

Davis sentenced for manslaughter

After multiple attempts to find guilt or innocence, Nicholas Rashawn Davis, 28, of Greenville, pled guilty to lesser charges, for the death of Travis Lavonte Solomon, and was sentenced to the Florida Department of Corrections (FDOC) on Thursday, March 15.

Back on April 20, 2016, investigators obtained a “first-degree murder while armed” warrant and a “possession of firearm by convicted felon” warrant for Davis, in connection to the murder of 21-year-old Solomon. One day after unsuccessfully trying to locate Davis, investigators received a tip that led them to the area of 185 Apopka Trl., in Madison. Around 5 p.m., a search was conducted, but Davis was not located.

Investigators then received another tip, and at approximately 10 p.m., the Sheriff's Emergency Response Team (SERT) arrived back at the same property and surrounded the residence, arresting Davis without further incident. Davis was taken to the Madison County Jail and charged with first-degree murder while armed and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

On Tuesday, Feb. 14, 2017, Davis was additionally charged with introducing contraband into a detention facility and on Friday, July 28, 2017, Davis was charged with tampering with a witness.

After a declared mistrial and a jury pool mishap, Davis returned to the Madison County Courthouse once again on Tuesday, Jan. 23 for a three-day trial that ended in a hung jury.

At the regular scheduled meeting for the Madison City Commissioners, the two already-established city commissioners and one newly-elected commissioner were officially sworn-in on Tuesday, March 20, at 5:30 p.m.

During the city elections on Tuesday, March 13, Terry Johnson became the newest member of the

Madison City Commission.

Johnson serves as the commissioner for District 4. Judy Townsend, commissioner for District 5, ran unopposed and Rayne Cooks, commissioner for District 1, was re-elected.

After a word of prayer and the pledge of allegiance, Tommy Reeves asked Johnson, Townsend, and Cooks to raise their right hand and swear that they will well and faithfully

Tight budget for district schools

In his regular monthly financial report to the Madison County District School Board on Monday, March 19, District Chief Financial Officer Walter Copeland informed the Board of an adjustment of the district's fund balance downward. This adjustment goes back to the fiscal year 2016-17 audit. The beginning fund balance at July 1, 2017, was adjusted down from \$1,927,912 to \$1,701,106 as the result of a June 30, 2017, audit adjustment. According to the report provided by Copeland, "In finalizing the fiscal year ending June 2017 audit, this adjustment was necessary to correct the retirement and terminal pay liability at year end. The effect of this prior year adjustment is a decrease in our February 2018 unrestricted fund balance ratio from 5.69 [percent] to 4.62 [percent]." "[The adjustment] hits the fund balance now, but we have [contingencies] in place, so

it won't be a surprise moving forward," said Copeland. The fund balance can be looked at as a "rainy day fund." The fund balance is the money left over after expenses in the budget. Ideally, the fund balance should remain over five percent, but should it drop below three percent, the state could step in and implement mandatory changes.

"Through February 2018 (67 percent of the fiscal year), our total general fund expenditures are trending slightly higher than budget at 70.5 percent. We are continuing to work to identify and reclassify general fund expenditures that should be paid from either grant funds or categorical funds which will improve our unrestricted fund balance ratio," said Copeland in his report. "If we can continue to have revenues in excess of expenditures [and we] continue to re-allocate staff and expenditures – where allowable – with grants; I think we can continue to bring [the fund balance] back up. But we don't have much wiggle room right now," said

Death of Valerie Straughter

On July 13, 1990, a homicide in the south region of Madison County was discovered, and an investigation began. Valerie Straughter was killed, and her body was found in a vacant lot in Madison, at the corner of 2nd and Mickel. She was 22-years-old.

Not enough evidence was found by the Madison Police Department (MPD) to lead to the arrest of a potential suspect. However, the MPD is re-interviewing potential witnesses and has resubmitted evidence to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) in Tallahassee.

Passing Parade: *Designated Teachers*

"The 8 x11-inch box sits atop a bookshelf in the school district headquarters, as much a part of the office furniture as the manila folders, yearbooks, and *Webster's* dictionaries. Inside is a semiautomatic Glock handgun with extra magazines, equipment that education leaders here say will prevent this district from suffering the next schoolhouse tragedy."

A dateline Sidney, Ohio, front page article, entitled: "Trump's Call to Arm Teachers Resonates at Schools That Do," ran in their March 2, 2018, *New York Times*, edition.

Dispersed throughout the school campus, a rural school district just outside Dayton, Oh., are dozens of biometric safes, tucked away discreetly in closets and classrooms, accessible only to a designated staff member whose fingerprint can open the box. A bulletproof vest is nearby, in an undisclosed location, fortified to protect against any bullet except one fired from an actual assault rifle.

No Gun Free Zone

John Scheu, the district's school superintendent, says: "We can't stop an active shooter, but we can minimize the carnage."

For all the outcry, officials do not see the strategically placed safety devices scattered through their schools as anything other than a practical response to today's media created furor.

No Swagger

"I agree with those folks who say teachers should teach and cops should be cops, but we got a mess on our hands," said the Sheriff, John Lenhart, of Shelby County.

"If I have to wait on state officials, on the federal government, on psychologists to figure out why people hurt one another, we would have nothing in our school system."

It's On Us

Since Sandy Hook, in 2013, State legislatures have seen the need to protect students from those "going postal," just as they earlier had mandated the fire safety precautions



School safety requires more taxes

of fire hydrants, fire extinguishers, and fire alarms, making them now standard equipment.

At least ten states allow school staff members, those designated and have concealed carry permits, to possess or have access to a firearm on school property, an analysis by the Education Commission of the States, says.

Safety is Expensive

The school district of Sidney, Oh., has spent about \$70,000 on safes, bulletproof vests, cameras, guns, radios, and ammunition. Uniformed, armed officers cost \$200,000 a year, and an insurance policy of \$100,000 a year includes coverage for its staff with access to firearms. Those are negligible expenses for a school district with a \$36 million budget, said the superintendent.

It's the teacher's responsibility to protect the kids, no matter what, and they do it already, but now these additional tools can serve as an insurance policy.

Community Support

Mrs. Nicki New, the parent of three students in Sidney City Schools, said she felt safer dropping off her children knowing there were staff members equipped to respond to a parent's worst nightmare.

"God forbid if something would happen, knowing that not only a law enforcement officer is there, but there are teachers in that building."

Christian Concepts: *Billy Graham: Prophet and Theologian*

While he was not perfect, there was only one who was, I wholeheartedly agree with Lee. But as you might suspect, not everyone shares our perspective.

Conservative intellectual George Will wrote, "Graham was no theologian. Neither was he a prophet." Intellectuals tend to think they know everything, but Will's reasoning shows he is neither a theologian nor a prophet himself.

Will cites as a reference, that Graham was no theologian, an answer he gave when he was asked if

J. Lee Grady in an article lauded Billy Graham for his example of honesty, integrity, purity, and humility. Lee commented, "So much of what we call ministry today has been compromised by ego... Billy Graham raised the bar for all ministers. I pray we will never forget his

he believed in miracles. Graham said television and cars are examples of miracles. I have read a number of Graham's books and to say he is no theologian based on a shallow comment, uttered possibly in the infancy of his ministry and Christian walk, is no cause to say he is no theologian.

The sorts of miracles recorded in Scripture confound human reasoning, and cannot be explained by it. They are a mystery one either believes or doesn't believe, and are beyond human ability to prove or disprove. But if one believes in an omniscient, omnipotent God, then His supernatural intervention in human history is not inconceivable.

Quoting Jesus, something hypocritical for an atheist like Will to do, who believes there is no God, Jesus isn't His Son, nor are the Scriptures inspired by the nonexistent one, Will comments that Graham who was honored by being called "America's Pastor" disqualifies him as a prophet because Jesus said, "A prophet is not without honor except in his own country."

This is where Will fails as an exegete. Jesus was not issuing a prophetic requirement, a qualification to be a prophet; he was simply making the observation

that familiarity with someone often blinds us to who they actually are. In His hometown of Nazareth Jesus was known as "Joseph's son," and because of that familiarity, they did not recognize Him as God's Son.

The *New York Post* was no kinder; it claimed Graham was a "pernicious influence" on presidents and politics. Of course, it could not cite a specific instance of this deadly advice Graham supposedly was dispensing, or how it had adversely affected the political course of the United States. *The New York Post* was probably jealous that Graham had more influence than the paper had.

Jesus said, "Blessed are you when people insult you and persecute you, and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of Me. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward in heaven is great; for, in the same way, they persecuted the prophets who were before you," (Matthew 5:11-12.)

I think Billy Graham is in better company and enjoying a greater reward than George Will or the *New York Post* will ever know.

thanked the Board for their involvement in the teacher appreciation dinners. It was Williams' opinion that the dinners have been a big success. Williams said the work of the CAT continues and that he felt optimistic in the improvements being made, especially at Madison County Central School.

The Board passed the consent agenda without discussion. The consent agenda included items such as previous meeting minutes, GED requests, the Cazales Autism Services agreement, property disposals, and grant-funded staff trips.

The Board conducted a public hearing on the Willie Ann Glenn Act waiver. The Board is requesting a waiver to allow an extension of the number of days the nutritional program is available to students. After brief public comment, the board passed the waiver. The Board also voted to increase the enrollment at Madison Creative Arts Academy by 18 students. A summer school budget of \$99,149.47 was passed. The Board held a public hearing on travel and per diem. The Board is seeking to

with a second from Harville. Calvin Malone nominated himself, with a second from Burnett. By majority, Dansey was elected as mayor. Dansey nominated Harville to be made Vice Mayor, with a second from Cynthia James. The motion prevailed to select Harville as Vice Mayor.

The meeting proceeded with approval of minutes and discussion of the Town Manager Edward Dean's contract. "I ask that we revisit the contract and the hours. Although I voted for it, I was not in [agreement] with the amount, given the financial status of the town at this time," said Malone. "I would just like to, if any way, reconsider. Half the citizens, yet, even know who he is." In a special session on Wednesday, Feb. 28, Dean came before the board to request a raise from \$500 per week to \$900 per week. Town Clerk Kim Reams informed the council during that time that \$900 per week (\$3600 per month) is actually less than what former Town Manager Jim McCroskey was being paid.

"I would like to say; as far as the last [town] manager that we had—who received more money than what Mr. Dean is making right now—I don't know what he did for the Town of Greenville at all," said Dansey. "There is nothing, no evidence of anything that he did to benefit the town of Greenville. We see evidence of something that Mr. Dean has done. We know of things he's working on toward the betterment of Greenville, so I don't see a problem of giving him a raise at all. His work speaks for itself."

"I was not opposed to a raise, I was just speaking to the amount," said Malone. James stated that he voted on the amount but Malone rebutted, stating that he was misunderstanding at the time of voting during the special session.

follow the state statute in regards to travel and per diem expenses. There was no public discussion, and the Board voted to follow the state statute for travel and per diem expenses. The Board approved personnel changes. The Board also voted to suspend an employee without pay, beginning Wednesday, March 21. This employee has been serving a 10-day suspension with pay that ended on March 21. The employee's case is still under investigation.

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Karen Pickles informed the Board that there is an "active shooter" training scheduled for school administrators on Monday, April 9. Students will be excused from school that day and teachers have the option of taking compensatory time off for the day. Chief Human Capital Officer Sam Stalnaker is currently working on guidelines and instructions for emergency situations that will be made available in every classroom and for every teacher. The district is currently re-evaluating safety procedures in case of school emergencies.

The next meeting of the Madison County District School Board will be a workshop meeting, scheduled for Monday, April 2, at 6 p.m. The meeting will take place in the Board Meeting Room, located at 210 NE Duval Ave., in Madison.

perform the duties of city commissioner of the city of Madison.

Upon swearing in the elected officials, the city commissioners selected a new mayor and a mayor pro-tem, in the event that the mayor is absent. Townsend moved that Ina Thompson be mayor and herself remain mayor pro-tem. Johnson seconded, and the motion prevailed 5-0. Thompson replaced Rayne Cooks as mayor. The mayor serves a one-year term, usually rotating among the members each year.

As the commission was reorganized, Townsend presented Cooks with a plaque in appreciation for her service as mayor of the City of Madison from March 2017 to March 2018.

During the meeting, Anderson stated that there had been questions about the lack of security at City Hall. Two bids on securing the public counter and hallway were brought to her attention: one at approximately \$18,000, "and some change," said Anderson; and the other bid at \$13,131.

"What that \$13,000 would do is the front window would have lexan glass that would protect the front counter area," said Anderson. She stated that there would be a door at the entrance of the hallway, with a button at the front counter to let people in the hallway; otherwise, the employees with offices down the hallway could go to the lobby and let someone in. "Right now, we've got

people that come and go as they please and if you're not paying attention, you don't know who's coming or going where," said Anderson. "So the recommendation is, 'Do we want to pursue this?' and if we do, is this the kind of direction that we would want to go?"

Chief of Madison Police Department (MPD) Reggie Alexander suggested that having a panic button that would alert the MPD would be a good way to have a fast and firm response time, in the case of an incident at City Hall. "Our task is to reduce the risk," said Commissioner Jim Catron. "Is [this] something where there is more benefit than not?"

"When you're looking at it, it would only take a gunman a minute and thirty seconds or less to come in," said Chief Alexander. "I understand what everybody is saying, but at the same time, it's the reducing of the risk." State Fire Marshall regulation is that anyone can be locked out, but nobody can be locked in. "No one can come into our building but [authorized personnel]," said Chief Alexander. "But, we can get out."

Cooks made a motion to proceed with the possibility of looking into grants to cover the cost of setting up security equipment, coming back to the commission with more information. The motion was seconded by Catron, and the motion prevailed.

The next regular scheduled meeting of the Madison City Commission will take place on Tuesday, April 10, beginning at 5:30 p.m. Madison City Hall is located at 321 SW Rutledge St., in Madison.

Tax Tips: Long-Term Care Insurance

Your chances of requiring some sort of long-term care increase as you age, and long-term care insurance (LTCI) can help you cover your long-term care expenses. Although tax issues are probably not foremost in your mind when you buy LTCI, it still pays to consider them. In particular, you should explore whether your premiums will be deductible and your benefits taxable.

You may be eligible for an income tax deduction

You may be able to deduct all or part of the LTCI premiums you pay for yourself, your spouse, or a dependent, but only if your policy meets the IRS criteria for a qualified policy. If you bought the policy before Jan. 1, 1997, and it met the requirements of the state where it was issued, it is automatically considered a qualified policy. If you bought the policy later, it must satisfy several requirements to be considered qualified.

First of all, the policy must provide coverage only for qualified long-term care services. These include necessary diagnostic, preventive, therapeutic, curing, treating, mitigating, and rehabilitative services, as well as maintenance or personal care services that are required by a chronically ill individual, in connection with a plan of care prescribed by a licensed health-care practitioner. Also, your policy must satisfy the following conditions:

- It must be guaranteed renewable, meaning that you can renew your policy as needed without undergoing additional medical exams
- It must not have a cash surrender value or any provision that allows you to cash in, pledge, assign, or borrow against the policy, or receive anything more than a refund of premiums paid if you cancel the policy
- It must provide that any refunds and dividends (other than refunds upon termination of the policy) can be used only to reduce future premiums or increase future benefits
- It must not pay for (or reimburse) expenses that are reimbursable under Medicare, unless Medicare is a secondary payer, or unless the policy pays a specified amount per day regardless of actual expenses
- It must meet certain consumer protection requirements set out in the Internal Revenue Code

The amount of your deduction depends on a few factors

If your LTCI policy meets the conditions listed above, or if it was issued before Jan. 1, 1997, at least part of your premium may be tax deductible as a medical expense. To qualify for a medical expense deduction, your unreimbursed medical expenses (including LTCI premiums) must exceed 10 percent of your adjusted gross income. Also, you must itemize your deductions.

The maximum amount of LTCI premiums that you can deduct in a year depends on your age at the end of the year. In 2017, deduction limits (which are indexed each year for inflation) are as follows:

Age	Limit on Deduction
40 or younger:	\$410
41 to 50:	\$770
51 to 60:	\$1,530
61 to 70:	\$4,090
71 or older:	\$5,110

Watch out — your long-term care insurance benefits may be taxable

A qualified LTCI contract is treated as an accident and health insurance contract, and the benefits are typically treated as tax-free. However, if your contract pays a set dollar amount per day (per diem), the tax-free treatment is subject to a certain limit, indexed annually for inflation. Benefits over and above this limit are generally considered taxable income.

Under this limit, the amount of your LTCI benefits that is excluded from taxation in a given period is figured by subtracting any reimbursement received (through insurance or otherwise) for the cost of qualified long-term care services during the period from the larger of the following amounts:

- The actual cost of qualified long-term care services during the period
- The dollar limit for the period (\$360 per day for any period in 2017)

It's a different story if you have a nonqualified LTCI policy, though. Such benefits may be subject to income tax.



Vehicle recalls in place

A massive recall has been put in place by Ford Motor Company after a series of incidents that have notably caused two accidents, one injury and multiple reports.

Currently, Ford is recalling 1.4 million Ford Fusion and Lincoln MKZ sedans, made from 2014 through 2018. According to Ford, the steering wheel of these vehicles can detach from the steering column and drivers could lose control. Representatives state that the steering wheel bolts can loosen over time.

An incident that occurred in Columbia, Tn., was reported on Oct. 30, 2017: "I was driving earlier this year, traveling down the interstate at 70 mph when my steering wheel came completely loose. I was able to get pulled over with no damage, but did have to get it to a dealership to have the steering wheel put back on properly," said the driver.

Out of the 1.4 million vehicles being recalled, 1.3 million vehicles are in the United States, approximately 62,000 vehicles are in Canada and about 14,000 vehicles are in Mexico.



New Glocks are less than perfection?

Mr. George, I heard where Glock M series are having problems. Have you heard about those problems? Should you decide to use my question, please do not print my name. It's really hard being a pro gun female at my work.

The Blog I read reported a few weeks ago that the new “M” series Glock selected as the FBI's new handgun and tested with some select police departments are experiencing some problems in the field, leading to it being recalled.

It looks like the new Glock 17M pistols are experiencing some problems with the design changes. The Indianapolis Police Department (IMPD) stopped issuing the new duty pistol due to problems during dry fire training. Dry fire training? What happened to live fire training?

The source within the department declined to be named and only spoke on the condition of anonymity about the problems. My source stated that the slides were falling off during dry fire due to a potential issue with the recoil spring assembly and/or the slide stop. IMPD has recalled all issued Glock 17Ms to include the one that was leaked in the lower photo because of the problem.

This news will hurt the egos of others, as myself, who believe the marketing hype of Glock “perfection,” but the reality is that all new models have problems, and the Glock's no different. They've had problems with previous generations of pistols as well, and will no doubt have issues with future

generations, as will every other manufacturer.

More than likely, the firearm needs minor tweaks to be made and then the 17M & 19M will function correctly with a minimal level of failures. This is why you hold field trials before deploying any weapon system.

A Florida Governor's Ellaville home

Now known as a ghost town, an Ellaville home serves as a forgotten part of Madison County's treasured history. Ellaville was founded in 1861 by George Franklin Drew, a successful businessman who eventually became the Governor of Florida.

Ellaville was named by Drew, honoring his African American servant, named Ella. During his time residing in Ellaville, a mansion was built in the late 1860's (possibly in 1867, according to a 1970 edition of the *Madison County Carrier*). Erected by his brothers: John and Ed Drew, the mansion was to be a centerpiece in a big saw mill operation – which was built in 1869 – a half-mile to the east on the banks of the Withlacoochee and Suwannee Rivers, where the two intertwine. The earliest mention of when the mansion was finally finished was in March and April of 1867, when Drew wrote down an unusually long grocery list, including kitchen furnishings, such as dishes,

pans, pots, and tables.

According to a historical resource, the beautiful mansion was two stories tall. Inside was ten rooms. The staircase was made of imported mahogany wood, and the fireplaces were adorned, with marble mantels and facings. The coal used in the fireplaces was barged in on the river for their use. At a later date, the Drew Mansion was among Florida's first rural homes to have running water, electricity and a telephone for communication. The home had oak parquet floors and was surrounded by formal, symmetrical gardens, with a railroad passing through.

Just two years after the mansion was built, both Drew brothers who erected the building had passed away. Ed Drew died July 9, 1869; and John Drew passed away on May 25, 1869. It is assumed that both brothers were living in the Drew Mansion at the time of their passing.

In 1877, Drew was elected as the 12th Governor of the State of Florida. According to the National Governors Association, during Drew's term, the state's penal system and educational programs were hindered by back tax cuts and disbursements that exceeded the state's economic capability. State lands were also utilized to sustain improvements in immigration and internal developments. Little do many know, Drew served as a Madison County Commissioner in 1870, before his tenure as Governor.

In front of the home was a railroad extending from Tallahassee to Jacksonville. The railroad system was the way Drew would make his way to his Tallahassee office on a daily basis. Travel to Jacksonville and Pensacola for political functions was also common. Northeast of the mansion was a family cemetery that held the remains of Drew's granddaughter, Mary Amelia Brush. The cemetery holds nine mortal remains. Of the nine, one was identified as John Clay Thomas. Over the decades, the cemetery grave markers suffered damage from nature and lack of care.

On March 17, 1883, Drew sold his home, his lumber mills and 1,390 acres of his estate in Ellaville to Louis Bucki and moved to Jacksonville where he served as the first President of Jacksonville's Board of Trade. In 1900, Drew passed away at the age of 73.

The Drew Mansion began deteriorating in the 1930's after it became abandoned and vandalized by salvagers. Much of the fencing had deteriorated, leaving the crawl space open to animals, large and small. In 1970, after an unknown corporation bought the land and home, the tragic happened. On Dec. 11, 1970, at approximately 6:30 p.m., the Drew Mansion burned down. The Florida Department of State installed a historic marker a half of a mile east of the site of where the mansion once stood. By 1974, all trees on the property were harvested, and the soil was prepared for replanting.

To this day, there are still several grave markers and ruins lying on the grounds of Drew's once-bountiful land. Though Drew is physically gone, the memory of his estate lives on in Madison County.



Travis Jay makes verbal commitment to FSU

Life for Madison County High School (MCHS) junior Travis Jay may begin to get a little simpler now. For the stand-out two-sport athlete, the college offers have been rolling in on an almost a daily basis. A short list of schools from whom Jay has received offers reads like a *Who's Who* of college football programs, including: Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisville, Maryland, Miami, and Tennessee, just to name a few. Now, Jay has taken a big step forward in making his final decision about where he will be

playing Saturday football. Jay has made a verbal commitment to trade in the maroon and silver for the garnet and gold of Florida State University (FSU). Although a verbal commitment does not preclude Jay from considering other offers, often when an athlete makes a verbal commitment to a school, other schools do not pursue that athlete as strongly.

Jay is a 6' 2", 181-pound cornerback who also saw time as the Cowboys' backup quarterback during the Cowboys' history-making, undefeated State Championship season in 2017. Jay, a three-star recruit according to *rivals.com*, had 29 solo tackles and eight interceptions, including two "pick-six" interceptions returned for touchdowns.

In addition to his contributions on the gridiron, Jay proved to be a valuable asset to this season's Cowboy basketball team. Jay helped to lead the Cowboys to a Final Four appearance in the state Class 1A basketball tournament, a first in Cowboys history. On the court, Jay averaged 15.6 points-per-game and 10.8 rebounds-per-game.

Jay is the son of Valerie Roberson and lives in Greenville.

MCHS Flag Football off to winning start

In their second season, the Madison County High School (MCHS) Girls' varsity flag football team is off to a winning start. The regular season for the Cowgirls began with a Thursday night, March 8 contest with Wakulla High School. Unlike the boys' opening game against Wakulla to begin their championship season, this game was not a "nail-biter." The Cowgirls easily dispatched the Lady War Eagles with a 34-7 score.

Quarterback Kenya Davis went 14-22 passing for 138 yards and two touchdowns. Lasage Ferguson had five receptions for 195 yards and two touchdowns. Zharia Norwood was 1-2 in passing with 17 yards and one TD. Norwood also had one rushing TD of 20 yards, six receptions for 20 yards, including one TD reception and one punt return for 15 yards. Markeyvia House had one rushing TD and one receiving TD for the Cowgirls.

Defensively, Jalyric Stevenson led the team with five tackles. Tamiyah Barfield had two sacks, and Ferguson snatched one interception.

"The girls played really well in their first game

of the regular season. The Cowgirls went 2-0 in the Kickoff Classic beating Gadsden (33-0) and Jefferson County (53-0) earlier in the season," said Coach James Ertzberger.

On Tuesday, March 20, the Cowgirls faced off against Florida A&M University (FAMU) High, in Tallahassee. The Cowgirls won big once more with a 38-0 score.

Davis was again effective from the QB position, going 13-22 for 114 yards, with three touchdowns. House chalked up three touchdowns for the Cowgirls (two receiving touchdowns and one rushing TD).

On the defensive side, Racandra Smith led the Cowgirls with nine tackles and one pass-break-up (PBU). Barfield had five tackles. Isabella Herndon had two tackles, one PBU, and one interception.

Those familiar with football will notice a few differences in the flag football version as compared to traditional football. The first difference is the field is only 80 yards long and not quite as wide as the traditional football field. Offensive play is very similar. Teams may run or pass the ball. Players may block, but may not extend their arms or draw

contact. Teams have four downs in order to gain ten yards, just as in traditional football. Teams may punt on fourth down. One major difference on offense is there are no kicks for a point after touchdown conversion. Instead, when a team scores a touchdown, they may opt for a one, two, or three-point conversion. On a one-point conversion attempt, the ball is placed on the three-yard line. On a two-point conversion attempt, the ball is placed on the 10-yard line. On a three-point conversion attempt, the ball is placed on the 20-yard line.

On the defensive side of the ball, the object is not to tackle a player. Instead, the object is to pull a flag from the waste of the opposing player advancing the ball. When the flag is pulled, the player with the ball is down at that point.

Your next chance to see the Cowgirls in flag football action will be on Monday, March 26 as the Cowgirls take on the Lady Cougars from Godby High School, from Tallahassee. The junior varsity game begins at 5:30 p.m. Kickoff for the varsity game is set for 7 p.m. Both games will take place at Boot Hill Stadium, on the MCHS campus.

How to conserve energy throughout summer

Energy bills tend to be high in the summertime as many people crank up their air conditioners in an attempt to combat the heat. For some households, higher energy bills might be stretching their budgets, while others might be looking for ways to reduce their carbon footprints.

Conserving energy can help homeowners save money and help the planet at the same time. And reducing energy consumption in the summer does not require men and women to sacrifice comfort in the name of conservation. In fact, various strategies can help homeowners and apartment dwellers reduce their summertime energy consumption.

- **Stop cooling an empty home.** A cool home might be the ultimate necessity during summer heat waves, but there's no reason to cool a residence when no one is home. According to the US Department of Energy (DOE), operating thermostats more efficiently can help homeowners trim their cooling costs by as much as 10 percent. One way to be more efficient with thermostats is to keep the house warmer than normal when no one is home. Programmable thermostats can be set, so air conditioning units turn on shortly before residents arrive home, ensuring the house is comfortable, and no energy is wasted.

- **Narrow the gap between indoor and outdoor**

temperatures. The DOE notes that the smaller the difference between the temperature indoors and outside the lower cooling costs will be. While it may be tempting to set thermostats to room temperature (68 degrees fahrenheit) on days when temperatures reach 90 degrees fahrenheit or above, that's an enormous temperature gap that will result in a high energy bill. Instead, the DOE recommends setting thermostats to 78 degrees fahrenheit whenever possible.

- **Open the windows at night.** Daytime temperatures, particularly during the dog days of summer, may necessitate the use of air conditioners. But men and women who live in climates where temperatures drop considerably at night can sleep with their windows open. This reduces energy consumption and saves money, and can be a great way to introduce fresh air into a home during a time of year when air can become stagnant.

- **Do not set air conditioner thermostats at lower than normal temperatures when turning them on.** The DOE notes that setting thermostats at lower than normal temperatures when turning air conditioners on will not cool homes any faster than setting them at typical temperatures. Such a strategy will only lead to excessive energy consumption and higher energy bills.

- **Install ceiling fans.** Ceiling fans can improve cooling efficiency in a home. According to the DOE,


ceiling fans allow men and women who use air conditioners to raise the thermostats on their AC units about 4 degree fahrenheit without adversely affecting comfort levels. Men and women who live in temperate climates may find that ceiling fans are enough to keep rooms cool without the need for air conditioners.

Homeowners can combat high utility bills and excessive energy consumption during the summer with various eco- and budget-friendly strategies.

- **Install a new faucet.** Instantly improve a kitchen or a bathroom with new fixtures. New faucets can provide aesthetic appeal, and low-flow faucets can help conserve water.

- **Create a gallery on the staircase.** Gather and arrange framed photos, artwork or wall accents so that they ascend the wall of a staircase. This creates a designer touch and can dress up an often barren area of wall space.

- **Install a fresh light fixture.** Improve drab spaces with a little illumination. *Better Homes & Gardens* suggests replacing an existing fixture with something new and vibrant. If hanging a new fixture is not within one's skill set, free-standing table or floor lamps also can cast a new glow on a space.

- **Add molding.** Molding can add instant aesthetic appeal to a room. Molding is appropriate near the floor, at the top of walls where they meet the ceiling or even mid-wall as a chair rail. Some homeowners like to create framed molding on walls in formal living spaces.

- **Update kitchen or bathroom hardware.** Replacing hardware is a fast and easy project, but one that can have an immediate impact. Swap out tired or outdated hardware for newer brushed metals and more impactful shapes and designs.

Home renovations do not need to take weeks or months. Many projects can be completed over the course of a weekend.

BRINGING LIFE BACK TO THE TOMB

Since the first Tomb Raider game launched in 1996, Lara Croft has been a recognizable character in video-game circles. She later was embodied in Lara Croft: Tomb Raider in 2001 and its follow-up film two years later by Angelina Jolie, but that was then. In the new film simply titled Tomb Raider, we get a new Lara Croft and a new adventure as, much like the video game did, we relaunch this classic character.

This time around, Lara Croft (Alicia Vikander) is searching for her father. Seven years have passed since Lord Richard Croft's (Dominic West) disappearance, and Lara still holds out hope that he is alive. It isn't until she is faced with the loss of everything her family holds dear that Lara prepares to admit he may be gone forever. But then, a puzzle and a variety of clues lead her to have second thoughts and set out on an adventure to find the man she calls Dad.

The journey has the athletic Croft using all of her mettle to sift through the wilderness and the variety of men who are trying to keep her from finding her father. There is adventure and danger around every corner, but this woman is ready to take on all challenges.

With video-game movies, it can be a fine line between greatness and full-blown cheesy ridiculousness. Tomb Raider walks the line on the good side of the two, but just barely. The longer I thought about it, the more I talked myself into liking what I saw.

However, as the opening salvo in a reboot of the franchise, this isn't an awful effort by any means. The "bad guys" in the movie were disappointing, but there is a real future here.

Welcome back, Lara Croft -- it's good to have you here. For all involved, let's take this iconic character to the next level next time and create a complete movie for the versatile Ms. Vikander. The fans of the game and fans of fun action movies will all thank you.






