FHP: DUI driver crashes, flees, crashes

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No one was seriously injured after a Milton man wrecked his car, twice in just a few minutes, ending up in a bunch of trees, according to the Florida Highway Patrol (FHP).

Charles Ryan Nielsen, 24, 6746

Gauren Trace Court, was arrested and charged with DUI and hit and run after the crashes Saturday.

FHP reports say Nielsen rear-ended a vehicle on State Road 89 near Arlington Drive. Nielsen was not wearing a seatbelt in his 2001 Toyota Tacoma when he hit the 1999 GMC Sierra loaded with four people, reports indicate.

There was about \$2,000 worth of dam-

age to his truck and an estimated \$500 worth of damage to the GMC. No one was injured in the collision, which happened around just before 11 p.m.

Reports say Nielsen fled the scene of the accident and continued northbound on State Road 89.

FHP found his vehicle minutes later on State Road 89 near Point Baker. Troopers say he was involved in a sin-

gle vehicle accident, with his truck in a patch of trees. It was determined he had driven onto the shoulder, began accelerating and completely crossed the road.

Nielsen was booked into the Santa Rosa County jail. FHP charged him with two counts of DUI and one count of hit and run, and he was also cited for two counts of careless driving. He refused a breath sample at the jail, reports say.

County enters mediation over \$18 million project

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The county staved off a lawsuit for now after a special magistrate was brought in to mediate a dispute between a soil company and the county, spurred by an ordinance that blocked a proposed construction and debris landfill in East Milton.

Santa Rosa Soils LLC acquired an attorney and is seeking an agreement with the county regarding a dirt pit planned at the same location where C&D facility was planned earlier this year.

The C&D facility was originally permitted in January 2008, but the owners failed to renew the permit. The county commission stepped forward after the permit expired and extended a well field protection area in East Milton to include the original area planned for the facility. The C&D company, Bluewater Holdings, SRC Inc., has filed a complaint with the county regarding their actions.

Special Magistrate James Wilson acted as a mediator between citizens, pertaining to property owners and county ordinances under the Florida Land Use and Environmental Act on Tuesday. Wilson said the two parties were present to discuss the issues, as well as give the public an opportunity to speak. This provided an opportunity to discuss an issue in depth before pursuing a lawsuit.

In February of this year, the Board of County Commissioners denied Bluewater Holdings, SRC Inc. a permit to build after the annual federal permit with the Department of Environmental Protection was not renewed, according to county officials.

They also say Bluewater Holdings, SRC Inc. did not secure an \$871,000 bond that would cover closure and cleanup of the first disposal area.


In March, the county expanded a well field protection area in East Milton, which included the area of the proposed C&D site. Now the owner of Santa Rosa Soils LLC, Jim Young, is seeking compensation for 18 million cubic yards of dirt that was at stake by digging the areas out and selling the dirt, soil and sand. Young estimated the loss at \$18 million. He holds the rights for the subsurface ground, according to county officials.

"I'm here for resolution," Young said during the hearing. "One hundred percent of the value of my rights was taken by the ordinance."

One argument made in the mediation is that Santa Rosa County essentially overreached its legislative authority by expanding a well field protection area in East

CAR FLIPS ON INTERSTATE



SUV flips on I-10, injures 4

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An SUV rolled over on Interstate 10 this week, injuring four and causing \$8,000 worth of damage in a single-vehicle accident, when the vehicle crossed the median, flipped and slid across the interstate on its roof, according to a Florida Highway Patrol report.

Stacey Bass, 38 of Crestview, was heading westbound on I-10 near mile marker 33 near the Highway 87 S. exit.

According to the report, Bass attempted to change lanes, but then realized there was another vehicle in the lane. She over-corrected and veered into the grassy median.

The 2005 GMC Envoy with three passengers overturned in the median and continued to slide across the eastbound lanes on its roof. It eventually came to rest on the shoulder of the interstate.

Shannon Shell, 29, was heading eastbound, en route to Tallahassee. She was

Clear Creek offers organic and sustainable farming tour

Call it a backyard garden on steroids.

Not that Ray and Wanda Davis would ever use anything unnatural or harmful at their Clear Creek Farm in Milton. But they have taken an amped-up approach to what some may think of as a genteel pastime.

"We're doing intensive gardening," Ray Davis said. "We use less water, less seed and less space to grow the same amount of plant material that you would in about an 80 percent larger garden space in a traditional garden."

For five years, they have used a method called "Square Foot Gardening" along with technological advances like solar energy at Clear Creek Farm. This year, they are joining the Beaches to Woodlands Tour offer farm tours from Sept. 28 to Nov 3.

"It's a guided tour," Davis said. "We'll be explaining to folks the various processes and introduce them to the systems. We'll show them, even if they have never gardened at all, how they can use this system to grow food for their family."

"Square Foot Gardening" is a type of container gardening that uses a raised wooden frame. The Davises use products and techniques perfected by Mel Bartholomew, the founder of Square Foot Gardening who popularized the method a 1981 book.

Clear Creek Farm produces about 85 different varieties of vegetables, herbs, mints and edible flowers in about 1.5 acres of space. Their fare has been featured on the menus of

some of the finest restaurants in Pensacola, including Global Grill and Jackson's Steakhouse.

"We basically build a square foot frame — a four-by-four or a two-by-eight or whatever dimension we want to build — and put a grid on top of it," Davis said. "You define the growing area in square-foot increments."

Vegetables, grown in various mulch mixes, can take as much room as a square foot each — like a large cabbage. Others, like carrots, are small enough to fit as many as 16 plants in one square foot.

The Davis family uses no chemical fertilizer or pesticides. Everything they use is organic-approved.

The tour will also showcase the farm's solar power system, which generates all the power the farm and the Davis' home requires, the rain-water collection and drip irrigation system and a geothermal energy system.

"We're using thermal energy from a cold water spring," he said. "The spring runs a constant temperature year-round — about 65 to 68 degrees — to keep root zones in these areas the same temperature

year-round."

The tours should last about an hour each. Admission will be \$10 for adults and \$5 for those younger than 18. Discounts are available for members of the military and large groups.


The couple, both of whom are 70, are semi-retired. Wanda Davis was formerly a professor at Pensacola State College, while Ray Davis was a financial advisor. Growing up in Madison County, Davis had also worked on his grandfather's and uncle's farms.

He said they chose to open Clear Creek Farm to keep themselves busy and to help raise awareness of self-sufficient food production.

"There are not a lot of young farmers coming a long," he said. "We're trying to promote the ideas and concepts that will allow people to grow their own food if they wanted to. This is a method that anybody can adapt and adopt and be successful. You don't need a lot of tools. You don't need a lot of space or money."

"For the first time, people can see how pesticide-free and fertilizer-free food really taste."

Santa Rosa did not receive a letter

Florida Gov. Rick Scott wrote 16 Florida counties, thanking them for reaching agreement on a \$2,500, across-the-board raise for Florida teachers.

Santa Rosa County did not receive one of those letters.

The School Board and the county's teacher union, the Santa Rosa Professional Educators, are still in negotiations over the allocation of \$9.436 million in state funds. After withholding for benefits and retirement, the teachers won't be seeing a full \$2,500 bonus.

In other systems, the counties made all or a portion of the benefit and retirement payments

so the teachers saw all, or at least a lion's share, of the \$2,500.

Santa Rosa teachers will get a raise, if they can hammer out a dollar figure with the board. To that end, the SRPE is asking the School Board to take another look at the budget, and move dollars around to make more of the \$2,500 raise available.

Will revisiting the budget, and taking funds already earmarked for other items affecting Santa Rosa? Or is the money actually available? Both are rather good questions — both of which deserve an answer.

The School Board has previously offered the SRPE

all the state funds, giving it the opportunity to allocate the funds as it saw fit, but the union is not sure.

Blue collar workers have reached an agreement, contingent on the SRPE reaching a deal. In the meantime, the back and forth continues. Will an agreement be reached in time for Christmas?

Facing an election year, Gov. Scott receives credit for good public relations in giving teachers across the state a raise. But, he gave all the responsibility to the local authorities to shake out the details, failing to mention

the hidden costs that plague governmental budgets such as retirement.

When we look at the back and forth going on over this, it's easy to see why state leaders sought to pass the political hot potato.

Florida schools may have much more to worry about. Santa Rosa, for example, has already notified the state, as required by statute that its monetary buffer has fallen below the three percent target. Next fiscal year, that number will be 2.17 percent.

Statewide, the governor may need to do some math.

Governor Scott sends letter to Florida superintendents regarding teacher pay raises

Tallahassee — On Tuesday, Oct. 15, Gov. Rick Scott sent out a letter to all Florida superintendents thanking the 16 superintendents and school boards who have worked together to negotiate with unions and ratify collective bargaining agreements for teachers

that resulted in pay raises.

He also spoke with Department of Education Commissioner Pam Stewart this week to ask her to work with the 51 county school districts, who have not reached final agreements, to encourage them to find a

quick resolution to the final teacher pay raise amount in these districts.

Gov. Scott said, "For those districts that have not yet finalized collective bargaining agreements on teacher pay raises, I have asked the Commissioner of Education to provide

any support and guidance superintendents need to come to a final agreement quickly. Florida teachers deserve a salary increase, and they should have the benefit of knowing their new salary level as soon as possible so they can best plan for their futures."

SRSO: Armed burglar starts fire, waits for cops

A Milton man was arrested by authorities this week after he allegedly set fire to a kitchen by burning pizza boxes on an oven top, while he ransacked the home, according to a police report.

The owner of a Gulf Breeze home returned to find his house unlocked and full of smoke. He noticed differences in the way he left the residence, so he armed himself with a baseball bat from his bedroom. In the bedroom, he encoun-

tered 26-year-old Christopher Manning rummaging through personal items.

The victim told authorities Manning said they went to high school together, but the victim did not recognize Manning at all. The homeowner said he felt threatened, left the residence and went to a neighbor's house to call police.

Authorities arrived and found the homeowner standing in the front yard with the baseball bat. He warned the officer of the man who was still inside the house.

The officer advised the homeowner to stay outside as he entered the home with his duty weapon drawn. The officer saw Manning, who was wearing only a pair of white shorts. Manning was ordered to put his hands up and get on the ground, in which he complied.

Manning was asked if he had any weapons, and he reached towards his back pocket while he was lying on his stomach. The officer advised him to not reach for anything. Manning was held

there in that position until backup arrived.

Backup arrived and placed Manning into custody. A utility knife was found during a search of his possessions. The 26-year-old had a cast on his right arm, so the handcuffs were placed around the index finger and thumb.

The burglar told authorities that he was invited over for a pool party. Authorities noted in the report that there was no pool on the property. The officers noticed a strong odor of alcohol on his breath.

Officers noticed there was a fire extinguisher on an island counter-

top in the kitchen and it appeared that someone stopped the fire. The home suffered an estimated \$1,200 worth of damage to the stove, a suspended, over-the-stovetop microwave.

Manning was taken to the Gulf Breeze Police Department for processing and paperwork and then transported to the Santa Rosa County jail where he was booked on three charges. He is charged with arson, criminal mischief and burglary. His bond is listed at \$105,000. He provided his address in the 5800 block of Quietwood Drive in Milton.

Couple arrested, charged with trafficking meth

A Milton couple was arrested last week for numerous drug charges, including trafficking methamphetamine, possession of drugs and paraphernalia, according to a Santa Rosa Sheriff's Office report.

Bert and Christen Gilmore were arrested after a narcotics unit attempted to make contact at their residence in the 6800 block of Dixon Street in Milton. A note was on the front door, saying to use the side door.

While the narcotics unit went around to the side door, they observed the remnants of a meth lab near

the back of the residence. Bert walked up the street,

finding the narcotics unit at the house. He told authorities that he and his wife lived there. Bert was taken into custody. Authorities searched the man and found a small bag containing suspected methamphetamine. It was tested in the field, which yielded a positive result.

A search of the purchase history showed the hus-

band and wife attempted to purchase 32 pseudoephedrine boxes in 2013. Pseudoephedrine is a controlled substance and a main ingredient in the manufacture of methamphetamine.

Bert was booked into the Santa Rosa County jail and given a \$71,000 bond. He is charged with two counts of drug possession,

two counts of drug equipment possession, marijuana possession, and trafficking methamphetamine.

Christen was arrested two days later and given a \$47,000 bond. She was charged with marijuana possession, drug possession, two counts of drug equipment possession and trafficking methamphetamine.

Milton, stating the county was lacking scientific evidence of any negative impact on the water table. The other complaint is referred to as "inverse condemnation," or the taking of property rights.

"I had certain financial expectations that I should have been able to retain," Young said. "Now, I'm seeking whatever relief is available to me as part two of the Bert J. Harris act."

The Bert J. Harris act is Florida statute 70.001, pertaining to private property right protection. The law recognizes that "some laws, regulations, and ordinances of the state and political entities

in the state, as applied, may inordinately burden, restrict or limit private property rights without amounting to taking under the State Constitution or the United States Constitution."

Jones countered, stating the expansion of the East Milton well field has been researched and going through a draft process for a number of years. The ordinance in question was established to protect citizens. The county did research and weighed the affect the well field expansion would have on a number of factors, one being economic impact.

"The science we looked at and

reviewed during the hearing was the same science that was before the county commissioners before enacting the ordinance," Jones said. "That underscores the validity of the action the board took."

Concerns were raised by the public in a prior forum about drinking water issues with a C&D facility.

After an all-day meeting, the two sides reached a resolution via a development order. If approved by the Board of County Commissioners, Young would be able to excavate at the site. The two legal teams will be meeting to stamp out the specifics of the potential

deal that would relieve the county of pending litigation.

Santa Rosa Soils LLC was originally permitted to dig the holes out to a maximum depth of 70-feet-deep. If the water table is found to be higher, they are required by law to keep a certain number of feet above the water table. The maximum depth is up for revision.

But ultimately, the decision to allow or deny excavation of the property by the soil company is made by the Board of County Commissioners.

There was no timeframe set in stone on the deal during the meeting, but it was suggested that they

strive for the sole county commission meeting in November. The two parties, however, did agree that they would reconvene Nov. 25 at 9 a.m. if they reach an impasse, according to Jones.

The proposed C&D facility would have been located on a roughly 160 acre plot of land, which is currently landlocked, off of U.S. 90 and Jeff Ates Road in East Milton. The pit itself would consist of three "cells," according to Young's attorney, that would be constructed over time. Essentially one pit would be dug and filled over time, until the next pit is needed, then it would be dug out and lined.

driving a gold Chevy truck and witnessed the roll over some 300-400 feet in front of her.

"I hit the brakes hard and the whole front of my truck dipped down," Shell said. "It looked like it rolled over at least twice, maybe three times, but no more."

Shell pulled over after witnessing the crash and called 911. She said two of the passengers got out of the vehicle on their own power. Other bystanders stopped to assist the two others out of the SUV.

Two of the passengers, Haley Bass and Natasha Davis, were transported to Santa Rosa Hospital with serious injury. The driver and remaining passenger were treated on scene for minor injuries. All four were wearing their seatbelts and alcohol was not a factor in the crash.

The driver was charged with careless driving as a result of the incident, according to FHP.

Her boyfriend, 28-year-old Alex Bryant, was at the kitchen sink, allegedly making methamphetamine. There was an open window above the sink, with a fan blowing air out of the building in the 4500 block of Belleville Court, directly off of Hickory Hammock Road.

The report states there was a heavy chemical smell in the building. Bryant was told authorities were going to be called, so he left and exited the trailer. She asked him where the methamphetamine lab was, and he responded, "it's in the green car that just left."

Bryant then bolted, running south toward Hickory Hammock Road.

Authorities arrived at the residence, discovering methamphetamine-manufacturing materials. The strong odor was determined to be paper towels that had been soaked in camping fuel, which were discovered in a trash can.

A check of Bryant's background revealed that he had numerous purchases of pseudoephedrine at multiple pharmacies during a four-month period of time.

A warrant was issued for his arrest Oct. 8. Bryant was arrested and booked into the Santa Rosa County this week for possession of a listed chemical with the intent to manufacture a controlled substance. He was given a \$10,500 bond.

ALZHEIMER'S CAREGIVERS CAN FIND THEIR OWN PEACE

DEAR DOCTOR K: I do my best to care for my mother, who has Alzheimer's disease. But I often feel guilty and frustrated. Can you help me change my outlook -- for my sake and my mother's?

DEAR READER: Fortunately, I never had to face the challenge that you face, as my parents both died while in full possession of their faculties. But many of my patients and friends are experiencing what you are going through. And like you, they often feel guilty and judge themselves harshly.

The sad truth is that today there is little anyone can do to fully prevent the slow decline of someone afflicted with Alzheimer's. As I look at the status of research on the disease, I'm an optimist. I think some powerful ways to prevent and treat the disease may well be discovered in the next 20 to 30 years.

As a caregiver, there is only so much you can do. And even when you're doing everything right, a person who is not in her right mind may not appreciate what you're doing. When that person is someone you love, that's really hard to deal with.

In her helpful new book, "Mindfulness Support for Alzheimer's Caregivers," my Harvard Medical School colleague Dr. Gail Gazelle helps guide caregivers back to physical and emotional health so that they can continue to care for their loved ones while preserving their own well-being. You can learn more about the book, and also order it, on my website: AskDoctorK.com.

Dr. Gazelle offers lots of practical advice, tips and exercises to help you reframe your thoughts. Your circumstances might not change, but your ability to control the way you experience your circumstances can. Here are a few examples:

-- Guilt. When your loved one has Alzheimer's, the guilt can seem endless. You feel guilty that you don't visit often enough, or that you don't do enough. You feel guilty about things that you did or didn't do before the disease took over. When you experience guilt, ask yourself: In what ways can I replace my guilt with awareness of the good things that I'm doing for my loved one?

-- The present moment. Experience what's happening right now, without labeling or judging it. Don't dwell on the past or worry about the future. Enjoy the view from wherever you stand. It decreases worry and stress.

-- Moments of joy. During the most trying times, we sometimes find moments of joy. With Alzheimer's, such moments may be small but significant: a smile of understanding. Your mother's cooperation while getting dressed. A caress that takes you back to earlier years. Hang on to these moments by keeping a journal describing the times when you feel a strong sense of joy. Describe what made the moment so joyful.

Be a source of reassurance and what you think may be happy memories. Touch your mother the way you always have. Sing a song she loved, and try to get her to join you. When you remind her of what she loved, you can bring both of you a measure of peace.



I had two small boys and I was preoccupied with my own life, but I made time for her when I could.

Now that I'm much older, I would have no problem sitting with her to learn what she wanted to share. And I did spend time with her. She told me a lot about our family and the history and where I got my blue eyes.

So during my own time alone recently, I imagined I was an old person, at the end of my life and wanting to share things with the younger people in our family. I have to admit I wonder if I will become a burden and will the young grandsons who adore me now, have time for me in twenty years?

Of course I have no idea what will happen by the time twenty more years pass.

But I do know what I want for my friend.

I pray for her to have peace. Where ever she is.

Leveling the LEED playing field

Working forests work for our communities and economy. Most people intuitively recognize that woodlands fill a vast array of needs, from jobs and products to wildlife habitats and water recharge areas. They do not, however, understand the importance of active, competitive markets in keeping lands forested and operational.

competitive. It reduces the demand for Florida wood, while benefitting those growing and producing timber elsewhere. The decreased demand for Florida wood negatively affects prices and profits, making it more difficult for Florida landowners to maintain their forests.

Perhaps the most flagrant example of this principle being overlooked is the criteria that the U.S. Green Building Council has developed for its Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design standards. LEED only awards points for wood that has been certified by the Forest Stewardship Council. The problem in Florida is that merely 120 acres of the 16.1 million acres of forestland in the state are certified under FSC. In contrast, almost 3 million acres are certified by the American Tree Farm System and the Sustainable Forestry Initiative collectively.

At the same time, LEED drives up prices for consumers by requiring "green" building projects to use FSC-certified wood. Most FSC-certified wood comes from other states or foreign countries and is more expensive.

LEED also adversely affects green spaces and the environment. When forest owners find themselves forced to develop their land into more profitable uses, wildlife loses habitat; the air loses its natural filters; our water supply loses areas for recharge and storage; and people lose opportunities for recreation and natural scenic beauty. In short, the standards represent a lose-lose situation for everyone except FSC.

Economically, LEED's criteria create a bad deal for Florida's woodland owners, producers and its consumers. By monopolizing the market through its exclusionary policies, LEED narrows opportunities for Florida woodland owners and producers, making it harder for them to remain

This year, Gov. Rick Scott and the Florida legislature took an enormous step toward leveling the playing field and increasing competition in the marketplace by giving public agencies more flexibility to use wood certified by other programs for building projects. This means all wood is treated equally when our

tax dollars are used to build public facilities like parks, community centers, and schools. When it comes to public projects, Florida woodland owners and producers are now given a fair chance to compete.

Our fight is not over, however. Many private projects also seek the LEED stamp of approval. Inequality still exists in this sector, causing contractors to look to other states or foreign countries for FSC-certified wood to complete structures with the LEED designation. Working forests work. Like other businesses and industries, they thrive in a free-market system. The Florida Forestry Association, its members and staff will continue to advocate for equality in this vital arena. I hope that others who appreciate and enjoy our state's forests will join us.

Lynetta Usher Griner was elected as president of FFA in 2012. She and her husband, Ken, began working in her family's timber business after her brother's death in 1989. Under their leadership, Usher Land & Timber Inc. has been honored as the Logger of the Year on the state and national level and has also received Audubon's Sustainable Forestry Award. This year, they were recognized for their exceptional natural resource stewardship with a County Alliance for Responsible Environmental Stewardship award.

Debt ceiling the only mechanism to control spending

That way members of the Obama administration can get in a holiday mood and draw names for their "Secret Santa" gift exchanges. There is a \$20 spending limit on gifts, but they are likely to go \$7 trillion over budget.



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10th annual festival offers sawmill demos

The Florida Division of Forestry provided sawmill operation demonstrations during the 10th Annual Munson Heritage Festival held on the grounds of the Krul Recreation Area in Munson.

The sawmill which was purchased in 1989 by Mr. Norman Riley, who resides in the Blackwater River State Forest, used it for his own personal operations until he donated it in 2009 to the Florida Forest Service to be used at the Heritage Festival and other events.

It was Riley's desire that the area's rich heritage of logging and lumber production could

be observed and preserved for generations.

The sawmill was originally purchased and put into operation in the mid 1950s in Baldwin County Alabama, by Mr. Ray Giles. Giles and his sons cut timber and produced lumber with the mill for over 35 years. The original mill was purchased with all wood parts, but Giles and his sons replaced those parts with metal improvements. Two major hurricanes made landfall in their area during that time period and left massive timber damage that the Giles cut into lumber.

The saw mill which is now called the Riley Sawmill, is powered by a General Motors diesel truck motor. The left handed cut has a circular 48 inch blade with 52 carbide teeth. The

blade turns at 600 rpms and can cut logs with the dimensions up to ten feet long and up to a 22 inch diameter.

During the Annual Munson Heritage Festival the saw mill as well as a grist mill, cane press and more demonstrations are available for viewing and recollecting the heritage of our area.

Over 90 vendors were on the grounds to provide a fun weekend of arts, crafts, music, food, art, and heritage of the Munson Community. Festival Secretary Justin Rowell stated, "The festival was great with approximately 5000 visitors through the park. We want to thank everyone who came out."

The festival is held annually during the second weekend of October.
