will be hosting Amnesty Day for the citizens of Madison County on October 26, 2013, from 9:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m., at the Solid Waste and Recycling Center located at 2040 NE Rocky Ford Road. Amnesty Day is an opportunity for citizens to discard hazardous household waste items, electronic waste, used oil and waste tires. Citizens are permitted to dispose of four (4) waste tires, per household at no cost. Tires beyond the limit of four will cost \$2.00 per tire for disposal. This event is only hosted for citizens to dispose of such items and is not available to businesses. As per guidelines from the Department of Environmental Protection, businesses are required to have a hazardous waste disposal plan with other certified agencies to dispose of their waste. To insure that the disposal of such items is consistent with the guidelines from EPA, and authorized in-county citizen usage, disposal of waste items will be carefully documented. Citizens are urged to be attentive to the following safety tips to avoid injury, as well as referring to the table of information outlining a description of hazardous household waste items.

SAFETY TIPS

1. Do not transport any liquids in an open container; containers must be closed.
2. Take the time to segregate like items before transporting.
3. Make the best effort to cushion glass containers to help prevent breakage.
4. If a liquid solution is not labeled, do not attempt to identify it by smelling.
5. If necessary, make the best effort to wear gloves and masks to prevent injury.
6. Avoid combining liquids that may be potentially explosive or corrosive.

and local businesses to provide unique opportunities for our youth to enhance their chances of attending a post-secondary institution and ready them for the workforce.



Dr. Marie Amanze Sees The Positives Of Breast Cancer Awareness

Dr. Marie Amanze of Hematology Oncology Solutions, the only female oncologist in private practice in Tallahassee, has always been interested in the health care profession in some form. "pretty much all my life," she says. In her native country of Haiti, health care was something that was not available to everyone, but when she came to the United States in 1986, she was amazed at the access almost everyone had to

health care and health care professionals. In 1994, she started medical school at the University of South Florida College of Medicine, with her heart set on becoming an OB/GYN. In the area of medicine, what could be more joyful than delivering babies? Then, her focus changed to internal medicine, because that was the foundation that all other medicine was built on. While she was doing her residency, she met Dr. Nathan Levitan, who would get her started in the direction

of oncology. He was the image of what she believed a doctor ought to be, a person of compassion, someone who was respectful to everyone from the janitor to his colleagues. Here, she believed, was a health care professional she could model herself after. He invited her to work in his clinic, and after two or three times of doing so, she saw that oncology was a field where compassion would go a long way, and she saw herself as a compassionate person. Although there would be

sad moments, and she would lose some patients, she realized that even for terminal patients, she could make a difference in their quality of life. She has now been in oncology since 2001, four years on a fellowship and eight years working in Tallahassee. At first, she was part of a group practice with five other individuals, but the problem was, with six oncologists in the same room, there would be six different opinions. After the group dissolved, she eventually formed her own practice.

Going solo wasn't what she had envisioned for herself. She missed not having a whole group of colleagues to talk to and bounce ideas off of, but after a year and half as a private practitioner, she has found that the support and mentoring is still there. She can email colleagues and refer patients to them and they can refer patients to her. She has also discovered that she is not only good at oncology, she is good at the business side of private practice as well.

Then there is the autonomy. Hospitals are buying up other practices and this autonomy is being lost left and right. She has a wonderful support staff that she was able to choose herself. "I can't say

enough about them...we work well together." At Hematology Oncology Solutions, she sees patients in all stages of illnesses, from pre-diagnosis to treatment to support services and patient education to post-chemotherapy. She can start with patients from the very beginning or take them in the middle as referrals from another doctor. She treats a wide variety of cancers: colon cancer, lung cancer, head and neck cancer, breast cancer, lymphomas and other blood disorders such as sickle cell anemia and other types of anemia...basically, "a little bit of everything."

When it comes to breast cancer, a woman's first line of defense is, "Know your body." That means breast self-exams. Mammograms are very important too, and she doesn't downplay the importance of regular mammograms, "But you know when something is abnormal for you...when something isn't right. Listen to your gut instincts." When a woman finds a lump or something else that shouldn't be there, or finds something that just is-

n't right, "The only mistake is in not getting help," she says. The field of oncology has come a long, long way in the last few years, and there are treatment options available now that weren't there only a few short years ago. There is this sense, when it comes to breast cancer, that "no matter what stage it is, you can make a difference." Because of this, things like breast cancer awareness and Breast Cancer Awareness Month are positive things, she believes. "It lets women know that they are not alone, that there are people out there who can help them. It lets them know that breast cancer is not their fault. We live in a good era when cancer is an open conversation," she says, unlike the era of 30, 40 or 50 years ago, when women lived in fear of 'the c-word' and were afraid to discuss the subject openly. 

58th Annual Florida Forest Festival Set For October 26

With Florida celebrating the 500th anniversary of the arrival of Ponce De Leon in its Viva Florida 500 efforts, the 58th annual Florida Forest Festival in Perry is honoring the state's timber history and its ties to the state's economy and culture with the theme "Viva Florida Forestry."

In conjunction with this look back, several "fan favorite" events,

including the Heritage Day Field Trip and the Great Race 5k Run are returning this year.

More than 20,000 people from around the region are expected to converge on Forest Capital State Park on U.S. 19 Saturday, Oct. 26, but the festivities officially kick off Wednesday, Oct. 23, when the carnival opens for business on Industrial Drive next to Perry-Foley Airport.

Everyone is invited

to return the next evening (Thursday, Oct. 24) for the "fabulous" fireworks display at the airport beginning at 8 p.m.

On Friday morning (Oct. 25), students from local schools will take part in the Heritage Day Field Trip to the Forest Capital State Museum, where they will be able to see demonstrations from Florida's pioneer past along with programs by the Florida Forest Service and live lumberjack shows.

Friday night will see festivities move to historic Downtown Perry for the Strut Your Mutt Dog Parade, held this year at Rosehead Park's Grand Pavilion at 5 p.m.; the annual Kids' Parade, a procession of children dressed in their best "theme-related" costumes around the courthouse square, at 6 p.m.; and the Gaslight Classic Car Parade at 7 p.m.

Concessions, kids' games and more will also be featured.

The classic cars will stream down to Perry Square (Save-a-Lot shopping center) for a street dance featuring live music from the band Southern Rain. Back downtown, kids will be able to take part in a Kid's Fun Run at 7 p.m. with scary stories following at the Grand Pavilion at 8 p.m.

Saturday morning of "festival day" (Oct. 26) will bring the annual King Tree Parade passing through Downtown Perry along Jefferson Street beginning at 10 a.m. Main Street Perry will host a farmer's market at the Grand Pavilion from 8 a.m. to 12 noon.

Additionally, the festival's "Great Race," the downtown 5K run, returns after being absent for a number of years.

Following the parade, everyone will travel to Forest Capital State Park for the rest of the festival.

Some 65 arts and crafts vendors are ex-

pected at the festival, opening at 9 a.m., along with dozens of special concessions and food booths.

Forestry-related events include professional lumberjack shows (at 12, 2:30 and 4 p.m.), a kid's lumberjack camp (beginning at 2:30 p.m.), chainsaw competitions, loader competitions and cross-cut saw competitions.

The World's Largest Free Fish Fry begins serving at noon as an estimated 6,000 people will receive a free lunch of fried catfish, baked beans and hushpuppies.

The mainstage entertainment begins at 12:30 p.m. and will include performances from Casey Weston, Betsy Badwater and the C.S. Holt Band.

Weston returns to the Florida Forest Festival after performing there in 2010, which was her first public concert. She went on to star in the first season of NBC's "The Voice," making it to the top eight on Coach Adam Levine's team. One of her recordings from "The Voice" made it to number 90 on the Billboard Hot 100.

Since the show, she has performed on the national concert circuit opening for Top 40 and Country acts such as James Otto, John Anderson, Craig Morgan and Justin Moore.

Badwater is a Perry native who now lives in Pensacola and returns to perform with her band, The Hillbilly Chrome.

Her music has been called a stout distillation of rockabilly, country, blues, soul and high-lonesome. She writes the songs, sings, plays guitar and a tambourine-topped bass drum all at the same time.

Badwater has performed in music venues and music festivals in 35 cities in eight states, has been featured on NPR radio shows as well as commercial radio stations in Florida, Alabama, Mississippi and Texas, as well as featured on PBS television, CNN and Headline News.

Her new record was completed at The Shed Recording Studio in New Orleans and features Grammy Award-winning musician and movie star Chris Thomas King ("O, Brother Where Art Thou," "Ray") as producer. Her performance here is part of a 47-date/eight-state tour of the South.

C. S. Holt is a vocal stylist and songwriter who performs his own unique take on blues-flavored American music, combining blues, soul and roots influences. Born and raised in Virginia, he makes his home in Moultrie, Ga.




