County ends Santa Rosa Transit's run

The county has officially ended what commissioners described as an OK run of the Santa Rosa Transit program.

And for about 700 riders using the bus service every month, the end of the line could be the end of a job.

The bus service's main goal was to get people to and from work along the U.S. 90 corridor from East

Milton to the corner of Nine Mile Road and University Parkway in Pensacola.

When the bus service first started in December 2010, commissioners were confident it would be beneficial to locals who needed to get to and

from work.

But on Thursday, commissioners voted 3-2 against continuing the service for another year. Commissioners Don Selter and Lane Lynchard were the commissioners in favor of keeping the transit program.

Despite a number of changes to the route, including a reduction in stops to make the round trip shorter, numbers weren't impressive to commissioners.

Many utilize the bus system, including Mag-

gie Maggie of Milton, said stopping the bus service was the last thing that needed to happen. Maggie relies on the service to get her to and from work.

Area resident an avid couponer after family hit with hard times

Kelly Nelson knows what it's like to be hit with hard times. The Jay resident had her work hours cut at a local medical facility. And with gas prices rising, her trip to the supermarket in her SUV was making her budget even tighter. But unlike a lot of people, she decided to do something about it. Nearly a year and a half ago, Nelson was introduced to couponing by a coupon class that came to her house. Because Nelson was losing \$600 a month in income, she figured saving at the grocery store could be one way she could cut back. And after a year and a half, the coupon queen is cutting her grocery bills by 55 percent, all by spending 15 minutes a day browsing for coupons.

Start to finish
Nelson has a method to her madness, and it all starts with a pattern that is beautifully executed from start to finish. Nelson prefers to shop at Publix because they are more lenient with coupons. "I use iheartpublix.com and mycouponexpert.com, which has a lot of the coupons I use at Publix," Nelson said. "Also, Publix allows me to use coupons on free items." Her first stop as she enters the grocery store is to the customer service counter. There she asks for any coupons the store may have. And whether it's morning, noon or night, the couponer has to be wide awake so she doesn't miss any good deals. So her second stop is to the front of the store to grab a free cup of coffee. Then, it's time to get to business. "Some people can't tell you how much they spend on groceries and things like cleaning supplies a month, but it adds up," Nelson said. So when Nelson first started couponing, it took her about three months to get everything stocked for her house.



Fire destroys Pace man's shed

A structure fire ripped through an abandoned shed and previously burned house in Pace at around 2:15 last Thursday afternoon, threatening nearby structures.

Pace Fire and Rescue District, Avalon Fire Department, Ferry Pass Volunteer Fire Department and Santa Rosa County sheriffs responded to the fire that spread quickly at the 3400 block of Diamond Street near Floridatown.

According to Sid Wiggins with Avalon Fire and Rescue, the home that sat in front of the shed had burned a year before, and was left abandoned. That statement was confirmed with two other sources.

Pace Fire and Rescue District chief Donnie Wadkins said the man who owned the previously burned house was actually cleaning the abandoned home out before the shed caught on fire.

"They were out there cleaning it up, and he went to the store to get a drink, and the grass caught on fire and caught part of the old house on fire," Wadkins said. "It burned part of his utility room and then spread to the shed."

Wadkins said that by the time the fire and rescue department got to the scene, the shed could not be saved.

"It was pretty nasty," Wadkins said. "When we got the call and got there, it was pretty much gone."

Wadkins said the homeowner said that the insurance company claimed that his house burned down because of a stove

fire over a year ago. The chief said that the homeowner was in the works of cleaning the house out to rebuild when the fire destroyed his shed.

The shed was filled with filing cabinets, bicycles and other miscellaneous items. Most of the brush in the backyard of the house caught on fire

including two large trees. The fire was detained by 3 p.m.

"It was pretty bad," Wadkins said. "That's all it was."

Voter turnout heavy so far

Two days into early voting in Santa Rosa County and the turnout has been strong.

During the first two days over 4,950 took the time to cast their ballot.

Santa Rosa County Supervisor of Elections, Ann Bodenstein, is predicting a 90 to 95 percent voter turnout and the early numbers are supporting her prediction.

"The longest wait we had on Saturday was an hour and 15 minutes," Bodenstein said. "The wait didn't seem to bother anyone and on Sunday it has been quite steady."

Monday has not slowed voting down in the early morning hours according to Bodenstein.

"We get about 15 or so voters coming in about every time the light changes," Bodenstein said.

Santa Rosa County is not the only one posting big two-day early voting numbers so far.

In neighboring counties, Paul Lux, Supervisor of Elections in Okaloosa County indicated around 7,200 had voted in the first two days of early voting, while in Escambia County the first two days saw just over 9,500 take advantage of the early voting period.

While Bodenstein and her office did not receive any complaints, the lines did deter some from voting this weekend.

"I went around 4 p.m. (Saturday) and the parking lot was full and the line so long I couldn't see the end," said Angel Hill on the Press Gazette's Facebook page. "I'll go back at a less popular time."

"I am so glad to see everyone participating."

The lines didn't deter people like Angelica Shoto.

"We went about 1:30 and left around 2:30 p.m.," Shoto said. "The line was long, but anything to keep my Commander in Chief in the office!"

Elyse Winters was not deterred when she voted at 10 a.m. on Saturday.


"It took almost 2 hours

but it was worth it to elect Mitt Romney the next President of the United States!" Winters said.

Besides the Presidential race, there will be nine constitutional amendments as well as judge retention votes and two local elections.

The local races involve Santa Rosa County Sheriff Wendell Hall facing opposition from Chris Roper to see who will serve the next term as sheriff in Santa Rosa County, while Charles Elliott and Jenny Granse are running to see who will replace retiring Santa Rosa County School Board Member JoAnn Simpson, who currently represents District 4.

The Amendments on the ballot this year focus on — health care services, veterans disabled due to combat injury getting a homestead property tax discount, a state government revenue limitation, property tax limitations when property values decline, state courts, prohibition on public funding of abortions, religious freedom, homestead property tax exemption for surviving spouse of military

Dear Pastor Gallups - "Someone showed me your DVD the other day on the Secret Name of God - absolutely amazing! Can you put something in your article about it?" Jane - Milton

Dear Jane,
For thousands of years...Hebrew language experts have been studying the numerical, pictographic and ideographic meanings and hidden messages of Hebrew words. Hebrew is a very ancient language dating to the 11 century BC and deriving from the ancient Semitic language groups.

"I was very disappointed that they declined to approve another two years for the Santa Rosa County transit program," Maggie said. "The funds were available and approved for this project already as a federal grant."

According to Shawn Ward, the county's transportation planner, 35 percent of the program is funded by federal grants.

The county pays for 18 percent of the total cost of the service, which would have equated to \$48,000 throughout the next two years.

Only 5 percent of the program is paid through the fares. It's \$1 to get on the bus.

When the county cut out routes back in May, ridership slumped nearly 150 for the month. A month before the cuts, ridership peaked at 810 riders. But the num-

bers weren't enough to persuade commissioners to change their mind.

"Commissioner (Don) Salter and (Lane) Lynchard fought hard to save the program, and the public spoke in favor of keeping it," Maggie said. "In fact some begged that it be kept because many people who don't have transportation or who can't drive will lose their jobs, not be able to get to classes, not be able to get to the doctor, or go shopping for groceries."

Jessica Anderson, who also utilizes the bus system said that it wasn't a good move for the county to stop the bus service.

"I think it will be sad once they stop it," Anderson said. "Especially the ones who don't drive, plus the elderly who rely on it to go to places like grocery

shopping or the doctor's office."

Shannon Babb said her friend's son relied on the bus service, and said something should have been done to extend the service.

"My friend's adult son with autism uses that bus to get places," Babb said. "Obviously if they needed more money to keep it, they need to spend a little to advertise it better. Apparently so many did not even know it existed."

Milton resident Jill Youngblood said ending the transit program was the wrong move for the county to make in the wake of one of the longest recessions in U.S. history.

"I am in amazement that the county commissioners voted as they did to end the Santa Rosa County transit system," Young-

blood said. "After listening to the many people that use this mode of transportation, (the county) still voted to end their connection to employment, higher education, and healthcare."

"Not everyone can afford a car, car insurance, fuel, and tags for a vehicle. This does not make them any less of a Santa Rosa County citizen."

Youngblood said that the county puts a small percentage of their dollars to the program, and said a lot of people use that bus to make ends meet.

"A mere investment of \$24,000 a year to provide this vital of a service is a small price to pay (for the county)," Youngblood said. "I feel the county has really let its residents down this time."

Ward, the county's transportation planner said that the bus system would stop operating on December 28, unless the program can find additional funding to cover the \$24,000 deficit.

"I can tell you that the Florida-Alabama Transportation Planning Organization is looking at additional funding sources to keep the buses rolling," Ward said.

"I was there to give them (commissioners) the information and numbers on the transit program. "We were just wanting to keep the service going."

People like Steve Robertson and Susan Ames who commented on the Santa Rosa Press Gazette's Facebook page that they didn't know there was a transit program in the north end of the county.

The Santa Rosa Transit program is a cooperative effort through the Florida-Alabama TPO with the county as the sub-recipient. Pensacola Bay Transportation operates the county buses.

Vasquez saw the location and thought it would be a perfect spot to put a Mexican restaurant that also serves many forms of American foods including sandwiches and pasta.

"It's a great location and it's in the right spot," Vasquez said. "It's close to Gulf Power, and right next to Whiting Field."

"It has a lot of opportunity, I think."

Originally from Mexico, Vasquez has more than 12 years experience in the Mexican restaurant business.

"All of what I make is made fresh daily," Vasquez said. "We will have a lot of different foods including burgers, sandwiches, and other kinds of American food."

The building is roughly 4,500 square ft., but only about half of that is being utilized as a restaurant. Vasquez said he is already working on building the second addition to his building, which is a full size bar.

"It has a whole new look inside, and it's a very nice and clean place," Vasquez said. "We will have a full liquor bar and we also want people to enjoy the restaurant."

Vasquez said that the new restaurant would offer two-for-one deals on drinks six days a week all day long.

Vasquez, a member of the Santa Rosa County Chamber of Commerce, said he enjoys the area because of its small town feel and the hard working people in the community. He said this is why he chose to open the restaurant in Milton.

"I come from a small town in Mexico, and people were like this there...very helpful," Vasquez said. "I really appreciate everyone helping me in this process and giving me this opportunity."

Vasquez said he didn't know how long it would take to open up the bar portion of the building, but said that for now, he will have a small bar inside the restaurant open for guests.

"Not every store has everything on sale all at once," Nelson said.

And for her, organization is key when couponing. Most couponing reality shows portray couponers bringing books and books of coupons in the store with them.

Nelson has just one folder with all her coupons for the trip. She also uses a checklist, that she prints off of Publix's website to help make her shopping trips easier.

"They have it organized by aisles (on the shopping list), so it's easier to find what I am looking for," Nelson said.

Let the games begin

After pouring her cup of coffee, Nelson makes her way to the closest deal, which on this shopping trip happened to be liquid gel pain relievers.

Normally \$6.69 a bottle, the pills were on sale for \$4.99. She also scored the pain relievers on their buy one get one free cycle. As if the savings weren't already enough, she also had a coupon for \$5 off of two. That means she got both items for nothing.

"I try to organize all of my trips," Nelson said.

Nelson, who is married and has five children, said savings are well worth the extra time, which has become effortless to her.

The couponer said the best coupon trip she remembered making was when she scored \$250 worth of groceries for \$52

She has also learned the best way to make the most of her trips is to stock up when she can score a deal.

"When you get a good price on something, and it's something like toilet paper that you know will never go bad, you should stock up on it," Nelson said. "Because you never know when you will get a deal like that again."

"I try to never spend less than \$.20 a roll on toilet paper."

Another tip Nelson said was to never go grocery shopping at peak business times. Nelson usually makes her trips in the mornings or evenings.

Not your typical couponer

Unlike most couponers, Nelson isn't about scoring on bags of processed foods. She is one of the few people that have learned that just because she is a couponer doesn't mean she has to eat like one.

Months ago, her daughter was diagnosed with diabetes. That change also made a big change in what she buys for her family.

"I try not to buy processed foods because they aren't good for you to begin with," Nelson said. "I try to buy healthy foods, and foods that my kids will like."

And with that in mind, her next stop after picking up pain relievers was the frozen food section. Publix had frozen smoothies for two for \$4. With her coupons, Nelson was able to snag the smoothies for \$.25 a piece.

Another trait that viewers see on the coupon reality shows is the hoarding of items that they don't need.

Nelson doesn't believe in that. And unless she scores a huge deal on something, she feels she has no need for unwanted items.

"The people on the reality shows don't make people follow the coupon rules," Nelson said. "It's just reality."

In Nelson's reality, when she sees a great deal on something

she doesn't need, she gives it to the people that do need it.

"One time I got a deal on disposable undergarments for \$.10, and I ended up donating them to a poor man I know that needed them," Nelson said.

The couponer also remembers a time when she was able to get free dog food with coupons she had and she donated them to a pet food drive.

"I never buy things that are family won't use," Nelson said. "If I do, I usually end up giving it to someone that does need it."

Nothing wrong with a little extra

Since living out in Jay can be quite a haul for her, Nelson has learned that there are more things than just coupons that can save her money.

Stores like Winn Dixie have what they call Fuel Perks. Depending on the amount of money a customer spends on one trip to the grocery store, they can save money at Shell gas stations on gallons of fuel.

Nelson has utilized that, and has also scored \$50 gas cards for \$10 off. After her trip around Publix, she did just that.

The couponer's husband originally thought that the idea was anything but good. But now, she says, he is seen accompanying her on shorter shopping trips. She also says he can't argue with the savings.

"I remember about three months after I started doing this, he went to pay the bills and we had all this extra money in our bank account," Nelson said. "He couldn't believe it."

And it's been that way ever since Nelson said.

"It took me a good three months to get good at this," Nelson said. "It took me that long to actually say 'I don't need to go shopping today, I have plenty of stuff at the house.'"

Nelson also stocks up for the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays, even though they are weeks away. In one trip, she bought enough candy to get her children through Halloween and then some. During her trip to Publix, she also picked up canned items like Cream of Mushroom soup for green bean casseroles, which she says she makes during the holidays.

"As long as it doesn't go bad before then, there's nothing wrong with getting it now if it's

on sale," Nelson said.

The Jay resident also uses coupons to get free items that are new.

"Usually when a company comes out with something new, they will have a voucher to get it free," Nelson said.

And she also hits the free sample tables if she's at Publix at the right time.

The results

Nelson made her trip through the supermarket look extra easy, but she says it takes time to develop a method.

"I organize all my coupons at home based on dates," Nelson said.

Most of the associates at the local Pea Ridge Publix know Nelson and turn checkouts into competitions.

Without coupons, and just sale and buy one get one free items, Nelson saved \$86.61 on what would have been a \$213.67 grocery trip. After adding the coupons, Nelson saved an additional \$46.95, bringing her grand total to \$133.56 in savings on a \$213.76 grocery bill. And to her, that was a mediocre trip.

"I just love to save," she said.

British army dog joins list of animal war heroes

LONDON (AP) — British soldiers and military dogs gathered at a London army barracks Thursday to honor a fallen hero with selfless courage, nerves of steel — and four legs.

Theo, a bomb-sniffing springer spaniel who died in Afghanistan on the day his soldier partner was killed, was posthumously honored with the Dickin Medal, Britain's highest award for bravery by animals.

Theo worked alongside Lance Cpl. Liam Tasker, searching for roadside bombs in Helmand province, a Taliban stronghold.

Tasker, 26, died in a fire-fight with insurgents in March 2011, and Theo suffered a fatal seizure hours later. Tasker's mother, Jane Duffy, says the pair were inseparable. She's convinced Theo died of a broken heart.

"They'll be watching us, and they'll be so proud," she said. "I just wish they were here to get it themselves."

Since 1943, the Dickin Medal has recognized gallantry by animals serving with the military, police or rescue services. Some of these animal heroes:

CANINE COMMANDOS

Theo is the 28th dog to receive the medal, awarded by animal charity PDSA and named for its founder, Maria Dickin.

One of the earliest winners was Rip, a mongrel found abandoned in a bomb shelter and adopted by a London air raid warden. He was credited with finding more than 100 people trapped in rubble by German bombs during the 1940 Blitz.

Another World War II hero was Rob, a collie who joined British commandos in more than 20 parachute operations behind enemy lines in North Africa and Italy. His medal citation said that "his presence with these parties saved many of them from discovery and subsequent capture or destruction."

Dogs have also been honored for service in Bosnia, Iraq, Afghanistan and during terrorist attacks.

After the Sept. 11 attacks, Apollo, a New York Police Department German shepherd, received the medal on behalf of all search and rescue dogs at the sites in New York and Washington, "for tireless courage in the service of humanity."

WINGED WARRIORS

Pigeons' homing instinct makes them excellent messengers, and more than 200,000 served with British forces during World War II. Some 32 were awarded the Dickin Medal for carrying back vital information from the frontline.

Feathered medal-winners include Gustav, a pigeon serving with the Royal Air Force, "for delivering the first message from the Normandy Beaches from a ship off the beach-head" on June 6, 1944, the day of the D-Day landings.

Google mapping Grand Canyon's popular trails

GRAND CANYON NATIONAL PARK, Ariz. (AP) — Google and its street-view cameras already have taken users to narrow cobblestone alleys in Spain using a tricycle, inside the Smithsonian with a push cart and to British Columbia's snow-covered slopes by snowmobile.

The search giant now has brought its all-seeing eyes — mounted for the first time on a backpack — down into the Grand Canyon, showcasing the attraction's most popular hiking trails on the South Rim and other walkways.

It's the latest evolution in mapping technology for the Mountain View, Calif., company, which has used a rosette of cameras to photograph thousands of cities and towns in dozens of countries for its Street View feature. With a click of the mouse, Internet users are transported virtually for a 360-degree view of locales they may have read about only in tourist books and seen in flat, 2-D images.

"Any of these sort of iconic, cultural, historical locations that are not accessible by road is where we want to go," said Ryan Falor, product manager at Google.

Google announced the trekker earlier this year but made its first official collection of data this week at the Grand Canyon.

The backpacks aren't ready for volunteer use, but Google has said it wants to deploy them at national forests, to the narrow streets of Venice, Mount Everest and to ancient ruins and castles.

The move to capture the Grand Canyon comes after Apple chose to drop Google Maps from its mobile operating systems and opted to use its own mapping program that was derided for, among other things, poor directions and missing towns.

Steve Silverman, operations manager for Google didn't directly address the competition in saying: "Just trying to document a trail, it's going to be hard to beat this."

Google launched its Street View feature in 2007 and has expanded from five U.S. cities to more than 3,000 in 43 countries. Google teams and volunteers have covered more than 5 million miles with the Street View vehicles on a scale that other companies haven't approached, said Mike Dobson, president of Telematics, a company that monitors mapping efforts.

"You could safely say that it's a standout, well-used application and they don't really have any competition," he said.

As the sun rose Monday, Luc Vincent, Google engineering director, strapped on one of the 40-pound backpacks and set down the Bright Angel Trail to the Colorado River — a nearly 10-mile hike that goes from 6,900 feet in elevation to 2,400 feet. He hiked back up from Phantom Ranch, which can be 30 degrees warmer than at the rim, through the South Kaibab Trail and also gathered data on other trails.

The so-called trekker captures images every 2.5 seconds with 15 cameras that are 5 megapixels each, from the rest areas, the steep switchbacks, the change from juniper trees to scrub brush and the traffic that moves aside as a courtesy to mule riders.

The GPS data is limited, so Google must compensate with sensors that record temperature, vibrations and the orientation of the device as it changes, before it stitches the images together and makes them available to users in a few months, Falor said.

Fans take to streets after Giants' victory

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Thousands of baseball fans took to the streets of San Francisco to celebrate the Giants' World Series victory, with revelers gathering on corners, in parks and at watering holes — and some turning rowdy.

Fans across the city left their televisions and rushed outside, greeting diners, bar patrons and other merrymakers Sunday night after the Giants defeated the Detroit Tigers 4-3 to sweep the Series for their second title in three years.

Some violence and vandalism was reported, with revelers setting a public transit bus on fire, flipping over a vehicle and breaking the windows of several businesses and vehicles.

Fans also lit bonfires, fueling them with couches, signs and newspaper racks. Firefighters had to be escorted in by riot police to fight some of the fires.

Police made arrests, although the exact number was unknown. A call to a police spokesman by The Associated Press on Monday morning wasn't immediately returned.

At Polk and Bush streets in the city's Polk Gulch neighborhood,

hundreds of fans sprayed champagne, set off firecrackers and blocked traffic for at least two hours after the game. Several blocks away, police clad in riot gear looked on as revelers

danced around Civic Center plaza where they watched the game on the Jumbotron.

The thousands of fans assembled there exploded in a roar with the final out.

Anthony Yos, 10, hugged his brother Luciano Yos, 15 and the two danced in an embrace with their parents.

"This is the greatest thing," Anthony said with a smile that could go no wider. "The Giants are my favorite team."

Someone in the crowd launched fireworks a few minutes after the game and the park was awash with fans, strangers hugging strangers and wine bottles and marijuana cigarettes being freely passed through the crowd despite a heavy police presence.

"This is San Francisco," said Laura Chu. "We know how to party."

Sara Vivas brought her 6-year-old daughter Briana Cepeda from Oakland to view the game and join the celebration. They were both clad head-to-toe in Giants garb.

"This is something she will remember forever," Sara said.

Bars of all stripes, from the

Castro to Chinatown were packed with supporters of the beloved Giants.

So-called pedicabs whisked fans down roads blocked to traffic and revelers enjoyed a New Year's Eve-like freedom to roam up and down streets usually clogged with traffic.

Mayor Edwin Lee announced the ticker-tape parade would be held Wednesday at 11 a.m., down Market Street to Civic Center Plaza.

"The rain in Detroit couldn't dampen the drive, talent and determination of the San Francisco Giants team tonight. Once again, the Giants brought our City together as we all cheered on our hometown heroes to another remarkable World Series victory," he said.

The 2010 parade drew hundreds of thousands fans, who lined the streets of downtown San Francisco. The parade ends at City Hall.

The party started early in Civic Center park, with many showing up hours before the 5 p.m. game on a nice Indian Summer day in San Francisco.

GI Joe, a member of the U.S. Army Pigeon Service, was honored for flying 20 miles (32 kilometers) in 20 minutes with a message that stopped U.S. planes bombing an Italian town occupied by British troops in October 1943, saving the lives of at least 100 Allied soldiers and many civilians.

HEROIC HORSES

Upstart, a London police horse, is one of three equine recipients of the medal.

He was honored for a World War II incident in which a German flying bomb exploded 75 yards away, "showering both horse and rider with broken glass and debris."

Despite this, "Upstart was completely unperturbed and remained quietly on duty with his rider," controlling traffic until

calm was restored.

FEARLESS FELINE

Only one cat has ever received the Dickin Medal.

Simon, a Royal Navy ship's mascot, was honored for his service on HMS Amethyst, a ship shelled by Chinese Communist forces on the Yangtze River in 1949.

Despite being seriously wounded by shrapnel, Simon returned to his rat-killing duties aboard the damaged ship, which was trapped for months in Chinese waters.

"Throughout the incident his behavior was of the highest order," the citation said.

Simon and the ship's crew were greeted as heroes when they made it back to England, but the cat died weeks before he was due to receive his medal.

Hikers that were on the trail when the data was gathered will have their faces blurred — an attempt by Google to ensure privacy. Street View has run into problems in places like Europe and Australia for scooping up information transmitted over unsecured wireless networks.

A removable hard drive on the trekker stores the data gathered at the Grand Canyon. Tourists looked at the trekker strangely this week, as if it was something from outer space.

Sharon Kerfoot, a first-time visitor from Alberta said being able to view the terrain ahead of time, gauge the difficulty of the hike and know just how wide the path is would benefit those considering a trip to the Grand Canyon. She and a group of friends headed down the same path as Vincent but on mules, not foot.

"I think it's an excellent idea to give people a broader perspective on what they're getting into," she said.



NBC making a long-sought comeback

NEW YORK (AP) — During NBC's slow slide to near-irrelevancy in prime time over the past decade, a succession of entertainment executives sat in boardrooms plotting comeback moves that didn't work.

It's still early, but NBC seems finally to have hit upon a plan that is moving things in the right direction. New entertainment chief Bob Greenblatt's baby steps strategy of using the successful competition "The Voice" as its centerpiece has helped NBC stand as the only one of the four big broadcasters to have a larger prime-time audience than it had last fall.

In the 18-to-49-year-old demographic that NBC targets, the network has made a startling move from fourth place to first, winning the first four weeks of the season for the first time since 2002. Among all viewers, it ranks third behind CBS and ABC.

"They needed a hit show to ignite the network," said Marc Berman, an analyst with TV Media Insight, "and now they have it."

Greenblatt, who came to NBC after running Showtime, said he understands the temptation of thinking all of a network's problems can be solved at once. Since that almost never happens, he brought a lesson he learned from cable.

He decided to set one or two priorities and put all of the network's attention on achieving them. In this case, the plan was to build out from NBC's most successful franchise, the Sunday night football game,

and improve the nights right after it.

NBC launched its first-ever fall version of "The Voice" and stretched it to two nights a week — Monday and Tuesday. Greenblatt didn't want to compete directly with Fox's "The X Factor" later in the week, and believed ABC's competing "Dancing With the Stars" was an aging franchise with a greying audience.

"The Voice" has rewarded his confidence and, just as importantly, served as a launching pad for new shows that followed it on the schedule, the drama "Revolution" on Monday and Matthew Perry comedy "Go On" on Tuesday.

Through four weeks, "The Voice" has averaged 14.1 million viewers on Monday night, more than double what "The Sing Off" had in the time slot last year, according to the Nielsen company. "Revolution" has averaged 11.9 million viewers, numbers that include some DVR playback. "The Playboy Club" was a high-profile bust at the same time last year, getting 3.5 million viewers for its third and final episode.

NBC's average in the 18-to-49-year-old demographic on Tuesdays is up 42 percent from 2011, Nielsen said.

The story is different on Wednesday and Thursday, where NBC is down from last year. In fact, Thursday night — NBC's former "must see TV" night — is down 32 percent in the demo compared to a year ago, when it wasn't doing well in the first place.

That's not entirely unexpected, though,

because it wasn't NBC's focus.

"The tendency is to look at the whole week and say, 'oh, we're going to fix this' and 'oh, we're going to fix that on another night,'" Greenblatt said. "You end up spreading out your assets and ultimately your ability to do anything significant. We were really disciplined and diligent this year and said, 'let's try to do one or two things extraordinarily well and let everything else sort of be what it is at the moment.'"

NBC advertised its new shows during the Olympics and even ran sneak previews of "Go On," "Revolution" and "Animal Practice." True to the nature of TV's law of averages, the limp "Animal Practice" has already been cancelled.

Rather than wait for the traditional start of the TV season in the last week of September, NBC started "The Voice" and its new shows a week or two earlier to get people in the habit of watching them.

Greenblatt's ultimate goal is to broaden NBC's appeal. The network's Thursday night comedies probably have more critical plaudits (and Emmy Awards, in the case of "30 Rock") than they have viewers.

"He's trying to make comedies that people will watch," said Bill Gorman, co-founder of the web site TV By the Numbers, "as opposed to comedies like 'Community' and '30 Rock' that have small, rabid fans bases but not a lot of people watching them."

Survey: Economic ills may defy next president

WASHINGTON (AP) — Whoever wins the U.S. presidential election will likely struggle to manage the biggest economic threats he'll face.

That's the cautionary message that emerges from the latest Associated Press Economy Survey.

Europe's recession will persist deep into the next presidential term, according to a majority of the 31 economists who responded to the survey. A weaker European economy would shrink demand for U.S. exports and cost U.S. jobs. Yet there's little the next president can do about it.

An even more urgent threat to the U.S. economy, the economists say, is Congress' failure so far to reach a deal to prevent tax increases and spending cuts from taking effect next year and possibly triggering another recession. Yet as President Barack Obama has found, the White House can't force a congressional accord.

And whether Obama or his Republican challenger Mitt Romney wins Nov. 6, he'll likely have to deal with one chamber of Congress led by the opposing party. Polls suggest the Senate will remain in Democratic hands after the election and the House in Republican control.

"It's not like there's a clean slate for someone to do what they want," says Joshua Shapiro, chief economist at MFR Inc.

Still, there are some ways in which the economists think the White House will be able to drive the economy.

The next president, for example, could help lift growth and reduce unemployment by backing lower individual and corporate taxes and looser business rules, more than 70 percent of the economists say. They think such policies — the core of Romney's economic message — would be more likely to help than would Obama's plans for more spending on public works and targeted tax breaks for businesses.

Only about one in five of the economists say Obama's policies would be more likely to help spur growth and reduce unemployment.

The economists were surveyed before the government estimated Friday that the economy grew at an annual rate of 2 percent in the July-September quarter — too slowly to spur rapid job growth. On Friday, four days before Election Day, the government will issue the jobs report for October.



Experts, travelers say fear of flying treatable

NEW YORK (AP) — Earlier this month, NBA rookie Royce White disclosed that he is afraid to fly and said he expects to travel by bus to play in at least some of the basketball games for his team, the Houston Rockets.

But psychologists who treat fear of flying and travelers who've overcome it hope he'll ditch the bus and get help instead.

"The treatments we have for this are so effective for fear of flying that upwards of 80 percent and sometimes even more people who get the treatment can fly," said psychologist Todd Farchione, of Boston University's Center for Anxiety and Related Disorders, echoing statistics offered by other experts.

Farchione says fear of flying treatment consists of a "fairly standard" combination of cognitive and behavioral therapy. That includes identifying the patient's "fear-provoking thoughts" and challenging them, then getting the patient to "gradually confront" the fear, by imagining flying and then doing it. Some programs use flight simulators or virtual reality programs; others put patients on airplanes on the ground and in the air, accompanied by counselors.

Either way, "the core of treatment is exposure" to the sensations of flying, said psychologist John Hart, who treats fear of flying at the Menninger Clinic in Houston, where patients can use a flight simulator that "has noise and shakes your chair."

"It's like the cockpit of a plane, with video screens that look like windows and show the ground and various airports," Hart says. "It vibrates, bounces, takes off

and lands and has different kinds of weather."

Lisa Fabrega, a detox and lifestyle coach who lives in North Bergen, N.J., was cured by a Freedom to Fly workshop at White Plains Hospital's Anxiety & Phobia Treatment Center in White Plains, N.Y. The program included sitting in a plane on the ground at a small airport and meeting a retired American Airlines captain.

"We got to bombard him with our most paranoid questions," Fabrega said.

Before she took the class, she said, "even thinking about getting on a plane would make me break into a sweat." She learned to visualize herself on a plane and deal with her feelings.

The White Plains program also encourages various types of exposure therapy, like riding a Ferris wheel, the Empire State Building's SkyRide attraction or an aerial tramway.

Georgia store offers gun raffle tickets to all voters

ATLANTA (AP) — Want a chance to win a rifle or handgun? Go vote. That's the message from an Atlanta-area sporting goods store.

The promotion caught the attention of the secretary of state's office last week and drew a complaint from a state senator who said it may break the law.

Georgia law prohibits anyone from giving or receiving money or gifts in exchange for voting, and felony charges could be brought if the law were broken, Secretary of State Brian Kemp said in a statement.

Eight billboards for Adventure Outdoors urge people to bring in their "I voted" sticker to enter a raffle for a Glock handgun or Browning rifle.

The secretary of state's office warned the store owner that offering the raffle only to people who voted may be violating the law.

Store owner Jay Wallace said the raffle was open to anyone, even those who don't vote.

"Getting people involved is what it's all about," Wallace said Wednesday. "I would encourage other businesses to do the same thing."

No action will be taken as long as Wallace allows anyone to enter the contest, said Jared Thomas, a spokesman for the secretary of state's office.

"Should they violate what they told our office they would do, then that

will be taken into account and actions will be taken accordingly," Thomas said.

Democratic State Sen. Vincent Fort of Atlanta filed a complaint Tuesday, saying businesses are not even allowed under the law to offer free food or drinks to voters.

"Now that that they've expanded it and allow all customers to participate, I think it's a legal raffle," Fort said. "I don't have any objections to it if it complies with the law."

Reaction to the raffle has been "almost 100 percent positive," Wallace said.

"We received some almost slanderous emails," he added. "I would say they're on the side of not liking guns,

to put it mildly."

At the store in the Atlanta suburb of Smyrna, reaction was mixed among customers.

"I think people should go vote because they're interested in the topics of what's being voted for, whether it's the president or your local judge," said Ernest Susco. "To promote giving a gun away for someone to go to vote, I'm not crazy about that idea."

John Keels, another customer, said it was a "pretty good idea."

"Well, since this is probably the most important election in my lifetime, anything that gets the public out to vote is good as long as it doesn't break the law," Keels said.

2,000 sheep led through Spain's capital

MADRID — Spanish shepherds led a flock of more than 2,000 sheep through central Madrid on Sunday in defense of ancient grazing, migration and droving rights threatened by urban sprawl and modern agricultural practices.

Many tourists and residents were surprised to see traffic cut to allow the ovine parade to bleat its way across some of Madrid's most upscale urban streets.

The right to use droving routes that wind across land that was open fields and woodland before Madrid grew from a rural hamlet to the great metropolis it is today has existed since at least 1273.

Every year, a handful of shepherds defend the right and, following an age-old tradition, on Sunday paid 25 maravedis — coins first minted in the 11th century — to city hall to use the crossing.

Shepherds have a right to use 78,000 miles of paths for seasonal livestock migrations from cool highland pastures in summer to warmer and more protected lowland grazing in winter.

The movement is called transhumance and in Spain up until recently involved close to a million animals a year, mostly sheep and cattle.

Modern farming practices are however increasingly confining animals to barns, because shepherding is costly, according to the Ministry of Agriculture, which has been promoting the colorful annual Transhumance Fiesta in Madrid since 1994.

Glasgow airport gets a surprise snake

LONDON — Scottish airport staff got a slithery surprise when they stumbled on a Mexican serpent stowaway under a seat.

The Scottish Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals says quick-thinking workers at Glasgow Airport remained "remarkably calm" when they discovered the 18-inch (45-centimeter) snake Tuesday under seats in the passenger cabin of a flight from Cancun, Mexico.

It says the young snake was taken to its Glasgow animal center, and has been named Furtivo, Spanish for "sneak."

It said Friday that Furtivo, a member of the Dryadophis family of snakes, was non-venomous but "feisty." The snake may have snuck onto the plane before take-off, or hitched a ride in a passenger's hand luggage.

The society says Furtivo will remain in its care until an expert home can be found.

Shark falls from sky onto golf course

SAN JUAN CAPISTRANO, Calif. — Golf club employees in Southern California came to the rescue when a shark dropped out of the sky and flopped around on the 12th tee.

San Juan Hills Golf Club operations director Melissa McCormack says a course marshal found the leopard shark Monday afternoon and brought it to the clubhouse. It had puncture wounds where it appeared a bird had snagged it from the Pacific Ocean, about five miles away.

They stuck the about 2-pound shark into fresh water before somebody remembered it came from the sea, so they got some sea salt from the kitchen and mixed it in.

Another employee rushed the shark to the ocean where McCormack says it was very still for a few seconds before twisting around and speeding off.

Report: Inmate steals money, walks out

SANTA FE, N.M. — A New Mexico inmate on his way out of jail was quickly thrown back in after authorities say he stole

another inmate's cash then treated himself to a hearty lunch.

The Santa Fe County Sheriff's Office told KOATV that 20-year-old Frank Rodriguez-Tapia swiped \$80 in cash while a guard's back was turned as Rodriguez-Tapia was walking out of jail. The money belonged to another inmate who was just coming into the Santa Fe jail and going through booking.

Police say Rodriguez-Tapia was supposed to report immediately to the electronic monitoring office, but bought lunch at Blake's Lotaburger. He later admitted to the theft, turned over the remaining \$67 and was sent back to jail.

School bus, truck crash without drivers

BEAVER FALLS, Pa. — Police don't plan to cite

the drivers of a truck and school bus which crashed in western Pennsylvania.

But only because neither vehicle had a driver when they wrecked.

Police in Patterson Township tell the Beaver County Times the incident happened just before 10 a.m. Tuesday when the parked bus began to roll down a hill. Police aren't sure why that happened, because the driver had engaged

the parking brake.

The bus rear-ended a parked truck, which also began rolling down the hill alongside the bus, until the truck flipped onto its side. The bus continued on, shearing off one utility pole and hitting another before rolling to a stop a few feet from the porch of a home.

Nobody was hurt. Patterson Township is about 30 miles northwest of Pittsburgh.


