## Pace biker critical

A Pace man riding a Harley Davidson motorcycle is in critical condition after a motor vehicle crash Saturday.

Philip J. Melton, 47, was taken to Baptist Hospital from the scene of the accident at Lillian Highway and Cordova Road, according to the Florida Highway Patrol. The accident happened around 2 p.m.

Melton was injured when a 1989 Ford van driven by Stephen C. Quates, 50, Foley, Ala., violated his right of way and hit the Harley, according to FHP reports. Melton was knocked to the ground, and the van came to rest on top of the motorcycle.

The accident happened at the driveway of the Crazy Horse Cafe. Trooper C. Mitchell said in his report that Quates was driving the van eastbound on Lillian Highway, while the Harley was traveling

westbound. Quates tried a left turn into the cafe driveway, resulting in the right front of the van striking the motorcycle on the left side, knocking Melton off the bike. The van came to rest on top of the bike.

Quates was arrested and charged with driving under the influence; violation of right-of-way; and no valid driver's license.

Reports indicate Melton was wearing a helmet and was not under the influence of alcohol.

## Hunt club president charged with killing dog

The president of a local hunt club was arrested last month on charges of shooting a dog and then dragging the animal 2 miles down a country road, tied by a rope to his vehicle.

Originally charged with a felony, James Sousa, 48, was arrested on a warrant for animal cruelty. Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Officer Doug Berryman said he was notified last week the felony charge was being changed to a misdemeanor by the State Attorney's Office. He said whether the animal suffered is a determining factor in deciding the level of a charge.

Sousa is the president of the Cabin Creek Hunt Club.

Berryman said Sousa shot the hunting dog in the shoulder with a Remington .270 rifle, killing the dog on or around Dec. 10. Officials believe the dog was dead when Sousa tied it to his vehicle. A blood trail was left during the dragging,

Last week, Milton Police Chief Greg Brand announced the Milton Skate Park might be closed down for a month at a time if skaters don't start wearing helmets while at the park.

In response to the city's threat, one skater has created a Facebook page in an effort to unite those who use the park. The page already is getting a lot of attention from local skaters.

"Milton Park, We Live to Skate" is the page created by Milton High School graduate Jason Goings, 20. He said the skate park meant a lot to him growing up, and he doesn't want to see the closings happen.

### Homeless coalition seeks volunteers for count

The EscaRosa Coalition On the Homeless is looking for volunteers to assist with the annual 2013 U Count Point-in-Time Homeless Survey. The survey will be conducted over a 24-hour period, from 10 a.m. Jan. 24 to 10 a.m. Jan. 25.

ECO H is charged with counting homeless individuals in Escambia and Santa Rosa counties. The purpose of the U Count survey is to determine the needs and extent of the local homeless population, including sheltered and

unsheltered men, women and children. ECO H then can match their needs against the services offered in the community.

Florida is ranked one of the highest in homeless veterans. As military men and women leave the service, the 2013 count is especially important, as it will provide information ECO H needs to better serve them.

Volunteers are asked to serve as active participants in the counting process. No specific experience is required to serve as a volunteer (training will be provided), but compassion and a desire to help individuals who are homeless are essential.

ECO H needs a minimum of 150 volunteers to serve a two- to four-hour shift at area soup kitchens, churches, food pantries and other locations where homeless gather.

In conjunction with U-Count, ECO H will have its first annual U-Count Homeless Services Day to provide homeless individuals and families the services and benefits they need, all in one place, on one day. Volunteers will be on hand to help secure temporary housing, sign people up for veteran or public benefits, provide employment counseling and access to medical care, give haircuts, a hot meal and more. The event will take place at ECO H's main office, 2601 W. Strong St., Pensacola.

### 'City of Pace' up to citizens

It happens almost daily. Someone calls to check on a subscription. Or they call to start a subscription. Either way, when it gets to the address, they note "and that's Pace, FL 32571."

Technically, there is no Pace, Fla. It is not an incorporated city. Rather, the address is Milton, FL 32571.

That address sticks in the throats of people who are proud of Pace and who often take part in the inner-county rivalry between Milton and Pace. Still, the fact remains: Pace is not a city.

Should it be?

Well, that is a matter of public opinion — an opinion that in the past has been, "No, it should NOT be a city."

Typically, the first-blush reaction to this question comes from the fact that nobody wants another level of taxation, and those in this "City of Pace" would certainly have some level of taxation.

Still, there are many more things that come with incorporation other than taxation. Cities typically have their own police department, so residents get better law enforcement: both city and county officers. City residents often enjoy amenities and sidewalks are just two examples. Cities are often eligible for grants and public funding to help with special projects.

But perhaps the largest reason for incorporation is something that is accepted as a truism: the government

is best that governs close to home. In short, would you rather that a law affecting you is passed by your city leaders or those in Washington, D.C.? You see those city leaders every week. You bump into them while shopping. You might even go to church with them. You have "access" to these people and they, as your neighbor, understand how any law will affect the local citizenry.

So, are these potential pluses worth another layer of taxation? Only the public can say.

And we believe the public should say.

The area most people consider to be "Pace" would be, if incorporated, the largest city in Santa Rosa. Such a move could wield a great deal of power.

In the end, only voters can decide if positives outweigh the negatives. We do believe Pace area voters should be asked this question at least once every two years. Still, such a vote requires a petition, and that requires someone getting behind the effort.

How does Pace feel? Is there anyone there who would like to see Pace become its own city?

### Obama 'saves' us from cliff with Grecian Formula

GEORGETOWN, S.C. — In the wake of an uninspired and cowardly climax to the self-inflicted drama of the "fiscal cliff," Washington is poised for its sequel: raising the debt ceiling. This is yet another phony crisis in a series created, and then magnanimously solved, by an increasingly inept Washington.

It's another case where I wonder if it is more detrimental to taxpayers if Congress tries to do something — or fails to.

indicating the animal was dragged immediately after the shooting.

A report filed by Berryman says Sousa killed the animal because loose dogs in the area have been "running the deer" on the property of the hunting club.

Reports indicate Sousa told the officer he heard three dogs running deer but did not see them. He got

out of his stand, looking for the dogs and heard them around his camp. He went there, saw one dog walking around, "not doing anything" and shot the dog from the road. The dog fell dead at the corner of his porch. He got some rope, tied it to the dog and dragged it to Munson Highway at Indian Ford Road. He left the dog there "to make a statement to those

people who are constantly running dogs illegally on his property," according to the report.

The dog was one of three hunting dogs belonging to a man living on Indian Ford Road. The dogs escaped from the pen at home and did not come back. While the owner was looking for his animals, he found the dead dog.

A picture of a police officer in uniform on a skateboard is posted on the Facebook page with the words, "In Denmark, Police skate with you." Goings invited Milton police to skate with the local skaters.

There are polls on the page for skaters to offer their opinion, as well as video links and photos of people using the Milton Skate Park.

There's even a message for the city police: "Milton PD, listen to what we have to say. That's the only way its gonna get solved without people going to jail or the only safe haven the kids got going away. Just think. Do you really want all of us, 100+, skating in your streets???"

Goings said it is his intention for the Facebook page to open dialogue between those affected by what goes on at the skate park. It appears to be working. Parents and skaters are exchanging information and ideas about the park, including the suggestion that crime is down at the park now that the public housing apartments near the park have closed.

Goings said many of the skaters

cannot afford the helmets required by city ordinance. He said helmets at the park are a good idea at times, but not all the time.

"I think we should have helmets at the park, but we shouldn't have to wear them all the time. Skaters know their limits, and even I have put on a helmet when trying something new or hard," he said.

"It's hard to say whether or not they will ever get rid of the helmet rule or not, but I believe the city should trust us more," Goings said.

An online petition has been created on the Facebook page. Goings said if there is enough support, the group might take its cause to the Milton City Council.

# County expected to discuss covered arena Jan. 22

**MILTON** — The fate of the somewhat controversial multipurpose center in East Milton likely will be decided later this month.

Though the agenda for the meeting will not be finalized until the end of this week, Santa Rosa County commissioners are expected to discuss the covered arena at their Jan. 22 meeting and vote on the project two days later.

County Commissioner Bob Cole, who has saved \$1 million from his district's recreation funds for the arena, said part of the controversy over the center stems from confusion about what it is. In early discussions, it was referred to as an equestrian center. However, he said it will be much more than that.

"This is not an equestrian center. This is a covered arena," Cole said. "If you're a horse person, then it's an equestrian center. If you like to show dogs, then we can have a dog show. If you're an archer and want to stand up a big archery event and know that if it rains you can use the indoor facility, then it's an archery center."

"This is why we (designed) this building as a multipurpose building," he said. "The bleachers aren't permanently put up, and the corrals for the horses aren't a permanent

fixture. They're all things that can move around."

The county sought construction bids last year, but commissioners delayed voting on approving a contract with A.E. New Jr. Inc. at their Dec. 10 meeting because they had too many questions about future funding for the project.

A.E. New Jr.'s bid originally was scheduled to expire at the end of December, but Cole said it has been extended through the end of January.

Since commissioners delayed their decision, the county's Tourist Development Council voted to contribute \$200,000 to the project, and Cole has found a way to save \$50,000

in construction costs. Rather than having the contractor purchase all of the supplies and materials, the county will purchase the materials without having to pay sales tax, Cole said.

"There's 50 grand instead of going to the state for sales tax can go into the project," he said.

If the project is approved at the Jan. 24 meeting, Cole said construction likely would start within 90 days.

The covered arena would be built at the intersection of U.S. Highway 90 and Bobby Brown Road. It would feature a 200-by-300-foot covered pavilion, a judges' booth, meeting room and restrooms.

# When hunting dogs venture onto the wrong property

After a year of maintaining roads, tending to food plots, monitoring game cameras and placing tree stands, hunters are more than ready to deer hunt.

But sometimes, the unexpected happens and a hunting dog or dogs venture onto their property, disrupting their hunt. The question is, what should they do?

Under the rules and regulations adopted by the FWC, anyone who chooses to use free-running hounds on private property to pursue deer or other species must apply for and receive a free dog hunt permit registration for approved lands, and the registration

number must be affixed to the collar of each dog used. Additionally, the hunter must be in possession of the dog hunt permit.

If the dogs get onto property where they are not permitted or wanted, FWC officers will contact the owners of the dogs, who likely will be cited for the violation.

However, it is never appropriate or legal to shoot someone's hunting dog that ventures onto property where it is not wanted. Anyone who does so can face criminal animal cruelty charges, be sued in civil court and face paying substantial damages.

# Flu outbreak reported in Northwest Florida

Sacred Heart Hospital in Pensacola continues to see people sickened by the flu outbreak that arrived early in Pensacola this year and has lasted longer than a typical flu season.

The first signs of the flu outbreak appeared in late October, and the number of cases kept climbing throughout November and December. From Oct. 28 through Jan. 5, Sacred Heart Hospital ran lab tests on 1,923 people who had flu-like symptoms. Of those, 546 tested positive for influenza.

Since the beginning of December, the Sacred Heart Urgent Care Center in Pensacola has seen 186 people with flu-like symptoms.

### Prevention

- Influenza is thought to spread from one person to another when the infected person coughs or sneezes. There are some things you can do to protect yourself and others, according to Centers for Disease Control.

- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the

trash after you use it. If you don't have a tissue, CDC suggests you cough or sneeze into your elbow. Be sure to wash the shirt, blouse, jacket, etc. you are wearing as soon as possible.

- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hands cleaners are also effective.

- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread that way.

- If you get sick, CDC recommends you stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.

### Kids practice reading with furry friends

The Pace Library had some special guests visit on Saturday to help local kids get some quality reading time.

In the back room at the library, Abbey, a 6-year-old Golden Retriever, and Mea, a 3-year-old Toy Poodle, cuddled up next to new friends as they read books like "Larabee" and "The Great Gracie Chase: Stop that Dog!" together.

Reading Education Assistance Dogs (R.E.A.D.) is a program held at the Pace Library from 9:30-11:30 a.m. the second Saturday of every month and at the Navarre Library from 4-5:30 p.m. the second Wednesday of the month. Kids sign up for a 15-minute time slot to read with a certified therapy dog.

The program started at the Pace Library in June, according to Melodie Taylor, the library manager.

"Kids may be embarrassed to read aloud to a brother or sister, but here it's one-on-one and they read to the dog. Everyone loves dogs," Taylor said. "The program is encouraging kids to be around books."

The same two dogs, Abbey and Mea, typically attend the Saturday program.

Yvonne Kass, of Milton, is the owner of Abbey. For the past four years, Abbey has been visiting elementary schools and libraries and is certified through Delta Society, where she has been screened for temperament, health, at-

titude, cleanliness and good manners, among other skills.

Judy Delano, of Milton, the owner of Mea, the Toy Poodle, also visits nursing homes and children's hospitals as a certified therapy dog.

"I have two other dogs at home that couldn't do this, but (Mea) absolutely loves it," Delano said. "She loves children."

According to the R.E.A.D. program website, [www.therpyanimals.org/R.E.A.D.html](http://www.therpyanimals.org/R.E.A.D.html), therapy animals have documented benefits with children. Besides improved reading, increased relaxation and lowering of blood pressure, therapy animals also foster safety, intimacy and help kids turn off anger and depression.

Emma Taylor, 5, Pace, read to both Abbey and Mea on Saturday. Emma's father, Mike, said she's a huge animal lover.

"She wants to be a doggy doctor when she grows up," Mike said.

After reading with Mea, Emma gave the 5-pound Poodle a few treats and watched her do tricks.

And with Abbey, although her long blonde Golden Retriever hair shed on Emma's black shirt and leggings, it didn't stop her from cuddling up next to the dog and rubbing under her chin while reading.

Taylor, the library manager, said the R.E.A.D. program is popular at other libraries and wishes more people knew about it.

"It's something free to do on a Saturday that doesn't involve watching cartoons," she said.

# Task force nabs fugitive wanted in 3 counties

The U.S. Marshals Florida Regional Fugitive Task Force captured a wanted man who is being sought in three counties. The capture came while the task force was conducting surveillance of a home on Saleta Street, and they saw fugitive Antwan Jernell Thomas arrive and go inside. Task force members from Escambia and Santa Rosa counties, aided by patrol and a K9 unit from Escambia, converged on the home around 4 p.m.

Once inside, police said Thomas ran from task force officers to the back of the house trying get rid of what appeared to be multiple bags of drugs. Thomas, 32, was tackled and taken into custody without any further

incident. The discarded bags were recovered and later tested positive for and identified as containing marijuana, powder cocaine and oxycodone pills.

The five bags of marijuana had a total weight of approximately 70 grams; a bag of cocaine contained 2 grams, and another had 5 oxycodone pills.

Thomas is wanted in Escambia County for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, grand theft of a firearm and misdemeanor battery. He also is wanted in Okaloosa County for a felony failure to appear on a driving while license suspended charge; and in Douglas County, Ga., for violation of probation stemming

from original charges of cocaine and marijuana trafficking. Thomas remains in Escambia County Jail, where additional charges of possession of marijuana, cocaine and oxycodone are pending. Police said another hard, white substance also was recovered that weighed about 494 grams, which is believed to be some sort of synthetic drug. Thomas also is being charged with possession and selling the synthetic substance.

In 2012, The U.S. Marshals and their task forces arrested more than 123,000 fugitives. More than 86,000 of them were state and local fugitives, almost 4,000 were homicide suspects and more than 5,000 were violent gang members. Among that number, more than 12,000 were sex offenders.



## PRESIDENTIAL STRUT

Pennsylvania Avenue walk now an iconic moment

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — At some point on Inauguration Day, if all goes as expected, the president's limousine will slow to a stop on its journey down Pennsylvania Avenue from the Capitol to the White House. A Secret Service agent will open the rear passenger door, and the newly sworn-in president and the first lady will emerge from his car for a several-minute stroll. The crowd will cheer. Barack Obama will wave.

In that moment, Pennsylvania Avenue is America's red carpet. And the president and first lady are the only celebrities on it. The victory walk has become an iconic inaugural moment, one expected by the public and the press.

And though the tradition dates only to President Jimmy Carter, it has already developed an air of inevitability and predictable patterns.

Charlie Brotman, who has been the announcer for the inaugural parade for decades, says the crowd never tires of the moment. When it happens, the 85-year-old says, spectators can expect to hear him saying something like this over the loudspeakers: "Ladies and gentleman, here's what the parade is all about. The president of the United States is walking right in front of you."

Carter wasn't thinking about starting a tradition when he decided to walk the mile-plus parade route in 1977. The idea wasn't even his. Before the inauguration, a Wisconsin senator sent Carter a letter suggesting the new president walk the route to set a good example for physical fitness. Carter initially dismissed the idea as silly, but soon reconsidered. He wrote in his memoir, "Keeping Faith," that he "began to realize that the symbolism of our leaving the armored car would be more far-reaching than simply to promote exercise."

"I wanted to provide a vivid demonstration of my confidence in the people as far as security was concerned, and I felt a simple walk would be a tangible indication of some reduction in the imperial status of the president and his family," he wrote.

Carter told only a few people of his plan, including the Secret Service, and spectators were shocked when he emerged from the limo. At first, revelers seemed to think something was wrong with the car. Then, they realized what was happening.

"There were gasps of astonishment and cries of 'They're walking! They're walking!'" Carter remembered in his memoir.

No other president has again walked the entire route, a trek that took Carter 40 minutes. His successor, Ronald Reagan, is the only modern president to skip the stroll. Reagan and his wife, Nancy, stuck their heads out of their limo's sun roof during part of the drive in 1981, and Reagan didn't have a chance to walk after his second inauguration in 1985: that parade was canceled because of cold weather.

The next four presidents, two Democrats and two Republicans, have all pounded Pennsylvania Avenue pavement. They generally walk at least the last block to the White House, though the length and the timing of the strolls have varied. Once the president and his wife emerge, however, the script is similar. Waving, thumbs-up-giving and hand-holding are standard, and the first lady always seems to make the trek in heels. Even rain or cold don't seem to dissuade presidents. George W. Bush braved wet weather and temperatures in the 30s to walk with his wife, Laura, in 2001.

Whether children accompany their parents is hard to predict. Amy Carter, then 9, jumped and danced down the street with her parents. Chelsea Clinton joined her parents in 1997 when she was 16.

### INAUGURATION Q&A

**Q: Why is the inauguration on Jan. 21 instead of Jan. 20?**

**A:** The Constitution's 20th Amendment, passed by Congress in March 1932 and ratified by the necessary states the following January, sets the inauguration date as Jan. 20 at noon.

Because that's a Sunday this year, Obama will take the official oath of office that day in a private ceremony. A public ceremony will be Jan. 21 on the west front of the U.S. Capitol. Local officials are planning for an estimated 600,000 to 800,000 people to crowd onto the National Mall to witness the oath-taking ceremony.

This is the seventh time the inauguration date has fallen on a Sunday. Inaugural ceremonies, however, are not traditionally held on Sundays because courts and other public institutions are closed.

**Q: What is the oath?**

**A:** "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Those words transform citizen to president and mark the beginning of a new administration.

Franklin Pierce, in March 1853, became the only president to "affirm" instead of "swear" that he would protect and defend the Constitution.

**Q: Does the chief justice always administer the oath?**

**A:** Traditionally, it is the chief justice who presides over the swearing-in ceremony. But there have been about a half-dozen exceptions including in 1923 and 1963.

In 1923, Vice President Calvin Coolidge took the oath of office at his father's residence

in Plymouth, Vt., following the death of President Warren Harding. Coolidge's father, Col. John Coolidge, was a notary public and he administered the oath to his son.

In 1963, Sarah Hughes, a U.S. district judge in Texas, administered the oath to Vice President Lyndon Johnson aboard Air Force One at Love Field in Dallas, after the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. Hughes became the first woman to swear in a president.

**Q: When was the parade started?**

**A:** The first organized parade occurred at the inauguration of James Madison in 1809. But the tradition dates back the country's first inauguration of a president, George Washington, in 1789.

Local militias joined Washington's procession as it passed through towns on his journey from Mount Vernon to New York City, where he was met by the Continental Army, government officials and other prominent citizens who escorted him to his swearing-in ceremony at Federal Hall.

**Q: Who pays for all this?**

**A:** Much of the cost is picked up by supporters and other private donors, as it has been for years. In 2009, Obama raised \$53 million in private money for his inauguration. The private money pays for the official inaugural balls, the traditional parade, giant TV screens on the mall for the swearing-in and thousands of portable toilets.

Public money is used for security, which is harder to put a price tag on. Secret Service doesn't discuss it, but the federal government reimbursed the District of Columbia \$44 million for the 2009 inauguration. That was just for city costs, not Secret Service or military personnel.


