

School shootings... WHAT IF?

When the Madison County School Board met on Monday, Feb. 19, there was plenty of concern expressed over school safety issues. In the wake of the recent school shootings in Parkland, that came as no surprise. Madison County Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Karen Pickles, updated the Board about recent Code Red training she attended.

Board member, Bart Alford, brought up previous safety drills he was aware of that seemed to leave kids as “sitting ducks” in classrooms.

Pickles brought back a

large amount of material for consideration which will be used in an upcoming workshop on school safety.

Board member, Bart Alford, brought up previous safety drills he was aware of that seemed to leave kids as “sitting ducks” in classrooms. Alford stated that the current requirement of taking students to the back of the room in the event of a crisis was not such a good idea if a shooter shoots a locked door's handle, gaining easy access to the room. The board members discussed the use of door wedges and latches for further protection, although, in

On Wednesday, May 25, 2016, a murder in the southwest region of Madison County was discovered, and an investigation began. Jeremy Harris was killed, and his body was found next to a set of railroad tracks on ER Scott Rd., in Madison, by a CSX operator around 3:39 a.m. Harris was 28.

The Madison Police Department (MPD) did not find enough evidence to lead to the arrest of a potential suspect. The MPD is re-interviewing potential witnesses and has resubmitted evidence to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) in Tallahassee.

Go Further with Food

March is National Nutrition Month, an observation launched in 1973 to bring to the attention of the American public the impact proper nutrition has on our health and well-being. To celebrate the month-long observance, the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics has adopted the theme, "Go Further with Food." This year, Americans are encouraged to plan meals and snacks to reduce food waste and nutrient loss. UF/IFAS Extension Service has always been a part of the educational effort for National Nutrition Month.

Research shows that 25-40 percent of food grown, processed and transported in the US will never be eaten. Think about it, how often do you find yourself throwing food away because it got lost in the back of the refrigerator? Or, you toss out fresh fruit because it became overripe and was no longer edible? It probably happens on a regular basis, and you don't even think about the fact that you are throwing money and nutrients away.

Consumer excuses for food waste are many; some forget about perishable food until it is too late, others cook big meals leaving leftovers in the refrigerator too long. Perhaps you purchased too much food at the store one week and didn't prepare all of it and had to throw some away. Another common food misstep is to freeze food in the grocery store packaging only to find freezer burn months later when you finally pull it out of the freezer. All of these issues translate into food waste of both nutrient and money loss.

There are steps you can take to reduce food waste and make your money go further. Here are a few suggestions:

- **Plan meals and snacks.** Create a menu for a week; look at what you have on hand, check the refrigerator, freezer, and pantry before making a grocery list. Find recipes that use those ingredients and then write a list of food items you need.
- **Shop carefully.** Make a list of the menus you plan and stick to it. When you see a sale such as ten canned items for \$10, don't overbuy when you may only need two. You will still get the cans for \$1 each.
- **Be sure to store food properly to extend its life.** Utilize those fruit, vegetable and meat compartments in the refrigerator, and they are there for a purpose!
- **Get creative with leftovers.** Sometimes called planned overs, a roast or chicken cooked for one meal, can be transformed into a stir-fry, soup, or sandwich within the next few days. Extra food can also be frozen and used the following week.
- **Keep a check on the containers in your refrigerator.** Use leftovers within four days or freeze. Leftover dinners can be a great lunch the following day, not only will you come closer to a balanced meal by taking leftovers, you will save money by not having to go out for lunch.
- **Any overripen fruit or vegetables can be composted in your backyard.** When you cut up a salad, vegetable peeling can be tossed on the compost pile instead of the garbage can. If you have a summer garden, it is an excellent way to put nutrients back into the soil. You may not realize it, and food waste accounts for a significant amount of methane, a greenhouse gas, dispensed into the air. Composting will keep it out of the landfill and helps reduce methane gas, especially if you regularly turned the pile.

We can all do our part to reduce food waste. Plan, shop smart by buying only what you can prepare and eat between grocery trips and minimize food waste. For more information on consumer issues, contact the Madison County Extension Service.

Passing Parade: *The Last Ounce of Courage*

Everyday heroes! Yes, that describes the four chaplains and their sacrifice. It was on Feb. 3, 1943, that the U.S.A.T. Dorchester, a military transport ship carrying 902 American servicemen and civilian workers, was torpedoed by a German submarine. The Dorchester was about 100 miles off the coast of Greenland. And it took about 18 minutes to sink below the frigid sea.

On board, panic had ensued. The sailors who were not killed in the explosion or trapped below rushed to the decks, where some of the lifeboats had frozen to the ship, survivors recounted. But four chaplains standing on the decks remained calm, distributing life jackets. When the supply ran out, the chaplains gave out their own, to the awaiting sailors.

The Feb. 5, 2018, *New York Times*, p. 15 a, carried the story as: "Remembering Four Chaplains And Their Sacrifice."

Moved By the Memory

Stirred by witness accounts of how the men gave up their life jackets, the US government in 1944 posthumously awarded each chaplain the Distinguished Service Cross and a Purple Heart. In 1948, a postage stamp was dedicated in their honor. In 1988, Feb. 3 was established by a unanimous Act of Congress as an annual "Four Chaplains Day."

Only 230 men survived the sinking of the Dorchester, making it one of the worst naval tragedies for Americans in World War II.

Inspired Leadership

Witnesses recalled seeing the four chaplains standing with arms interlocked, each praying in his own way, as the ship sunk. They were Catholic, Jewish, and Protestant: Rabbi Alexander B. Goode, the Rev. George L. Fox, a Methodist Minister, the Rev. Clark Poling of the Reformed Church in America, and the Rev. John P. Washington, a Roman Catholic priest.

Onward Christian Soldiers

As the Andrew Sisters used to sing: "We've got a job to do," so have the rest of us. Keeping the memory of the four chaplains alive is growing

more difficult. Mrs. Christine Beady, the executive director of the Four Chaplains Foundation, in Philadelphia, explains the difficult situation. The number of World War II veterans is shrinking. According to U. S. Department of Veterans Affairs, 558,000 of the 16 million Americans who served in World War II were still alive in 2017.

They are dying at the rate of 362 per day, the department reports. Among the survivors of the Dorchester disaster that day, only one remains alive: Bill Bunkelman, who is in a nursing home in Michigan, Mrs. Beady said.

The Four Chaplains Memorial Foundation tries to raise awareness through scholarship competitions, awards for valor, school group visits to its chapel and by funding an emergency chaplain corps.

Each year on the first Sunday in February, St. Stephen's Roman Catholic Church, of Kearny, N. J., rings with the remembrance of a selfless act of valor now 75 years old.

Before volunteering for the war in 1942, Father Washington, one of those chaplains, had last served at the Kearny, NJ church, and each year, a Mass is celebrated in honor of him and the other chaplains, attracting veterans from near and far.

Many are called, but few are chosen for the ultimate sacrifice. Greatness is among us. When called, let's measure up!

move to the next level; and clear that hurdle they did. For the first time in school history, the Cowboys have punched their ticket to play in the Final Four in Lakeland.

The Cowboys built an early lead and, by the end of the first quarter, held a 10 point advantage with a 19-9 score. Efficient shooting, especially from the three-point line, along with a stifling defense that held the Hornets scoreless for the first 3:30 of the second quarter, helped

themselves. That they could clear the “Hawthorne hurdle” and

the Cowboys open their lead to 15 by the end of the first half. The first half ended with the Cowboys ahead, 35-20. The end of the third quarter found the Cowboys ahead with a 54-34 lead. Not taking their opponent lightly, the Cowboys continued to keep the pressure on for the rest of the game. When the final buzzer sounded, and the game clock hit 00:00, the Cowboys had built an insurmountable 30-point, 70-40 lead.

Demarvion Brown led the Cowboys with 24 points. Travis Jay chalked up another “triple-double,” scoring 12 points, grabbing 12 rebounds and 13 assists. Ken Hawkins scored 11 points for the Cowboys. Chris Simmons hit two of three

from the three-point line on his way to scoring eight points. Tre Adams scored seven points and had four key blocked shots on defense. Bailey Browning and Zarrion Robinson also added to the Cowboys' point total.

The Cowboys will now travel to Lakeland for the Class 1A Final Four Championship playoff. They will face either Bell High School or Wildwood High School in the semi-final game on Monday, March 5. member, Carol Gibson, encouraged faculty meetings to remind teachers to lock their classrooms and to continue doing everything possible to improve safety. Alford also shared his continuing concern over the disparity of classroom scores in the accelerated reading (AR) testing within the Journey's reading program. Some schools within the county are showing several hundred points racked up in the Journey's program, while Madison County Central School (MCCA) is far behind those numbers. “We need an institutional review for student performance at MCCA. Some teachers are not using the Journey's reading program as they should,” said Alford. Gibson added that she checked the records and “all schools except MCCA are properly using the AR testing in the Journeys reading program.

Board Member, Reggie Daniels, expressed his appreciation for all the winners and participants, and for all of those who worked to make the “Teacher of the Year” banquet and the teacher appreciation dinners a success. “We also need to be mindful to pray for our teachers' and students' safety,” said Daniels.

Community Spotlight - Mark Akerman

Madison native, Mark Akerman, knows well the sweet smell of a library. Though the smell wasn't so sweet in his childhood, it grew on him into adulthood. Growing up with the foremost authority on the Florida cattle industry naturally involved spending time doing research; something his beloved father, the late Joe Akerman, thoroughly enjoyed.

Since coming to North Florida Junior College as a history instructor in 1965, the elder Akerman's passion for all things cattle grew, blooming

into three books on the subject. First published was *Florida Cowman, a History of the Florida Cattle Industry*, in 1976; followed by *American Brahman* in 1982. Mark Akerman has a special fondness for the third writing, *Jacob Summerlin, King of the Crackers*. This book was a collaborated effort between father and son that was published in 2003. "We worked on chapters separately because I was living in Greensboro, NC at the time. Although we worked together occasionally, much of the time we would email back and forth. But, Dad probably had to have Tommy Moffses open them for him," said Akerman, with a smile big enough to be seen through the phone lines during this interview.

Not only did the writing of the Summerlin book create cherished memories for Akerman, it also received the Carlton Tebeau Award for Outstanding History Book in 2005. Summerlin was influential in the cattle industry of Florida, supplying confederate soldiers with beef during the Civil War. Summerlin was also responsible for making Orlando the county seat for Orange County.

Other fond memories for Akerman include visits to Kennedy Space Center, in Titusville. The family had front-row seating for shuttle launches due to Astronaut John Young being a first-cousin to Joe Akerman. Young was the first to pilot the space shuttle, Columbia. Young also piloted Apollo 10, which circled the moon in a type of trial-run, preparing for a moon landing. Young had the opportunity of walking on the moon as part of the Apollo 16 mission. Young passed away on Friday, Jan. 5, at the age of 87.

Akerman is currently working in Mountain Brook, Al., where he serves as Associate Vice-President and Branch Manager of PNC Bank, in Mountain Brook. Akerman resides with his wife, Angie. They have two children: Cole and Emma.



Good Reasons to Retire Later

Working longer might work out well for you.

Are you in your fifties and unsure if you have enough retirement savings? Then you have two basic financial choices. You could start saving and investing more of your pay than you currently do, or you could work longer so you have fewer years of retirement to fund.

That second choice might be more manageable, and it may also work out better financially.

Research suggests that working longer might be a good way to address this shortfall.

Last month, the National Bureau of Economic Research (NBER) published a paper on this very topic, and its conclusions are significant. The four economists writing the report maintain that when you reach your mid-sixties, staying on the job just one more year could help you greatly. Waiting a little longer to file for Social Security also becomes a plus.

What was the most noteworthy finding? By the time you are 66, staying on the job just an additional three to six months will do as much for your standard of living in retirement as if you had contributed 1 percent more to your retirement plan for 30 years.

Example. A 66-year-old who has directed 9 percent of their earnings into an employee retirement plan during the length of their career retires. Had they simply put 10 percent of their pay per year into that retirement plan rather than 9 percent, they would have retired with

11.11 percent more money in that account.

If they work for another year, retire at 67 and file for Social Security benefits at 67, they may put themselves in a better financial position. In this simple example, Social Security benefits would constitute the other 81 percent of their retirement income. They are just slightly past their Full Retirement Age as defined by Social Security, so by retiring at 67, they receive 108 percent of the monthly Social Security benefit they would have received at 66.

In the future, will Social Security benefits be reduced? That possibility exists.

Working full time until age 67 may be a tall order for some of us. Right now, only about a third of American workers retire after age 65; about a fifth retire at age 60 or younger. Perhaps the ambitious, energetic baby boom generation will alter those percentages.

First Baptist Church From 1835 to now

Picture if you will. The year is 1835, and Florida statehood had not yet been established. The Civil War had yet to take place, and Andrew Jackson was President of the United States, the country that was soon to be 60 years old.

More locally, Alexander Mosley and Richard Johnson Mays, over a steady group of Missionary Baptists, led an organization that is now known as Madison First Baptist Church. Mays, who was a native of South Carolina, not only played a part in creating the church, but also bought the first 160 acres of land for the formation of the town of Madison in 1838.

According to a presentation by Jean McWilliams, a member of First Baptist Church (FBC), FBC's original name, Hickstown Baptist Church was the first name of the constituted organization. Hickstown came from a Miccosukee Indian Chief, named Tokose Emathala, whose English name was John Hicks. Hicks was driven from the shores of Lake Miccosukee, in Leon County, in 1825, by Andrew Jackson and settled in the area between Madison and Greenville.

There was plenty of resentment between the Indians and the settlers, but due to the friendly nature of Hicks to the settlers in the Madison area, the settlers honored him by naming the church after him.

The first pastor of FBC was William B. Cooper, who – like Mays – was a native of South Carolina. In 1840, the first meeting building was built. More likely a very plain, one-room building. One year earlier, in 1839, the county seat of Madison County was moved to Madison, and the county commissioners at the time set aside a full block for each of the three predominant Protestant denominations: Baptist, Methodist, and Presbyterian.

These churches were all on the same street, which was called Meeting St. (now called Meeting Ave.), where only the First Baptist Church stands today at the Corner of Meeting Ave. and Base St., in Madison.

In 1843, Elder Henry Ardis became the longest pastorate on record for FBC, serving for 24 years until 1867. Ardis, who pastored through the Civil War and the early days of reconstruction, undoubtedly ministered to the wounded from the Battle of Olustee. It was during Ardis' time as pastor that he renamed Hickstown Baptist Church to The Madison Baptist Church, in 1850.

After the Civil War, a more beautiful building

replaced the small, wooden shack. E.B. Browning, Sr., presented a sketch, which was given to him by an older resident; a sketch representing the building that was of a gothic and Queen Anne style. The building faced east, was rather long and was a wood-constructed building, painted white. Having a traditional steeple and a bell, the building was finally in commission in 1898.

Rev. Stephen Crockett, who led the construction of the "Old Baptist Church," came to Madison Baptist Church in 1895. Crockett was a native Englishman who is remembered for his effort to build the 1898 white wood building that currently sits behind the newer structure.

According to the presentation, Crockett had considerable skills in building and had a clear idea of what he wanted the new church building to be like. Though the church's architectural aspects do not follow the traditional and simple lines of religious architecture of the day, it was very innovative in style, shape and decoration.

Nearly all of the stained glass windows were either donated or were honoring a member of the church. One window was presented by FBC's first pastor, Rev. Stephen Crockett.

Many of the stained glass windows are currently under repair, but almost every stained glass window was honoring, remembering or was dedicated by a certain member of the church. Those members being: Rachel V. Parramore, John M. Beggs, Amanda C. Hardee, James B. Hardee, T.L. Whitlock, Jane Olive Mays, Sallie Livingston and Mrs. B.F. Mosley, just to name a few. To the right of the pulpit, one stained glass window was given in honor of Rev. Crockett, by his first American pastorate in Fairmont, IL.

In the baptistry, next to the pipe organ, there was a window. According to an account by Jargo Clark, who was on the building committee of the new church in 1956: "When they started planning for the new building, they took the architect and the contractor to the 1898 church building and showed him a beautiful window behind the baptistry, which depicts the baptism of Jesus by John the Baptist," said Clark. That window was given in 1942 in memory of Jim Hardee by his sisters. The building committee had the window moved into the new church, and it is now the focal point of the sanctuary.

Speaking of the pipe organ, the instrument was a center piece in the 1898 church building. The pipe organ was acquired with the assistance of the Carnegie Foundation and is one of the oldest of its kind still in use today. Originally, it was manually pumped. The story is that when Sister Anna Stanton struck the keys for the invitation song, nothing happened. There was no sound. The congregation stood in silence until a young boy, who was in charge of tending to the bellows, could be awakened and get

the bellows inflated. When electricity came to Madison, the assistance was no longer needed, and the organ converted from a pump organ to an electric system. This was also the time when a beautiful chandelier was installed into the sanctuary.

The gold stencil was done by Rev. W.C. Stracener, who took the time to personally etch each pipe, giving it the beautiful green and gold representation it still has today.

One of the noticeable characteristics about the pipe organ was the designs on the pipes of the organ. The intricate patterns were etched by Rev. W.G. Stracener, who personally cut the stencils and etched each reed with great care and skill. Under the guidance of Willie Clare Copeland, who was also the historian and custodian of the church, the organ was completely restored in 1989.

In 1956, construction on the present brick church building began and was completed in 1957, under the pastoral leadership of Rev. James Barber and the leadership of the building committee, which included: Clark, Van H. Priest, Ernest Page Jr., W.C. Copeland Jr., and Buford Selman. Nearly twenty years later, under the leadership of Rev. Eddie Humes, the present educational building was erected by remodeling and adding to the existing educational building. On Nov. 14, 1978, the 1898 church building was placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

According to the record books, church membership was at 25 in 1845. As of 2012, the membership was recorded at 465. Since then, 21 new members have been received, possibly more.

With the account of Jean McWilliams, through the time of war and peace, through times of depression and boom, major and minor upheavals within the church body, this Church – the body of believers at Madison First Baptist Church – for 178 years, has stood firm on the foundation of the Word of God and His salvation through His Son, Jesus Christ.

When electricity came to Madison, a beautiful chandelier was hung from the wooden ceiling, giving the symmetrical and intricate ceiling design another characteristic. It was a beautiful addition to the sanctuary itself.



It turns out that driving isn't the only thing that stirs my appetite. Driving and going to the late service at church both seem to have a ravenous affect on me. On this trip, Cheddars Scratch Kitchen got the assignment of calming my hunger.

To my surprise, the spacious restaurant got my family seated immediately, despite the fact that we arrived at the peak of rush hour. The staff of Cheddars was efficient and friendly; a trait I've enjoyed from them before. I consider myself a chip and dip connoisseur, and I generally consider Applebee's to be the standard in this department. However, the spinach dip and salsa are very good at Cheddars. The salsa at Cheddars is much milder than Applebee's offering, so I give the edge to Applebee's. Cheddars was a little heavy on the salt with their chips on this occasion.

For my main course, I chose the Grilled Chicken Pecan Salad, which is made up of grilled chicken, fresh greens, carrots, tomatoes, cheddar and jack cheeses and glazed pecans. The chicken has a nice, smoky flavor locked inside the grill markings. The pecans make this healthy dish distinctively delicious and at \$8.99, it is reasonably priced. It also comes with honey drizzled croissants that could easily double as a dessert.

My wife had a side salad with a baked potato, which was barely warm. This was the only down side to an otherwise pleasant experience. On a side note, if you have any balance issues, I don't recommend eating at Cheddars on a rainy day. The floor becomes as slick as ice when wet and is very dangerous. Cheddars is located at 270 Norman Dr., in Valdosta.

NEW MOVIES IN THEATERS

"GAME NIGHT" PLEASANTLY PASSES THE TIME

OK, what's the answer to "Harmless comedy with two likable stars?" Two words, nine letters?

I think we have the solution right here.

Game Night is a slick farce that takes a ridiculous situation and works it pretty painlessly, thanks to Jason Bateman and Rachel McAdams. You won't leave the theater holding your sides from laughter, but you won't walk out holding your head, either.

Bateman and McAdams play Max and Annie, young marrieds whose idea of a wild Friday is a night at home with two other couples, chasing after that pink Trivial Pursuit wedge. They're all pretty

competitive, although they pale next to Max's brother, Brooks (Kyle Chandler).

Brooks, you see, is all about taking things to the next level. So, the night he joins in, he throws away the gang's Scrabble board and dares them to join him in a role-playing murder-mystery game.

Except then real criminals join the fun. And soon, it's impossible to tell who's playing a role and who'd better start running for their lives.

How much you enjoy a game usually depends on who you play it with. Luckily, directors John Francis Daley and Jonathan Goldstein have made some smart choices here. Bateman could play the slightly exasperated nice guy in his sleep by now -- but he doesn't, instead adding an off-kilter bounce. And there are a few big-screen smiles warmer than that of the amiable McAdams. Chandler is a

nice add, too, as the brash, boastful Brooks.

It's good they've all been dealt in, too, and anted up their charisma, because the rules of this game -- and the plot of the film -- don't always make sense. It's clear that the filmmakers, who also teamed with Bateman on the *Horrible Bosses* films, like edgy. But all the bloody shootouts and crazy car chases aren't just overstuffed with double-crosses; they distract from the real object of the film.

You know, the jokes.

Still, the cast livens up the dull moments, and although there could be more gags, the ones that do show up -- including a story about

a celebrity hook-up -- pay off wonderfully. There's also a surprise guest star or two, and some cute nostalgic details

worked in -- the little pieces from *Parcheesi*, the terrier from *Monopoly*.

For the truly demanding, the film can feel a little middle-of-the-road. It won't challenge you, like chess or bridge (or embarrass you, like *Cards Against Humanity*). It's just a friendly, occasionally funny way to pass two hours.


But if you're planning a date night, that may make *Game Night*, a safe bet.

NFCC prepares real students for real jobs

Local students are fortunate in that there are not only excellent career and technical programs available at the local high school, our local community college has a multitude of programs available for students of any age. According to David Dunkle, Associate Dean of Economic Development and Technical Programs, the overall goal of the Career and Technical Education (CTE) program at North Florida

Community College (NFCC), is to "get students to work." Not just work, but well-paying jobs which offer the opportunities for career advancement. "Our programs translate into real jobs. These are high skill, high wage jobs," said Dunkle.

Dunkle stated that great care goes into the programs at NFCC to make sure the programs offered match the job market. To that end, one of the newer programs at NFCC is the Commercial Driver's License and Commercial Truck Driving program. This program was designed with the assistance of local timber companies

such as Genesis Timber, MA Rigoni, and Gray Logging. Because of the shortage of experienced drivers, especially in the timber industry, students completing the 320-hour course have a substantial likelihood of starting work right away at a good wage. "These students are going to work," said Dunkle.

Another important aspect of the CTE programs offered at NFCC is the fact that the programs are designed to put a student on a career path. For instance, a student could enroll in the Medical Assistance program and find employment at the end of the program, or they can use that program as a springboard into a Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) program. Then, the student could enter the workplace at that level, or that student may decide to go into the new bachelor's degree in nursing program offered at NFCC. This is only one example of the several career paths available to students in the CTE program at NFCC.

Among the other career path programs available at NFCC are:

- Advanced Manufacturing and Production
- Early Childhood Education
- Emergency Medical Services
- Engineering Technology
- Law Enforcement and Corrections
- Medical Coding and Billing

Anyone who wishes for more information about the CTE programs offered at NFCC is encouraged to attend the CTE Open House on Thursday, March 22, from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. at the Career and Technical Education Center on the NFCC campus. 

Throughout 2018, the Museum has committed to commemorate 40 years of Florida's Capitol Complex. In 1978, the vision for the Capitol included both a monument to the state's history and a soaring new tower, which now holds the governing offices, to represent the modern and progressive Florida of the present and future. As the Capitol Hill explored the architectural, artistic, and legislative decisions that led to this new landscape for Florida's Capital city, they invited fifth graders from across Florida to reflect with them.

"The state contacted us with a contest in which fifth grade students statewide were asked to draw what they thought the Capitol Building would look like in 60 years," said Lacey Smith, a MCAA instructor. The students whose work is currently being displayed are: Dixie Phillips, Loring St. John, and Emma Thompson. Each piece of work displays the response to the main question: What do you think Florida's Capitol will look like in 2058?





