## NEWLY ELECTED OFFICIALS

When the Greenville Town Council next meets there will be three new faces on the council. According to unofficial election results provided by the Madison County Supervisor of Elections office, all three candidates who were either incumbents or former council members were defeated.

In Group One, Teresa Harville defeated former Greenville Town Council member Kovacherich Arnold. Harville received 106 or 52.74 percent of the votes, compared to Arnold's 95 or 47.26 percent of the votes cast. In Group Two, Bobby

Burnett received 122 votes or 61 percent to edge out incumbent Joi Collins, who garnered 78 votes or 39 percent. In the Group Five Greenville Town Council race, Cynthia James defeated incumbent Brandi Seabrooks 117 votes or 58.79 percent to 82 votes or 41.21 percent. The new Greenville Town Council members were scheduled to be sworn in before the Town Council meeting on Thursday, March 15.

In the City of Madison, voters selected two Madison City Commission members. In District One, incumbent Rayne Cooks held off a challenge from Candida Akins to hold on to her seat. Cooks narrowly won re-election with a six-vote edge, 39

votes to Akins' 33 votes. In the Madison City Commission District Four race, Terry Johnson won election in a three-candidate race. Johnson received 36 votes, compared to Princess Roebuck's 31 votes and Shirley Joseph's 20 votes. Commissioner Judy Townsend, from District Five, was unopposed for her seat. Cooks, Townsend and Johnson, are to be sworn in before the next City Commission meeting on Tuesday, March 20, at 5:30 p.m.

Voter turnout for the Greenville and Madison City elections was 29.35 percent. There were a total of 361 total ballots cast, out of a pool of 1,230 registered voters.

## Emergency declared at special session

On Wednesday, Feb. 28, a special session was called at the Greenville Town Hall to discuss two items on the agenda. In attendance were Mayor Calvin Malone, who passed the gavel to Vice Mayor Brandi Seabrooks; and council members Barbara Dansey and Joi Collins. Also in attendance was Town Manager Edward Dean and Town Clerk Kim Reams. There is some disagreement as to who called the meeting.

After a word of prayer and the pledge of allegiance, Edward Dean began the discussion of raising the compensation of the Town Manager from \$500 per week to \$900 per week. Dean expressed that there were no taxes nor social security and this would be an easy transition. "I'm looking for an up-or-down vote," said Dean.

Seabrooks asked for a motion. Mayor Malone motioned twice to discuss the modification of the compensation and Dansey seconded that motion. Mayor Malone's main concern for the compensation raise was if Greenville had it in their budget. Town Clerk

The council members for the Town of Lee gathered together for their monthly, regular scheduled meeting on Tuesday, March 6, at 7 p.m., at Lee's Town Hall. In attendance were Mayor Eddie Bell and council members: Edwin McMullen, Ronnie Bass, Dianne Beck, Shirley vonRoden, and Erika Robinson. Also in attendance were Town Manager John Anderson, Deputy Clerk Courtney Bailey and County Commissioner Rick Davis.

The evening began with a proclamation from the Town of Lee, designating the month of April as Water Conservation Month. This proclamation coincides with the Suwannee River Water

## Single vehicle rollover

On Thursday, March 8, Florida Highway Patrol and first responders were dispatched to the scene of a crash on Interstate 10.

According to a report by FHP, at approximately 1:40 p.m., a 2017 Hyundai Veloster overturned several times after a tire blew out. Mikhayla Epps, 20, of Crystal Springs, Ms., was driving eastbound on Interstate 10, just east of Hwy. 221. The right rear tire on the vehicle blew out, and Epps was unable to maintain control. ## Bill mandates schools display "In God We Trust"

Under a bill passed recently by the Florida House, public schools and school administrative buildings in the state would have to display conspicuously the words "In God We Trust," the state motto.

The House passed the measure, HB-839, on a 97-10 vote on Wednesday, Feb. 21. A companion bill in the Florida Senate, however, has yet to be heard. Senate Bill 1158, titled "Display of State Motto," was filed on Dec. 6, 2017. Its last action, on Saturday, Jan. 9, was listed as "introduced" on the Senate webpage, as of last week.

In the House, Rep. Kimberly Daniels, a Jacksonville Democrat, introduced the legislation. In her arguments for why the bill should be approved, Daniels cited the shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland that left 17 dead on Wednesday, Feb. 14. Daniels, who runs a ministry in Jacksonville, is quoted saying on the House floor in her closing argument that God is the "light" and "our schools need light in them like never before."

"It is not a secret that we have some gun issues that need to be addressed," said Daniels. "But the real thing that needs to be addressed are issues of the heart." She said a vision inspired her to file the bill. "I believe it was God, and I heard a voice say, 'Do not politicize what has happened in Florida and do not make this a thing of division,'" said Daniels, adding that God was neither Republican nor Democrat.

"He's not black, and he's not white," she continued. "He is the light. And our schools need light in them like never before."

The bill still requires Senate approval before it can go into effect, which will be on July 1. Critics didn't fail to note that while House members overwhelmingly approved Daniels' bill, they failed to pass a motion advancing a bill to ban assault rifles on the previous day, despite the outcry of students from Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School.



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## Reduce fat and sugar in your diet

Since March is National Nutrition Education Month, let's continue our focus on making positive food choices. The USDA Dietary Guidelines for Americans has a full chapter on foods Americans need to work on reducing in their daily consumption; solid fats and sugars are two that take top

billing. SoFAS is the acronym USDA has coined a few years ago to describe this trend in the American meal patterns; the "SoF" stands for solid fat, and the "AS" represents added sugars. While the intention is a catchy phrase, it might leave some people scratching their heads.

Let's break this down and look at "SoF" (solid fats) first. Fats are categorized into three groups known as fatty acids: they can be saturated, polyunsaturated and monounsaturated. All fats contain a combination of fatty acids, but they are in different amounts. Saturated fats are solid at room temperature, and that is where we get "SoF," with the exception of palm and coconut oils. These fats tend to raise cholesterol levels in the human

body, which over time can cause a plaque build-up in blood vessels leading to coronary heart disease. Fats that are liquid at room temperature will be higher in poly or monounsaturated fats and do not contribute to cholesterol levels. These liquid fats are the better choice but use all fats sparingly.

Trans fats are also a fat that can lead to increased cholesterol levels; these are formed in food processing. When hydrogen is added to a fat to make it more solid, trans fats are formed, making the fat more saturated. Synthetic trans fatty acids are found in margarines, snack foods and prepared desserts. Small amounts of trans fats are naturally found in meat and milk foods.

How does all of this information translate into the food choices you make every day? Eat lean cuts of meat and choose low-fat and fat-free dairy foods to reduce solid fats and naturally occurring trans fats. Consume less prepared desserts and snacks to reduce trans fats and saturated fats that are added to foods as an ingredient.

Consumers always have questions about margarine; there are so many on the market. Read the ingredient list and start with a spread that has a monounsaturated fat as the major ingredient. High monounsaturated fats are canola, olive, soy, sunflower, and peanut. Then, read the nutrition label and find the smallest amount of saturated and trans fats with a higher number of poly or monounsaturated fats.

In food preparation, both monounsaturated and polyunsaturated fats are much better alternatives to solid fats. While they still have the same amount of calories, they have a more positive effect in your body. Oils that are high in monounsaturated fats are canola, safflower, olive and peanut oils. Examples of polyunsaturated fats are corn, cotton seed, and soy bean oil.

Now, for the "AS" or added sugars in SoFAS. By itself, it is not a bad ingredient, and it adds sweetness to our foods and serves as a browning agent in many foods, and most have few nutrients, and are high in calories. According to the new Dietary Guidelines, added sugar contributes an average of 16% of the total calories in the American diet. This translates into added calories and excess calories can only mean extra pounds. Sugar also contributes to tooth decay, another good reason the consume less.

Sugars come in many forms. Read the nutrition labels; added sugars may be high fructose corn syrup, corn syrup, malt syrup, maple syrup, fructose, dextrose molasses or honey.

Can you guess the food source highest consumption of added sugar? Sugary drinks like soda, energy drinks, and sports drinks account for 36 percent of extra sugar in our diet. Sugar-sweetened fruit drinks account for about 10 percent of the extra calories in the American diet. Sweet tea, a southern staple, is loaded with sugar and falls into this category, so sweeten lightly. The message is to cut back on foods high in sugar and eat them less often.

Solid fats and added sugar can contribute a substantial portion of calories to the American diet. It is estimated that on average solid fats and added sugar contribute up to 800 calories per day to an adult's diet. Remember too, most foods that are high in these ingredients are also low in other nutrients, and it is well documented these foods contribute to weight gain. The recommendation from USDA is to eat these foods less often. Instead, focus on nutrient-dense forms of foods from all food groups.

### Taking on the Constitution

#### One Example

#### Supreme Court Set the Table

In 2005, the Supreme Court decided a "taking issue" in regards to New London, Ct. It seems that in the case of *Kelo Vs. The city of New London*, 545 US 469 (6/23/2005), the city required Kelo, through the instrument of eminent domain, to sell his land to another. The US Supreme Court decided that private property rights could be suborned like that.

#### A Florida Champion

Meet Fane Lozman. A Florida native, living in Riviera Beach, the county of Palm Beach. The City of Riviera Beach wanted his legally docked houseboat, moored along the oceanfront. Actually, they wanted his private property rights and surrounding acreage, in order to entice some developer to move in and "improve" the area.

While most would give up their rights of ownership in the face of the raw intimidation of government, not Fane Lozman.

As a result of that 2005 Kelo decision, the Florida Legislature, in 2006, worked overtime to marginalize its effect.

#### Riviera Beach Never Blinkered

The day before the law passed by the Legislature was to go into effect, and without a public meeting, The Riviera Beach Council underhandedly passed the ordinance to take that private property. As an American, Fane Lozman, acting as his own attorney, took his case to the US Supreme Court. The justices reviewed Lozman's claim that Riviera Beach had improperly used federal admiralty law to seize (and later destroy) his two stories plywood-and French-doors houseboat, moored at the city marina. And in 2012, that court upheld his Constitutional private property rights, 7 - 2.

#### The Back Story

The Feb. 26, 2018, *Washington Post* front page, blared this story: "Justices to see a familiar face in a battle over speech rights." Fane Lozman was scheduled to face the Supreme Court one more time.

It seemed that about the time the City Council was overriding Lozman's property rights, in 2006, the commercial entity scheduled to be the receiver of this land, threw in the towel, and wanted out of the deal.

#### More Poison

How was Fane perceived by the community? "He's a formidable citizen-activist," said Barbara Petersen. "He's the kind of watchdog that keeps local governments honest." In his wake are officials who lost jobs and politicians drummed from office.

During the Nov. 15, 2006 City Council meeting, used to announce the commercial deal was not going through, and in the face of TV camera's and reporters, Fane was forcibly denied his three minutes of "public comment time." He was hauled off to jail by the police.

The Council had met behind closed doors to discuss its legal strategy, for the meeting, and as a transcript released under public records law showed-what to do about Lozman.

Instead of reporting on Lozman's triumph in sinking the development, "everyone's story that night was the guy who killed the deal went to jail."

#### Was it retaliation?

That's Fane Lozman's position! It's a First Amendment issue, and this year's Supreme Court gets to decide whether its retaliation.

Reams stated that \$900 per week would total out to be \$3,600 per month which is less than what former Town Manager Jim McCroskey was being compensated – \$750 per week plus social security, medicare and retirement being taken out.

Reams stated that if the council approved the modification, there would have to be a budget amendment, “and we can do that at the next meeting,” said Reams. Seabrooks agreed that there needs to be a budget amendment. Reams went on to inform the council that the Town Manager's compensation was being paid out of the general fund and there was money allotted for the Town Manager's compensation – \$26,000 was allotted, according to Seabrooks.

“In the general fund, we were spending just under \$3,900 per month with the past town manager. It would be less for this town manager [if the compensation is moved up],” said Reams. “There's money there; you just have to pull it from what we call the reserve because that's the money that we didn't spend in the budget, plus money carried over from years prior. In order to expend that money, you would have to do a budget amendment.”

Dansey stated her opinion, feeling that the council should give Dean an increase. “McCroskey was given an increase, and I don't see anything that he did that Mr. Dean has done so far[sic].” Dansey offered a motion to increase Dean's salary to \$900 per week. Collins seconded the motion. Mayor Malone voted in favor after being asked if there was a vote from him. “I didn't want it to be quite that amount, but they set it at the max,” said Malone. After stating that the motion prevailed, Malone rebutted. “What is required to vote nay?” asked Malone. Seabrooks stated that he can resend his vote to which he did not at the moment.

“I feel you should have wanted more discussion if it was something concerning the salary that you didn't agree with,” said Dansey. “Last meeting, you voted and then changed after being asked. [If] you needed more discussion, you should've asked for that before you voted.” Seabrooks stated that the motion prevailed by majority and began to proceed onto the next subject of the agenda when Collins interrupted, asking Malone if he is not resending his vote. “It's a done deal,” said Malone. “Let's go ahead.”

The next subject on the agenda was concerning the emergency purchase of a sanitation truck. Dean stated for the record that the condition of the current truck had been brought to his attention by his public records crew. “I was unaware of any previous issues when this issue was brought to me,” said Dean. Currently, when the sanitation truck is full, the truck struggles to go over 30 miles per hour. The public works crew stated that these problems had existed for a few years. “Mr. Malone stated that the transmission has been slipping,” said Dean. “Chief [Hakili Washington] said that there are no brakes. He [said] the brakes have been repaired on multiple occasions.”

According to Dean, the sanitation truck is a 2002 model, more than 15 years old; and the odometer has flipped twice. “I asked them why is this issue being brought to me when we're in an emergency stated,” said Dean. It was stated that the issue has been brought up on multiple occasions prior.

Another issue of concern is that when the truck is coming to a stop, the brakes have to be pumped. Dean stated that an average truck is in service from six to eight years. “This truck should have, at the very latest should have gone off the grid, in 2010,” said Dean. Mayor Malone interjected asking for documents concerning repair history.

“If you've had a truck and it's flipped the odometer, and you've got 16 years, then it's had its best days, and it's done what it's suppose to do. We needed to address this issue a couple of years ago,” said Dean. “I don't want to get stuck on the fact that it wasn't addressed, I want to get stuck on the fact that there's an emergency issue here which facilitated us needing to be able to meet here on this day.”

Dean told the council that he couldn't get a trade-in value for the truck. “Why would you put any money trying to repair a vehicle that you can't even get a trade-in value for?” said Dean. Mayor Malone stepped in, stating that the Town of Greenville doesn't even have a spare truck, not wanting Dean to entertain the idea of trading in the current sanitation truck.

Dean reassured Mayor Malone, stating that he would use a trade-in value – if there was one – to get a loaner and a rental,

Management District, other water management districts, and the State of Florida, working together to increase awareness about the importance of water conservation.

As the month of April is typically a dry month when water demands are most acute, Florida's Water Conservation Month is to educate citizens about how they can help save water resources. As stated in the proclamation, “every business, industry, school and citizen can make a difference when it comes to conserving water, promoting a healthy economy and community.” The proclamation was adopted unanimously, 5-0.

Leroy Rutherford, acting fire chief of the Lee Community Volunteer Fire Department (LCVFD) approached the podium, asking for the town council's assistance and involvement on behalf of the LCVFD. As stated in LCVFD's articles of incorporation, there should be three council members on the board of the LCVFD. At the time, Ronnie Bass was the only council member on the board of the department.

“Have you ever sat there in your yard and watched your neighbor's house burn? Have you ever been traveling on the interstate and seen an accident and there was nobody to pull the child out of the car?” said Rutherford. “We as citizens of this community have a responsibility. If someone is in medical need, are you trained to take care of your neighbor? Where do we stand as stewards of our community [to] our friends, our neighbors?”

Rutherford explained that Chris Williams, Fire Coordinator for

waiting on the truck to get to the city. Dean proposed that the council buy a truck that's already been bid through National Joint Powers Alliance (NJPA), brand new with a five-year warranty. According to Dean, NJPA offered the lowest bid, with financing at a 3.39 percent interest rate. The cost of the new sanitation truck is \$149,036.97. “We did get three quotes, but nothing was even close to what [NJPA] was going to give us,” said Dean.

According to Dean, the priority of this agenda item was to keep the public works and sanitation crews safe while still serving the community who pay for the services. Proceeding with the purchase of a replacement sanitation truck, Dean also stated that he did not pursue any other local banks other than Farmers and Merchant Bank, for financing, because he realized no one would give him as low of an interest rate as NJPA. “We have an emergency situation here,” said Dean. “I'm concerned about the citizen's safety.”

“I'm not against a new truck,” said Mayor Malone. His stance was concerning the general maintenance in the past: general oil changes and filters. “Have we did [sic] what we can to allow these trucks the long life?”

Upon the discussion of financing, came the discussion of how it will be paid for. Dean brought up the subject of charging the citizens for the services they are using, in effort to be able to have services that the city can afford. “We haven't revisited this issue in over ten years,” said Dean. Mayor Malone responded, stating that was something that has to be done, “prior to going into debt for a truck.” The safety issue still prevailed over the notion of increasing service charges to citizens. He also reiterated that he must keep his crew safe on the road, therefore wanting to rent a truck instead of continuing in the unsafe sanitation truck. Mayor Malone continued to stress his stance that more general up-to-date maintenance can extend the life of the sanitation truck, but Dean did not want to take that route, out of precaution.

“I'd love for us to get a new truck,” said Seabrooks. “I just don't want it to be on the back of the citizens.” Seabrooks again stated that she realizes the charges for some services will have to go up but does not want a majority of the payment for the truck, coming from the citizens.

Dean brought up the possibility of taking out grants only if the council had a year and a half to wait – in reference to a new fiscal year – so there would be no other immediate avenue, considering the emergency nature of the situation. Concerning the businesses, the Greenville Town Council “would have to deal with a plethora of ordinances,” said Dean.

Collins stated that she supported raising service charges to the citizens and businesses. Reams also stated that businesses pay for service charges, not just the residential area. Mayor Malone asked if the possibility was open to purchase a four year old truck, but Dean had said there was a truck for \$100,000 but it had no warranty. “I didn't even want to propose that,” said Dean. “Mr. Malone, whether we kick the tire down another three weeks or six months, you've done a great job of keeping that truck. It's time to move on.” Mayor Malone was excused to leave the Greenville Town Hall.

According to Town Attorney John Reid, emergency purchases in excess of \$3,000 shall require the town council to declare the existence of an emergency, creating an immediate need for the procurement of the applicable commodities or the contractual services; in this case, sanitation services. “No bids will be required for such emergency purchases or acquisition after said emergency is declared,” said Reid.

Dansey moved to declare an emergency pertaining to the condition of the 2002 garbage truck. “There's an immediate need for a replacement of the truck,” said Dansey. The motion was seconded and passed.

Collins moved to direct town manager Dean to purchase a replacement garbage truck for an amount not to exceed \$150,000 and further directed the town attorney to draft a legal memorandum pertaining to the procurement policy. Dansey seconded. “It's not that I don't want to support you, I want to find another way of doing it,” said Seabrooks. Because Malone had exited the meeting, the motion prevailed on a 2-1 vote, with Seabrooks casting the dissenting vote.

The next regularly scheduled town council meeting will be held on Monday, April 19, at 6 p.m., at Greenville Town Hall. Greenville Town Hall is located at 154 SW Old Mission Ave., in Greenville.

Madison County, was talking about coming to the Town of Lee to teach first aid classes. “If you guys don't support us and get our community over here, we're not going to have anybody to take care of it like we use to,” said Rutherford.

Council woman Shirley vonRoden stepped up to serve on the board as the second board member of the LCVFD. Regularly, the LCVFD holds meetings on the second Tuesday of the month, but right now, the department is meeting every Tuesday night.

Rutherford continued to explain that Chipola Fire College, in Marianna is offering an eight-day class, whereby anyone age 18 or older can become Firefighter I certified. “Talk about a freebie,” said Rutherford. “They provide the meals [and] the housing. All we have to do is pay for the transportation to get them out there and they will reimburse us for the transportation.” The LCVFD is not gender-specific and will not just take men, but women as well.

Firefighting is not the only option for serving at the LCVFD. Other services needed are support staff, bookkeeping and inventory officer. “You don't have to be in the hot zone. There's something for everybody,” said Rutherford. “Even if you're physically handicapped, you can still perform certain duties in there.”

Anyone wanting to know more about LCVFD and is interested in volunteering, is encouraged to attend a meeting every Tuesday. The meetings begin at 7 p.m. and are held at the LCVFD, located next to Town Hall at 317 NE County Road 255, in Lee. The next regular scheduled town council meeting is to be held on Tuesday, April 3, beginning at 7 p.m.

## Gift and estate taxes

If you give away money or property during your life, those transfers may be subject to federal gift and estate tax and perhaps state gift tax. The money and property you own when you die (i.e., your estate) may also be subject to federal gift and estate tax, along with some form of state death tax. These property transfers may also be subject to generation-skipping transfer taxes. You should understand all of these taxes, especially since the passage of the Economic Growth and Tax Relief Reconciliation Act of 2001 (the 2001 Tax Act), the Tax Relief, Unemployment Insurance Reauthorization, and Job Creation Act of 2010 (the 2010 Tax Act), the American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012 (the 2012 Tax Act), and the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act. The recent Tax Acts contain several changes that make estate planning much easier.

### Federal gift and estate tax — background

Under pre-2001 Tax Act law, no federal gift and estate tax was imposed on the first \$675,000 of combined transfers (those made during life and those made at death). The tax rate tables were unified into one — that is, the same rates applied to gifts made and property owned by persons who died in 2001. Like income tax rates, gift and estate tax rates were graduated. Under this unified system, the recipient of a lifetime gift received a carryover basis in the property received, while the recipient of a bequest, or gift made at death, got a step-up in basis (usually fair market value on the date of death of the person who made the bequest or gift).

The 2001 Tax Act, the 2010 Tax Act, the 2012 Tax Act, and the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act substantially changed this tax regime.

### Federal gift and estate tax — current

The 2001 Tax Act increased the applicable exclusion amount for gift tax purposes to \$1 million through 2010. The applicable exclusion amount for estate tax purposes gradually increased over the years until it reached \$3.5 million in 2009. The 2010 Tax Act repealed the estate tax for 2010 (and taxpayers received a carryover income tax basis in the property transferred at death), or taxpayers could elect to pay the estate tax (and get the step-up in basis). The 2010 Tax Act also re-unified the gift and estate tax and increased the applicable exclusion amount to \$5,120,000 in 2012. The top gift and estate tax rate was 35 percent in 2012. The 2012 Tax Act increased the applicable exclusion amount to \$5,490,000 (in 2017) and the top gift and estate tax rate to 40 percent (in 2013 and later years). The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, signed into law in December of 2017, doubled the gift and estate tax exclusion amount and the GST tax exemption (see below) to about \$11,200,000 in 2018. After 2025, they are scheduled to revert to their pre-2018 levels and cut by about one-half.

### However, many transfers can still be made tax free, including:

- Gifts to your U.S. citizen spouse; you may give up to \$152,000 in 2018 (\$149,000 in 2017) tax free to your noncitizen spouse
- Gifts to qualified charities
- Gifts totaling up to \$15,000 (in 2018; \$14,000 in 2017) to any one person or entity during the tax year, or \$30,000 in 2018. (\$28,000 in 2017) if the gift is made by both you and your spouse (and you are both U.S. citizens)
- Amounts paid on behalf of any individual as tuition to an educational organization or to any person who provides medical care for an individual

### Federal generation-skipping transfer tax

The federal generation-skipping transfer (GST) tax imposes tax on transfers of property you make, either during life or at death, to someone who is two or more generations below you, such as a grandchild. The GST tax is imposed in addition to, not instead of, federal gift and estate tax. You need to be aware of the GST tax if you make cumulative generation-skipping transfers in excess of the GST tax exemption (\$11,200,000 in 2018; \$5,490,000 in 2017). A flat tax equal to the highest estate tax bracket in effect in the year you make the transfer (40 percent in 2017 and 2018) is imposed on every transfer you make after your exemption has been exhausted.

### State transfer taxes

Currently, a few states impose a gift tax, and a few states impose a generation-skipping transfer tax. Some states also impose a death tax, which could be in the form of estate tax, inheritance tax, or credit estate tax (also known as a sponge or pickup tax). Contact an attorney or your state's department of revenue or taxation to find out more information.

The Madison County High School (MCHS) Cowboys are managing to play well in the games that seem to matter the most, that is, the district games. Lawson pitched 2.2 innings for the Cowboys, giving up three hits, two earned runs and four strike-outs. Dylan Bass pitched the remaining 3.1 innings, giving up just one hit, no earned runs and registering five strike-outs.

Then, on Friday, March 9, the Cowboy bats cooled off faster than an early March evening, when they went down the road to Live Oak to play the Suwannee County High School Bulldogs. The score was tied at one at the end of the first inning; then the Bulldogs put together a four-run second inning to take the lead. The Cowboys did manage to cut into the Bulldog lead with one run in the fifth, and a two-run rally in the top of the seventh that came up just short. The Bulldogs posted the win with a 5-4 final score.

The one bright spot at the plate for the Cowboys was Dylan Bass, who went two-for-two. Dilan Lawson went one-for-three and brought home the only Cowboy RBI for the evening.

Drew Herring spent two innings on the mound for the Cowboys, giving up six hits, four earned runs and no strike-outs. Thompkins pitched four innings in relief, giving up two hits, zero earned runs and chalking up three strike-outs.

The Cowboys will again be home on Friday, March 23, when they play the Marauders of Maclay School, from Tallahassee. The first pitch is scheduled for 7 p.m. at the Cowboys' baseball diamond, on the MCHS campus.

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

Colin P. Kelly Jr. was no doubt a brave hero in World War II (WWII), and his legacy lives on in

Madison still today. Born in 1915 to Mary Mays and Colin P. Kelly Sr., he enjoyed life here in Madison. Kelly went on to graduate from the United States Military Academy (USMA), known as West Point, in 1937. The following is a recollection of Kelly, provided by West Point Association of Graduates:

Colin (C.P.) Kelly was the first West Pointer to be killed in combat in WWII and the first major national war hero. He came from a long, honorable military tradition. His ancestors served in the Revolutionary and Civil Wars.

Colin's interests at the Academy were varied and intense. His military ratings were superior, and his interpersonal relations were outstanding. His classmates describe him and his activities: "C.P. took everything in stride and always did a magnificent job, no matter what he tried," said one classmate. "Colin was not one to let life's little mistakes get him down. His attitude toward everything was to do the best you can with everything you have at your command and not quit until the job is done," said another classmate.

C.P. participated in cross-country, track, and boxing and was a member of the Chapel Choir, Lecture Committee, Howitzer Staff, and Cadet Players. Kelly became a corporal in his third class

year, sergeant in his second, and lieutenant in his first class year.

A momentous event was him meeting his future wife, Marion Wick in 1936. After graduating from West Point, Kelly and Marion married on Aug. 1, 1937.

C.P.'s interest in aviation never flagged. Graduating as a Second Lieutenant in the Infantry, he eagerly proceeded to Randolph Field for pilot training. He achieved his life's ambition upon the award of his wings and transferred to the Air Corps on Jan. 13, 1939. Kelly and Marion enjoyed their first home at Randolph. Their next assignment was to the 19<sup>th</sup> Bomb Group, in March Field, Ca., where Colin P. Kelly III was born on May 6, 1940. Colin's promotion to First Lieutenant on June 4, 1940, was memorable. He was flying a plane to Mitchell Field, NY, when he demonstrated his courage and his regard for the safety of others. He found Mitchell's ceiling zero and his alternate, Floyd Bennett Field, the same. Low on fuel, he desperately searched for an emergency landing place. He passed over the wide streets of Brooklyn but did not land there because children were playing. As his fuel ran out, he set his plane down on a street under construction, wrecking the craft and suffering a minor injury.

In April 1941, Colin was ordered to Hickam Field, Hi., and appointed squadron operations officer and senior B-17 check pilot for the 11<sup>th</sup> Bomb Group. The Kelly family's happy Hawaiian life was shadowed by the gathering war clouds when Colin's squadron was ordered to the Philippines. Led by Major Emmett O'Donnell Jr., a USMA graduate of 1928, the nine aircraft flight departed Hickham for Clark Field via Midway, Wake, Port Moresby, and Darwin. This 10,000-mile pioneering flight ended successfully when the aircraft, flying in typhoon weather, landed at Clark Field in a blinding rain on Sept. 12, 1941.

Colin and Marian corresponded frequently by shortwave radio. In late November, Colin told Marian that trouble was close and insisted that she and Colin III leave Hawaii and return "home."

Upon receiving General Marshall's warning message on Nov. 28, 1941, all Philippine air units were put on full alert. The following night the Army-Navy game was to be rebroadcast to Manila. Captain Kelly was to have been the Army cheerleader, but the alert canceled his attendance.

On Dec. 5, 1941, C.P. flew a reconnaissance mission to Formosa and observed many enemy ships headed for Luzon. His report underscored the need to disperse the B-17s from overcrowded Clark Field. Colin's squadron was dispatched to Del Monte Field, Mindanao, some 450 miles south.

On Dec. 10, 1941, Colin returned to Clark Field to bomb-up. An enemy raid forced him to take off with only three bombs to attack a carrier reported near Aparri, North Luzon. Several cruisers were at Aparri but no carrier. He searched for the carrier but had to return to Aparri and bomb the largest vessel, making one direct hit and two near misses. As he approached Clark Field, he was jumped by two Japanese fighters. With the plane catching fire, Kelly stayed at the controls so that his crew could safely leave the plane. Just days after the brave acts of Kelly, General MacArthur announced "with great sorrow," the death of Colin P. Kelly Jr. after his plane crashed.

Colin's son graduated with the Class of 1963. Colin's hometown honored him with a public memorial. A plaque in his honor hangs in Cullum Memorial Hall at West Point. His classmates honored him at their 50<sup>th</sup> Class Reunion, placing his bust in the Regimental Room of Washington Hall at West Point. The Air Force awarded him the Purple Heart, Distinguished Flying Cross, and the Distinguished Service Cross.


