Man held on 42 sex crimes

A Milton man is in jail, charged with multiple sex crimes after two young complainants came forward. He also is charged with possession of obscene material involving the sexual performance of a child.

Carl Ernest Carswell, 45, Hap-

py Lane, Milton, is being held on \$270,000 bond, according to Milton Police Department Capt. David Cox.

Carswell was arrested after an MPD investigation indicating he molested two female family members. The victims do not live in Florida at this time, Cox said.

Cox said police became involved when the complainants

shared the information about what Carswell had allegedly done with family members. Once police were called, Cox said there was enough details and information to move forward with an arrest. At that time, Carswell was charged with two counts of lewd and lascivious acts on a child under 16 years of age and two counts of lewd and lascivious

acts on a child under 16 years of age.

While Carswell was sitting in jail, family members presented compact discs to the police, filled with what Cox said is obscene material involving the sexual performance of a child. The material was in the form of videos and photographs.

A Santa Rosa judge signed

a warrant, and Carswell was served while incarcerated. He faces 42 counts.

Cox said if convicted, Carswell could face up to 210 years in prison.

Carswell is not a registered sex offender.

The investigation is continuing, Cox said. Additional charges might be forthcoming.

Bill proposes oil drilling in Blackwater Forest

On Jan. 22, State Representative Doug Broxson filed a bill that would allow for drilling and mining of oil and gas resources at Blackwater River State Forest.

HB 431 would give the governor's Board of Trustees of the Internal Improvement Trust Fund the ability to develop oil and gas resources on the Blackwater River State Forest if the "development yields near-term revenues for the state," according to the bill.

The bill excludes environmentally sensitive areas, according to Broxson, such as creek beds.

Similar bills have been proposed in years past; however, none have passed. Last year, HB 695 faced opposition and died on a second reading in March. Previously in the Senate, a version of the bill also died in a committee.

Broxson said he expects this bill to be more successful than the previous since it only includes Blackwater. Previous bills included other state forests.

2 dead, one critical after 3 weekend motorcycle wrecks

Three motorcycle accidents during the weekend have left two people dead.

The most recent happened in Bagdad on Sunday. The Florida Highway Patrol is reporting Thomas Alton Sanders, 57, Bagdad, is in critical condition after a one-vehicle crash about 1 p.m.

Sanders was driving a 1977 Honda motorcycle east on Old Bagdad Highway at Rice Road.

Reports say the rear tire began to skid, causing the bike to "collide with the ground."

Sanders skidded 110 feet before stopping in the eastbound lane. The bike went on about 180 feet from the point of impact before landing in the centerline of the road. Witnesses told troopers Sanders was "traveling at a high rate of speed at the time of the incident." He was not wearing a helmet, according to FHP. Alcohol was not a factor. The damage to the bike was valued

at \$5,000.

On Sunday, the drivers of two motorcycles in two separate accidents were killed.

A Navarre woman died in Fort Walton Beach after the 2003 Honda motorcycle she was driving was cut off in traffic at an intersection.

FHP said Shaaron Jackson Lively, 59, Navarre, died at the scene of the noon crash. It happened at the intersection of U.S. 98 and Serville Court. Troopers say she was traveling west on

U.S. 98 when a 2010 GMC pickup truck driven by William E. Smith, 42, Fort Walton Beach, went into the intersection, crossing the path of Lively.

Reports say Lively "was unable to take evasive prior to striking the left front of V-1 (GMC truck)." Both vehicles came to rest in the westbound turn lane of U.S. 98. Alcohol is not reported to be a factor for Smith, who was wearing a seat belt. Results are pending on Lively, who was wearing a helmet, according to FHP.

The third motorcycle crash happened in Pensacola at Highway 29 and Van Pelt Lane just before 1 p.m. Sunday.

Dead is 19-year-old Taylor Austin Weir. He was driving a 2003 Honda motorcycle, according to FHP. Weir was going northbound on the northbound center lane of Highway 29 when a 2005 Kia UT driven by Kathleen Eccles, 31, traveling south at the left turn lane attempted a left hand turn





New center to be named after June Ates

The name of June Ates has been used a lot lately as the preparations are made for the new covered arena in East Milton. The lifelong Milton resident will have the new Santa Rosa equestrian center named in her honor.


So who is June Ates and why is she being honored in this way?

The Ates family has been well known in the Santa Rosa County area since the early 1800s. In 1972 June Hodgson became June Ates. She said she was "tickled to death" to move on a farm when she married Jeff, a fifth generation of the family.

"People joked that I married him because he had horses, but I had a horse. I went after him for the truck and trailer," Ates said jokingly.

Ates has been a major supporter of the covered arena, which was approved for construction on Tuesday and should be complete in about 180 days.

The honor for Ates isn't just in name. She will be utilizing the center along

"That was a big shock. It needs to be named after Kyle (Holley), he did all the work," she said. "I'm flattered and humbled that they think so much of me, but I'm not one to bring attention to myself."

"I'm just super excited about it. It's going to open up, hopefully, the youth involvement in livestock again," she said. "I love watching the kids get involved in steer racing and showing. It teaches them so much responsibility."

Commissioner Bob Cole said the decision to name the arena the June Ates Arena was made because of Ates' efforts to bring this project to life.

"June Ates, in particular, was one of the people that brought it to my attention that we needed this facility out here," Cole said. "She's a positive and encouraging person in everything she does."

with others in the community. Ates was injured in a serious accident years ago. In March of 1988, Ates was helping her husband log wood on their property when a tree landed on her.

"I was hooking (a tree) to the tractor to be pulled out," she said. "I happened to not be paying attention and it broke my back."

She was in the hospital and rehab for 2 1/2 months.

"I tried to not let it get to me," she said. "All I could think about (in the hospital) was that I have three small kids and a farm to take care of."

Now Ates walks with forearm crutches, but it doesn't slow her down.

"You deal with what you're dealt and figure out

new ways," she said. "You can always adjust."

The mother of three said this accident caused her children to grow up, but there are blessings in everything, she said.


"I couldn't throw the saddle up on a horse so the girls had to learn," she said. "I was just focused on family."

Ates' resilience and her

involvement with 4-H, the National Barrel Horse Association and the County Fair led her to encourage the commission to push for the new equestrian center.

Having the arena named in her honor was a complete surprise for Ates, who sunk down in her chair when it was announced at Tuesday's County Commission meeting.

Buddy joined the Navy in January 1942 and served as a radioman-gunner in a SB2-C dive-bomber flying from the


Carrier U.S.S. Hancock in the Pacific. He was wounded in the 1944 battle over Clark Field, Philippines, and received a Purple Heart.



onto Van Pelt Lane. As Eccles turned, the right side front bumper hit the left side of the motorcycle. The Kia traveled east after the collision and came to rest after hitting a utility pole. The motorcycle stopped about 20 feet east of the northbound lane where it was traveling, blocking two lanes on

Van Pelt Lane. Weir died at Sacred Heart Hospital several hours after the crash. Alcohol was not a factor in this crash, according to FHP reports. Weir was wearing a helmet; Eccles was wearing a seat belt. Charges in all of these accidents are pending completed investigation.

One major benefit of the drilling, according to Broxson, would be the royalties it would produce to help schools and communities — Broxson estimated between \$30 and \$60 million, with Santa Rosa's or Okaloosa's share funneled back through state coffers. According to his office, Santa Rosa County received \$974,617 last year from a gas and oil tax that resulted from 3,800 barrels a day currently pumped out of the ground in Jay.

Blackwater River State Park opened in 1968 with 360 acres and acquired an additional 230 acres in 1981 from the Division of Forestry. Sen. Greg Evers said his overall opinion of the bill is positive. "It will build jobs and help with the economy," he said. "With gas prices right now, I think it's a good thing." Broxson stated he believes this drilling could be done without disturbing the nature of the state park thanks to new technology. "The evidence is there. We can go 30 miles from Milton (to Jay) and get reams of testimony about how safe it is," he said. For more information on the petition opposing the bill, go to Facebook.com and search "Save Blackwater River State Forest."

It is impossible at this point to know exactly how much would come back to the County if drilling were allowed in Blackwater State Forest, he notes. He also mentioned, depending on how much was found, the creation of several hundred jobs. "The motivation to find pockets of oil has increased," Broxson said. After hearing word of the proposed bill, local residents have created a Facebook page under the name "Save Blackwater River State Forest" and have also created a petition on change.org stating that they want Blackwater River State Forest to remain pristine and untouched by drilling and mining. 

OUR VIEW

Safety preparedness must be reinforced regularly

Five people received treatment last week after a dimethylamine leak at Tamino in Pace. Two of those actually work at the facility, and another was a truck driver on the scene at the time — the other two were Lifeguard Ambulance employees. To those living in the Pace area, it was easy to know something had happened: Those alarms started going off.

The alarms were plenty loud and were easy to hear even from inside homes with doors closed. On Sundays, the facility tests the system. The loud “beeps” typically are followed

by a voice telling residents “this is only a test.” No such message followed last week’s release; therefore, the event was real, but we find ourselves wondering, do Pace residents actually know what to do in the event of a leak?

When equipment is tested so regularly, it is easy to start paying little attention. Years ago, there was a turtle “mascot.” This colorful critter went to schools and taught children how to do as he does: shelter in place. He would explain that, in times of emergency, he pulls himself inside his house (shell

and seals up the entrance. Similarly, he would tell children how they could safely shelter in their home.

What happened to this little fella? Does he still make the rounds? What about the rest of Pace? Should not residents regularly be educated on sheltering in place?

In your newspaper, expect a story soon explaining this procedure. In the meantime, we thought we would take this opportunity to simply ask our residents if you know what you are expected to do in the event of a leak — and are you prepared to do so?

Some of the actions include:
 1.) Close all doors.
 2.) Close all windows.
 3.) Roll up wet towels and place them along the bottom of doors, covering any cracks.
 4.) Turn off any heating or air conditioning equipment that might be pulling air from outside.

Similar comments could be made about the county’s hurricane evacuation plans and emergency preparedness.

Every so often, the public needs to be re-educated, lest they begin to take things for granted and forget what is expected of them in an

emergency. With the influx of people coming and going from any community, regular disbursement of information is necessary.

This will be particularly true this hurricane season. It has now been almost eight years since Santa Rosa residents had to deal with a direct hurricane hit. Many residents already have begun to be complacent — others simply were not here.

We say all this to remind those in charge of keeping us safe, to also keep us informed. History is full of examples of people not doing what was expected of them.

Ask the Preacher
...a weekly column answering your questions with Biblical answers about life.



Dear Pastor Gallups, "I read somewhere, in one of your articles, I think...that you believe that Deacons ought not to "run" or administrate church affairs. How can that be? So many churches depend upon their Deacons to keep the church running?"

— S.S. — Pace

Dear S.S.,

Let me say before I go any further, that how a church chooses to operate is between it and the Lord. It is not my place in this article to tell any church how to run its business. You have asked for my opinion, however, on a very important matter...so I will answer your question.

S.S., the scriptures simply **do not allow** for Deacons to administrate the affairs of a church. Most Bible scholars agree that the first appointing of Deacons in the church is found in the Acts chapter six account. Here they were clearly chosen to spread the gospel, keep peace in the body and **SERVE** the church by **ministry**.

The very word "deacon" in the Biblical language of the Greek means, "servant." The qualifications for a Deacon are found in **I Tim 3:8**. In not one scripture is found an example of or an expectation that the Deacons "run the affairs" of a church. By "affairs" of a church we would mean matters of church business, budgets, programming, pastoral job descriptions, etc. The Bible **IS** very clear who should determine these matters...the **Elders**. (**I Tim 5:17a**)

The qualifications for and the job description of Elders are entirely different than those of Deacons. (**Titus 1:6-9**) Churches get into trouble when this Biblical truth is confused.

Who are Elders, then? Again, this would be left up to the individual church. Certainly the Pastor and/or Associate Pastors could be considered to be Elders. (**I Tim 5:17b**) Any group of Ministry Directors or specially appointed or elected people could serve a church in the "elder" capacity. It is **THIS** group, whoever the church determines they are, that should "run the affairs" of the church...**NOT** the Deacons. I believe that the Lord particularly blesses a church that keeps this New Testament order of administration.

I trust that this answers your question. Thank you for asking my opinion in this matter.

Local drag racer Martin driving for Al Anabi Racing

Joey Martin, a local chassis builder from East Milton and the driver of the Outlaw Doorslammer Pro Extreme Promod of the ADRL, the "Lowmad," has landed in Doha, Qatar, as a crew member for David Hance. Since 2009, Sheikh Khalid bin Hamad Al Thani (KH), owner of Al Anabi Racing and president of the Qatar Racing Club, sponsors a drag racing series in Qatar.

"The Qatar Racing Club has been proclaimed as the fastest racing surface in the world and proven by producing some of the quickest and fastest times in event competition," as stated on their website.

After the first race of the series was canceled because of a sand storm, the crew had five days to kill before the next race. During a walk-through of a warehouse full of cars, a snow white Camaro stood out. No one knew what was to come next. Within a few hours and a timely placed text message, KH gave the nod for Joey to drive this brand new Garret screw blown 1969 Camaro for Al Anabi Racing in the series.

"Never in my wildest dreams had I thought of a chance to drag race in the desert, much less compete for a championship," Martin said. From pieced-together bracket cars to building and driving the Fastest Wagon on Earth, he has earned respect in the drag racing world. "This is proof that you just never know what will be in your future," he said.

Martin had spent a couple days making sure this new car was set up the way he liked. Being a chassis builder really helped in the adjustments. This brand new car rolled onto the track for its first attempted pass, a half-track run, when the car became unstable and he let off still rolling out the end of the track with

a 3.99 at 148 mph. Having a day to spare, Martin called up fellow racer Brandon Snider to come crew for him.

The next morning he was on a plane; 14 hours later he landed in Qatar. Suitcases full of parts and tools, this duo would combine to baffle the other teams. The first round of qualifying was short, a great launch then the car became loose. The next round was a solid 3.82 at 199 mph. After the sun had gone down in the desert, the third round improved with a 3.78 at 202 mph. Still last in the field that afternoon, the next day would bring fireworks as Martin chose his tune-up and ran a stellar 3.70 at 200 mph moving him to qualifying in second position for the eliminations.

The car was getting close, yet to break the 3.60s, it had plenty of tune-up to move on. Martin drew Alex Hossler of Al Anabi racing as his first opponent in the event. This was the true test as to the abilities of the two-man team. They were up against the legend Frank Manzo tuning for Hossler. Both cars took the tree, and as the lights fell, Hossler left early automatically giving Martin the win, but the sleek white Camaro ran his lane dipping into the 3.60s. Martin had made it from a crew member to winning his first round in the Qatar Racing Series. No time to celebrate, as the next opponent was the fastest man in the USA, Frankie "Madman" Taylor.

Again after the burnout, both cars staged to what could be a historical race for both drivers. Martin left first, and within a second, the car's wheelie bars failed and threw the car left, ending the chances of a first time winner. Not winning was tough, but taking a brand new car, described by Martin as, "Never had the brakes mashed," to the finals was a success.

Lady Argos come back to defeat Christian Brothers

PENSACOLA — After overcoming a double-digit deficit at halftime to tie the game with eight seconds left in regulation, the West Florida women's basketball team dominated the ensuing overtime period to defeat Christian Brothers 61-54 Saturday afternoon at the UWF Field House.

It was the Argonauts' (5-12, 2-7 Gulf South Conference) second conference win in as many games, while the Lady Buccaneers fell to 5-12, 2-7 GSC.

"We got ourselves refocused (at the half)," UWF coach Stephanie Lawrence Yelton said. "We got ourselves to play in the moment ... and we were able to pull it together."

Trailing by 14 at the half, the Argonauts slowly whittled away at the Lady Bucs' lead, trailing by two, 46-44, with 3:53 left in regulation. CBU went up by four with a layup at the 3:21 mark, but Toynetta Johnson (Pascagoula, Miss./Pearl River CC) hit a momentum-changing 3-pointer to bring the Argos within one, 50-49, with 2:44 on the clock.



Raquel Miller (Jackson, Tenn./Southern Illinois) gave the Argos their first lead since 14:08 in the first half with a layup with 42 seconds left in the second half. But CBU took the lead back, 53-51, on a three-point-play with 25 seconds remaining.

With 10 seconds left, Hannah Vette (Tarkio, Mo./Mineral Area CC) missed a game-tying jumper, but Jasmine Wigfall (Orlando/Timber Creek HS) got the rebound and drew a foul with eight seconds remaining. She made a pair of free throws to tie things up, 53-53, and send it to overtime.

"Jasmine Wigfall made two great free throws there to tie it up at the end," Yelton said. "As a freshman, she's really stepped up a lot."

It was all Argos the rest of

the way. UWF outscored CBU 8-1 in overtime, while going 6 for 8 from the free-throw line and forcing the Lady Bucs to go 0 for 6 from the field.

Vette led the Argos with 20 points and a career-high 17 rebounds in her second consecutive game with a double-double and 20 or more points. It was her sixth double-double of the season and seventh of her career.

"Overall she had a great game," Yelton said. "Down the stretch, we were able to go to her. Hannah made some really tough plays, and some good 3-point plays in the second half, to really help us win."

Wigfall added 16 points, scoring in the double-digits for the second consecutive contest, while Johnson had another solid performance with seven points, eight assists and four steals. Miller added three blocks, a pair of steals and 11 rebounds.

UWF will host a pair of home contests next week with a game against North Alabama at 5 p.m. Thursday and a game against Union at 2 p.m. Saturday.

FRIEND IS STINGY WITH HIS THANK-YOUS

DEAR HARRIETTE: A friend asked me to do a huge favor for him, and, as usual, I did it right away. Did he send me a thank-you note or even pick up the phone to call? Exactly. I am so miffed. He could at least have acknowledged that I did what he asked. How do I address this without blowing up? -- Hurt, Westchester, N.Y.

DEAR HURT: Wait until you calm down. It is not wise to scold anyone when you are upset.

Once you have cooled off, reach out to your friend and tell him that you did what he asked and that you are not happy he failed to complete the circle. He likely will apologize at that point, for whatever that will be worth after the fact.

DEAR HARRIETTE: I read the response about hospice from "Compassionate Nurse," and, as a hospice volunteer for more than 15 years, I would like to add some thoughts.

First, I want to say that the nurses, in my opinion, are the angels of palliative care and hospice services. They deal with the patients day in and day out and can give the families the most accurate information about their loved ones.

To me, the essence of hospice care is the support and compassion the system gives to the patients and families. I believe that most people think death is an event. This is true when one dies of a heart attack, brain aneurysm, etc. Otherwise, death is a process over time, and this is where hospice can guide the family and loved ones.

Hospice is there to give as much support as requested, including emotional support, answers to questions and medical equipment for comfort. Remember that hospice care can be in the home or at a hospice facility.

The person in need has many choices today. There are for-profit and nonprofit palliative and hospice care organizations. I belong to a nonprofit one, which by state law must have at least 5 percent volunteer participation to keep its status. I am not saying one is better than the other, but I am suggesting that people contact more than one in order to obtain the best care for the person in need.

Another important aspect of hospice is the bereavement support most offer after the loved one has passed on. The survivors learn and experience that there is no wrong way to grieve and that to be human is to grieve. The pain of the loss never goes away; one just learns to manage it better. -- Hospice Volunteer, Chicago

DEAR HOSPICE VOLUNTEER: Thank you for adding your insight to this conversation. I believe many readers and I have learned a lot about the role of hospice and palliative care, thanks to the many people who have written to me to clarify what actually happens during this tender time in a family's life.





FWC REPORT

SANTA ROSA COUNTY

FWC Officer Howard Jones was on patrol near the community of Holley within the Eglin wildlife management area when he observed a fresh set of all-terrain vehicle tracks that indicated a four-wheeler had exited a closed area earlier in the day. In addition, Jones noticed drag marks that showed a deer might have been dragged behind the ATV.

Jones tracked the ATV and drag marks to the backyard of a home in the community of Holley. There he found an individual, dressed in hunting clothes, who had just completed butchering a large buck deer. The deer head was still hanging in a tree, and the carcass, meat and butchering tools were present.

After an interview, Jones said the individual confessed to utilizing the ATV to hunt the night before and that he shot the deer after having skinned its eyes. He was charged with night



hunting, hunting in a closed area and operating an ATV on the Eglin WMA. All instruments of the crime were seized as evidence.

OKALOOSA COUNTY

On Dec. 23, 2012, RPS Officers Sulin Schafer and Alan Kirchinger responded to a complaint regarding an antlerless deer being killed in Eglin. A witness reported hearing a vehicle drive by and

shooting along the road. He confronted the man and posted the incident on Facebook.

Eglin staff saw the post and contacted FWC. By that time, the suspect had left the area, but the officers obtained a description of the man and his vehicle. On Jan. 19, check station personnel observed the man return to the area to hunt.

They contacted Schafer and Kirchinger and advised them that the man was still checked in the area. The officers, along with Lt. Dan Hahr and Officer James Rockwell, responded to the area and teamed up to locate the man and interview him. Eglin Range Patrol found the hunter and had him follow them to the check station.

The FWC officers interviewed him and obtained a sworn statement in which he confessed to killing a doe deer and hiding it in the woods. The officers seized the rifle used to kill the deer. Charges of taking antlerless deer out of season and willful wanton waste of wildlife are pending.

Alzheimer's Family Services support group


Covenant Hospice in Milton is holding a free monthly support group for families and friends coping with a loved one with Alzheimer's disease.



'No budget, no pay' plan for Congress advances

WASHINGTON (AP) — In an earlier era, a move like the one engineered by House GOP leaders to pass a “no budget, no pay” measure probably would have been stopped in its tracks. But with Congress’ approval ratings in the gutter, House lawmakers pushed aside questions about fairness and constitutionality and tacked the idea on to an unpopular, must-pass measure to increase the government’s borrowing cap.

The measure temporarily would withhold pay from any member of the House or Senate whose chamber doesn’t pass a budget this year. The Senate is expected to approve it in the coming week, but only after leaders make clear they think “no budget, no pay” is rife with flaws and is not going to be repeated.

The proposal is before the Senate because the House breezed past objections that the idea is unconstitutional because it could “vary” the pay of lawmakers in violation of the 27th Amendment to the Constitution. The House ignored concerns that the measure is unfair to members who are in the minority and are powerless to determine whether a budget passes or not.

Nearly unmentioned was the prospect that withholding lawmakers’ pay favors wealthy members over those of more modest means and could, in theory,

attract more affluent candidates better able to withstand having some of their \$174,000 salary withheld.

“The last thing we want to do is to say to people running for Congress, ‘If you’re not a millionaire, don’t run because there’s no guarantee you’ll be paid,’” said Rep. Jerrold Nadler, D-N.Y.

For these reasons and more, the idea went nowhere in the last congressional session. But it was embraced about a week ago by House GOP leaders such as Speaker John Boehner of Ohio as they struggled to avoid a potential market-crippling default on government obligations.

The proposal is a slap at the Democratic-controlled Senate, which hasn’t passed a budget since 2009. Republicans advanced the measure as a one-year experiment rather than a permanent law.

The logic behind “no budget, no pay” goes like this: Passing a budget is the core responsibility of Congress, so why should lawmakers get paid if they don’t do their main job?

“The hardworking people that I represent wouldn’t be paid if they didn’t show up and they didn’t do their job,” said Rep. Michael Fitzpatrick, R-Pa. “And this place should operate no differently.”

For Republicans, much of the appeal of the measure was that it was a rare

opportunity to cram something down the Senate’s throat. Two years of polarizing battles over issues big and small have left little good will between the GOP-run House and the Democratic-controlled Senate.

In the Senate, traditionalists such as Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., opted to set aside their concerns and avoid the task of beating back such an irresistible message. Reid also welcomed the reprieve from a potential economy-rattling government debt crisis.

“The House Republicans had to add a gimmick or two to the bill, but I understand, we all understand,” Reid told reporters. “The tea party plays a big part in what goes on in the House and they need a gimmick or two to get things done over there. But to spare the middle class another knock-down, drag-out fight we are going to ... get it out of here as quickly as we can.”

Reid’s announcement came hours after the incoming chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash., issued a statement saying the committee would produce a budget for the first time since 2009. The four years without one caused much frustration for Republicans and embarrassment for junior Democrats such as Sen. Joe Manchin of West Virginia, a co-sponsor of “no budget, no pay.”

WTC workers scrawl graffiti of defiance, hope

NEW YORK (AP) — On most construction projects, workers are discouraged from signing or otherwise scrawling on the iron and concrete. At the skyscraper rising at ground zero, though, they’re being invited to leave messages for the ages.

“Freedom Forever. WTC 9/11” is scrawled on a beam near the top of the gleaming, 104-story One World Trade Center. “Change is from within” is on a beam on the roof. Another reads: “God Bless the workers & inhabitants of this bldg.”

One of the last pieces of steel hoisted up last year sits near a precarious edge. The message on it reads: “We remember. We rebuild. We come back stronger!” It is signed by a visitor to the site last year — President Barack Obama.

The words on beams, walls and stairwells of the skyscraper that replaces the twin towers lost on Sept. 11, 2001, form the graffiti of defiance and rebirth, what ironworker supervisor Kevin Murphy calls “things from the heart.” They’re remembrances of the 2,700 people who died, and testaments to the hope that rose from a shattered morning.

“This is not just any construction site, this is a special place for these guys,” says Murphy of the 1,000 men and some women who work in the building at any given time, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

“Everyone here wants to be here, they want to put this building up,” Murphy says. “They’re part of the redemption.”

On a frigid, windy winter day, with the 9/11 memorial fountain straight below and the Statue of Liberty in the distance, Murphy supervised a crew of men guiding the first piece of the steel spire that will top out the building at a dizzying 1,776 feet — the tallest in the Western Hemisphere.

In the rooftop iron scaffolding for the spire, 105 floors up, a beam pays homage to Lillian Frederick, a 46-year-old administrative assistant who died on the 105th floor of the south tower, pierced by a terrorist-hijacked airliner.

A popular Spanish phrase is penned next to two names on one concrete pillar: “Te Amo Tres Metros Sobre el Cielo,” meaning, “I love you three steps above heaven.”

Some beams are almost completely covered in a spaghetti-like jumble of doodled hearts and flowers, loopy cursive and blaring capitals. Many want to simply mark their presence: “Henry Wynn/Plumbers Local (hash)1/Sheepshead Bay/Never Forget!”


Families of victims invited to go up left names and comments too, as did firefighters and police officers who were first responders. “R.I.P Fanny Espinoza, 9-11-01” reads a typical remembrance signed by several family members of a Cantor-Fitzgerald employee.

Former Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff wrote: “With you in spirit — those who perished, those who fought, those who built.”

the communal grief as the workers carry on, trading jokes and gruff male banter. Some ends up in whimsical graffiti marking World Cup soccer matches, New York Giants Super Bowl victories and other less-weighty matters that have gone on since construction began six years ago. One crudely drawn map of the neighborhood down below shows the location of a popular strip club.

People on the ground below will never see the spontaneous private thoughts high in the Manhattan sky. The graffiti will disappear as the raw basic structure is covered with drywall, moving panels and paint for tenants coming into the 3 million square feet of office space by 2014.

Knowing this, workers and visitors often take photographs of special bits of graffiti, so the words will live on.

Harbaugh parents could become Super Bowl TV stars

NEW YORK (AP) — Jack and Jackie Harbaugh would do well to practice their impassive faces in front of a mirror before the Super Bowl.

The parents of Baltimore Ravens coach John and the San Francisco 49ers' Jim Harbaugh will be watched closely during Sunday's Super Bowl — if anybody finds them — for any visual evidence that mommy and daddy really do love one boy or the other best.

It promises to be a fascinating sidebar to CBS' coverage of the game because, as Lynn and Rick Raisman can attest, parent cams are valuable in sports coverage. NBC's clip of the Raismans watching daughter Aly perform on the uneven bars during last summer's Olympics in London went viral, with stage parents everywhere relating to their murmurs and facial contortions.

"I had no idea it was going to be so great," said David Michaels, senior producer at NBC Sports, who often produces and directs coverage of gymnastics and figure skating, events where parental involvement can be particularly intense.

Michaels makes it a point to know where parents are sitting during competitions,


tracking them through spot-ers or sometimes sports governing bodies that know where parent seats have been assigned. Or where they are not sitting: Sometimes a dad who retreats to a concession stand because he can't bear to watch an offspring compete is a good story, too.

Michaels said he tries not to overdo it, sticking with parents who he knows are interesting and very involved in their children's competitive undertakings.

"It has certainly gotten more ubiquitous," he said. "Sometimes it's fantastic and sometimes it's just too gratuitous."

Jack, a former college and high school football coach, and his wife will be attending the Super Bowl. On a conference call last week, the parents said they did not know where they would be sitting. Even if they did, they'd be unlikely to inform a horde of reporters about their seat locations.

The senior Harbaugh was a college head coach at Western Michigan and an assistant at several places, including Michigan, Pittsburgh and Stanford. His son-in-law, Tom Crean, is the Indiana University men's basketball coach. It doesn't seem like a family

that would want to watch a game casually while piling their plates with nachos.

The couple had a practice run to see what it would be like to watch their sons coach against each other on Thanksgiving 2011, when older brother John's Ravens beat the 49ers 16-6.

During that game, the couple watched in an office. Jack said his wife's face looked "nearly comatose" throughout the contest.

"She just stared at the screen," he said. "Not a word was spoken. And at the end of the game, it was just over."

They'll experience the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat — all at once. A 75-yard touchdown pass that would be reason to stand up and cheer for one son is another son's

horrible defensive lapse.

"I am going to be neutral in the game," Jackie Harbaugh said. "I know one is going to win and one is going to lose, but I would really like to end in a tie. Can the NFL do that?"

CBS Sports President Sean McManus said there will be a pregame feature about the familial battle. It would be hard to argue otherwise; no matter how much the brothers want to downplay it, it's a unique situation. But McManus said CBS would try not to let it dominate its coverage of the game.

Given the need for the coaches' parents to stay neutral, longtime TV critic David Bianculli said he wondered how much of a story it will be visually for CBS. If they really maintain

impassive faces, how much will viewers want to see them on the screen?

"I would advise them to pay attention to the field, more than anything else," said Bianculli, who teaches about television for Rowan University.

A stone face is a story, too, Michaels said. The only question is how much a producer should go back to the shot.

He said he can't imagine CBS not knowing where the couple is. If they're out in public, the network will

likely keep a close eye on their reactions.

"As a producer or a director in this kind of a situation, it's incumbent upon you to know where every element of the story is because you never know how it's going to evolve," Michaels said.

Finding the right approach ultimately shouldn't be much of a problem for CBS, he said.

"It's a little bit of a distraction at times," he said. "But they'll figure out the best way to deal with it. The pictures won't lie."

Soda spills, freezes on Pa. road when rigs crash

SAN ANDREAS, Calif. — Authorities in Northern California say a man arrested in nothing but a trench coat and socks after a break-in told investigators he had been using the homeowner's sauna.

Calaveras County sheriff's deputies arrested 49-year-old Robert London this week after they responded to a report of a burglary at a home in San Andreas. He pleaded not guilty Thursday to charges of burglary and possession of stolen property.

Sheriff's Sgt. Chris Hewitt says arriving deputies found the homeowner on top of a nearly naked London on the driveway.

The homeowner said he discovered London going through

his kitchen cabinets and chased him out the door.

Hewitt says London told investigators he thought the house was vacant, and he had used the sauna there in the past.

Polite British vandal guilty of damaging cars

LONDON — A British professor who specializes in cities and urban life has been convicted of damaging luxury cars with graffiti that was surprisingly polite.

Stephen Graham was found guilty Friday of using a screwdriver to scrawl inoffensive words such as "very silly," "really wrong" and "arbitrary" into the paintwork of vehicles including a Mercedes, an Audi, and a Volvo.

Prosecutors said the spree caused 18,000 pounds (\$29,000) in damage.

Graham, who teaches at Newcastle University in northeast England, pleaded guilty to criminal damage at Newcastle Crown Court.

Graham's lawyer said the 47-year-old academic had no recollection of his August vandalism spree. Graham previously blamed a bad reaction to alcohol, antibiotics and prescription drugs for his behavior.

Judge James Gos said he would sentence Graham next month.

Southfork Ranch draws 'Dallas' fans old and new

PARKER, Texas (AP) — The white two-story home with stately pillars overlooking a green Texas pasture where longhorns roam is instantly recognizable: This is the power seat of television's famous Ewing family.

Tourists from around the world have been flocking to Southfork Ranch since the early years of the classic series "Dallas," which ran from 1978 to 1991, and the ranch is only getting more popular. With the premiere last June of a new "Dallas" series, the number of visitors at Southfork has doubled from 150,000 annually to more than 300,000, according to Jim Gomes, general manager of the Southfork Ranch & Hotel and vice president of Forever Resorts, which owns the property.

"We are obviously thrilled the new fans love Southfork as much as the original fans of 'Dallas,'" said Gomes.

The new show starts its second season Monday on the TNT cable channel. The recent death of Larry Hagman, who starred as

conniving Texas oilman J.R. Ewing in both the original series and the new show, has also spurred fans to visit.

The 340-acre ranch is located about 25 miles northeast of downtown Dallas in the suburb of Parker. Patrick Duffy, who has returned to the role of J.R.'s brother Bobby, said that the biggest changes since he first filmed on the ranch are new tourist-related buildings and event facilities for weddings and meetings, along with the buildup of the surrounding town, including housing additions and a high school.

But any time he's back at Southfork, it doesn't take long for the magic to take over. "You drive down that road and you look across this pasture and there's the front of Southfork and it looks like the opening credits of the show and I know why people love it so much," Duffy said.

Duffy remembers a time when fans watching them film consisted of small groups of 20 to 30 people. Those crowds grew to the

hundreds as the "Who Shot J.R.?" mania built in 1980 when a cliffhanger left fans in suspense. The answer came on Nov. 21, 1980, when the shooter was revealed to be Kristin — J.R.'s vengeful mistress, who was also his sister-in-law — in an episode that was seen by more people than any TV program in history until that time.

When the series first began filming at Southfork, the family that built the house in 1970 still lived there. And while they hosted tourists as the show's popularity grew, it didn't become an official tourist attraction and event location until 1985 after they sold it. Forever Resorts bought Southfork in 1992.

Most of the shooting for the original series was done in Los Angeles, though some of it was filmed in Texas, but the new show is being filmed in the Dallas area — with locations ranging from the flagship Neiman Marcus downtown to the gleaming Cowboys Stadium.

TWEET SEATS

Providence theater experiments with word of mouth

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) — Sarah Bertness slipped into her seat at a recent staging of the musical "Million Dollar Quartet" and, when the lights dimmed, started doing something that's long been taboo inside theaters: typing away at her iPhone.

The 26-year-old freelance writer from Providence wasn't being rude. She had a spot in the "tweet seat" section at the Providence Performing Arts Center.

The downtown theater is now setting aside a small number of seats — in the back — for those who promise to live-tweet from the performance using a special hash tag. They might offer impressions of the set, music or costumes, lines of dialogue that resonate with them or anything else that strikes them, really.

At "Million Dollar Quartet," based on the true story of a 1956 recording session that united music greats Johnny Cash, Elvis Presley, Jerry Lee Lewis and Carl Perkins, PPAC for the first time had cast members tweeting from backstage, too.

A growing number of theaters, including some on Broadway, have been experimenting in recent years with tweet seats and other real-time uses of social media as they try to figure out the relationship between the stage and the smartphone.

Some insist the theater should remain a sacred, technology-free place and that allowing the use of phones during a show — even discreetly — only serves as a potential distraction for other patrons. But others say theaters can't afford not to engage the digital generation, and that the way performances were once enjoyed, in a vacuum, doesn't hold up anymore.

"I think that it's important that PPAC and cultural institutions in

general kind of jump on the social media bandwagon and learn to engage a broader audience," said Bertness, who runs the blog The Rhode Islander and is such a big Johnny Cash fan that she showed up to the performance wearing all black. "I think it's such a valuable tool."

Scott Moreau, an understudy for Johnny Cash, hadn't ever tweeted from backstage during a performance. He tried to provide a glimpse of what life's like on the tour, which he likened to the special features on a DVD. He said he enjoyed getting

instant feedback from the tweeters — feedback he shared with other cast members.

"It makes it feel a lot more personal," Moreau said.

A picture of Moreau that was tweeted out from backstage — he was tweeting in it himself — prompted someone in the tweet seats to declare that's what the Man in Black would have looked like, with an iPhone.

Other theaters are also trying different digital ways to engage with patrons. In Boston, the Huntington Theater plans to introduce a "Twittermission" where an artist affiliated with the production, or someone from the theater's staff, answers questions about the show on Twitter during intermissions. The tweets will also be projected on screens in the theater lobby, according to spokeswoman Rebecca Curtiss.

The theater won't be introducing tweet seats, though.

"We feel strongly that the experience that an audience member has in our theater should be limited to what they are seeing on the stage," Curtiss said. "When the lights go down and the show begins, we want the art on stage to speak for itself."


