Counties receive \$10M for development

TEAM Santa Rosa, the county's economic development council, invited Dr. Rick Harper from the University of West Florida to speak at Monday's county commission meeting on behalf of the college and the

state on how the college's office of economic development and engagement plans to use the \$10 million it was given from the state to fund economic development projects.

The money, which is not from British Petroleum, is part of the state's general revenue to help the eight

Florida counties that were affected by the oil spill, which spans from Escambia to Wakulla County.

The legislature specifies that the \$10 million must be used to implement economic development, must be used to help create jobs and bring secure companies across the

eight counties.

Currently, UWF is negotiating what to do with the money, and Harper said his office should have a plan on how the funds will be dispersed by the beginning of October.

"The legislative intent for the funding was that it would be used as a closing

fund to help close out projects," Harper said.

That includes projects that have incentives which help attract corporations to the county.

"The incentives are to help push projects over the finish line," Harper said.

The money would most likely be used to bring in high

paying jobs to the area according to Harper who has worked closely with TEAM Santa Rosa since they received word that the school's economic development office would be charged with receiving and distributing the money. The

Jay High nears completion



Soon, the cracks that line the walls of Jay High School will be a memory for students and staff as construction crews work to meet delayed construction deadlines that will run into October of this year instead of the proposed August deadline that was presented to school board members in 2010.

Crews with Jack Moore Construction of Pensacola are working to complete part one of the \$6.1 million project that broke ground in March 2010.

"We had a lot of delays in the construction process of Jay High School," said Assistant Superintendent for Administrative Services for the Santa Rosa County School District Joey Harrell. "Our first delay was we found a lot of hidden gas lines. That took a month to take care of."

On top of that, Harrell said minor setbacks, such as rain, have pushed the completion deadline of phase one of back to Oct. 7. Harrell said he put in change orders for the high school two weeks ago and will present these change orders to board members at tomorrow's school board meeting.



Phase one mostly includes classrooms and administrative offices and will be roughly 73,000 square feet. Phase two, which will start once students and faculty are moved into the new phase one buildings, will replace the old Jay High School once it is demolished. "Phase two calls for the removal of the old building, then to build the new band room, kitchen, cafeteria and additional

Cars burglarized during funeral

Mourners in Milton returned from a graveside service in Milton's Serenity Gardens to find their cars had been burglarized.

According to Sgt. Scott Haines with the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office, the burglaries occurred between 10:40 and 11:30 a.m. Aug. 6 during a graveside service the victims were attending about 50 yards away.

Items taken, according to the reports, included purses, cash, cell phones, identification cards, credit cards and other miscellaneous items.

Haines indicated the total value of the items taken was about \$3,400.

Three of the vehicles burglarized were left unlocked, while a fourth vehicle had a side window broken out.

According to Haines, a fifth car was damaged by the suspects, who appeared to have attempted to break out two side of the car's windows, but were unsuccessful.

Damages to the fifth vehicle were estimated at \$1,000.

One of the victims contacted the Santa Rosa Sheriff's Office to inform them their credit card had been used at the Shell Station on Dogwood Drive around 12:30 p.m., which was after the reported thefts occurred.

Haines indicated that no suspects are known at this time.

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County awarded federal funds under Emergency Food and Shelter National Board Program

Santa Rosa County has been chosen to receive \$17,155.00 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the area.

The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)

and consists of representatives from The Salvation Army; American Red Cross; Council of Jewish Federations; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.; and, The United Way of America which will provide the administrative staff and functions as fiscal agent. The Board was charged to distribute funds

appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country.

A Local Board made up of The United Way of Santa Rosa County; Santa Rosa County; The City of Milton; The American Red Cross; The Salvation Army; Local Ministerial Association; Catholic Charities of NW Florida; The NW Florida Area Agency on Aging, Inc.; Santa Rosa County Emergency Management; and a homeless/formerly homeless or past recipient of services will determine how the funds awarded to Santa Rosa County are to be distributed among the

emergency food and shelter programs run by local service organizations in the area. The Local Board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profit or units of government, 2) have an accounting system, 3) practice nondiscrimination, 4) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs, and 5) if they are a

private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying organizations are urged to apply. Deadline to apply is 4:00 p.m. on FRIDAY, AUGUST 19, 2011. Any application postmarked by this date will be considered.

Santa Rosa County has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds previously to Tri-County Community Council and South Santa Rosa Interfaith Ministries, Inc. These agencies were responsible for providing emergency shelter assistance to 241 people and utility assistance to 287 people who had no other resources with which to meet their own needs.

Applications postmarked by this date will be considered. Any organization submitting an application will be informed of the date that the Local Board will meet.

Deadline Aug. 31 for Fla. Bar certification area

Florida Bar members interested in board certification must have applications postmarked by Aug. 31 for 12 of Florida's 24 legal specialization areas. Applications are available at FloridaBar.org/certification and are due Aug. 31 for the following specialties: Admiralty and Maritime Law, Adoption Law, Appellate Practice, Aviation Law, Civil Trial, Education Law, Elder Law, Immigration and Nationality, International Law, Labor and Employment Law, Marital and Family Law and Tax Law.

Certified attorneys are the only Florida lawyers allowed to identify themselves as "specialists" or "experts" or to use the letters "B.C.S." to indicate Board Certified Specialist.

"Florida Bar board certification is synonymous with the terms 'specialist' and 'expert' because of its very high standards for professional excellence," said Florida Bar President Scott G. Hawkins, who is board-certified in business litigation. "The Florida Bar's board certification program is one of the finest in the country and helps the public identify lawyers

who have been evaluated by their peers for experience, competence and integrity."

Certification is the highest level of evaluation by The Florida Bar of the competency and experience of attorneys in areas of law approved for certification by the Supreme Court of Florida. Certified lawyers are legal experts dedicated to professional excellence, and attorneys who become board-certified are evaluated as to their character, ethics and reputation for professionalism in the practice of law.

The Florida Bar's board certification program offers 24 specialty areas of practice for which board certification is available — the largest number of state-approved certification areas in the nation. Only about 4,460 of Florida's 91,000 lawyers are board-certified.

Lawyers who are members in good standing of The Florida Bar and meet the standards prescribed by the state's Supreme Court may become board-certified in one or more of the 24 certification fields. Minimum requirements for certification are listed below; each area may contain higher or additional standards.

• A minimum of five

years in law practice.

• A satisfactory showing of substantial involvement in the field of law for which certification is sought.

• A passing grade on the examination required of all applicants.

• Satisfactory peer review assessment of competence in the specialty field as well as character, ethics and professionalism in the practice of law.

• Satisfaction of the certification area's continuing legal education requirements.

Board certification is valid for five years, during which time the attorney must continue to practice law and attend Florida Bar-approved continuing legal education courses. Recertification requirements are similar to those for initial certification. Not all qualified lawyers are certified, but those who are board-certified have taken the extra step to have their competence and experience evaluated.

Applications for additional certification areas are due Oct. 31. Board-certification applications, requirements and staff contact information are available at FloridaBar.org/certification.

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
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'A Beautiful Life' auditions under way

Auditions were held Saturday for "A Beautiful Life," a Moonshine Creek Production play that will once again prove that history runs deep in Santa Rosa County.

The play, written by Shay Morran, a longtime Santa Rosan, will kick off where last year's sold-out show, "Johnson Family Reunion," left off.

Director Stacie Toups, who is working side by side with the Santa Rosa Arts and Culture Foundation, which helps put on Riverwalk and a Get a Taste for Art, put her decision skills to the test when she graded auditions for the play, which will be performed at Milton High School's auditorium in October.

"This play is really going to appeal to a lot of locals in the area," Toups said.

That's because the play tells the story of how Santa Rosa County came to be what it is today, and will surround viewers in the history of Santa Rosa County that they might not even know about.

"The play will talk about Floridatown, Bagdad, and we'll have some songs in there to entertain crowds," Toups said.

The play will not only tell the story of Santa Rosa County but allow local talent to showcase their acting skills.

Santa Rosa Arts and Culture Foundation Chairman Richard Baldwin, a longtime Santa Rosa County historian, said the play took excerpts from a short story contest held earlier this year. Area high school students and others submitted short stories based on the history of the county to the Santa Rosa County Arts and Culture Foundation. One of those people was Baldwin, who helped Toups with Saturday's auditions.

"A lot of people don't know that Whiting Field used to be a POW camp for German prisoners," Baldwin said. "And Chumuckla used to bottle its own water and sell it to local outlets years ago."

And that is just a taste of some of the stories that will be incorporated into the play.

McCombs earns Florida Housing Hall of Fame selection

Electrical contractor Jack McCombs has been elected to the Florida Housing Hall of Fame and will be inducted Oct. 22 during the Florida Home Builders Association's annual Fall Conference in Tampa.

The announcement came from Robert Harper, chairman of the Hall of Fame Board of Governors, at last week's FHBA Board of Directors meeting in Orlando.

Since 1990, the hall has recognized 56 people who have made significant and lasting contributions to the Florida home building industry and FHBA.

McCombs, of McCombs Electric Company in Milton, made history in 1985 as the first associate member from Florida to vote on the Board of Directors of the National Association of Home Builders (NAHB). He served as 1981 FHBA second vice president and has always believed that the homebuilding industry is one of

the best industries in the nation.

Knowing the importance of supporting his industry, he became active with the Home Builders Association of West Florida (HBA) in the early 1960s.

McCombs was also active with NAHB. He was one of the first associate national directors and is a member of the prestigious NAHB Hall of Honored Associates, which recognizes outstanding associates in the U.S.

He was named HBA Associate of the Year in 1977 and FHBA Associate of the Year in 1985, and still has a burning desire to help the housing industry, and that desire has instilled a sense of lasting volunteerism to many.

McCombs served on the governor-appointed committee that developed Florida's first energy code for residential and commercial construction. His service to his industry, association and community spans 48 years.

Architectural firm moving quickly on community center plans

Quina Grundhoefer Architects are moving quickly to help close out the proposed Pace Community Center design in hopes to have the new establishment built by voting season next year.

The new community center that will be structurally similar to the Bagdad Community Center will be off of Chumuckla Highway. The center is proposed to have a multipurpose room, kitchen and bathrooms, as well as a paved parking lot.

Quina Grundhoefer Architects spokesmen told commissioners at Monday's county commission meeting that they planned to build a slightly bigger kitchen compared to Bagdad Community Center's and would build a covered walkway similar to Bagdad's.

The building footprint would be 50 by 80 feet, and the property would allow for a 28-space parking lot. The property the community center will be built on will allow space for a future gymnasium.

The proposed 4,000-

square-foot building is estimated to cost \$500,000 to build. Furnishings, the parking lot and contingency money will bring the estimated grand total to \$658,000.

Originally, the county estimated the project would cost \$350,000 to \$400,000.

Resident Jerry Foster, who spoke at Monday's commission meeting, said he was concerned that the 28 parking spaces would not be adequate considering the facility could hold 200 patrons.

Commissioner Don Salter, who has overseen the project and the property, said there is additional overflow parking past the proposed parking lot. If a gymnasium were to be built in the future, commissioners said, they would consider extending the paved parking lot.

Part of the cost for the community center would come from District 1 and 3 recreation funds and general funds and would cost the county \$13,000 a year to run. The community center could be rented out. That money would be used to help run power in the build-

ing and support county functions. A price has not been set for rental of the building.

Navarre resident William Lake said he worried the center would become a sports activity center and would not be utilized for art functions and plays, which he said he and many others support.

"We are a diversified community, not a jock spot," Lake said at Monday's commission meeting.

Lake suggested the county propose higher ceilings in the community center to allow for rental companies to bring in stages so art shows and plays could rent the space.

Commissioner Lane Lynchard said the building would be run by the county parks department and not by an athletic department, and that the architectural company originally suggested higher ceilings to allow for indoor stages.

Quina Grundhoefer Architects said they hope to get the design finalized by the end of the summer and have bids out to companies by December. Construction would start in January.



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Fort Walton Temple Mound subject of presentation

The Fort Walton Temple Mound will be the Lore, Legends and Learning subject Aug. 30 at 5:30 p.m. at the Navarre Library.

The mound was built as a ceremonial and political center by the Mound Builder Culture. At 12 feet tall and 223 feet wide, it is the largest on saltwater and possibly the largest prehistoric earthwork on the Gulf Coast. An estimated 200,000 basket loads of earth were used to create this earthen structure.

The mound was probably begun around

AD 700 and completed sometime between AD 1500 and AD 1650 — the late Mississippian Time Period in the Panhandle of Florida. The high point of its use was around the late 1400s.

The program is part of the free Lore, Legends and Learning series at the library, sponsored by the Friends of the Navarre Library. The program is held the last Tuesday of each month from January through October, presenting a variety of topics to the public. Reservations are not required.

We thought:


This land is your land, this land is my land.

Santa Rosa school taxes are increasing

The school taxes in Santa Rosa County have increased each year from 2007 to 2010 and are proposed to increase again in 2011. The overall increase in school taxes is projected to be 11.1 percent during this period. If the School District does not seek other sources of revenue in future years, school taxes will continue to increase as they have in the past but at a much higher rate. There are two reasons for the projected increase in the growth rate of school taxes. First, we will eventually emerge from the current real estate recession and then begin another real estate boom. For example, in 2004 before the real estate recession began, single family home building permits were 1,969 as compared to only 448 permits in 2009. If the County goes back to the 2004 level of building permits, in the future our schools will hemorrhage from the increase in students. Second, a recent military BRAC report estimated that beginning in 2012 over 11,000 military personnel are expected to be moving into the Eglin AFB complex which will require additional single family housing in the three-county area (Okaloosa, Walton and Santa Rosa).

Given the predicted increase in students caused by growth, as stated above, our School District will be overwhelmed by the need for additional classrooms. The School District will not be able to satisfy the demand for new classrooms using temporary buildings as they have in the past and will have to build some new schools. In the past ten years the School district has built some schools using debt, which is the primary

reason the new school budget shows \$4.7 million in interest on its loans. I am certain that not many County residents want increased school taxes and increased debt passed on to their children.

Several years ago at a School District budget meeting I recommended school impact fees as a partial solution to the shortfall in classrooms and funds for building new schools. The School Superintendent at the time was not interested in impact fees and said that our County could not legally qualify for school impact fees. Unfortunately, the School Board agreed with him, and the Board Chair volunteered that temporary buildings make excellent classrooms. The truth is, according to Florida law, all the counties in the state are qualified for school impact fees. Currently, 31 counties in Florida have school impact fees and the average county school impact fee is \$5,286 for a 2,000 square foot home. If 1,600 new houses are built in our County each year in the future, the total impact fees from these new houses would be \$8,457,600 per year. Now why would the School Board and School Superintendent not jump at the chance to increase revenues? I suggest that every resident ask the board members coming up for reelection this question and if they don't agree to work for obtaining school impact fees, then do not vote for them!

There is a plethora of information on this topic. Many books have been written, movies made and websites created dedicated solely to this subject. Some of these are quite sensational and have to be approached very cautiously.

Here is a brief understanding of the Dead Sea scrolls. They were the libraries of a previously unknown first-century Jewish sect. They were kept in caves near the community of Qumran for safe-keeping because of the advancing Roman troops in about AD 70.

Eventually, the Qumran community was completely destroyed, no one ever returned, and the scrolls were forgotten until they were discovered by accident in 1948 by a Bedouin shepherd. They contain the text of most of the Old Testament and the rules and regulations of the community at Qumran.

The Old Testament text from Qumran is 900 years older than any previous copy of the Old Testament, and it is virtually 100% identical. This vindicates the textual integrity of the Old Testament for an additional 1,000 years and probably farther than that.

Recently, experts have made discoveries among the documents from Qumran that may be fragments of canonical Christian gospels, which, if verified, could push back the dating of the New Testament to the first decades after the Crucifixion. This would be a huge asset in determining the authenticity, authority and reliability of the New Testament documents. Although, the New Testament documents are still considered, to this day, to be THE MOST reliable of all ancient documents known to man.

Thank you for your question. I hope this helps and I pray that the Bible is a daily part of your walk with the Lord Jesus.

state agreed to supply \$10 million a year for the next three years. These oil spill funds will supplement, not replace, existing BP funds, according to Harper.

Commissioner Bob Cole stated he was concerned about what would happen to the money that is not used at the end of each year.

"Any funds not used will be given back to the state of Florida," Harper said.


The money would not be used for infrastructure improvements, according to commission chairman Lane Lynchard, who said that now that the county has the money in the forefront, it would be up to TEAM and other agencies to bring companies

into the county. "This requires us to get out and beat the bushes and get companies into the county," Lynchard said.

Commissioner Don Salter said that projects such as the Whiting Aviation Park and any vacant land in the East Milton Santa Rosa County Industrial Park could be free incentive to get companies to move into the county.

"You have to have product to sell to get business to come here," Harper said.

Harper gave a deadline of Oct. 1 for when he would start dispersing checks to proper entities. It would now be up to the county and to TEAM Santa Rosa to help attract companies to the area.

classrooms," Harrell said. Back in 2010, Harrell said that the high school was falling apart, and could potentially be deemed unsafe for students.

School board members approved the low bidder Jack Moore Construction in March of last year to work on improvements on the high school, which houses about 500 students.

Once students are securely moved into the new building, the school board will start taking bids on the second phase of the project.

"We have not started taking bids on that part of the project yet," Harrell said. "Before we even do that, we have to make

sure everything is good on the current project."

After doing a strenuous walk through and inspection, Harrell said it could take more than a few days to move a majority of the new furniture into the phase one building. All of the old furniture in the current Jay High School will not be used in the new high school.

"What is going to take them the longest is getting the furniture into the new building and setting up the computers," Harrell said. Right now, Harrell said he does not have a timeline when the district will be able to start moving into the phase one building.

The school district originally looked at

rebuilding the high school years before bringing it to the table in 2010. But at that time, construction equipment was too high for the district to consider taking bids.

Jack Moore Construction outbid the second lowest bidder by \$750,000 back in 2010.

Originally, the school board estimated it would cost roughly \$10 million to do the project when the cost to build per square foot was \$150 and up.

Jack Moore's bid was roughly 2/3 of that last year.

Before construction started in 2010, Harrell estimated Jay High School had not seen renovations done to its foundation for roughly 15 to 20 years.

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Finnegan defends training camp no-show

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Titans cornerback Cortland Finnegan is defending himself on Twitter, saying he left training camp to deal with a personal matter and isn't upset with his contract.

Finnegan wrote Sunday that he has spoken to coaches and teammates and will resume "all things asked." He said his personal issue needed attention, and he will be back playing Monday, when he will answer all questions.

"My absence had nothing to do with a holdout yet a personal matter that Titan officials were aware of. I am grateful for being a Titan," Finnegan wrote in one post. "I am also thankful for my current contract and direction of team."

The Titans first noticed Finnegan had left camp when he didn't attend a special teams practice Saturday morning, and general manager Mike Reinfeldt said after practice Saturday afternoon that the team had tried unsuccessfully to reach Finnegan. Reinfeldt said they were surprised

he had left camp.

But Finnegan wrote the Titans knew of his absence and were disappointed he wasn't there.

"Being absence from a team function doesn't mean holdout or your unhappy Family issues

come up I'm human thank you Nashville for understanding," Finnegan wrote.

The Titans did not immediately respond Sunday to Finnegan's statements.

Finnegan's agent, Terry Wat-

son, did not respond to a telephone message left at his.

The Titans had just received a counteroffer from Watson on Friday, and Reinfeldt said they promised a response Monday. Finnegan is in the last year of his contract and due to earn more than \$3.7 million this season.

"We've tried to call him," Reinfeldt said Saturday after a team practice at LP Field. "We've not been able to get in touch with him. It's a tough situation. We have 23 guys in the last year of their contract. I talked to Cortland during the week. Coach (Mike) Munchak did. ... We were totally surprised that he just turned around and left camp."

Running back Chris Johnson has yet to report for training camp, holding out for a new contract as well. But Johnson has led the NFL in yards rushing since he was drafted No. 24 overall in 2008, and he is scheduled to make \$850,000 this season.

Reinfeldt said they had told Finnegan's agent they would re-

view the counteroffer over the weekend and respond Monday.

Reinfeldt said the Titans have extended the contracts of several young players, including Finnegan in August 2008. Finnegan became a starter in 2007 and is due to make more than \$3.7 million in the final year of that deal.

"That's something we thought we could work out an extension both sides would be OK with. It kind of caught us off guard," Reinfeldt said.

The cornerback was a seventh-round draft pick in 2006 out of Samford who became a starter by his second season and has started every game he has played in since the start of 2007. He was an All Pro and Pro Bowler in 2008.

He has 13 career interceptions but only had two in 2010 when the Titans went 6-10. Finnegan's biggest highlight last season might have been when Houston receiver Andre Johnson swung away at him Nov. 28, drawing both players \$25,000 fines.

Former Pace stand-out Erica Wright joins the UWF squad for her final year of college eligibility after spending four seasons (including a redshirt year) with Spring Hill College in Mobile, Ala.

Wright showed the best form of her collegiate career in 2010-11, starting 17 games for the Badgers less than a year after going down with an injury.

Wright averaged 8.7 points per game last season and knocked down 26 three-point field goals.

Joining the Argonaut roster from the University of Maine is forward Jaymie Druding. A sophomore from Orchard Park, N.Y., Druding spent her rookie season in the NCAA Division I ranks, where she featured 19 times for the Black Bears. Druding averaged 2.5 points per game in her first collegiate season, which was highlighted by a 14-minute assignment against Kansas and a seven-point effort against Penn at the famed Palestra in Philadelphia.


Perhaps they relate tales of woe, perhaps tales of foolishness, but all haunt the same area where they once walked in happier days past.

A classic news reporter wanders down along the Blackwater River before the start the 2010 Ghost Walk tour in downtown Milton.



Builders cite rise in 'mother-in-law suites'

Betsy McCann and her husband, Jim Forbes, often worried that his mother was growing isolated in her Los Angeles-area home. At 90, Lois Brokus had stopped driving and was sometimes afraid to be alone in her house.

Jane and William Merrill also decided that they didn't want his mother living on her own anymore. Then 81, Jane Merrill, who shares her daughter-in-law's name, was still active but in need of companionship.

Both families considered nursing homes, assisted living and retirement communities. In the end, they came to the same conclusion: Their homes were the best place for their mothers. But they needed more home.

So McCann and Forbes added a 400-square-foot bedroom and bathroom to their Escondido, Calif., home; the Merrills converted a two-car garage at their 8-acre spread in Carmel, a suburb of Indianapolis.

Now, both older women live with their adult children, with a large degree of independence and privacy.

Although it isn't for everyone, it is a choice many families are making. Homebuilders across the country say they are getting an increasing number of requests for such additions, known as mother-in-law suites, granny flats or accessory dwellings.

According to the National Association of Home Builders, 62 percent of builders surveyed were working on a home modification related to aging in 2010. About one in five builders added an entry-level bedroom.

About 3.5 million American households last year included adult children and their parents — a number expected to rise as the country ages and baby boomers move into retirement, said Nancy Thompson, an AARP spokesperson.

To accommodate the growing demand, AARP teamed up with the homebuilders' association to create a designation for Certified Aging in Place Specialists, who are trained in designing and modifying buildings for the elderly. About 3,000 builders, contractors, remodelers and architects have been certified.

One is Todd Jackson, CEO of San Diego's Jackson Design and Remodeling, which handled the room addition at McCann's home.

"There's both a physical component and a sensitivity side to these projects. The family needs to take that into account," said Jackson, who noted that aging parents might be reluctant to move into their children's homes and might worry about losing their independence.

"The transition will go over a lot better if you bring the parent into the conversation," Jackson said. "Ask them: 'What do you need?' 'What color do you want?'"

That's what McCann and her husband did when they decided to build

an addition in 2008. Brokus, now 93, was part of the planning.

"We didn't want her to feel like a guest intruding on our house," McCann said. "She kept telling all her friends about how she was involved in the design process and that the paint colors were her choice."

Brokus now proudly calls the addition, which includes a bedroom, wet bar and wheelchair-accessible doorways and bathroom, "her apartment," McCann said. Every month, she writes a rent check covering the cost of utilities — an act that adds to her sense of independence.

The arrangement has given the family more time together and greater peace of mind, and may have averted a tragedy in July when Brokus had a heart attack. Had she been alone, McCann said, she might not have called 911. As it was, she just had to walk a few feet for help.

The addition, which was part of a

major renovation to other parts of the house, cost the McCanns \$250,000. The average price for a bedroom addition can run from \$100,000 to \$400,000, depending on size and amenities, according to builders.

For the Merrills, who used a company called Next Door Garage Apartments to do their garage conversion, the cost was much lower.

The Indianapolis-based company remodels two-car garages into complete apartments within 10 days for \$35,000. (The Merrills, who converted their garage 11 years ago, paid \$25,000).

The company's owner, Susan Jennings, came up with the idea when she was managing a trust department at a bank and often worked with widows yearning to live with their adult children.

Jennings worked with a designer to come up with a dwelling attractive to both the adult children and the older parent. For privacy and independence,

the apartment has a separate entrance, full kitchen and wheelchair-accessible features.

"The biggest advantage is that my husband can sit down with her every evening. Because of that constant contact, he has learned much more about his parents and their lives," the younger Jane Merrill said. "He would not have had that if she was in assisted living."

However, both Betsy McCann and Jane Merrill caution that this might not work for every family. For one thing, their mothers-in-law are self-sufficient and do not need daily medical care. In both families, they got along well before moving in together.

"If you can't stand one week or one weekend together, this won't work," McCann said. "You need to have realistic expectations about the impact on your life."

Thompson, of AARP, offered other tips for families considering building a mother-in-law suite for an aging parent:

- Decide what your expectations are well in advance, and make sure everyone agrees. Involve the elderly parent in the process.

- Make sure the addition is built following universal design guidelines. Are counters, bathrooms and doorways wheelchair-accessible? Is there a walk-in shower with grab bars? Opt for entry-level additions to eliminate stairs. Look for a contractor or builder with experience in universal design or aging in place.

- Check municipal building codes to make sure accessory dwellings are allowed.

Numbers down, but possum fest still a hit

"This is like a big, Wausau family reunion," said Wausau Possum Festival and Fun Day General Chairman Jim Tharp as he opened the 42nd annual version of the event a national woman's magazine called "a truly unique community event."

But a combination of soaring heat index and sagging economy conspired to reduce the normal crowds for the 42nd annual Wausau Possum Festival and Fun Day Saturday. Still, the event was filled with laughter, food, music and the signature possum auction.

"It was a good day," Tharp said. "It was a good day for an off year."

By "off year," Tharp meant that the largest and most financially successful festival years are even-numbered, when the small Panhandle town is a Mecca for political office seekers from across Florida and the country.

And even this year, the Possum Festival lived up to a national reputation as one of the most unique local

celebrations, all because it honors all things possum.

Vendors at the arts and crafts show offered everything from possum ice cream to "possum breath" scented

candles and said business during the day was satisfactory if far from brisk.

Attendance at major events of the festival, such as its parade, the possum auction

and Friday's crowning of the Possum King and Queen, was consistently around 300.

The biggest excitement of the day was generated around the possum auction, where a bidding war was rumored between the two candidates for state attorney who were in attendance. However, the men did not participate, so the top possum went to Washington County School Superintendent Dr. Sandra Cook for \$250.

Proceeds from the day's fundraising typically go to the Wausau Volunteer Fire Department, and this year was no exception. But special contributions were being sought by the Wausau Garden Club as well to have the portion of State Road 77 through downtown designated a Blue Star Memorial Highway in honor of the town's military veterans. A plaque is planned for placement at the Possum Monument in downtown Wausau; however, the club has only a few days to raise a remaining estimated \$2,500 to achieve the designation so the memorial can be placed during a planned Veteran's Day celebration.

OPOSSUMS 101

- North America is home to millions of Virginia opossums.

- Americans sometimes use the terms opossum and possum interchangeably. But Virginia opossums are native to North America, and possums are native to Australia.

- Possums are nocturnal marsupials.

- The opossum's relatives include other marsupials from Down Under — kangaroos, koalas and wombats. But because opossums look like rats, they don't share the other mammals' popularity.

- Adult possums don't hang by their tails, Bale said. Their tails can't support their weight.

- Poor eyesight is why so many are hit by cars. "They can only see 6 to 8 inches in front of them," said Barbara "Missy" Runyan, a wildlife rehabilitator who runs Friends of the Feathered and Furry Wildlife Center in Hunter, N.Y. "They can't smell a car coming. And since they are nocturnal, they cross the road when it's dark."

- They can make hissing, sneezing or growling sounds, sometimes described as a purr. They aren't likely to dig holes in your yard because they have delicate paws with nails that can be easily ripped out, Bale said.

- Despite 50 razor-sharp teeth, opossums are generally docile and prefer to avoid confrontation.

- They can bite, but they prefer playing possum. If confronted, they fall over, start drooling, emit a musky odor that smells like decay, induce diarrhea and slow their breathing so it appears to have stopped.

- They eat cockroaches, crickets and beetles, snakes, slugs, mice, rats, rotting fruit, human garbage, dead animals and small reptiles. They like dog and cat food, too.

- Baby opossums start out the size of raisins. A mother can have one to three litters a year. A grown female will weigh between 7 and 9 pounds and a male up to 12 pounds.

- They are solitary, transient creatures, seldom staying in one place more than a few days. Babies stay with the mother for 4½ to 5 months. If they fall off while riding on her back or get left behind when the mother takes off, they are on their own because the mother won't come back, said Leslie Bale, a wildlife rehabilitator and president of the Opossum Society of the United States, which has about 300 members.

- Rabies in opossums is rare because their body temperature is too low to support the virus.

- They are good climbers, using their tail for balance, but they can fall into swimming pools when trying to get a drink and into trash cans when going after food.

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

CHICAGO (AP) — Playing sports in hot, steamy weather is safe for healthy children and teen athletes, so long as precautions are taken and the drive to win doesn't trump common sense, the nation's largest pediatricians group says.

New guidelines from the American Academy of Pediatrics arrive just as school sports ramp up in sultry August temperatures. The advice, released Monday, comes a week after two Georgia high school football players died following practices in 90-plus degree heat. Authorities were investigating if the weather contributed.

The guidelines replace a more restrictive policy based on old thinking that kids were more vulnerable to heat stress than adults. New research shows that's not true, the academy says. With adequate training, water intake, time-outs and emergency treatment available on the sidelines, healthy young athletes can play even in high heat and humidity — within reason, the guidelines say.

"The more educated parents, athletes and staff are about risks associated with heat illness, the more likely they will think twice before allowing a competitive culture to overtake sound sensibilities," said Dr. Cynthia Devore, co-author of the policy and a physician for schools in the Rochester, NY area.

Government data released last week showed that more than 3,000 U.S. children and teens younger than 20 received emergency-room treatment for nonfatal heat illness from sports or exercise between 2001 and 2009.

A few young athletes die annually from heat-related illness. Over a 13-year period, 29 high school football players died from heat stroke, data from the American Football Coaches Association and others show. Football is a special concern, because players often begin intense practice during late-summer heat, wearing uniforms and padding that can be stifling.

Dr. Michael Bergeron, a University of South Dakota

sports medicine specialist, said the academy's old policy was often ignored because it recommended limiting or avoiding sports even in common hot weather conditions. The new policy is more detailed and nuanced, recommending that athletes be evaluated individually for play in hot weather.

Still, Bergeron warned that overzealousness can be dangerous even for healthy kids, and even in relatively tame summer weather.

"You can take somebody in 80-degree heat and you can kill them if you work them hard enough," he said.

The guidelines don't list temperature or humidity cutoffs, but say safety should be the top priority.

Other academy advice includes:

- Teams should have emergency plans with trained personnel and treatment available and policies for avoiding heat illness.
- Give kids about two weeks to adapt to preseason sessions, gradually increasing intensity and duration. Closely monitor more vulnerable kids, including those who are overweight or have diabetes.
- Make sure athletes are well-hydrated before practice or games. During activity, kids aged 9-12 should drink about half a cup to a cup of water every 20 minutes; for teens, 5 or 6 cups an hour. Sports drinks containing electrolytes and sodium should be offered during extra strenuous activity.
- Educate everyone about signs of heat stress, including dizziness, muscle cramps, headaches and nausea. Kids with symptoms should be sidelined and treated immediately; athletes should be encouraged to report if teammates seem to be struggling.



Opossums are common but misunderstood

LOS ANGELES (AP) — People have been calling Leslie Bale about opossums since 1982 when she started on the graveyard shift as a 911 dispatcher for the Irvine Police Department.

The calls came from homeowners or security guards who thought they had prowlers. Call after call turned out to be opossums, she said.

Bale still gets calls about opossums, but these days it's as a wildlife rehabilitator and president of the Opossum Society of the United States, which has about 300 members.

North America is home to millions of Virginia opossums, but for a creature so commonly found in backyards and along roadways, this nocturnal marsupial is the subject of many myths and misperceptions.

Colloquially, Americans sometimes use the terms opossum and possum interchangeably. But while Virginia opossums are native to North America, possums are native to Australia.

The opossum's relatives include other marsupials from Down Under — kangaroos, koalas and wombats. But because opossums look like rats, they don't share the other mammals' popularity.

"It's the furless tail that sets people off," said Barbara "Missy" Runyan, a wildlife rehabilitator who runs Friends of the Feathered and Furry Wildlife Center in Hunter, N.Y., and who thinks opossums are "adorable."

But they don't hang by their tails, Bale said. Their tails can't support their weight.

Poor eyesight is why so

many are hit by cars. "The opossum does 90 percent of its searching through scent," said Runyan. "They can only see six to eight inches in front of them. They can't smell a car coming. And since they are nocturnal, they cross the road when it's dark."

They can make hissing, sneezing or growling sounds, sometimes described as a purr. They aren't likely to dig holes in your yard because they have delicate paws with nails that can be easily ripped out, Bale said.

Despite 50 razor-sharp teeth, opossums are generally docile and prefer to avoid confrontation, said Kim Ashby, a wildlife rehabilitator in Raleigh, N.C.

They can bite, but they prefer playing possum. If

confronted, they fall over; start drooling, emit a musky odor that smells like decay, induce diarrhea and slow their breathing so it appears to have stopped, said Ashby, a retired emergency room nurse. "Most predators will walk away because they won't eat anything that has been dead for a while."

They eat cockroaches, crickets and beetles, snakes, slugs, mice, rats, rotting fruit, human garbage, dead animals and small reptiles. Bale calls them "nature's little sanitation engineers."

They like dog and cat food too. "If people are feeding dogs and cats outside, they are probably feeding their local possums as well," Ashby said.

But you can also take

steps to keep them out of your yard. Cover pools and trash cans, remove food and water sources, keep trees and shrubs clear of fences and don't let fruit from trees rot on the ground. A few companies sell repellent granules made of fox urine that you shake on the ground. Manufacturers say the product, \$15 to \$20, is 100 percent organic so it won't hurt your cat or dog.

While dogs and cars are the possum's main predators in cities, foxes, coyotes, bobcats, owls and other animals prey on them in the wild.

Bale works with 10 backyard rehabilitators in Southern California. They get about 1,000 calls a year to help with orphaned opossums.
