## Man critical after catching fire

A Pace man is in critical condition after catching fire Monday night, according to Santa Rosa Sheriff's records.

Lifeguard Ambulance transported Darrin Lee Dickerson, 32,

from 4319 Kings Court around 10:30 after Sheriff's 911 operators received a call from a neighbor. The caller told dispatchers Dickerson had been on fire, but the fire was out. When deputies arrived, they found Dickerson—stripped nude due to his clothing being on fire. Radio reports said the man received second-degree

chemical burns on several locations on his body. Emergency dispatchers said he was burnt with an aerosol torch, deliberately.

Dickerson was taken under a trauma alert to Sacred Heart Hospital, where he was reported in critical condition.

Sheriff's deputies say there was a domestic disturbance at

the same address the night before between Dickerson and a woman named Crystal Loraine Cail, 30.

During that incident, they said Dickerson was armed with a knife. Jail records indicate no arrests were made in that complaint.

A deputy at the scene of the

Monday night incident said a woman set Dickerson on fire and passed that information to EMS.

The State Fire Marshal was notified of the incident, and according to Sheriff's records, has taken over the investigation. The investigator could not be reached for comment.

## Stolen car hits tree, driver flees on foot

What began as a traffic stop for improper tag ended up as a chase and a crash Monday night when a man refused to stop for a Sheriff's deputy.

Joshua Devon Crenshaw, 30, Milton, was driving a 2003 white Toyota north on Stewart Street when Deputy Dwayne Smith says he ran the tag on the car and discovered it was not assigned to a vehicle.

When Smith hit the lights of his patrol car and attempted to pull Crenshaw over on Stewart Street, he said the car turned on to Cedar Street. Instead of pulling over in the residential neighborhood, the driver hit the gas.

Smith activated his siren and pursued the Toyota. Smith said he watched while the driver of the vehicle failed to acknowledge a stop sign and careened onto Byrom Street.

The stolen car sped up again, reports said, heading south on Byrom Street, picking up speed as he raced past the community center and past Rhodes Elementary School.

The car quickly approached a four-way intersection by Milton High School.

Smith said he anticipated the car might not stop, so he backed off to a safe distance as the vehicle sailed through the intersection.

Crenshaw, attempted to sling through the next stop sign on Park Avenue, but lost control during a left turn and slammed head-on into a tree at the corner of Park Ave and Byrom St., according to reports.

The 30-year-old driver jumped out and ran west until he lost his flip-flops, Smith

# Blessing of the Fleet is Saturday

Fire up the Evinrude and hit the Blackwater River safely this year. As Memorial Day approaches this weekend and the weather continues to warm, Blackwater River will be filled with activity and the buzzing sound of outboard motors.

The United States Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 01-08, known as the "Guardians of the Blackwater," have teamed up with the Blackwater Pyrates and the Knights of Columbus from St. Rose of Lima to celebrate National Safe Boating Week. Members from the Coast Guard will offer safety inspections and explain proper, safe-boating

techniques.

Monsignor Steven Bosso, Pastor from St. Rose of Lima Catholic Church, will be on the Riverwalk dock blessing boats and sprinkling them with holy water after they pass inspection on the Blackwater River.

"It's an ancient blessing, going back to the days when all the ships were wooden," Deacon Jeff Massey of St. Rose of Lima said. "It asks for God's blessing for those on the water."

The boater's blessing originated roughly 1,000 years ago when port-towns and fishing villages survived and thrived off of the sea, according to Massey. The aim of the blessing was to bestow safety onto the families and loved ones that had to endure the hardships and dangers of everyday

life on the water.

"We had entire villages, men and sons, living their lives and risking them while on the sea," Massey said.

While the rise of modern technology has made boating safer, there are still plenty of risks and dangers while spending time on the water.

"It's something we've done as a tradition, when it comes to having their boat blessed," Milton Fire Chief John Reble said. "It's a nice program that we're using to promote boater safety."

Florida, as a state, is consistently in the top ten for boating fatalities, Reble said. Drowning is often the leading cause of death, when it comes to boating-related deaths.

In 2010, there were 79 boating deaths in the state. In 76%

of those cases, the person was not wearing a life jacket, or personal flotation device. In 13% of those cases, the person was wearing a flotation device. Reble said the personal flotation device could save lives, especially in situations where someone is knocked unconscious.

He noted improvements in comfort and efficiency in the selection of life jackets available. He encouraged the use of the inflatable jacket that looks like a set of suspenders. There is an automatic version that inflates by pulling a cord and it fills with Co2 and a manual version that is pumped with air.

"They offer the buoyancy of an offshore life jacket," Reble said. "And they are very comfortable to wear."

### IF YOU GO...

This activity will begin at 9 a.m. on Saturday, May 25, 2013, at Riverwalk South, on the Blackwater River between the Highway 90 bridge and the CSX bridge. All boats present will form in a flotilla and pass in review to receive their blessing.

# Garden Club issues Community Pride Award

Down at the First Baptist Church of Milton at 6797 Caroline St., Pastor Dr. David Spencer is very proud of the work that his groundskeeper, Ellis Hare, is doing. Ellis is in charge of keeping everything trimmed, mulched and weed-free. In front of the church office are crape myrtles, which Ellis prunes back twice a year to get a second blooming.

The azaleas are still in bloom, despite the fact that everyone else's are long over. The creeping juniper is full of pretty blue berries, and along the side street is a lovely chestnut tree. Walking around the office building Ellis pointed out loropetalum, variegated pittosporum, more crape myrtles, a small oak tree, recurve privet, and along the ground, variegated liriope, and day lilies among the rock mulch. Ell has been working his green thumb magic at the First Baptist Church for the past 12 years. Now-a-days, he enjoys using a gas mower to cut the grass rather than the push mower he used as a child. Good work, Ellis.

Our recipient for May goes to Bob and Joan Haring at 5171 Goshawk Drive in Hawks Nest of Hamilton Bridge Road in Milton. Joan and Bob have four beautiful oak trees shading their front yard. Under the oaks are red encore azaleas, loropetalum, muhly grass,

and white vinca, all neatly contained within black edging. By the curving walk to their front door is a beautiful Japanese butterfly maple tree with feathery leaves in green and cream. A statue of St. Francis stands watch over red and white begonias. Along the walk defining the garden is monkey grass. Against the house is a hedge of Buford holly.

Facing the house on the left are lovely knockout roses and a crape myrtle. At the corners of the garage on either side are nandina bushes. On the right side of the house near the street is a very full and leafy Japanese red maple. In back of it is a crape myrtle that Bob's brother-in-law rooted and gave to Bob as a little stick which now towers over Bob's head. Heading towards the back of the house on the right are liriope, yaupon with beautiful red berries, hostas, and ping begonias which are so well protected from winter's frost and cold that they come back every year.

There also are a bridal wreath bush and some agapanthas that Joan divided and transplanted from the backyard. Bob said she was so determined to get them divided that she jumped on her shovel so hard she fell off. He had to pick her up and take her to the ER to make sure she was okay. Moving through the privacy fence into the back yard we

find spreading lilies that a friend gave to Joan and also day lilies and Easter lilies. Then there are lion's paw which flowers orange and yellow in the fall, three very nicely scented sweet olives, society garlic, wandering Jew with its pretty purple leaves, Don Juan roses, princess flower with its purple flowers, Mexican petunias, blue hydrangeas, Asiatic lilies, caladiums, silver dust, and hostas. Set among these plants and under the big oak trees are pots of bright red verbena, yellow zinnias, pink dahlias, purple coneflowers, dianthus, and angel wing begonias which Joan brings inside in the winter or sometimes sets under a large protective bush to keep from freezing. Also in pots are lantana, tiny petunias called million bells, and creeping Jenny.

In the back corner of the yard is a very tall crape myrtle which Bob and Joan's son, Bobby, cut back for them by getting on a tall ladder and using a long handled pruner. Beneath the crape myrtle is a beautiful blue glass gazing ball on a pedestal with caladiums growing around it. Moving along the back fence towards the other corner are azaleas, hydrangeas, red camellias, yellow shrimp plant, crossandra, wild hibiscus, allamanda, rose of Sharon, reosamba which blooms with big orange and yellow flowers, peegee

hydrangea, coreopsis, pineapple guava with its red flowers that resemble an exploding firecracker, gardenias, a bottle brush tree that the squirrels like, deep pink knockout roses, and a weeping yaupon holly. In the back corner is a Turkey fig.

Last year Joan managed to get only enough figs to make one jar of jam. The squirrels and birds got the rest of the figs. Growing up the post of a birdhouse is clematis, which apparently helped a snake climb to the birdhouse, because when Bob opened the front of it there was a snake coiled up inside. It gave Bob a good scare.

The window box on the shed has vinca growing in it. Under one of the trees is a birdbath with a ceramic bird in the center. Joan made suncatchers with her friends out of old glassware. She has a red, white, and blue one on a pole in her back garden. Hanging from the bottle brush tree is a pot with green and white scopia which requires lots and lots of water. Joan dusts her dahlias with sevin and gives ironite to her gardenias.

# The little building that could

You've noticed it ... there on Stewart Street. The little building that could. It's flown many flags since it's been standing. Many businesses have called its brick and glass walls home over the years. It's housed restaurants in the past and currently houses another entrepreneur.

5382 Stewart St. is the place. Over the past four years, it has given rise to five different businesses. Taco Town was the most recent addition when it was established March of this year.

It all stems back to 1967, according to Bob Locklin of Locklin Insurance who is located in the adjacent building. It was originally built as a Spudnut Shop. The Spudnut Shop was a doughnut cafe that specialized in potato-based doughnuts. The doughnut shop however was short lived.

Bethia Schenck said she remembers a popular blouse company residing in the building. In addition to the retail space, she also had vague recollections of a realtor working out of the space some years ago. Though, she said lately it's been eateries.

Since 1990, the building has been a shell for restaurants. Mi-Maw's Country claimed the counter space from 1990-1996. From there, the title changed hands to the current landlord, who ran the Dragon Express restaurant from 1997 to 2009.

Then the Sunnyside Cafe moved in from March of 2009 to February 2010; Momma's Place resided from April 2010 to March 2012; Half Time Sports Grill served grub from Sept. 2012 to March 2013; and now Taco Town lays stake to the real estate on Stewart.

"We're a small franchise," said the owner, Curtis Marracco. "It's an enjoyable location with a nice school and good atmosphere. We're up for the challenge of the city."

He said Taco Town has 30 years of franchise branding working to their advantage and has generally been situated in rural settings.

"Without a good name, it's hard in this industry," he said. "I've got four boys at home to keep me motivated."

Taco Town had been located on Highway 87 S. for months before relocating to the Stewart Street rotunda adjacent to Milton High.

"We just rolled straight over from 87,"



he said. "I hired a few more employees to handle the increase in business."

Some have speculated that the crux of the location is the parking, or lack thereof, has made it a difficult location to sustain, thus creating the whirr of activity in the rolodex of eateries.

"There's plenty of room with parking in the rear," Marracco said. "I fixed a sink hole that was collecting water and causing drainage problems."

This is Marracco's second franchise — he owns another Taco Town business in Baker. He said he's confident in his employees and his restaurant and hopes to attract more of the Milton and Pace clientele.

"Keep it good and keep it consistent," he said, "and they'll keep coming."



the students will be playing a recon-ditioned bugle from 1937.

In addition to the memorial service, there will be a brick-laying ceremony in honor of the late Chief Petty Officer Robert Roy who was killed in a DUI vehicle accident late April. His two surviving sons will place a brick with his name engraved on it, becoming a part of the memorial plaza.

"I talked to his wife about doing it, but then I got to thinking, it'd be great to have his boys do it," Nesenson said. "And his wife agreed to let them place the brick."

Representatives from both the City of Milton and Santa Rosa County

will make proclamations regarding Memorial Day.

Nesenson, a Vietnam War himself said the American attitude toward veterans has changed for the better and has seen notable differences in the way veterans are treated. "In Vietnam, people didn't care," he said. "You couldn't even wear your uniform. People would spit on you."

He says young people that spat back then have since grown up and matured. Recent attacks on American soil, during 9/11, had a vast effect on the American people and their thinking.

"Since Iraq, the people have embraced the



military more," Nesenson said. "Especially Santa Rosa County. I think Santa Rosa County is the most patriotic in the United States. Our reaction toward those coming back has changed."

Not only are the attitudes changing, but the public's actions have changed for the positive. Nesenson says there are more people willing to lend a hand to help out a veteran than there have been in the past.



# Americans rush in times of need

A police and fire scanner crackling in the background of a newsroom is a common sound, an expected annoyance. Just like new parents who hear their baby's cries from across a house, when certain alerts are sounded on the scanner, ears perk up and attention is diverted to the words of the dispatcher. This constant companion, of course, keeps us apprised of emergencies — but it also educates. It adds a second dimension to our existence, reminding us there are other things going on outside our lives.

It is Tuesday morning as this column is being written. A car just rolled over on the Interstate in East Milton. A Florida Highway Patrol trooper pulled up to the crash within a minute or two of dispatch. Then a Santa Rosa County sheriff's deputy arrived. The person in the car received minor injuries and got himself out of his vehicle—which was crashed into the tree line. He was transported to Sacred Heart Hospital in stable condition.

Last night, a man was seriously burned when someone used an aerosol can as a torch with a lighter. According to the dispatchers, it was called in as deliberate. The fire department, EMS, and Sheriff's office all had personnel racing to the scene to help this man.

We live in a great country. Sure, we have our complaints and our politics, but the truth is we have so many conveniences

that are taken for granted every second of every day. Dialing 911 is one of those conveniences.

Two years ago, a member of this community traveled to Africa after joining the Peace Corps. As the new installment of volunteers was traveling to various posts around the country, there was a terrible vehicle accident involving African citizens. People were dying. And no one dialed 911. People were trapped in the car; people were lying in on the clay road, bleeding to death. And no one came. Several of the American Peace Corps volunteers were medically trained — one was a paramedic. They stopped to render aid and grabbed what medical supplies they had and jumped in to assist. Their efforts saved the life of one man. But there was no help, no ambulance to transport. It was dark and unfamiliar. They drove the man to the hospital and went on to find their new homes with the blood of a stranger on their clothes.

We are Americans. When things blow up, fall down or get blown away, we run toward those in need—and that is the average citizen. Give them fire, medical or police training and they run toward those in need with lights and sirens, guns drawn... jaws-of-life ready to go.

We are going to take a moment today and appreciate where we live and what we have.

We hope you do the same.

When I'm working late at the newspaper and all is dark and quiet, memories flash before my eyes. It was 1995 when I was hired by Jim Fletcher and moved from my kitchen into the newsroom. I'd done my duty in the war zone at home with four kids and I felt it was time to do something specifically for me.

I still remember my first day and my first story. Milton police were putting a dummy in a patrol car as a deterrent to speeding. No, it didn't drive. It was parked along Dogwood Drive or Hwy. 90. People didn't catch on for a long time. In fact, some citizens called in, concerned about the officer who never moved and wouldn't roll down his window to speak to them.

My youngest son, Michael, was two when I came to work here. He's going to be 21 in a couple of weeks. I remember the self-doubt I felt as a mom, running off to work her dream job while my little guy was in daycare, learning how to defend himself.

One of the first thoughts I had when I came to work here wasn't about the job as much as it was about the people. I never before imagined so many genuinely nice people all in one office.

The paper has been bought and sold once or twice over the years. Our owners' names have changed, but the family inside the building remains strong. This

group here on Elva St. begins with Rosie, who has worked here for 64 years. She has not changed much since I met her. There is Carol, our second-longest employee, coming in around 46 years with the paper. Then Jim Fletcher—and the rest all blend in around the same time I began here.

I was hired on as full-time editor last week. I am truly blessed and honored to be in this position. There is no other job for me. I moved to this town in 1995 and I have grown to love it over the years, as I watched my kids grow to call it home—and now, I have grand-kids to watch grow up here.

There have been good times and of course, there have been bad times. But I've learned it's not so much what kind of times a family is having, just that they are having them together, that everyone keeps coming back to the same place.

My mother told me once I should listen for those things in life that "purr" to me, that it is God speaking to me when a nagging feeling won't go away or when the path to an end is cleared away for me.

That is how I feel about the Press Gazette. It's not the biggest or most well known newspaper, but it purrs to me. It will always be a part of who I am. I've worked other jobs over my lifetime and nothing I've ever done has allowed me to just be myself and do what I do.

It feels really good to be home again.

# How to tell when a marriage needs professional help

Seeking help for a marriage is not a sign of weakness nor a signal that a marriage is going to end. Instead, in many cases it is the beginning of building a strong, healthy and long-lasting relationship.

# Local author gets paranormal-romance novel published


"The more people that started reading it, they were wanting me to get it published," Pettus said. "They're kind of like my beta readers."

# Road to recovery paved with volunteers

In the Pensacola waiting room during her husband's cancer treatments, Milton resident Judy Platt couldn't help but overhear a conversation that would change her life. Another patient was telling someone what a hardship it was—not to have cancer—but to get to the hospital for the treatments. That was something Platt knew she could do something about.

Not long after, Platt walked into the local office of the American Cancer Society and offered to help drive people who needed help with transportation to their cancer treatments. Nothing was in place at the time, but a program was in the works. It wasn't long before she got the call to help. That was eight years ago.

"There was a need and I had the time," Platt said. "It's a very, very rewarding thing to do."

Now, she and the other volunteer drivers for the Road to Recovery transportation program are looking for help.

At least 10 drivers from the Pace and Milton areas are needed to help get patients to cancer treatments in Pensacola. Even just a handful of people who could be on call to drive one day during the week would be an enormous help, organizers say. Volunteers are needed in Navarre as well.

The requirements are easy: be 18 years old; do a 45-minute, one time, online training; provide a copy of a driver's license and insurance; and be willing to help.

"The bottom line is we need drivers desperately," Platt said with a smile. "I'm

past the asking point—I'm at the begging point here. It would put the burden so much lighter."

Debbie Kraft said before she started volunteer driving she had never thought about how hard it must be for people to get to cancer treatments when they don't have a car or live near family. After driving several family members, including her husband, Buddy Kraft—also a volunteer—to treatments, she realized she could help others.

"I want everyone who has a chance of surviving cancer to have the best shot that they have," she said. "What if you didn't have family members or they have to work? It's very hard to say no when you know if you don't volunteer, someone might not get to their appointment. We try to give rides to everyone we possibly can."

Now they need the community to do what it can. Volunteering to drive from

Pace/Milton to appointments in Pensacola one day each week doesn't mean that volunteer would be required every week. Volunteers choose when they can drive. And volunteers can say no at any time. Road to Recovery just needs people to do what they can.

"Most of this community does not even know about this program," Platt said. People ask how she can afford it when gas prices go up, but regardless of the cost, it's worth it to her. "It's not about a dollar value," she said. "The gratitude is your payment. Patients are so thankful that someone they don't even know is willing to take them. It's humbling, but it's a very gratifying thing to do. You know you're making a difference by getting them to treatments, because if they don't get treatments their hope is gone."

Cancer treatments can require daily hospital visits for eight weeks or more.

That can be a huge hardship for people who don't own a car, can't afford gas, or whose doctors recommend they not drive. One patient was on medication that distorted his vision. Others might opt out of treatment because they have no way to get to the hospital every day.

"More than once patients have offered a little gas money, or to take you to lunch, because they are just so appreciative," Platt said.

All that time on the road can be a therapy in itself. Some patients want to talk to someone removed from their problems, especially when discussing their health upsets their families.

"It's a way for them to say things they want to get out of their system without burdening their families," Platt said. "Of course we never give medical advice. I guess you could say we're the confessional. Some

people just want to ride in silence. Although if you're riding with me you're going to have to talk, because I can't drive to Pensacola and back without talking. It's against my religion," she laughed.

Kraft describes the ideal volunteer as someone who really wants to help other people and has a little extra time.

"When you're doing this, you're doing out of the goodness of your heart," she said. "You're doing it because you want to help the cancer patient. I've had several people who have broken down in tears and said, 'If it weren't for you volunteers, I'd be dead, because I have no other way to get there.' It really just tears at your heart. You see their situation and you know they're telling you the truth—they didn't have any other way to get there. That's why I continue to do this."

Platt agrees.

"I don't think people realize the importance of the program," she said. "You hear someone has cancer and is going for treatment. You don't realize they're there five days a week. That's their life (at stake) during their treatment."

Jill Pait is the Panhandle Patient Services Manager for the American Cancer Society. She's worked with Road to Recovery for five years now. She said Santa Rosa volunteer drivers have provided Santa Rosa County patients with 803 trips to treatments. In 2013 alone, more than 400 trips to treatment were completed. As the program grows, Pait said, it needs more volunteer drivers than ever.

"A lot of our drivers try to see the patient through their treatment," she said. "I think that's what makes the program so special. It's more than just a driver program. They take them to treatment, but they bond with one another as well."

# FWC reminds boaters to boat smart, safely

Memorial Day weekend, which kicks off summer activities, is right around the corner, and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) wants all boaters to remember to boat safely.

"Florida is a great place to enjoy boating year-round," said Col. Calvin Adams, director of the FWC's Division of Law Enforcement.

"And even more people will be out on the water for the holi-

day weekend. Both the holiday and National Safe Boating Week (May 18-24) present an opportunity to emphasize the importance of remaining safe while boating," Adams noted.

Each year, FWC officers rescue around 1,000 people, many of them on the water. However, not everyone is so lucky. Ten people have already lost their lives this year due to boating accidents in Florida.

"FWC officers are committed to keeping people as safe as possible, but we need your

help," Adams said. "We want to reach out to as many boaters as we can to help them understand that most boating accidents are preventable."

The FWC reminds boaters to enjoy their time on the water by taking a few safety precautions, such as remaining alert while operating a boat, wearing both a life jacket and engine shut-off switch at all times and designating a sober boat operator.

According to the FWC, inattentiveness of the operator often contributes to boating

accidents.

Statistics also show that more than 67 percent of the 55 boating-related deaths confirmed last year were attributed to drowning, which life jackets are designed to prevent.

There is a wide variety of comfortable, affordable and stylish life jackets on the market today. The many options make it easy to be protected. Some compact designs even inflate upon hitting the water.

An engine shut-off switch is a safety lanyard that attaches from

the boat operator to the ignition. If it is disconnected, the engine will shut down, potentially preventing a boater who has fallen overboard from being injured by the moving propeller of a runaway boat.

"Boating smart and safely could result in fewer injuries and deaths each year," Adams said.

# Record-setting Burmese python captured

A Miami man has caught and killed the longest Burmese python ever captured in Florida: 18 feet, 8 inches. The python was a 128-pound female that was not carrying eggs, according to University of Florida scientists who examined the snake. The previous record length for a Burmese python captured in the wild in Florida was 17 feet, 7 inches.

On May 11, Jason Leon was riding late at night in a rural area of southeast Miami-Dade County when he and his passenger spotted the python. About 3 feet of the snake was sticking out of the roadside brush. Leon stopped his car, grabbed the snake behind its head and started dragging it out of the brush. When the snake began to wrap around his leg, he called for assistance from others and then used a knife to kill the snake. Leon once owned Burmese pythons as pets and has experience handling this non-venomous constrictor species.

Leon reported his python capture to the FWC's South Region office, which connected him with 888-IveGot1 (888-483-4861), the FWC's hotline for reporting exotic species. Cheryl Millett of The Nature Conservancy's Python Patrol Program helped coordinate the response, and Jeff Fobb of the Miami-Dade Fire Rescue Venom Response Program arranged to pick up the snake from Leon. Finally, the python was turned over to the University of Florida's Fort Lauderdale Research and Edu-

cation Center, where UF staff experienced in working with Burmese pythons performed the necropsy.

"With the help of people like Mr. Leon and our ongoing partnerships with other agencies, the FWC is advancing what we know about Burmese pythons in Florida," Sommers said. "This event highlights how the Exotic Species hotline allows the public to help us obtain more information about Burmese pythons, so we can improve management of this invasive species. It also reflects the cooperative efforts of the FWC and its partners to address python sightings by the public."

The public is asked to report sightings of exotic species to IveGot1.org or 888-IveGot1. There is also a free smartphone app:

IVEGOT1.

The Burmese python is an invasive species that has negative impacts on the Everglades ecosystem and its native wildlife. The FWC actively coordinates with local, state and federal partners, including university researchers, native tribes and nongovernmental organizations, on the research, management and capture of pythons.

# FWC, partners rescue injured Florida panther kitten

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and partners rescued an about 9-month-old female Florida panther in the Golden Gate Estates area of Collier County earlier this month.

The FWC received a call about a panther kitten dragging its rear leg. A homeowner noticed the injured panther earlier that morning as he was leaving for work. When he returned home and saw the panther a second time, he notified law enforcement.

FWC panther biologists and law-enforcement officers, deputies with the Collier County Sheriff's Office and staff from the Golden Gate Animal Clinic responded to the area where the panther was last seen. They located the panther in thick brush and sedated it.

After an on-scene assessment of the panther's condition, FWC biologists transported the panther to the Animal Specialty Hospital of Florida. Veterinarians at the hospital determined that the panther had a compound fracture in her rear right leg, rib fractures and bruising around the lung, all of which were likely caused by a vehicle collision. That evening they performed surgery, using a steel plate to mend the bone together.

With the help of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the panther was taken to the White Oak Conservation Center in Yulee, where she will receive care until she has fully healed from her injuries and is ready for release.

"We are pleased with what appears to be a successful surgery with no complications," said Darrell Land, FWC panther team leader. "Thanks to the help of our partners, this panther has a very good chance of returning to the wild. With only 100 to 160 adults and sub-adults remaining in south Florida, every panther plays an important role in the population."

Florida residents can support conservation efforts like the rescue and rehabilitation of injured or orphaned panthers by purchasing a panther license plate. Fees from license plate sales are the primary funding source for the FWC's research and management of Florida panthers.





**BOSS'S DENIAL MAKES DREAM OF MOVING A NIGHTMARE**

DEAR HARRIETTE: I recently visited Miami and fell in love. During my visit, I decided I wanted to move there and start a new life. To help with my transition, I asked for a work transfer since the company I work for has a location there. There were two positions available, and the Miami manager was interested in me. My current manager denied my transfer, saying it is in my best interest to stay. I was just promoted to a full-time position, and we are losing our assistant manager soon. I feel discouraged and like my manager's decision was selfish and inconsiderate. What am I to do? -- Ready to Move, Chicago

DEAR READY TO MOVE: If you are prepared to pack up and move to Miami, focus on that. Start researching other job opportunities there. If you have been good at your current job and have someone who can provide you with a solid recommendation, use that to put out feelers for other jobs. You can also let the manager in the Miami store know how much you wish you could come there, but your manager is unwilling to budge on the transfer. You have to be clear that you are ready to move, even if you don't get the transfer.

It makes sense that your boss would want you to stay -- especially if you are a valuable employee who has received training and a recent promotion. That an assistant manager is leaving makes it potentially more difficult for your current employer to survive comfortably without you. If you are not 100 percent bent on moving, this may be the time to negotiate your future at home. Find out if you might be considered for the assistant manager position now or in the near future. Figure out what incentives exist for you where you are. That doesn't mean you never move to Miami, but it could delay your move and keep Miami as a cool vacation site for now.





**Washington state woman spots stolen car in drive-thru**

**KENNEWICK, Wash.** — A Washington woman whose car was stolen from her apartment complex saw the stolen SUV hours later — in the drive-thru of the McDonald's restaurant where she works.

The Tri-City Herald reported Virginia Maiden called police Tuesday after seeing her SUV in the drive-thru. Officers arrested the driver, a 22-year-old Kennewick woman, at the restaurant.

Police found clothes in the car that had been stolen from department stores.

**Connecticut chef set to feast on cicadas during invasion**

**NEW HAVEN, Conn.** — Connecticut chef Bun Lai already is known for his Mexican grasshopper dish and his fried rice with meal worms and crickets. But he soon also might be recognized as the cicada chef.

Lai, owner of Miya's Sushi, told the New Haven Register he plans to fill a big freezer full of Brood II cicadas, once the red-eyed bugs' 17-year life cycle brings them above ground for about five weeks.

"I'm going to catch a whole bunch of them and preserve them for future eating," he said. "I plan on eating a whole bunch of them myself."

Lai said cicadas, and insects in general have great nutritional value and are "healthier for our bodies than eating meat."

He said he plans to feature the cicada in some theme dishes, steaming some of the bugs and boiling others, with the appropriate spices and herbs.

"I don't want to take something that's inherently nutritious and deep fry it," he explained. "If I'm going to interrupt this amazing, 17-year life cycle, I'm going to honor it and respect it."

Lai told the Register he sees it as a challenge to take something that's abundant and nourishing and make it appealing, not to mention tasty.

"I'm not trying to gross people out," he said. "I'm not running a frat house. I respect the cicada."

**Florida toddler who lost feet in lawnmower meets dolphin**

**TAMPA** — A toddler whose feet were amputated after her father accidentally backed over her with a riding lawnmower had a special meeting with her hero.

Ireland Nugent often has been seen clutching a stuffed animal of Winter, the dolphin with a prosthetic tail, in her wheelchair since the April 11 accident. She even carried the toy with her when she left the hospital nearly a month after the accident.

On Saturday, she got to meet the real Winter the dolphin.

Bay News 9 reported she initially cried, but soon reached out and touched the mammal.

Winter lost her tail to a crab trap and has become an ambassador to those who have lost limbs. Ireland underwent seven surgeries and will be fitted for prosthetic feet in the coming weeks.

**Once-homeless, man now a college grad**

**DAYTONA BEACH (AP)** — As the lights went out and his fellow students settled into their dorms, Joshua Williams would store two duffel bags of belongings in a friend's room and disappear into the darkness.

He would leave the secure surroundings of the Bethune-Cookman University campus and head across the International Speedway Boulevard bridge and walk, sometimes all night. In the early morning hours, he would sneak into the lobby at the Bronson Hall dorm and sleep a few hours on a couch as if he lived there.

"I would go down to the beach sometimes," he recalled. "Sometimes I would just take any direction and get lost and try to find my way back — I would just walk."

Williams, 23, who recently graduated with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice, was homeless for most of his first three years at the school but too proud to tell anyone.

But just like on his nightly walks, he always found his way. He survived on handouts, slept in empty trucks or on a couch at the apartments of classmates who thought he just didn't want to go home after a late-night study session.

Remembering the poverty, drug dealers and random shootings he'd seen growing up near Miami, he knew he was on the right path. At school, he would find family, a sense of purpose and even win the title of Mr. Bethune-Cookman University and become the first student to organize a scholarship — but first he had to find a place to sleep.

"Before the sun comes up, I would make sure I was somewhere to lay down," Williams remembered. "I knew I was homeless, but I said to myself I'd rather be in Daytona homeless trying to go to school than ever go back to Miami."

Williams arrived at B-CU in the fall of 2008 with \$3,000 he saved from working at a gas station in Miami. He knew it wasn't enough but felt confident.

Then he found out tuition, room and board ran about \$10,000 a semester.

Williams wasn't about to let that stop him.

He had never known his father, and he's had little communication with his mother. A great-grandmother raised him in Atlanta until she was too sick to care for him. Then he moved to Miami to live with an aunt. Both women stressed the importance of finishing school. His great-grandmother, who has since died, always told him "to get as much knowledge as possible so I won't end up on the streets."

Life reinforced the lesson. He remembers drug dealers on the corners, kids skipping school and police in his aunt's neighborhood all the time. He said her house was shot at twice while he was in college. His 16-year-old brother, who lived nearby, was found dead in a lake in 2011 from what Williams was told was a drowning.

Immersing himself at a young age in school activities gave Williams hopes of a college scholarship. He was on his high school track and football teams before being hurt his senior year. A teacher helped him focus on the admissions tests and applications he needed to apply to colleges.

By the time he arrived at B-CU,

Williams was so excited about his new circumstances that he was convinced everything would fall into place. The school put him in temporary rooms while he applied for loans and financial aid.

"It didn't matter to me where I went, as long as it wasn't Miami," he said. "I didn't want to be a part of that."

He stayed in a dorm his first semester but didn't have enough to pay for both tuition and room and board after that. He then lied to school officials, saying he lived off campus so he would only have to pay for classes.

In reality, he had no place to live.

Only a few people knew the truth of Williams' living situation. Pride kept him from asking for help.

"I didn't want anyone to help me or look down on me or have sympathy for me," he said. "I just wanted to go to school."

He took copious notes in class because he couldn't afford textbooks. If he was able to borrow a friend's meal plan card, "It was a blessing. If I didn't, I was out of luck." Plenty of days he ate nothing more than a cup of noodles he got from friends whose parents bought them groceries. The still-slender student had more worry than appetite in those days.

"I would be stressed and I would over-think and over-analyze and I just didn't have an appetite," he said. "I was always worried about my next move — Where would I stay? How long can I stay here? When is my family going to send me money?"

The nightly walks began once he left the dorms. Sometimes he found shelter in an unlocked U-Haul truck on the business next to campus. He could always sneak into a dorm for a shower before heading to class. He could hang out in a friend's room until curfew at 11 p.m., then stow his stuff before heading out for the night. His friend's three roommates never knew he was homeless.

Sometimes he would tag along with classmates who lived off-campus.

"I would say, 'Hey, I'll come over and we'll study for that test and we'll just arrive to school tomorrow,'" he explained. "I would ask without asking. I was very prideful. I didn't want anyone to know."

His life changed after he found the courage to speak about his homelessness at a school assembly his junior year. An adviser who heard his speech made some calls and got him into a residence hall that year. Unburdened of his secret, Williams came to see he was a part of the campus community he'd been sneaking around for three years.

"Joshua knew how to camouflage very well," said Cheryl Lawson-Young, public safety compliance and prevention manager for B-CU's department of public safety, who has known Williams for 3½ years and helped with his field study internship this past semester. "When things are not going right in his life or he's hurting, you really won't know it."

Williams has been able to turn his circumstances "into a real blessing by supporting others and being able to relate to their experiences," said his former speech communications assistant professor Joanna Showell, who encouraged Williams. He has since motivated others by sharing his experiences and background at talks

throughout the state.

Last spring Williams won the Mr. Bethune-Cookman University title, which made him an ambassador for the school. That also guaranteed him room and board his senior year, though he said he also wanted the position to change people's viewpoint.

"When you think of Mr. B-CU you think of some uppity or overachieving person," Williams said. "I felt where I have come from and what I've been through I would make the position different. I'm the same person I was when I stepped on campus."

Not having books until his senior year inspired Williams to start a Keeper of Light book scholarship — the first scholarship started by a student, college administrators said. Williams has raised \$2,750 and every Mr. B-CU after him he hopes will continue to raise money for the fund.

"He hasn't left and he's already serving others," President Edison Jackson said. "His spirit and mind is in the right place."

Eugenia Forte of Orlando, a 1980 B-CU graduate, was moved by that spirit when she heard one of Williams' speeches in November 2011 at her church. She was "so touched and moved by his story" she has taken on the role of his godmother, calling often and having him participate in family holidays and other occasions. She and her family will attend graduation.

"I was so amazed at his courage and his strength," Forte said. "I was just captivated by this young man because he was still in school. I'm so proud of Josh. The Lord has great things for him to do."

After graduation, Williams said he hopes to get an internship for the summer at a law firm in Washington. Administrators want him to continue at the college and obtain a master's degree, which he is considering. He wants a career either as a defense attorney, motivational speaker, professor or even a congressman.

"Coming from his situation to where he is now and with the energy that he still possesses, I think his future is bright," said Fontaine Davis, the university's chief of staff who has taken Williams under his wing.

As he looked ahead to graduation, so much has changed for Williams since he first showed up on campus. The dreadlocks he once wore have been replaced with a haircut. He often wears a suit as he walks across campus, cheerfully shaking hands with students and the campus safety officers he once had to avoid. Yet tucked in the book bag he always carries is a reminder of more desperate times: deodorant, toothpaste, toothbrush, a clean change of underwear. Old habits are hard to break.

Looking out from a top floor library window to the campus that he made his home, Williams paused to think when asked if he ever wanted to give up.

"Every day. All the time. I want to quit now sometimes," he said, his voice tinged with sadness. "I ask myself, 'Am I really doing this for me or am I only doing it to show my family that I could do it?' Sometimes I battle with that. (But) I made it too far. I'm not going to quit. I just have my moments where I feel alone still."

# Hunt for ID of artist's inspiration succeeds

**SARASOTA (AP)** — As he studied hundreds of photos for images to enshrine at Sarasota National Cemetery, art project leader Larry Kirkland kept coming back to a frame he could not shake.

It was a Defense Department portrait of a young woman in uniform, saluting as a tear ran down her cheek. She was an Air Force staff sergeant. Her name was Alicia Watkins. For six months, Kirkland tried in vain to seek her approval. But the trail was cold.

"We find that Alicia Watkins has retired," Kirkland recalled of his investigation. "Then we find she has been interviewed on the 'Oprah Winfrey Show.'"

He learned Watkins had been in the Pentagon during the 9/11 attack. And that she had deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan. And that she suffered from post-traumatic stress disorder.

"Then we find out that she was homeless," Kirkland continued in a measured cadence. "We get the last contact for her ... and after that, she just kind of vanished. Until the Boston Marathon bombing."

A dramatic pause. Then: "She gets interviewed. Local television. Phenomenal."

Clutching an American flag, Watkins emerged from nowhere on April 18 to attend a memorial service address by President Barack Obama. Kirkland's team worked the Boston CBS affiliate's lead to contact Watkins. Kirkland delivered the bottom line with a flicker of a smile: "She gave us permission to use her image."

As a result, Watkins' tearful salute will join scores of other

veteran-themed photos incorporated into marble markers at Patriot Plaza, The Patterson Foundation's \$10 million gift to Sarasota National Cemetery.

For Kirkland, the often tedious detail work is overshadowed by his own intensely personal relationships with matters of war and peace.

"At this time of my life, I can handle this," Kirkland, 63, said. "But if this had come up 20 years ago, I don't know if I would've been ready for it. I think as we age, we understand the world is a complicated place. It's not black and white."

Kirkland has left creative fingerprints across the globe.

From the Mass Transit Railway terminal in Hong Kong and Iwate Prefecture University in Morioka City, Japan, to the National Academies of Science in Washington and the Civil Rights Garden in Atlantic City, his projects are bold and provocative.

Hospitals, libraries, soccer fields, international airports — Kirkland's eye has transformed diverse and ordinary venues into uncommon opportunities for wonder, whimsy and reflection.

But Patriot Plaza, a public showcase for private-sector innovation set for dedication in 2014 by the Department of Veterans Affairs, has forced Kirkland to revisit his own childhood in a way that no other commissioned work has done.

Chosen among 60 artists screened by The Patterson Foundation to confer an unforgettable aesthetic upon the Patriot Plaza, Kirkland built his career with a single thought in mind:

"The first and last question I

want to ask in my creative process is, who are we when we are here?" Kirkland said recently at Patterson's office in downtown Sarasota. "Every person that's ever been born, at some time in their life, says, 'Why am I here?' But 'Who are we when we are here?' asks about the kind of community we are."

When Kirkland came aboard, Patterson already had approved the basic design — amphitheater, rostrum, landscaping — submitted by Hoyt Architects of Sarasota. The issue confronting Kirkland and Patterson art consultant Ann Wykell was how to personalize the experience.

That wasn't the only challenge.

"When I first showed some of the images we'd picked, the VA archivist said, 'No, you can't use that one, it has a gun in it,'" Kirkland recalled. "Ann and I kind of looked at each other going, how are we going to do this?"

In 1920, federal legislation banned images of armaments and violence from national cemeteries, reasoning that veterans burial grounds should be a place of "peace and repose." Ultimately, however, those restrictions sharpened their artistic instincts.

"There are other places around the world where battle pictures are shown, but we were not trying to depict that experience of battle," Wykell said. "We were trying to get at the internal experience in each of these soldiers."

With a major assist from Kenny Irby of the photojournalism program at the Poynter Institute for Media Studies in St. Peters-

burg, a review of American war photography spanning three centuries informed Kirkland's ideas on some universal truths.

"When I look at row upon row of people in uniform, instead of seeing a battalion of warriors, I think of them as individuals who have made a choice to be a collective," Kirkland said. "There are musicians, there are dancers, there are poets, there are football players. There's fathers and there's mothers. There's brothers, sisters, grandfathers and grandmas and children."

"These are human stories. They make sacrifices. And it's hard to be in the military. It is hard to be a military spouse. It is hard to be a military kid."

Kirkland would know. His earliest memories are rooted in Japan, where his father served during the post-war occupation. He was the third of five kids. He says the first day of class — he attended seven different schools — was always the worst.

"There's something genetic in our family — whenever we were nervous we would always yawn," Kirkland said, the memories of his sibling yawners suddenly immediate and vivid. "The yawning was gulping in air to give us oxygen because it was terrifying. You're brand new, you know no one, you don't know if they're smarter than you, you don't know where you're going to stand in this, and some military kids can't deal with it, it's too hard."

That is why Patriot Plaza's glass-and-stone, tablet-installed photo essays will be divided into two themes. The most promi-

nent, "Witness to Mission," will feature troops in the more familiar contexts of conflict. But perhaps the most intimate, "Service, Support, Sacrifice," situated away from the main entrance, zeroes in on less celebrated scenes from military life, the families in the background, the anticipation, the aftermath.

Kirkland, a college student during the Vietnam War, drew a high draft number and never served in the military. That conflict exacted a profound toll on his family, and even today, Kirkland declines to discuss its consequences. But they are no doubt on his mind, at Patriot Plaza and back in Washington, D.C., where he also is working on a monument to disabled veterans.

The latter "has somehow made this project a little deeper," Kirkland said, choosing his words carefully, pausing between each subsequent sentence.

"As I said earlier, every human being goes through many of the same things. You get born. You get your first tooth. You have your first day of school. You have your first kiss. There's all these firsts. And you share those with the rest of humanity."

"So as an artist and a thinker, as a participant in a culture that's trying to find those things that we share ..." Kirkland lets the thought hang in midair for so long it creates its own tension. His small audience in the Patterson meeting room waits for the shoe to drop.

"Maybe next time I'll do a piece that's about the things we don't share."

Everyone at the table shares a huge laugh at that one.


