Address change for Avalon?

County to consider calling portion Gulf Breeze-Navarre Expressway

Some businesses on Avalon Boulevard could see an address change soon.

The Santa Rosa Bay Bridge Authority and the county are looking to change the name of Avalon Boulevard south of Interstate 10 to Gulf Breeze-Navarre Expressway. SRBBA members hope the new name would quickly convey

to visitors that the bridge is the most direct route to the beaches and downplay the proposed \$3.75 toll to use it.

SRBBA board member Gary Woods said the name change is just one of the issues the Authority needs to straighten out for the bridge's future success.

Woods recently brought the

new bridge marketing plan before county commissioners.


Area residents have voiced concerns about the \$3.75 toll, and the idea of a name change is not getting a much warmer reception from business owners who would be affected.

"When this bridge was proposed, it was going to be built to

unite the north and south end of the county, and it was said to be for the residents," said John Bordelon, managing member of Avalon Landing LLC, an RV park.

Bordelon said the name change could negatively affect his business because the word Avalon

Plants and displays will be available to view and purchase, and events will help visitors learn

"I chose to go through extra training because I wanted to know the ins and outs of it," Simon said. "Learning hypnosis is easy, but understanding how it works is different."

Simon does about 90 shows a year. He said he doesn't just do his shows to put on acts, he does it to educate people. He said when someone is under an hour of hypnosis, it's similar to getting five hours of regular sleep.

"I don't claim to have any special powers," he said. "I actually show them how to do it themselves."

During his week at the fair, Simon holds separate seminars from his actual shows educating people about what he does and how he does it.

"People don't realize that they are in hypnosis all of their life," Simon said. "I can't make you do anything you don't want to do."

"It feels like you are in a heavy daydream."

Simon covers about four county fairs in Florida every year and mostly does college and high school shows. He

covers about 27 Project Graduations for high schools up and down the East Coast every year.

But the Santa Rosa County Fair is always a place he feels he is welcomed back at.

"It's always good to come back here and be welcomed back," Simon said.

He said when people are under amnesia in his shows, they don't ever want to come out.

"It's such a good feeling, and a lot of people don't realize it," Simon said.

There are many different levels of amnesia, Simon said. He said certain levels dictate how a person can feel. Some levels can create hallucinations, and others can cause sensory changes.

Simon said when people come up on stage, he wants them to feel as comfortable as they can and come out of hypnosis feeling better than they did before they came up.

"Whenever they want to, they can pop out of hypnosis," Simon said. "It's such a good feeling that most people don't want to come out of it."

The key to this show is small standard flowers, so no top-heavy cuttings such as elephant ears, nandina, palm, banana, sago, etc. will be allowed, and all other cuttings must be no longer than 30 inches and none shorter than 12 inches, except for miniatures.

Most sections call for one stem or a blossom.

The flower show will not be open Friday, as the setting up of flowers and the judging by District I Florida Federation of Flower Show Judges will be taking place.

During Saturday and Sunday's flower show in the Bo Johnson Center, there will be a display of handmade quilts from the Northwest Florida Quilters Guild and vendors selling African violets.

Again this year, the "Gardening Grannies" will be driving golf carts carrying you and your purchases to your vehicle free of charge. Come enjoy the day and enjoy all the beautiful flowers of the flower show and the vendors.

is in his business' name.

"This marketing campaign is more about fluff than reality," Bordelon said. "The reality is, the bridge toll is too high. I don't think (this campaign) is going to achieve its desired objective."

Since late 2011, SRBBA has been under new leadership. For more than a year, the authority was shut down because many people left the board. New members, including Woods, were appointed earlier this year by the county and state.

Woods said SRBBA's idea is not to increase local usage on the expressway, but to attract those driving Interstate 10.

"I'm not trying to convince local people to use the bridge more," Woods said. "I can't change that. We have distant travelers, people who don't know this region. Those are the people that want to use the bridge."

Woods said he wanted to put more signs along the interstate to alert travelers to the bridge. He said in the coming weeks, he wants to get input from people who live on that part of Avalon before moving forward with a name change.

"These people have different needs; they are different types of folks," Woods said.

"They are less sensitive to price."

Other businesses on Avalon Boulevard that could be affected by the name change are the Shell Station, Red Roof Inn and Waffle House. Those business directed requests for comments on the proposal to their corporate offices, and responses were not available by press time.

Woods said he thinks out-of-town travelers would be willing to pay the high toll because they want the quickest route to Navarre or Pensacola Beach. He said by putting signs up to alert people of the shorter route, the bridge could make more money.

Woods said he also would like to see the signs mention SunPass so travelers who have the toll device would know Garcon Point accepts it and persuade travelers to buy a pass.

"This is an impulse purchase," Woods said.

Commissioners said they would put the name change on the agenda for their April 23 meeting. If they want to change the name of the road, the Florida Department of Transportation would be notified, new signs would be made and changes would be updated on maps and GPS systems.





When you go to a fair or carnival, the fare of choice is funnel cakes, corn dogs, hot dogs, pizza, soda, lemonade, elephant ears, cotton candy and shish-k-bobs.

At the 2012 Santa Rosa County Fair you will see a lot of people carrying tin mugs, enjoying Bayou Billy's Homebrew or homemade soda pop.

The only discussion is which of the seven flavors on tap from old wooden kegs will you enjoy. Owners Jim and Debbie Tucker are confident they will have a flavor that will do much more than quench your fair thirst.

"I learned about this at the Blueberry Festival in Plymouth, Ind., when I was selling cars," Jim said. "Towards the end of the day I had spent my food money, but had heard everyone talking about this soda and bought a cup of the root beer."

"Next year, the first thing I did was buy a mug and tried all the flavors."

Now the Tuckers spend 10 months out of the year managing booths and festivals in Michigan, Indiana and Florida.

And word of mouth is helping spread the word of not only the sodas but the tin mugs, which can be refilled for just one dollar.

"I had seen people all day walking

around with these souvenir mugs and had heard them talking about it," said Mark Boardman who was enjoying a glass of the Bayou Billy's Homebrew. "I have tried the root beer and the cherry wine and both were good."

And some of those enjoying one of the seven flavors — birch beer, root beer, diet root beer, ginger beer, orange zippy, cherry wine and sarsaparilla — hadn't drank much soda for a long time.

"I started on Friday drinking the cream soda," said Cathy Goren, who is working at the Santa Rosa County Fair. "Unfortunately, they ran out. So I have tried the root beer, ginger beer and orange zippy."

"The funny thing is, I detest root beer, but I love the taste of this. The amazing thing is, I haven't had soda for years."

Jim talked about how some have reacted when they try one of his sodas.

"I was at a festival and a lady got some of the sarsaparilla," Jim recalled. "She took a drink and her eyes got big, then she handed off the mug to her husband and they passed it back and forth."

"After they finished the mug they told me they hadn't had sarsaparilla like that in years and they were so happy."

While many might be surprised about the \$7.50 for the souvenir mugs, the price of unlimited \$1 refills keeps

them coming back for more.

Juan Rivera hopes he can keep his mug, and is looking to get more when the fair resumes on Wednesday through Saturday.

"This is so good," Rivera said about the root beer. "It taste fresh to me compared to what you get at the store and it is not as heavy on my stomach after I drink it."

While Rivera enjoyed the flavor, Lois Mahute enjoyed memories of her past in Pennsylvania as she drank a mug of birch beer.

"This is the first time I have had this in 10 years," Mahute said. "I have not found it since we have moved down here."

World War II Veteran celebrates 90th birthday

Easter weekend Armand Black, a World War II veteran and Dixonville resident, celebrated his 90th birthday with the help of family members from as far away as Mobile and Dothan, Ala.

Son of Calip and Susie McNaughton Black, Armand was born in a log cabin in the Shackleville community in Butler County, Ala., on April 8, 1922.

Black can still describe, in minute detail, the little cabin as well as many events of his childhood. Family members have been entertained by stories of life before such conveniences as electricity, running water, and roads were commonplace.

After the death of his father in 1925, Black and his family moved to the Dixonville community

on the Alabama-Florida state line. As a first grader attending W.S. Neal School, Black still remembers the paddling he received for talking too much in class. Then he attended Fidelis School with sisters Leila and Willie after the family moved to a small farm on the Florida side of the state line.

When not in school, Black had plenty of chores to occupy his time including chopping wood, hauling water, and plowing with the temperamental mule, Kit.

During his childhood, the local church provided lots of activities for the community children and Sunday afternoon brought everyone out to a neighborhood cow pasture for the weekly ball game. The talented fielder found his position a bit more challenging after the owner of the pasture planted a row of stout saplings in the

outfield. It took a lot of grit for the little outfielder to keep a straight face and hide the pain of colliding with a tree much larger than he.


The male role models in his young life included his grandfather, John McNaughton and his uncle, Clyde McNaughton, the father figure the young boy idolized.

Granddaddy McNaughton ran a small country store that still stands today. Black spent many an afternoon with his colorful grandfather, who carried a pistol in his pocket and kept a persuasion stick behind the counter to thwart the intentions of unruly customers.

At the age of sixteen, Black joined the C.C.C. (Civilian Conservation Corps) and traveled all over California working on a variety of projects. On rare occasions, the boys were able to go into town on Saturday night. New Year's Eve in Monterey was an evening that Black remembered well.

Grinning, the country boy recalled, "I had never been in anything like that before!"

Enlisting in the U.S. Army on November of 1942, at Camp Blanding in Starke, Fla., Black was stationed in New Guinea in

the Pacific theatre during World War II.

Returning to the farm after the war, he embraced 20th century technology with the aid of an obstinate mule. Lying in a crumpled heap with eight broken ribs after being struck in the chest by two power packed hooves, the young farmer immediately decided to buy a tractor. The Ferguson tractor served him well for over 50 years and without the orneriness of that old mule.

Embracing twentieth century technology continued at a rapid pace. Armand remembers when power lines were strung by the REA.

While most of their neighbors acquired electric pumps and refrigerators, his family was the only one who had a radio. So every Saturday night, neighbors gathered at 8 p.m. as the radio dial was tuned to WSM in Nashville, to the Grand Ole Opry. For the next four hours, they joined the rest of

America in enjoying the likes of Roy Acuff and The Smoky Mountain Boys, Bill Monroe and The Blue Grass Boys, and the Delmore Brothers.

Family and neighbors sang along to "Wabash Cannonball," "Will the Circle Be Unbroken," "Precious Memories," "The Wreck on the Highway," "Turn Your Radio On" and "The New Muleskinner Blues." While music was filling the neighbors' ears; Black's mother, Susie, was filling stomachs with delicious cakes and pans of cookies, made with eggs from the hen house and fresh milk, courtesy of the old black cow.

The troubles of the week drifted away as the grown ups shared the latest gossip between songs and the teenagers just grinned and giggled through everything.

After a few years, Black switched to part time farming and sought employment with the

Monsanto Corporation where he remained until his retirement. At Monsanto, he met his sweet bride, Mattie Kilpatrick Black. They spent many happy years enjoying their retirement, spending time with their grandchildren, and taking occasional trips across the country. Sadly, Mattie passed away a few weeks before their 55th wedding anniversary.

The spry nonagenarian maintains an expansive lawn, and does his own housework and laundry.

In remarkably good health, Black still drives, attending to errands and shopping. In addition to his hobbies of reading and hunting, the family patriarch enjoys escorting family members on genealogy adventures.

Congratulations, Mr. Black, on the celebration of your 90th birthday. Thank you for your service to our country and best wishes for a year filled with good health and happiness.

Bagdad needs another sign

"I had no doubt he could hit that shot. I've seen him hit it a hundred times at Tanglewood, and the hardpan pine needles didn't affect him one bit," said Murray Rutledge, Bubba Watson's Milton High golf coach.

Rutledge's words came after watching Watson's second shot at Augusta National.

"I thought it was going to be really bad. I sat there shielding my eyes, hoping that (Louis) Oosthuizen did not do so good," said Milton resident Becky Paul after she and her daughter Leacy stopped to get a picture by the Bubba Watson sign in Bagdad.

Just outside of Bagdad, people stopped to get photos taken at one of the signs that displayed the town as being the home of Watson.

Now following Sunday's win, Bagdad could be looking to erect yet another sign.

"This is the best news I've heard," said David Bailly, one of many who worked with Watson's father, Gerry, to get the existing signs erected. "I think we should get to work on another sign."

"This is a good thing, and he is a good guy. I am so happy for him."

Bailly, who lives across the street from where Watson grew up, remembers when they first bought the home in 1987. "There were golf balls in all over the front

yard," Bailly recalls. "I am sure he is the one who hit them there."

"I think if I were to start digging, I might find that there are still some buried there."

Legend has it Watson, a University of Georgia graduate, has never had a swing coach or watched video of his swing.

"When I was Bubba's head coach his senior year, my job was to, basically, get him to the match on time. He took care of the rest," Rutledge said. "He knew golf, and I tried to talk to him more about how to treat people and how to be humble."

"Golf swing-wise, I didn't give him any advice. He was hitting it pretty far even back then."

Even coaches who were preparing teams to face Watson saw the talent evident in the Bagdad native's game.

"I remember when I was coaching golf at Gulf Breeze, it was already apparent he had the ability to work the ball," said Bill Emerson, assistant superintendent of curriculum and instruction in Santa Rosa County. "He basically plays golf like the high school kids do today."

"They see it and try to do it, but Bubba is pretty good at making the shot he sees in his mind."

Santa Rosa County is abuzz with excitement since the final putt on Sunday night that earned Watson the Master's trademark



"As soon as I saw it, I had to call my son, Trent Stewart," said Vicki Wolfe. "My son said he couldn't believe it. I feel just like Bubba when he said 'it's beyond what I allowed myself to dream.'"

While Milton is happy, Watson isn't the only famous person to walk the hallways of Milton High.

"This is totally amazing. Little old Milton High School has produced so many pro athletes," said Milton Mayor Guy Thompson. "For a small community to have the number of champions we have had is

amazing."

In addition to Watson, fellow PGA golfers Boo Weekley and Heath Slocum came from Milton. The small municipality also has three former football players in the National Football League including kicker Lawrence Tynes, who won his second Super Bowl Ring when the New York Giants defeated the New England Patriots in Super Bowl XLVI in Indianapolis.

Another Milton standout was former Olympian Mark Everett. He appeared

in three Olympics – Seoul, Barcelona and Atlanta – while winning 13 track titles in SEC champions from 1986 to 1990.

Milton is searching for a way to honor Watson.

"Right now, it's just so new," Thompson said. "I am sure we will do something to recognize this accomplishment."

Hog Heaven

Several at the Santa Rosa County Fair on Saturday felt as if they were in hog heaven during the first ever hog show held in conjunction with the 21st annual event.

Middle and high school students from Santa Rosa and Escambia counties showed hogs in two separate divisions – heavyweight and lightweight – as well as competing in showmanship.

“This is more than just about showing hogs,” said Judge Jarrett Tice. “This is about work with and making better kids in our community.”

The students, who were 4-H and Future Farmers of America members, have been showing their hogs in arenas similar to the one constructed at the Santa Rosa County Fairgrounds on Saturday.

For Central School student Dale Campbell it was quite an experience.

“This is the first time for me to ever do anything like this and I have learned a lot,” Campbell said. “I need to work on my showmanship and take a crash course on my hog.”

Campbell was asked three questions by the judge during the showmanship portion of the competition and only got one correct.

The grand champion of the hog show was Matthew Smith’s hog. His hog won the heavyweight division, while he finished fourth in the seniors showmanship division.

“I have been working with hogs for about three years and the longer I work with them the more I learn about them,” said Smith, who attends Ransom Middle School.

Smith and Campbell are just a few of the students who will also be participating this weekend in the Gulf Coast Agricultural and Natural Resources Association 19th Annual 4-H and FFA Show at the Langley Bell 4-H Club Center in Pensacola.

While there is not a lot of work these young people can do when it comes to the growth and development of the hog, they can work on showmanship.

“At this point and time there is not much you can do with a hog since a lot is already determined on genetics,” said Central High

agriculture teacher Bobby Gindl, who is also the sponsor of the oldest 4-H Club in Florida, Berino Park 4-H. “I would love to see agriculture classes grow in the school system and that is one of my goals to help develop it.

“This is an agriculture count and when you look at the central and north end you are in heaven when it comes to agriculture.”

The Santa Rosa County Fair officials were very pleased with the first ever hog show and hope this is just a sign of things to come.

“We hope this is just the start of things,” said Kyle Holley. “We had a lot of great hogs and very talented kids here showing them.

“I am glad we have this first show under our belts, and we look forward to doing more great things like this to help promote agriculture in our area.”

Duck uniform revolutionary

Nike takes on the NFL

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Back in 1998, Oregon and Nike teamed together to tinker with the Ducks' traditional, but tired uniforms. Out went emerald green and lemon yellow, in came spruce, mallard and a little something called "lightning."

That was just the start. The gaudy uniform craze that began with Nike co-founder Phil Knight's alma mater has gripped every school from Maryland to Boise State, hitting Notre Dame and Michigan along the way.

Is the NFL next?

Nike is taking over the pros from Reebok with a gala uniform unveiling in New York City. The design details are a closely guarded secret at the Beaverton-based shoe and apparel maker, but some images — there's no way to know if they're real or fake — have circulated on the Internet.

The biggest changes will likely be in the performance aspect of the uniforms, like newer lightweight fabrics and a sleek silhouette, but a few teams could get the Cinderella treatment.

Nike isn't commenting until the big reveal.

"I think that what we'll see is a subtle homage to the collegiate revolution in uniform design, but in the framework of arguably the most successful sports franchise there is, the NFL, which is more steeped in tradition than the college landscape was when Nike really got into it with Oregon," said Paul Swangard, managing director of the university's Warsaw Sports Marketing Center.

The Ducks signed their contract with Nike in 1996. After the first major makeover in 1998, the school introduced the Nike-designed "O" logo in 2002.

In 2003's opener against Mississippi State, the Ducks wore neon yellow from helmet to shoe, which some dubbed the "Human Highlighter." In 2006, Oregon introduced black uniforms, while "wings" were incorporated to jerseys in more recent years in a nod to the school's mascot.

"We aren't like USC or Notre Dame or Penn State or Alabama, which are really traditional," said Jim Bartko, who holds the title of executive senior associate athletics Director at Oregon and has close ties to Knight. "Our philosophy was that every four years we were going to change, so that every player that comes into Oregon in the football program will have a chance to be a part of a design."

Today Oregon has five different helmets, seven jerseys and six pants for 210 possible uniform combinations, enough to carry them through 17-plus seasons, minus bowl games, which usually get new garb. And that's not counting different shoes, socks and undershirts.

Old-schoolers claim that Oregon's countless uniforms are an annoying distraction, while kids see them as cool. There's no doubt that they benefit the Ducks in lots of ways, from merchandise revenue to the immeasurable buzz among potential students and recruits.

"It's taken off," Bartko said. "I don't think we would have ever thought back in 1998 that the uniform craze would be where it is now. Our goal and philosophy has always been to be a step ahead of everybody. If they want to copy us or follow us, that's great. We want to be the leader."

Copycats abound. Arguably the most shameless was Maryland's so-called Pride uniform, a hodgepodge of so many elements that one critic suggested

it looked as if someone had thrown up the state flag and put it on a jersey.

The uniforms were the work of Under Armour, whose CEO, Kevin Plank, played football at Maryland. Say what you will about the design, they got noticed.

"If this university had to go pay for that publicity, we'd be broke," Terrapins coach Randy Edsall said at the time.

Many college programs, even the most traditional ones, are bandwaggoning with throwback uniforms or even "alternate" jerseys, so as not to stray too much from convention. Notre Dame and Michigan wore retro adidas attire to mark last season's first night game at Michigan Stadium.

The Fighting Irish's showy shamrock-embellished helmet still raises the ire of some of the team's more stodgy followers.

"I think in some ways we're seeing now what we always see with marketing, which is that a good idea is originally seen as innovative, but now that everyone is going it is becoming sort of commoditized," Swangard said. "I think some teams have almost tried too hard, whether it's the highlighter uniforms of Baylor in the tournament, or what Maryland did with their uniforms this past season."

"Now people are doing it just to do it, rather than doing it to convey something about the school's brand or its athletic brand."

A handful of teams, like USC and Penn State, are still shunning the trend for now. But Nebraska — Egads! — will wear an alternate adidas jersey at a home game this season, athletic director and former coach Tom Osborne told The Associated Press on Monday.



"It does seem to appeal to the student-athletes. Most older fans don't get overly excited about it," he said. "We're walking a fine line because we are traditional, but we also recognize the fact that we don't have to stay the same all the time."

That said, Osborne suggested the iconic "N" on Huskers' helmets isn't going away.

"We will protect our tradition," he said.

new menu, is a lot like McDonald's

MIAMI (AP) — Burger King is trying to revive its ailing empire with a rival's recipe for success.

After years of lackluster sales of its Whoppers and fries, the struggling fast-food giant on Monday launched 10 food items in its biggest menu expansion since the chain was started in 1954.

But there are unmistakable similarities between Burger King's new lineup and the offerings its much-bigger rival McDonald's has rolled out in recent years. The Golden Arches already rolled out specialty salads in 2003, snack wraps in 2006, premium coffee drinks in 2009, and fruit smoothies in 2010.

Burger King doesn't deny that its new chicken strips, caramel frappe coffees, Caesar salads and strawberry-banana smoothies sound pretty close to those on McDonald's popular menu.

But executives say the company came up with them through its research. "Consumers wanted more choices," said Steve Wiborg, president of Burger King's North America operations. "Not just healthy choices, but choices they could get at the competition."

The menu additions

are part of Burger King's plan to abandon its nearly single-minded courtship of young men, who were once the lifeblood of the industry but were hard hit by the economic downturn. Competitors went after new customers with breakfast items and healthier fare, but Burger King let its menu get stale. As a result, Burger King for the first time was edged out by Wendy's last year as the nation's No. 2 burger chain. McDonald's solidified its hold on No. 1.

To stem the decline, Burger King executives last year decided to modernize the 7,200-restaurant chain's aging stores, redesign worker uniforms with aprons so they stay clean and even serve the iconic Whopper in cardboard cartons instead of paper wrapping for the first time in more than 20 years. Food, however, is at the heart of their plan.

The revamp is nevertheless a gamble. Burger King's new food could be a flop, and of course, the chain is already late to the party.

"Being an innovator is critical in the fast-food industry," said Darren Tristano, an analyst for the food industry researcher Technomic Inc. But in recent years, he said Burger King has been more of a follower.

Eddie Yoon, a principal at consulting firm The Cambridge Group said companies like Burger King that come out with similar products as their rivals can be successful only if they offer lower prices or superior taste. But if it's merely a "me too" strategy, he said Burger King's venture could fall flat.

"You can have football teams, and just because they're both running the same offense it doesn't mean it will work the same," said Eddie Yoon, a principal at The Cambridge Group, a growth consulting firm.

THE RAMP UP

The fast-food industry has undergone a shift in recent years. Just five years ago, the top three fast-food companies were all burger chains. But concerns over obesity have paved the way for competitors like Subway, now the second-biggest chain, and Starbucks, which climbed up the rankings to the No. 3 spot. Smaller players such as Five Guys, which sells made-to-order burgers, are gaining ground too.

McDonald's quickly adapted. The world's biggest burger chain reinvented itself as a hip, healthier place to eat by offering wireless Internet and rolling out a string of hit menu items such as fruit smoothies, iced coffees and oatmeal.

Burger King failed to keep up. Its share of sales among burger chains fell from 17 percent a decade ago to 12 percent last year, according to Technomic. McDonald's share rose from 42 percent to 50 percent.

All Tom McDonald had to do was look at Burger King's competitors to see why sales at the chain were falling. A Burger King franchisee since 1989, McDonald said the chain's menu hadn't changed much over the years.

"We were getting behind with the wraps and salads that were coming on the market," said McDonald, who owns 19 franchises. "We had salads, but they weren't as good as the competition. We focused on burgers maybe longer than we should have."

McDonald said he expressed his concerns at the company's failure to keep up with the times. But the Miami-based chain had gone through a series of owners over the years, and McDonald said he got little response from corporate about addressing the problems.

He said the attitude from the top changed last year after New York-based private equity firm 3G Capital bought Burger King in late 2010.

That's when Burger King assembled a group of 15 key executives, franchisees and suppliers to evaluate the chain's menu, item by item.

The process, which took three months of daylong meetings, was grueling at times. One day, for example, the group sat through a lengthy presentation complete with charts and graphs on how oils and eggs affect the quality of mayonnaise. A blind taste test of 30 varieties followed. The verdict: They liked the one Burger King was already using.

"That was actually a pretty hard day," recalls John Koch, Burger King's executive chef.

French fries took multiple days, given the various factors like seasoning, oil and frying method. Even the day for soft-serve ice cream, which was rolled out last summer, wasn't as fun as it might sound: A supplier that had 400 vanilla flavors presented the nuances between Madagascar and honey vanilla.

"Trying to come up with the exact intensity of vanilla you need is a little bit daunting," Koch said. Burger King quietly put some changes in place over the past year. The French fries are thicker so they'll stay hot longer. Burgers now come with one slice of cheese instead of two, so it melts more evenly. And naturally-smoked bacon is now cooked at each restaurant. Previously, Burger King had used a pre-cooked variety with a smoked flavor sprayed on.

THE ROLLOUT

Once executives settled on menu items, it was time to go to the masses. Would the new items measure up to those of Burger King's competitors? To find out, the company conducted consumer tests and revised its recipes over months.

Burger King considered making Panini-pressed snack wraps, for example, but tests showed customers wanted something lighter. The wraps it settled on closely resemble the ones offered at McDonald's — a chicken strip sprinkled with cheese, lettuce and dressing wrapped in a flour tortilla. McDonald's even offers the same flavors — honey mustard and ranch.

Even seemingly straightforward items had to be reworked over and over. The new "Homestyle Chicken Strips" went through 11 variations before the final version was selected. And it took about seven months and six tries before the company found the right mix of creaminess, iciness and tanginess for its strawberry banana and tropical mango smoothies.

"They didn't rush these products out to market," said McDonald, the Burger King franchisee who regularly eats at competitors to stay on top of what they're doing. He said he's confident the new menu items stack up to rivals. "They got feedback from consumers and reformulated them to get it right."

Eldy Pick, a customer who was at a renovated Burger King near the company's headquarters in Miami, said she liked having some lighter options. She normally gets the chicken or fish sandwiches and said the new cranberry apple salad she was eating was "a treat."

But food isn't Burger King's only problem. Many of its restaurants are showing signs of aging. So the company decided it wanted to give them a more modern look that mixes leather armchairs, high stools and plastic chairs in warmer lighting. High partitions will create more privacy in

some seating areas. The makeover costs an average of more than \$275,000 per restaurant.

That presents another challenge: getting buy-in from franchisees, who own 90 percent of the chain's U.S. stores. So the company is offering those who sign up for the remodeling incentives, such as a 50 percent discount on the annual \$50,000 franchise fee.

So far, more than 1,000 franchise locations are slated to be updated in the next year. Over the next three years, 2,500 will be remodeled.

Customers will see changes even in stores that aren't remodeled. The drab red, black or blue shirts workers used to wear have been replaced by metal gray shirts and aprons that were designed with the help of employees. Wrappers, cups and bags now have vivid photos of food that were shot by the same photographer responsible for the catalogs of the high-end housewares retailer Williams-Sonoma.

To get the word out about the changes, Burger King is rolling out its biggest marketing campaign ever. TV ads will feature celebrities, including soccer player David Beckham, comedian Jay Leno and actress Salma Hayek. In one spot, R&B singer Mary J. Blige croons the ingredients of the snack wraps.

Whether the star power of the ads, updated stores and the new food on the menu can fix Burger King's troubles remains to be seen. But Alex Macedo, chief marketing officer for Burger King North America, said the chain has a good chance of rebounding because Burger King is a brand everyone knows.

"People love Burger King and really want a reason to come back," he said.

Chia seeds: Not just for 'fur' on clay critters

After decades adorning everything from a zoo-worthy collection of clay critters to presidential busts, ch-ch-ch-chia seeds finally are ready to ditch the kitsch.

Because in recent years these tiny black seeds have gone from an as-seen-on-TV punch line to a must have ingredient in the natural foods world, taking starring roles in smoothies, health drinks, energy bars, crackers, cereal, granola, even pasta.

"People think 'chia' in the U.S. and they think 'green hair on a terra cotta figurine,'" said Peter Georgii, new product manager for San Francisco-based Joseph Enterprises Inc., which created the Chia Pet in 1981 and recently released an edible seed product. "What's becoming known now is the benefits to your diet."

Packed with omega-3 fatty acid — more than flax seed — along with fiber, calcium and antioxidants, the native Mexican seed is being touted by runners, yoga moms and all manner of other health conscious eaters.

Sales of edible chia have skyrocketed during the past two years, retailers and specialty food experts say, driven at least in part by an overall growing interest in so-called ancient grains, such as quinoa and amaranth.

Bob's Red Mill, a national grain seller based in Milwaukie, Ore., began carrying chia

in 2009. Sales last year saw quadruple growth, said vice president of sales Robert Agnew, and already show signs of continued growth this year.

Joseph Enterprises began selling edible seeds in a few hundred CVS and Walgreens drug stores last year, Georgii said, and now sells them in thousands of stores, as well as online.

"In the last year, they've really jumped in popularity," said Kara Nielsen, trend analyst with California-based product developer CCD Innovation, who first identified chia's trend potential in 2006. She credits recent publicity from television health gurus, athletes and online chatter with fueling the popularity.

"When you start having these different groups, you're talking about a lot of people," Nielsen said. "The press will also keep rippling this out and it will get broader and broader."

Health food aficionados have likely known about chia since the mid-2000s, when people such as natural health personality Dr. Andrew Weil first began talking about them. Runners got on board thanks to the 2009 book "Born to Run" by Christopher McDougall, which credited the seeds as a source of sustenance for Mexico's Tarahumara Indians, who run hundreds of miles.

"It really can be traced to that book," said Joanna Golub, senior editor at Runner's World magazine. "That's when a wider audience of runners became aware of it. It's always been

on the fringe, but that's when it came up on the radar for all sorts of runners."

The seeds — which resemble poppy seeds — have become an especially popular addition to drinks. That's because when soaked in water, the seeds develop a gelatinous coating, giving them the texture of tapioca. Add them to a drink and the result is similar to Japanese bubble tea — a thick beverage full of floating, jelly-like balls.

They are a common addition to kombucha, a popular health drink. And Empellon, an upscale Mexican restaurant in New York, even featured them in a cocktail.

"It adds a cool texture that's definitely an acquired taste," says Christine Muhlke, executive editor of Bon Appetit magazine, who abandoned flax for chia. "And it gives that little halo of health."

Oh, and as for the Chia Pets? They haven't gone anywhere. They flood into stores during the holidays and are available all year online. And Georgii says sales today are sometimes even stronger than in the heyday of "Chia Guy" and "Chia Ram."

But seeds — the ones you eat — are the future.

"Dietary chia will outpace the Chia Pet," Georgii said. But he warns not to go pilfering from the pet's packet. Those seeds aren't grown, packed, stored or quality checked for human consumption. "People should not eat the seeds sold in the pets," he says.
