## Three charged with second degree murder

After a suspect in a fatal shooting that occurred in March posted bond of \$150,000 on Thursday, March 8, the Madison Police Department (MPD) is asking for your help in locating her.

On Wednesday, March 7, officers were dispatched to Madison County Memorial Hospital (MCMH), at approximately 11:01 a.m. Upon arrival, MPD located a blue Honda Accord at the emergency room entrance of the hospital with a person in the back seat. Jamescya Pringle, 19, of Madison, had been abandoned in the back seat of the Honda Accord and was pronounced dead. Upon further investigation, it was determined that a bystander had driven Pringle to MCMH. "[The bystander] had nothing to do with the incident," said Chief Alexander.

After investigation, officers found that an armed burglary had taken place at a residence on Mandina Ave., in Madison. According to FDLE, four suspects: Jamescya Pringle, 19; Jeremiah Davis, 21; Keosha Lewis, 20; and Selena Murray, 18, all of Madison, entered a home occupied

## Overcorrection leads to injuries

On Tuesday, April 10, Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) and first responders investigated an accident that began on Interstate 10, in Madison County, and ended on a dirt road parallel to the interstate.

At approximately 3:55 p.m., Vanessa Yakimchuk, 19, of Jacksonville, was traveling westbound in the inside lane when she traveled off the roadway. Yakimchuk overcorrected and caused her 2005 Toyota Camry to rotate counterclockwise. Yakimchuk traveled off the north side of the road, over the grass portion and the driver side of her vehicle collided with a fence. Yakimchuk's vehicle proceeded to travel through the fence onto Genoa Way, in Madison. The rear of her car collided with a dirt road embankment and rotated to a stop, coming to a final rest facing south.

Yakimchuk stated she was tired and could have possibly fallen asleep before running off the road. She was transported to Tallahassee Memorial Hospital with non-incapacitating injuries. FHP was assisted by Madison Fire Rescue and Madison County EMS.

## Practice Money Smart Strategies

Do we ever have enough money? For most Americans, the answer is no. It seems the money flows through our hands very quickly, and it's hard for some people to keep their heads above water. Money Smart Week, a public awareness

campaign designed to help consumers better manage their money begins tomorrow, April 21<sup>st</sup> and runs through April 28<sup>th</sup>. Similar to America Saves, it is a broad coalition of private, public, non-for-profit, schools and governmental agencies coming together to spread the word of consumers taking personal action to improve their money skills. This observance also works well as part of April's National Financial Literacy Month.

Money comes and goes, but there is a lot to think about if you want your money to go further and increase your net worth over time. According to the Money Smart campaign, there are five things consumers do with money; we earn, spend, save and invest and borrow. Some of these things you may be doing well, but maybe you need to work on other financial skills to make money go further.

Earning money is the first step in the Money Smart process. If you already earn an income, make it your business to understand all of the deductions and withholding. Social Security and Medicare taxes are two deductions we all have. Other deductions may be employer benefits such as health insurance, retirement or a savings plan.

Spending money is necessary, but some people spend every dime they bring home without blinking an eye. The solution; have a spending plan. Know your total take-home pay for the month, keep track of purchases and write it down.

Pay attention to expenses. Fixed expenses are the same every month, while flexible expenses change. It's the flexible expenses that can be trimmed if you discover you are spending more than you bring in. It isn't hard or time-consuming to work on a spending plan, and it is one sure way of putting yourself in charge of your money. Think before you make a purchase, comparison shop and get the best buy.

Saving and investing money will help you build wealth over time. Start a savings habit now and don't let low-interest rates be your excuse. Build an emergency fund for unexpected events such as a car breaking down or the water heater going out.

Invest money for life events such as a child's education and retirement. Regular amounts of money over time add up. You may want to consult a financial planner for investment advice; it is money well spent. Start early; you'll have time on your side and funds will grow.

Borrow money wisely. Attaining a home mortgage or buying a car for transportation to work are two good reasons to borrow money. Pay your bills on time to build a positive credit report which translates into a lower interest rate when you need to borrow money. You may not have given it much thought, but all of those credit cards are loans, you pay a monthly payment with interest. Before opening a line of credit, understand the annual percentage rate and fees involved. Purchasing on credit adds to your debt load, not your income. If you have credit card debt, make a plan to pay bills off.

Protecting your money involves action on your part, keeping financial records is a step in the right direction. Identity theft is a major consumer problem these days, so guard your personal information. Lock your social security card in a safe place and never carry it in your wallet. Never give out personal information such as bank account numbers, your date of birth or social security number over the phone or e-mail.

It looks like there's going to be a contest in Florida for a U.S. Senate seat. The seat is now occupied by Bill Nelson!

What on earth has Bill Nelson contributed, for the sake of Florida, from that Senate seat? That question has never been far from my mind, that is, since about 2001.

Bill Nelson has been present nearly 30 years in Washington. What impact has he made for Florida, or, for that matter, the Nation? His exploits in space, well, are interesting, but hardly of great importance to the improvement for the real lives of real people.

That's quite a list of accomplishments for having spent 30 years in Washington. Voters are being asked to reward Bill by returning him to a fourth, six-year term at age 76.

The Republican Party of Florida (RPOF) has launched *NoMoreNelson.org* to highlight that after nearly 30 years in Congress, Bill Nelson has sponsored 860 pieces of legislation and only ten have been signed into law. "His mediocre ascension through the political ranks has produced no noteworthy accomplishments," says RPOF, "but instead has left behind a trail of high taxes and lost jobs. Bill Nelson has failed to do his only job—representing Floridians in Washington City."

Republicans elaborate: Three of the ten pieces of legislation Nelson sponsored was during his time in the U.S. House of Representatives. Nelson's 10-item "career accomplishment," has cost an estimated \$4.4 million in taxpayer-funded government salary over the course of his

political career.

But what Nelson may lack on his invisible record and below-par (49 percent) name recognition, he makes up on energized opposition in Florida to President Donald J. Trump's perceived policies on guns, minorities, immigrants, and women.

### Rick Scott

It's now official. Governor Rick Scott, wants the Senate seat, not to offset Florida's second Senate seat occupied by Marco Rubio, but to enhance Florida's clout by having a united two, and not a divided two, if Bill Nelson were to be returned to the Senate.

In February, Rick Scott's approval rating as governor was at 58 percent. A growing Florida economy has given his campaign a strong foundation, as well.

Under his leadership, taxes have been cut by more than \$10 billion, businesses have created nearly 1.5 million new jobs, and record investments have been made in Florida's education system, transportation infrastructure, and environment.

### An Expensive Race

It's predicted that Floridians will view the race between Nelson and Scott as entertainment, until, it gets caught up in the inevitable "food fight." Then, it's like, "Cut it out!" Each side will have millions to spend. And they will! Let's just sit back and enjoy the passing parade, because it has to run its course, with or without our concurrence.

by a male and female victim. The suspects tied-up the woman and beat the man. Davis was armed with a gun and threatened the victims. The male victim was able to retrieve his firearm and shoot the suspects, killing Pringle and injuring Davis. Lewis and Murray, who were not injured, fled the home and were arrested a few hours later.

Lewis and Murray were booked into the Madison County Jail, and after recovering from his injuries, Davis was taken to jail. All three suspects were charged with armed burglary. On Thursday, March 8, Lewis posted bond of \$150,000 and was released from the Madison County Jail, while Murray and Davis remained in custody.

On Tuesday, April 3, Lewis was arrested on a separate

misdemeanor offense and was released from jail shortly after. Since then, the additional charges of murder in the second degree and two counts of battery, stemming from the March 7 burglary case have been added to Lewis' list of charges by the State Attorney's Office. Jeremiah Davis was additionally charged with burglary with battery, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, and murder in the second degree. Selena Murray was also charged with burglary with battery and murder in the second degree. Greene Publishing, Inc. has contacted the State Attorney's office on when these additional charges were added, but as of press time, no phone calls were returned.

The MPD has issued a warrant for the arrest of Keosha Leshay Lewis but are unable to locate her. If you have any information about Lewis' whereabouts, you are asked to immediately call the Madison Police Department at (850) 973-4001, ext. 1.

of the Town of Greenville, they offer their strong support for the Madison County Board of County Commissioners locating a 24-hour dual-trained EMT/firefighter unit in

Greenville. As stated in the letter, the Town of Greenville is prepared to immediately house the additional staff at the town's fire station. According to Dean, the average arrival time of EMS is anywhere from 15 to 20 minutes after being called. "This should cut it down to five minutes or less," said Dean. "They will also be able to fight fires. We haven't had sufficient back up readily available to us, and this will eliminate that."

As of right now, the letter of support has not been taken before the Madison County Board of County Commissioners; therefore an interlocal agreement was not available to spell out any and all obligations of both parties. Kovacherich Arnold, a volunteer firefighter with the Greenville Volunteer Fire Department, stated that the Town of Greenville has had EMS services stationed in Greenville before, but that lasted only a short amount of time. Arnold's main concern was whether or not EMS and the County has enough staff to support a full-time EMT in Greenville. Councilman Burnett made a motion to approve the letter of support and Vice Mayor Harville seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Town Attorney John Reid brought forth Resolution No. 2018-

01: A resolution of the town council of the Town of Greenville, authorizing and approving execution of a contract with BancorpSouth Equipment Finance, a division of BancorpSouth Bank. During a special session on Wednesday, Feb. 28, the Town Council was made aware of the failing status of Greenville's former sanitation truck. Dean was very concerned about the safety of the public works employees as well as other citizens should the brakes fail on the sanitation truck. A motion was made to declare an emergency, and the council (with the exception of former councilwoman Brandi Seabrooks) authorized Dean to enter into a purchasing agreement for a new sanitation truck on behalf of the Town of Greenville.

The terms of the contract entails a five year finance period, whereby the Town of Greenville will pay \$2,704.81 monthly for the sanitation truck. A motion was made by Councilman Burnett to adopt the resolution. It was seconded by Councilwoman James, and the motion prevailed unanimously. As of right now, it is still unknown how the sanitation truck will be paid for. When a citizen of Greenville voiced her concern whether the citizens of Greenville will be paying for the sanitation truck or not, Mayor Dansey stated that the matter has not yet been discussed.

The next regular scheduled town council meeting will take place on Monday, May 14, at 6 p.m. Greenville Town Hall is located at 154 SW Old Mission Ave., in Greenville.

## North Florida man arrested for neglect and defraud

Attorney General Pam Bondi's Medicaid Fraud Control Unit (MFCU) and the Suwannee County Sheriff's Office arrested a North Florida man on Thursday, April 12, for allegedly using personal identification of disabled adults in a fraud scheme. Jared Austin Combee, 31, of McAlpin, allegedly falsified timesheets for services Combee never performed.

The MFCU investigation revealed that Combee falsified progress notes to his employer, Building Dreams, for services not rendered and left two disabled adults without care, supervision and services that their physicians ordered. From the falsified progress notes, Combee received more than \$2,000 and defrauded Medicaid out of more than \$4,000. Combee's claimed service dates and times for the disabled adults directly conflicted with the times Combee worked at Advanced Auto Parts, the defendant's second job.

Combee faces one count of organized fraud and two counts of criminal use of personal identification information of a disabled adult, all third-degree felonies. The State Attorney's Office for the Third Judicial Circuit will prosecute this case.

## Scam Alert: IRS telephone scams

As tax season comes to a close, the number of phone calls from scammers claiming to be from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) rise. For one Madison County resident, he got a call more than once.

According to [irs.gov](http://irs.gov), a sophisticated phone scam targeting taxpayers, including recent immigrants, has been making the rounds throughout the country. Callers claim to be IRS employees, using fake names and IRS identification badge numbers.

The resident, who will remain anonymous, claims that he received a call from a number out of Washington, D.C. As he answered the call, he was promptly told that there was a warrant out for his arrest for tax evasion and owing back taxes, and the phony IRS scammers stated that they wanted to inform him before law enforcement came to his home. Before the scammers even began to give him options to make a payment, he disregarded the message and hung up the phone. The resident stated that he called the same number back and the scammers answered the phone as the Internal Revenue Service.

Victims are told they owe money to the IRS and it must be paid promptly through a gift card or wire transfer, according to [irs.gov](http://irs.gov). Victims, like the resident in Madison County, may be threatened with arrest, deportation or suspension of a business or driver's license. In some cases, the scammer may become hostile and insulting. If the phone isn't answered, the scammers often leave an "urgent" callback request.

If you receive a call and you are unsure if a scammer is on the other line, here are some tips given by the IRS. The IRS does not:

- Call to demand immediate payment using a specific method of payment, such as a prepaid debit card, gift card or wire transfer. Generally, the IRS will first mail you a bill if you owe any taxes.
- Threaten to bring in local police or other law-enforcement agencies to have you arrested for not paying.
- Demand payment without giving you the opportunity to question or appeal the amount they say you owe.
- Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.

Thousands, possibly millions of people, have lost plenty of money and their personal information to tax scams. Scamming can not just be initiated over the phone but through mail and/or email. If you receive such a call through any of those sources, remember the tips listed above to determine whether or not you are being scammed.



## Facts About Refinancing

### Even with interest rates rising, you may want to explore the possibilities

In the first quarter of 2018, the refinance share of home loan applications in the U.S. fell to 40 percent, the lowest in ten years. Higher mortgage rates had reduced demand for refis.

Still, the refi is not exactly dead. If you have good credit, you may be considering refinancing yourself, for one or more reasons. Perhaps you want to shorten the term of your home loan. Maybe you have an adjustable-rate mortgage now and want to refi into a fixed rate. Or, maybe you want to tap into home equity or consolidate debt. Whatever your reason(s), you must ask yourself two questions. One, how long do you want to stay in your home? Two, how much money will you really save?

Refinances break down into three types: rate-and-term, cash-out, and cash-in. Rate-and-term refis simply adjust the term and/or the interest rate of your existing loan. Even though interest rates are rising now, they still make up the bulk of refinances. This kind of refi could permit you to walk away from closing with as much as \$2,000 in cash. The no-cash-out variety adds closing costs to the loan balance, relieving you from having to pay those costs out of pocket.

A cash-out refi gives you an opportunity to tap home equity and pay off your existing mortgage. In a cash-out mortgage, the loan balance on the refinance is at least five percent more than the balance on the original loan. As you just owe the balance of your original loan to the lender, the overage is either paid out as cash at closing or routed to your creditors to help you whittle down other debts.

A cash-in refi is the inverse of a cash-out refi. You bring cash to the closing to lower the outstanding principal of the loan, pursuant to a shorter loan term or a lower interest rate available at lower loan-to-values (LTVs). You may be able to cancel mortgage insurance premium payments as part of the move (i.e., by reducing a conventional mortgage to 80 percent LTV or lower).

How much will a refi cost? In ballpark terms, the answer is often \$2,000-\$5,000. In percentage terms, think three to five percent of the loan amount.

The price of a refi may be notably cheaper in one state than

another, thanks to variations in closing costs. Of course, certain closing costs may be negotiable, like app and processing fees. Sometimes you can save on title searches, title insurance, and inspections by turning to a third party for those services. If your last appraisal was conducted recently, you might be able to negotiate your way out of a new one.

Sometimes you can refinance

without an appraisal.

offer streamlined

refinancing

programs to

homeowners with

existing FHA or VA-

backed home loans.

The underwriting

process is less

demanding than it

would be otherwise.

Besides usually

waiving the

credit score and

income verifications.

In some

situations,

refinancing may not

be "the answer."

If you are stretching the term of your

loan out with a refi, you will carry

mortgage debt for years longer than

you originally planned, complete

with thousands more paid out in

interest. If you are using home

equity to fund a remodel or

upgrades, your home's value may

not rise as much as you anticipate

from the work. Then there are the

little curveballs life throws at us,

such as potential job changes and

relocations. If you sense you might

have to move before you can

recapture the closing costs of the

refi, is it even worth the trouble to

try?

Hopefully, you will be able to

lower the interest rate on your loan,

shorten its term, or find a way to

reduce your monthly payments

through refinancing. Online

calculators and a conversation with a

trusted mortgage professional may

help you determine the potential

break-even points for a refi and find

paths to a home loan more suitable

to your needs.

Every day, approximately eight million plastic items find their way into the oceans of this world, killing over 100 million sea animals each year. 

Amnesty Day is an opportunity for citizens to discard their hazardous household waste items at no cost. Because Madison County is required to pay for the disposal of its waste tires at a cost of \$129.00 per ton, citizens should come prepared to pay for the disposal of their waste tires. This event is only hosted for citizens to dispose of such items and is not available to businesses. As per guidelines from the Department of Environmental Protection, businesses are required to have a hazardous waste disposal plan with other certified agencies to dispose of their waste. To insure that the disposal of such items is consistent with the guidelines from EPA, and authorized in-county citizen usage, disposal of waste items will be carefully documented. Citizens are urged to be attentive to the following safety tips to avoid injury, as well as referring to the table of information outlining a description of hazardous household waste items and associated costs.

### SAFETY TIPS

1. Do not transport any liquids in an open container; containers must be closed.
2. Take the time to segregate like items before transporting.
3. Make the best effort to cushion glass containers to help prevent breakage.
4. If a liquid solution is not labeled, do not attempt to identify it by smelling.
5. If necessary, make the best effort to wear gloves and masks to prevent injury.
6. Avoid combining liquids that may be potentially explosive or corrosive.





It's time for the incredibly intelligent gorilla, George, to have his own movie as the new film *Rampage* comes to theaters. Based on the classic video game of the same name, this offering is bound to leave a path of destruction halfway across the United States.

George is living a charmed life in a San Diego preserve under the watchful eye of primatologist Davis Okoye (Dwayne Johnson). But when a mysterious canister lands within his habitat, George is transformed into a bigger, more aggressive beast, and Davis must quickly figure out what is going on.

The arrival of a mystery woman brings some answers. Dr. Kate Caldwell (Naomie Harris) thinks she knows what George is going through, and as the aggression increases and the gorilla grows, she tries to help. But a shadowy government agency led by Harvey Russell (Jeffrey Dean Morgan) has other plans.

As George is captured, and Davis and Kate are taken away, they quickly find out George isn't the only animal that has been infected by a rogue canister. Turns out a wolf and a crocodile also came in contact with the gene-modifying pathogen. And now the three giant creatures are converging on Chicago, and with their aggression, Chicago doesn't stand a chance.







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**Charred Green Beans with Lemon Verbena Pesto**  
Serves 2 to 4**Green Beans**

1 1/2 pounds slender green beans  
2 teaspoons olive oil

**Lemon Verbena Pesto**

1 cup fresh lemon verbena leaves (substitute fresh lemon balm leaves)  
2 garlic cloves  
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese  
1/4 cup pine nuts or English walnuts  
1/2 cup olive oil

Fine kosher or sea salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

Prepare a hot fire in your grill.

Toss the beans with olive oil and place in a perforated grill basket or wok set on a baking sheet.

For the Lemon Verbena Pesto, combine the lemon verbena, garlic, cheese, and nuts in a food processor and pulse to puree. Slowly add the olive oil with the processor running until the mixture thickens and emulsifies, about 1 minute. Season to taste with salt and pepper. The pesto will keep in the refrigerator for 7 to 10 days, or it may be frozen for up to 3 months.

Place the grill wok or basket directly over the fire and stir-grill, tossing the beans with wooden paddles or grill spatulas until crisp-tender, about 5 to 8 minutes. Transfer the grilled beans to a large bowl and toss with about 1/4 cup of the Lemon Verbena Pesto or to taste.


