Milton man dies in crash

A 21-year-old Milton man died early Friday morning when he lost control of his vehicle and crashed into the side of Cook's Paint and Body in Pace on

Floridatown Rd. According to the report, the 1994 Chevrolet Camaro driven by Enrique Lopez Jr. was traveling southbound on Chumuckla Highway at a high rate of speed at around 3:40 a.m. Friday when it hit the intersection of Highway

90 and went airborne. The vehicle stayed southbound on Chumuckla Highway, which becomes Floridatown Rd on the opposite side of Highway 90. The report stated the driver failed to maintain control of the

vehicle once it went airborne and rotated counterclockwise and traveled south into the side of Cook's Paint and Body. The driver was pronounced deceased at the scene when a Lifeguard Ambulance arrived. The body shop owner David

Cook was in bed when he received a call from the body shop's alarm company at 3:42 a.m. Cook later arrived at the scene to help pull the vehicle out of the wall. See **CRASH A7**

City Council Ward 3

There is just one race this August in Milton and it involves the Ward 3 seat occupied by incumbent Grady Hester. Hester, a 16-year veteran of the council, is being challenged by Alan Lowery, a 30-year veteran of the Milton Fire Department who retired in 2009 and at one time served as the acting fire chief. Lowery and Hester both have served on city committees under the direction of the city of Milton. Both candidates answered questions provided to them by the Santa Rosa Press Gazette:

What do you see as the key issues?

Hester: To continue the process the City of Milton has begun to make the city a better

District 2 Senate

The race for the District 2 Senate seat in Tallahassee has a tale of two candidates. One candidate is the current outgoing Representative for District 1, Greg Evers. His opponent, Mike Hill, is a businessman who touts his time at the U.S. Air Force Academy. This is Hill's first foray into seeking public office, while Evers has served two terms representing District 1 in the Florida House of Representatives and served on the Yellow River Soil and Water Conservation District from 1996 to 2001. Dr. Durell Peaden did not seek re-election due to the term limits set forth by the state constitution. Both candidates answered questions provided to them by the Santa Rosa Press Gazette:

State Representative

Greg Evers has served his limit in Tallahassee as the Representative from the First District, but in 2011 a resident of Santa Rosa County will fill the seat. Currently there are six people looking to fill the seat being vacated by Evers due to the term limit — Greg Brown, Doug Broxson, Ricky Perritt, Ferd Solomon, and Mathias Venditto. Venditto is running as an independent thus creating a Republican only primary to decide his opponent from the field of Brown, Broxson, Perritt, and Solomon. All of these candidates are relative newcomers to the political arena as they contend for the seat currently held by Evers, a Republican from Baker.

Cleanup efforts are being coordinated from 17 staging areas in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Florida. Over 33,000 people are involved in the cleanup operation.

Cleaning Up the Beaches

The number of people mobilized to clean up the beaches depends on the size of the affected area. Individual teams can number in the hundreds, and thousands of additional workers remain on-call. Working with the Coast Guard, our teams continue cleaning up until the last bit of oil has been removed. As a result, in most cases when oil reaches a beach, it is even possible to keep it open.

Our Responsibility

Our beach cleanup operations will continue until the last of the oil has been skimmed from the sea, the beaches and estuaries have been cleaned up, and the region has been pronounced oil-free. And none of the costs of our efforts will be paid by taxpayers.

Our commitment is that we'll be here for as long as it takes. We may not always be perfect, but we will make this right.

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Ask the Preacher

Dear Pastor Gallups - "I just read the other day that scientists have now "created life" from scratch. What do you make of this?" S.U. - Pace

Dear S.U.

The news is filled with dramatic announcements that the Venter lab has created an organism with the first "synthetic genome."

Live Science headlined the story, "First Live Organism with Synthetic Genome Created."

The word "created" was emphatic in the article; "the J. Craig Venter Institute says they have succeeded in "CREATING" the first living organism with a completely synthetic genome."

It almost sounds like the lab created something entirely new from scratch - "artificial life." New Scientist even used religious overtones, calling it an "Immaculate Creation."

A closer look, though, shows that the "synthetic genome" still used the 4-letter code of a LIVING bacterium, and used its own transcription and translation machinery.

It would be a little like a programmer inserting a USB drive with a program on it - into an existing computer; the computer has to have the operating system and software to recognize the code.

And - Of all things - the Venter Institute proudly planted watermarks in their genome. "The researchers deliberately inserted four sequences of DNA that serve as watermarks so they could distinguish between the naturally occurring and synthetic bacteria," Live Science reported. "The watermarks contain a code that translates DNA into English letters with punctuation, allowing the scientists to literally write messages with the genes."

It seems that evolution minded Geneticists keep walking right into the gaping trap of Intelligent Design.

If an alien civilization discovered the Venter Group's genome, and read the watermark, would they be justified in assuming a design and a designer? - What if they inferred that this genome was simply the result of random chance? Wouldn't they be wrong?

This accomplishment by the Venter Group is an incremental step in genetics...to be sure...but it is NOT a breakthrough. Geneticists have been doing genetic engineering for years, including genetic watermarking.

Craig Venter's lab has simply taken existing genes from bacteria and performed some reverse engineering on it, then inserted it back into the hardware of a living cell. Any way you look at it, it's further PROOF of the necessity of intervention by a designer, thus pointing to an intelligent design!

place to live. To improve infrastructure and better streets. Build a sewer treatment plant in East Milton, to expand the industrial park, and grow jobs. Encouraging more business and to be a business friendly city.

Lowery: New vision and direction for the Milton City Council. Fairness in city government for all citizens. Better financial management and accountability.

Why are you the best candidate?

Hester: Sixteen years in office and my ability to do my research prior to making a decision and understand the issues involved. To continue serving the people of Milton. During my tenure with the cooperation of my fellow council members we have built

a new garage and warehouse, new city hall, police department and fire department while seeing only a slight increase in taxes due to the tax cuts created by the Florida Legislature. We have not had to terminate any employees due to the tax reduction.

What do you see as the key issues?

"It's just a tragedy to see something like this happen." Cook said. "The man was out driving and he made a mistake."

According to the report, Lopez was not wearing his seatbelt and had to be extricated from the passenger side of the vehicle.

The airbags in the vehicle deployed when Lopez struck the side of the cinder block building.

Cook said it took about an hour to get the vehicle pulled from the building.

"Two of our main toolboxes were up against the wall and some of diagnostic machines were damaged," Cook said.

Cook said the insurance company estimated there was over \$50,000 in damage to the side of the building.

"The Pace Fire Department really did a heck of a job. They put up a structural support to hold the frame up while we worked on cleaning everything up," Cook said. "That fire department went beyond what they had to do, and that meant a lot to us."

The incident at Cook's Paint and Body came less than 12 hours after a Milton resident drove a Volkswagen rental car into the storefront of Merle Norman Cosmetics Studio in Pace.

The driver in the Thursday afternoon incident was not injured along with the three store employees who were inside the store.

Pace Volunteer Fire Department also responded to the Thursday afternoon incident.

Lopez was transferred to District 1 Medical Examiner's Office following the crash.

Cook said his shop would continue to operate despite all of the damage.

"It's sad to see someone lose their life like that. It's a true tragedy," he said.

Florida Highway Patrol is still investigating whether alcohol was a factor in the accident.



Fish kills common this time of year

High temperatures and cloudy, rainy days can spell trouble for fish in Florida's rivers and lakes. These conditions can cause fish kills, which are natural occurrences and typically do not cause permanent damage to the ecosystem or to fish populations.

Fish kills commonly are caused by weather-related factors. Sudden temperature fluctuations or extreme temperatures can result in fish kills any time of the year. Hot weather during the summer months can cause fish kills because warm water holds less oxygen than cold water. In

addition, a lack of rain during hot-weather months lowers the water levels in the system, heating the water and further depleting the oxygen in the system.

Fish kills also can occur during extended periods with little sunshine. The process leading to these types of die-offs begins with overcast skies and rainy weather. During extended periods of overcast, rainy or cloudy weather, the biological system uses the dissolved oxygen in the water faster than it can produce it. Rain water can compound the situation by causing vegetation, such as dead leaves and grass clippings, to wash into

the system and decompose. The decomposition process also removes oxygen from the water.

Residents can report fish kills in natural water bodies to the FWC at <http://research.MyFWC.com/fishkill/submit.asp> or call the FWC Fish Kill Hotline at 800-636-0511. For more information on fish kills, visit <http://research.MyFWC.com> and select "fish and wildlife health" located under the "explore" section.

During the weekend, the FWC announced it had reopened state waters offshore of Escambia County to the harvest of saltwater fish on July 31. The FWC had closed

this area on June 14 as a precautionary measure due to possible impacts of oil from the BP Deepwater Horizon spill in the Gulf of Mexico.

The FWC is reopening this 23-mile area of state waters because careful laboratory analysis of fish from the area confirms they are safe and oil-free. The reopened area to the harvest of saltwater fish includes state waters from the beaches out nine nautical miles into the gulf from the Alabama line east to the Pensacola Beach water tower.



Two seats on the Santa Rosa County Commission are up for grabs — District 2 and District 4.

District two, currently represented by Bob Cole, will have a Republican only primary as Prudence Caskey is in the race representing the Christian Party. The other Republicans in the District two race are Ron Scott, Clifton Wheeler and Claude Duvall.

Cole has served as County Commissioner for District two since 2002

District four will be an open primary with incumbent Gordon Goodin facing the challenges of Ruth Dupont Esser, Mark Goode, and Jim Melvin.

Goodin: Oil spill- Continue our fight for a long term recovery from this life altering event. What issues do you feel needs the commissioner's focus?

Cole: The first is the BP oil well disaster. This issue will continue to affect all of our plans, expectations, and the value of our largest investments for an unknown period of time. As a Santa Rosa County Commissioner I have been and will continue to demand that BP and state DEP allow our county government to be the lead eyes on the waterfront and shoreline. Our future depends on how well and how quickly any and all oil product is removed from these resources. Our citizens should be compensated by BP for all direct economic loss and that includes our state government through special session. This session will allow for reassessment of property values for land owners affected by the oil and charge BP for the loss in value. As your commissioner I continue to fight for Santa Rosa County residents until this crisis ends. The second issue is the Budget. We must continue to explore all avenues of cutting back on the tax burden that we all face. Property owners, both home and business, can not continue to carry the majority of cost of government while still providing the services that each of us expect the county to provide. To do this we must look into ways to reduce any and all duplication of services, apply user fees, and look into more outsourcing. These measures would not only save dollars in the short term, but they will also reduce future budgets. I also demand that the state legislature does not continue to place unfunded mandates on local government. These mandates burden local government with cost that should be addressed and funded by the state generated sources not unfairly passed on to Santa Rosa County and its residents.

Duvall: Jobs, a more open government, and lower taxes.

Scott: Economic stability is number one. Without that we will not be able to see growth in the job market and property sales will remain flat.

Wheeler: The county's budget. County and local

job loss. The County Court House.

Caskey: the commissioners need to think past this election and past the oil spill. They need to focus on 10, 20, even 50 to 100 years out.

Goode: Diversifying our local economy. Tourism is great, but not necessarily dependable. High tech jobs would be wonderful, but there are a number of "Blue Collar" workers in this area. It is possible to have a manufacturer in the area that is environmentally safe. The budget is out of control. While a number of positions have been eliminated, through layoffs or attrition, consolidating departments should be explored. Additionally, consolidating our government onto as few properties as necessary would reduce the outflow of money for maintenance and utility bills. On top of that, the properties could be returned to the tax roles, which would supplement our county's budget. Commencing action on the renovation of our roadways to encourage and accommodate economic growth.

Goodin: •Job creation- We need to continue creating a climate that attracts businesses to Santa Rosa County. The Commission has already cut its red tape. We need to continue working with local utilities, State, and Federal agencies to reduce or eliminate their red tape. This has never been more important than now, as we attempt to recover from the economic recession and the Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill.

•Military: Congress has created a Budget Reduction Task Force. Undoubtedly cuts to the Department of Defense will be considered. Another Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) is likely in 2013. Santa Rosa County needs to be focused on protecting the missions at Whiting Field, Hurlburt Field, and Eglin Air Force Base. Since the military makes up at least a third of our economy, preparation in advance of this BRAC is absolutely essential.

•Roads and Transportation- Funding for road projects is limited nationwide. The Commission needs to continue its aggressive efforts in Tallahassee and Washington so that, as fund-

ing becomes available, we can improve safety, relieve congestion, enhance commerce and trade, and provide hurricane evacuation routes.

•Environment: The Commission has implemented strict regulations for C&D landfills, but improved oversight and siting of these landfills will be an ongoing and important effort. We can't allow unscrupulous operators to pollute our water, pollute our air, and make our residents sick. The Commission also needs to protect its clean drinking water from incompatible zoning and land development.

Melvin: Bringing high quality jobs to Santa Rosa County needs to be the number one focus of the commissioners. This will be my number one focus.

to continue finding new ways to fund Santa Rosa County's needs!

Duvall: The commission must be more fiscally responsible with tax dollars. We cannot afford to continue to make stupid decisions like the recent industrial park land purchase. We simply don't have the funds to be anything but responsible.

Scott: the county must become more fiscally responsible. I have outlined some areas of improvement. Others include a motor pool concept for county vehicles, reduction in the number of employees who are given a county vehicle or a monthly vehicle allowance. I will have a confidential, open door session with all rank and file employees to receive their cost saving ideas.

Wheeler: Yes

Caskey: They can and they absolutely should!

Goode: The short answer is yes. Planning a budget based on estimated expenses is not how I understand the commissioners to do business. My understanding of the current system is that an inquiry is sent to the Property Appraiser basically asking, "How much can we squeeze out of them (the taxpayers) this year?" Planning this way will never provide the taxpayers with any relief. If I tell you that I am giving you \$100 to go shopping and that you don't have to pay me back, chances are you won't look for the best deals. However, if you go shopping on your own dime you will do your best to stretch it as far as it will go. It's time for our government to properly plan its budgets.

Goodin: Always. We as Commissioners need to remain ever vigilant to make certain the taxpayers always receive the greatest value for their taxpayer dollars.

Melvin: I know there are areas we can improve upon to be better stewards of the money the tax payers send us to run the county. I am uniquely well qualified to help in this effort due to my background in public accounting. The commissioners have to treat the taxpayers money with respect and ensure that all expenditures are reasonable, and in the best interest of the people of Santa Rosa County.

Can Santa Rosa County be more fiscally responsible?

Cole: We must continue to explore all avenues of cutting back on the tax burden that we all face. Property owners, both home and business, can not continue to carry the majority of cost of government, while the county still provides the services that each of us expect the county to provide. To do this we must look into ways to reduce any and all duplication of services, apply user fees, and look into more outsourcing. These measures would not only save dollars in the short term but also reduce future budgets. I also demand that the state legislature does not continue to place unfunded mandates on local government. These mandates burden local government with cost that should be addressed and funded by the state generated sources not unfairly passed on to Santa Rosa County and its residents. I will also continue to seek out all state or federal grant dollars that our county qualifies under. There is a report available on Santa Rosa County website that outlines where your tax dollars go. You will find that I have been very diligent with every penny to provide Santa Rosa with vital services and infrastructure. I would enjoy having the opportunity

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School Board could see major change after elections

Santa Rosa County's Board of Education has three different races taking place this August in District 1, District 3, and District 5.

Two incumbents are facing challenges this primary with Diane Scott (District 1) facing Dale Anderson and Shepherd Iverson.

In District 3, incumbent Diane Coleman is facing opposition from Carol Boston, while District 5 will be represented by a new board member followed by Ed Gray's decision not to seek re-election. Vying to replace Gray are Scott Peden and Thomas Naile.

All candidates were provided questions by the Santa Rosa Press Gazette with the following replies:

Why are you the best candidate?

Anderson: It is time to have a school board member who has a working knowledge of what is going on in our schools. Who will offer a fresh approach that incorporates new ideas and not just vote yes every time the Superintendent presents his agenda. I will do what is in the best interest of our students.

Iverson: The community consensus is that our current School Board is failing us. What makes poor leadership worse is that it often takes place behind closed doors and during meetings scheduled, as if, to exclude the public. Besides greater openness and accountability, I'll bring new perspectives: an international perspective as I have observed the inner-workings of the most successful educational system in the world today in Korea. Eastern cultures are becoming affluent because of how they educate their youth. The Global Village is no longer a pipe dream; it's a keystroke away. Also an essentialist perspective. I won't get mired in the minutia of trivia and detail and neglect to see the forest through the trees. The education of our children is an issue of national security and of their future prosperity!

The Department of Environmental Protection gives notice of its intent to issue an environmental resources individual stormwater permit for "PJC Midway", Permit Number 57-0293750-003-SI, to Walt Winter, Physical Plant Director, Pensacola Junior College, at 1000 College Boulevard, Pensacola, Florida 32504.

The purpose of the permit is to authorize construction of Phase 1 of a new educational campus, consisting of an entrance road, building, and parking lot, plus related infrastructure, including a stormwater management system, on approximately 17.5 acres of two parcels totaling 111 acres. Stormwater treatment will be provided via a dry retention pond and two wet detention ponds. A portion of the site development contains jurisdictional wetlands, for which a separate wetland resource management permit is required.

Proper erosion control measures will be employed during construction.

The project will be located on the southeast corner of U.S. 98 and Nantahala Beach Road, in Midway, in Santa Rosa County, Florida.

Based on all the above, and with the application of general and limiting specific conditions of the permit, the Department has reasonable assurance the project, as proposed, fully meets the environmental resources permitting requirements of Chapter 62-346, Florida Administrative Code, and will not harm the environment.

A person whose substantial interests are affected by the Department's action may petition for an administrative proceeding (hearing) under Sections 120.569 and 120.57 of the Florida Statute. The petition must contain the information set forth below and must be filed (received by the clerk) in the Office of General Counsel of the Department at 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, Mail Station 35, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-3000.

Because the administrative hearing process is designed to re-determine final agency action on the application, the filing of a petition for an administrative hearing may result in a modification of the permit, or even a denial of the application. Accordingly, the applicant will not commence construction or other activities under this permit until the deadlines below for filing a petition for an administrative hearing, or request for an extension of time, have expired.

Under subsection 62-110.106(4) of the Florida Administrative Code, a person whose substantial interests are affected by the Department's action may also request an extension of time to file a petition for an administrative hearing. The Department may, for good cause shown, grant the request for an extension of time. Requests for extension of time must be filed with the Office of General Counsel of

the Department at 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, Mail Station 35, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-3000, before the applicable deadline. A timely request for extension of time shall toll the running time period for filing a petition until the request is acted upon. If a request is filed late, the Department may still grant it upon a motion by the requesting party showing that the failure to file a request for an extension of time before the deadline was the result of excusable neglect.

In the event that a timely and sufficient petition for an administrative hearing is filed, other persons whose substantial interests will be affected by the outcome of the administrative process have the right to petition to intervene in the proceeding. Intervention will be only at the discretion of the presiding officer upon the filing of a motion in compliance with Rule 28-106.205 of the Florida Administrative Code.

In accordance with subsection 28-106.111 (2) and subparagraph 62-110.106(3)(a) 4, Florida Administrative Code, petitions for an administrative hearing by the applicant must be filed within 21 days of receipt of written notice. Petitions filed by any persons other than the applicant, and other than those entitled to written notice under Section 120.60 (3) of the Florida Statutes, must be filed within 21 days of publication of the notice.

Under Section 120.60 (3) of the Florida Statute, however, any person who has asked the Department for notice of agency action may file a petition within 21 days of such notice, regardless of the date of publication.

The petitioner shall mail a copy of the petition to the applicant at the address indicated above at the time of filing. The failure of any person to file a petition for an administrative hearing within the appropriate time period shall constitute a waiver of those rights.

A petition that disputes the material facts on which the Department's action is based must contain the following information:

- (a) The name and address of each agency affected and each agency's file or identification number, if known;
- (b) The name, address, and telephone number of the petitioner; the name, address, and telephone number of the petitioner's representative, if any, which shall be the address for service purposes during the course of the proceeding; and an explanation of how the petitioner's substantial interests are or will be affected by the agency determination;
- (c) A statement of when and how the petitioner received notice of the agency decision;
- (d) A statement of all disputed issues of material fact. If there are none, the petition must so indicate;
- (e) A concise statement of the ultimate facts alleged, including the specific facts that the petitioner contends warrant reversal or modification of the agency's proposed action;
- (f) A statement of the specific rules or statutes that the petitioner contends require reversal or modification of the agency's proposed action; and
- (g) A statement of the

relief sought by the petitioner, stating precisely the action that the petitioner wishes the agency to take with respect to the agency's proposed action.

A petition that does not dispute the material facts on which the Department's action is based shall state that no such facts are in dispute and otherwise shall contain the same information as set forth above, as required by Rule 28-106.301, Florida Administrative Code. Under Sections 120.569(2)(c) and (d) of the Florida Statute, a petition for administrative hearing must be dismissed by the agency if the petition does not substantially comply with the above requirements or is untimely filed.

This action is final and effective on the date filed with the Clerk of the Department unless a petition is filed in accordance with the above. Upon the timely filing of petition this order will not be effective until further order of the Department.

This permit, when issued, constitutes an order of the Department. The applicant has the right to seek judicial review of the order under Section 120.68 of the Florida Statute, by the filing of a notice of appeal under Rule 9.110 of the Florida Rules of Appellate Procedure with the Clerk of the Department in the Office of General Counsel, 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, Mail Station 35, Tallahassee, Florida, 32399-3000; and by filing a copy of the notice of the appeal accompanied by the applicable filing fees with the appropriate district court of appeal. The notice of appeal must be filed within 30 days from the date when the final order is filed with the Clerk of the Department.

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Natural materials make a comeback

Like everything else in home décor, flooring evolves. While we are moving away from petroleum-based carpets and classic (and perhaps endangered) mahogany floors, wood takes on new looks, leather gets used underfoot, stainless steel serves as flooring and carpet alternatives crowd the market.

What to choose among modern flooring depends a lot on your lifestyle. Think about who uses your rooms and how. Do pets live inside? Do kids play on the floor? And most importantly, does the family eat in your living spaces? Before you shop, try to define your décor style: Traditional, modern, country or rustic. Also think about how long you plan to live in your home.

Bret Hemphill, at Hemphill's Rugs & Carpets in Costa Mesa, Calif., said he recently measured four jobs for seagrass installations. "It has been our most popular carpet in the entire store for about the last four years." According to Hemphill, the price of oil has a direct effect on the price of synthetic carpet, so nylons are falling out of favor. "It takes 7 gallons of petroleum to produce 35 pounds of nylon carpet," he said. "These days you can get wool for about the same price."

So what's new then?

- **Plant-based materials:** Carpet alternatives, such as sisal and seagrass, are not that new, but they are gaining on traditional carpets for affordability and a casual vibe.

- **Seagrass:** Grown in the salty marshes of India and China, seagrass carpets have natural colors ranging from beige to green. Seagrass is recommended for people with carpet-based allergies. It is softer and more stain-resistant than sisal. "It offers a lot of look for your money," Hemphill said.

- **Sisal:** A natural fiber from the agave plant, sisal can be rough on the knees of crawling babies. For those of us who walk upright, sisal can provide a sturdy choice. It does stain, but it can be died in many colors. Tighter weaves are recommended so loops don't snag.

- **New "old" woods:** Hemphill carries post-industrial recycled wood floors made from leftover pieces from manufacturing other products. Vintage wood companies around the country also fashion flooring from reclaimed wood from old barns and other buildings in the United States and Europe.

- **Cork:** Cork is coming along nicely in the market because of its eco-friendly, formaldehyde-free construction and sustainable growth. Plus, its bouncy character makes it easy on the feet, especially if you spend lots of time in the kitchen. What's more, cork has natural antibacterial qualities, making it a good choice for play areas. But beware, it does fade in sunny rooms.

- **Animal-based materials:** We are seeing more leather on the floor in the way of area rugs and wall-to-wall installations. Wool has been used on floors forever, but is making a dramatic comeback.

- **Leather:** Leather is a hot item for high-style interiors. Floors from manufacturer Torlys Smart Floors are made of recycled leather in planks or tiles and installed with nail-free, snap-together technology. Leather is for light- to medium-traffic areas, such as bedrooms, but is not recommended for heavy use. Use leather for throw rugs to add earthy appeal.

- **Wool:** Wool is one of the earliest known floor coverings. Although expensive, it is a carpet that lasts a lifetime or longer. Plus, it's fireproof, super soft and easy to clean.

- **Metals:** Metallics move away from the kitchen to appear on floors as either metallic glazed tiles or actual stainless steel or aluminum tiles. Walker Zanger produces a line of metallic tiles with a hand-forged Celtic appearance. TGInternational goes super-modern with the real deal in metals.

Bike riding is risky business

LONDON (AP) — Feel like living dangerously?

Riding a bike in London will soon be more convenient, though it's unlikely to be any less scary. Riders already dodge the city's famed black cabs and double-decker buses — to say nothing of other cyclists.

A bike rental program launched Friday by London's Mayor Boris Johnson will add an additional 6,000 bikes to the capital's congested streets. Under the initiative, cyclists will be able to rent bikes from 400 docking stations around town.

Johnson called it "a new dawn for the bicycle in the capital" — but veterans of the London cycling scene are bracing for a new era of transit mayhem.

Unlike Amsterdam, where bike paths are separated from the road by a curb, in London a white line is the only protection for cyclists.

Consider these experiences of two avid riders who cycle to work almost every day.

FIRST RULE, BE SAFE

When the brakes on my bike started slipping, I figured I'd take care of the problem later. After I went flying over the hood of a black cab at the intersection of Gray's Inn Road and Calthorpe Street, I wished I'd taken care of it sooner.

The London Cycling Campaign says the most common cause of accidents here is from drivers not seeing cyclists, so when in London, do as the Londoners do: Don day-glow jackets, fluorescent gloves or a bright yellow backpack.

Sure, you'll look ridiculous, but at least motorists will look

And, while accidents happen, serious ones are rare. According to the latest statistics kept by Transport for London, the number of fatalities has stayed virtually the same between 1987 and 2007 — about 15 per year — even as the number of cyclists plying the streets has doubled.

So while the papers often carry accounts of trucks hitting cyclists, you're better off biking to work than sitting on the

couch eating crisps, as the British call potato chips.

"The health benefits outweigh the risks by a factor of 20," says Mike Cavenett of the London Cycling Campaign.

USE THE GREAT ESCAPE

Tourists often don't know this, but London has a great canal network that runs through the central and eastern parts of the city, and it can be a great escape for cyclists who find the capital's maze-like

streets and traffic circles too scary.

Long, narrow house boats traverse the canals, maneuvering through one lock after another. Alongside are footpaths that horses once used to pull narrow boats carrying supplies and produce.

These footpaths can be a boon for bike riders, but be warned: They aren't easy to navigate.

For one thing, the paths are made of loosely laid concrete blocks that wobble and shake as a cyclist speeds over them — making it easy to lose control.

Tunnels along the canals are only wide enough for one bike — and so low that a cyclist has to duck his head to pass through.

In the middle of the day, when lots of bikes and pedestrians (and dog walkers) are using the footpaths, a ride involves

constant negotiation.

Once, while coming out of a tunnel, I had a head-on collision with another biker who was entering from the other direction. Result? Bleeding knuckles.

But we both were thrilled we hadn't fallen into the polluted canal waters.

RIDE ON THE CORRECT SIDE

Like many Americans living in the UK, I have friends and relatives who visit for the first time and need to be shown around London.

I always insist we cycle. On a bike, a tour that includes Buckingham Palace, 10 Downing Street, Parliament, Big Ben, Regent's and Hyde parks and many sites along the River Thames can be done in just three hours.

In some ways, it's like teaching a teenager how to drive. Even on a Sunday,

when traffic is at its lowest, Americans find it tough to ride a bike on the left side of the road and to navigate traffic circles.

At the end of the ride, they are usually saying something like, "Wow, never again."

NAVIGATING LONDON

Forget street signs or the grid system. London's traffic network is an amazing mix of Roman roads, crooked Medieval alleys, 19th-century avenues and modern concrete traffic circles.

It's also one of Europe's largest, most densely populated cities, as a friend and I learned firsthand. On a bike trip from London to Brighton on the southern coast, we couldn't believe it took 2½ hours of pedaling just to get outside the city limits.

Trying to keep the city's many famous place names straight can also be a challenge — Leicester Square, Covent Garden, Oxford Street, Regent Street, Bond Street, Mayfair, Soho, Trafalgar Square.

Some cyclists rely on landmarks to keep track of where they are. The River Thames, the London Eye Ferris Wheel to the west and the Gherkin skyscraper to the east are all great navigational tools.

And once you learn the maze, short cuts on bikes are everywhere. Not to mention the clock tower at St. Paul's Cathedral, which is ideally positioned for cyclists wondering whether they're late for work.

BIKING HAS ADVANTAGES

Whether you're living in London long-term or just here as a tourist, bouncing around on a bike makes good economic sense. Transport in London is brutally expensive. A single trip from Covent Garden to Hyde Park can set you back four pounds (\$6.25). Even if you buy into the capital's discount card system, a weekly pass costs 25.80 pounds (about \$40).

At 5 pounds (\$7.85) for a seven-day rental and 45 pounds (about \$80) for an annual membership, London's bike rental plan is a better deal by far. And you're spared the creaky, sweaty subway system. Even in London's frequent (but usually very light) rains, cyclists tend to stick to their handlebars rather than risk the overcrowded Tube.

Bikes are faster too. In a race organized by a popular television show, "Top Gear," a cyclist beat public transport, a motor boat and a Mercedes in a 17-mile (27-kilometer) race across London.

As the London Cycling Campaign's Cavenett puts it: "What a great way to see the city."

Zac Efron sleepwalks through corny 'Cloud'

Zac Efron and the rest of the crew behind "Charlie St. Cloud" want their movie to be weepy, soulful, inspirational, cathartic, ethereal, life-affirming and who knows what else on the New Age emotional barometer.

Too bad they didn't aim to make it a little interesting.

This melodrama about a young man who puts his life in stasis after his kid brother's death is a bore, despite a somewhat clever twist — somewhat because it momentarily jolts the story out of the doldrums before the movie settles back to sleep.

Adapted by director Burr Steers and screenwriters Craig Pearce and Lewis Colick from Ben Sherwood's novel "The Death and Life of Charlie St. Cloud," the movie deals with the biggest of issues — why are we here, where are we bound? — with the blandest of greeting-card sentiments.

While Efron aims to show he's more than just a "High School Musical" heartthrob, he's vacuous in the title role here, sleepwalking through what's meant to be a journey from the deepest despair toward new hope.

Efron's Charlie has everything going his way in his Pacific Northwest hometown. He's a master yachtsman about to graduate from high school and head off to college with a sailing scholarship. His female classmates swoon at the sight of him. He's best friend, idol and father figure to his young brother, Sam (Charlie Tahan).

Then Sam dies in a terrible accident, while Charlie is revived after a near-death experience that leaves him seeing dead people — not in a creepy "The Sixth Sense" manner but in

an everyday, how's-your-afterlife-going sort of way.

Five years later, Charlie's stuck in limbo, working as the caretaker at the cemetery where Sam is buried and still looking after his little brother, who keeps popping up from beyond to hang out.

What could ever shock Charlie back to life? Why, the love of a fine woman, of course.

Just as she's about to head off on a 'round-the-world solo sailing race, Charlie's high school classmate Tess Carroll (Amanda Crew) comes back into his world,

rekindling his interest in living people, the sea and everything else for which he once had a passion.

The surprise turn in the plot initially leaves hope for something better than a predictable Hollywood ending.

But if you give any thought to that little twist, then it makes no sense, even within a story where a guy chats with dead folks. So best not to give it any thought.

Kim Basinger and Ray Liotta appear in oddly fleeting roles — she as Charlie and Sam's single mom, he as a paramedic who revived Charlie

and asks him the Big Question — why'd you get to come back, kid?

Donal Logue also is on hand for a meager part as Tess' sailing coach, an insignificant character except for his silly name — Tink Weatherbee.

Steers, who made the decent teen tale "Igby Goes Down" and also directed Efron in the piffing comedy "17 Again," does a nice job putting some soul in the scenery, even if he can't manage the same for the characters. The sailing images are lovely, the seascape is bleakly beautiful and the town is

pretty as a postcard.

Efron certainly looks pretty, too, and because he's there for almost every frame of "Charlie

St. Cloud," maybe that's enough for his young fans, even if no one's home behind Charlie's cloudy eyes.
