# Milton adjusts traffic lights

Milton has been listening to residents, and the city has made an adjustment to its traffic lights.

Because of this adjustment, the city started anew with its red light camera efforts as of July 20 at 1 p.m.

"We have reset our yellow light

timing to 4.7 seconds," Milton City Manager Brian Watkins said. "We did this after we learned of the standards in the Florida Traffic Engineering Manual."

According to Watkins, the

yellow light should be set at 4.5 seconds in a 45-mph zone, but the city set the lights at 50 miles per hour to afford a little leeway.

Pace resident Jay Daley met with Milton Mayor Guy Thompson, Milton Police Capt. Tony Tindell and Watkins about the lights and the FTEM study.

"I was watching a traffic light

in Milton on Saturday (July 16) when it was raining, and the trucks were not able to stop," Daley said. "There was a white truck that tried to stop, but he started to skid, and he lifted off the breaks and decided to drive through."

"I am looking forward to seeing if this will reduce the accidents and the number of tickets

like the study said it should."

Watkins said he was unaware of the state standard until it was brought to the city's attention.

"We are concerned about the public's safety," Watkins said. "If this adjustment will help ease the concerns of the citizens, then by all means, we will do it."

## Arrest made in Jay pharmacy break-ins

An arrest has been made in connection with two pharmacy break-ins in Jay.

Michael Wayne Lassiter, 26, of Milton, was arrested July 10 and charged with involvement in the two burglaries, at the Jay Pharmacy on July 18 and the Dura-Med Pharmacy on July 17.

According to Sgt. Scott Haines with the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office, deputies had leads on Lassiter's involvement and interviewed him after his arrest on unrelated charges.

Lassiter is charged with two counts of burglary of an unoccupied structure unarmed, criminal mischief \$1,000 or more, and criminal mischief \$200 and under.

The criminal mischief \$1,000 or more, a third-degree felony charge, stems from the broken double-paned window at the Jay Pharmacy on Alabama Street, and the criminal

## Boater seriously injured on Blackwater River

A Milton man was seriously injured Sunday afternoon when he lost control of his 15-foot boat on the Blackwater River.

Roger Lambert, 47, was piloting the boat, which he owns, when his hat flew off after the boat went to full plane.

According to Stan Kirkland with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission office in Panama City, Lambert reached out to catch his hat and lost control of his boat.

Lambert's boat wedged between two trees and flung him forward onto the bow, where he suffered a severe facial injury.

## Motorcyclist wedged under trailer

Traffic was halted on U.S. Highway 90 near the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office for about 45 minutes Monday as emergency responders assisted a motorcyclist who had been wedged underneath a truck's trailer after he struck the trailer in a no-passing zone.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol report, Kenneth Davies Jr., 23, of Milton, was driving an eastbound SUV on U.S. 90 at about 10:20 a.m., attempting to turn left onto Jeff Ates Road in East Milton when Wayne Stevens, 68, of Pace, passed traffic on his motorcycle in a no-passing zone heading eastbound and hit the side of Davies' trailer.

After impact, the report stated, Stevens was wedged under the trailer, and witnesses quickly assisted in removing lawn equipment from the trailer and getting the trailer off of the motorcyclist.

Stevens was taken from the scene by a LifeFlight helicopter to Sacred Heart Hospital with minor injuries.

The accident caused \$6,000 in damage to his BMW motorcycle.

# The Williamsons go to Washington

Two days later, I find out my good friend and fellow Santa Rosan, Jayer Williamson, received his invitation and would be making the trip with me.

The folks at the White House did not know what they were getting themselves into. Heck, we had the debt ceiling thing fixed before we landed to change planes in Atlanta, and we were finishing up on social security reform when the pilot announced we were on final approach to D.C. and all "seat backs and tray tables needed to be stored in their upright and locked position."

Once getting settled into the hotel, Jayer and I decided to put our walking shoes on and take a stroll. I was down right beside myself walking through the National Mall. "No tax breaks for billionaires, millionaires, hedge fund managers and corporate jet owners," was the line of the day and we heard it from start to finish. I knew we would be visiting the enemy camp, but the rhetoric was a little ridiculous and counterproductive. Needless to say, it is days like these that make me happy to say I live in



## No child left — to the left

It was a lovely day recently in Atlanta. The school kids were out playing in Piedmont Park, and some were diving for murder weapons in the park's lake. It was a scene Normal Rockwell might have painted.

I was enjoying a nice breakfast at Chick-fil-a, the only restaurant where the staff and the food look the same as in the commercials. They have free papers there, which is still too high a price to pay for the Atlanta Journal Constitution. I took a peek to see if the AJC was running its weekly rehash of the Emmitt Till story. Or perhaps the paper would employ its exhaustive investigative liberal journalistic skills proving that a man serving life in prison might have been wrongly convicted of two of his 86 murders. It's what the AJC does, which is why no one reads it anymore.

The AJC was reporting on a story which first broke in 2009 about a massive, ongoing, cheating scandal in the Atlanta Public School System. Gloria Love of the Northside Neighbor wrote that a "report found 178 educators, including 38 principals, participated in cheating during the

administration of the 2009 Criterion-Referenced Competency Tests." In short, for years teachers were changing test answers for their students to make them look better.

Good teachers, and there are many of them, were bullied by their leaders to conform to something not good for the students. In short, the teachers union, the sole province of the left, was doing its job.

For this fine work, Superintendent Beverly Hall, the darling of the educator world, received the National Superintendent of the Year award. She has since resigned, got a similar job and was recently spotted vacationing at a

posh Maui resort.

Obama delivers grandiose speeches on not taking the low road and cheating in schools; his words, written by someone else, would resonate better if he did not read them from a teleprompter hidden in front of him. Obama says he wants to train thousands more math teachers. Perhaps they could help him better understand what his \$4 trillion in deficit spending — so far — means for the country. Sadly, the kids already good in math and the metric system (converting ounces to grams and back) are making great money right now in our school system.

In the great documentary Waiting for Superman, even liberals agree that the monopoly held by the unions and government schools is a problem. Vouchers or school choice are torpedoed at each turn by the teachers unions and their beholden politicians.

For the past ten years, we have spent 32 percent above the rate of inflation on education, with bad results. If the Atlanta situation is as pervasive as I imagine, even the results we do have may be fraudulent.

accountable for the results. I would like to say "You get what you pay for," but we do not even get that. No amount of good money after bad will improve the situation unless we break the monopoly control of the government and the teachers unions.

Money is not the answer. I could teach math scratching in the dirt with a stick. My poor hometown did all it could to teach kids with the money it had. I am pretty sure my high school football coaches saved the school money by teaching driver education and sex education in the same car. We did what we could.

Atlanta's embarrassment confirms what we know: we cannot take small corrective measures with a education system that is fundamentally flawed. As Albert Einstein wrote, the definition of "insanity" is doing the same thing over and over again and expecting a different outcome. And, as these kids will learn, Einstein was a smart man who made lots of money with his bagel stores.

## 1001, 1002, 1003, 1004 ... STOP

As the title of this article indicates; this article will discuss the use of highly technical engineering equipment used by this writer. As always, our local Santa Rosa Press Gazette hits the nail on the head and shows all sides of real issues.

In watching the media and public reaction to Red Light Cameras, one can see there is a controversy that is beyond the stirring stage. As a motorcycle rider and motorcycle rights activist, as well as a four wheel vehicle driver, I find the Red Light Camera debacle quite interesting. I am, as the saying goes, torn between two lovers. I can see, if they are used properly, Red Light Cameras could possibly save lives somewhere down the road when the repeat offender finally gets tired of paying a small fine. However, I cannot see a one time convicted offender changing their driving habits due to a small fine. Changing ones driving habits is essential in the quest for fewer deaths on the highway.

Using my own experience with red lights, without a camera, I go

way back to 1969, when I was a young pup taking driver's education in Holley High School in upstate New York. Drivers Education is a class given in high school to young teens learning how to drive properly. It was free. I say this with a little sarcasm since all high schools in our county offer it, but it is not mandatory. When I took the class in 1969; if you didn't take it, you couldn't drive at night until you were 18 years old. That was a motivator to take the class in itself. Getting back on track, I was always taught that for every 10 mph, you travel it takes about a car length to stop, increasing the faster you go. Thus, at 40 mph you should be about four car lengths behind any vehicle in front of you. Not being naive; we all know this is not the way it is in the real world. People tailgate.

When we take a look at red lights, no matter what rule of thumb you use, it takes a few seconds to stop safely with traffic behind you. When I drive up and down Highway 90 from Milton to Pace — actually my wife drives me around — I find the lights are set to change at several different intervals. I have seen lights change from yellow to red at 1001 seconds, 1002 seconds and 1004 seconds. To

put it bluntly, there seems to be neither rhyme nor reason in the settings. Settings like this cause a conscientious driver to pay more attention to the light than in what is going on around them.

The Milton Police Chief reported over 400 violation pictures were sent to their office by the camera service company. This covers only a short period of time in their study, a "warning only" period. How many short amber lights would have caused rear end collisions had the violator stopped one second sooner?

I am sure the Red Light Cameras are, or can be, money makers. However, do they really save lives the way they are currently set up? Is the expense worth the value of lives saved in return? How many of these 400 plus violators resulted in a crash? As the controversy continues, it is up to you to decide whether these cameras contribute as a hazard or safety device. My solution: Kill or seriously injure someone by violating traffic laws...go to jail. You will remember next time.

When the Press Gazette responded to the accident, there was a second motorcyclist who appeared to be involved in the same accident. The highway patrol confirmed that the second biker was involved in a separate accident and had minor injuries.

The highway patrol did not release the identity of the second biker, who was taken away in a LifeGuard Ambulance, and did not release what hospital the second rider was sent to.

Stevens was ticketed with improper passing in a no-passing zone.

Daley reported the city traffic lights he timed with a stopwatch and his results, but only one of those lights had a red light camera installed, and two were in the city's enforcement area.

The only one being monitored by cameras is at U.S. Highway 90 and Parkmore Plaza, which he said had an average yellow light of 3.8 seconds.

U.S. 90 and Avalon Boulevard — which is under construction and at the city's police enforcement limit — had an average of 3.75 seconds for a yellow signal.

The other two lights, at U.S. 90 and Chumuckla Highway, and U.S. 90 and West Spencer Field Road, both in county jurisdiction, had an

average of 3.7 and 3.8 seconds, respectively.

"We have taken it upon ourselves to use the standards set by the Florida Traffic Engineering Manual as what we should go by here in the city," Watkins said. "After we got this completed, we started all over again and revoked all previous red light camera offenses."

Milton Police Chief Greg Brand is focused on the safety of the intersections.

"Since we started the red light camera enforcement on July 15, we have not had any accidents (at the red light camera intersections) reported, to my knowledge," Brand said. "I hope this will help

cut down on the number of tickets and help correct driver issues.

"That is what this is all about. I understand the people think it is a money issue, but we have seen with the number of warning tickets this is a driver issue that needs to be corrected."

Before the timing change, the city of Milton would not give a ticket to anyone if the yellow light was displayed less than four seconds before switching to red.

With citizens' recent questions about the lights, Brand stressed that the red light camera system activates when motion is detected just before the stop bar after the traffic signal has turned red.

The camera captures two im-

ages of an alleged violation, taken of the rear of the vehicle.

The first image shows the vehicle at the white stop bar and the illuminated red light.

The second image shows the violator in the middle of the intersection with the red light illuminated.

The license plate image is a close-up from one of the images captured.

The time, date and duration of the yellow and red lights are also recorded.

Cameras also record a 12-second digital video of the violation, including the six seconds before and after the red light has been run.

Baptist LifeFlight took Lambert to Sacred Heart Hospital, where he was treated. The hospital did not release the patient's condition, citing patient privacy laws.

According to Joy Tsubooka, public information officer for Santa Rosa County, units from East Milton, Bagdad and Skyline responded to the call, which came in around 3:17 p.m.

Kirkland indicated there was an unknown passenger on the boat with Lambert at the time of the accident, but

because of the extent of Lambert's injuries, investigators have not been able to get more information.

Emergency personnel used Whiting Park facilities as an egress point to help reach Lambert and transport him to a LifeFlight helicopter at Locklin Park.

Kirkland said the boat was still at the accident site, and it is believed to be a total loss.

Lambert and his passenger were leaving Ski Beach when the accident occurred.

## FWC seeks help monitoring deer for disease

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has not found any evidence of chronic wasting disease (CWD) after years of extensive testing of the state's white-tailed deer population.

The FWC tested 910 free-ranging deer during the past year and 5,519 during the past nine years, with no CWD-positive results.

"We are fortunate that no Florida deer has tested positive for CWD. The effect this disease has had in other states is substantial," Cory Morea, FWC's deer coordinator and biologist, said. "We would like to obtain more samples of deer from areas adjacent to captive deer facilities, because the most likely way for CWD to be introduced into Florida is through the importation of deer from other states."

CWD is a contagious neurological disease that has been found in captive and wild mule deer, white-tailed deer, moose and Rocky Mountain elk within several Western states and more recently Eastern states. It causes degeneration of the brain of infected animals,

resulting in emaciation, abnormal behavior, loss of bodily functions and death.

Virginia and West Virginia are the only Southeastern states where CWD has been detected.

To reduce the chances of CWD entering Florida, the state prohibits importing live deer unless they come from a herd that has been certified CWD-free for five or more years. Importation of any species of deer, elk or moose carcasses, with the exception of cleaned skull caps, antlers, tanned hides and deboned meat, is prohibited from 19 states and two Canadian provinces where CWD has been detected.

Chronic wasting disease has been detected in New Mexico, Utah, Colorado, Wyoming, Kansas, Minnesota, Oklahoma, Montana, South Dakota, Nebraska, Wisconsin, Illinois, New York, West Virginia, Michigan, Virginia, Missouri, North Dakota and Maryland, and Alberta and Saskatchewan, Canada. Visit the CWD Alliance website at [www.cwd-info.org](http://www.cwd-info.org) for the most up-to-date CWD reporting.

"Early detection is the key to limiting the spread of the disease, if such an outbreak should occur in

Florida," Morea said.

The FWC is once again turning to hunters and members of the public this hunting season for assistance in helping monitor the state's deer herd for CWD.

"We're asking hunters to report any sightings of sick or emaciated deer, or deer found dead from unknown causes," Morea said. "If you see such a deer, do not touch it, but instead contact us as soon as possible by calling toll-free, 866-CWD-WATCH (293-9282). Wildlife biologists will respond and, if necessary, collect deer tissue for testing."

CWD WATCH is part of an aggressive monitoring program intended to detect CWD in Florida and minimize its impact, should it be found.

There is no evidence that CWD poses a risk for humans. However, public health officials recommend avoiding direct contact with any sick-looking deer or one that has died of unknown causes.


"This is more of a music, family fun day. Everything is free," Valarezo said.







# Irrigation Association names July Smart Irrigation Month

According to the Environmental Protection Agency, more water is used in July than any other month in most areas of the U.S., and much of that water goes toward keeping lawns and landscaping green. For this reason, the Irrigation Association has named July "Smart

Irrigation Month." The average American household uses about 30 percent of its water outdoors, while in some parts of the country, this can be as high as 70 percent. Experts estimate that as much as 50 percent of landscape water use goes to waste because of evaporation, wind or runoff caused by overwatering. Some households lose up to 70 gallons of water daily. Saving water doesn't have to involve the cost and inconvenience of tearing up

your yard to install a new irrigation system. It's easy to save water and reduce your utility bills with simple changes to your landscaping and gardening routine.

- Landscape to suit your lot. Choose grass or plants that have low water requirements and will thrive in your local climate. Consider your lot's exact features, including sun and shade, dry and damp areas, plant size and how you plan to use each section of your yard.
- Keep soil healthy. Aerating your lawn and around trees at least once a year helps improve water penetration. When planting, turn and cultivate the soil and add compost or fertilizer to improve moisture retention and grow healthier plants that need less water to stay strong.
- Mulch well around

plants, bushes and trees. Using two to four inches of mulch reduces evaporation, moderates spikes and lows in soil temperatures, improves water penetration and helps control weeds that compete for water.

- "Hydro-zone" your yard. Grouping plants with similar moisture needs in the same area makes it easier to make sure they get the water they need without overwatering. Separate plants from grassy areas, which have different water requirements.
- Plant in spring or fall. Avoid summer, when hotter temperatures mean plants need more water to become established.
- Save grass for functional areas. Plant grass in play zones and other areas where it will be used and enjoyed. Instead of planting turf on steep slopes

or other hard-to-water spaces, consider ground cover, perimeter plants or mulch.

- Plant shade trees. The shade they cast creates natural air-conditioning, lowering air and soil temperatures, and reducing soil moisture loss.
- Maintain your yard regularly. A well-maintained yard requires less water, so weed, prune and mow as needed.

When watering is necessary, be sure to apply it efficiently. In the landscape, watering at the right time of day is important. It is best to irrigate when the sun is low, the winds are calm and temperatures are cool. This will save water — as much as 30 percent — by reducing evaporative losses. The best time to water is from early morning a couple of hours before sunrise.

When irrigating, saturate the root zones. Roots are generally within the top six inches of soil. Let the soil dry between irrigations. Watering too frequently results in shallow roots, weed growth, disease and fungus.

## Winehouse autopsy inconclusive; funeral Tuesday

**LONDON** (AP) — An autopsy on singer Amy Winehouse Monday failed to determine what killed the 27-year-old star, leaving fans and family with a weeks-long wait for the results of toxicology tests. Her funeral will be held Tuesday.

A family spokesman said the private funeral "for family and close friends" would be held at an undisclosed time and place.

Winehouse's devastated parents visited mourners outside her north London home to thank them for their support.

The singer, who had struggled with drug and alcohol abuse for years, was found dead Saturday at home by a member of her security team, who called an ambulance. It arrived too late to save her.

The Metropolitan Police said Monday that a forensic post mortem "did not establish a formal cause of death and we await the results of further toxicology tests." Those are expected to take two to four weeks.

The singer had battled her demons in public, too often making headlines for erratic behavior, destructive relationships and abortive performances.

Last month, Winehouse canceled her European comeback tour after she swayed and slurred her way through barely recognizable songs in her first show in the Serbian capital, Belgrade. Booed and jeered off stage, she flew home and her management said she would take time off to recover.

Her last public appearance came three days before her death, when she briefly joined her goddaughter, singer Dionne Bromfield, on stage at The Roundhouse in Camden, near her home.

Winehouse released only two albums in her lifetime — 2003's "Frank" and the chart-topping "Back to Black" in 2006. Both shot up the music charts as fans bought them to remember her by.

On Twitter, singer George Michael called her "the most soulful vocalist this country has ever seen."

"I hope she is at peace now," he added.

# 'Always Sunny' cast leads Comic-Con sing-along

**SAN DIEGO (AP)** — The cast of "It's Always Sunny in Philadelphia" showed up to Comic-Con in appropriate attire: costumes.

Glenn Howerton, Rob McElhenney, Kaitlin Olson, Charlie Day and Danny DeVito appeared at a Sunday panel for their rude FX comedy wearing their outlandish ensembles from "The Nightman Cometh," their infamous musical-within-the-show they toured with in 2009. The crowd at the pop-culture convention roared when the gang stepped onto the stage.

"My pants don't fit anymore," complained McElhenney, who gained weight for season seven.

Before the panel at the San Diego Convention Center, the audience previewed the seventh season premiere, which is set to debut Sept. 15.

The episode, titled "Frank's Pretty Woman," introduced the dramatic 50-pound weight gain of McElhenney's Mac and followed the gang as they attempted to sway DeVito's Frank from marrying a crack-smoking hooker.

The presentation ended with the gang leading a rousing rendition of "Dayman Fighter of the Nightman," one of the musical's songs, with more than 6,000 fans who gathered inside the convention's largest venue.

**SAN DIEGO (AP)** — "Glee" stars Lea Michele, Chris Colfer and Cory Monteith will appear in future seasons of the hit show.

Co-creator and executive producer Brad Falchuk told thousands of so-called "Gleeks" gathered at Comic-Con on Sunday that Rachel, Kurt and Finn "are not done with the show after this season."

Reports surfaced last month that the three stars would not return for season four of the musical Fox series. Their characters are high school seniors who are set to graduate at the end of the season three.

"They're seniors, they're graduating, but just because they're graduating doesn't mean they're leaving the show," Falchuk told fans, noting that the actors remain under contract.

The three actors did not appear at the presentation at the San Diego Convention Center, where show writers and cast members Jenna Ushkowitz, Darren Criss, Dot Marie Jones and Harry Shum Jr. talked about the new season, which is set to

# 'Grimm' premiere episode unfolds at Comic-Con

**SAN DIEGO (AP)** — "Grimm" plans to turn fairy tales on their heads.

After previewing the first episode of NBC's upcoming storytelling-meets-crime fighting procedural, which is loosely based on Little Red Riding Hood, the "Grimm" cast and crew promised Comic-Con attendees that other bedtime stories would be transformed into supernatural cases, including the Three Little Pigs, Cinderella and Goldilocks and the Three Bears.

"I like all the fairy tales where

I don't get thrown against the wall," joked David Giuntoli, who plays detective Nick Burkhardt, one of the last surviving members of the Grimm family, which the show depicts as an ancient clan of profilers who have the ability to see baddies disguised as humans. In the first episode, he tracks down a big bad serial killer.

Jim Kouf and David Greenwalt, the show's writers and executive producers, said that Burkhardt would solve a fairy tale-inspired crime each week, but Greenwalt added there would be "arcs for all

the characters and terrible things are going to happen to them." It's familiar territory for the pair: They worked on "Buffy the Vampire Slayer" and "Angel."

The show takes place and will be filmed in Portland, Ore. Bitsie Tulloch, who plays Burkhardt's fiancée, Juliet, said the town is the perfect setting for the mythological procedural because it has a "built-in eeriness." When asked by a fan if the story lines would move beyond the city, Greenwalt said "apparently, there's a lot of monsters in Portland."

# Discount destinations New travel passes mean more choices, less money



**NEW YORK (AP)** — Skip lines, pay less and get your money back for tickets you bought but didn't use?

Not a bad vacation, if you do the research ahead of time. That's the goal of a new line of travel passes called Go Select by Smart Destinations, which takes the traditional city travel pass (pay one price to visit a set list of sites for a certain number of days) and lets vacationers pick out only the attractions they want. The more attractions, the higher the discounts. If you didn't make it to all your destinations, you have a year to ask for a refund.

"It's taken an entire city and made it like a theme park experience," said Smart Destinations president Cecilia Dahl.

Smart Destinations has been selling its traditional unlimited-visit Go City cards in 14 U.S. cities, including Miami, Los Angeles, New York and Chicago. The company negotiates discounted rates with individual attractions and then bundles them to customers, who can then use the pass to skip ticket lines at each site.

But this summer, the company added customizable passes called Go Select for a number of destinations, including New York, Chicago, Boston, San Diego, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Oahu, Hawaii. (Three more cards are being added within the next few weeks: Seattle, Orlando and Blue Ridge, which is mainly in and around Asheville, N.C.) The new product lets consumers choose which attractions they want to see. You pay discounted prices that get steeper the more attractions you choose. The

top discount is 36 percent off gate price for all entry fees, Dahl said. But you'd have to buy at least a half-dozen attractions to achieve that savings. Typically, the minimum discount is 10 percent for two items.

The ability to pick means you'll shell out less overall and not pay for places you don't go. When I gave the Go Select pass a try in New York, I came away pleased. The biggest appeal? The refund. On vacation, plans do fall through.

Buying was easy. I logged onto the company's site, [www.smartdestinations.com](http://www.smartdestinations.com), picked my city, ticked off a box that said I wanted to choose my own sites, and was taken to a list of attractions, 43 in all. The site lets you browse attractions based on popularity, whether they're family-friendly, open late or don't allow kids at all.

A ticket for the Museum of Modern Art, the American Museum of Natural History and the Empire State Building rang up at \$48.64, 15 percent off the \$57 that Smart Destinations said I'd pay at the gate if I bought tickets on site. I removed Empire State and the price rang up \$31.44, a savings of 13 percent.

After buying my tickets, Smart Destinations offered me a free, printable city guide with maps and information, and my tickets. One barcode is good for all entries. The company plans to allow users to load these barcodes onto their phones in the future but for now Smart Destinations recommends printing the coded ticket to show at each site.

The tickets stated where to go upon arrival in order to skip lines. At the Museum of Modern Art, a staffer

spotted the print-out in my hand and sent me to the information desk. There, I exchanged it for an entry ticket.

Minutes later, I was standing in front of Monet's "Water Lilies."

But I didn't make it to the Natural History museum, so I wanted a refund. I called the number on my receipt — also listed prominently on the website — went through a few pre-recorded messages, got a person, and told him I wanted a refund. He asked for my order number and verified I did not make it to that museum. I got \$14.09 back, so my ticket for MOMA — usually \$20 — was \$17.35.

It helps to be somewhat tech savvy to navigate the options online, but phone numbers are displayed throughout the site if you prefer to buy over the phone. Either way, you might save a few bucks.

# Jazz impresario building legacy

**NEWPORT, R.I. (AP) —** While crews work to erect tents and stages for the upcoming Newport jazz and folk festivals, the festivals' creator and guardian angel continues to build something else: a legacy that he hopes will continue long after he's gone.

New York jazz impresario George Wein, who started the festivals more than 50 years ago, took them non-profit earlier this year to shield them from the financial ups and downs of corporate funding.

"I'm trying to project 20 years ahead," Wein, 85, told The Associated Press in a phone interview from his New York home. "I won't be here in 20 years. The only way I can see to perpetuate the festivals was to go nonprofit. We can't quit now. I say never quit. Once you quit, you're finished."

The folk festival returns to Newport July 30 and 31, with performances by Emmylou Harris, Decemberists and dozens of other acts. The Aug. 5-7 jazz festival will feature Dave Brubeck and Wynton Marsalis. Fort Adams State Park will host both events.

Nonprofit status will allow the board that oversees the events to accept tax-deductible contributions from music lovers and corporate sponsors. Several other music festivals are already nonprofit, including the Monterey and New Orleans jazz festivals.

"He's trying to keep this going," said Leon Jackson, who attended the second jazz festival in 1955 and most of them since. He's worked behind the scenes at many of the events, one of many local residents who pitch in to make things run smoothly. But Jackson said it will take more than a new tax status to ensure the festival's long-term survival — it will take someone with Wein's energy and vision.

"George promoted the first outdoor jazz festival in the nation, and he's kept it going ever since," he said. "I don't think anybody else could do that."

Over the years Wein's festivals have weathered financial upheaval, moves to other cities and even a riot in 1960 when the National Guard was summoned to deal with crowds of unruly fans gathering outside the festival gates. All the while Wein played at the jazz festival with his band of rotating musicians, the Newport All-Stars. The band continues to tour.

"The man is a dynamo," said Bruce Jackson, an English professor at the University of Buffalo who served on the board overseeing the Folk Festival in the 1960s. He is not related to Leon Jackson. "People would say occasionally that George was only in Newport for the money. I always knew that was absolute B.S. He was in it for the music."

The jazz festival traces its roots back to 1954. Wein was playing piano and running the Storyville jazz club in Boston when Newport socialite Elaine Lorillard asked him to organize a performance to entertain Newport's affluent summer social scene. The first festival featured Ella Fitzgerald, Dizzy Gillespie, Billie Holiday and others.

Though it left Newport for New York for several years in the '70s, the jazz festival has featured household names like Miles Davis, Duke

event volunteer on George Wein, the man who started the Newport jazz and folk festivals

Ellington, Thelonious Monk and Frank Sinatra. Wein even exported the Newport brand, establishing "Newport" festivals in Boston, Saratoga, N.Y., and even Japan.

The folk festival started in 1959 with performances from folk icon Pete Seeger and a then largely unknown Joan Baez. In 1965, Bob Dylan famously outraged some folk purists by trading in his acoustic guitar for an electric one. The festival skipped several years in the '70s but returned in 1985. Since then the festival has broadened to feature a greater variety of artists including the Allman Brothers, Jimmy Buffett and Arlo Guthrie.

Bruce Jackson, the former board member, recalls how in the early days, headliners like Dylan would be paid the same amount as unknown musicians — a flat fee of \$50. At the end of the event, any extra profits would be given away. A musician who lost his guitar would be given cash for a new one. A struggling music festival in another part of the country would be given a little help.

"The thing I loved about Newport was that it was all about love," he said. "That sounds so corny now. But it was about people coming together to hear music and be together. George was the one who held it all together."

Wein sold the festivals in 2007 to a festival production company. He wouldn't disclose the sale price but said at the time it was "in the millions." But the company ran into financial trouble in 2009 and long-time sponsor JVC pulled out. Wein stepped in to produce the festivals once more.

Wein likens the festivals to children, and said he couldn't stand by and watch them fade into history.

Newport Mayor Stephen Waluk said Wein's dedication has paid off for the city. He recalls making record profits at his childhood lemonade stand on the weekends when the festival was in town.

"He wants to leave a legacy," Waluk said. "It's something I definitely support. The festivals wouldn't be the same without Newport, and I don't think Newport would be the same without the festivals."

Wein's Newport All-Stars often plays the festival, but not this year. There's too much else to do, Wein said.

"You don't want to push yourself too much," he said, before quickly adding, "though I may sit in without being announced."




