Boo Weekley, Willie Robertson, Larry the Cable Guy, Colt Ford, Jamey Johnson attend charity golf tourney

Local golf professional Boo Weekley took over the course at Hidden Creek in Navarre, inviting local players and a few famous friends for a golf tournament this weekend, benefiting several local charities.

Local patches of rain loomed during the tournament kickoff on the first day. The rain stayed at bay for most of the two-day tourney, with a few light sprinkles late Saturday afternoon during a celebrity showdown, according to event coordinators.

Weekley brought star power to the event to play a nine-hole round with the likes of comedian Larry the Cable Guy, Willie Robertson from "Duck Dynasty" and musicians Colt Ford and Jamey Johnson.

The group played an informal round, mostly mingling with a crowd of around 40 spectators that braved the ominous and cloudy afternoon to snag a photograph with their favorite celebrity. Children seemed happy to

\$646,000 sidewalk coming to Spencer Field

Pace residents soon will be strapping on their sneakers, with new avenues for pedestrians to get around.

Santa Rosa County is expected to begin a \$646,126.50 sidewalk project near Benny Russell Park in August, according to County Engineer Roger Blaylock.

The sidewalk will loop around Spencer Field, with a leg extending north to Benny Russell Park. The path also will extend south and connect to an existing sidewalk that runs east and west along Norris Road by Pace High School.

"There's a lot of positive things when you get folks into the neighborhood," Blaylock said. "It serves a community purpose."

Blaylock said the sidewalks will be suitable for walking, jogging and cycling, as well as providing non-vehicular traffic access to Benny Russell Park. The sidewalk project is part of a transportation enhancement program.

The project is being fully funded by fed-

Driver says traffic camera contributed to accident

A red-light violation camera was a factor in a single-vehicle crash Monday morning in Milton, according to witnesses of the accident.

A motorcycle driver lost control of his bike and crashed, causing minor injuries to himself, as it approached the red-light camera-equipped intersection of U.S. 90 and Glover Lane.

Olivier Biaggini, 49, Milton, was driving a mid-2000 yellow Victory motorcycle behind a gold Kia SUV, according to Milton police. The vehicles were heading eastbound on U.S. 90, approaching the traffic light at Glover Lane.

The driver of the gold SUV said he saw

Canal Street work delayed, awaiting permit

Traffic remains detoured through downtown neighborhoods as construction on the Canal Street Project mulls along, stymied not by recent patches of rain, but by complications in securing a permit with the Florida Department of Transportation.

"Everything is basically done from Highway 90 south,

with the exception of paving," said City Manager Brian Watkins. "We just got permit approval from FDOT to relocate the traffic signal."

FDOT issued a permit to make adjustments to the intersection of U.S. 90 and Canal Street. The traffic signal will be relocated, and a turn lane from Canal Street onto U.S. 90 will be created, according to Watkins. Traffic along U.S. 90 is not expected to be stifled much further

while the intersection is modified. The contract specifically states the old light had to be working as the installation of the new traffic light was being installed.

Jerald Ward, Public Works Director for the city, estimates the project will take another two to four weeks to complete.

"They were looking for specific documents from the contractor that we could not get until the contract was

signed with the contractor," Ward said. "We thought it would have been here a month ago, but it's taken twice that."

The city has been waiting on the permit so they could pave the street from one end to the other in one process.

Ward said the city saved \$95,000 by recycling the original Canal Street concrete. When the road was ripped

The Department announces receipt of an application for a Joint Coastal Permit (File No. 0220096-006-JC), pursuant to Chapter 161 and Part IV of Chapter 373, Florida Statutes, and for authorization to use sovereign submerged lands, pursuant to Chapter 253, Florida Statutes. The applicant is Santa Rosa County Board of County Commissioners, and the proposed activity is to place approximately 1,200,000 cy of material along 4.1 miles of shoreline with a proposed offshore borrow area located just over 4 miles south of the fill placement site at Navarre Beach in Santa Rosa County.

the light turn yellow and started slowing down, knowing the intersection was equipped with red-light violation cameras. He said he looked in the rear-view mirror and saw Biagini losing control of his motorcycle.

The SUV driver said he made the decision to proceed through the light to avoid being hit by the motorcycle. His vehicle rolled about halfway through the in-

tersection, and then he pulled off onto the shoulder, where he stopped. He said the driver of the motorcycle was moving and walking around after the accident.

Biagini crashed without hitting any other vehicles. Milton police on scene said he suffered road rash to his arm and an open wound to the calf that likely would require stitches. Biagini was transferred to the hospital

via ambulance.

The Victory motorcycle suffered minimal damage to a foot peg and gear shifter, according to police. The damage was consistent with a low-speed crash.

The accident is under investigation, though Milton Police said the driver of the gold Kia will not be ticketed for driving through the red light considering the circumstances.

up in the initial demolition phase, it was trucked to a facility in Bagdad where it was crushed, resulting in a usable, recycled-concrete product.

The project began construction in May, creating some problems for local residents and commuters. Large trucks have been diverted to either Avalon Boulevard or Ward Basin Road as alternate routes. No one is accessing Interstate 10 via Canal Street during this period.

"Probably the biggest issue we've had is the increase of traffic with the bypass," Watkins said. "Hopefully, it'll be alleviated when we get the road open."

Residents attended City Council meetings to voice their complaints against the influx of traffic in the surrounding neighborhoods. One resident, Kim Stevens, was concerned with trucks cutting through the detour, tearing up her yard on Baldwin Street.

Another resident, Maria Ard, pleaded with the council to establish more of a police presence along Baldwin Street while the construction project continued.

The Canal Street Project is a \$700,000 infrastructure project funded by a Community Development Block Grant through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The project features the addition of curbs; wider turn lanes; sidewalks; buried utilities; and complete resurfacing of the road itself.

Some portions of the original plan were deleted from the project to stay within budget, Watkins said. Landscaping and lamp-posts were cut from the plans, trimming \$103,000. They might be installed in the future if funding can be secured.

eral dollars administered by the Florida Department of Transportation, Blaylock said. An FDOT local agency program (LAP) provided for every aspect of the project, with design, consulting and inspection included. Santa Rosa County does not have any obligation to match funds.

The LAP program funded similar projects such as the Florida Historic State Road 1 reconstruction, also known as the Red Brick Road. Jay secured \$177,079.70 in funding through the FDOT LAP program last year, extending sidewalks in the town for transportation enhancement.

To qualify for the funding, the county had to adhere to strict federal guidelines in place, Blaylock said. The scope of the project was very detailed, and the project was updated as the county moved closer to the top of the list for funding. The guidelines dictated certain permits, the procurement of land, inspections, Equal Employment Opportunity standards and adherence to a prevailing wage rate.

Blaylock said the county applied for the FDOT LAP funding "years ago."

The Navy had initial reservations with increased foot traffic around the airfield, Blaylock said. But the county worked closely with the military in acquiring shared use of the land.

"The Navy is a full partner with this," Blaylock said. "We have worked every step of the way, because it is Navy property."

As part of the project, portions of the airfield's fence will be removed and replaced to address security concerns, Blaylock said. The sidewalk will meander around several large heritage oak trees on North Spencer Field, preserving as many as possible.

Panhandle Grading and Paving Inc. was awarded the contract to perform the work. They have 270 days to complete the project, looking at a potential completion date of June 8, 2014, Blaylock said.

"What town is this, again?" Robertson asked with a slight chuckle. "Oh yeah, Navarre, it's great."


Dr. John Cloninger competed in the weekend's 216-man shotgun tournament earlier in the day and stuck around to see the celebrities take a couple swings during the informal game.

What can you do for 2-2-2?

What do you call 200 pairs of shoes, 200 hundred pair of underwear, and 200 socks for needy neighborhood children?

At East Milton Assembly of God, they call it the "2-2-2" program.

This project is from an idea that Pastor Brad Odom had after seeing the need in the local community.

According to Pastor Brad, "There are 750 students who attend the East Milton Elementary School (the church's neighbors) and many of these children return to school with shoes that don't fit or are beyond repair. Also, children in our community have a basic need of socks and underwear. I believe the Lord impressed upon me to bless the elementary school with 200 pairs of shoes, 200 packs of socks and 200 packs of underwear."

"Impressed" is rather mild.

What Pastor Brad means is that he, and his church, laid shoes, socks, and underwear at their altar and prayed for the community to join together.

But, can one trust some country pastor saying that God gave him a need to fill?

Evidently, the message had merit to it as Marsha Pugh, Guidance Counselor for East Milton Elementary School noted, "Many of our students do not have the opportunity to start to school with basic necessities such as new socks, shoes, and under garments. They rely on the generosity of local organizations and loving individuals to contribute to their needs."

Pugh went on to note that the school has a very high percentage (around 85 %) of free and reduced

lunches.

She contended that many of the families of their students are either homeless or doubled up with other families.

Pugh said, "Understanding poverty in our own backyards is very difficult for a lot of people. Many do not have any idea what some of our students go through just to get to school. In some instances, school is the safest and most consistent place for many of our students."

Pugh went on to say, "For some of our students' breakfast and lunch served at school is the only hot meal they receive. In addition, East Milton Elementary has one of the largest ESE departments in Santa Rosa County - helping many underprivileged children with special learning needs."

Already, thanks to some marvelous blessings by local businesses, individuals, and a local church, the 2-2-2 program has exceeded its goal on shoes and now is only in need of 100 packs each of underwear and socks.

So, what can you do for 2-2-2?

Well, the church has made it easy for people to participate.

Black self-sabotage

If we put ourselves into the shoes of racists who seek to sabotage black upward mobility, we couldn't develop a more effective agenda than that followed by civil rights organizations, black politicians, academics, liberals and the news media. Let's look at it.

First, weaken the black family, but don't blame it on individual choices. You have to preach that today's weak black family is a legacy of slavery, Jim Crow and racism. The truth is that black female-headed households were just 18 percent of households in 1950, as opposed to about 68 percent today. In fact, from 1890 to 1940, the black marriage rate was slightly higher than that of whites. Even during slavery, when marriage was forbidden for blacks, most black children lived in biological two-parent families. In New York City, in 1925, 85 percent of black households were two-parent households. A study of 1880 family structure in Philadelphia shows that three-quarters of black families were two-parent households.

During the 1960s, devastating nonsense emerged, exemplified by a Johns Hopkins University sociology professor who argued, "It has yet to be shown that the absence of a father was directly responsible for any of the supposed deficiencies of broken homes." The real issue, he went on to say, "is not the lack of male presence but the lack of male income." That suggests marriage and fatherhood can be replaced by a welfare check.

The poverty rate among blacks is 36 percent. Most black poverty is found in female-headed households. The poverty rate among black married couples has been in single digits since 1994 and is about 8 percent today. The black illegitimacy rate is 75 percent, and in some cities, it's 90 percent. But if that's a legacy of slavery, it must have skipped several generations, because in the 1940s, unwed births hovered around 14 percent.

Along with the decline of the black family comes anti-social behavior, manifested by high crime rates. Each year, roughly 7,000 blacks are murdered. Ninety-four percent of the time, the murderer is another black person. According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, between 1976 and 2011, there were 279,384 black murder victims. Using the 94 percent figure

means that 262,621 were murdered by other blacks. Though blacks are 13 percent of the nation's population, they account for more than 50 percent of homicide victims. Nationally, the black homicide victimization rate is six times that of whites, and in some cities, it's 22 times that of whites. I'd like for the president, the civil rights establishment, white liberals and the news media, who spent massive resources protesting the George Zimmerman trial's verdict, to tell the nation whether they believe that the major murder problem blacks face is murder by whites. There are no such protests against the thousands of black murders.

There's an organization called NeighborhoodScout. Using 2011 population data from the U.S. Census Bureau, 2011 crime statistics from the FBI and information from 17,000 local law enforcement agencies in the country, it came up with a report titled "Top 25 Most Dangerous Neighborhoods in America." (http://tinyurl.com/cdqv4) They include neighborhoods in Detroit, Chicago, Houston, St. Louis and other major cities. What's common to all 25 neighborhoods is that their makeup is described as "Black" or "Mostly Black." The high crime rates have several outcomes that are not in the best interests of the overwhelmingly law-abiding people in these neighborhoods.

There can't be much economic development.

Property has a lower value, but worst of all, people can't live with the kind of personal security that most Americans enjoy.

Disgustingly, black politicians, civil rights leaders, liberals and the president are talking nonsense about "having a conversation about race." That's beyond useless. Tell me how a conversation with white people is going to stop black predators from preying on blacks. How is such a conversation going to eliminate the 75 percent illegitimacy rate? What will such a conversation do about the breakdown of the black family (though "breakdown" is not the correct word, as the family doesn't form in the first place)? Only black people can solve our problems.

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Division of Law Enforcement weekly report

NORTHWEST REGION Weekly Report July 19-24, 2013

ESCAMBIA COUNTY COPS
 Captain Sumner attended the change of command ceremony for the United States Coast Guard (USCG) – Sector Mobile. The Mobile USCG headquarters provided a nice farewell ceremony for retiring Captain Don Rose and a welcome for incoming Captain Sam “Duke” Walker. Many maritime industry leaders and representatives from local, state, and federal maritime law enforcement agencies were in attendance.

OKALOOSA COUNTY
 Officers Arnette, Murphy, and Lewis responded to the Blackwater River near Bryant Bridge after receiving information that two canoes with eleven people, including children, had capsized. A severe thunderstorm was passing through which made the response challenging. The river was flooded and very swift due to recent multiple days of rain which caused the canoes to capsize. The officers located all the occupants who were wet and cold, but safe along the river’s bank. Additionally, officers located the canoe occupants’ personal belongings and retrieved the

submerged canoes. Everyone was safely transported back to their original launch site.

OKALOOSA COUNTY COPS
 Officers Maltais and Molnar addressed a group from the Defense Threat Reduction Agency (USSTRACOM) at the Hurlburt Field conference center. Twenty-four personnel, newly stationed to the area, were briefed on boating, fishing and hunting opportunities and regulations. Information on the Northwest Region’s State Forests and Parks were provided.

FRANKLIN COUNTY
 Resource Protection Service (RPS) Officers Allen and Gore received information that two individuals were fishing a seine net on the beachside of Bald Point State Park. When they arrived on the scene, they set up surveillance on two individuals who were fishing two nets. During the surveillance, they determined the individuals were fishing with two monofilament gill nets. They observed the individuals working the nets pulling crabs and fish from the net. Officers Allen and Gore approached the individuals and identified themselves. Two monofilament nets were seized and the case was turned over to the State Attorney’s Office for prosecution. RPS Officers Allen and Gore were on patrol in St. George Island State Park when they observed two individuals cast netting on the bay side of the park. Further surveillance revealed that one of the

individuals fishing was a repeat resource offender. The subject’s recreational and commercial fishing license is revoked for net fishing violations. They continued surveillance and when the individuals quit fishing, the officers identified themselves and conducted a resource stop. The individual with the revoked license was in possession of a quantity of fish which included an undersized black drum. The subject was arrested and booked into the Franklin County Jail for fishing on a revoked saltwater products license and possession of an undersized black drum. While on night patrol, RPS Officers Allen and Gore observed a boat in the East Point Channel operating without navigation lights. Surveillance was set up on the vessel. There were two occupants on board and the individuals were observed harvesting oysters off of exposed oyster bars in the Channel.

Harvesting oysters in this area is prohibited. The officers watched as the individuals harvested several bags of uncultured oysters, brought them back to the boat ramp and hid them. When the boat returned back to the boat ramp with more oysters, the officers identified themselves to the boat operator and passenger. The operator of the boat took off running into the water, but Officer Gore was able to apprehend him. Seven large bags of oysters were seized and returned back to the water alive. The subjects on the boat were booked into the Franklin County Jail and charged with harvesting oysters in a prohibited area, harvesting oysters between sunset and sunrise, and possession of uncultured oysters. One subject was charged with resisting a law enforcement officer without violence and possession of less than 20 grams of cannabis.



Ask the Preacher

Dear Pastor Gallups,
 Was Jesus really a carpenter?
 - J.T. Milton

Dear J.T.,
 What a great question. This may come as a surprise to many of our readers, but we really don’t know for certain the answer to this question. We find only ONE place in scripture where Jesus is either called a carpenter or the, son of a carpenter, depending upon which of the ancient manuscript copies that you read. The passage is found in Mark 6:2-3, but these words are uttered by people who were MISTAKEN about Jesus otherwise.

Additionally the word translated from the original Greek of the New Testament to “carpenter” in English can mean either a worker of wood, fabric or stone. In other words, a “fabricator” or “builder” in general.

It is quite common to refer to Jesus as a carpenter from Galilee. You even see people driving around with a bumper sticker that says “My Boss Is a Jewish Carpenter” by which they mean Jesus.

The people in Mark 6 who were asking the question of Jesus - were asking because they were surprised to see someone whom they thought was a carpenter functioning as a Rabbi. Jesus was teaching in the synagogue on the Sabbath; in other words, He was preaching the sermon. Since they thought He was a carpenter - usurping the role of a “Rabbi” they understandably took offense. Apparently, the synagogue authorities had allowed Him to preach, which means they believed that He was not “Merely” a carpenter and was a fully qualified, “Rabbi”.

The New Testament calls Jesus “rabbi” about 13 times and the New Testament calls Jesus “teacher” about 47 times. These words are synonymous. Jesus called Himself a Rabbi in Matthew 26:17-19. Nowhere does He call Himself a carpenter.

It may very well be that Jesus’ earthly father was a carpenter and that Jesus was raised learning these skills. We simply do not know for certain. But we DO find that at the age of 12 Jesus was already preparing Himself to be a “teacher.” We also know that He purposely waited until He was 30 years of age to begin His ministry. This was the age that a person was allowed to officially be a Rabbi and teach in the synagogues.

BARTRAM'S TRAVELS

Group expanding knowledge of 18th century explorer

Whether you call him William, Billy or Willie, 18th century naturalist William Bartram is still making his presence felt in 21st-century Florida.

Bartram would several times visit the Southern colonies before the United States was the United States. In 1791, he would publish his "Travels," a book detailing those journeys and the fauna and flora, people and customs he observed. The book would be the first scientific book to come out of the new United States.

In Florida some of those travels were along the St. Johns River that borders both St. Johns and Putnam counties.

Now a group in Putnam is seeking to expand people's appreciation of Bartram. They see it as both a way to promote ecotourism and a way to give the state's schoolchildren a better understanding about the early naturalist and the early people of the state.

"(Bartram scholar) Charlotte Porter convinced us that William Bartram's 'Travels' in Putnam County is ours — it's our history, our heritage and our nature. In her words: 'Putnam County owns him,'" Putnam County Commission Chair Nancy Harris told a group over the weekend.

For two days Putnam County hosted a scholarly

symposium on Bartram, funded in part by a Florida Humanities Council grant. Both the county government and the City of Palatka have chipped in resources and personnel to help the Bartram Trails in Putnam Committee, the group heading up the effort to spread information about Bartram's role in the state's early history.

"I knew (the history) was here, but I never knew how important it all was. We just need to appreciate this," said Sam Carr, who chairs the committee.

With 31 identified places relating to Bartram and his travels in Putnam, the group is offering visitors and the curious a chance to see where William visited. They've come up with biking, hiking, driving and canoeing trails. For those who aren't ready to physically see the places, there's a website that offers photographs, quotes from the book and explanations offering both historical and scientific information about the spots.

They plan to do more including kiosks along the riverfronts in Palatka that tell about Bartram and unobtrusive signs along the waterways that smartphone users can scan as they canoe or kayak past. Brochures and exhibits are also planned.

"We are hoping this is the beginning of something really great, of a public private partnership," Carr said.

Appreciating Bartram isn't new. The emphasis on

it in Putnam County is.

Tim Kyser, who heads up the Putnam County Environmental Committee, says the whole project has been "a long time coming together."

The symposium included historians, scientists, environmentalists, nature lovers and a few of the just curious in attendance, giving an indication of Bartram's appeal.

So what makes Bartram special?

As scientist Dean Campbell told the group, everybody at the symposium was talking about "how they came to Billy."

For him, it was first a copy of the book given him by his father when he was 25. But, he said it wasn't the elaborate passages or the poetry of the writing, it was the science contained within.

Campbell, who became part of the St. Johns River Water Management's cleaning up the St. Johns River initiative, found William's book offered accounts of what the river looked like when it was still pristine and thus gave them ideas when starting the cleanup. And he was even more impressed by the journals that William's father, John, wrote. "John appealed to me as a scientist. I can see what he saw."

Bartram first visited the area with his father, John. He later made trips by himself.

Those elaborate

passages and poetry of writing did inspire others including English poets Samuel Coleridge and William Wordsworth in their writing.

His writings on the Indian Nations, the customs and the trading have offered insight into the economic system including the frontier exchange economy and the British empire system.

His descriptions of flora and fauna included discoveries of new plants and led to the naming of several.

His artwork offered a meticulous look at previously unknown species and allowed readers their first glimpse at species native to the area.

Two of the committee members — Ken and Janice Mahaffey of San Mateo — recently returned from a couple of months in Europe. The highlight of their trip? Probably going to London's Natural History Museum, which has an original copy of Bartram's "Travels," a journal and the original of some of his illustrations.

"It was like the Holy Grail," said Janice Mahaffey. "To see the original pen and ink and how meticulously they were done."

"And I was holding the original manuscript," Ken Mahaffey said. "They handed it over to me and I was turning the pages and thinking as I read, 'I know where he's talking about.'"

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A two-headed turtle born last month at the San Antonio Zoo has become so popular that she has her own Facebook page.

Zoo officials say the Texas cooter, named Thelma and Louise for the female duo in the 1991 Oscar-winning movie, has been doing well.

Spokeswoman Debbie Rios-Vanskike said the turtle eats and swims, and added that the two heads — named Louise Left and Thelma Right — get along.

The Facebook page on Sunday showed photos of the quirky reptile and imaginary conversations between the two heads.

The turtle hatched June 18. The animal is on display at the zoo's Friedrich Aquarium.

Judge fines woman who cursed at jury selection

ERIE, Pa. (AP) — A Pennsylvania woman has been fined \$500 for cursing because she was frustrated with being picked to serve on a jury.

The Erie Times-News reported Erie County Judge Ernest DiSantis levied the fine Wednesday on Kathleen Port.

DiSantis told the Erie woman she was "totally out of line" and explained jury service is a duty of citizenship.

Port, whose phone number is unlisted, apologized several times but was fined nonetheless.

She told the judge she was upset because jury service would make her miss work and cost her income.

DiSantis said Port could have claimed a hardship on her jury service questionnaire, but did not.

Port was also thrown off the jury, which was picked to hear an illegal weapons case.

Rescued Florida sea turtle headed for Las Vegas casino 'retirement'

LAS VEGAS (AP) — An ailing 320-pound, green sea turtle, believed to be about 50 years old, was packed in a customized FedEx crate to be shipped to Las Vegas on Thursday to give it a better home at a luxury casino.

The turtle, named OD, after a dive charter boat that rescued it in 2008, has been cared for at the Florida Keys-based Turtle Hospital for almost five years. It cannot be released due to an irreparable collapsed lung that left it floating on its side.

Officials at the Turtle Hospital decided OD needed a better home with a larger and more stimulating environment.

The Shark Reef Aquarium at Mandalay Bay Resort and Casino in Las Vegas offered to give OD a home for his "retirement" at its 1.6-million-gallon aquarium which already houses several sea turtles.

"He's ready now for a forever home ... where he can live out his life," said Turtle Hospital Manager Bette Zirkelbach.

FedEx is providing free air transportation for OD for the 2,400-mile trip to Las Vegas in a specially moisturized and foam-padded crate, accompanied by Zirkelbach and Turtle Hospital founder Richie Moretti.

BOOK OF TRAVELS

Published in 1791, Bartram's Travels is a book of four different parts. Part one outlines preparations for his trip and describes his journey in 1773 from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, to the Georgia colony. Part two recounts to Bartram's travels in British East Florida in the year 1774. Part three describes his investigations in the territories of the Cherokees and Choctaws, or West Florida, Alabama, and the region west to the Mississippi River in 1775. Part four contains Bartram's valuable accounts of Southeastern Indian groups at the time of the American Revolution. Besides the Creeks and Seminoles, Bartram discussed three other Indian groups living between the Savannah and Mississippi rivers: (1) Cherokees occupying in the mountain valleys of the Carolinas, Tennessee and Georgia, (2) Choctaws controlling lands from the Tombighee to Mississippi rivers, and (3) Chickasaws to the north of the Choctaws.

PENSACOLA, 1775

While waiting for a ship to take him west from Mobile, Alabama to the Pearl River in 1775, Bartram decided to embark for the Perdido River "for the purpose of securing the remains of a wreck." Although his subsequent arrival in Pensacola was "merely accidental and undesigned," the naturalist was soon introduced to Governor Peter Chester of West Florida who "commended my pursuits, and invited me to continue in West Florida in researches after subjects of natural history." Chester offered to pay Bartram's expenses and put him up with his own family. Already committed to collect specimens for the British Quaker physician, Dr. John Fothergill, Bartram declined the governor's offer to survey West Florida. Although his visit to Pensacola was brief (less than 24 hours), he gave detailed descriptions of the city in his Travels. During the next century, there was talk of ceding the sparsely settled Florida panhandle to Alabama. In 1875, poet and composer Sidney Lanier similarly praised the beauty of the gulf coastal bays and "fine fish and oysters" in his tourist guide, Florida: Its Scenery, Climate and History.


