A bear of a problem

Growing rural population causes friction between humans and bears

Santa Rosa and Okaloosa counties appear to have a bear of a problem with almost 600 registered complaints with the FWC. Recently, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission euthanized an

adult black bear in the Wynn Haven Beach community of Mary Esther, because the female bear had killed a pet and livestock. The bear that had to be put down reportedly had raised two litters of cubs and had been active in several neighborhoods in the area for a few years, but she suddenly became more bold and

protective of her cubs. As people move out to more remote locations, the availability of human-provided foods like trash, bird seed and pet food in neighborhoods can cause a bear to completely lose its natural fear of people. After multiple attempts, the FWC gave up trying to trap the mother bear on

Nov. 29. Her two cubs were captured and relocated northwest of Wynn Haven Beach onto Eglin Air Force Base property. Though cubs normally stay with their mothers for 18 months, the chances of these cubs to survive is relatively good. "The cubs have been with their mother long enough that they are no lon-

ger fully dependent on her," FWC Bear Management Program coordinator Dave Telesco said. "Remember though that the worst thing people can do is to feed the relocated cubs. "The best chance they have at survival is if they can learn to stay in the woods and not rely on people." The 250-pound female

and her 100-pound cubs were much heavier than typical Florida bears living in the woods. Bears grow larger and produce more cubs when they have regular access to human-provided foods, which increases the number of bears living in neighborhoods and causes

Milton juvenile facility worker charged

A worker at the Milton Girls Juvenile Residential Facility was arrested Dec. 4 and charged with battery of a client.


Shannon Linn Abbott, 33, of Milton, was charged with battery stemming from an incident that allegedly occurred on Aug. 9.

Abbott has been released from the Santa Rosa County Jail after posting a bond of \$2,500.

Attempts to contact the Gulf Coast Youth Services in Fort Walton Beach to see if Abbott is still on staff have been unsuccessful at this time.

The Department of Juvenile Justice, which owns the building managed by Gulf Coast Youth Services, issued the following statement on Monday.

"The Florida Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) is aware of the incident at the Milton Girls Juvenile Residential Facility, a contract provider of residential services. The incident is under investigation by local law enforcement, the Florida Department of Children and Families and the DJJ inspector general (IG)," said DJJ Secretary Wansley Walters. "When we were made aware of the incident, our IG immediately notified local law enforcement and began an investigation to protect the residents. Furthermore, DJJ residential staff acted to ensure the safety of the victim since the incident.

The Milton Girls Juvenile Residential Facility is a moderate risk, 60-bed commitment program for the Department of Juvenile Justice serving females ages 13-18. Shannon Linn Abbott, an employee of the facility, is charged with battery on a resident on Aug. 9. She was arrested on Dec. 4 following an ongoing investigation by the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office.

"DJJ will not tolerate activities which place the youth for whom we are responsible in harm's way, including those under the supervision of our contract providers."

According to the warrant obtained from the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office, Abbott allegedly is seen in two security camera

videos leading the victim with her arms secured: "the defendant's arm was under the victim's arm at the elbow from behind."

Investigators in their report indicate the victim shows no signs of resisting Abbott.

"The victim is observed not pulling her arms away from the

defendant; the victim is not attempting to strike the defendant in any manner and is compliant throughout the entire event."

According to the warrant and arrest report, Abbott is alleged to have stopped the victim facing a

Postal scam carries virus

Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office Crime Prevention is warning the public about an email that appear to be from the United States Postal Service but is not.

With holiday shipping just around the corner, the sheriff's office warns residents to be aware of emails that appear to come from the USPS or other well-known shipping companies.

These bogus emails contain a link or attachment that, when opened, installs a malicious virus that can steal personal information from your PC. The emails claim to be from the USPS and contain fraudulent information about packages, online postal charges, erroneous addresses or instructions on how to print your own shipping label by clicking on a link or attachment.

Delete the message and report these spam emails to spam@usps.gov.

The USPS offers consumers a way to create and print a mailing label online through Click-N-Ship, but you must first go to their website, www.usps.com, where you will be asked to create an account using a username and password.

Friday afternoon, the Santa Rosa Press Gazette received calls concerning the flag at the Milton Post Office flying like any other day.

Apparently the person who put the flag out forgot Friday was the 71st anniversary of Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor.

This attack led us to fight World War II in two separate military theaters.

Here are some of the comments we received after posting the photo.

Jerry C. Cummings: I think flying the flag at half mast is appropriate and patriotic. How soon we forget our dramatic history and the lives that Americans lost defending our once great country.

I suppose the post office feels it's no longer necessary to show love of country and that is very sad.

Ask the Preacher

...a weekly column answering your questions with Biblical answers about life.

Dear Pastor Gallups – “Is it correct to make our prayers TO the Holy Spirit or TO Jesus himself - or should all our prayers be made TO the Father...?” E.P. Milton

Dear E.P.,

Prayer is the vehicle for a living, breathing, daily and personal relationship with God. Prayer is talking to and listening to God.

Now - do we make our prayers to the Father, Son or Holy Spirit? First consider that the Father, Son and Spirit are three - yet according to the Scripture - they are ONE. So in that since of biblical understanding it should not matter if your prayer is directed to the Father or the Son or the Holy Spirit. However, to be the most excellent about our prayer life there is a predominate biblical pattern which unfolds in the pages of scripture.

We are told that Jesus opened the way for us to approach the throne of God. Jesus told us that whatever we ask the Father in his name - he would provide for us. Certainly people approached Jesus in prayer-like conversations. He received those prayers. The Bible ends with a prayer to Jesus - Even so, come lord Jesus come! I cannot imagine that from time to time there would be anything wrong with praying something like - Holy Spirit of God - would you give me wisdom or courage in this matter or would you illuminate this scripture so that I might understand it. I think the point is - again - to be the most excellent - the most biblical - our daily prayer life should be directed to our Father in Heaven, in the Name of Jesus - as we approach him in The Holy Spirit.

The main thing, though...is to PRAY!





BEAR SAFETY TIPS

- Feed your pets indoors or bring in dishes after feeding.
- Secure household garbage in a shed, garage or a wildlife-resistant container.
- Put household garbage out on the morning of pickup, not the night before.
- Secure commercial garbage in bear-resistant dumpsters with metal lids or metal-reinforced plastic lids and lock bars.
- Clean grills and store them in a locked, secure place.
- Remove wildlife feeders, or make them bear-resistant.
- Protect gardens, apiaries, compost and livestock with electric fencing.
- Pick ripe fruit from trees and remove fallen fruit from the ground.
- Encourage your homeowners association or local government to institute ordinances on keeping foods secure that would attract wildlife.

human-bear conflicts.

"This situation was preventable. If those bears did not have easy access to trash and other human-provided foods, they would likely have just passed through the neighborhood," Telesco said.

Since May 1 of this year, 312 bear complaints have been logged with the FWC in Santa Rosa County, while 267 bear reports have come from neighboring Okaloosa County.

Though black bears don't necessarily need to put on pounds to survive the state's usually mild winters, they behave as if they do — eating about three times as much as usual to pack on the pounds.

One way to help the bears is to be extra diligent in securing food sources around homes and businesses that can attract bears and create problems.

"Preventing bears' access to food is the most important thing people can do to keep bears and other wild animals out of neighborhoods," said Capt. Rob Beaton, area supervisor

for the FWC. "If you are a Florida black bear, raiding a garbage can to eat leftovers may be more appealing than foraging in the woods for palmetto berries and acorns."

It is against the law to have food and attractants out for bears to access. And as bears are looking for food, the easier a food item is to get, the more likely it is that a bear will take advantage of it.

"Conflicts between Florida black bears and people are preventable," Beaton said. "Most people who follow the FWC's advice on how to bear-proof their homes and businesses don't have conflicts with these large and powerful wild animals."

The FWC has a wide variety of options from which people can choose to secure garbage and other items that attract bears. Go to MyFWC.com/Bear or call the Northwest Regional Office at 265-3676 for additional information.

wall and is observed repositioning her current grip on the victim's arm hold.

"The defendant's forearms are now wrapped around the victim's arms at her elbows with the defendant's hands clinched together and positioned into the middle of the victim's back," the report stated. "After (Abbott) repositions her grip, she moved her stance closer to the victim from behind."

According to investigator Larry Tynes' report, the victim was about two feet away from the cement cinder block wall when Abbott allegedly thrusts herself toward the victim in a very forceful manner, using her upper and lower body strength, pushing the victim violently into the cement wall.

Tynes' report reiterates before this action the victim is observed in a compliant state and is not moving or

resisting.

The report stated the victim's chest area and chin bounced off the wall.

A few seconds later, with the victim still against the wall, Abbott is reported to be speaking into the victim's left ear.

"Seconds later the defendant stops speaking to the victim and pulls the victim with great force and violently throws the victim to the floor while restraining the victim's arms behind their back."

Abbott is alleged to have landed on top of the victim's back with her full weight.

The report indicated the victim weighs 148 pounds and that Abbott's observed size is much greater than the victim's as depicted in the video.

When investigators attempted to speak to Abbott she said she was going to have a lawyer present before she spoke.

Abbott never contacted the investigators attached to the case after Nov. 14.

According to a report submitted by Abbott on Aug. 9 to facility director Carol Andrus, Abbott alleged the victim struggled and hit her with her elbow several times.

Abbott indicated in a Protective Action Response form that she asked the victim to stop, and she would strike her harder and resist to get her arms free.

Investigators in their report indicated this statement by Abbott was not depicted on the video received by the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office.

According to the Gulf Coast Youth Services' website, the Milton Girls Juvenile Residential Facility is a moderate risk, 60-bed commitment program for the Department of Juvenile Justice serving females ages 13-18.

"I know the hard work I have put in paid off, and now I want to go and do the same at Brenau."



Area business turns glass into yard treasures

If you're tired of seeing your same old yardscape day in and day out, perhaps you need to spruce it up a bit. And the people you need to see about that are Kathryn Livermore and Jane Jennings at K & J's Garden.

K & J's Garden in Jay can furnish unique accessories for your garden, yard or any outdoor area that will simply make it come alive! And although glass is their primary choice in building their unique garden ornaments, they can and do use other material of stone and special metals.

And although Kathryn and Jane are relatively young at plying their trade, they have developed some of the most extraordinary figurines and other outdoor ornaments that are head-turners.

The sisters have always shown artistic and creative talent, but never until recently thought about sharing it with the public. And now that they have, Kathryn says their products are being very well received.

The artifacts that they construct are unusual in both form and material. Glass items are put together with metal fasteners for durability. Glue is never used. "That's what makes them durable as well as attractive," Kathryn said. "Wood has a limited life outdoors because it decays. Glass and stone, on the other hand are material that lasts." They also make birdbaths and special custom designed structures, as well as floral designs.

Unusual glass designs are their most popular items. They are not easy to make, but the finished product is beautiful as well as unusual. Working with glass is very painstaking, Kathryn said. It takes dedication as well as skill, and it's something that has to be learned. "My hands are a good example of the learning process," she said.

The business was introduced to the public at the Jay Peanut Festival in this past October, and again at

the recent Jay Cotton Festival. Word of mouth and other verbal means are about the only advertising that has been done. "But people are interested, and that makes a difference.

Kathryn says that plans are underway to put the business online by spring. That will give the public access to what is available. Pictures speak louder than words.



Romney’s ‘47 percent’ chosen as year’s best quote



NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — Former Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney’s comments about 47 percent of the population dependent on the government and “binders full of women” topped this year’s best quotes, according to a Yale University librarian. Fred Shapiro, associate librarian at Yale Law School, released his seventh annual list of the most notable quotations of the year. “Debate remarks and gaffes actually seemed to play an important role in the ups and downs of the election campaign and may even have affected the ultimate outcome of the election,” Shapiro said. Romney, who lost the November election to President Barack Obama, made the 47 percent comment at a private fundraiser in May that was


secretly recorded and posted online in September by Mother Jones magazine. “There are 47 percent of the people who will vote for the president no matter what ... who are dependent upon government, who believe that they are victims. ... These are people who pay no income tax. ... and so my job is not to worry about those people. I’ll never convince them that they should take personal responsibility and care for their lives,” Romney said. Romney spoke about reviewing “binders full of women” as governor when he sought to diversify his Massachusetts administration. “It contributed to an image of him as being somewhat out of touch and maybe particularly out of touch with issues related to women,” Shapiro said.

Obama made the list, too, for his “you didn’t build that” comment, his contention that people who built businesses had help, from teachers, family and other supporters — and sometimes the government. “It was probably the leading line that Obama wished he hadn’t made during this year,” Shapiro said. Obama’s “horses and bayonets” debate rebuke of Romney in an exchange over the size of the Navy also made the list. The original “Yale Book of Quotations” was published in 2006, and Shapiro has updated it with an annual list of the top 10 quotes. Shapiro picks quotes that are famous, important or revealing of the spirit of the times, not necessarily ones that are the most eloquent or admirable.

WVU mascot told to stop firing musket at wildlife

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) — The musket touted by West Virginia University’s Mountaineer isn’t just a prop — it’s a bona fide weapon, and mascot Jonathan Kimble demonstrated that when he brought down a black bear with it in the woods.

Now WVU has ordered Kimble to stop using his university-issued weapon on hunting trips after a video of this week’s kill was posted online. He says hunting with the gun is a Mountaineer mascot tradition.

The 24-year-old Franklin resident accompanied more than a dozen friends and family on the trip in Pendleton County on Monday. In the video, Kimble is shown firing the musket at the bear in a tree.

“Let’s go Mountaineers!” Kimble yells afterward. He also posted a photo of himself with the bear on Twitter.

The WVU mascot wears buckskin and a coonskin cap and fires the musket — loaded with black powder but minus ammunition — at home athletic events and other sponsored



activities. Hunting isn’t one of them.

“While Jonathan Kimble’s actions broke no laws or regulations, the university has discussed this with him, and he agrees that it would be appropriate to forego using the musket in this way in the future,” said WVU spokesman John Bolt.

Kimble said Friday he has been hunting all his life, and this was the first black bear he’s ever killed. He said all his friends have congratulated him for that.

“Hunting can be a controversial topic,” Kimble said. “I apologize to any of those who took offense to the video. It

definitely wasn’t my intent to offend anybody.”

Kimble said he taking the musket on hunting trips has become a tradition with the mascots.

“Other Mountaineers have gone and shot multiple deer with it before. I’ve taken it with me deer hunting before, also.”

Some WVU fans stood behind Kimble on Friday.

“This is a smart young man from West Virginia who did nothing wrong, who was celebrating who he is,” said Robert Hickman, who holds two degrees from WVU and lives near Fairmont.

“If you’re from West Virginia and you love the outdoors, or if you hunt or don’t hunt, or if you fish or don’t fish, it is a celebration of this state. As a former WVU graduate, I’m thrilled to death with him. Happy as can be.”

The Mountaineer mascot first appeared at athletic events in the 1936-1937 school year. The Mountaineer is selected each year and the mascot’s outfit is custom tailored to fit the winner.

Police cordoned off Whitehall, a street that is home to several government departments, as Motrescu climbed up and down the statue, at one point balancing himself on the duke’s head.

It took several hours for officers to talk him down.

Motrescu, a Ukrainian citizen of no fixed address, was convicted Tuesday of possession of an offensive weapon, criminal damage and a public order offense. A magistrate sentenced him to 12 weeks in jail.

Washington begins creation of legal weed market

SEATTLE (AP) — People openly lit joints under the Space Needle and on Seattle's sidewalks — then blew the smoke at TV news cameras. To those looking to “get baked,” the city's police department suggested pizza and a “Lord of the Rings” movie marathon.


What, exactly, is going on in Washington state?

Marijuana possession became legal under state law Dec. 6, the day a measure approved by voters to regulate marijuana like alcohol took effect. It prompted midnight celebrations from pot activists who say the war on drugs has failed.

But as the dawn of legalization arrives, Washington and Colorado, where a similar law passed last month, now face some genuinely complicated dilemmas: How on Earth do you go about creating a functioning, legal weed market? How do you ensure adults the freedom to use pot responsibly, or not so responsibly, while keeping it away from teenagers?

And perhaps most pressing, will the Justice Department just stand by while the states issue licenses to the growers, processors and sellers of a substance that, under federal law, remains very much illegal?

“We're building this from

from the marijuana fairy.

In Colorado, where pot fans will also be able to grow their own plants, the law takes effect by Jan. 5.

The other part of the measures, the regulatory schemes, are trickier. Washington's Liquor Control Board, which has been regulating alcohol for 78 years, has a year to adopt rules for the fledgling pot industry: How many growers, processors and stores should there be in each county? Should there be limits on potency? How should the pot be inspected, packaged and labeled?

To help answer those questions, officials will turn to experts in the field — including police, public policy experts and some of the state's many purveyors of medical marijuana. Smith anticipates undercover monitoring operations to make sure the private, state-licensed stores aren't selling to minors.

With legalization, officials need to look at some of the measures that have been shown to reduce teen drinking, said Derek Franklin, president of the Washington Association for Substance Abuse and Violence Prevention. That includes public education about the risks of pot use and driving while stoned, emphasizing patrols to look for stoned drivers and

encouraging cities to adopt laws that hold parents accountable if they host parties at which kids are provided marijuana.

“We're really going to need to get all hands on deck to sort through this,” he said.

The marijuana will be taxed heavily, with revenues possibly reaching hundreds of millions of dollars a year for schools, health care, basic government services and substance abuse prevention.

Unless, of course, the Justice Department has something to say about it.

Few people question the states' ability to simply remove all penalties under their own laws for marijuana. The federal government would remain free to raid state-licensed growers or stores and prosecute those involved in federal court, just as they remain free to shut down medical marijuana dispensaries in states with medical marijuana laws.

Whether a state can regulate an illegal substance is another question. Many constitutional law scholars say the answer is no: Washington and Colorado's regulatory schemes obviously conflict with marijuana's prohibition in the federal Controlled Substances Act, and when state and federal laws conflict, the feds win

out, they say.

So the Justice Department could likely sue to block the regulatory schemes. But will it? What's better, from the administration's perspective — an ounce of weed legalized with regulation or an ounce of weed legalized with no oversight?

The department has given no hints about its plans.

While pot fans wait for an answer, they are partying. Though Washington's law prohibits smoking in public, about 200 gathered under the Space Needle for a New Year's Eve-style countdown to midnight. A few dozen gathered on a sidewalk outside the north Seattle headquarters of the annual Hempfest celebration and did the same, offering joints to reporters.

“I feel like a kid in a candy store!” shouted Hempfest volunteer Darby Hageman. “It's all becoming real now!”

The Seattle Police Department emailed its 1,300 officers, telling them not to write any citations for smoking pot in public until further notice. A voter initiative passed in 2003 made marijuana enforcement the department's lowest priority, and for years officers have looked the other way while thousands light up at Hempfest.

the ground all the way up,” said Brian Smith, spokesman for the Washington Liquor Control Board, which is charged with regulating the drug. “The initiative didn't just wave a magic wand and make everybody here an expert on marijuana.”

The measures approved Nov. 6 have two main facets. First, they OK the possession of up to an ounce of marijuana by adults over 21. That took effect Thursday in Washington, though it remains illegal — for now — to sell pot, so people have to keep getting it

'Girls,' 'Homeland,' 'Smash' among year's best TV

"Breaking Bad" (AMC). It's notable not only for how twisted, funny and shocking it is, but also for how it keeps on upping the ante. This summer's satisfying miniseries ended in a most unlikely fashion, hinting that Walter White (series star Bryan Cranston) might actually break free from his life of spiraling disaster and resurrect his happy home. But then, in the last scene, Walter's drug-enforcement-agent brother-in-law made the connection that had always eluded him: the drug lord he's been chasing all this time is Walter! Once again, the series' never-broken promise was upheld.

"Fox & Friends" (Fox News Channel). With their three-part harmony, co-hosts Steve Doocy, Gretchen Carlson and Brian Kilmeade offer up a unique brand of jovially partisan delivery. There is a seamless, finish-one-another's-sentence knack for issuing the network-designated messages as news. Contrary viewpoints are admissible only to be mocked. But mostly cheerful unity prevails, a tidy single-minded package of riffs as predictable as the tides — but as amusing as any deliberate caricature.


"Girls" (HBO). Lena Dunham this, Lena Dunham that. Blah, blah, blah. She, in her mid-20s, created, wrote, directed, produced and starred in a half-hour comedy series about 20-something adulthood, femininity and sexuality. She

sparked adulation, conversation, arguments and green-eyed envy of her talent. "Girls" was a series that couldn't be ignored — at least, by pop-culture cognoscenti. It will surely be welcomed back in January with even more attention, if possible, as viewers resume arguing: Does the series measure up to all the hype? Nuff said. Up to now, indisputably, "Girls" has been monumental. And a gas.

"Here Comes Honey Boo Boo" (TLC) and "Killer Karaoke" (truTV). Two new reality shows blazed new trails of idiocy. One capitalized on redneck stereotypes and a 6-year-old beauty pageant veteran. The other invited contestants to sing their hearts out while being zapped with electricity or dunked in a vat of snakes. In a TV universe swamped with reality shows, these two stood apart as groundbreaking, inspired and dismaying — if for no other reason than they served as a reminder that each is merely a way station en route to the next extreme in outrageous crassness.



'LUCK'

"Homeland" (Showtime). In its second season, this series remained suspenseful, disturbing and riddled with surprises. It mined drama from possibly the most damaged pair of protagonists, opponents and star-crossed lovers in TV history. Marine Sgt. Nicholas Brody (Damian Lewis) was a prisoner of war in Afghanistan who had returned home a national hero and soon-to-be-elected U.S. Congressman — and, covertly, a terrorist turncoat. Carrie Mathison (Claire Danes) was a former CIA agent suffering from a bipolar disorder as well as emotional ties to the man she was obsessed with bringing down. They could have titled this series "Homeland Insecurity."

"Key & Peele" (Comedy Central). The biracial status of comedy partners Keegan-Michael Key and Jordan Peele (black fathers, white mothers) is notable only because it gives them unique insight sizing up the human condition. And they made the most of that insight

on their sketch-and-standup half-hour series. In particular, they scored with Peele in an unsurpassed impersonation of Obama where the unflappable president is joined by Key as "anger translator" Luther, who demonstrates, comically unfiltered, what Obama really thinks. But whatever they did, the humor of Key and Peele proved fresh and smart. And without ever preaching, they illustrated how the issue of race (in their words) "always boomerangs back to culture" and ultimately "is an absurd thing." Doggone funny, too.

"Luck" (HBO). This drama set at a California racetrack boasted the rich density of David Milch's writing and a king's ransom of a cast: Dustin Hoffman, Nick Nolte, Dennis Farina, Jill Hennessy and Richard Kind for starters. It explored a strange and fascinating world while capturing the horse races with breathtaking footage. But three horses died during production of the series. That sad fact, and another — the show wasn't

exactly a ratings blockbuster — led to HBO canceling "Luck" after its first season, in a bow to bad publicity led by animal-rights activists. Amid the hubbub about the horses' welfare, there was a question no one seemed inclined to ask: Assuming every reasonable precaution had been taken, was risking the lives of a few horses an excessive price to pay to keep an excellent drama series on the air?

"Smash" (NBC). This NBC musical drama put a bright, sexy sheen on one of film's most timeless tropes: Hey, kids, let's put on a show! Which "Smash" did, embedding songs and dance into the story of how a Broadway musical comes to life. Sure, "Smash" took knocks for unbelievable plotlines, cardboard characters and trite show tunes. With a show-must-go-on defiance emblematic of Broadway, "Smash" never flagged in its unique charm and meticulous artistry.

"Sons of Anarchy" (FX). Tough guys on motorcycles selling guns and drugs. Tough women keeping them in line, or trying. Rival gangs, corrupt cops and a club membership in turmoil. Jax (Charlie Hunnam), his mother, Gemma (Katey Sagal), and her husband, Clay (Ron Perlman), were the core of a series that, in its fifth season, raged wilder than ever. A family drama set in a hard-hitting workplace, "Sons" was bloodthirsty and brilliant like nothing else on TV. Its audience knew what its characters found out: there was no escaping its excitement.


