## Fire sends one to hospital

A grease fire sent a resident at Deer Run Apartments in Pace to the hospital via Lifeguard ambulance for smoke inhalation, and another was treated on scene for minor smoke inhalation at around 2 p.m. Monday afternoon.

The grease fire started from the kitchen on the stove according to Fire

Chief Donnie Wadkins with Pace Volunteer Fire Department.

"They tried to put it out with an extinguisher, and got in front of it and just inhaled a lot of smoke," Wadkins said.

The resident who tried to put the fire out with a fire extinguisher was treated for smoke inhalation.

The fire sent occupants inside the apartment located near Alba Street on Highway 90 fleeing outside,

leaving four cats, which later had to be retrieved by the volunteer fire department, inside the home.

Three of the four cats were pulled from the smoke filled house. Firefighters tried to retrieve the fourth cat, but it crawled under a box spring mattress in one of the bedrooms.

Pace Volunteer Fire Department responded to the scene along with Santa Rosa County Sheriff officers.

## 'They mistake our good nature for stupidity'



### County commissioner Gordon Goodin gives BP one week to clean up

County commissioner Gordon Goodin and City of Gulf Breeze Councilman Dana Morris held a press conference Friday afternoon to warn British Petroleum and the Coast Guard that they had until today to make a more diligent response to the oil crisis before it hit Gulf Breeze, or they were implementing the National Incident Management System.

NIMS is a system used in the U.S. to implement emergency preparedness and incident management among local, na-

tional and state agencies.

The system is normally used to respond to natural disasters such as hurricanes and terrorist attacks.

"This is unacceptable," Goodin said at Shoreline Park in Gulf Breeze. "If this isn't solved by next Wednesday (today)... everywhere we see a FEMA sticker, we will remove it and replace it with BP."

Goodin said the lagging response allowed oil to slick its way into the Gulf Breeze pass. The commissioner said the county was getting reports of oil sightings

## Mental health professionals offer help to gulf residents

It has been two months since the Deepwater Horizon incident, but the rippling effects are now being felt closer to home.

To help combat some of the negative effects of the oil spill, the mental health professionals of Lakeview Center, an affiliate of Baptist Health Care, are providing the public with ways to help cope with stress, anxiety and depression that may be brought on by the disaster.

Dr. David Josephs, psychologist and clinical director with the Lakeview Center, noted the need growing just recently.

"Up until about a week to a week and a half ago we didn't see a real impact," Josephs said. "Then last week we saw an increase in the request for services to our hotline that coincided with the arrival of the oil on Pensacola Beach, Navarre, and Destin."

"What we are looking to do is support the community and drive home the message of resiliency, which we have demonstrated many times in recent years when you look at the impact of the hurricanes and other issues affecting us."

Dr. Josephs provides the following advice:

### Reacting to a Traumatic Event

After surviving a disaster, individuals may feel dazed or even numb. They may also feel sad, helpless, or anxious. In spite of the tragedy, some people just feel happy to be alive. These are all normal reactions to the stress of a crisis.

### Anger

Anger is a normal, healthy emotion that moves us to action when we have been wronged or victimized. The gulf

## Emergency personnel respond to reported plane crash at airport

Emergency personnel in Santa Rosa County responded to a reported plane crash Friday around noon at Peter Prince Airport in East Milton.

Preliminary reports indicate Jerry Akers was traveling north on a runway to take off when the gear underneath his single prop Paradise plane broke according to East Milton Fire Chief Josh

Thompson.

Akers, who lives in Birmingham, Ala., was able to direct his plane into the grass without any incident.

Officials at the airport were still awaiting word from the Federal Aviation Administration concerning the accident, but all emergency personnel were shortly released from the scene after responding.

Responding to the reported crash were members of the East Milton Fire Department and Milton Fire Department.

The number of people mobilized to clean up the beaches depends on the size of the affected area. Individual teams can number in the hundreds, and thousands of additional workers remain on-call. Working with the Coast Guard, our teams continue cleaning up until the last bit of oil has been removed. As a result, in most cases when oil reaches a beach, it is even possible to keep it open.

#### Our Responsibility

Our beach cleanup operations will continue until the last of the oil has been skimmed from the sea, the beaches and estuaries have been cleaned up, and the region has been pronounced oil-free. And none of the costs of our efforts will be paid by taxpayers.

Our commitment is that we'll be here for as long as it takes. We may not always be perfect, but we will make this right.


I'm sure you've heard the tale of the frog and the pot of water. Put a frog in a pot of hot water and it will instantly jump out. Place the same frog

Dear Pastor Gallups, "I love your column and look forward to it every week. I've always believed that nothing happens by accident – only that God allows things to come and go in our lives – but what does it mean in Ecclesiastes when it says that time and chance happens to every man? Thank you." A.C., Milton

Dear A.C.,

Thank you for your kind words about my column.

King Solomon wrote Ecclesiastes. It was written during a time when he was very rich, very powerful and...very board with life. He had wandered away from the freshness of his relationship with the Lord God who had blessed him with his wealth and power.

Although there is much wisdom and warning to be gleaned from this book, and although it is the Word of God by Holy Spirit inspiration...not every word in it, of course, is the word of ultimate truth of God Himself. You often hear the misguided and incorrect interpretation of life spoken by a man who had wondered far from God.

Ecclesiastes is a journal or a diary of man on a spiritual journey. In all of Solomon's wandering from God, he found no satisfaction or purpose in life. Solomon often referred to life as "meaningless".

The particular verse you refer to is Ecclesiastes 9:11. Reading verses 7–14 as a unit will give a better understanding. I believe that Solomon is wrong in that we are not merely "victims" of time and chance. Acts 17:26 says that God has determined the time and the exact places where men should live! God has a purpose for your time and place, A.C.!

I believe it is true that God is actively involved in our lives. I do not believe however that he ordains every detail that happens to us. We are free agents in many ways. We make choices. 



# Woman killed, child injured in separate accidents

A child was sent to Sacred Heart Hospital in critical condition Saturday morning after the all terrain vehicle he was riding on with a 70-year-old male hit a pine tree off of Bon Bay Drive in Milton.

According to the report, the passenger of the vehicle, 4-year-old Logan Campbell "gained control" of the throttle, while the driver of the vehicle, Edward Pasek was on the ATV, causing Pasek to lose control of the vehicle.

According to the report, the ATV accelerated and crossed

Bon Bay Drive and drove into a drainage ditch on the south side of Bon Bay Drive and struck a pine tree head on.

The report stated both the driver and the passenger were not wearing helmets during the time of the crash.

According to a house supervisor at Sacred Heart Hospital, Pasek was treated and released after suffering serious injuries, while the 4-year-old remains at Sacred Heart in critical condition as of Monday afternoon.

The crash investigation is still pending.

In a separate incident on Saturday, a 50-year-old woman was

killed after being ejected from a pickup truck after she veered off of the road on State Road 87 and struck a tree.

The crash report stated the Chevrolet pickup was traveling south on State Road 87 at about 4:00 p.m. when for an unknown reason, the vehicle traveled to the east shoulder striking a tree, causing the vehicle to overturn onto its right side.

The accident caused \$4,000 in damages to the vehicle.

According to the report, the driver, Abbieirena Cox was not wearing a seatbelt and was partially ejected from the vehicle.

Cox was pronounced dead at

the scene.

An alcohol report is still pending on the case as of Monday afternoon.

In another incident that occurred on US 98 in Navarre, a Milton man was issued a citation for violation of right of way after he pulled into a vehicle when attempting to turn left on Highway 98, causing the vehicle he hit to strike a power pole, which fell across the Highway.

The report did not state if the vehicle was turning into a business or another road, but said it was somewhere near State Road 399.

The cited driver, 64-year-old

Richard Reu was attempting to turn left when it veered into the path of a 2-door Chevrolet driven by 19-year-old John Gatzman of Fort Walton Beach.

According to the report, the right front of Reu's vehicle struck the left front of Gatzman's vehicle, and Gatzman's vehicle veered off the right of the road and struck power pole support cables, which caused power lines to fall across Highway 98.

Highway 98 was closed due to the downed power lines for two hours according to the report.

Gulf Power was able to restring the power lines and had them off of the road by 5 p.m.

since 6:30 Friday morning up until 9 a.m.

"I just received an e-mail from unified command that boats are on their way," Goodin said. "Ladies and gentleman it's 12:45 (p.m.), this is inexcusable."

Goodin said the county has already dished out \$300,000 to pay for equipment and boats to handle the oil before it reached the shores. The City of Gulf Breeze has spent \$250,000 to do the same thing.

Both the city and coun-

ty have yet to see any of that money be reimbursed through BP, and said both government bodies are broke, Goodin said.

"The city put \$250,000 in place to make sure coastline does not get destroyed like Pensacola is now," city councilmen Morris said with the Pensacola Beach ball tower seen behind him in the distance. "We have the county working hard, the city working hard and BP falling short."

"The next step will be the

point where the city cannot afford anything else."

Goodin said at the current time there are not enough buoys in place to block oil from entering certain parts of the bay area, and the county and city have run out of funds. The original plan to block off several areas around Gulf Breeze with buoys was not completed in time.

The commissioner was hoping he could stop the oil before it hit the shores of Gulf Breeze, but the lack of

help and the lack of effort he said has caused oil to make its way into the bay.

"Oil was nearly to the city of Gulf Breeze last night. We were told this would never happen," Goodin said.

Goodin said he knew Thursday night from information he received from BP officials that the oil was going to make its way into the pass, and he said no boats or crews responded to stop it. Goodin said as of Friday morning oil had been pushed by a flood tide into the pass,

and another flood tide could push the oil into the East Bay.

"This all could have been stopped if we had boats out there Thursday night," Goodin said.

Right now Goodin said there are only two boats that are working to keep the oil off the Gulf Breeze coast, one is owned by the city, and another by the State. Both boats did not respond until hours after the first oil sighting call was made Friday morning.

"If we do not have im-

proved response from now until Wednesday (today), I will ask the President to implement the National Incident Management System," Goodin said.

Goodin said because the city and county are out of money and have not received funds from BP, there is nothing left for the county to do at this point, and that using NIMS would be the county and city's only option.

"We don't have billions upon billions of dollars like BP does," he said.

animals and community are being victimized by the oil spill. Significant anger regarding the events is normal. Properly directed this anger can provide energy for recovery. Improperly directed it is destructive, divisive and damaging.

• Direct anger into community involvement and help. Individuals can focus their energies on helping friends, family, community and those whose livelihoods have been affected by the oil spill.

• Be mindful of displacing/directing anger at those close to us such as our children, spouses, family, etc.

• Be mindful that even those who disagree with us about the crisis are likely hurting too.

• Be part of the solution, not the problem.

### Protect Yourself

Just as individuals would protect themselves from the flu with a flu vaccination, these are steps that can be taken to lessen the impact of stress from the oil spill.

• Limit exposure to unsettling information (turn off the TV)

• Spend time with family

• Go to church, synagogue or mosque.

• Develop a routine of exercise and healthy living.

### Ask for Help

Untreated anxiety and depression, substance abuse, and isolation or lack of a support system may put individuals at greater risk of mental health impacts from the oil spill. It is important for individuals to ask for help if they:

• Find that they are un-

able to take care of themselves or their children.

• Are not able to do their job.

• Use alcohol or drugs to get away from their problems.

• Feel sad or depressed for more than two weeks.

• Think about suicide.

In this case, individuals should talk to a counselor, their physician, a community mental health organization such as Lakeview Center, or the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (1-800-273-TALK).

### Children (and Adults also)

It is important that parents help their children cope by using these measures (which can also be helpful tips for adults):

• Validate what children are seeing and hearing — oil

is a real problem.

• Provide hope. Explain to children that lots of people are involved in cleaning the beaches and fixing the problem. Explain that your children will be able to go to the beach again.

• Remember that children absorb what's around them. Be a positive, healthy stimulus by increasing your own resiliency to the situation.

• Give children an active role so they feel they can contribute to the beach getting better. For example, children might donate allowance money to a clean-up effort, keep their own rooms clean or spend time with friends who are also missing the beach.

• Do not take children to the beach to actually clean oil.

Right now the Lakeview Center in Pensacola and the

Avalon Center of Lakeview in Milton are working to get more support services established.

"Working on the message of resiliency is a long term mental health strategy that has worked in many different places like the Oklahoma City Bombing, 9-11, and other situations," Josephs said. "We need to look at it therapeutically and understand it is bad, but we can deal with it and it will go away."

Dr. Josephs noted one of the most important groups is of those who are affected financially by this crisis.

"There are those who are facing what seems like a life and death battle," Josephs said. "Before this many were on the brink financially to begin with. These are the people who need immediate attention because we are talking their livelihood and jobs."

Josephs noted this is a very resilient area in more ways than one, but just the sheer magnitude of churches is a big help.

"I have lived here since 1995 and this area is very unique to other places in America," Josephs said. "There are more churches here per capita, which is something our community depends on, but we have fishermen and other groups who are pretty strong people across the region."

"That is part of that healing message and for each of us not to forget it."

The Avalon Center is located on Spikes Way in Milton and is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

## Watson wins 3-way playoff

**CROMWELL, Conn.** (AP) — Bubba Watson really wanted to play well at the Travelers Championship to impress U.S. Ryder Cup captain Corey Pavin. He did.

Watson overcame a six-stroke deficit Sunday to force a playoff with Pavin and Scott Verplank, then beat Verplank with a par on the second playoff hole.

Watson, the long-hitting left-hander from the Florida Panhandle, closed with a 4-under 66 to match Verplank (64) and Pavin (66) at 14 under. Pavin dropped out on the first extra hole.

After making a 3-footer on the par-3 16th to win, Watson hugged wife, Angie, and began crying. He said he was so nervous, he could not feel his

arms on the final putt.

"I'm a very emotional guy," he said. "I cry all the time. When I go to church on Sunday, I cry at church. I couldn't get the 'Yes' out of 'I do' at my wedding. The pastor said, 'You got to say it. You can't just nod. You can't nod.'

"Everybody has issues. My family had some issues. My dad is battling cancer. My wife last year thought she had a tumor in her brain. We got lucky with that one, and now, we're battling with my dad. It's emotional."

It was largest comeback on the tour since Padraig Harrington also came from six back to win the 2007 British Open.

Verplank left his tee shot short and left of the green on the second playoff hole and

missed an 8-foot par putt. Watson, who had a 48-footer for birdie, was able to steady his nerves enough to get it close.

The 50-year-old Pavin, who was taking a break from the Champions Tour to scout players for the Ryder Cup, was eliminated on the first playoff hole after hitting his tee shot just 219 yards (101 yards shorter than Watson) and putting his approach into a bunker short of the 18th green.

He chipped to 3 feet, earning a standing ovation.

"The playoff was a little disappointing to me," he said. "I kind of popped up a three-wood there and left myself in a pretty precarious spot."

"Now, it's just time to go back and play with golfers my own age," he added.

Justin Rose, coming off his

first PGA Tour win this month at the Memorial, had a three-stroke lead entering the round. But the 29-year-old Englishman shot a 75 to tie for ninth at 11 under.

"It was obviously my tournament to lose," Rose said. "I could have shot 1-over par today and won the golf tournament. It's disappointing. It wasn't overly difficult today."

Watson ended Europe's tour winning streak at three. Northern Ireland's Graeme McDowell won the big prize last week at the U.S. Open. The Memorial was Rose's first tour win, and fellow Englishman Lee Westwood won the St. Jude Classic.

Watson earned \$1.08 million and moved into eighth place in the FedEx Cup rankings.

## Auggie Grill finds his way back to victory lane

Flashbacks washed over Augie Grill at Five Flags Speedway on Friday.

The uneasiness caused him to squirm a little his Super Late Model seat.

The two-time Snowball Derby champion lost the Blizzard Series season opener when on a late caution he began leaking fluid, putting a sudden and dramatic end to his night.

When another came out on Lap 91 during the U.S.A. Digital 100 on Friday, Grill was bound to not let history repeat itself.

Lesson learned, as Grill made a dominant return to Victory Lane.

"That first race was heartbreak," said Grill, who was dominant from qualifying and

thereafter. "I didn't smell in the car anything this time. I thought we'd be all right when everybody got back out. Fortunately, I was able to pull away."

He drove away from the youngster Chase Elliott, who won here last month and unofficially took the Blizzard points lead after finishing as the runner-up.

Elliott led a good portion of the race early but could not close the door when Grill came barreling down on him in the middle of the race.

"I worked as hard as I could, but Augie was too tough," the 14-year-old said. "It'll be our goal from here on out to win every week."

On a night full of bright pink, purple, green, orange and more fireworks, yellow was the

color that stole the show at Five Flags.

An inaugural competition yellow promised to add a bit of drama to the Blizzard Series. Yet, as expected, it had little effect on the usual cast of characters that drive up front.

"Basically, it worked out like it would've had everybody pitted on Lap 80, you know," Grill said. "It was nothing too different, except I didn't have to beat everybody out in the pits."

He had his white No. 112 running on all cylinders, even though he didn't make it easy on himself.

Fastest in qualifying, Grill partook in the other Blizzard Series adjustment Friday — a field invert. On the roll of the die, he figuratively rolled the dice by slamming the die into

the asphalt. The gamble did not pay off, and the field was set to an eight-car invert.

It didn't matter on this night.

"We didn't have the car we liked to have on the last race," Grill said. "We worked on it and got it back to like it was for the first race. We had a really good car tonight."

Among Grill, the fireworks and the series changes, the night's other highlight was an ultra-competitive battle between Bubba Pollard and Casey Smith late in the race.

The pair were door-to-door just prior to Lap 85 as they battled for third and stayed that way for several laps. They sandwiched around Eddie Mercer, down a lap, before Smith finally passed Pollard at the start of Lap 90.

## School beautification

Bagdad Elementary Principal Linda Gooch has had a strike of luck during the past month.

First, her school received two new live oaks to replace one that was on its last limb, and on Saturday, Gooch received a school makeover valued at \$30,000 from Clearwire Corporation, which has a call center based out of Milton.

The volunteer event took nearly 75 people from the local Clearwire calling center and seven people from Bagdad's employee list to spruce up the front, back and inside of the school from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday.

The school received new computer monitors to replace a set of monitors in one of its two computer labs. The school also received fresh sand for its playground, new artwork for the inside of its cafeteria and an abundance of fresh plants for its front.

"Am I happy or what?" Gooch said as she looked on at the volunteers working.

And she was. The enthusiastic principal, who just finished her second year at Bagdad Elementary, said she was shocked that Clearwire chose Bagdad Elementary to spruce up.

Clearwire started initiating community service efforts this year to give back to local communities. Clearwire has one of its biggest call centers for Internet troubleshooting in Milton, so the choice to revamp inside the Santa Rosa community was a clear choice.

Clearwire has finished working on a volunteer project in Washington, D.C., and near one of their corporate locations in Kirkland, Wash., just outside of Seattle.

"All of these employees took time off on Saturday to volunteer their time for this project," said Michelle Nelsen, programs manager for the Kirkland branch, who was at Bagdad Elementary Saturday morning.

Clearwire hired RockCorps, a company that helps recruit volunteers and run volunteer projects, to give back to charities and non-profit organizations. RockCorps set up DJ booths to keep the volunteers' minds off the 90-degree heat and on the work at hand.

RockCorps brought in music, helped bring in locally catered food to feed the volunteers and all of the equipment necessary to make the four-hour workday a success.

The corporation also assisted in choosing the school, according to Toby Garrett, RockCorps producer, who sweated it out in the heat on Saturday.

"We called the Santa Rosa County School District, and we asked 'Where could we begin to look for a school that is in need of volunteer work?'" Garrett said.

After touring several schools in the district, he found his answer on the corner of Forsyth and Garcon Point roads.

"We didn't get the love from any other school like we did from Mrs. Gooch," Garrett said.

Garrett contacted Gooch May 31 about the good news.

Not only did volunteers benefit from the project, but also teachers did. Jason Sasser, the new Bagdad physical education teacher, literally walked through the front doors of Bagdad Elementary the week before he was given a new outdoor recreation area to teach next year's batch of children.

"I am absolutely elated to have this happen when I first walked in," Sasser said.

The gym teacher, who has been with the school district for 18 years, volunteered his Saturday to help paint several large squares, which he can use for recreational activities, under the school's outside pavilion next to the playground.

"We're putting in several sections for my classes so they can participate in hopscotch in one square and bowling in another," Sasser said. "This will do wonders for my P.E. classes."

Each activity square was hand-painted by volunteers, and inside each square, volunteers drew out courses, such as hopscotch.

"We try to do things that are transformative, so when they (volunteers) are done, it will put a permanent mark on the school," Garrett said.

The first permanent mark started on the front of the school as Ashley Williams splashed a fresh coat of white paint on the Bagdad Elementary letters.

Inside, a local artist sketched several murals of school children and let the volunteers paint them any color they pleased.

After all was said and done, the front of the school looked brighter and better than ever with new plants, mulch and paint.

"This is really an exciting day," Gooch said.





# WEATHER UNDER A WATCHFUL EYE

## Recording temperature, rainfall for National Weather Service

She regularly goes out to look for fires caused by dry conditions and even has spotted a tornado from her property.

For Camilla Blain, weather is a serious part of her daily life. It's why she signed up to be a daily cooperative observer with the National Weather Service office.

The program allows regular people to participate in the study of the weather by recording daily temperature and precipitation records, all in an effort to cover more ground than official weather service stations alone can provide.

"Weather is an exaggerated part of life out here, whether you are putting up fencing or going hunting," Blain said. "Many times, the activities for the day are determined by the weather, which can vary a lot even in just a small area."

Her business is dependent upon the weather, and she started taking unofficial records in 1995 before weather service workers approached her to start taking official records in 1996 at her K-Bar Ranch Hunting Lodge, southwest of Odessa, Texas.

"It was a perfect fit, no question about it," she said.

As part of an agreement to submit temperature and rainfall records at least once a month, the National Weather Service placed equipment on her property to record those vital pieces of information.

"The rain gauge is so detailed it can record a dew, while the thermometer can store high and low temperatures for days," Blain said.

However, some pieces of information are missing, such as air pressure or wind speed and direction. Drops in pressure can offer clues to the general direction a storm system is headed, and the pressure trend can at least point to the possible future weather.

What Blain would really like is to be able to measure wind speed and direction — a big part of the weather

on her ranch.

"It's a factor that can make all the difference in the world on things like moisture content," she said.

Most cooperative observers record their observations in the evening, but Blain stays up until midnight to make sure every drop of rain that could possibly come gets recorded.

"I am the very opposite of a night person, but that's how important it is to me," she said.

In fact, if she has to be away from home for any reason, she asks another person to come by and measure any rainfall.

She said the hardest thing to measure is snowfall. Because actual accumulation in one spot depends heavily on wind and other factors, she has to measure several times using a board and measuring stick. She has to take the tubes out of the rain gauge if it snows and measure the moisture content, as well as how many inches of snow fell.

"Luckily, we don't get too much snow out here," she said.

Blain said the weather in the Permian Basin of West Texas gets volatile at times.

"We are on the edge of a desert, and we rarely get moisture that doesn't come with damage from wind, hail or lightning," she said.

For Blain, many of the interesting aspects of her job taking daily measurements come from following trends.

"For instance, while I would say we are still in a drought overall, I could go back and see the August rainfall one year exceeded the total rainfall for three entire years," she said. "Sometimes the airport has less than half of what we get out here, as well."

Some of her most memorable moments involve the weather, including the time she saw a funnel touch down just looking out her window.

"I just happened to look outside and saw it touch down. Since that time, we've been hit three times with three strong winds," Blain said.

National Weather Service Observ-

ing Program Leader Susan Griffin said the ideal goal is to have one observer for roughly every 25 miles.

Stations are classified differently based on what they record and their main purpose, with many used only for recording precipitation. Blain's is one of the few private stations tasked with a daily record of temperature, as well.

She said most observers are adults, and the work can become a family tradition due to the need to have long-standing observations.

Griffin said the program is necessary to establish a true history of weather and climate around the country, a scope of study requiring much more than just the main weather service offices.

"It's my primary job to maintain this network today. It's important," she said.

As for her part, Blain said she thinks she's becoming a small part of history by her work, even though observations don't take more than five to 10 minutes to complete. It's work that requires a real love for nature.

"You have to have a real appreciation for the weather. I think that's why you become an observer in the first place," Blain said.

### HOW TO BECOME A NOAA DAILY WEATHER OBSERVER

The Cooperative Observer Program (COOP) is the nation's weather and climate observing network. As a volunteer weather observer, you would maintain a weather station on your property and provide daily meteorological data, such as temperature, precipitation and snowfall.

Observers also provide data in near real-time to support forecast, warning and other public service programs of the National Weather Service. This data helps define America's climate and are used in agricultural planning and assessment, engineering, environmental-impact assessments, utilities planning and litigation.

# Dubai's ambitions soar with new airport

**DUBAI, UNITED ARAB EMIRATES** (AP) — In the desert beyond the skeletons of villas unfinished because of Dubai's economic slump, the home of the tallest building is preparing to open what could become another record-setter: an airport aiming to become the world's busiest.

Civic boosters envision Dubai World Central-Al Maktoum International, set to open Sunday, as one day growing into a mammoth transit hub of five parallel runways that could trump Atlanta's airport for the No. 1 spot. Where camels now graze, they see up to four terminals handling more travelers than the world's No. 2 and 3 airports — Chicago's O'Hare and London's Heathrow — combined.

Big ambitions die hard here. Yet the airport and surrounding development — with a projected price tag of more than \$32 billion — are a gamble for a city-state whose soaring aspirations have been eclipsed by its struggle to pay for them.

Dubai has proved skeptics wrong before, growing its current airport from a lowly wind-swept airstrip into one of the world's busiest international transit hubs in a few decades. What is unclear now is whether the sheikdom — one of seven city-states that make up the United Arab Emirates — can attract enough business to justify its appetite for a project of this scale.

"The name of this game is to be able to interconnect traffic from a wide range of regions and commercial centers," said Mike Boyd, an aviation industry consultant. "It's an open question if Dubai is going to be competitive" with other emerging global air hubs, he said.

The new airport, which will grow in stages over the next two decades, was planned well before the economic meltdown revealed serious problems with Dubai's finances. The emirate is still wrestling with more than \$100 billion of debt. It has yet to final-

ize a deal to repay lenders stung by credit problems at its government-owned Dubai World conglomerate. Concerns are also mounting at other state-linked companies.

Much of the debt piled up because of megaprojects that, like the new airport, promised to be the biggest or the best — one-of-a-kind feats designed to make Dubai stand out on the global stage and bring in cash.

But as the credit crunch deepened, Dubai's vast network of state-owned companies suddenly found themselves scrambling to pay the bills, spooking global markets with their debt load and inability to pay.

That hasn't derailed the airport plans, even if

Dubai's debts remain a key concern for bankers and bondholders.

Officials say it remains a vital piece of infrastructure that will ensure the emirate retains its crown as the region's transportation and logistics hub. Dubai is already home to the region's busiest seaport and airport.

"There's no suggestion of scaling back," Dubai Airports CEO Paul Griffiths said in an interview this week. "The world can now sit back and see that Dubai is really taking the lead in this sector."

Although Dubai's existing airport is among the world's busiest, it operates below capacity. Griffiths argues the new airport is nonetheless needed because the existing one

is being bogged down at peak times. That's why construction cranes are hard at work building an additional concourse at the existing airport, Dubai International, even as increased attention falls on the new Al Maktoum International, named for Dubai's ruling family.

"The strategy is to run ahead of time ... rather than wait until things become more constrained," said John Strickland, a consultant who follows the aviation industry. "It's just good fortune they're able to do this. Others will be very envious."

Ultimately, the new airport is designed to handle up to 160 million passengers and 12 million tons of freight each year. Assuming it can drum up

enough business, it would eclipse Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport, the world's busiest passenger airport.

Atlanta handled just over 90 million passengers in 2008, according to the most recent annual statistics from the Airports Council International trade group. That's well over double the 37.4 million passengers that passed through the tax-free shopping corridors of Dubai International that year.

Dubai International is growing fast, however. Preliminary figures show passenger numbers shot up 9 percent to 40.9 million in 2009.

Driving much of the traffic is rapidly growing Emirates airline, a

state-owned carrier that has emerged profitable and relatively unscathed from Dubai's debt crisis.

It shows no signs of slowing down. Just weeks after Emirates unveiled a whopping \$11.5 billion order for 32 more Airbus A380 planes, on top of the 58 it had previously requested, it confirmed plans to order more planes at next month's Farnborough International Airshow. Its recruiters are busy searching for 3,000 new cabin crew and more than 700 pilots as part of the company's growth plan.

The idea is to eventually shift Emirates' operations, and possibly the rest of Dubai International's, to the new airport sometime next decade. For now, Emirates is staying mostly put at its existing base — a strategy analysts say makes sense because it is more efficient.

That leaves Al Maktoum International looking elsewhere for customers. Griffiths, the former boss of London's Gatwick airport, acknowledges it will be years before his new airport really takes off.

Only one runway has been built — part of the \$820 million investment Dubai's airport company estimates has been made in the new airport so far. The total project, including vast business and residential complexes nearby, is expected to cost over \$32 billion.

Initially, it will only handle cargo flights, like the Emirates airline Boeing 777 freighter that landed on a test flight last Sunday. The first passenger terminal isn't slated to open until March.

Ten airlines have signed up to operate at the new airport, Griffiths said. But days before the debut, he was unwilling to name one that would be flying there when the doors open Sunday.

"We're not expecting it to be a massive runaway success," he said. "To create such a large facility is going to take some time. ... It's by nature a fairly long-term ambition."

## Atlanta airport delays have most ripple effects

**ATLANTA** (AP) — A study says more delays at major airports across the country were attributed to problems at Atlanta's Hartsfield-Jackson International Airport than at any other.

The Atlanta Journal-Constitution said the report by the Government Accountability Office shows that problems in Atlanta affect air traffic all over the country. Hartsfield-Jackson is the world's busiest airport.

Hartsfield-Jackson ranked 29th out of 31 major airports for on-time performance in 2009.

Airport spokesman John Kennedy attributed

the report's findings to the large volume of traffic at the world's busiest airport. He said it's logical that what happens in Atlanta would affect travelers across the country.

The report said that overall airline on-time performance improved across the country, but declined in Atlanta. At Hartsfield-Jackson, 72.6 percent of flights arrived on time in 2009, down from 75.5 percent in 2008.

The higher delay rate was due to an increase in the number of scheduled flights and peak periods during the day.

This year so far, however, Atlanta's airport



## 'Sound of Music' tour, power trips and a felon's passport

After more than two decades of independent travel in Europe and instructing a seminar on independent European travel for colleges, churches and other groups, I periodically answer questions about travel in Europe for Yahoo! Answers. Here are selected questions that have earned the service's "best answers" designation.

### 'Sound of Music' tour in Salzburg?

Q: Has anyone taken any of the official "Sound of Music" guided tours they offer in Salzburg, Austria? I only have one day in Salzburg, and the guided tours look like they run about four hours! Does it give you a good tour of the city, or am I better off on my own?

I am a big "Sound of Music" fan. My boyfriend, however, is not, and while he's tolerant of my desire to see some of the sites, both of us are concerned about fitting in as much of

Salzburg as we can!

A: Like you, once I saw "The Sound of Music" as a kid, I yearned to visit Salzburg and see those gorgeous places in person. Salzburg is a beautiful city that has sold its soul to tourism. Mozart (who was born there) and "The Sound of Music" are its two biggest attractions. Few Austrians, however, know much — nor really care — about the latter.

I have taken the city tour, which incorporates many "Sound of Music" locales. The best "Sound of Music" tour, however, was one I did myself. We rented bicycles and toolled around town to see both film sites and places from the von Trapp family's life, including Villa Trapp across the river in the village of Aigen.

Many "Sound of Music" tours stretch the truth quite a bit. They'll tell you the gazebo, abbey courtyard and cemetery scenes were shot on location. (They were shot in Hollywood.) They'll tell you Leopoldskron Palace on the lake was the location for "Villa Trapp." (It

wasn't; the crew wanted to shoot there but the owner wanted too much money. However, 20th Century-Fox built the patio and garden set, including the famous "Sixteen Going on Seventeen" gazebo, on city-owned land next door, then filmed scenes in which the villa appears at Frohnburg Palace two miles away.)

In short, take the city tour, which gives you an excellent overview of the city, then explore around town on your own. You can book the tour at the tourist information office.

One thing I found personally moving was to sit in the Nonnberg Abbey church where Maria Augusta Kutschera and Capt. Georg von Trapp were married in 1927 (not the cathedral used in the film, which is in nearby Mondsee). You can walk to the abbey from the castle; take the walkway around the city side of the hill. The chapel is through the gate, which had a fake bell pull installed for the film (someone stole it in the 1980s), and across the courtyard. It is open to the

public, though most of the abbey is closed to visitors.

But only one day in Salzburg?! For shame! You must return and spend a couple days to see it properly! Promise your BF you'll spend time at something he'd like to see if he'll go back to Salzburg with you. (Is he a history buff? Hitler's mountain retreat is close to Salzburg. You can spend the night in the inn next door to where Adolf lived!)

### Are there power plugs in European trains?

Q: Are there power plugs in European trains?

A: Yes. In the WCs (bathrooms) there are generally outlets. In most express trains, especially in first-class compartments or seats, there are often outlets as well. You must make sure your device can operate on 220V instead of 110V, and you must have a plug converter as the tines are different than our American flat ones. You can get a

set of plug converters from Radio Shack, AAA travel agencies and travel stores.

### Can a person charged with a felony travel to Europe?

Q: Here is the thing. I was charged with a felony when I had a drunk driving accident with a friend in the car about four years ago. No one died but I was charged with vehicular assault because minor injuries occurred. What I want to know is, can I enter the countries of Europe with this on my record? I know I can receive a passport but will any of the countries accept it?

A: A passport is simply a document from the State Department requesting other countries to allow you to enter. It does not contain your criminal record. While drunk driving is a despicable, disgusting and completely preventable crime, it will not bar you from entry into Europe. Incidentally, I hope you learned your lesson!

# 5-minute chocolate cake recipe

**I**t's an e-mail and Internet phenomenon and quite possibly one of the most dangerous recipes ever.

That's because with only a handful of ingredients you probably have in your home, you can make a chocolate lava-style cake in minutes. And you can do it without turning on the stove or dirtying a lot of dishes.

It's a 5-minute chocolate cake that's made in a coffee mug in the microwave. If you haven't received the recipe in your inbox, we've got you covered. Or if you got the forward and thought it sounded too good to be true, you might want to recon-

sider. That's not to say the recipe yields the best chocolate cake you'll ever have — just possibly the best chocolate cake you can make in five minutes. In your microwave.

#### 5-Minute Chocolate Cake

4 tablespoons flour  
4 tablespoons sugar  
2 tablespoons cocoa  
1 egg  
3 tablespoons milk  
3 tablespoons oil  
3 tablespoons chocolate chips (optional)  
Small splash of vanilla extract

Procedure: Add the dry ingredients to a microwave safe coffee mug and mix well. Add the egg and mix thoroughly. Pour in the milk and oil and

mix well. Add the chocolate chips (if using) and vanilla. Mix again. Put mug in the microwave and cook for 3 minutes at high power (1,000 watts). The cake will rise over the top of the mug, but don't be alarmed! Allow to cool and tip out onto a plate if desired. Then enjoy!

It might not be something you'd whip up for guests because it's not the prettiest dessert, but it'll work in a pinch if you're at home with a sweet tooth and few options. The microwave cake can be a bit spongy, but the chocolate shines through and the lava part at the bottom of the mug offers plenty of gooey goodness. It's especially tasty with a dollop of vanilla ice cream.

After you try it once, you'll proba-

bly want to make it again and again to perfect the recipe for your tastes and your microwave. If you're looking to cut out a few calories, use a sugar substitute instead of real sugar, skim milk instead of whole milk and apple sauce in lieu of oil. It turns out as good as the original recipe but with a little less guilt. (It actually turned out a bit moister than the original recipe for this taste-tester.)

Of course, the real dread — and delight — comes when you realize the last words of the chain e-mail just might be true: "Now we are all only 5 minutes away from chocolate cake at any time of the day or night."

You may never have to go without dessert again.
