# 911 note rescues mother, child

A woman who told a gas station clerk in Pace to call 911 was rescued by sheriff's deputies on Interstate 10 in Okaloosa County, according to sheriff's reports.

Michael Anthony Devita was arrested on the side of the interstate

after deputies stopped the car he was driving. A Be On the Lookout (BOLO) for the car was issued by sheriff's deputies in Santa Rosa County after the 31-year-old female victim left a note with a clerk at Murphy's Oil, 4988 Highway 90, Pace, reports say.

The note told the clerk to "call 911" and gave details about the car, where the driver was headed,

and the woman who left the note. Deputies originally responded to Murphy's Oil and gave the description of a green Honda. A few minutes later, a Phase 2 911 call from a cellphone came in from the area of the Moors on Avalon Blvd. — meaning the location of the cellphone via GPS comes into the dispatch center.

Deputies responded to the area

where the call came in and dispatchers advised the phone was traveling eastbound on Highway 10.

The BOLO was re-issued as deputies attempted to catch up with the car. Around the Okaloosa County line, the car was found and stopped.

Inside, deputies found a "distraught, crying" woman and child.

The woman said she was the one who left the note and told deputies she only got back in the car because her child was in the vehicle. She told deputies Devita had been using meth for several days and began hitting her in Pace when they were driving around. She stated he continued to reach around from the front seat and strike her after leaving the gas station.

## Milton man in critical condition after stabbing

A Milton man has been arrested and charged after stabbing another man several times in the back, according to Santa Rosa Sheriff's reports.

Kristopher T. Keefer, 36, Stardust Trail, Milton, is accused of stabbing the victim, a male who authorities have not identified, in the back following an altercation. Witnesses say the pair had been arguing all day.

Sheriff's officials say deputies were dispatched to the area of Stardust Trail Saturday night. The fight was over when they arrived. Lifeguard Ambulance arrived on scene and paramedics began to tend to the wounds of the adult male victim, who was transported to an area hospital.

Deputies say they gathered statements from witnesses and determined Keefer stabbed the victim several times in the back. Witnesses said the violence followed an attempt to "talk it out" in the street. It was at that point a fight began. Keefer, who was armed with a knife, stabbed the victim.

Keefer was taken to an area hospital where he was checked for injuries. He was released into the custody of waiting deputies and was arrested. Keefer was taken to the Santa Rosa County jail and as placed on a \$25,000 bond. Keefer was charged with aggravated battery with a deadly weapon. Sheriff's officials say the victim is in serious condition at the hospital.

## Fourth candle extinguished on fire safety tree

The fourth candle was extinguished on the "Keep Your Holidays Bright" fire safety tree after a residential fire in the 3100 block of Cayuga Trail. Santa Rosa County Emergency Communications received a call at midnight on Dec. 12 reporting smoke in the home. Crews from Avalon and Pace fire departments arrived on scene at 12:11 a.m. No injuries were reported and the damage is estimated at approximately \$35,000. The fire is thought to have been caused by lights on a dry Christmas tree.

# Shortlist of properties reduced to 4 East Milton still not on list

The decision of shortening the list of six possible judicial center sites at the Santa Rosa County Board of County Commissioner's meeting Thursday was narrowed to four: JDL of Santa Rosa, with three votes, and a tie of three: BTF Florida, Coldwell Banker Commercial Properties, and Neal Inc. all with two votes. The votes were submitted with a paper ballot. Commissioners Williamson and Lynchard both abstained because of personal interest, being they own property on Avalon Blvd. located relatively close to the properties considered.

Commissioner Jim Melvin was adamant the property on Highway 90, Coldwell Banker, would be a bad decision with highway thoroughfare being "at capacity or over capacity." He says the county would "rue the day" they decided to place the future courthouse on the popular highway. He argues it would be far better to turn traffic on Avalon since it is brand new and constructed to accommodate such a load of traffic.

But Commissioner Salter says he would like to have the Highway 90 property still in the mix and within the process of evaluation, traffic studies would show whether or not it would be beneficial.

Commissioner Bob Cole says he's not made a decision on which property on the short list is the better of the four, but "it depends on how "sweet of a deal" we get when we break ground." Cole said. "If we don't watch our pennies, the citizens won't trust us and we'll never get the sales tax passed."

He said he's still not giving up on the East Milton property offered to the county free of charge by William Byrom. Cole emphasized with no support from the board and just a few citizens saying they're for it, there's not much else to be done. He continues to say "if we had more citizens come forward, like several hundred people were to show their support, registering their opinion it could change the outcome." However, Cole says support so far is sporadic. "But let's move forward," he said.

Byrom sent a letter to the commissioners on Dec. 4, stating while knowing the properties being considered were on Highway 90 and Avalon Boulevard, he was offering 15 acres about one and a half miles from the Santa Rosa County jail.

The projection of cost to build the judicial center is between \$30-40 million. An estimation of completion of the courthouse project from the commissioners is between 2-5 years, respectively.



## The pope and capitalism

Pope Francis, in his apostolic exhortation, levied charges against free market capitalism, denying that “economic growth, encouraged by a free market, will inevitably succeed in bringing about greater justice and inclusiveness in the world” and concluding that “this opinion ... has never been confirmed by the facts.” He went on to label unfettered capitalism as “a new tyranny.” Let’s look at the pope’s tragic vision.

First, I acknowledge that capitalism fails miserably when compared with heaven or a utopia. Any earthly system is going to come up short in such a comparison. However, mankind must make choices among alternative economic systems that actually exist on earth. For the common man, capitalism is superior to any system yet devised to deal with his everyday needs and desires.

Capitalism is relatively new in human history. Before capitalism, the way people amassed great wealth was by looting, plundering and enslaving their fellow man. With the rise of capitalism, it became possible to amass great wealth by serving and pleasing your fellow man. Capitalists seek to discover what people want and produce and market it as efficiently as possible as a means to profit. A couple of examples would be J.D. Rockefeller, whose successful marketing drove kerosene prices down from 58 cents a gallon in 1865 to 7 cents in 1900. Henry Ford became rich by producing cars for the common man. Both Ford’s and Rockefeller’s personal benefits pale in comparison with that received by the common man

by having cheaper kerosene and cheaper transportation. There are literally thousands of examples of how mankind’s life has been made better by those in the pursuit of profits. Here’s my question to you: Are people who, by their actions, created unprecedented convenience, longer life expectancy and a more pleasant life for the ordinary person — and became wealthy in the process — deserving of all the scorn and ridicule heaped upon them by intellectuals, politicians and now the pope?

Let’s examine the role of profits but first put it in perspective in terms of magnitude. Between 1960 and 2012, after-tax corporate profit averaged a bit over 6 percent of the gross domestic product, while wages averaged 47 percent of the GDP. Far more important than simple statistics about the magnitude of profits is its role in guiding resources to their highest-valued uses and satisfying people.

Arthur C. Brooks, president at the American Enterprise Institute and author of “Who Really Cares,” shows that Americans are the most generous people on the face of the earth. In fact, if you look for generosity around the world, you find virtually all of it in countries that are closer to the free market end of the economic spectrum than they are to the socialist or communist end. Seeing as Pope Francis sees charity as a key part of godliness, he ought to stop demonizing capitalism.

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## Ask the Preacher

Dear Pastor Gallups, "If Christians proclaim that NOBODY can be 'saved' without Jesus, then how did people get saved back in the Old Testament days or the days before Jesus even came?" H.H. - Pensacola

Dear H.H.

H.H., The way a person has ALWAYS been given access to salvation from the Lord has ALWAYS been the same. People have ALWAYS been saved by FAITH and God's GRACE.

Now, granted, before Jesus came, we did not have the complete picture or understanding of God's grace nor did we have the complete understanding of the OBJECT of our faith. The whole of the Old Testament pointed, in one way or another, to Jesus Christ and the ultimate and complete fulfillment of God's salvation plan. Jesus Himself said on several occasions that He was the complete fulfillment of the Old Testament.

The words Old and New as they apply to the "Testaments" of the Bible have confused some folks. They do NOT mean that God had two different plans of salvation, one old and the other "new". Rather, both Testaments apply to the same unfolding salvation plan of the Lord who is the same yesterday, today and forever.

The words, OLD and NEW more accurately can be presented as "chapters" or "stages" of a relationship or a covenant agreement. Under the Old Testament, in order to be saved, one had to believe in the Lord God. They had to believe Him enough that they would desire to make Him LORD of their life. That Lordship involved the keeping of His commands. One was not saved by the law; rather one kept the law BECAUSE he was saved. God revealed Himself through His prophets, His Word and through His miraculous interventions in life. A person who responded in this way of faith was "saved" by God's grace. Under the New Testament, the very same requirements of belief are present. Only now, we know the Person of God and the Name of God in Jesus! We also have observed, first hand, His grace and sacrifice for our sin in the atoning death of Jesus on the cross and His shed blood.

I hope this has helped you, H.H. and please remember, "Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name, under heaven, given to men by which we must be saved." Acts 4:12

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# City planning passive park



The plans for Gill Bass park along the corridor of Canal and Pine Streets are coming along. Twelve trees are sighted for removal for forward implementation and has caused some questions lately so being after the chopping of palm trees in the medians of Highway 90. However, according to Milton City Manager Brian Watkins, the plan for tree removal on the park property, bequeathed to the City of Milton from the Gill and Bass family in 2010, was specifically specified to be a "passive park." Watkins says the city has a plan to implement the family's desire.

Milton landscape head Lee Willingham says the trees set for removal are either leaning, damaged, scarred or diseased. Each tree was carefully considered amongst the six oaks which were recently planted. Some trees will be removed simply because they interfere with the plan, he says and it can't be helped. He continues, "if we put in a sidewalk and a tree is too close the roots, it could damage the walkway. We have to do it right the first time."

Willingham continues to say the city has created a database to inventory all trees on the city's properties and right-of-ways. "It includes a listing of heritage and protected trees, as well as condition, care and maintenance of current trees," he says. In addition, the database contains potential areas for additional plantings.

Watkins says the park is projected to cost around \$200,000. He hopes the project will, with time, be completed sometime soon but has no idea when it will be. He says the city is looking at every potential

avenue for funding and has to start somewhere. "The Gill Bass park is one of the gateways into the city," says Watkins.

Milton City Planner Randy Jorgenson says because of the location of the park, it is important

to make it a special place. He says it's style will resemble the other improvements throughout the city.

Watkins says the city has planted over 400 trees this year and has it's application submitted to be a Tree City USA for the eighteenth year.

# FWC REPORT

**Dec. 6-12**

This report represents some events the FWC handled over the past week; however it does not include all actions taken by the Division of Law Enforcement.



## NORTHWEST REGION

### OKALOOSA COUNTY

Officers Bartlett and Maltais were on land patrol conducting fisheries inspections. The officers observed a subject fishing from the Shalimar Bridge. Officer Bartlett conducted a fisheries inspection of this subject and located nine mangrove snapper, five of which were undersized. Officer Bartlett issued the subject citations for the violations.

### WALTON COUNTY

Lieutenant Hollinhead and Officer Arnette met with Officer Yates after he had received information of an antlerless deer being killed near Glendale. The officers made contact with a subject at a residence and confirmed a doe deer had been killed and the property where the deer was taken had been issued antlerless deer tags. It was later determined the subject was in possession of antlerless deer tags, but they

were at his residence when the deer was taken and a tag was never placed on the deer in the field or when he returned to his residence. The subject was cited for taking/possession of an untagged antlerless deer. A juvenile was issued a warning for the same violation and for not having a hunting license.

### BAY COUNTY

Officer Hellett received a complaint of a subject keeping undersized mangrove snapper on the jetties at St. Andrews State Park. He arrived at the jetties and found a subject who fit the description. He conducted an inspection of the angler's catch and determined he was in possession of and had harvested three undersized gray (mangrove) snapper. The subject was issued a notice to

appear for the violation.

### GADSDEN COUNTY

Officer Johnson and Lieutenant Parker worked a trespass complaint in the Quincy area. After locating the individual at his home, the officers issued a citation to the subject for taking over the limit of squirrels and no hunting license. While at the subject's home, the officers also found a carcass of a doe deer. Further investigation revealed it was a road kill that had been skinned and then illegally sold. The officers located the man who sold the deer. He was issued a citation for illegal sale of deer.

## NORTH CENTRAL REGION

### DUVAL COUNTY

Officer Holleman was fishing while off duty when he observed five individuals fishing from the shore with cast nets in a remote area. Officer Holleman had observed the individuals catching several small fish. He contacted Officer Hayes and Lieutenant Thompson and told them of the individuals and advised that it might be a good idea to conduct an inspection on them. As Officer Hayes and Lieutenant Thompson approached the area by vessel,

two of the individuals fled on foot. With Officer Holleman's assistance, Officer Hayes and Lieutenant Thompson were able to locate the other three individuals who had hidden their cast nets in the woods nearby. Officer Hayes stayed with two of the individuals while Lieutenant Thompson went with one of the individuals back to their vehicle in an attempt to locate the two who had fled. While walking back to the vehicle, Lieutenant Thompson was able to locate the two individuals as they attempted to hide in the wood line along the CSX railroad tracks and took them into custody. Both individuals were charged with trespassing on CSX railroad property and one of the individuals was charged with interfering with FWC Officers' inspection.

The National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) issued a \$2,000 Notice of Violation Assessment (NOVA) to a boat crew that Investigator Izsak and Officer Bryan stopped 25 miles offshore last September. The recreation fishing crew of 7 had numerous fishing violations consisting of possession of 28 black sea bass during a federal closure (10 of which were undersized) and 18

undersized dolphins.

### HAMILTON COUNTY

Officers Nichols and Hoyle were checking a known hunting location (from last hunting season) within the Suwannee River State Park when they noticed it was actively being hunted. At the access point on the Suwannee River, the officers noticed a blood-stained spot on the white sand along the river bank. Officer Nichols located a carcass of a cleaned button buck left behind. A few weeks later, both Officers returned via boat to this location. As the Officers' boat was idling up to the spot, they noticed a suspect's boat pull up to the bank. The Officers observed dried blood and deer hair in the vessel along with an empty rifle case. A hunter was observed walking and cautiously looking around. The Officers made contact with the hunter and advised him that he was hunting on Suwannee River State Park property. The Officers issued the hunter a notice to appear for hunting in a state park. A second hunter, who was not present at that time, will have charges filed against him with the State Attorney's Office for taking an antlerless deer during closed season and hunting in a state park.

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## BBB: Use caution when buying BCS game tickets

For many football fans in Northwest Florida, a ticket to the VIZIO BCS National Championship is a popular item on wish lists this holiday season. Between now and the National Championship game on Jan. 6, thousands of tickets will be listed on classifieds websites, offering buyers little protection from dishonest sellers. The Better Business Bureau serving Northwest Florida is warning consumers to be on the lookout for phony game tickets.

"The reason tickets are expensive is because they're hard to get, and the chances of you getting lucky and finding a deal are slim. If an offer sounds much better than it should, such as someone selling tickets for much less than offered elsewhere, it's probably not on the level," said Norman Wright, president and CEO of the BBB serving Northwest Florida.

To help ensure you don't get ripped off buying event tickets, BBB recommends the following:

- Be careful buying tickets from someone on the street. When you get to the gate and find out your tickets

aren't real, the seller will be long gone.

- Before buying from an online ticket broker, check out the broker's BBB Business Review at bbb.org. Make sure the website has a secure payment processing system, usually denoted by "https://" at the start of its website address or URL or a small closed lock icon at the bottom of the screen.


- If you buy tickets through an online auction site, choose a seller with a long history of satisfied customers. Scammers can hijack old accounts, so make sure the seller has recently sold other tickets.

- Ticket buyers also should be wary of sellers who try to lure buyers from a legitimate site to another site for a "private" transaction. Scammers often want to conduct their business on sites with names that mimic well-known companies but actually are fakes.

- If you are buying tickets through an online classified ad site, never pay the seller by wire transfer. You will have no way to get your money back if the tickets do not arrive or are counterfeit.

"My dad has been a great influence in my life," Nicholson said. "He wrestled in high school and shared that interest with me as well as his love for fire and rescue work."



# Strong slate of challengers takes on iPad

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Once upon a time, people who craved a tablet computer bought an iPad.

But Apple faces its strongest slate of challengers this holiday season, with several tablets besting the trend-setting iPad on price and features.

There are still plenty of reasons to get an iPad — either the full-size iPad Air starting at \$499 or the iPad Mini at \$399. Versions of both are available for \$100 less, but you get a slower device with a lower-resolution screen. The Air is lighter and thinner than previous full-size models, and it feels nice in your hands.

Whichever one you get for your loved one, the iPad offers this:

- An unmatched selection of high-quality apps, many of them adapted for the tablet's larger screen. Many apps for Android tablets are simply phone apps blown up, while the Windows app store has a smaller selection.

- A screen with a 4:3 aspect ratio. That's the standard size for photos and older television shows, and it displays more content when Web surfing with the tablet held horizontally. That said, the wider aspect ratio found on Android and Windows tablets are better for widescreen video.

- Great syncing with other Apple devices, if the recipient of your gift has any. When setting up an Apple TV streaming device, for instance, you can simply place your iPad near it and bypass screens of prompts. Directions on the Mac's new Maps app can be sent to the iPad with two clicks. You can read and reply to iPhone texts from the iPad or a Mac.

But for a top-notch experience, you'll pay a top-notch price. That's where Android tablets come in.

You can get Amazon.com Inc.'s Kindle Fire HDX 8.9 for \$120 less than the iPad Air, at \$379. It's even lighter, by about 17 percent, though I couldn't feel much of a difference holding the two side by side. The Kindle's screen has a higher resolution, but the display measures just 8.9 inches diagonally compared with the Air's 9.7 inches.

For a smaller tablet, you can get a 7-inch Kindle Fire HDX or a 7-inch Google Nexus 7 for \$229, or \$170 less than the latest iPad Mini.

With the Mini, though, you get a larger screen, at 7.9 inches. LG Electronics' G Pad 8.3 offers an 8.3-inch screen for \$350, or about \$50 less than the Mini. Sync the G Pad with an Android phone to see who's calling on your tablet, though you still need the phone to answer it. You can read and reply to texts from the tablet, as long as they don't have photos or video attached. You're limited to one reply and can't initiate a text from the tablet, however. That's where iPads do better.

As for the Kindle, there's

one important limitation. The Kindle runs a modified version of Android, and only a subset of Android apps works on it.

On the flip side, Amazon is alone in offering live tech support 24 hours a day, seven hours a week. Hit the "Mayday" button on an HDX, and a representative will appear in a video box within seconds. The representatives can only hear you and see what's on your screen. They can help guide you by placing orange markers on your screen or taking control of your device completely. This feature makes the Kindle excellent for your tech-challenged loved ones. Just train them to call Mayday — rather than you — every time the device's volume needs adjusting.

Owners of Samsung phones might prefer a companion tablet, such as the \$550 Galaxy Note 10.1. Sporting a stylus and several note-taking features, the Note is good for those who handwrite a lot of notes. But beware: The tablet's text-recognition software makes plenty of mistakes.

Avid readers, meanwhile, might be drawn to an Arc tablet from e-book specialist Kobo. Prices range from \$150 to \$400 depending on screen size and quality. The home screen has quick access to books and recommendations. A reading mode blocks distractions such as notifications and sounds, while adjusting screen brightness. You can even turn Wi-Fi off completely in reading mode to avoid temptations to check email and Facebook.

Some Android tablets also address one of the iPad's major shortcomings: It's not meant for sharing. The Nexus, the G Pad and the Arc tablets are among those that let you create multiple profiles. The Nexus also lets you restrict what kids can do under their profiles, though that feature is rudimentary. Beyond Android, you have plenty of Windows tablets to choose from, all with multi-user capabilities. The app selection is limited compared with iPads and most Android tablets. But Windows tablets are the only ones to offer a full version of Microsoft's Office software. It's free with tablets running a lightweight version of Windows 8.1 called RT. With iPads and Android tablets, you're limited to Web versions of Office.

Microsoft sells a 10.6-inch RT tablet, the Surface 2, for \$449. For \$130 more, you can get a keyboard cover with keys that move. A more powerful version, the Surface Pro 2, starts at \$899. It runs a regular version of Windows 8.1, meaning it can run older Windows programs, not just ones designed for RT. Microsoft markets these as laptop replacements, and the cover has been redesigned such that it works better for typing on your lap.

A newcomer to tablets is Nokia, traditionally a phone maker. Nokia's first-ever tablet, the Lumia 2520, has a brightly colored plastic back that helps it stand out in a crowd.

It costs \$499, the same as the iPad's starting price. But it comes with access to 4G LTE cellular networks, something that costs \$130 more for iPads and \$100 for the Kindle. That's something really useful for those away from Wi-Fi a lot. Data charges aren't included. Price reductions are available with service contracts or bundled with Nokia smartphones.
