Castillo had heard Grubb talking about wanting to audition in Pittsburgh, but never took him seriously until he packed up and left for the Steel



Principal arrested in undercover operation

Avalon Middle School Principal Steven McHenry was arrested on Thursday night by Pensacola Police Department Vice and Narcotics Unit and is now on paid administrative leave pending the outcome of his case.

McHenry was charged with committing a lewd and lascivious act or behavior cohabitation and indecent exposure in public on Thursday. Both crimes are misdemeanors and could result in a maximum penalty of one and a half years in the Escambia County Jail.

McHenry was released Thursday night after posting a bond of \$1,000.

According to a copy of the arrest report obtained from the Pensacola Police Department, Pensacola Police Department's Vice and Narcotics unit was conducting an undercover operation at the Chimney Bluffs Park on Scenic Highway near Langley Ave.

Pensacola Police Detective Keving Christman observed McHenry rubbing his private

When he was born, doctors told 39-year-old Jennifer Moseley of Milton that her son, Blake, had a condition called Hydrocephalus.

Hydrocephalus is a term to describe a buildup of fluid inside of a person's skull that leads to brain swelling. The buildup of fluid puts pressure on the brain,

pushing the brain up against the skull and damaging or destroying brain tissues.

The youngest of Moseley's four children, Blake has been revived from death twice, undergone five difficult surgeries and had a portion of his brain removed. He isn't even 2 years old yet.

Hydrocephalus is a rare condition that affects one in 20,000 children worldwide.

At only five months into her pregnancy, doctors told her the horrifying news of Blake's condition.

"We already had his funeral planned," Moseley said. "They said he wasn't going to make it through my pregnancy."

During one of many trips to the hospital, Blake passed away in front of his mother.

"The doctor handed our baby to us and told us he was dead,"

Moseley said. "His father (William) took him and started sucking stuff out of his mouth, and after that, he started breathing again."

Now, at only 19 months old, Blake is on a series of pain medications and medicine to help him cope with the constant pain.

"Everyday can be our last

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Motorcyclist, Milton woman involved in weekend wrecks

A Milton woman sustained no injuries after her vehicle was struck by a motorist in the eastbound lanes of I-10 while she was pulled over near the 26-mile marker.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol accident report, Lissia Vaughn, 62, was parked in the

left shoulder with another vehicle parked directly behind her when a freight truck, driven by Jean Val, lost control and struck the rear ends of both Vaughn's vehicle and a pickup truck, driven by Steven Wisneski, of Panama City who was parked directly behind Vaughn, according to the FHP report.

After Val struck the two vehicles, he veered back to the right of the highway, crossed both lanes

and struck the guardrail on the south side of the roadway, the report indicated.

After coming to a final rest, Val's trailer blocked the right eastbound lane of the interstate.

Val caused an estimated \$30,000 in damage to the tractor-trailer and caused over \$21,000 in damage to Vaughn and Wisneski's vehicles.

Wisneski and Vaughn did not sustain any injuries during the

wreck.

In a separate accident that occurred on Old Martin Road in Munson, a motorcyclist from Pensacola was sent to Sacred Heart Hospital with serious injuries after the rider drifted onto the roadway's shoulder and into a ditch, according to a Florida Highway Patrol report.

Jason Baughman, 26, of Pensacola, who was the operator of the motorcycle, was traveling south

on Old Martin Road just south of State Road 4 when he drifted off the roadway, into a ditch and overturned the motorcycle. He was ejected from the motorcycle when it overturned. According to the FHP report, he was wearing a helmet.

Baughman was taken by Life-Flight to Sacred Heart Hospital after sustaining \$1,500 in damage to his Honda motorcycle.

"We're fortunate to have a board certified lactation consultant that can address those concerns and help them breastfeed successfully."

Breastfeeding for at least the first six months can have significant health benefits.

Breast milk is easy to digest and the rates of ear and respiratory infections are lower in babies that are breastfed.

According to the news Sunday night, an agreement was reached to raise the debt cap and start reducing expenditures.



Organizing a right-wing jobs program for America

There's one little catch, though, you have to be a Wisconsin jailbird to get one of these dandy positions. He's not the only one thrilled with this scheme to take middle-class paychecks from public employees. The Washington Examiner, a far-right newspaper that cheers on the privatization of public

services, hailed Racine County's jailbird ploy as "great news for Wisconsin taxpayers. Hopefully, we'll see more of it."

So there you have the right-wing's idea of a good jobs program for America. When Walker ran for governor last year, he promised to create 250,000 new jobs, and now he's delivering. To apply, just go directly to jail.

Tax the millionaires and billionaires

This seems to be the current rally cry of the administration regarding the deficit and the national debt. Unfortunately it indicates either complete ignorance of the subject or deliberate deception. The amount of taxable income of an individual has nothing to do with whether or not they are a millionaire or a billionaire.

Millionaires and billionaires are determined by something called the fair value of net assets. This is measured by taking the fair value of everything

they own (assets) and subtracting all of their debt (liabilities). If that amount equals or exceeds one million dollars, then they are considered a millionaire. It has nothing to do with how much income they earn.

One can be a millionaire and have zero income and once can earn one million dollars a year or more and have negative assets. For instance, I can own land valued at \$1 million, have no debts, live with my parents and have zero income. Or I could have paid one million for a house that has a \$750,000 mortgage and a fair value in the current depressed market of only

\$500,000. In this case, my net assets are negative regardless of how much I earn.

Voters would be surprised at the number of ordinary Americans who worked at the same job most of their life, saved their money, paid their bills, and are now millionaires—and living on \$40,000 to \$60,000 a year of retirement income.

Many will need all of these assets just to cover their medical costs in old age. Politicians do not seem to realize that changes in the income tax law create a dynamic environment. When taxes are increased, taxpayers find a way to legally pay

less tax. The result is that the government collects less total tax revenue and not more. An alternative available to the very wealthy is the ability to take advantage of the tax law to reduce their taxable income.

Taxing people in the highest income categories only serves to reduce the number of people they hire, increase unemployment, generating less tax revenue to the government. So why deliberately mislead the populous? What is ironic about this rhetoric is that most of the members of Congress are millionaires.

The event will also hon-


or the many heroes, both at home and abroad, who have served, and continue to serve our country in the ongoing war against terrorism.

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Dear Pastor Gallups, "Where does the phrase — 'ashes to ashes, dust to dust' come from? I hear this at funerals all the time, but I can't find it in the Bible." T.R. Milton

Dear T. R.

You won't find 'ashes to ashes, dust to dust' in the Bible. The phrase comes from the funeral service in the Book of Common Prayer, and it is based on Genesis 3:19 — which states that man was created from the "dust of the earth."

Each church of the Anglican Communion has its own version of the Book of Common Prayer. In the current American version, it appears on page 485 (Burial Rite 1) and on page 501 (Burial Rite 2) in a prayer that is said by the priest as a handful of "earth" is ceremonially cast on top of the coffin. It reads as follows,

"In sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life through our Lord Jesus Christ, we commend to Almighty God our brother and we commit his body to the ground; earth to earth; ashes to ashes, dust to dust. The Lord bless him and keep him, the Lord make his face to shine upon him and be gracious unto him and give him peace. Amen."

The funeral service has become part of the literary resources of the English language and many Christian funeral services.

This understanding of 'ashes to ashes, dust to dust' is also found in Psalm 90 - Psalm 90:2-3

2 Before the mountains were born or you brought forth the earth and the world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God.

3 You turn men back to dust, saying, "Return to dust, O sons of men."

Youth fighting disease becomes pilot for a day

Aviation units at Naval Air Station Whiting field teamed with Sacred Heart Hospital, July 12, to brighten up the day for one local boy. Patton Goetter, 12, doesn't seem different than any other kid his age. He smiles — a lot, laughs, tell jokes and dreams of one day flying jets for the military. However, Patton also suffers from cystic fibrosis, but for one day, he got a little taste of his dream.

Helicopter Training Squadron Eighteen and Training Squadron Three hosted Patton for the "Pilot for a Day" program. The program is a monthly cooperative effort with Sacred Heart to help seriously ill children enjoy a day centered on them. All six of Training Air Wing Five's training squadrons participate in the event, planning a full day of activities, around the base each month for the child selected by Sacred Heart.

Patton's day began in the seat of a T-6 Texan II simulator, where he flew around the local area and even got to buzz his own house. While he was sitting in the cockpit, members of the squadron prepared his biggest surprise. When he exited the simulator, Patton was presented with his own flight gear, complete with identification. It was a highlight of his day.

"I got some badges for my shirt and stuff, and I got my nametag, and I got boots and a whole suit and a helmet — an awesome helmet. It's just been really cool," Patton said.

He followed that with a VIP seat in NAS Whiting Field's south tower to see helicopter operations close up. He was amazed by the amount of helicopters coming in and out of the field, counting all of them with their rotors turning. Then he made his way down to the flight line where he sat in the pilot's seat of a training helicopter. When he was asked how it feels to be in the pilot's seat, his simple response was, "It's awesome."

Patton's day had just

begun. On the north side of base he climbed up on the wing of one of the newest T-6s. As he got the cockpit rundown and walked around the aircraft, you could sense his excitement. From there Patton got to experience the helicopter simulator and even received some training on night vision goggles.

The day did recall some bitter sweet memories for Patton and his family. His brother, Tyler, also had cystic fibrosis and attended a similar "Pilot for a Day" event. Tyler's case of the disease was much worse and he passed away 10 years ago.

"It was heart wrenching. It was very devastating, but we've been very blessed because his (Patton's) disease is not nearly as severe as our other son's," Abby Goetter, Patton's mom, said. "It's a very memorable experience. It gives us good memories and our kids felt very special for the day. It's something that they probably won't get to experience again."

Patton seems determined not to let his disease stop him from anything.

"I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me," Patton said.

The overall goal of the pilot for a day program is to benefit children and their families who suffer from tragic illnesses. It tries to help the families in the recovery process by bringing a positive experience to the child.

Although a local program, similar "Pilot for a Day" programs can be seen at other military bases across the country. Helping these children and their families through an exciting day at the base is supported wholeheartedly by the pilots.

"We get a bit isolated in our day to day mission and it gives us a chance to get back in touch with the civilian world, and help out a kid in need," Lt. Benjamin Permenter, Patton's escort for the tour, emphasized. "Also, he chose us out of all the different things he could have done. He wanted to see what we do and that makes it very special for us as aviators."



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Tax holiday begins Aug. 12

The Florida Legislature and governor approved a back-to-school sales tax holiday on certain clothing and school supplies. Beginning at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, Aug. 12 and running through midnight on Sunday, Aug. 14, consumers can purchase certain clothing with a sales price of \$75 or less and school supplies having a sales price of \$15 or less without paying sales tax on the items. Florida's Department of Revenue offers a detailed list of items that do and do not qualify for the tax exemption.

To help consumers make the most of the sales tax holiday, your BBB offers the following tips:

- Plan ahead. Set a realistic budget and stick to it. Make a list of the items you need to purchase to avoid buying on impulse. Be sure to check with

your child's school for a list of required supplies to avoid return trips.

- Comparison shop, carefully. Tax holiday "sales" and promotions may not be the bargains they appear to be. Make sure you're comparing "apples to apples" when looking at sales and promotions.

- Talk to the retailer. Before making your purchase, ask the merchant how refunds and exchanges will be handled after the sales tax holiday ends.

- Be aware of your surroundings. Because stores may be particularly busy during the sales tax holiday, pay extra attention to those around you. Never leave your wallet, purse or credit card on a counter. Don't get overloaded with packages. Shop with a companion or ask for an escort to your car.

day with Blake," Moseley said. "We treasure everyday we have with him."

"He is a trooper and a fighter."

Moseley, who has Medicaid, said the health care provider will pay for certain procedures, but not always for special equipment such as a special helmet the infant must wear to protect his head from injury.

"Next is a wheelchair. Every step of the way, he's going to need something new," Moseley said.

On Saturday, Lights Out, a local bar hosted a charity motorcycle ride to help raise money for the helmet Blake needs, which his mother says costs \$2,000.

The ride turned out over 40 riders, with a cost of \$10 per biker, and \$5 a passenger.

Up until the day of the poker run, the bar had been asking for donations from visitors.

"Blake has a long life ahead of him," Moseley said, "but he is a fighter."

area on the outside of his pants.

A second officer, Martez Lawrence, encountered McHenry along the walking trails smoking a cigarette.

After passing officer Lawrence a third time McHenry stopped on the trail underneath some trees where he could still be observed.

McHenry was observed by officer Lawrence after he had exposed himself.

After being read his Mi-

randa Rights, McHenry spoke with Detective Christman and stated he knew why he was under arrest and that his actions were illegal.

Officer Lawrence noted on the report that McHenry was observed in the same area on July 26 during an undercover operation and acted in the same manner; but did not expose himself.

Monday Santa Rosa County Schools Superintendent Tim Wyrosdick met with

Avalon Middle Monday and stated he would be reassigned to other administrative duties until his adjudication and arraignment is handled.

The school system is also awaiting word on any determination the Florida Department of Education might take on McHenry's certification to teach in the State of Florida

Tuesday morning Wyrosdick named David Sigurn-

jack, the former assistant principal at Holley-Navarre Middle School, as the new principal. Classes are set to get under way on Aug. 22.

For the 13th consecutive year, Avalon has been rated an "A" school by the Florida Department of Education.

Prior to being named the assistant principal, McHenry was a social studies teacher at Gulf Breeze High School and also served as a basketball and volleyball coach.




On Saturday, bikers gave up part of their day to help raise money for a Milton child who is lucky to be alive.


The Buckets for Blake Run was held Saturday, with first bikes out at 10 a.m. to raise money for a child who was born with a condition that causes brain swelling.

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Florida Bar disciplines 22 attorneys

The Florida Bar, the state's guardian for the integrity of the legal profession, announces that the Florida Supreme Court in recent court orders disciplined 22 attorneys, disbarred 10 and suspending 10. Some attorneys received more than one form of discipline. Two attorneys were publicly reprimanded; one was placed on probation and one was ordered to pay restitution.

As an official arm of the Florida Supreme Court, The Florida Bar and its Department of Lawyer Regulation are charged with administering a statewide disciplinary system to enforce Supreme Court rules of professional conduct for the 90,000-plus lawyers admitted to practice law in Florida. Since Aug. 1, 2007, case files have been posted to attorneys' individual Florida Bar profiles and may be reviewed at and/or downloaded from The Florida Bar's website, www.floridabar.org.

Court orders are not final until time expires to file a rehearing motion and, if filed, determined. The filing of such a motion does not alter the effective date of the discipline. Disbarred lawyers may not re-apply for admission for five years or longer if stated. They are required to go through an extensive process that rejects many who apply. It includes a rigorous background check and re-taking the bar exam. Historically, fewer than 5 percent of disbarred lawyers seek readmission.

Gary Michael Appellblatt, 3610 American River Drive #112, Sacramento, Calif., disbarred effective immediately, following a June 23 court order. (Admitted to practice: 1991) The Florida Bar was notified by the California Supreme Court

that Appellblatt had been disbarred in that state in April 2010 because of felony convictions. (Case No. SC10-2463)

Antonio R. Arnao, 28870 U.S. Highway 19 N., Suite 315, Clearwater, suspended for 60 days, effective retroactive to Dec. 1, 2010, following a May 24 court order. (Admitted to practice: 1988) Arnao was found in contempt for repeated failure to respond to official Bar inquiries and failure to show good cause for non-compliance. (Case No. SC10-1341)

Daniel Antonio Benito, 2423 S.W. 147th Ave. #362, Miami, permanently disbarred effective immediately, following a June 7 court order. (Admitted to practice: 1997) Benito had established a pattern over a three-year period of using client funds to satisfy past obligations to different clients, in a manner similar to a Ponzi scheme. One of Benito's clients claimed to have sent him \$80,000 for funding a marital settlement agreement. When the settlement did not materialize, the client demanded a refund through a new attorney, leading to a fee dispute. Instead of depositing the money into his trust account until the conflict was resolved, Benito disbursed the funds for his own use. (Case No. SC09-775)

Jessica Ann Bennett, 13194 U.S. Highway 301 S., Riverview, suspended for 91 days, effective 30 days from an April 12 court order. (Admitted to practice: 2004) While preparing and filing a petition for a client in a guardianship and life insurance case, Bennett received court notification of deficiencies that needed to be corrected in order to grant the petition. Bennett never corrected the deficiencies, never informed client of court denial and stopped working on the

case. In another instance, Bennett accepted a retainer fee to represent a client in a modification of child support matter. She failed to perform any legal services or communicate with the client, and she failed to respond to Bar inquiries regarding the matter. (Case No. SC10-1017)

Richard Edward Benton, 1415 Piedmont Drive E., Suite 4, Tallahassee, suspended for 40 days, effective 30 days from a June 17 court order. Further, Benton is directed to attend ethics school. (Admitted to practice: 1976) Benton accepted legal fees from a client but took no action to move the case forward, and subsequently failed to communicate regarding the status. The client requested the return of his money and retained another attorney to complete the case. Benton also failed to respond to the Bar's inquiries regarding the matter. (Case No. SC11-241)

J. Gordon Blau, 2732 Deer Berry Ct., Longwood, disbarred effective retroactive to April 1, following a May 11 court order. (Admitted to practice: 1978) An audit revealed that Blau misappropriated and commingled client funds. Blau had a federal tax lien of more than \$12,000 and his law firm failed to timely pay employee withholding taxes. Blau also charged an excessive fee and failed to adequately explain his contract for representation in one case. (Case No. SC11-712)

Kevin Jay Byrne, 1451 W. Cypress Creek Road, Suite 300, Fort Lauderdale, disbarred effective immediately, following a June 23 court order. (Admitted to practice: 2001) After receiving retainer fees from clients, Byrne demonstrated a pattern of neglect. He'd schedule and then cancel meetings; he did little or no work on cases

and he failed to keep clients informed about the status of their cases. On numerous occasions, Byrne failed to respond to Bar inquiries regarding client matters. (Case No. SC11-628)

Arthur P. Cohen, 4701 Martinique Drive, Apt. B4, Coconut Creek, suspended for 30 days, effective 30 days from a June 17 court order. (Admitted to practice: 1984) Cohen was arrested for possession of cocaine, a felony; and possession of drug paraphernalia, a misdemeanor. Criminal charges were dismissed due to Cohen's successful completion of drug court outpatient and pre-trial intervention programs. (Case No. SC11-63)

Joseph R. DeLuca, c/o Gloria Clevenger, 16091 Blatt Blvd., Weston, disbarred effective immediately, following a June 24 court order. (Admitted to practice: 1971) DeLuca pleaded guilty in circuit court to one count of neglect of a child, a felony. Prior to petitioning for reinstatement, DeLuca shall reimburse The Florida Bar's Clients' Security Fund in the amount of \$11,166.67. (Case Nos. SC09-412 & SC09-758)

Todd Corey Deratany, 503 Fifth Ave., Suite 102, Indialantic, disbarred for 10 years, effective retroactive to March 21, following a May 11 court order. (Admitted to practice: 2007) Deratany is the subject of numerous disciplinary violations. In several instances, Deratany failed to maintain adequate communication with his clients and in one civil matter, he failed to appear for a trial and did not notify the court or his client regarding his conflict with a pending criminal case. Deratany also made disparaging remarks about another defense attorney during a recorded conversation with an incarcerated former client. (Case Nos. SC10-

1292 & SC10-2383)

David Edward Evans, 108 W. 4th St., Panama City, suspended for 90 days, effective July 15, following a June 17 court order. Upon reinstatement, Evans is further placed on probation for two years. (Admitted to practice: 1994) After being retained to represent clients, Evans often failed to communicate and failed to appear at scheduled hearings. Evans was subsequently arrested and charged with doctor shopping, i.e., concealing information to obtain prescription drugs. (Case No. SC10-1400)

John Everette Evans, III, P.O. Box 1653, Fort Myers, disbarred effective immediately, following a May 11 court order. (Admitted to practice: 2005) Evans engaged in a pattern of neglect with respect to client matters. In numerous instances, Evans obtained fees from clients and then failed to provide reasonable representation. He subsequently abandoned his practice without communicating with clients about their cases. (Case No. SC10-1566)

Terry Jon Forman, 1501 S. Le Jeune Road, Coral Gables, disbarred for 10 years, effective immediately, following a June 23 court order. Forman shall also pay restitution of \$50,000 to one client. (Admitted to practice: 1988) Forman was both a practicing attorney and a Certified Public Accountant when he entered into a business venture with clients.

When the venture failed, Forman never repaid one of the investors. Forman knowingly participated in two mortgage fraud schemes, and he prepared and mailed a fraudulent income tax return to the IRS on behalf of a client's girlfriend. Case No. SC10-1104)

Inger Michelle Garcia,

P.O. Box 11933, Fort Lauderdale, publicly reprimanded following a June 17 court order. (Admitted to practice: 1997) Garcia is further directed to attend ethics school. In the handling of one case, Garcia disclosed embarrassing information that was irrelevant and prejudicial to the administration of justice. In three other instances, after accepting retainer fees, Garcia failed to properly communicate with clients and keep them informed as to the status of their cases. (Case No. SC10-2261)

Eric P. Gifford, 3807 County Road 826, Anna, Texas, suspended until further order, following a May 24 court order. (Admitted to practice: 2001) According to a petition for emergency suspension, Gifford appeared to be causing great public harm by misappropriating client funds. A Bar investigation found that Gifford took \$5,000 held in trust for a mentally disabled client and used part of the money to pay private school tuition for his children. (Case No. SC11-943)

John Robert Green, P.O. Box 349, Panama City, suspended for three years, effective 30 days from a May 24 court order. (Admitted to practice: 2004) After his former wife filed a modification seeking an increase in child support, Green knowingly disobeyed an obligation to provide a truthful and accurate financial affidavit pursuant to the Florida Family Law Rules of Procedure. A circuit court found that Green unnecessarily delayed the proceedings for three years by failing to provide financial information, misrepresenting his financial situation and changing his testimony regarding the authenticity of various loan applications and financial statements. (Case No. SC10-671)

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Use precautions to beat mosquitoes

It's summertime, and the livin' is itchy — especially if you spend time outside during dusk or dawn. The best ways to avoid mosquito bites are to stay out of mosquito-infested areas, wear protective clothes, and use insect repellent.

According to the EPA, correct use of products containing DEET is not a health concern, while "natural" repellents may not always be safe alternatives, especially if used in high concentrations. Best practice is to always follow the label instructions and use only repellents ap-

proved by the EPA. Also avoid repellents combined with sunscreens. Because sunscreens are designed to be used frequently and liberally, too much repellent may be applied even when the product is used as directed. It's best to apply sunscreen first, then add repellent to be sure each product works correctly.

Some popular ways to prevent mosquito bites are surprisingly ineffective. For example, there is no evidence that any sound-emitting devices will repel mosquitoes. There is also no scientific evidence to back eating garlic, onions, or other foods to make you less attractive to mosquitoes. A mosquito's attraction is based on a complex

interaction of both chemical and visual signals, so certain foods may work to keep the insects away from one person but not another. Bug zappers don't work well either. Studies show that they don't reduce the number of mosquitoes and they kill other bugs, like moths and beetles, more than they kill mosquitoes.

The bottom line is, if you don't want to feel the itch, take steps to avoid mosquitoes. Stay inside during dusk and dawn and avoid places that are calm, shady and humid. The more skin you cover, the fewer bites you'll get. Dump out sources of standing water near your house and use an EPA-approved repellent according to the label directions.

Summer weather, fall fashion



Time to layer for looks that cross seasons

NEW YORK (AP) — It's fall in the mall.

Officially, summer has weeks left on the calendar, but retailers have begun the transition from lightweight and lighthearted vacation clothes to the more dressed-up, sophisticated styles that come with fall fashion.

The tricky part, they say, is that while it's good to infuse the excitement of a new season into stores, shoppers can be so enthusiastic about their new purchases, they want to be able to wear them right away. That can be a problem when traditional fall looks — sweaters, long trousers and outerwear — might not be suited to the dog days of August.

The solution? Lightweight layers in a deeper, more autumnal color palette.

"The consumer in general is forward looking but wants instant gratification," said Barclay Resler, vice president and head of visual management for Esprit.

You can do that with a pretty chiffon blouse, he suggested, or a short-sleeve knit dress, maybe with some buckle detail at the waist.

Lisa Axelson, head designer of Ann Taylor, has already worn her sleeveless trench — with a silk blouse and cropped black pants — but it'll go with flannel trousers and long gloves later. It is "the perfect wear-now-and-layer-later piece," she said.

Fabric choices are very important, said Banana Republic creative director Simon Kneen, a fan of tropical-weight wool. "It's designed for tropics. It's airy, and the weave is more open, but it will look refined. You can have it in a dress, trouser, skirt, jacket — and those are the foundations of your fall closet."

Lightweight chambray denim serves the same purpose for more casual pieces.

Navy is a favorite transitional color for Resler because it plays crisp and clean against white pants, but more luxurious with high-waisted trousers in gray, camel or brown. A ruffled, navy-and-white dot blouse in stores now has it all, he said, a cheerful vibe to finish out the summer, but ladylike enough to carry through the rest of the year.

Warm shades of orange, amber and green are trends at Kohl's for fall, but they're not dark colors, either, so they fit into a variety of weather landscapes, said David Hacker,

vice president of trend and color. Kneen said Banana Republic — and he imagines other retailers, too — has learned to work in the mindset of many mini-fashion seasons filled with versatile pieces instead of sweeping in with major changes twice a year.

As a children's retailer, The Children's Place switched to its back-to-school merchandise in

the middle of July to capitalize on the shopping-spree days before kids go back to class. However, said Michael Giannelli, senior vice president of design, all he needs to do is walk outside to be reminded that "fall is really a summer delivery."

A tiered, sequined skirt that pairs just as well with a tank top and flip-flops as with a sweater, tights and chukka boots

a few months from now — even into the holiday season — is blowing out of stores, Giannelli said, but the No. 1 selling footwear item right now is a slouchy suede boot that really looks more like a fall item.

"Those emotional, fashion-y pieces will sell out, so people don't wait to buy it. They're willing to wait to wear it if the item is so special."

Still, he added, he's seen quite a few girls around wearing those boots with their shorts.

Trendy items don't have to be limited to a single season, and it's those more lasting looks that are on the floor at JCPenney right now. "We're sticking with bright color," said director of women's trend Cynthia Washburn-Nester, ticking off skinny jeans in saturated shades of red, yellow and green, and sleeveless tops with feminine details as top choices.

A chunky fisherman-style or shaker-knit sweater will evolve that look into full-on fall, she said, and, really even now, a lighter, open-weave sweater isn't a bad idea living in this very air-conditioned world.

"People aren't necessarily looking at 'fall' and 'spring' wardrobes. It's about evolving things into the next season. You give something you've loved and worn a new life by wearing it with something new," Washburn-Nester said.

Hacker of Kohl's sees the gauze or crochet-style ponchos that have a lot of real estate in stores as swimwear cover-ups for August, and then as the perfect introduction to outerwear in the early fall. You'll need a heavier knit eventually, he said, but ponchos — even two of them — are pieces you'll get a lot of use out of. They are a key item of the season.

"You want to update, not redo your wardrobe," he said.

Also, he added, don't underestimate the shorts you've been wearing for months. "Most people think of shorts as a summer thing, but, especially in Europe, and with the advances in legwear to add texture and color — you can even layer legwear with tights with socks on top — that this is something that can go into fall," he said.

"Based on the economic times, people are learning to adapt their clothes from season to season," he added.

Looking ahead, some stores will have even more shorts, including tweed ones, heavier denim and sturdy earth-tone cargo styles.

"Probably no one is happy to see the end of summer come, but the fabrics of fall are so rich, and things can layer so well together, there is definitely something coming from customers that's a high interest in fall," Resler said.

A little fat gives salmon lots of flavor

Though relatively high in fat — especially compared to most white fish — salmon is a great choice for a healthy diet. That's because salmon's fats fall mostly in the good-for-your-heart unsaturated category. Which is a happy coincidence, because that fat happens to be key to salmon's moist texture and rich, indulgent

flavor. It also makes it a breeze to cook. The oils in salmon make it hard to overcook and dry out. So for a simple and healthy summer dinner, we've paired salmon with a mushroom hash. The earthy flavor of shiitake mushrooms mixed with shredded potatoes complements the rich fish. And a touch of soy sauce lends a pleasantly salty touch to cut through the oil.

SALMON WITH SHIITAKE HASH

Start to finish: 30 minutes

Servings: 4

- 2 tablespoons olive oil, divided
- 6 ounces shiitake mushrooms, stemmed and sliced
- 2 shallots, chopped
- 1 small red onion, chopped
- 2 small red potatoes, grated
- 2 tablespoons low-sodium soy sauce
- Ground black pepper, to taste
- Four 4-ounce salmon fillets
- 1 scallion, thinly sliced

In a large saute pan over high, heat 1 tablespoon of the olive oil. Add the mushrooms and saute until well-browned, about 8 to 10 minutes. Lower the heat to medium-high; then add the shallots and onion. Saute for 6 to 8 minutes, or until the onion becomes soft. Add the potatoes and continue to cook until the potatoes are tender and beginning to brown. Season with the soy sauce and black pepper.

In another large saute pan over medium-high, heat the remaining tablespoon of olive oil. Cook the salmon fillets for 4 to 5 minutes per side, or to desired doneness. Serve each piece of salmon with the shiitake hash. Top everything with a sprinkling of scallions.

Guy Fieri: Chop salad in kitchen, not at table

A salad should be chopped in the kitchen, not at the table.

That's the advice of Food Network star Guy Fieri, who prefers salads made from bite-size pieces. "A good salad shouldn't require a knife," he said via email.

However, it does require a salad spinner or some other means of drying the greens. One of Fieri's salad turnoffs is wet lettuce. "It needs to be rinsed and dried," he said.


Salads have made an impression on Fieri since he was a child.

"I distinctly remember taco salad night in my family," he said. "When my parents made taco salad, I thought it was the greatest thing. We didn't eat a lot of meat growing


up, but when we ate this, I had a field day with the fixings — kidney beans, olives, green onions. I love to crumble up tortilla chips and toss it on top. My kids love taco salad night now. I continued the tradition."

For an AP salad series, Fieri offered an intense salad of grilled romaine lettuce topped with bacon, onions, blue cheese and a tangy vinaigrette made with the bacon drippings.

"The idea behind it is to bring out the natural flavors of the romaine by warming it up, rather than serving it cold like other salads," he said. "The sweet flavor of the romaine comes out when you char it on the grill. Hit it with the balsamic vinaigrette, bacon, onion and blue cheese, and you have a nice balance of sweet and savory flavors."

GRILLED ROMAINE WITH BLUE CHEESE-BACON VINAIGRETTE

Guy Fieri ignores his own no-knife-needed advice for salads with this grilled romaine offering. But it's worth the extra trouble. The grilling imparts a deliciously smoky (and, for salads, unusual) flavor. The inclusion of the bacon fat in the vinaigrette doesn't hurt, either.

Start to finish: 15 minutes

Servings: 6

- 4 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, divided
- 3/4 cup finely diced red onion
- 1/2 pound bacon, diced into 1/4-inch pieces
- 1/2 cup balsamic vinegar
- 3 romaine lettuce heads, halved lengthwise, cores removed and leafy ends trimmed
- Salt and cracked black pepper

1/2 cup crumbled blue cheese

Heat a grill or indoor grill pan to high.

In a large skillet over high, heat 1 tablespoon of the olive oil. Add the onion and bacon and cook until the bacon is crispy, about

10 minutes. Use a slotted spoon to transfer the onion and bacon to a plate. Return the skillet to the heat and add the balsamic vinegar and 1 tablespoon of the olive oil. Bring to a simmer; then cook to reduce for 2 to 3 minutes. Remove from the heat and set aside.

Brush the romaine with the remaining 2 tablespoons of olive oil; then season with salt and pepper. Place on the grill cut side down and quickly sear until grill marks are visible. Set aside.

For each serving, place half a head of romaine cut side up on a plate and drizzle the balsamic dressing. Sprinkle with blue cheese and the bacon and onion mixture; then season with black pepper.

BUTTERY ROASTED TOMATO BRUSCHETTA

Start to finish: 25 minutes

Servings: 2

- 4 plum tomatoes
- Olive oil
- Kosher salt and ground black pepper
- 2 large slices sourdough bread
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh rosemary
- 3 tablespoons butter, cut into very small pieces

Heat the oven to 500 F. Cut each tomato in half, top to bottom; then trim out the tough stem area at the top of each half. Use your fingers to scoop out and discard the pulpy-watery center of each half; then place the tomatoes in a medium bowl. Drizzle the tomatoes with about 2 tablespoons of oil; then toss to coat.

Arrange the tomatoes on a baking sheet; then season liberally

with salt and pepper. Roast for 15 minutes, or until starting to brown.

Meanwhile, drizzle the bread with a bit of olive oil; then sprinkle half of the rosemary over each. During the final 5 minutes the tomatoes are roasting, add the bread to the oven to toast.

Remove the bread and tomatoes from the oven. Use a spoon to immediately arrange 4 tomato halves over each slice of bread. Sprinkle half of the butter pieces over each; then return the bruschetta to the oven for 1 minute, or until the butter just melts.

- Pinch cayenne
- Pinch kosher salt
- 1/2 cup grated manchego cheese

Heat the oven to 450 F. Slice the banana in half crosswise; then slice each piece in half lengthwise to create a total of 4 pieces. Place the banana slices in a small bowl; then drizzle with the

lime juice and olive oil. Gently toss the bananas to coat; then set aside.

Top each slice of bread with half of the arugula; then set 2 banana slices over each. Sprinkle each with a bit of cayenne and salt, then half of the cheese. Toast for 4 to 5 minutes, or until the cheese is melted and starting to brown. Serve immediately.

Bang for your backyard

Outdoor designer Chris Fenmore has survived the bad economy so far by staying nimble. Fenmore, the brains behind Garden Studio Design in Corona del Mar, Calif., has re-imagined ways to spruce up the landscape at a fraction of what it would have cost five years ago.

Where her design team was once installing landscapes that cost six figures or more, they are now creating backyards with style for as little as \$25,000.

With just as much creativity but fewer pricey materials, Fenmore upgraded the landscape of this Newport Beach, Calif., home. The additions included an outdoor water feature with seat wall, a fire pit area floored in gravel and a dining pavilion with simple slabs.

"Think of the square feet of living space you have outdoors," Fenmore said. "It makes sense to use that space to expand your living area. And it is much cheaper than adding on."

The focal point of this new design is the fountain, because it can be seen through

the house from the front door. The house sits on a small lot, and there wasn't much room to work with — just 15 feet to the fence line. Fenmore used the family's existing outdoor furniture and divided the yard into additional rooms.

The living area sits in front of the large water feature, the dining area was moved to one side to create another "room," and across the lawn sits a new fire pit paved in gravel.

"The entire backside of the house opens up to the yard," Fenmore said. "So we went all-out on the fountain and simple on other elements." Fenmore said many homeowners are shifting, too. At first they wanted "it all" for less money. Now they ask the right question — "What is the biggest bang for our buck?"

For this homeowner, it was the view and ambience provided by the stone fountain.

"We are doing a lot of face-lift-like landscapes now," Fenmore said. "New lighting, a water feature or new irrigation are very popular." Fenmore said homeowners don't want the over-the-top gardens anymore, but rather landscapes that are ready for weekend living.
