County: Can't afford more school resource officers

A grant is available to pay 75% of the salaries for nine deputies to be hired—specifically school resource officers, but the other 25% would come from the County, something commissioners say there is no money to support.

Santa Rosa Sheriff Wendell Hall is looking to hire nine, full-time school resource officers with the help of the Department of Justice Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS). Hall called for

a referendum to help meet the county's financial obligations as part of the matching grant after Commissioners hesitated to commit the county's 25%, citing no money in the budget to support it.

"I don't even have a child in school anymore," Hall said. "But I would gladly pay an additional \$40 to \$50 dollars (a year)."

The grant would fund 75% of the officer's salary, or \$993,000 over a three-year period. The County would be liable for the remaining 25% of \$331,271. The grant states the officers hired

with the program must maintain employment for one full year after the grant funding ends.

That full cost to taxpayers adds up to \$423,000 a year—not including equipment or vehicles. The Sheriff would have to find additional resources for nine patrol cars for the officers and other costs like uniforms and training.

"Our schools are our biggest assets," Hall said. "Our children, our quality of life and our level of education is second to none."

The county has applied for the COPS grant in the past with

varying results.

"In the early 2000s, after I was elected in 2001, we began increasing our school resource officers," Hall said. "We were able to do that because of the COPS grant." Hall said federal funding for the grant program was redirected to other departments, such as homeland security, after the Sept. 11 attack.

"Those grants pretty much went away," Hall said. "After what happened, of course, in Newtown, Conn., the emphasis has shifted back, and that wasn't of course the first incident that

has happened. So that money is becoming available again."

But support for the grant has been proven difficult to find with the board. The county commissioners were skeptical of the associated costs of hiring additional officers, such as equipment and vehicles.

"You don't have it in your budget," Commissioner Jim Williamson said. "And we don't have it in ours."

Hall mentioned monies geared for a Community Center in Tiger

Milton irons out alcohol hours

Should alcohol sales end at midnight or 2 a.m.? That is the question facing the Milton City Council this week.

The idea of late-night alcohol sales in the tourist-development district moved one step closer toward approval during a city council meeting last week.

"I'm for the what the council is doing," Mayor Guy Thompson said. "I'm glad they're moving in the right direction. I feel they're motivated to open up to tourism."

Despite the support for extended hours, Councilman Grady Hester introduced a proposal during the executive session last Monday to scale the amended hours back to current regulations—7 a.m. to 12 a.m., Monday through Saturday. His motion failed to garner support from the other council members, according to Thompson.

"The problem with the council, they made a decision and stood by what they

A Santa Rosa Sheriff's deputy escaped serious injury Thursday night after a 22-year-old man who was later arrested for DUI, tried to ram his squad car at a high rate of speed, and ended the evening by backing over the squad car, breaking the windshield with the deputy inside.

Cameron Kimmons, Milton, became the target of an investigation after his family reported he had been drinking and was drunk behind the wheel of a pickup truck he took without permission.

Deputies responded to the original call of a stolen vehicle in the 4400 block of Arcadia St. just before 8 p.m.

When they arrived, Kimmons' grandfather told them his grandson had been sitting in the front yard drinking and listening to music.

It was reported Kimmons did not have a driver's license and drove off with a Ford F150 belonging to his grandfather. It was believed he might have gone to his

Right to speak pending Governor signing

Florida citizens may have more input at public meetings if Governor Rick Scott signs SB 50, a bill which would give all citizens time to speak at public meetings.

The bill adds to Florida's "Sunshine" law requiring access to information and public meetings. The law has not always guaranteed citizens to

participate in the meetings of governmental bodies such as the City Council or the County Commission. Mayor Guy Thompson said he is hoping that the governor will sign the bill.

"I like the bill I support the bill and I think people should have a right to speak," Thompson said.

Thompson said meetings might be longer if everyone in the meeting wants to speak,

but everyone will get a chance. Thompson said it has always been like this and he hopes this bill will bring light to what citizens' rights are.

It's up to the individual how they want to do it," Thompson said. "We do what state law requires us to do as far as informing the public on our meetings and in some cases we go beyond that."

Peggy Smith, a local citizen who supports SB 50 said

it's about time the law passed. She said she has been following similar bills for the past two years and said they have failed both times.

"I think it is a continued step in the right direction for transparency," Smith said. "Government on all levels needs to be reminded that they work for us not the other way around."

Breaking new ground on a blueberry patch

An open field has been his life. For the past 20 years, Ben Ellison has been driving a tractor and farming peanuts, now he is grasping the reins with his own endeavor. The new Blue Basket Farms is vested in the providing for community's future.

Ben and Jamie Ellison opened Blue Basket Farms this past weekend in Allentown. Ben says they opened a week late because of the late freeze, which slowed the growth of the blueberry bushes. "We had a great

opening day Saturday," Ben said. "We're definitely trying to make things work."

Blue Basket Farms is primarily a "you-pick-it" blueberry farm, though with a little advanced notice and a larger order, they'll help you pick it. They have around seven-and-a-half acres of blueberries up for picking with delicate fingers.

They have opened operations where Lundy's Berry Patch used to be on Highway 89 in Allentown. They plan to expand the business to incorporate more fresh produce grown on the property. At this point in the

season, the farm is producing blueberries. As the season progresses, Ben said they will have more fresh produce available. They have plans to grow watermelons, cantaloupe and sweet corn on the property around mid June.

"We're going to be the alternative to the grocery store when it comes to fresh produce," he said. "We're hoping around the last of this month, we'll get some peaches from Chilton County."

June 15, Blue Basket Farms will have a cancer awareness day, where 10 percent of their proceeds will be donated

to a cancer research charity. Cancer has had an impact close to Ben. Both his mother and his stepmother have battled breast cancer.

"My mom actually had it twice," said Ben.

The Ellison's have three boys; Carson, 4, Bailey, 12, and Tristan, 14.

Bailey and Tristan are active in sports at Central High School. Bailey is on the basketball team, while Tristan plays both basketball and baseball for Central.

The two oldest boys are responsible for a segment of the operation, according to their father. They are involved in

handling okra that is grown on the property.

"We had about 2,500 okra plants to begin with," Ben said. "They're responsible for cutting, grading and packaging the okra."

Along with handling the okra, the young men help with mowing and weed-eating around the property. Ben says that along with their sports schedule, they stay pretty busy.

Carson, the couple's four-year-old son, helps out around the farm, says Ben.

"Or at least he thinks he's helping," Ben said, with a smile.

Taminco sends mail-outs to inform citizens about alarms

Residents living within a two-mile radius should be expecting an important piece of mail that might save their life, if they have not already received it.

Taminco sent thousands of "Community mail-outs" to the roughly 5,100 residents living close to the chemical plant that produces amine compounds and derivatives.

Amy Dyer, Taminco site environmental health and safety manager, said the company wanted to take ownership of educating the public and rais-

ing awareness on the alarm system.

The company said it was concerned about any inconveniences caused by an alarm that was sounded Jan. 24 because of a dimethylamine (DMA60) leak. The leak caused five people to receive medical treatment but was not deemed a threat to the community, according to later reports. Two people were Taminco employees, one was a truck driver and two were EMS personnel.

"We sounded the alarm," Dyer said. "We wanted to activate the Shelter in Place, and we wanted to make sure people were safe."

Dyer said they performed modeling studies regarding the cloud of DMA60 that was released during a loading process. She said there should not have been any detection by the fence line of the property. The alarm that was triggered was precautionary.

After the incident, Taminco received a "critique, both internal and external," according to Dyer. The plant has a Community Advisory Panel that acts as a liaison for the community and plant activities. The panel gathered feedback from residents surrounding the January event.

The company said it wanted to take the opportunity to educate new residents close to the

plant and remind those that have been living close to the facility about the alarm procedures.

The emergency package contained a letter from the company to residents, an instructional DVD, an informative brochure and a glossy, step-by-step card of the procedures to follow in case of an event. Recipients were given the chance to win a free iPad by answering an enclosed quiz regarding the information in the package.

"We did not look at cost as a barrier for the public," Dyer said. "We wanted to make sure that people were confident in case we have to sound the alarm."

SHELTER IN PLACE INSTRUCTIONS

The alarm is tested the first Sunday of each Month.

1. Move inside immediately.
2. Close and lock all doors and windows (Provides better seal when locked)
3. Turn off ventilation systems
4. Go into and seal a room
5. Turn on TV/radio for the emergency alert system
6. After all clear, ventilate home by opening doors and windows

Helton sentenced to life in prison

State Attorney Bill Ed-dins announced Santa Rosa offender Timothy Donald Helton was sentenced by Judge David Rimmer to life in state prison as a habitual felony offender and prison release reoffender.

A Santa Rosa County jury convicted Helton of aggravated battery with

a deadly weapon causing great bodily harm and battery on January 17, 2013.

On May 31, 2011, Helton was arrested by the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office after he got into an argument with another man at a home in Navarre.

Reports say Helton struck the first victim with a homemade weapon. He then left the residence but returned with a friend about 10 minutes later. Helton got out of the truck with a metal pipe and threw the pipe at a second victim, striking him in the

head and crushing his skull. Doctors testified that a titanium plate had to be inserted in the victim's skull, and he will have permanent injury from the attack.

I soon discovered that a builder has decided that those who live in Habitat for Humanity homes are less of a human being because they live in an 1100 sq. ft. home instead of a 2,000-4,000 sq. ft. home as he does. As I read further into the article I saw that these "small" homeowners could even be considered criminals. I could not believe what I was reading.

This builder even suggested that the county "step in and claim the land for public use for resolution of eminent domain, stating concerns of property devaluation, potential crime and the reduction of taxes." "What!" I said out loud. Who does this man think he is?

How can he determine that a Habit Home owner is a potential criminal? How can he determine that his property will be devalued because "certain" people live in his neighborhood?

What an insult to those single moms who often qualify for Habitat homes. The single mom component comes to mind because I was a single mom when my husband died in an accident, and I know how hard it was to buy my first home. I sure am glad that my neighbors didn't come together and fill out a petition to keep me out of their neighborhood.

Furthermore sir, you cannot step in and demand eminent domain, because you don't like Habitat, that is not how it works. What if someone had bought this same property and built a 6000 sq. ft. home and when you and your neighbors bought your property they filed a petition that said you all didn't measure up so the county needed to claim eminent domain and take your land to keep you from building your 2000-4000 sq. ft. homes on your property? I bet you wouldn't like that would you? Hopefully our county will not be part of such an atrocity, and if they lean that way, we as citizens, should step forward and stand with Habitat for Humanity in fighting it, because if the county does it for this case, they will do it for others, and that cannot happen. The property appraiser's office stated that Habitat clearly followed all of the rules to obtain the land,

When the community comes together to help build one of these homes, certain rules still have to be followed such as volunteers can only do so much, they cannot do things that are required such as plumbing,

wiring etc. When you see our military volunteers out there working on a home for someone less fortunate, it is very heart-warming. I remember a build we did in Ft. Walton Beach where women, for a single mom, did all the volunteer work. I have watched families, (many single moms) cry as the key to their home is handed to them at the dedication service, they are so proud, and they continue to be good citizens in their community. There is more to Habitat Homes than just building the homes, it is the building of relationships and the feeling a person gets from helping someone else.

I would hope that the county would stand firm and confirm that they don't have the power to stop Habitat from building homes on land they bought in good faith. It appears there were no size requirements before they bought the property, so this petition should have no power at all.

I hope that those that signed this petition will think about how fortunate they are to be able to live in a large home, and I hope they will be happy for those who will own their first home even if it isn't as big as theirs. Maybe you will find it in your heart to take them a housewarming gift at the dedication service of their home. Wouldn't that be better than pre-judging someone you don't even know because their house is smaller than yours?

Hating America

Brothers Tamerlan and Dzhokhar Tsarnaev, who are accused of setting the bombs that exploded at the Boston Marathon, attended the University of Massachusetts. Maybe they hated our nation before college, but if you want lessons on hating America, college attendance might be a good start. Let's look at it.

"We need to think very, very clearly about who the enemy is. The enemy is the United States of America and everyone who supports it." That's taught to University of Hawaii students by Professor Haunani-Kay Trask. Richard Falk, professor emeritus at Princeton University and the U.N. Human Rights Council's Palestine monitor, explained the Boston bombings by saying, "The American global domination project is bound to generate all kinds of resistance in the post-colonial world." Professor Falk has also stated that President George W. Bush ordered the destruction of the twin towers.

University of Southern California professor Darryl Sragow preaches hate to his students in his regulation of elections and political finance class, recently telling them that Republicans are stupid, racist losers and that they are angry old white people. A few years ago, Rod Swanson, a UCLA economics professor, told his class, "The United States of America, backed by facts, is the greediest and most selfish country in the world." Penn State University professor Matt Jordan compared supporters of the voter ID laws to the Ku Klux Klan. Professor Sharon Sweet, an algebra teacher at Brevard Community College, told her students to sign a pledge that read, "I pledge to vote for President Obama and Democrats up and down the ticket." Fortunately, the college's trustees fired her.

University of Rhode Island history professor Erik Loomis tweeted, "I want (National Rifle Association executive vice president) Wayne LaPierre's head on a stick." He asked, "Can (we) define NRA membership as dues contributing to a terrorist organization?" Here's a sample of how Professor Loomis frequently expresses himself: "Motherf---ing f---heads f---ing f---." Then there's Georgetown law professor Louis Michael Seidman, who explained our national problems by saying, "But almost no one blames the culprit: our insistence on obedience to the Constitution, with all its archaic, idiosyncratic and downright evil provisions." Professor Seidman worked

for The Public Defender Service for the District of Columbia. When he was sworn in as an officer of the court, I wonder what constitution he swore to uphold and defend.

Parents don't have to wait for college admission for their youngsters to receive America-hating lessons. Scott Compton, an English teacher at Chapin High School in Chapin, S.C., was put on administrative leave after he allegedly threw an American flag on the floor and stomped on it in front of his students. He has chosen to resign.

An Advanced Placement world geography teacher at Lumberton High School in Texas encouraged students to dress in Islamic clothing and instructed them to refer to the 9/11 hijackers not as terrorists but as "freedom fighters." They were also told to stop referring to the Holocaust as genocide. John Valastro, the superintendent of the Lumberton

Independent School District, told Fox News that the teacher did absolutely nothing wrong.

In McAllen, Texas, teachers tried to force a teenager to sing the Mexican national anthem and recite Mexico's pledge of allegiance. The teen refused, saying it was against her beliefs as an American. She was thrown out of the class and given a failing grade for that day's assignment. Her father has filed a lawsuit on behalf of his daughter against the McAllen Independent School District.

Investor's Business Daily ran a story that shows student indoctrination is official union policy: "A New Low From The California Federation Of Teachers: Urine Indoctrination" (12/5/12). The union's website has a cartoon narrated by leftist Hollywood actor Ed Asner. In tones used when reading to children, Asner says: "(Rich people) love their money more than anything in the whole world. ... Over time, rich people decided they weren't rich enough, so they came up with ways to get richer." The cartoon finishes its class warfare message by graphically depicting "the rich" urinating on the poor.

These people running our education system are destroying the minds and values of our young people, and we allow them to do it.





Point with the possibility of redirecting those funds toward the School Resource Officer program, though he added, "I'm in no position to tell you how to spend your money." Hall's said another possible answer, in addition to a referendum, is asking the school board to search for available funds to help with the 25% match. Hall said Superintendent Tim Wyrosdick pledged support for applying to the grant, but had not put a dollar amount on the notion. Hall did say there was talk with Wyrosdick of the School Board paying the 25% for the first three years of the grant. This left Commissioner Bob Cole stating, "I'd like to see a buy-in from the School Board for after the four years." Wyrosdick

says he supports the grant and will ask the School Board to make steps to partner with the Sheriff's Office. Before that happens, he says the School system and the County will need to work out some details. "I applaud the Sheriff for reaching out to us."

Hall pointed out that a nearby county Sheriff took measures to move patrol officers into schools following the elementary school shooting in Connecticut, telling their commissioners, "If you want them back on the streets, you find them."

"I didn't do that," Hall noted. "This county has to change the direction and go back to where we're comfortable and do everything we can to protect these kids."

had done," Thompson said. "I (think) they felt enough is enough and they expressed with their vote."

The council remained in support of extended hours on a 6-2 vote, with members Grady Hester and Wesley Meiss opposing the original decision to extend the hours. The amendment they oppose will allow for the sale of alcohol in the district from 7 a.m. to 2 a.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 12 a.m. on Saturday. There will continue to be no sales of alcohol on Sunday.

"I think (extending the hours) is progressive, in the right direction," Thompson said. The mayor continued,

saying he doesn't expect the late-night hours leading to any issues for the city. "This is not for bars," Thompson said. "This is not for clubs. This is for restaurants."

The idea of allowing sales of alcohol on Sunday in downtown Milton came after former city councilman and restaurateur Paul Kilmartin sought to invest \$500,000 in a new waterfront restaurant.

The discussion led to a packed council chamber for the vote in April where the mayor stepped in with a tie-breaking vote which allowed later sales of alcohol, but denied Sunday sales.

mother's home, so deputies went there to check, according to Sheriff's reports. Upon arrival, deputies discovered he had been there doing donuts in the front yard and left at a high rate of speed.

Reports say they were told Kimmons might be violent or suicidal.

A short time later, the truck was spotted on Nichols Lake Rd., heading at a high rate of speed toward Deputy Lance Bird.

The truck passed the deputy's car, causing Bird to do a turnaround, activate his emergency lights and attempt to catch Kimmons in the truck.

Two other deputies entered the area by this time, Deputy Kyle Gillman and Deputy Roman Jackson. As Bird closed in on Kimmons, reports say the man made an abrupt turn and pointed the truck head-on at the patrol car driven by Gillman. The deputy, according to Bird's report, turned quickly into a ditch to prevent a collision.

A pursuit had begun, with deputies attempting to catch Kimmons. Bird says Kimmons jerked the Ford pickup into the other lane of traffic several times, right at cars.

The Lieutenant in charge, who Bird noted, did not know due to heavy radio traffic that Kimmons tried to hit Gillman's patrol car, called off the pursuit.

Traveling west on Hickory Hammock Rd., Bird says he followed the truck driven by Kimmons at a normal rate of speed, saying in his report that he was certain Kimmons did not know he was behind him.

Bird says he observed the truck nearly run off the road two or three times. He followed the truck north on Ward Basin

Road to I10, westbound.

The truck left the interstate at Garcon Point Road and went north, turning onto DaLisa.

The truck began traveling at a high rate of speed and Bird says he was not able to see the truck's taillights, but caught sight of the truck again when he found it stopped by a train on the tracks at DaLisa Rd. and Warren Rd.

At that point, deputies attempted to block the truck in, with Gillman coming up from behind.

Bird said Kimmons responded by putting the truck in reverse, peeling out and ramming the front of Gillman's patrol car, going over the hood backwards, and flipping the truck onto its side, landing on DaLisa Road.

The windshield on the patrol car broke, throwing glass on the deputy. Slightly injured, Gillman got out of his car and the three deputies approached the truck, according to the report.

Bird says Kimmons was irate and was cussing and yelling at the deputies, refusing to obey commands to show his hands, so for safety issues, Bird used his taser.

Kimmons was then secured, handcuffed and taken to jail, charged with DUI with property damage — by the Florida Highway Patrol, Trooper M. Register, who worked the crash.

Santa Rosa Sheriff's deputies charged Kimmons with fleeing to elude leo at high speed; operating motor vehicle without a valid license; assault on officer; aggravated battery on officer; vehicle theft; and resisting officer — obstructing without violence.

He is being held on \$159,000 bond.

Tractors have been pulling plows across the earth and tilling the land. Seeds have sprouted, blossomed and are producing fruits and vegetables. Local farmer, Zane Riddles has been doing this for more than thirty years. He says he's been planting all his life.

Zane Riddles started the **Farmer's Market** around 1980. He said it used to cost a dollar to park his truck and sell homegrown merchandise.

The city and the county got involved in the farmer's market, in years past, according to Riddles. Though, he says attention has been turned to large-scale produce companies with grant funding.

Riddles Farms is located four miles down the road, according to the farmer. He and his wife Elaine, work the land off East Gate Rd.

As the season progresses, there will be more added to the market

tables. Right now, the market is offering squash, zucchini, onions, tomatoes and potatoes. In weeks to come, there will be beans, cantaloupe, peas and more as they start growing.

Zane said they had a rainy first day, which kept the crowds away, when they opened last week. They look forward to expanding as the crops grow.

The **Santa Rosa County Health Department** opened up a section of its parking lot to area farmers on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Gill Kennington and Bob and Debbie Knowles were there Tuesday marketing the fruits of their labor.

The farmers had cucumbers, potatoes, and squash. Kennington said he ran out of strawberries and snap beans earlier in the morning. He has been farming for more than 30 years, on his farm six miles north of Whiting Field.

Kennington has never been short of knowledge, according to Bob

Knowles who set up a table next to his.

"If I have a question or problem," Bob said with a chuckle, "this is guy I talk to."

Bob has been farming for eight years, after retiring from Sears as a technician. He says he never expected to become a farmer, but has "grown" into it.

They rotate crops through the season, hoping to provide fresh produce all summer long. Bob said pays a little more for non-GMO (Genetically Modified Organisms) seeds. He says there's no independent evidence that states that GMO seeds are better or worse for the consumer.

The USDA has approved their operation and is part of the Florida Farmers' Market Nutrition Program.

Bob says that farming offers a large reward. Hard work and sweat is respected and paid for when someone compliments his produce.

"I just love to plant things and watch it grow," Bob said.

FWC scientists discover new bass species

Scientists with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) have uncovered a new species of black bass in the southeastern United States. Scientists have proposed naming the new species the Choctaw bass and recommended the scientific name of *Micropterus haiaka*. They revealed their discovery at a meeting of the Southern Division of the American Fisheries Society earlier this year.

FWC scientists first noted a DNA profile that did not belong to any recognized species while testing a bass specimen from the Chipola River in 2007, as part of a broader genetic study of bass.

"We didn't set out to find a new species," said Mike Tringali, who heads the genetics laboratory at the FWC's Fish and Wildlife Research Institute. "It found us."

After confirming the initial discovery, scientists searched for the DNA profile in bass caught in nearby rivers to determine the species' range. They


found that the Choctaw bass inhabits coastal river systems in Alabama and along the western Florida panhandle, including the Choctawhatchee River.

"We chose the name 'Choctaw bass' because the species' range overlaps the historic range of the Choctaw Indians," said Tringali. "As for our recommended scientific name, *Micropterus haiaka*, 'haiaka' is a Choctaw word that means 'revealed.'"

The American Fisheries Society must approve the suggested scientific name for it to take effect.

The Choctaw bass is very similar in appearance to its relative, the spotted bass. The physical differences between the two species are not easily seen with the naked eye, one reason they had never before been distinguished despite decades of bass studies in the region.

Enjoy a safe day on the water – and stay out of trouble!

With over 12,000 square miles of water, 2,000 miles of beautiful tidal shoreline and 12,000 miles of fishable rivers, streams and canals, Florida is a boating paradise.

As the weather heats up and kids get out of school, many people will be taking to the waters to cool off and relax.

That's where the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) comes in. In addition to patrolling all of Florida's waterways, FWC staff promotes access to them by developing and maintaining boat ramps. The goal is for everyone to be able to enjoy the water safely.

Each year, FWC officers rescue around 1,000 people, many of them on the water.

Earlier this year, in Escambia County, two people were left hanging

onto the Bob Sikes Bridge after their boat began to take on water and sink. Fortunately, two FWC officers responded and brought them safely to shore.

However, not everyone is so lucky.

In 2012 there were over 700 boating accidents, and 55 people tragically lost their lives as a result. FWC officers do everything they can to keep people safe, but there are also measures that boaters should take to protect themselves.

Remain alert, wear a life jacket at all times and designate a sober boat operator. These three simple actions can mean the difference between a fun day on the water and a tragic one.

There are many comfortable life jackets

on the market today, including compact styles that automatically inflate if you hit the water. Having it stored in a bin is legal for adults, but you will be much more likely to stay afloat if you're always wearing it.

Some popular waterways can get crowded at times. Ensuring that your boat operator pays close attention to the surroundings, including signage, other boats and animals, and hasn't had any alcohol are absolutely necessary to be safe.

Recently, FWC officers in Duval County received a complaint of an impaired boater. When they located him, he had three children onboard and was unable to dock his boat. The officers used a rope and pulled

his boat to the dock. After sobriety tests and a check of his blood-alcohol level, he was arrested for BUI and taken off the water before he could injure himself or others.

If you see someone operating dangerously, putting himself or others in harm's way – say something! The FWC's Wildlife Alert hotline is staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week. You can report fish and wildlife law violations as well as dangerous boaters. Helping the FWC is another way to stay safe and enjoy your day on the water.

Also, if you encounter any FWC officers, remember it is their job to keep people safe, and they have many ways to do that. They may put on a boating safety course for students, be called to rescue someone or in

some instances, have to issue a citation.

If you are out on the water, you may be stopped briefly so they can check your vessel registration and safety equipment or inspect your fishing licenses and catch.

FWC officers are trained to handle public interactions with respect and humility. But you can help ensure a positive experience and even reduce the number of times you are stopped.

If an FWC officer spots a boat without the proper registration, it is likely that the officer will stop it. Operating recklessly is another sure way to be stopped.

Also, having all of your safety gear onboard and easily accessible not only helps in case of emergency, but it makes checks go more quickly as well.

Let's work together to

protect this paradise and enjoy it safely!

MOMS NEED LESSON IN FRIENDSHIP







Neighbors objected to the look of the catwalk and also worried children would try to use it. In addition, the association says its regulations bar pets from roaming free in the development.

Panel: No profanity on rapper's headstone

LYNN, Mass. — Commissioners at a Massachusetts cemetery have said no to profanity on headstones.

Sonny Santiago, 23, was a rapper who died in a car crash in February. Commissioners at Pine Grove Cemetery in Lynn this week unanimously rejected his family's request to inscribe his gravestone with a song verse that included profanity.

The commission became aware of the language when the company inscribing the 3-foot tall memorial submitted drawings to commissioners.

Pine Grove Cemetery regulations posted online state that "the cemetery office must approve all inscription work on monuments."

"We've never had a problem like this before," commission Chairman Arthur Dulong told The Daily Item of Lynn.

City officials contacted the family about the inscription and they agreed to have the gravestone inscribed with a different, profanity-free verse from a song Santiago wrote, said Santiago's sister-in-law, Angela Ventola.

"Everything got changed," she said. "Those words are not going on."

The commission's dispute with Santiago's family is not over. The family added a 3-foot by 8-foot decoration made from mulch and rocks on his gravesite shaped like the number "1." Uno was his performance name.

The family has been asked to remove the decoration because it does not conform to cemetery rules.

Santiago's mother, Ana DeJesus, said the family will comply with the request — but she's not happy about it.

"I feel like we paid for the spot," she said. "We want to be with him. It's not fair."

Boy, 10, honored for saving drowning girl

SARASOTA, Fla. — Police in Sarasota are honoring a 10-year-old boy for saving a little girl from drowning in an apartment complex swimming pool.

The Sarasota Herald-Tribune reported Sarasota Police Chief Bernadette DiPino applauded Alexander Castanon for his "quick thinking and bravery" during a ceremony on Wednesday.

He was swimming on April 20 while several neighbors prepared dinner on the grills beside the pool.

Officials say a relative of the 3-year-old girl jumped from the pool when flames shot from a grill. Others became distracted because of the flames. But Castanon noticed the girl had slipped from a floatation ring. He went under water and saw her face down in the pool.

The boy pulled her to the side of the pool and yelled for help. The child's relative began CPR and the little girl started breathing again.

The girl's mother says Castanon is a hero.

Scratch-and-sniff cards prompt natural gas scare

GREAT FALLS, Mont. — Those scratch-and-sniff cards the energy company sends to customers to teach them to recognize the artificial smell added to natural gas? Turns out they work pretty well.

Energy West general manager Nick Bohr told the Great Falls Tribune workers recently discarded several boxes of expired scratch-and-sniff cards in Great Falls. But when the garbage truck picked them up and compressed the load Bohr says "it was the same as if they had scratched them."

The resulting odor prompted numerous false alarms and building evacuations as the garbage truck traveled through downtown Great Falls on Wednesday morning, leaving the smell in its trail.

Bohr said the company apologizes for the disruption.

Astronaut exits space station with music video

CAPE CANAVERAL (AP) — In a high-flying, perfectly pitched first, an astronaut on the International Space Station is bowing out of orbit with a musical video: his own custom version of David Bowie's "Space Oddity."

It's believed to be the first music video made in space, according to NASA. Canadian astronaut Chris Hadfield's personalized rendition of "Space Oddity" was posted on YouTube on Sunday, one day before his departure from the orbiting lab. He's wrapping up a five-month mission that began last December.

His return aboard a Russian Soyuz capsule, along with American Thomas Marshburn and Russian Roman Romanenko, was set for May 13 in Kazakhstan.

Hadfield, 53, a longtime guitarist who played in an astronaut rock 'n' roll band, recorded the video throughout the space station. He had some down-to-Earth help from a Canadian music team.

"With deference to the genius of David Bowie, here's Space Oddity, recorded on Station. A last glimpse of the World," Hadfield said via Twitter.

The spaceman altered some of the lyrics of Bowie's 1969 version, singing "Planet Earth is blue and there's nothing left to do." The Bowie version goes "... and there's nothing I can do." And instead of "Take your protein pills and put your helmet on," it became, "Lock your Soyuz hatch and put your helmet on."

Planet Earth provided a stunning backdrop for many of the scenes.

"It's just been an extremely fulfilling and amazing experience end to end," Hadfield told Mission Control on Monday. "We're, of course, focusing very much on flying the Soyuz home now and looking forward to seeing everybody face to face. But from this Canadian to all the rest of them, I offer an enormous debt of thanks." He was referring to all those in the Canadian Space Agency who helped make his flight possible.

Hadfield, an engineer and former test pilot from Milton, Ontario, was Canada's first professional astronaut to live aboard the space station and became the first Canadian in charge of a spacecraft. He relinquished command of the space station on May 12.

He sang often in orbit, using a guitar already aboard the complex, and even took part in a live, Canadian coast-to-coast concert in February that included the Barenaked Ladies' Ed Robertson and a youth choir; and featured the song I.S.S., "Is Somebody Singing?"

I.S.S. is NASA's acronym for the International Space Station.

Also last February, Hadfield joined the Irish band The Chieftains and two ground-bound astronauts in a Houston concert, singing the lead on "Moondance."

The five-minute video posted Sunday drew a salute from Bowie's official Facebook page: "It's possibly the most poignant version of the song ever created."

NASA broadcast the video on its daily space station update late Monday morning.

One of the video collaborators was piano arranger Emm Gryner, part of the Bowie band in 1999 and 2000.

"Planet Earth IS blue," she said in her online blog, "and there's nothing left for Chris Hadfield to do. Right. Safe travels home Commander!"

Spies caught in website scandal embarrass SKorea

SEOUL, South Korea (AP)

— The scandal shaking up South Korea's main spy agency is not cloak-and-dagger stuff, but the kind of low-grade trickery anyone with an Internet connection could pull off.

And the target was not Seoul's opaque rival to the north, but the country's own people.

Internet postings ostensibly from ordinary South Koreans, but actually from National Intelligence Service agents, allegedly boosted President Park Geun-hye while she was running for the job as the ruling party's nominee. She was reportedly dubbed "the best," while her opponent, in a play on his name, was called "criminal."

A police investigation conducted before the December election found no wrongdoing, but now police say at least two agents violated the law and the original investigation is itself being examined.

Dozens of Internet comments, or more, may not have affected an election that Park won by a million votes, but they have damaged public trust in a spy agency that already had a dubious record.

The agency was founded in 1961 by Park's father; longtime dictator Park Chung-hee. Agents detained, tortured and even allegedly killed his politi-

cal opponents. After Park was killed in 1979 — by his spy chief, ironically enough — other abuses occurred under his successors.

In recent years, however, criticism of the NIS has centered on what it has failed to do — namely, come up with much intelligence about North Korea. It learned about Kim Jong Il's death in December 2011 two days after it occurred, when Pyongyang's state TV announced it.

The Internet comments scandal captured headlines in South Korean media late last month, when state prosecutors summoned the agency's former director, Won Sei-hoon, and raided its Seoul headquarters. Reports recalled the unfortunate fates of predecessors who ended up being arrested, imprisoned or even killed.

"The prosecution will mobilize all its capabilities to swiftly and thoroughly get the truth of the case," Prosecutor-general Chae Dong-Wook said in a meeting with top prosecution officials Tuesday, according to his office. "This case should be investigated in a way not to have any lingering suspicion."

The scandal flared about one week before the Dec. 19 election. Liberal opposition members camped outside the apartment of an NIS officer allegedly involved in

illicit online campaigning, based on a tip from another agent. The officer locked herself in the apartment for two days, then came out — wearing a mask and a baseball cap to conceal her identity — to let police confiscate her computers.

The incident triggered a last-minute election debate over whether the NIS illegally engaged in politics, or whether the opposition party harassed an innocent woman.

Three days before the election, police announced the results of their initial investigation by clearing the officer of any wrongdoing, giving Park's camp a source of criticism on her main rival, Democratic Party candidate Moon Jae-in.

Kwon Eun Hee, a police officer who headed the initial investigation, recently told The Associated Press and other media that her bosses inappropriately interfered in the probe by pressing her team to drastically decrease the number of search words they would use in analyzing the NIS officer's computer hard disk, in an apparent effort to announce the investigation results before the presidential election.

Top police officers have denied Kwon's claim, saying there was no attempt to cover up the truth about the case, according to the

National Police Agency.

Police said last month they've found that at least two agents and an ordinary citizen, who was allegedly in collusion with them, posted 100 comments on at least two websites in violation of a law banning the NIS from engaging in domestic politics.

Police subsequently requested that prosecutors indict all three people, one of whom is the agent the opposition had accused before the election.

One of the websites is the online forum "Today Humor," which had more than 950,000 unique visitors last month, according to Nielsen KoreanClick.

Police found that the agents didn't violate the election law because they weren't influential enough to sway the election's outcome, as they only supported government policies and projects rather than directly criticizing Moon.

One of the comments disclosed by police praised Park's predecessor and fellow ruling party member Lee Myung-bak for making many overseas trips: "President Lee Myung-bak will make a five-day trip to Indonesia and Thailand from tomorrow. This will be his 48th overseas trip and it is overwhelmingly the largest-ever (among South Korean presidents). He is really great."
