TEAM's future still uncertain

On Monday, Dave Hoxeng, Chairman of TEAM Santa Rosa, wanted commissioners to give TEAM an 18-month extension, but the Santa Rosa County Commissioners would not hear of it.

Commissioners did not rule out an extension,

but they were not ready to give them an extension so quickly after Tom Ticknor presented his report to the Board of County Commissioners on TEAM following his weeklong look at the organization.

After Ticknor's presentation, Commissioner Bob Cole, who heads up the Economic Development Committee, made a motion to

move an 18-month extension of TEAM's contract, with an additional \$100,000 for a new director position, to Thursday's agenda.

Commission Chairman Jim Williamson and Commissioner Jim Melvin objected to the motion.

Since Cole's motion did not receive a second, he withdrew the motion, but urged commissioners to set

a time frame on when they would look at making a decision.

"I think we need time to digest the information and I think TEAM needs time to digest this as well," Williamson said. "It is hard to say if the private companies will go or not go and I feel it is in the best interest of everyone if we take some time to look at this and digest what we

have been presented."

This was a sentiment also stressed by Commissioner Jim Melvin, who has been a staunch critic of TEAM Santa Rosa.

"This project has been 20 years in the making and it is better late than never," Melvin said. "I was thinking there needs to be a restructuring of the voting board and I have heard from a lot of con-

stituents and citizens who are not in favor of what we have now."

Hoxeng, who is the owner of Cat County 98.7 and News-Radio 1620 in Pensacola, feels the changes are being made in the right direction and the county needs to step up so TEAM can go forward in doing its job after only

Santa Rosa is watching you

City looking to keep downtown cameras up year-round

This holiday season, Santa Claus won't be the only one keeping an eye out on who's naughty or nice.

The City of Milton is looking to catch criminals in the act this year again as they put back up the Christmas decorations and nearly \$3,000 in camera equipment that they purchased last year to keep masterminds from tampering with the decorations.

The cameras will feed images to a Digital Video Recorder located downtown. If city workers find that any of the lights or decorations have been tampered with, city officials will be able to watch a recorded video of the area to see who did it.



The cameras will be placed on the north and south ends of Willing Street soon, according to Milton City Manager Brian Watkins, and might stay up even after the decorations are taken down at the end of the year. Watkins said he would meet with the city on the decision to leave them up.

Last year, the city voted to install the cameras at a cost not to exceed \$6,000. This time around, Watkins said he wants to keep the cameras up year round to monitor downtown activity.

Watkins said the city purchased four

1 dead in Saturday accident

A Milton man died in a traffic accident Saturday morning at the intersection of State Road 87 and State Road 4 in Jay.

Lifeguard Emergency Management Services pronounced Michael L. Cale, 40, of Milton, dead at the scene of the accident.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol press release, William J. Bray, 47, of Jay was eastbound on State 4 and had stopped for the stop sign at State 87. Cale was traveling northbound on State 87 approaching State 4.

According to the report, Bray failed to see Cale and began to move forward, still traveling east. Bray crossed the southbound lane of State 87 and struck the rear of Cale vehicle

as it entered the northbound lane. Cale's car rotated counterclockwise and overturned.

Cale and two passengers, Dominique Cale, 14, and Ethan Cale, 10, were ejected from the vehicle. They were not wearing seat belts, according to the report.

Dominique Cale and Ethan Cale sustained critical injuries, according to the report.

Marsha Cale, 46, Courtney Cale, 16, and Brandon Nicholson, 10, all sustained serious injuries.

As of Monday, Marsha Cale and Ethan Cale remained at Sacred Heart Hospital and were listed in good condition while Courtney Cale, Dominique Cale and Nicholson were treated and released later Saturday.

According to the Florida Highway Patrol report, charges in relation to the accident are pending.

Man, 68, arrested on sex charges

Jay man charged with lewd and lascivious behavior

A Jay man was arrested and charged Dec. 1 with lewd and lascivious behavior on a victim between the ages of 12 and 18 and sexual assault after an investigation was completed by the Santa Rosa Kids House and the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Department.

According to the report, Gary Bryant, 68, of Jay was charged with the felonies after the victim told a person

about the molestation, who then reported it to deputies.

One of the victims said Bryant would make the victim touch his private parts and that the victim was groped by the suspect when they were in their room watching cartoons.

The report also indicated that Bryant would ask the victim to give him massages and that he would frequently ask for them.

According to the report, Bryant used the code word "massage" to indicate he wanted a sexual favor from the victim.

The report indicated that

these acts occurred over a long period of time, but the most recent occurred Oct. 24.

When interviewed, Bryant denied all of the allegations and said he has not been sexually active since he had a heart at-

tack. Additionally, Bryant was charged with lewd and lascivious behavior conducted by a person 18 years of age or older.

If convicted of the crime, Bryant could face life in prison for lewd and lascivious behavior on a victim between the ages of 12 and 18 and a maximum fine of \$15,000.

It's interesting to listen to our Speak Out line.

There are a couple of people who are the monitors of our volunteer fire departments.

What's so funny about this situation is, no matter how some people put these volunteers down, they remain undaunted.

When the alarm goes off at 4 a.m. for a business structure fire, they're there — even if the address can't be easily found.

During last Thursday's house fire in Tanglewood, fire departments had to use a ferry system to extinguish the fire.

The most basic need for any fire fighting effort — a fire hydrant — was no where near the home.

Truck after truck brought tanks of water to the corner of Kirkland and Wychewood roads to a waiting fire truck at the driveway of the subject home. Water was then pumped from there to the Skyline Fire Department truck at the end of the driveway to help put out the fire.

Could they have saved the home?

We cannot say what they could or could not have done, but by not having the proper equipment the job was certainly made more difficult.

It is very hard to fathom how jaded we have gotten as a society.

We do not want to find ways to put down volunteer fire departments, deputies, sheriffs or even emergency medical service responders.

With some of the calls and comments made recently about these people, it brings to mind a situation.

There was an individual driving down the road headed home. Coming up behind the individual was an ambulance with its siren blazing and horn honking so the driver would pull over and give them room (as Florida law requires).

The driver would not budge and, later, calmly turned into their driveway.

The ambulance turned in behind him. Yes, the ambulance had been dispatched to the driver's house. The driver did not know, but had an initial reaction of: "If I had known, I would have gotten out of the way."

Does this mean the driver's family members are more important than everybody else? He would have given room had he

known HIS relative was ill, but not for anyone else.

Once again, it is the "all about me" club.

When there is a fire at your home, you want help as fast as it can get there.

It wouldn't matter how many trucks or volunteers are involved, but when they respond to someone else's home or business, we are quick to say "look at that waste."

The days of fire departments like Pace's and the fire truck people, jokingly called Mr. Iffy, are long gone.

We cannot say the departments are completely staffed and have everything they need, because there is always something that can do the job a little better.

In reality, that is the case at almost every job and profession.

Would you have been willing to put down your recent Thanksgiving dinner to answer a call?

They do this and take the classes to be trained all out of the goodness of their hearts.

The unpatriotic nature of the Patriot Act

Another Thanksgiving came and went as millions of Americans endured the legacy of government's overreactions to events and were forced to remove their clothing and dignity in order to fly through the TSA-controlled airports. Americans should not be made to feel stress, shame and awkwardness while flying. That is what spending time with your relatives at Thanksgiving is for.

Even with bin Laden dead, the TSA has become more intrusive than ever. Now I have to take off my belt to go through security. TSA screeners' pre-search routine has gone from putting on latex gloves to now applying lubricant to them. Should it not be going the other way by now — less invasive instead of more? The TSA will handle more junk this holiday season than Sanford and Son.

Even as the TSA is accused of touching more women inappropriately than Herman Cain, politicians feign outrage but do nothing. When asked about the full body hand check now given by the TSA, even Hillary Clinton said she would not like to go through

The corruptible power of one group's control over another with the false promise of safety seldom works. And even if it did, at what cost?

We pay twenty-one times more in taxes than our Founding Fathers did, but are we safer? Do we have more liberty? Government says, "If you will just let us regulate more and give us more money and more power, then we will promise you safety." Yet many do not want real liberty; that involves taking individual responsibility and owning the outcome of one's actions. Any endeavor, even one as simple as walking across the street, has risks that cannot be regulated away.

The SEC's budget has tripled since the Enron collapse, but it missed the Bernie Madoff (a man who supposedly had billions and did not make a trade for ten years) scam. Then Obama said he wants more. Now, MF Global, run by former Democrat Senator and New Jersey Gov. Jon Corzine, reportedly cannot account

for \$1.2 billion of customer money.

Has more regulation ever really made us safer than our own informed decisions and actions? Has government's insatiable appetite for more money and more power to regulate not been preceded by events like 9/11 and the financial meltdown, which it was supposed to be regulating to begin with? Have not people been more hurt when they thought government was regulating something than when they knew government was not? The presumption of safety when you get a Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac mortgage, or invest in a financial institution, has done more to snooker people out of their money than non-regulated free markets.

Historically, any time a politician can persuade people, usually under the duress of an unusual event like 9/11, to forfeit even the smallest of their freedoms to the statist in government, those liberties are seldom restored. Such acts create more intrusion by government into even more corners of our lives, which serves to entrench government's power — not ours.

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

NAS Whiting Field surges on solar energy

Naval Air Station Whiting Field marked another step on its path toward energy independence Tuesday, Nov. 29 with a ribbon cutting for the air station's first large-scale photovoltaic power system. Capt. Matthew Coughlin, base commanding officer, and Public Works Officer Lt. Cmdr. Jason Kranz were on hand to celebrate the auspicious occasion.

At the time of the ceremony, the power system was generating sufficient energy to reduce

the host structure's energy consumption to "net zero" according to public works representatives. This achievement represents a landmark event in the base's drive toward energy self-sufficiency.

"The goal is to reduce energy purchased, to increase our independence from outside sources," Ensign Cory McLaughlin of public works explained.

The new solar array is designed to provide primary power to base building 2981, which houses Training Air Wing FIVE's fixed-wing Training Squadron TWO and Training Squadron SIX. A duplicate of the solar

array has been installed to service a similar facility containing two of the air station's three South Field-based helicopter training squadrons.

The second system, which boasts even greater output potential than the North Field generator, was activated in concert with the proceedings at the fixed-wing squadrons. Combined output of the two power plants would be sufficient to supply approximately 45 average American homes.

According to Kranz, the newly-commissioned system was undergoing initial evaluation at half of its potential, and a second set of electric inverters is scheduled to double the output of the plant.

Beyond the operational certainty and security that the system affords the base, economic incentives loom on the near horizon. While reflecting on the peripheral advantages of on-site renewable power, Kranz was unequivocal about the immediate payoff.

"We look forward to saving money," he noted with a smile.

The self-contained power units can induce base's power consumption meters to "run backward" and further diminish energy expenses for the command. The net economic windfall is projected to approach sixty thousand dollars per year at current utility rates with the potential for greater gains if energy costs rise.

Both power plants are

fully integrated with the air station's power grid. In the event that one solar array produces power in excess of the needs of its host building, the surplus can be channeled to other facilities on the base.

The base's newly activated solar generators are the culmination of a Navy-wide initiative to expand the energy independence of its stateside installations. The project has been funded by the American Recovery

and Reinvestment Act of 2009.

NAS Whiting Field has been a consistent leader in the early adoption and innovative application of alternative energy technologies.

The base has engaged solar energy units to meet a broad spectrum of operational requirements. Since 2009, the air station has installed solar powered parking and traffic lights as well as tested a solar-powered

water heating plant at the former Wings Club facility.

Exploratory plans are under way to re-commission the solar heater, which is in storage, and expand the use of photo voltaic generators.

The Public Works Department is engaged with its local electric utility partner, Gulf Power, to evaluate the technical feasibility and economic benefits of a solar power farm aboard the air station.

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Ask the Preacher
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Dear Pastor Gallups, "I recently heard you say on your radio program that there is a difference between Sunni and Shia Muslims. Mubarak led Egypt. Mubarak was an "aristocratic Sunni" and was considered out of touch with his mainline Sunni population.

The so-called "Arab Spring" is nothing more than a radical Sunni uprising. Obama was raised in the Sunni traditions of Indonesia and Kenya. He has invested American military intelligence, personnel, equipment, weapons and supplies in aiding these uprisings - much to the consternation of Israel and many in the U.S. Congress.

of the cameras in 2010 and that no one damaged the light fixtures, although he said that some of the string lights were tampered with. "There were some net lights (that were dismantled), but nothing serious," Watkins said. "There wasn't really any damage done." But it won't be just the city that will have access to the video being captured by the cameras. Captain David Cox with the Milton Police said that the de-

partment has access to live feeds from the cameras once they are set up. Cox said he heard the city mention keeping the cameras up year round, but he knows it is still in its planning stages. "This is more of a deterrent for us," Cox said. Just like the red light cameras, Cox said that by keeping these cameras up downtown, people might think twice about commit-

ting a crime. "If someone does something in the field of camera view...we're able to access that 24/7," Cox said. Watkins said the city is looking to erect a permanent structure to house the cameras on if they vote to keep them up year round. The city has all of the Christmas lights up and Watkins said the cameras would be put up sometime soon.

getting a six month contract extension in October. "We have three projects in front of Rick Harper and we need to move forward," Hoxeng said. "We agreed to an annual review every January and these contracts can be cancelled in 90 days by either the county or TEAM. "We need the board to say OK so we can get re-organized and get started with these changes. We are constantly in communications with those looking at Santa Rosa County and we have questions from them to answer." While Hoxeng was pushing for a decision, Cole was willing to move for the 18-month contract extension, yet not every commissioner was on board. "I don't want to rush into this," Commissioner Lane Lynchard said. "We

are over 20 years into this experiment and we need more cooperation to flush these things out; this is too important to move forward prematurely. "We want the public behind the EDO, the private sector and the five of us. We don't need this to hinge on a 3-2 or 4-1 vote." Hoxeng was adamant about doing the job he took over on Oct. 1. "I am asking the board to trust me and my business sense," Hoxeng said. "As a leader, we need to move forward one way or another. "We have a long track record and we need to do our work." During Ticknor's presentation of his study on TEAM Santa Rosa, he pointed out the need to do some rebranding while also showing that aggressive,

countywide budgets are typically \$5 to \$8 per capita, while Santa Rosa County is \$3.03 per capita. "I want to do what is right for the county to step up its economic development game," Ticknor said. "This group is not lavishly or poorly funded, and they do the basics well." While many wanted to take a look and study Ticknor's report, Commissioner Don Salter reminded the board where they started. "When we started this public/private endeavor in 1992 we started with an executive director and a secretary and it was appropriate for a small rural county at the time," Salter said. "As the county has grown so has TEAM and it has been done in a piecemeal fashion. "We are not small any-

more and we need to create the future the right way because we have only one shot at it." While Hoxeng was pleading for the board to trust him and approve the 18-month extension so it would send a message to those considering Santa County, Williamson took some offense. "I have a hard time understanding why you feel that way," Williamson said. "Just last week, we approved the incentive for Project Vortex, and did so in five minutes, and I am sure we will support any other economic development issue brought before this board." Commissioners are planning to look at this matter again during their first meeting in January, which would be three months into TEAM's six-month extension.

Pace's road ends in St. Johns with 34-24 loss

Pace High School saw a magical run come to an end Friday when they traveled to St. Johns for the Region I Finals, where they faced Bartram Trail.

The Bears were ready for the game and walked away with a berth in the final four after a 34-24 win in the Class 6A Region I Finals.

Bartram Trail (12-1) will prepare to travel next week as they will face undefeated and second-ranked team in the country in Seffner Armwood (13-0) on the road in the state semifinals.

Bartram didn't play its best game against Pace (10-3). The Bears were constantly hurt by penalties, but, just like last week against Lake City Columbia, were able to make critical plays when they needed to. Especially on defense.

Pace quarterback Devon Varney was 9 of 10 passing in the first half and 4 of 15 in the second. He connected with wideout Patrick Maddox five times for 118 yards in the first 24 minutes and only twice for 42 yards the rest of the way.

Pace led 17-14 at the break. The Patriots' only points in the second half came following a fumbled punt by Bartram's Nick Uruburu that set Pace up only 21 yards away from the end zone.

Running back Brice Moore hit Varney on a halfback pass for a 19-yard score that tied the game at 24.

Bartram responded with a 28-yard field goal by Cole Leininger. Pace's J.C. Curry fumbled on the

first play from scrimmage on the Patriots' next drive, and Bartram had only 24 yards to go to take a 10-point lead that would stand the rest of the night.

Bartram's defense stopped Pace on a long drive that ended with a missed 35-yard field goal that ultimately sealed the game with just more than three minutes remaining.

"We came out and everybody just did their job and did exactly what they were supposed to do," said linebacker Matt Mailhot, who recovered a fumble. "This is the greatest feeling in the world."

Bartram's defense also took the ball away early in the third quarter on a Briggs interception. The Bears had to settle for a 46-yard field goal by Leininger, however, as a personal foul set Bartram back. That was perhaps the only disturbing theme of the night for the Bears.

Bartram's offense lost a fumble early on, but was nearly flawless after that, going the entire game without a three-and-out and wearing Pace's smaller line down.

A big reason for that was the play of senior running back Gabe Johnson, who has made a habit of outshining himself down the stretch of his final season.

Johnson ran for 203 yards on 24 carries, caught four passes for 106 yards and scored twice.

Bartram fell down 14-0 early. Pace drove down the field to start the game and scored a 1-yard touchdown by Austin Autrey to take a 7-0 lead.

Bartram quarterback

Nathan Peterman fumbled on the next possession, and Pace responded with another scoring drive, this time ending with an 8-yard run by Curry that made it 14-0 in the first quarter.

Peterman hit Jared Crump on a 26-yard score on the following possession, and after stopping Pace on fourth down, Bartram scored again to tie the game when Johnson ran in from a yard out.

Pace kicker Ryan Santosa added a 22-yard field goal before the half.

The second annual BonfireJam promises that "country state of mind" to transport attendees away from the stress associated with the holidays.

Everything gets started that Saturday with the Redneck Christmas Festival at 9 a.m. followed by the annual Chumuckla Redneck Parade at 1 p.m. Events close with the 5:30 p.m. kickoff of the second-ever BonfireJam. This year, the event is featuring three huge country music artists: Josh Turner, Jamey Johnson and Lee Brice.

So far, officials note, ticket sales for the BonfireJam are going well. All reserved premium seats are sold out, but regular premium seats are still available, as are special Jam boxes.

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What does your holiday card say about you?



NEW YORK (AP) — The Santa hats, beach background or dressed-up dog in the holiday card photo might be saying more than “Merry Christmas” or “Happy New Year.”

The image can be a snapshot of the past 12 months: where you’ve been, what you’re thinking, your outlook, your outfits.

Yes, it’s a big message to come in a 5-by-7 envelope, but you already knew a picture could be worth a thousand words. Now consider that this card might be the only piece of snail mail you send to your loved ones all year.

While email and social media makes it easy to stay in frequent communication with far-flung friends and relatives, those tweets, texts and updates can be deleted or forgotten as quickly as they arrive.

A holiday card, in contrast, “is really a chance to make a statement,” says Kemper Johnson, visual director of MyPublisher.com, an online custom publishing site.

“You’re creating your own greeting card. It has meaning, and most people you’re sending it to know will know that it’s your home in the background or the vacation you were on, or it’s an introduction to you and your family to a new friend,” he says.

So are you the traditionalist who lines the family up in front of the fireplace? The goofball who each year dresses up her Chihuahua in a new sequined frock? The proud parent who wants to show off the family’s football star and best ballerina on the same card?

The right photo will look different for each family, and likely will be a different type each year, says Meg Bohnert, card stylist for Shutterfly, the online photo site. You’ll know it when you see it, she says.

Her advice: “You want a photo that is ‘in a moment.’”

That doesn’t mean perfect, though. Sometimes it’s the frame shot just before or after the posed photo that better captures the real family dynamic.

Next, think about color. That means not only the background and text but also the hues of your clothes or the setting, says TV style adviser Jeannie Mai. “Color is what will jump out of the envelope first.”

White, for example, is a way to “hit the reset button” and convey a change, either in look or lifestyle, she says, while peach or blush tones say “romance — that you’re feeling lovey dovey.”

If you like a strong, polished look, consider browns and grays mixed with black, suggests Mai, who hosts Style Network’s “How Do I Look?”

She envisions her own card this year to feature a natural, woodsy setting with fresh greenery. “I want my card to say to my recipient that there’s a new year ahead and a lot to look forward to.”

Other tips

• **Black and white:** This is either nostalgic or modern, says Johnson. With the traditional trappings — those Fair Isle sweaters, plaids or snowy landscapes — your message is one of a classic, timeless holiday greeting, he says, while something sleek without clutter is more sophisticated and subtle.

Here also are practical reasons to use a black-and-white image. If there’s too much clutter in the background, it’ll be tempered, and will neutralize clashing colors.

• **Coordinated clothes:** “Matching outfits can do a couple of different things,” San Francisco-based photographer Jennifer Chaney observes. “It can say, ‘We’re very traditional,’ it can say, ‘We have a sense of humor,’ but it also can convey that you don’t have a lot of creativity.”

She suggests everyone wear something in the same color family or have one matching accent piece. “You’ll look like you belong to the same family but that you have your own style.”

• **Gallery:** Using multiple photos can bring a family together, even if it’s hard to get them together in one room. “It’s the quick fix if someone is away at college or for grandparents who want to show all their grandkids,” Bohnert says. “You can tell a lot of stories this way.”

• **Antler ears, Santa hats and fake moustaches:** “The joke has to be an obvious joke,” Chaney says. Clever wording will help here. Think “Awkward Family Photos.”

• **Pets:** As much as he’d like photo cards to show every member of the family right down to the goldfish, Johnson warns that pets can steal the thunder, so mind the pecking order and how that comes out in the picture.

• **Outdoor setting:** It’s often the easiest shot, has the best light and it’ll probably have the most easy-going feel, Bohnert says. The family will probably come off as less stuffy and more playful.

Don’t feel limited to a pine-tree background. If your best photo was from your summer vacation, share that with your friends. They want to see you when you feel happy and at your best, Bohnert says.

If you want to make it feel a little bit more “holiday,” trim it red and green or add candy-cane stripes.

• **No people:** You don’t need people to make a personal photo card. An artistic landscape from that blockbuster trip, a sunrise picture from your deck or the wreath that hangs on your door can say just as much.

• **New Year’s:** Want to stand out from the crowd? Send a New Year’s card. “That says, ‘I’m always late’ or ‘I’m really optimistic,’” according to Bohnert, “but you’ll remember getting that card.”

LET THEM EAT CAKE (and make it for them, too)

Small Bundt cakes are an easy and elegant gift to give. You can make them in a traditional metal pan, but also consider purchasing paper baking pans, which are designed to be both the baking pan and a decorative wrapper.

To use the paper pans, simply place them on a baking sheet and bake as normal. When completely cooled, wrap the item in plastic wrap or a clear bag tied with a bow.

We've offered a recipe for a cherry spice cake, but this technique will work for any recipe that's designed for a Bundt pan. Quick breads are another easy offering for paper baking pans, as they come in small loaf pans, as well as the ring-style pan.



CHERRY SPICE CAKE

Start to finish: 45 minutes
Makes four 8-by-2-inch ring cakes

For the streusel:

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 2/3 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- Pinch of salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, melted

For the cake:

- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup honey
- 1/4 cup molasses
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoon dry ginger
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cardamom
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 cup dried cherries
- 1 cup frozen cherries, thawed and drained

Heat the oven to 350. Coat four 8-by-2-inch ring cake pans (or two 8-inch Bundt pans) with baking spray. Arrange the pans on a baking sheet for stability and ease of moving to and from the oven.

To prepare the streusel, in a small

bowl mix together the flour, brown sugar, granulated sugar, salt and cinnamon. Stir in the melted butter, allowing clumps to form. If using metal Bundt pans, distribute the streusel mixture between the pans. If using paper baking pans, set the streusel aside.

In the bowl of an electric mixer, beat together the oil, eggs, sugar, honey, molasses, baking soda, salt, ginger, cinnamon, cloves, allspice, cardamom and vanilla. Mix in half of the buttermilk, then half of the flour. Scrape down the sides of the bowl, and repeat with the remaining buttermilk and flour.

Stir in the dried and thawed cherries. Divide the mixture between the prepared pans. If using the paper baking pans, sprinkle the reserved streusel on top of the batter.

Bake for 30 to 40 minutes. Allow to cool for 10 minutes. If using a metal pan, turn out onto a wire rack to finish cooling. Will keep for 1 week.

Smart spending

Buy holiday gifts close to home

If you've been inside a mall or department store this fall, you've heard it already. If you've strolled through the home or seasonal section of a Target or Walmart or another low-price general-merchandise store, you've seen it. And if you're shopping online, the signs are abundant.

Holiday hype is here. This year, with prices rising everywhere, the key to limiting your spending on gifts might be to reconsider the whole process, starting with where you shop and when. Instead of hitting the mall for early bird specials, coping with the traffic or puzzling through online discounts, consider places you already patronize.

We're talking supermarkets, convenience stores and dollar stores. Carry a running list — whether in your head, on paper or in a notes file on your smartphone — and pick up gifts as you go about life. You'll save money and time, and you'll avoid crowds and website crashes.

This is an especially effective way to keep from spending too much on small items like stocking stuffers, workplace grab bag presents and hospitality gifts.

SUPERMARKET SWEEP

You probably don't picture yourself shopping for presents while you're buying milk and eggs, but why not?

Grocery stores operated by California-based Safeway Inc., New Jersey-based ShopRite, Ohio-based Kroger Co. and other companies stock toys and books all year. And the bakery aisle offers everything you need to make personalized gifts of cookies, cake or homemade candy. Stocking stuffers like lipstick, kitchen gadgets and gift cards are also readily available. And you can pick up wrapping paper or a bouquet at many large grocery stores.

Patty Fishman, a vice president with Minnesota-based Supervalu Inc., said licensed graphic T-shirts, As Seen on TV items and a retro popcorn machine are available at some of its Albertsons, Jewel-Osco and other stores. New gift items this year include Mattel's Fijit interactive robotic toys and the latest Michael Bu-

ble CD.

"While price point is key for supermarkets, value and quality has become an equally important part of holiday merchandise," said Christina Veiders, managing editor of Supermarket News.

Specific promotions: At Kroger, "Buy Holiday Gift Cards, Use them Like Cash, and Save on Fuel" deal, Nov. 20 to Dec. 11: Participating locations will offer quadruple fuel rewards for gift card purchases, while Kroger customers usually get double fuel rewards points for gift card purchases.

At Supervalu, grocery discounts, starting in mid-November: Customers who spend \$100 on selected gift cards will get a discount on their next grocery purchase, with rewards varying by store.

CONVENIENCE STORES

If you're heading to a holiday party this year, convenience stores are great for hostess gifts like wine. But they also carry much-needed batteries for toys and popular stocking stuffers like scratch-off lottery tickets or extra-large candy bars.

Perhaps the best perk of shopping at a convenience store is the hours. The vast majority of 7-Eleven's stores are open all the time.

CVS also has some 24-hour stores and extends the hours at many leading up to the holidays.

Jesus Delgado-Jenkins, senior vice president of merchandising, marketing and logistics for 7-Eleven Inc., said its holiday offerings will include smartphones and watches and a \$19.99 remote-control car or helicopter. Similarly, CVS/Pharmacy stores offer affordable electronics, including a house-brand Craig 7-inch portable, combination LCD TV and DVD player for \$99.99. A rocking horse is \$29.99.

Specific promotion: At CVS, through Christmas, Dec. 25: Shoppers who belong to the company's rewards program and spend \$30 on certain items advertised in its weekly circular can earn up to five \$10 gift cards per week to spend at retailers including Macy's, Gap, American Express and Barnes & Noble.

DOLLAR STORES

If you think of dollar stores as resources only for cleaning supplies and party goods, think again. You can pick up candy canes or chocolates for stocking stuffers at most dollar stores. And many sell calendars, fragrance sets, winter hats and scarves and other gift items.

Paul White, a senior vice president with Family Dollar Stores Inc., said the chain carries name-brand goods from Hasbro, Mattel and Disney Co.

Not only do dollar stores offer low prices, their selections constantly change. To figure out what's in stock, sign up for company emails from the chain nearest you.

Specific promotions: At Family Dollar, through Christmas: Shoppers get 10 percent off when they spend \$100 on toys.

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What will your pet find under the Christmas tree?

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Just over half of American pet owners will buy gifts for their pets this holiday season, and they'll spend an average of \$46 on their animals, with toys and treats topping the list, according to a new AP-Petside.com poll.

Sixty-eight percent of pets getting gifts can look forward to a toy, 45 percent to food or another treat, 8 percent new bedding, 6 percent clothing, 3 percent a leash, collar or harness and 3 percent new grooming products, the poll showed.

"Christmas is about the pets," said Gayla McCarthy, 58, of Kekaha, Hawaii, whose Australian shepherd, Echo, will find a toy under the tree. McCarthy even got a shirt for her husband as a gift to him from the dog, and she'll be giving collapsible bowls that she ordered online to all their friends' dogs.

Although the average budget for pet gifts among those surveyed was \$46, 72 percent of those polled said they'd spend \$30 or less. Those who bought gifts for their pets last year said they spent \$41 on average.

Overall, 51 percent of those polled this year said they would buy holiday gifts for their pets, a figure that's been relatively stable in the last few AP-Petside.com polls. It was 53 percent last year, 52 percent in 2009 and 43 percent in 2008.

Income does matter. Those making \$50,000 or more say they



plan to spend an average \$57 on their pets. Those making under \$50,000 say it will be \$29.

Major pet retailers have been taking part in the Black Friday and Cyber Monday frenzy for a few years.

"Including pets in holiday gift-giving has been a growing trend in the last few years," said Greg Seremetis, vice president of marketing for Petco Animal Supplies. "More and more pets are being treated as family members and being included in holiday traditions, including having a gift waiting for them under the tree."

Younger pet owners are more apt to say they'll buy their pet a holiday gift, including 56 percent of pet owners under age 50. Among those ages 50-64, it's 47 percent, and among seniors, 39

percent, the poll showed.

Lauren Beard, 22, of Felton, Pa., and her family lavished their dog Groovy with gifts last year — including treats and bones — because it was the chocolate lab's first Christmas. "We still love her, but it's a little less exciting this year," Beard said. So she reduced her budget of \$70 last year to \$50 and hopes to get some things on sale. She'll also buy a gift for Groovy's best friend and neighbor, a golden retriever named Tessie, Beard said.

Ronda Singleton and her husband live in Elk, Wash., and raise and show standard poodles. But they don't plan to get gifts for their dogs or for each other. "If we need something, we go get it," she said, adding that the dogs get treats all the time. She and



her husband like to celebrate holidays with traditional dinners and church services.

Thomas Koch, 69, in Raleigh, N.C., has something special to celebrate this year — adoption of his adult son should be finalized, he said.

The two will spend the holidays with their dog, Jessie, a Sheltie-chow mix, and two cats, Tanz and Callie.

Last year, Jessie got toys and the cats got play mice and a large bag of catnip. "They liked it so much we just threw it on the carpet and let them roll in it," Koch said.

He covered the goodies last year for a mere \$8, but is setting aside \$10 this year just in case prices have gone up.

George Smith, 43, a father of

three in Adams County, Colo., said pets are "part of the family, just like our kids." But they keep the holiday gifts for Miley, a golden retriever, and Zippity, a cat, low-key: no fancy wrapping or stockings, just \$10 worth of toys and treats.

Steve Gottula's budget was \$100 last year, and he figures it will run about the same this year for his two dogs and seven cats. Odie, a dachshund, and Sky, a Dalmatian, will get special bones, and the cats will get catnip and mouse balls.

Gottula, 48, his wife, Leigh, (she's the one who brings home the strays) and five kids (ages 6 to 16) live with the nine pets in Spring, Texas.

His daughters have made stockings for the pets — with their initials — and they are always part of holiday celebrations, Gottula said.

What do his pets mean to him? "They are entertaining, they are companions. They have little senses of humor. They all have personalities. If you give love to them they give it back — it's unconditional," he said.

The AP-Petside.com Poll was conducted Oct. 13-17 by GfK Roper Public Affairs and Corporate Communications. It involved landline and cellphone interviews with 1,118 pet owners. Results among all pet owners have a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 3.6 percentage points.

Poll: Vet visits average \$505/year

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Vet visits cost pet owners an average of \$505 dollars last year, according to an AP-Petside.com poll, with those whose pets faced serious illness spending more than \$1,000 on average.

Eight in 10 pet owners had taken their animal companion to a veterinarian in the past 12 months. And cost was an obstacle for a third of those who did not visit the vet.

But most pet owners trust that vets are not suggesting unnecessary treatments, and the bulk of pet owners faced costs below the average. Sixty percent of those who did take a pet to the vet spent \$300 or less on their animal's care, but the average expenditure was boosted higher by the one in eight (13 percent) who spent \$1,000 or more.

About one in six pet owners said their pet faced a serious illness during the year, and those pet owners spent an average of \$1,092 on vet care. One percent say they took their pets to the vet and spent no money.

Thomas Klamm, 76, of Boone, Iowa, said he and his wife, Beverly, spent \$3,000 on their two Chihuahuas, sisters Kati and Keli, and he would have spent more if necessary, even though his annual income is under \$50,000.

The biggest bills resulted from a spinal condition Kati had, but Klamm said he has a lot of confidence in the vets and senior students at Iowa State University's Veterinary Teaching Hospital in nearby Ames, where the little dogs have been going since they were pups.

According to the poll, most pet owners have faith in the treatment vets recommend. Overall, 52 percent said vets do not often recommend excessive treatment, 26 percent said that happens moderately often and 17 percent said

extremely or very often. Those whose pets had been seriously ill in the past year were no more likely than others to say that vets suggest treatments that go beyond what is reasonable and necessary.

Among those who did not take their pets to the vet last year, 52 percent said they only take their pets to the vet "when they're really sick," and a third say they can't afford it at all.

Luis Calderon, 56, of El Monte, Calif., couldn't afford to take Buddy, his 3-year-old German shepherd, to the vet last year. Buddy was given to Calderon when the dog was 6 months old. "We have become best friends," he said.

Calderon, a self-employed handyman, has a wife and two kids and said work is scarce. If Buddy needed a vet, Calderon said he would have to go through public services or use credit.

How much would be too much? It would depend on what was wrong and what

the vet said, Calderon said. "At that point I would have to consider whether to keep him or let him go, put him to sleep," he said.

He hates the idea of putting limits on Buddy's health. "But we have to survive. At this point, my mortgage is No. 1. This month is really close to the edge," Calderon said.

Higher-income pet owners (household incomes over \$50,000) were more apt to take their pets to the vet than those with incomes below \$50,000 — 90 percent versus 74 percent. Forty percent of those with household incomes below \$50,000 who didn't take their pets to the vet say they can't really afford to do so.

According to the poll, dog owners were a bit more likely to take their pets to the vet than cat owners — 85 percent of dog owners compared with 79 percent of cat owners. But dog owners spent a bit less — an average of \$537 — than cat owners, who spent an average of \$558.

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Is tech friend or foe to Santa Claus?

NEW YORK (AP) — Kids can video chat with Santa, follow him on Twitter or enlist NORAD to track his every move online. And yet in many ways, technology may be making it harder for parents to keep their children believing in the jolly old elf.

At nearly every turn, the Internet threatens to blow the fat man's cover.

Practically any school-child can type "Is Santa real?" into Google. And just a few clicks can bring youngsters to websites that sell customized letters from the North Pole or offer advice on how Mom and Dad can fool the kids into believing in old St. Nick.

"I have a love-hate relationship with technology and Santa," said Kristi Kovalak, a mom in St. Louis. "The beauty of Santa is the not knowing. Technology is all about knowing, and knowing this instant. I swear, Google is the nemesis of the North Pole."

She embraces digital life daily but stays far away from cyber-Santa for her two boys, ages 5 and 11.

"We don't do robo-calls. We don't submit lists to Santa online. I don't have tracking apps on my phone," she said. "Too much proof means you then have to explain away when the next crazy thing contradicts it."

Kevin Grout and his wife had a close call recently while watching a Santa Claus parade on TV with their children, ages 6, 4 and 5 months. A commercial came on for a website that creates email greetings from Santa. They switched channels just in time.

"We're definitely in this boat, primarily with our oldest. She's a smart cookie," said Grout, of St. Catharines, Ontario. "It was clear to me a poor strategy to run it during a Santa Claus parade when many kids would be tuned in."

Santa sites can easily be found by any kid with an iPad.

Igco.com, for example, screams: "Discover our acclaimed letter from Santa, phone call from Santa,

Santa evidence kits and official good list certificate. Make your children's eyes pop out of their heads this Christmas!" (Parents might have fun explaining away the Santa boot print kit, complete with a plastic template and a shaker full of snow crystals, for \$15.99.)

Over at Santa.com is a menu of prices for letters from Santa. There's a fancy one on a scroll for \$19.99 and a simple postcard for

nearly \$3. (Mommy, why does Santa charge?)

Enter the search query "Is Santa real?" and up comes an entry on a psychology site about the dreaded question itself and how parents who are trying to keep the Santa secret live in fear this time of year.

Kyla Kelim of Fairhope, Ala., caught her oldest, a 9-year-old boy, on her iPad playing Santa sleuth a week or so ago.

"We're so close with him this year, not believing," she said. "He was Googling 'Santa,' and I saw him type the word 'myth' when I grabbed it and said no electronics. I'm constantly having to follow my phone and iPad and stuff around right now. We're trying not to debunk Santa for our 7-year-old."

Not all parents are worried technology will destroy the magic.

Dad Brian Searl in Ormond Beach, Fla., keeps the Santa secret for his 7-year-old daughter through apps that offer Santa video chat and recorded calls from the big guy. "It isn't getting harder. The methods are just different," he said.

And what happens when she's older? He said he might go retro and haul out the movie "Elf" with Will Ferrell, the one "where the sleigh doesn't have enough power because people don't believe."

Other parents, though, are finding that in some ways, it was easier to maintain the Santa myth before high-speed Internet.

When Kimberly Porrazo's boys, now in their 20s, were little, she and her

husband jingled sleigh bells outside their kids' bedroom windows on Christmas Eve, and Dad took to the roof to make scampering hoof sounds.

When one of the boys was still a believer at 12, she broke the news — gently — before some playground skeptic did it for her. The Lake Forest, Calif., mother turned the experience into a little book she

self-published, "The Santa Secret: The Truth About Santa Claus."

"Now, with technology, all the various opinions on whether or not he exists are more readily available to children beyond asking their parents," she said. "It's likely they will Google rather than asking their parents. That's why parents need to share the secret on their terms."

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TVs are hot sellers this holiday season

NEW YORK (AP) — In an unexpected twist, TVs are topping many Christmas shopping lists this year.

Wal-Mart Stores Inc. said TVs are among the top gifts people are putting on layaway at its 3,000-plus U.S. stores during the holiday season. The Westinghouse 46-inch LCD HDTV on sale for half off at Target for \$298 was a top seller during the start of the season last weekend. And Abt Electronics already has sold out of 55-inch Samsung LED TVs marked down by half to \$1,099.

"You've got people clamoring to spend \$1,000 on a large-screen TV," said Jon Abt, owner of Glenview, Ill.-based Abt, where sales of TVs are up 15 percent over

a year ago.

Heading into the holiday shopping season, TVs seemed so two Christmases ago. Sales had slowed as consumers tightened their budgets in the weak economy and technologies like 3D failed to spark their interest the way tablet computers and smartphones have. But now shoppers are responding to discounts up to 50 percent.

Most chains don't break out TV revenue, but overall unit sales are up 15 percent this year through October, according to NPD Group Inc. That compares with a 2 percent rise during the same period in 2010. Meanwhile, prices have dropped 7 percent to an average of \$597, compared with \$647

last year and \$734 in 2009.

Best Buy has slashed a 55-inch Samsung LED TV by \$400 to \$1,099.99. A Sony 40-inch Internet-enabled LCD HDTV at Target is marked down by \$200 to \$599. J&R Electronics in New York has a 42-inch LG LCD HDTV for \$30 off the original price at \$549.99.

"Great prices on TVs are a proven method of getting people into stores," said Stephen Baker, an NPD analyst.

That TVs are turning out to be a hot item gives retailers some unexpected good news during the holiday shopping season. It's a time when they can make up to 40 percent of their annual revenue.

Retailers long have de-

pendent on electronics to build buzz over the holidays. (Think: smartphones last year.) And consumer electronics are expected to account for a third of all purchases over the holidays, according to the Consumer Electronics Association trade group.

But merchants weren't expecting TVs to be hot this season because Americans rushed out to buy flat-screen TVs two years ago. Indeed, tablets like the iPad are expected to be the second-most-wanted gift this year behind clothes, while TVs didn't even make it in the top five most-desired products this holiday season, according to the electronics trade group.

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




