With green and white ribbons pinned to their shirts and candles in hand, about 200 community members stood on the Pace Athletic and Recreation Association's football field Wednesday night singing "Silent Night" and bowing their heads in prayer.

Although there was a Christmas tree lit on the field, the

gathering wasn't to celebrate the holidays. The group was taking a moment from their busy lives to remember victims of the Sandy Hook Elementary School shootings.

"We can never imagine the hurt and pain they feel," Pastor Wayne Blocker of Community of Christ Church of

Milton said. "(But we can) continue to pray God's peace surrounds them now and the days to follow.

"I know they feel our love from this small community to their small community," he said.

The tragedy in Newtown, Conn., took place more than 1,200 miles away from Pace, but Jason Zdon Sr. of Milton said he wants to see the local community learn from it.

"I woke up Sunday morning and just realized that this needed to be

Abbott's charges upgraded to felony

Charges against a juvenile detention supervisor who was arrested in early December for alleged battery against a 15-year-old have been upgraded to a felony, according to State Attorney Bill Eddins.

Eddins issued a press release Thursday saying Shannon Linn Abbott, 33, Milton will face child abuse charges — a third degree felony — based on several factors. Maximum potential sentence for Abbott could be five years in prison.

Assistant State Attorney James Parker said criteria for the upgraded charges are based on several factors. After reviewing reports from the Department of Children and Families; the Santa Rosa

Death leads to abuse hotline overhaul

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The Florida Department of Children and Families announced last week it recently implemented a new child-abuse hotline tracking system — one designed to be faster and more accurate.

The upgrade was brought about after the death of Nubia Barahona, a 10-year-old South Florida girl, in 2011. The Barahona Investigative Panel discovered after the incident multiple calls had been made to the center about Nubia's situation, but because of the old system, some information was incomplete or inaccurate and, South Florida investigators say they had to do their own research.

DOT: East Milton portion of U.S. 90 road work complete

Work on Avalon Boulevard continues

Motorists using U.S. 90 East can breathe a sigh of relief. There will be no more lane closures and one-way traffic funneling resulting in long waits.

Resurfacing the highway from a few yards east of the Local Yonel to the east end of the old brick

road has ended, according to the Florida Department of Transportation. Some areas of the highway were widened, and new turn lanes were added for safety.

The five-mile stretch of road construction added a westbound left and an eastbound turn lane off Persimmon Hollow Road. An extended right turn lane at Industrial Boulevard also was extended.

The 11-month, \$1.8 million project also included some sidewalk construction and American with Disabilities Act improvements. The usual drainage and

safety features were part of the overall project, as were new, visible pavement markings.

U.S. 90 East serves a heavily populated area including the Santa Rosa County Industrial Park, the alternate travel route to the south end of the county on Highway 87, and residents east to the Okaloosa County boundary.

A midweek update from FDOT indicates the following:

• **U.S. 90 to Commerce Road:** Crews from Panhandle Grading & Paving Company have begun laying the final layer of asphalt. Drivers can expect intermittent lane

restrictions from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Estimated completion: winter 2013.

• **North of CSX Railroad Bridge to south of Commerce Road:** No work took place this week on this section of Avalon Boulevard. Estimated completion: winter 2013.

• **South of Moors Lodge to CSX Railroad:** Crews continue to work on roadway construction including milling of the existing roadway, drainage, embankment and placement of sod. No planned lane closures at this time. Estimated completion: fall 2013.

• **Interstate 10 to south of the Moors**

Lodge: Crews continue construction activities for the future southbound roadway between Del Monte and San Juan streets. Bridge construction continues for the future two lane northbound roadway. Sidewalk, curb and gutter construction between San Juan Street and San Pablo Streets will continue. Erosion control devices continue to be maintained throughout the project. Estimated completion: fall 2013. Construction activities are weather-dependent and may be delayed or rescheduled in the event of inclement weather.

"(The hotline) has had upgrades over the years as technology changes, but this is first massive redesign ... We started from scratch," said Erin Gillespie, DCF spokeswoman.

Improvements include new online abuse reporting technology and better gathering capabilities to help investigators assess the risk of a case early in the process. Reporting technology now will take hotline counselors through a series of questions while pulling information from previous calls and law enforcement.

"It has been made more of an automated process, instead of relying on each counselor to ask the right questions," Gillespie said.

A \$7 million appropriation from the Legislature funded the new statewide system and provided about 40 new call center jobs.

The new system will

affect local DCF offices by providing more information up front to investigators. The new system also will make sure efforts aren't being duplicated by mistakes, such as different spellings of a child's name.

"Before, if someone called the hotline and gave the name of a kid and someone called later and spelled the name using a different letter, two separate investigators would be put on the case," Gillespie said. "If didn't happen constantly, but it did occur. Now, we've streamlined the process. Things like this will match up in the system, and we won't duplicate efforts."

The new system is designed to make it easier for law enforcement and school personnel by improving the online reporting tool.

done," he said.

Zdon said he has never organized anything like the vigil before, but he has found an overflowing support from the community. Wal-Mart donated candles, Home Depot donated a Christmas tree and several friends and family helped spread the word about the event.

As a father of four, basketball coach and Vice President of Football on the PARA Board of Directors, Zdon has many children he holds close to his heart.

"I have four boys ... ages 17, 15, 9 and 7 ... and I coach basketball. This hit home," he said. "Being a coach, they're not just kids I teach, they're like my own."

Zdon said he wanted the community to get more out of the vigil.

"If someone needs help, they need to know they can find it in the community. And we also need to look at other people, because not everyone will ask for help," he said. "We need to realize it's not just about us."

SandyHookElementary

School in Newtown, Conn., was the scene of the nation's second-deadliest shooting in U.S. history on Dec. 14 when a mentally disturbed 20-year-old opened fire on small children, killing 20 between the ages of 6 and 7. Officials say he killed six adults at the school, including the school's principal and guidance counselor and at least one teacher who protected her students by lying to the shooter. The mother of the shooter was found dead at her home. Some speculate that her plans to have her son committed to a mental health facility might have triggered his anger and led to the shootings.

The unprecedented killing sparked a national debate on gun control; a visit to the town by President Barack Obama; a national period of mourning with flags at half-staff across the country; a Facebook page with 316,000 "likes" in less than a week (Sandy Hook Elementary School Massacre Memorial Page); and a nationwide sense of community in the loss of young, innocent lives.

Sheriff's Office; and the Department of Juvenile Justice, Child Protection Team, officials determined Abbott's actions met the criteria.

Parker said because Abbott was in a position of authority over the victim; the victim is under the age of 18; and the "significant injury" to the victim, felony child abuse charges apply. He described the injuries to the victim in this case as, "carpet burns, bruising around the eye and swelling around the face." He said initially, it was believed the victim had a fracture, but that later was determined not to be the case.

Reports say the injuries happened Aug. 9 at the facility. The incident was recorded on security cameras.

According to the warrant obtained from the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office, Abbott allegedly is seen in two security camera videos leading the victim with her arm secured.

Investigators indicate the victim shows no signs of resisting Abbott.

"The victim is observed not pulling her arms away from the defendant; the victim is not attempting to strike the defendant in any manner and is compliant throughout the entire event," according to the report.

Abbott then is alleged to have stopped the victim, facing a wall, and is observed repositioning her grip on her arm: "The defendant's forearms are now wrapped around the victim's arms at her elbows with the defendant's hands clinched together and positioned into the middle of the victim's back," the report states. "After (Abbott) repositions her grip she moved her stance closer to the victim from behind." According to investigator

Larry Tynes' report, the victim was about two feet from the cement cinder block wall when Abbott allegedly thrust herself toward the victim in a very forceful manner, using her upper and lower body strength, pushing the victim violently into the wall.

The report stated the victim's chest area and chin bounced off the wall.

"Seconds later the defendant stops speaking to the victim and pulls the victim with great force and violently throws the victim to the floor while restraining the victim's arms behind their back."

Abbott is alleged to have landed on top of the victim's back with her full weight.

The report indicated the victim weighs 148 pounds and that Abbott's observed size is much greater than the victim's as depicted in the video.

When investigators attempted to speak to Abbott, she said she was going to have a lawyer present before she spoke.

Abbott was charged with battery on Dec. 4 by SRCSO.

A second investigation continues into the actions of the facility's director, Carol Andrus, who is accused of grabbing the neck of a restrained client and throwing the 15-year-old to the ground. The DJJ report indicates the teenager received lacerations to her face and ear "that looked like it needed stitches."

Citing concerns over "safety and security" at the facility, the DJJ has placed an admissions freeze on the Milton Girls Juvenile Residential Facility.

No charges have been filed against Andrus to date.


He was preceded in death by his mother, Jessie Cain; and granddaughter, April Hayes.

Pallbearers were Levi Cain, Justin Cain, Josh Cain, Cody O'Neal, Cliff Archer and Eddie Podgurski.





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

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Parents can help children cope after trauma

DCF: Stay calm and explain what's going on in terms they can understand

TALLAHASSEE — Children can start showing signs of trauma right away or months after a disastrous event. Just hearing about an event on the news or seeing a reaction from parents is enough to have an effect on kids.

You might not have spoken to your kids over the weekend about the Sandy Hook Elementary School tragedy, but it is possible they heard something at school and might have ques-

tions for you about it.

Jennifer Evans, a licensed mental health counselor and traumatologist at the Department of Children and Families who specializes in compassion fatigue, offers these signs to look for in your children and ways you can comfort your child during this time.

- **Be clear:** Talking about tragedy and death can be very difficult for anyone. Being clear and only answering what the child is asking will help them to understand without getting into too much graphic detail. Try using dialogue like, "When people die, their bodies stop working."

- **Be available:** Let your kids ask the questions. Start by asking them, "What do you think happened?" Allow them to guide the conversation where they need to go to help them cope.

- **Stay calm:** Children learn emotional reactions and coping through adults. The way adults react to events is often the way the child perceives and reacts to the event. It is OK to cry and show concern and emotion, and then to show appropriate ways to cope and heal. Try using dialogue like, "It is OK to feel confused and hurt. Sometimes people cry to show how sad they are. This allows their body to feel better."

- **Normalize their feelings:** When a tragedy happens it can be confusing, and often, kids are uncertain of the emotions they are feeling. Use this opportunity to discuss emotions and the way kids are feeling and explain how you can cope. Try using dialogue like, "Often people feel sad when something like this happens. It is hard to understand why

someone would do something like this."

- **Understand how children cope:** You might see your child try to act out the traumatic event through their dolls or other toys. This can be scary for a parent to see, but kids will often replay the event as a way to cope. You can use this opportunity to discuss their play and their memory of the event. This is a great time to clarify and normalize their reaction again. Try doing an activity to help provide closure for your child. Ask your child if they would like to say or do anything to help the families who have experienced this tragedy. They might want to write a letter or a card to the school or the families to say they are sorry and offer words of hope and encouragement.

- **Notice changes in behavior:** Often, the effect of trauma on

your body does not happen until weeks after the event. This is a normal process of coping. If your child's behavior dramatically changes for an extended amount of time, consult a professional. Common symptoms of trauma include sleeplessness, over/under eating, extended sadness for no immediate explanation, extended traumatic play, lack of focus/concentration and nightmares.

We are all keeping the victims in our thoughts and prayers. The national Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration provides more information about coping strategies and how children and adults are affected by and react to tragedy. 

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Division of Emergency Management offers online updates

If you haven't tuned in to your Santa Rosa County Division of Emergency Management lately, you might not be aware of some of its basic tools designed to protect citizens and property in emergency situations.

Many people associate the Emergency Management Division of county government with hurricanes.

But hurricanes, which are

pretty much confined to a seasonal pattern, are far from the only disaster that can affect the community. Floods, fire, industrial accidents, earthquakes and the like should never be dismissed or trivialized.

In its dedication to addressing such calamities and to give assistance to those affected, SRCDEM has developed technology that can help residents plan for, or emerge from, these types of disruptive occurrence.

Major among the programs offered by the SRCDEM is the

E-breaking News platform, email and text message notifications. To use this tool, register on the county's website, www.santarosa.fl.gov/emergency/publicwarning.html. The instructions will tell you how to access the program.

Disaster information is also available online at the county's website. The information there is updated regularly and can be relayed to you via emails. All you have to do is ask to be added to the list. You can do that by accessing joyt@santarosa.fl.gov.

Perhaps the most serviceable

program SRCDEM offers is the Reverse 911, a high-speed telephone system used to call homes and businesses in case of emergencies. The program is so sensitive it can call only sections of the county affected by a calamity. It relays a recorded message giving the receiver important information about the disaster and recommends steps to take to protect life and property.

The SRCDEM also has prepared the "212 Official Santa Rosa County Disaster Preparedness Guide" available online. It's

a 48-page publication that gives valuable information on what to do before, during and after a variety of disaster scenarios. It is available on the web at the same site that gives you E-breaking News.

"Additionally, we highly recommend the purchase of a NOAA weather radio for all homes, businesses and rental properties," said Sheryl Bracewell, the director of the county's emergency management. "It's an inexpensive tool, and it just might save a life!"

Florida to allow Air Force to train on more state land

As part of the Air Force's quest to find more space to meet increasing training demands in Northwest Florida, it now will be allowed to conduct nonhazardous missions on additional state-owned land.

The state Department of Environmental Protection agreed last week to allow the Air Force to set up communications equipment on pockets of land across the region.

The agreement is part of a recent effort to ease competition for range space on Eglin Air Force Base's reservation, which spans 460,000 acres.

After the last base realignment in 2005, which brought several new missions to Eglin and surrounding bases, officials began looking for public or private land nearby for nonhazardous training.

"This will allow us to have a lot more flexibility to use the range for what it was really designed for — testing and shooting and all those things that come with hazardous activity,"

said Michael Penland, the Air Force's director of base operations.

Before moving to his position at the Pentagon, Penland was in charge of operational support at Eglin, where he began working on the project to find nearby land for training. He has continued that effort in Washington, D.C.

In October, the Air Force signed its first agreement to use Florida Forest Service land. The state agreed to allow the military to use about 400,000 acres in the Blackwater River State Forest near Eglin and Tate's Hell State Forest near Apalachicola, Penland said.

He said the Air Force plans to sign a similar agreement with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission in the near future.

The agreements are one of a kind and could serve as models for similar arrangements across the country.

"This is first time we've actually tried to do something to this scale, especially in the Air Force," Penland said.

The DEP agreement allows the Air Force to set up mobile threat emitters,

which are used for air training. Currently, the emitters are housed at Eglin, but they rarely are used because they must be spread over a large area, Penland said.

Under the agreement signed with the Forest Service, the military — including the Army 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne) at Eglin — will be able to run small ground-training missions, and other groups will be able to land aircraft such as the CV-22, Penland said.

It will offer some opportunities unavailable on the Eglin reservation and shorten wait times for the space.

No live ammunition will be fired on state lands, officials said.

Penland said the state agencies and the Air Force have worked to make sure the training missions will not disrupt any endangered species or restrict recreational activities. They searched for areas where the training would be compatible with what the land already is being used for.

"(The state) has been very forthcoming in helping us look for places we might be able to use," he said.

Patrick Gillespie, a spokesman for DEP, said

the agreement is the first of its kind, but fits in with the agency's overall mission.

"It's been a priority of the DEP to purchase state land that buffers military installations and to work to support our armed forces," Gillespie said.

He said the plan was presented at two public meet-

ings before it was approved. The details of how, when and where the land will be used will be hammered out over the next two months.

Gov. Rick Scott praised the partnership in a news release issued last week.

"This agreement is another step in making Florida the most military-friendly

state in the nation," he said. "Not only will this decision strengthen our nation's security, but it will support our military communities that provide jobs for Florida families."

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Fish and Wildlife looks to upgrade wood stork's status

Wood storks in the Southeastern United States no longer face imminent danger of extinction.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is proposing to upgrade the status of the U.S. breeding population of wood storks from endangered to threatened under the Endangered Species Act. The proposal follows a comprehensive review, conducted by service biologists, of the best available scientific and commercial information about the species' status.

"The proposed reclassification of the wood stork demonstrates that the Endangered Species Act works," said Dan Ashe, director for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. "This is a good day for the wood stork, and a good day for conservation. Thanks to great efforts from our conservation partners, the species is making real progress toward recovery."

The wood stork is the only true species of stork nesting in the United States. Since its original ESA listing as endangered in 1984, the U.S. breeding population has shown substantial improvement in the numbers of nesting pairs as a whole and the expansion of its breeding range. The three-year averages during the past 10 years range from 7,086 to 8,996 nesting pairs, all above the 6,000 nesting pair benchmark average established for reclassifying the species as threatened, but well below the five-year average of 10,000 nesting pairs needed for delisting.

"Although some habitat loss continues, current population data clearly indicate that the wood stork is benefiting from

the work of private landowners and several strong partnership efforts," said Cindy Dohner, the Service's Southeast regional director. "The wood stork is expanding its breeding range using a wide variety of wetlands to forage, roost, and breed, including man-made and restored wetlands."

The proposed reclassification would not change any conservation or protection measures for the wood stork under the ESA. Rather it would recognize the stork's ongoing recovery and the positive impact that collaborative conservation efforts over the

last two decades have had on breeding populations. With a continuing trend, the species could become suitable for de-listing from the ESA. Therefore, addressing the threats

associated with habitat loss, including the protection of natural wetlands through partnerships and the focused management of public lands, remains a conservation priority for the Service.

When the Service originally listed the Southeastern U.S. portion of the population, the wood stork's range included Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and Alabama and breeding was primarily in central and south Florida. Historically, the Florida Everglades and the Big Cypress National Preserve once supported large breeding colonies. Today its range includes portions of North Carolina and Mississippi with significant nesting in Florida, Georgia and South Carolina. Biologists believe man-made changes in the Everglades and Big Cypress ecosystems have contributed to the bird's expanded breeding range.

The Natural Resources Conservation Service Wetlands Reserve Program has restored more than 200,000 acres of wetlands in Florida and more than 115,000 acres in Alabama, Georgia and South Carolina during the past 18 years. Thousands of acres of wetlands also are being protected on private lands to assist in habitat and

wildlife protection through restoration in conjunction with establishing conservation easements. Wetland losses are being avoided, minimized and mitigated through project consultations and the regulatory process.

"The wood stork has shown a fascinating ability to respond to changes in hydrology by broadening its breeding range beyond central Florida, the Everglades, and Big Cypress ecosystems," said Dave Hankla, field supervisor for the Service's North Florida Ecological Services Office in Jacksonville. "However, this does not reduce the importance restoration of the stork's historical breeding area has for recovery. Nor does it diminish the significant role South Florida's ecosystems play for wood storks and other wildlife."

Large-scale restoration projects such as the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Program, Kissimmee River Restoration Project and St. Johns River Headwaters Restoration Project are significant conservation efforts that continue to greatly benefit wood stork recovery. Florida nesting pairs totaled more than 5,000 in 2011.

The announcement, which will publish in the Federal Register in coming

days, also constitutes the service's 12-month warranted finding on a petition to reclassify the wood stork, which was submitted by the Pacific Legal Foundation and Biological Research Associates, on behalf of the Florida Home Builders Association.

To ensure its final decision reflects the best available information, the Service is soliciting comments from the public, other concerned governmental agencies, Tribal governments, the scientific community, industry and any other interested parties.



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A guide to holiday recycling

During the holiday season, Americans throw away more material than at any other time of the year. According to the EPA, the volume of household waste in the United States generally increases 25 percent between Thanksgiving and New Year's day, approximately one million extra tons. With more recycling

choices available in Santa Rosa County than ever before, you can make the holiday season the season of recycling.

Citizens can recycle glass, metal, plastic containers, paper and cardboard with curbside collections by their residential garbage collection service, hauling the items to the Central Landfill or Gulf Breeze and Jay transfer stations,

or by taking items to one of the 19 recycling drop off sites located throughout the county. Our recycle contractor will be servicing the containers quickly and often, but usage will be extremely high after Christmas. When using



the recycling drop of sites, be sure to deposit only recyclable materials and place your items in the containers. Residents are reminded that recycle areas are not disposal areas for furniture or household garbage that is not sorted,

recyclable material. Please do not dispose of carpet, furniture, toilets, sinks, vinyl flooring, or wicker furniture in the recycle bins. Not only can people be fined for illegal dumping, it can cause the site to be closed or relocated, which can be a great inconvenience to those that are using the site as intended. The removal of materials out of the recycle containers

such as aluminum cans, plastics or other items is also illegal. This material is property of the county's recycle contractor. - Do not put food waste or other household garbage in the recycle containers.



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

If you're reading this, the Mayans were wrong

We all had several years of stories, novels and even Hollywood movies to prepare us for the end of time. And those who love to speak of doomsday wasted no time in latching on to the fact that the Mayans' "long count" calendar had no dates beyond December 21, 2012. "Surely," these mongers conjectured, "this means the Mayans knew something and the world is about to end." It never seemed to cross anyone's mind that the Mayans may have looked at the calendar, signed from their exhaustive effort and said, "Hmm, 5,125 years of calculations... that's good enough for anyone" and left it at that.

We suppose it's just more "fun" to prognosticate over Armageddon than to admit ignorance and move through life as through a dark forest. Humans, after all, have a long love affair with the end of the world:

In 1910, many were certain the end was coming when the earth passed through the tail of Halley's comet. Of course, nothing happened, but that didn't stop the doomsdayers. They're always ready to leap from one failed forecast and latch onto the next.

Some may recall Pat Robertson telling those watching his 700 Club in 1980 that he "guaranteed" a judgment on the world by the end of 1982. As the calendar rolled into 1983, nothing visible had happened.

In 1997, a California group known as Heaven's Gate was certain an alien spacecraft was coming — marking the end of the world. Thirty-nine members of that group ended up killing themselves.

Few people have not heard the name of Nostradamus. In 1999, the name was on many tongues as the public latched onto one of the writers' quadtrains which promised a "king of terror" in

the 7th month of 1999.

While it wasn't being billed as "the end of the world" it was being put forth as a world of problems. The Y2K bug was expected to bring planes crashing from the sky — a result of no maintenance and ruin financial banking systems. Nothing happened. As if that weren't enough, there was an attempt 12 months later to say 2001 would be the REAL Y2K bug. Nothing happened then, either.

P.T. Barnum is often credited with saying "there's a sucker born every minute." We're not sure if he was the real author of that phrase, but the words seem to ring true. Why is it that we, as a people, are so quick to believe end-of-time prophecies?

If you really feel you need to live beneath the fear of end times, turn to Erich Von Daniken. In the 1960s, he wrote the book "Chariots of the Gods." Daniken postulated the earth had, long ago been visited by aliens who had meddled with the DNA of this planet's life to create humankind. He then linked that thought to the Mayan calendar saying the aliens would return in 2012. Quick to hedge his bets, though, Daniken says the Mayans' calculations could be off by "up to 25 years." So, the Mayan theory remains active for another quarter of a century.

So, should we go to work Monday? Do we really have to pay our bills? After all, Dec. 21, 2013, is coming.

100 percent of nothing

JoAnn Watson, Detroit city council member, once said, "Our people in an overwhelming way supported the re-election of this president, and there ought to be a quid pro quo." In other words, President Barack Obama should send the nearly bankrupted city of Detroit millions in taxpayer bailout money. But there's a painful lesson to be learned from decades of political hustling and counsel by intellectuals and urban experts.

In 1960, Detroit's population was 1.6 million. Blacks were 29 percent, and whites were 70 percent. Today, Detroit's population has fallen precipitously to 707,000, of which blacks are 84 percent and whites 8 percent. Much of the city's decline began with the election of Coleman Young, Detroit's first black mayor and mayor for five terms, who engaged in political favoritism to blacks and tax policies against higher income mostly white people. Young's successors, Dennis Archer and Kwame Kilpatrick, followed his Third World tyrant policies, but neither had his verbal vulgarity. Kilpatrick (2002-2008) went to jail and is on trial today on charges of corruption. Mayor David Bing is making an effort to revive Detroit. His problem is that he's not God.

Policies that ran whites and other more affluent people out of Detroit might have been Young's and his successors' strategy. After all, why not get rid of people who aren't going to vote for you anyway? The problem is that getting rid of these people left Detroit with a lower tax base, fewer jobs and fewer consumers. Fewer whites might be good for the careers of black politicians, but it's not in the best interests of ordinary blacks. Blacks have political control of Detroit, but the relevant question is whether some control of something is better than 100 percent control of nothing. By most measures, Detroit is one of the nation's most tragic cities, and it's mostly self-imposed.

Detroit topped Forbes magazine's 2010 list of America's Most Dangerous Cities. That year, there were 345 homicides, but that's going to be topped with this year's 365 homicides so far.

Most homicide victims in Detroit and elsewhere are black, and 95 percent of the time, their murderers are black. But far more important to black leaders and white liberals than blacks murdering blacks are charges of police misconduct and racial profiling.

Detroit's predominantly black public schools are close to being the worst in the nation, perhaps with the exception of those of Washington, D.C. Only 4 percent of Detroit's eighth-graders scored proficient or above on the most recent National Assessment of Education Progress test, sometimes called "The Nation's Report Card." Thirty-six percent scored basic, and 57 percent below basic. "Below basic" is when a student is unable to demonstrate even partial mastery of knowledge and skills fundamental for proficient work at their grade level. "Basic" indicates only partial mastery.

Unbeknownst to most black parents is that most black students who manage to graduate from high school cannot read and compute any better than whites four years younger and still in junior high school. Here's a question for you: If we put a group of 100 students of any race having an eighth-grade level of proficiency and another group of 100 students of any race with a 12th-grade level of proficiency in college, is it reasonable to expect the first group to perform as well as the second? On top of that, is it reasonable to expect a student of any race to be able to make up 12 years of fraudulent K-12 education in the space of four or five years of college?

Detroit's social pathology is seen in other cities with large black populations such as Philadelphia, Newark, N.J., Baltimore, Md., and Chicago. These are cities where blacks have for years dominated the political machinery in the forms of mayors, police chiefs, superintendents of schools and city councilmen, plus they've been Democrats. It's safe to conclude that the focus on political power doesn't do much for ordinary blacks.

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Impact fees waived

Santa Rosa County Commissioners recently voted to extend the suspension of transportation or road impact fees for the fifth year in a row. This waiver will extend the suspension of the transportation through December of 2013.

Any new construction, residential or commercial, which would normally be assessed a transportation impact fee during the building permit process in 2009 through 2013 will have impact fees waived. However, those paying installments will be required to make payments for 2010, 2011, and 2013.

It is anticipated the Commissioners will review and address the suspension again in November 2013 for the following years.

During a commission-meeting workshop on January 29, 2009, the Commissioners originally voted to suspend the collection of the transportation impact fees for the 2009 calendar year as an incentive to stimulate new local

construction projects.

Considering the current national downturn in the economy and high unemployment, commissioners understand the need to create employment opportunities, including the construction industry. Commissioners hope the savings recognized from the suspension will act as an economic stimulus.

An impact fee is a one-time charge to offset the cost of new or expanded infrastructure to accommodate a new development. Impact fees are generally categorized by the project, and a county may one or multiple impact fees.

Examples can include impact fees for roads, water, sewer, drainage, parks, libraries, fire services, law enforcement services, and schools. When instated, the amount of impact fees collected changes each year as it is dependent on the number of building permits issued.

In fiscal year 2007 and 2008, 623 road impact fees were processed and over \$1.8 million were collected to help fund road projects within Santa Rosa County.

Pros and cons of shopping online

Shopping online is one of the most convenient ways to browse and buy these days but, buyer beware! Shoppers must be aware when using the convenience of the Internet to shop.

The good side is shopping online can happen any time and anywhere, eliminating the challenges of crowded stores, thieves lurking about, and the frustration of not finding the right item. Shopping from the kitchen table online is so much more comfortable than

fighting crowds.

Shopping online, however, has certain pitfalls to avoid. Knowing how and where to shop can often minimize the chance of scams. Shopping at well-established online businesses is practical and safer. Reading what others say about a business is helpful.

Be particular about shopping at stores outside the United States. While online re-

tailers in this country are regulated by U.S. consumer laws, those outside the U. S. are not. There could be problems if a dispute arises, or if the buyer is not satisfied with the purchase.

There are other tips to consider when shopping on line. Use credit cards if possible. This makes it easier to negotiate differences when it is necessary. If the credit card is compromised by loss or theft, you are only responsible for the first \$30 in unauthorized charges with most companies. In many cases credit card companies will waive that. Debit cards do not offer this protection.

Shop at secure sites that display the lock icon, and be extra careful not to be tricked into sharing personal information like a Social Security number or other personal data.

Watch checking accounts and other statements for buying activity that may be unfamiliar. Take particular care and examine them closely. Often, if the discrepancy is reported quickly, it's more often that not, it can also be solved just as quickly.

Whether shopping in area retail establishments or online, be careful and follow common sense scenarios. The holiday will be more safe and secure for the effort.



Foster kids 'home for the holidays'

2,400 children to visit relatives or be placed in permanent homes in time for Christmas

TALLAHASSEE — Thousands of children in foster care will be going "Home for the Holidays" this month. Half of the kids will be visiting relatives or loved ones, while the other half will be moved into a permanent placement with their forever family just in time for Christmas.

The Department of Children and Families and our community partners work diligently to make sure our children spend time with loved ones over the holidays.

"Children who are in foster care deserve to be with their family and other loved ones during the

holiday season," said Secretary David Wilkins. "Working together, we can provide memories that will last a lifetime for our kids who may not get opportunities to see their siblings, grandparents or others very often."

About 1,200 children will be visiting relatives in Florida and out of state this month. Another 1,200 kids will be placed in their permanent home. The "Home for the Holidays" program works to expedite placements by completing reunifications already scheduled to occur, finalizing adoptions with new moms and

dads, and requesting amended visitation so children may spend time their family on that special day.

The initiative requires collaboration from contracted agencies, legal teams, judges, guardians, foster families and dedicated case managers. In many circumstances, the effort requires expedited background screenings, court orders and travel arrangements. The state's 18 community-based care agencies frequently pick up the cost of the children's travel if the family is unable to do so.

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Wildlife officers hold classes, respond to calls

Florida Wildlife Conservation Commission officers worked the annual Family Hunt within Blackwater WMA. On Dec. 7, officers Steve Hoomes and Danny Arnette, along with FWC Biologist Barbara Almario and FWC Wildlife Technicians Andrew Jernigan and Kevin McDonald, conducted the pre-hunt safety meeting attended by 43 children. The Munson Heritage Festival Committee assisted with logistics and support for this year's hunt. Wal-Mart in Gulf Breeze provided door prizes for the participating youth hunters, as well as hot

dogs and hamburgers cooked by FWC personnel during the safety meeting for all to enjoy. The Munson Fire Department hosted the check station site for the two-day hunt. This year's two-day hunt resulted in 43 youth participating. On Dec. 8, 30 permits were issued with two deer harvested, and on Dec. 9, 25 permits were issued with eight deer harvested. Of the 10 deer harvested, five were does, one was a legal buck and four were antlered males. A special thank you to the Munson Heritage Festival Committee, the Munson Fire Department and Wal-Mart of Gulf Breeze for their support of this important event.

Officer Ben Pineda received a complaint through dispatch regarding two subjects trespassing on a hunt club's land in Chumuckla. When Officer Pineda arrived, he observed two subjects leaving the area that matched the description of the subjects in the complaint. Officer Pineda made contact with the subjects and learned that they were in fact the two individuals who had been trespassing. While investigating this incident, Officer Pineda learned that one of the suspects was a convicted felon. The investigation is ongoing and charges are pending.

Officers Steve Hoomes and Brandon Lewis received a

complaint through dispatch regarding shots fired near the community of Jay. The officers arrived on the scene and, after some investigating, found two freshly killed deer. After interviewing a suspect, they learned he shot the two deer from a hut using a light after dark. The subject was charged with taking deer at night with a gun and light.

Lt. Doug Berryman received a complaint through dispatch regarding a hunter's dog being shot and subsequently dragged from a vehicle for over a mile. When Lieutenant Berryman arrived on scene, he observed blood and drag marks that exited a gate to

a hunt club adjacent to Blackwater WMA. The marks were from where the dog was dragged. Lieutenant Berryman followed the trail to a hunt camp where he observed blood, hair, and more drag marks. Lieutenant Berryman then followed the trail from the gate down the road to where the dog was found, dead, by its owner, approximately one mile away. Photographs, blood samples, and other evidence were seized at the scene. Follow-up interviews were conducted and a confession was obtained from a hunt club member. Officers are meeting with the Santa Rosa State Attorney's Office to review and file charges.

New signs for birding, wildlife viewing something to sing about

There are new signs of economic opportunity and natural wonders in south Florida. Tourists and residents in 11 southern Florida counties may have noticed that directional signs for the Great Florida Birding and Wildlife Trail were popping up all over the place.

The signs direct traffic to 113 new birding and wildlife viewing sites from Sarasota and Stuart south to Key West, joining hundreds of other GFBWT locations throughout the state. Not only do these signs, bearing the swallow-tailed kite logo, designate ideal locations for birding and wildlife viewing adventures, they are also a symbol of positive economic impact.

Gov. Rick Scott said, "Wildlife viewing in Florida is a major reason why our state is the most popular tourist destination in the country. I am proud that Floridians and our visitors can now better enjoy the wildlife our state has to offer, while creating more opportunities for Florida families."

A recent study about birding in Florida indicated the trail's road signs play an important role in visitors' travel decisions. Of 1,652 participants, 65 percent had seen a GFBWT road sign, prompting a later visit (81 percent indeed visited later).

"We hope that many Florida families and tourists will follow these new signs and explore the fascinating wildlife these sites have to offer," said Mark Kiser, Great Florida Birding and Wildlife Trail coordinator for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

Birding and wildlife viewing are important to Florida's economy, and the GFBWT program is an integral component of Florida's nature-based tourism industry. According to U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service data, wildlife viewing generates more than \$5 billion in Florida and supports 51,000 jobs. A recent state-wide survey by Responsive Management showed that wildlife viewing is the second most popular outdoor recreation activity in the state (behind going to the beach) for visitors and residents.

The FWC installed the trail signage with a grant from the Florida Department of Transportation and support from the Wildlife Foundation of Florida. Dozens of federal, state and local government agencies, nongovernmental organizations and private landowners also supported the effort.

In addition to signs, the FWC has produced guide booklets that contain site descriptions, directions and maps showcasing birding and wildlife watching opportunities throughout Florida. Wildlife enthusiasts can download or order the GFBWT guidebooks at FloridaBirdingTrail.com and WildlifeFoundationofFlorida.com.

Mike Hamada marked something off his bowling bucket list recently when he bowled his first 300 game.

Hamada, a left handed bowler who has come close on several occasions, will occasionally wear the ring he received from the United States Bowling Congress for achieving the feat.

"When I let go of that shot I remember hearing myself say carry," Hamada recalled of the night. "For me it was a dream come true to finally bowl my first 300 game.

"But I missed my other goal of having an 800 series that night by finishing with a 786."

Hamada, who runs the pro shop at Oops Alley, would have to average 267 for three games to achieve the 800 series, but he finished with a 262

on the night.

Despite his excitement, Hamada put his feat into perspective.

"I know a lot of really good bowlers who haven't even gotten close to bowling a perfect game (300)," Hamada said. "There is always that shot or two that seems to get away from you."

So when did reality set in on Hamada, who currently bowls in three leagues this summer plus run his business.

"When I got up in the 10th frame I really started thinking about it," Hamada said. "Then when I got my 11th

strike I heard some people behind me which gave me chills, but by the 12th strike everyone in the house was behind me and the place went nuts."

Ironically the sport of bowling can quickly humble you despite all the well-wishers and questions.

"People asked me the next week if I was going to bowl a perfect game again," Hamada said. "But doing something like this is not easy and I know I didn't bowl some of my best games the next week."

Hamada pointed out one bowler he knew bowled a perfect game and




in the two previous games shot a 160 and 140.

"It is just not an easy thing to do," Hamada pointed out.

Some feel it may be easier for a left-hander to do since the lanes do not change as much, but Hamada quickly rejects that notion.

"I don't know if being a left-hander is an advantage or not," said Hamada, who started bowling 20 years ago in a church league after taking a long break from the sport. "A lot depends on the transition of the lane and how the oil is carried down to the end.

"Sometimes the track gives way and other times you might have another left-handed bowler, but I don't think there is any difference."

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
