# Judge recuses herself after outburst in chambers

About 30 people converged on the Santa Rosa County courthouse sidewalk Monday to protest a decision by Judge Marci Goodman. Judge Goodman had decided to hold Areyt Kapetanis in jail for 30 days for contempt of court. A petition containing more than 300 signatures appears on [www.change.org](http://www.change.org).

A Santa Rosa County resident and owner of the gentleman's club Areyt's Angels in Pensacola, Kapetanis was taken into custody during family court proceedings on July 19, according to a Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office report.

Areyt's daughter, 27-year-old Jeanna Kapetanis, organized the civil protest this week and started the petition to have Goodman removed from the bench, citing allegations of misconduct.

"It's not just for my Mom," Jeanna said. "So many people are suffering at the hands of this judge. (My Mom) is not the only one sitting in jail with similar charges."

Jeanna said she was the second witness serving as a character reference in a custody battle regarding her younger sister. Jeanna said Goodman ruled against her mother in the middle of her testimony in what Jeanna classifies as a "snap decision," awarding custody of her little sister to the child's father (Jeanna's stepfather). Jeanna alleges Goodman did not wait for any other testimony in the custody case.

According to police reports, Areyt became agitated after the ruling, jumping out of her chair, yelling "just take me to jail." The report says it was just one of many outbursts in the judge's chambers, (a 12-by-9-foot room that held nine people during the proceedings).

A deputy attempted to restrain Areyt, who reports say then broke away and lunged toward the judge. The deputy said Areyt cursed at Goodman, calling her "child abusing." The deputy gained control of Areyt by physically pushing her into the wall, the report notes.

Jeanna said she and her sister heard a "thud"

# Suicide near courthouse causes stir

A Milton woman shot herself in her vehicle near the courthouse on Monday, causing a stir that left local business owners wondering if they should shelter in place, according to Milton police.

The original call of a gunshot wound to the chest was dispatched to Lifeguard Ambulance and Milton Fire Department around 3:50 p.m. Upon arrival, Lifeguard personnel notified the 911 dispatchers the person who was shot was dead. A short time later, Milton Police Capt. David Cox confirmed the woman apparently committed suicide in the parking lot of Riverwalk on Willing Street, right

across from the Santa Rosa County Courthouse. He said there was no suicide note in the vehicle. Late Monday afternoon, Cox said it was difficult to tell exactly where she was shot, but all indications were that it was self-inflicted. A handgun was recovered on the seat next to her.

Milton police cleared onlookers in the area of the shooting shortly after the woman was discovered. Her vehicle was covered with a white cloth.

A neighbor of the victim told the Press Gazette that Santa Rosa sheriff's deputies were at the woman's home the night before looking for her. A sheriff's spokesman would not comment on the details of that incident, citing ongoing investigation.

# River ruckus leads to man's felony arrest

A tubing trip turned tumultuous on Coldwater Creek when a group of individuals started fighting, leading to the arrest of the alleged instigator, according to Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office reports.

The river ruckus occurred in late June, but deputies have been searching for the main suspect, a man who fled from authorities by running into the woods, according to reports. He was found last week and arrested on outstanding warrants.

Reports indicate Christopher Logan Kerrigan, 23, of Milton, was tubing with a group of friends who met up with another

group on Coldwater Creek. Kerrigan made advances toward one of the females in the other group, who rebuffed him. Reports say he became upset and angry, making threats and cursing.

Kerrigan hit a female and continued fighting others. He then allegedly picked up a kayak paddle, striking another female in the side. Members of his group attempted to restrain him, but he hit a third female and then tried to bite the ear off a male, according to the report.

Kerrigan ran into the woods when he learned that authorities had been contacted.

One of Kerrigan's friends told deputies Kerrigan kept talking about

# Police: Pace man pursued sex with 13-year-old

A Pace man was arrested by Pensacola police on Friday after they say he arranged to meet a 13-year-old girl for sex, according to a Pensacola Police Department spokesperson.

Eric Crist, 23, 4626 Live Oak Lane, was arrested after Pensaco-

la police found an online advertisement Crist allegedly wrote seeking sex with a female. The ad said age, size and race did not matter.

Detective Jeff Brown contacted Crist through email, according to Pensacola police, and offered for Crist to have sex with his 13-year-old daughter, who did not actually exist. After multiple communications, police said Crist agreed to meet with her for sex. The meeting

was arranged for Friday, at which time police arrested Crist without incident.

Pensacola police said members of the North Florida Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force helped with the investigation.

Crist is in custody at the Escambia County jail under \$50,000 bond, charged with public order crimes and obscene communications.

# New judicial center design to begin

Updated design work on a new judicial center in Santa Rosa County could start soon.

Santa Rosa County Commissioners discussed approving a new \$262,000 agreement with HOK Inc., for the design of a new judicial center at their Monday committee meeting.

HOK's work will feature architectural plans, some structural and engineering designs, traffic studies and a usage plan for the proposed building.

"The citizens of Santa Rosa County don't want what they've termed a Taj Mahal," said Commissioner Bob Cole. "We want a cost-effective, but a good sound, solid structure in a good location that people can agree on as far as convenience of access."

County commissioners will vote

on the agreement at their Thursday meeting. The board has discussed building a new judicial center to replace the 87-year-old courthouse off and on for the past 13 years with HOK.

The new agreement will allow HOK to start the preliminary needs assessments while commissioners move forward with finding a location for a new judicial center.

"I like this approach," Commissioner Lane Lynchard said. "Given the accelerated nature of the timetable we're working with if we want to have this on the ballot next year, the more information we can get upfront and the harder our numbers can be, then the better chance of success that we'll have."

The bulk of HOK's agreement will cover the architectural, structural and mechanical designs, among other projects. It also includes about \$50,000 in allowances for extra work that are not required to complete the project, such as having HOK representatives meet with the public at workshops and completing renderings for the media.

County Administrator Hunter Walker said the commission likely would discuss selecting a location for the judicial center later this month and narrow the search to a specific site at a later time.

Dear P.G.,  
 You are referring to I Timothy 4:8. "For bodily exercise profiteth little: but godliness is profitable unto all things, having promise of the life that now is, and of that which is to come."

The scriptures have much to say about the proper balance in taking care of the body that God has equipped us with and spending too much time on the purely physical - while neglecting the spiritual nature of our being.

And, there really is a balance. It would be sin, for example, to simply ignore the physical care of our body. To purposely let our teeth rot, our health degenerate, our strength diminish and our weight to astronomically rise, unchecked, would be a disgrace to the creation of God which is our body. Not to mention, to totally ignore our health, diminishes our time and ability to properly serve the Lord with our lives now. So, there must be a balance.

The scripture in question speaks to those who put way too much emphasis on the physical care of the body (a temporal thing) while neglecting the spirit-man within them (an eternal thing.) outside of the chambers when her mother was pushed into the wall. (Jeanna was outside the room, having previously been told to leave the chamber area by Sheriff's officials, who said she was becoming disrespectful.)

Jeanna said she later took her sister's hand and left the courthouse to take the child out for ice cream, but her sister had an upset stomach and ended up not going. Later, Jeanna said there was a pending Amber Alert waiting to be issued by Goodman.

"I am by no means an anarchist," Jeanna said. "My father's a cop. I've always been respectful of law enforcement."

Jeanna and her sister returned to the courthouse. She said she inquired about some comments made by Goodman to her little sister. Jeanna alleges Goodman told her younger sister "most of the people were bad people," referring to Arey's business.

"It was made very clear that my mother owns a bar," Jeanna said. "I felt insulted."

Jeanna said she told the judge she didn't see any relevance to the custody suit. She said the judge prodded her little sister with rhetorical questions about the business, asking the younger sister if she knew what her mother does.

"I was appalled," Jeanna said. "I will never have kids or get married in this county."

Arey's lawyer, Christopher Johnson, filed a motion to disqualify the judge, based on the fact that she witnessed the arrest. Goodman recused herself from the custody case, and another Santa Rosa County judge, David Rimmer has been presiding over the case since July 31.

Arey remains in Santa Rosa County jail with no bond. She was arrested on judges' orders and charged with resisting an officer and contempt of court, sheriff's reports say.

# Would they be proud?

One can't imagine the fear in the hearts of the parents of those nine black students who walked past shouting placard-carrying mobs as they entered Little Rock Central High School in 1957. Each day, they were greeted with angry shouts of "Two, four, six, eight, we don't want to integrate." In some rural and urban areas, during the school desegregation era, parents escorted their 5- and 6-year-old children past crowds shouting threats and screaming racial epithets. Often there were Ku Klux Klan marches and cross burnings. Much of this protest was in the South, but Northern cities were by no means exempt from the turmoil and violence of school desegregation.

Most of the parents and civil rights leaders whose sacrifices and courage made today's educational opportunities possible are no longer with us. My question is: If they could know what many of today's black youngsters have done with the fruits of their sacrifice, would they be proud? Most schools identified as "persistently dangerous" are predominantly black schools. To have a modicum of safety, many schools are equipped with walk-through metal detectors, security cameras and conveyor belt X-ray machines that scan book bags and purses. Nationally, the black four-year high-school graduation rate is 52 percent. In some cities, such as Detroit and Philadelphia, it's considerably lower -- 20 percent and 24 percent, respectively. In Rochester, N.Y., it's 9 percent. What black politicians, parents,

teachers and students have created is nothing less than a gross betrayal and squandering of the struggle paid in blood, sweat and tears by previous generations to make possible the educational opportunities that were denied to blacks for so long.

Born in 1936, I've lived during some of our racially discriminatory history. I recall being chased out of Fishtown and Grays Ferry, two predominantly Irish Philadelphia neighborhoods, with my cousin in the 1940s and not stopping until we reached a predominantly black North Philly or South Philly neighborhood. Today that might be different. A black person seeking safety might run from a black neighborhood to a white neighborhood.

On top of that, today whites are likely to be victims of blacks. According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics' 2008 National Crime Victimization Survey, in instances of interracial crimes of violence, 83 percent of the time, a black person was the perpetrator and a white person was the victim. Most interracial assaults are committed by blacks. What's worse is there're blacks still alive -- such as older members of the Congressional Black Caucus, NAACP and National Urban League -- who lived through the times of lynching, Jim Crow and open racism and who remain silent in the face of the current situation.

After the George Zimmerman trial, in cities such as Baltimore, Los Angeles, Milwaukee, Chicago and New York, there have been a

number of brutal revenge attacks on whites in the name of "justice for Trayvon." Over the past few years, there have been many episodes of unprovoked attacks by black gangs against white people at beaches, in shopping malls, on public conveyances and in other public places in cities such as Denver, Chicago, Philadelphia, New York, Washington and Los Angeles. There's no widespread condemnation, plus most of the time, the race of the attackers was not reported, even though media leftists and their allies are experts in reporting racial differences in everything else.

Would those black Americans who fought tooth and nail against Jim Crow, segregation, lynching and racism be proud of the findings of a recent Rasmussen poll in which 31 percent of blacks think that most blacks are racists and 24 percent of blacks think that most whites are racists? Among whites, in the same Rasmussen poll, 38 percent consider most blacks racist, and 10 percent consider most whites racist.

Black people don't need to have a conversation with white people on matters of race. One first step would be to develop a zero tolerance for criminal and disruptive school behavior, as well as a zero tolerance for criminal behavior in neighborhoods. If city authorities cannot or will not provide protection, then law-abiding black people should find a way to provide that protection themselves.

## Traffic to transition on U.S. 90 at Bass Hole Cove

**PACE** — Westbound traffic on U.S. 90 over Bass Hole Cove, west of Pace, will be transitioned to a temporary acrow bridge Tuesday, Aug. 13. On Aug. 15, eastbound traffic will be transitioned to the existing westbound lanes as crews begin removal of the existing eastbound span and roadway to build the new structure.

This work is part of the \$14.7 million bridge construction project to replace bridges over the White River and Bass Hole Cove on U.S. 90 between Pace and the Escambia River Bridge. In addition, crews will resurface the westbound

lanes, make minor drainage improvements, construct guardrail and place new signs and pavement markings.

To minimize congestion and decrease traffic delays, there will be no lane restrictions allowed between 6 a.m. and 8 p.m. The project is expected to be complete winter 2016.

Drivers are reminded to pay attention to the speed limit when traveling through the construction area and to use caution, especially at night, when driving in work zones.

Galata and the Melvin's appear to be old friends and find encouragement in each other's aspiration to help others.

Galata confides he is considering altering his strategy as he walks back to California.



## It's too hot

I've said it before and I'll say it again... I hate summer! Give me jackets and rainy days and cold fronts any time.

Unless you have an in-ground pool or the beach in your back yard, it's just too hot to go outside. This weekend I watched the kids find their own way to cool off. It involved a garden hose and a plastic tote, and several small aquariums I have sitting on the deck.

The aquariums sat untouched on Saturday. But by Sunday afternoon, they were all filled with water and little hands splashing about. Of course, no one climbed into them. They saved that for the tote. It cost me \$12 and they got about a thousand dollars worth of fun out of it, so any concerns about them breaking it were put aside.

I realize I could have run out and purchased a wading pool for them, but the truth is I didn't want to interrupt the flow of the day. Some of the best times I had as a child were with everyday items my brothers and I turned into toys.

I can still remember how it felt to play in an old chicken coop we had on our farm in Indiana. My oldest brother, who is a year younger than me, would look for cans and bottles that were discarded years before we arrived. We took them inside the coop and lined the walls with them, saying they were our food. We spent hours out there pretending.

So when I look out the kitchen window and see my two grandsons sitting in the tote while my daughter "showers" them with the hose, only to find they switched later, she's in the tote and they are fighting over the hose, well, it brings back memories and makes me smile.

I spent most of my childhood playing outside around the animals, climbing the trees, imagining that a tractor was an airplane or a tree was a mountain.

I shucked corn for the chickens until my thumbs were raw; we pulled white balls of flowers from trees that lined our yard and threw them at each other like snowballs. We dug little potatoes out of the garden with our bare fingers and ate tomatoes warm from the sun without washing them. I still remember how they taste when you get a bad one and spit it out on the ground.

I wish my children had grown up like this. Their lives have been about half and half: some video games, some playing outside, but never the full picture.

My children are scattering to the wind. I suppose when you have five, it's bound to happen. One is moving to Missouri in a few months with his soon-to-be wife; one is leaving for New York; one is in Africa; and one is married to a woman from Indiana. It would not surprise me if they ended up living there some day.

That leaves me with my ten-year-old daughter. We talk about moving and traveling. I want her to see Indiana, where my childhood friends still are with their children and grandchildren.

Life is funny. My dad's birthday was Sunday. He would have been 74. He is the reason I grew up where I did and have such a love of the outdoors. And he is the reason we left it all to move to the Florida beaches. His ashes are scattered on his mother's grave in Kokomo; around the base of an evergreen tree at sister's in Indiana; and in the Gulf of Mexico.

Good representation of who he was.

And what I love.

# Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Division of Law Enforcement Weekly Report July 26-Aug. 1, 2013

**SANTA ROSA COUNTY:** Officer Jones responded to a complaint of a boating accident in the vicinity of the Navarre Beach Boat Ramp. He found that two rental personal watercraft (PWCs) had collided resulting in property damage. The vessels were occupied by a total of three adults and there were no injuries.

**OKALOOSA COUNTY:** Officer Maltais responded to a vessel accident involving serious injury when an occupant on board a rental pontoon fell overboard when the vessel hit a large wake in Choctawhatchee Bay. The occupant fell from the bow of the

vessel and was struck by the prop resulting in severe lacerations. The injured subject was air lifted from the Destin United States Coast Guard (USCG) Station and transported to Sacred Heart Hospital in Pensacola. The woman remains hospitalized in serious condition. Investigator Goley responded to the accident and the investigation is ongoing.

Officers White, Maltais and Molnar stopped a vessel near Destin Pass after receiving information that the operator may be intoxicated. Upon stopping the vessel to conduct a vessel safety inspection, the officers observed numerous empty beer cans and the operator struggling to stand

and displaying signs of impairment. Field sobriety exercises confirmed he was impaired. He was placed under arrest and transported to the Destin USCG station where he refused to submit a breath sample to determine his breath alcohol content. The vessel operator was transported to the Okaloosa County Jail and charged with boating while impaired.

Officer Maltais responded to a vessel accident near Crab Island in Destin when a male jumped from a pontoon vessel for a swim. As the man left the vessel, his left ring finger became caught between the gate and the vessel railing causing amputation of the

finger. The man was air-lifted to Sacred Heart hospital. Investigator Goley responded and the accident investigation is ongoing.

**FRANKLIN COUNTY:** Officers Anderson and Allen were patrolling Alligator Point when they observed a net boat working along the shoreline. The officers watched the vessel that had two men on board. As they watched the vessel deploy its nets several times, they could see that the nets were connected and being fished from the vessel. The officers watched as the net boat deployed the nets three or four times and each time the nets were deployed and retrieved as one continuous net. During the

surveillance, Officers Anderson and Allen contacted Officer Gore who responded in a vessel so that an inspection of the net boat could be conducted. There were four nylon nets connected on board. There were also 120 pounds of mullet. The nets and mullet were seized and both individuals were cited for connecting two nets to exceed 500 square feet and fishing more than two nets from a vessel. The fish were sold to the highest bidder. A measurement of the connected nets indicated more than 2,300 square feet of net were being fished from the vessel. Additional charges of fishing over 2,000 square feet will be direct filed.

# 3 Blackwater firefighters deployed to California

Two-dozen members of the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services Florida Forest Service will deploy to battle blazes in Oregon this week. Two additional firefighters will aid firefighting in California. Three of those being deployed to assist firefighters out west are from the Blackwater District, which includes Santa Rosa County. ## Pair arrested for illegal oyster harvesting

Two Franklin County residents were arrested July 21 and booked into the Franklin County jail for oystering in permanently closed waters at Eastpoint. Ottis E. Russell and Sonya Starr Murray, both of Carrabelle, face charges for oystering in prohibited area, harvesting oysters between sunset and sunrise, and possession of unculled oysters. Russell was also charged with resisting arrest without violence and possession of less than 20 grams of cannabis.

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) Resource Protection Service officers John Allen Jr. and Matt Gore watched Russell and Murray collecting oysters after dark near Eastpoint Channel. The two were arrested at midnight when they brought in seven bags of oysters. Under Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services shellfish rules, while some areas of Apalachicola Bay are open to oystering, other areas, such as near Eastpoint Channel, are permanently closed due to water quality issues.

"It's important for the viability of the commercial oystering industry that consumers have faith that the oysters they consume are taken from approved oystering areas and are as safe as possible," said Capt. Rob Beaton, FWC law enforcement supervisor. "What the officers did is stop over 500 pounds of potentially contaminated shellfish from entering the market and possibly making someone sick." Beaton said officers have made more than a dozen similar arrests over the last couple of months for oystering in closed areas.

# Personal 'Obamacare' accounts debut

WASHINGTON (AP) — You can now open your own personal "Obamacare" account — but you'll have to wait awhile before you can actually use it to pick a health insurance plan.

Just eight weeks before the Oct. 1 launch of open enrollment under President Barack Obama's health care overhaul law, administration officials announced Monday the Affordable Care Act is a step closer to reality for millions of uninsured Americans.

Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius said consumers can now go online to [healthcare.gov](http://healthcare.gov) and create personal accounts by establishing a username and password.

However, serious shopping will have to wait until sometime in September, when details on insurance plans and premiums offered in local areas will become available through the new online marketplace.

Though Monday's an-

nouncement might sound like partial progress only, Sebelius quickly moved to put the law's doubters on notice. "Let me be clear," she said. "We are on target and ready to flip the switch on Oct. 1."

The congressional Government Accountability Office and Treasury's inspector general for the Internal Revenue Service have been among the non-partisan oversight organizations warning of possible delays with the rollout of the law.

The new personal account feature unveiled Monday will be available just in English for the time being. HHS said personal accounts will be coming soon to the Spanish-language marketplace, at [cuidadodesalud.gov](http://cuidadodesalud.gov).

"Every step of the way, there has been a delay in the Spanish language information, but they have gotten there," said Jennifer Ng'andu, health policy director for the National

Health and Human Services secretary

Council of La Raza, a Latino civil rights group. Hispanics are seen as a key

constituency for the law's success. Although they are more likely to be un-

insured, they are a young population whose premiums could help subsidize older adults.

But the government's Spanish name for its health care website — [cuidadodesalud.gov](http://cuidadodesalud.gov) — doesn't exactly roll off the tongue. "It kind of sounds like 'caution — health care,'" Ng'andu said.

Adding to the many details and the sheer logistical complexity facing the Obama administration is the refusal of congressional Republicans to provide

additional implementation funds the president has requested. Some GOP lawmakers are advocating a government shutdown to try to block what they deride as "Obamacare" — a term the administration itself has started using.

The new online insurance marketplaces will be geared to people who don't have coverage through their jobs, most of whom will be eligible for tax credits to help pay their premiums. Insurance benefits take effect Jan. 1. That's also when the law will require most Americans to have health insurance or face fines. In return, insurers will be barred from turning away people with medical problems. The administration hopes to sign up at least 7 million uninsured people next year.

On Monday the administration also launched a special call center for small businesses seeking coverage under the law, at 800-706-7893. Small firms will have access to marketplaces designed for them, and some may be eligible for tax credits as well.

Sebelius said she doesn't mind if people call the Affordable Care Act "Obamacare."

"The president himself embraced the term 'Obamacare,'" Sebelius said in a teleconference with reporters. If it helps getting people signed up, she added, "then I'm all for that."
