SRSO: Pace woman stabs man in bedroom

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A Pace woman was arrested Sunday on charges of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon for stabbing a man after an argument about what to make for lunch, officials report.

According to Santa Rosa

County Sheriff's Office reports, Tamara Huntly Boykin, 30, took a knife down the hall, after a brief scuffle in the kitchen, and stabbed the victim in the leg. Reports said children were present during the attack and were questioned afterward.

Deputies report the victim said he and Boykin began scratching and hitting each other in the kitchen,

and at one point he grabbed her by the throat, and they both fell to the ground. Reports said after getting up, they continued to push and shove each other in the living room. The man said he took Boykin's telephone and tablet, stored them away and locked the door. Reports said the victim could see Boykin coming down the hall with the knife. SRSO re-

ports said the struggle began in the bedroom, and the victim stated he lost control of Boykin's hand, and she stabbed him in the leg. The victim told deputies he went to the living room to call 911 and handed the phone to Boykin. He told deputies he only remembers Boykin walking out the door saying he was OK, and she got the bleeding stopped. He was taken

to West Florida Hospital for treatment of the wound.

Deputies said Boykin agreed to speak to them and said she did not realize the victim was cut after slipping after the argument. Reports said Boykin tried to call her mother, but the victim took the phone from her, so she went

New property up for donation for courthouse

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Ruth Dupont Esser, former co-owner of Avalon Landing and Santa Rosa County Commission candidate for district 4, said, "We have to do things differently in the county. We have to work with what we have," regarding determining the location of the new Santa Rosa County Courthouse. To that end, Esser said she found 200 acres in East Milton, right near the intersection of State Road 87 and Interstate 10. She said the owner of the property is former Sen. Charles Clary, who served from 1996 to 2006.

She said the land has infrastructure in place and would require little road construction because of its convenient location to these two major roadways. Of the two properties currently scheduled for the November ballot, Esser said the jail location in East Milton would be unattractive for the county courthouse, and she was worried putting the courthouse on Avalon Boulevard would cause too many traffic problems.

Esser said she called Clary and suggested he donate 20 acres of his land. She said he also would benefit because new businesses would open to serve courthouse employees and anyone else going to the judicial site, causing the land to increase in value.

Clary said he had potential commercial interest in the front of the land in question and had the back certified by Gulf Power for manufacturing. He said he had no previous connections to Esser, who called him on the proposal. Since then, he said he contacted County Attorney Angela Jones to discuss a donation or a low price.

utilizing coupons. She said she shopped from 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. on this outing.

Whitaker said she relocated with her husband from West Palm Beach to be near her grandson, who has a medical condition.

They were regularly visiting and decided to move. She said a series of misfortunes beset the

family to the point they were "down to using travel items to survive." Whitaker said she got ideas from extreme couponing shows and "liked using coupons anyway," so she got newspapers from friends, joined couponing groups through the Internet and soon was giving gift boxes of toiletries and groceries as gifts for

the holidays.

"I like to be able to provide for my family," she said.

Whitaker said her job as an associate at Dollar General is full-time now, but she doesn't know when it could drop down to 18 hours or less.

Constitution and Coffee discusses Mt. Vernon Assembly, Article V

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On Dec. 7, Florida Sen. Alan Hays, R-Umatilla, and Rep. Larry Metz, R-Yalaha, attended the Mt. Vernon Assembly in Mt. Vernon, Va., where 100 lawmakers from 32 states gathered to discuss organizing an Article V convention. Since then, 15 states including Florida have filed legis-

lation calling for this convention.

Article V provides a method by which the states may propose and ratify amendments to the Constitution without approval by the Congress, the president or the Supreme Court. When 34 states first agree to a proposed amendment, and subsequently, 38 states authorize the amendment, according to Article V, the modification becomes a part of the Constitution.

Local political action group Constitution and Coffee, made up of conservatives, libertarians and Tea Party supporters, discussed the Mt. Vernon Assembly and proposed commission on federalism at their March 22 meeting. The group supports a state-sponsored commission on federalism and a Constitutional convention to amend the Constitution.

"This is what we should have

been doing," said Carl Hudgens, who began a weekly Constitution and Coffee meeting two years ago.

A federalism commission, Hudgens said, would aid in calling for a convention to amend the United States Constitution, a power delegated to the states under Article V.

"Article V is the vertical

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OUR VIEW

Who will we look like, commissioners?

A number of years ago, the Santa Rosa County commissioners began to decentralize county offices. The practice probably goes back to the building of the administration offices at the convergence of Old Bagdad Highway and U.S. 90. Since then, satellite administration offices have been built, designed to service populations and geographies more conveniently. Fairly recently, the county took over an abandoned and unsightly retail complex and turned it in to a spacious and attractive center for local government. The practice seems to have worked well. Generally, the cost of this strategy and benefits realized are a credit to the commissioners and planners of the recent past. However, this strategy may have been over utilized with the latest sight selection for a future courthouse. At this point, we could discuss the merits of building a new courthouse. However, it appears to us the scope of the current conversation is less about whether or not a new courthouse will be built and more about when and where a new courthouse will be located, although we realize the question of building a courthouse is moot, particularly if a funding path does not materialize once residents of Santa Rosa County mark their ballots in the fall. The question we must ask is must we build a courthouse without a town? We're not saying the Pea

Ridge site doesn't have merit. Yes, it sits closer to the important Pace constituency. Yes, it's a large tract of land with highway frontage. Yes, it's a green field tract with inherently less construction issues. It just has no location, no character, no history and no tradition. The halls of justice are by design located in the centers of government, from the Supreme Court in Washington on down. Our centers of government and justice are points of assembly for commerce, arts, parades, celebrations, festivals and the diverse workings of a community. When the new Federal Courthouse

was built in Pensacola, surely a bare field on U.S. 29 north of the paper mill would have been a frugal place to build. Perhaps the old Kmart on Davis Highway (where Home Depot is now) would have been better place, more accessible if population distribution were the obvious consideration. But they chose to tear down a historic downtown landmark, the San Carlos Hotel, to make way for progress and improvement. It lies within a category 5 Hurricane flood plain. Its obvious construction cost, surrounding population densities and even risk were not the only considerations for the location of this project. Future Santa Rosans will be utilizing the next courthouse for 50 years or more. And those who research Santa Rosa County will find the county seat is Milton and see a picture of the Courthouse at Pea Ridge on the search engine. This will point to some flaws in our design. The courthouse steps are the center of power. This is where public business is orchestrated. Although there may have been parades in Arcadia at some point (historical place close to Pea Ridge), no one can recall any. So commissioners, please consider officially moving the county seat to Pea Ridge. And provide a line item for the construction of a parade route. Also prepare for Milton to be set adrift when its downtown anchor is removed.

It does not bring customers into my antique store, which resides only one block away. Occasionally, I'll get the lone person waiting on a relative to get out of court, just to kill time. People who are called to jury duty are in a hurry to get back to work as soon as possible.

Because of the location, many surrounding buildings house attorneys, probation officers and bail bond businesses, instead of shops and restaurants. Unlike a city the size of Pensacola or larger, Milton does not have enough storefront real estate to house both.

I would love to see the existing courthouse renovated and used for the benefit of all citizens. Make it a community center or a satellite branch of one of our universities. Make it a children's museum. Make it something that will bring life to our community.

We must stop looking at the courthouse building as our town's status symbol. A thriving community should be our goal. Moving the courthouse won't make Milton disappear, as some people fear. It will give it the opportunity to come alive again.

As for the question of where to relocate the courthouse, it would make sense to use land the county already owns. East Milton, next to the jail seems to be a logical location. If my sources are correct, taxpayers are paying in excess of \$170,000 per year to transport inmates to and from the jail. Why not build the courthouse right next to it? If a caged walkway was planned as part of the construction, there wouldn't be a need for vehicle transport at all. Obviously, I don't have access to all the facts and figures, but starting with land the county owns makes the most sense to me.

Here's hoping our county commissioners will strongly consider these points.

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

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

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Painted in a Corner: The Business of Art

In Northwest Florida, it seems like everyone is an artist of some kind. While no official study has ever been conducted, it is generally accepted that this area of America has an unusually high population of artistic individuals. For many in Santa Rosa County, art is a way of life and a means to get by when times get tough. As the economy has taken a toll on the livelihoods of many in this area, people have begun to contemplate selling their artwork to earn extra income. But, is this really such an easy choice to make? What is the true business side to making money off of art in contemporary society?

According to the Santa Rosa County Economic Development department, approximately 75 percent of Santa Rosa's citizenry are underemployed. The per capita income is \$24,474 with significantly less wage income levels for Jay, Pace, Milton, and other communities north of the Yellow River. Desperation often causes people to look for quick ways to make ends meet. Seeing price tags from hundreds to thousands of dollars for paintings often causes people to get interested in art to help supplement their income. The problem is that most people do not realize what it takes or how much one has to spend in order to command such high prices. Also, few people fail to hear the backstories of what the art business is about.

In discussions with local artists, many noted the drive to pursue an artistic career often means having

a primary job which has nothing to do with art. Of those interviewed, very few have a full time job as an artist. Some worked as paralegals, some as cooks, etc. just to pay the bills. Even those who worked with art full time said they often had to supplement their living, holding art classes, and doing occasional odd jobs. As a local artist, Donna Tucker said, "Everyone starts off as a starving artist and they hope things are better towards the end."

Many artists also said it took years of training just to start producing marketable materials and then it took additional years to sell their first painting. Stories of initially giving away fine art as gifts were common with many, reporting sales being on the decline with the lack of disposable income due to a down turned economy.

Artists also noted a general lack of support by artists groups which have traditionally issued grants, stipends, and contests for venue art, etc. Many said the trend at "art" festivals

deferred from showcasing art and instead they use the art as a draw to the public in order to showcase the more popular crafters, jewelers, photographers, pottery vendors, crafters, woodworking, and food vendors. For this reason, the numbers of fine artists at festivals have dwindled. Claiming high booth costs, exclusion of local artists at bigger arts festival, etc. many artists said they were barely able to break even at most events whereas, in comparison, food vendors could easily make \$10,000 or more a weekend at even the small venue festivals.

Many artists said public showings take up a tremendous amount of time as artists clamor to gain sales. Most claimed to be traveling to art festivals almost every weekend of the spring and summer, with gallery nights and other showings during the middle of the week. Reports of sales from these multiple venues were spotty with many claiming limited success in Escambia and Walton

counties. Time away from family was a common issue. Tucker noted that she's done shows as far away as St. Augustine, Jacksonville and Troy, Ala. Another local artist, Dennis Boyce, said he does multiple showings at public events and relies mostly off of commissioned pieces, illustrations, and art instruction for an income. Boyce has even done commercial artwork for PepsiCo and a local wine festival. Another local artist, Joesph Diaco, said in addition to having a primary job other than art, he has artwork in galleries as far as New Orleans and Atlanta, over 70 paintings in storage, and doing multiple art festivals on the weekends. As Boyce noted, "You gotta get out like any other business and do the sales work."

But, sales are a harder task than one would think. Diaco said it took him a year and a half to get into a gallery in Atlanta and three years just to get into one in New Orleans. Tucker said few people realize art sales requires warehousing, extensive traveling, booth costs, fuel, storage and exhibition equipment, food, and lodging. She said one venue cost her over \$300 in fuel alone. Booth costs quoted by artists ranged from \$125 to over \$1,000 based on the size and location of given venues. Some artists said they felt the costs of space should be a third to a half what they are now to offset the other expenses artists must pay. Each additional cost ultimately eats into profits and makes it extremely hard to come out ahead.

Time is also critical. Tucker said that it can take months to do a single painting. She also notes

celebrated American artists, like Thomas Kinkadee may take a year or more to do a single painting. The artist, therefore, has to manage time well and balance out perfection with the need for inventory, as since most artist displays viewed had a minimum of twenty pieces with many having significantly more plus prints for sale.

The artists did offer up some tips for people wishing to enter the market. Boyce said to always "watch the bottom line." Most said to be choosy in their venue in order to maximize sales at minimal costs. Many noted patience is critical, since a single painting can

take two or more years to sell. Tucker noted valuation price points are critical. She suggested before entering the market, artists need to first find others doing similar quality and style in order to get a proper price. She also said new artists need to remember "It takes 12 years to do something that takes two hours to paint." In other words, most paintings take years of training, perfecting skills, learning from mistakes, experimenting new processes, and adapting before one is able to make a marketable painting. Continuing education was also ranked as highly critical to one's success in the business.

no registration, saying it was his brother's car. At the time, according to reports, the officer noticed a White Owl Blunt wrapper package on the driver's side floorboard. Reports said Sikder told the officer there was a blunt on his floorboard after

another officer patted him down.

Upon searching, the officer found a 2-gram blunt in the White Owl package, an unopened package of spice (Fairly Legal Brand), a vapormax "with an unknown leafy substance," eight blunts in the center console, and a marijuana roach in the ash tray. A tan satchel in the back seat contained a digital scale reports said "was covered in loose marijuana shake," and two plastic bags of marijuana, one of

11.5 grams and another 8 grams. Reports also said an officer discovered at the Gulf Breeze Police Department a black first aid kit of package containing two loaded .380 caliber Bersa Thunder magazines and two boxes of .380 ammunition.

The officer's report said Sikder was placed under arrest for possession of marijuana over 20 grams, possession with intent to sell, possession of a dangerous drug, possession of drug paraphernalia and given citations for speed, lack of registration and tint violation on the vehicle.

he was not going to lie to them, and he had been drinking. Locklin also told deputies he had taken the car from a guy he knew, and he told them he was told not to take the car, according to reports. Locklin told deputies he would not submit to a field sobriety test and asked to be taken to jail.

SRSO reports Locklin was found with Diazepam 10 mg, which reports indicate is a schedule 4 drug by prescription only. Thomas Enfinger pressed charges against Locklin for vehicle theft. Locklin is being held on \$16,000 bond.

Ask the Preacher

Dear Pastor Gallups, "I have two questions. Please enlighten me on Deuteronomy 22:5 about women dressing like men. Also, what does the bible say about women preaching or teaching? I enjoy your articles." P.G. Milton

Dear Mrs. G., Thank you for your kind words about my articles and thank you for being a loyal reader.

Your first question concerns the following biblical passage -

Deuteronomy 22:5

A woman must not wear men's clothing, nor a man wear women's clothing, for the LORD your God detests anyone who does this.

The context of this passage is that men should be men and dress like men and women should be women and dress like women. Some have held to a very strict interpretation of this scripture reading and legalistically demanded that a woman should always wear a dress, for example. The context here is not so much to declare a certain type of attire for a man or a woman so much as it is a statement against homosexual tendencies and gender confusion within a society. Societal "dress" and customs continually change. The passage is a clear statement that men and women are distinct creations of God and should act, dress, and conduct themselves accordingly. A woman has no business purposely dressing to "look like a man." Nor does a man have any business dressing to "look like a woman."

Your second question can get a bit more complex. I have produced a full length DVD on this topic. You can get it through our church office. Let me give you the quick, Biblical answer here. A woman is permitted to preach and teach in the church. She is not permitted, however, to teach or to instruct the men, especially in a way that takes leadership authority over the men or the church. She can preach/teach to women or youth, for example, but she may not, biblically, preach to the church and instruct and direct the church. I hope this brief answer addresses the crux of your question.

Washington Update

American Center for Law and Justice Amicus Briefs

As a strong defender and supporter of our Constitutional rights, I am proud to support three amicus briefs filed or soon-to-be filed to protect U.S. citizens' First Amendment rights.

The first of these briefs is the result of a recent decision in the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals, which ruled that public school officials can ban students from prominently displaying the American flag at school, while leaving the display of other national flags completely unrestricted. This decision came after a group of students at a California high school were threatened with physical violence by a group of their peers for wearing American flag t-shirts and displaying American flag banners. School officials, citing that the patriotic gear caused disruption and potential violence, required the students to either turn their t-shirts inside out or leave school to change clothing. The American flag is one of the greatest symbols of liberty and freedom both in our Nation and around the world, and it should be respected in our public schools and institutions.

Another recent court ruling that has caused significant controversy is the decision that the Mount Soledad War Memorial Cross, in San Diego, must be torn down on the grounds that it supposedly constitutes a government endorsement of religion. Except for a period of two years, there has been a cross of some kind displayed in this location since 1913, and the current Mount Soledad War Memorial Cross was dedicated on April 18, 1954 to honor the fallen heroes of World War I, World War II, and the Korean War. The cross was constructed by the Mount Soledad Memorial Association, a group founded by members of a local American Legion post, with the full permission of the City of San Diego. The land where the cross is located was eventually transferred to the federal government. This memorial has been a part of the San Diego community, which has a large and important military presence and history, for more than half a century. I hope that the Supreme Court will take up this case to overturn the flawed decision to remove it.

I was also glad to support a final amicus brief where, for the time being, a court decision has upheld the right to display the Knights of Columbus' Statue of Jesus Memorial at the Whitefish Mountain resort in Flatbush National Forest, which was constructed in 1954 to honor soldiers of the 10th Mountain Division who encountered similar statues while fighting in the Italian Alps during World War II. The statue was built by the Knights of Columbus on land owned and developed by a former member of the 10th Mountain Division, Ed Schenk. Last year, a federal district court for Montana ruled that the statue does not constitute a government endorsement of religion and can remain. Unfortunately, opponents of the Statue of Jesus Memorial continue to pursue further legal action, and that is why I joined more than 106,000 Americans who joined

the ACLJ's Committee to Defend the Jesus Statue War Memorial to help ensure that this important memorial is not torn down.

Obama administration more secretive than ever

Despite President Obama's declarations that he would lead the "most transparent Administration in history," a new report by the Associated Press found the Administration is more secretive than ever. Last year, the Administration cited national security concerns as a reason for withholding information a record 8,496 times. While it is right to withhold information that could harm our national security, the Associated Press highlights a troubling pattern where executive agencies routinely use spurious claims to dismiss valid Freedom of Information requests.

Increased transparency helps cut waste, fraud and abuse to ensure that government is working for the people. Earlier this month, the House passed legislation to increase the amount of agency information made available through proactive disclosure. This bill, the FOIA Oversight and Implementation Act would also place the burden on the Administration to justify withholding information and establish a single website for all FOIA submissions, appeals, and status requests. Passing this law in the Senate and sending it to the President would be a good first step to fulfilling President Obama's promises of historic levels of transparency.

Medicare Advantage

During President Obama's travels to the Sunshine State last week, the President was presented with an opportunity to speak to the more than 1.3 million seniors in Florida who rely on Medicare Advantage that are facing skyrocketing costs thanks to Obamacare. This is a serious issue not just in Florida, but around the Nation. Earlier this month, I joined more than 200 of my colleagues in sending a letter to Marilyn Tavenner, Administrator of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, expressing deep concern with the proposed Medicare Advantage cuts. The President promised seniors they wouldn't be impacted by Obamacare, but, like with so many other promises the President has made, this is

unfortunately not the case. President Obama needs to fix this mess before it jeopardizes the health care of millions of Floridians and seniors throughout the country.

Constituent Voice


Over the last few weeks, several constituents have brought to my attention H.R. 3708, the General Aviation Pilot Protection Act of 2013, a bill introduced by Congressman Todd Rokita (R-IN). H.R. 3708 would direct the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to issue or revise its medical certification regulations for certain small aircraft pilots as long as they meet certain requirements. While pilots would continue to assess their fitness to fly and undergo regular flight reviews, just as they do today, this bill would expand the third-class medical exemption and eliminate duplicative and costly regulation. I appreciate those who brought this measure to my attention, and was pleased to lend my support as a cosponsor.

Whitaker now teaches one-on-one coupon classes. She said customers can stack coupons by using competitor coupons, store coupons and then manufacturer coupons at stores that accept them. She also described using "rain checks" and "overages." She said stores give "rain checks" when out of a particular item, the benefit being sale prices are still honored when collecting on a rain check. On a recent deal, Whitaker said she combined coupons and rain checks to whittle a \$52.86 total down to \$22.86, which still qualified her for a \$50 gas card from Publix. Additionally, she said, she will use the gas card to add to her fuel perks with Winn Dixie. Because of the deals she's found, Whitaker said she "would be owed money from Winn Dixie, but they don't do cash back," so she gets store credit, which she termed "overages." She said she takes her overages and buys treats for her dog and her husband, too. She also uses overages to buy items not on sale.

According to Whitaker, "you need a coupon buddy." She said she has two friends

with whom she keeps in constant contact, alerting each other of new deals. She said her friend Theresa uses these couponing techniques to be debt-free. Whitaker said there are also many couponing groups on Facebook, some aimed at individual retailers. She also uses Internet sources to find coupons in different regions.

"This is work," Whitaker said. Her husband built extra shelves in the house to accommodate the bulk items extreme couponing requires, she said, and he also helps clip coupons.

"It's addicting," she said, more than once. "It's like somebody on crack, a kid in a candy store," but "it doesn't get away with you. It's always about looking for that next deal."

Whitaker said she has a stockpile of paper towels and toilet paper among items she's collecting to donate to a men and women's shelter. She said she could have brought some things already, but she wants her donation to be big. She has also gotten makeup on clearance and wants to donate some to a women's shelter.

"I'm concerned negotiations could change," Esser said. "I want this deal to be a donation and not a sale."

As to where Clary's property is located, Bob Cole, District 2 county commissioner, said he has always preferred East Milton as the location for the future courthouse. Cole said Byron Cotton has made the same offer for the last six years.

He also said he preferred putting the courthouse next to the jail but would be willing to discuss Clary's land with him.

This new addition to the mix of potential properties added to support for an East Milton courthouse, while real estate owners downtown expressed fear that moving the courthouse would affect their business at the public commission meeting Monday.

Members of the public spoke in support of these two properties in East Milton, but Jerry Couey, speaking before the council, said he had never heard anyone support the U.S. 90 property.

Carl Hudgens, creator of the political action group Constitution and Coffee, echoed Couey's U.S. 90 sentiment, calling it the "worst location." Hudgens said before recent meetings, the two main properties in consideration were U.S. 90 and Avalon Boulevard, "but now citizens are getting involved and asking questions." Esser also expressed support for the Clary proposal and Cotton's potential donation.

Couey said Santa Rosa County could follow Walton County's example. Walton County kept its courthouse's original facade

while updating the interior.

"It's easy to say, 'It's old and I want something new,'" Couey said.

Hunter Walker, county administrator, twice said the courthouse is "a sick old building" and said, "I don't know how to keep the courthouse downtown."

"Milton is on its uphill climb," said Cindea Coulter-Booth, owner of C. Coulter Corporation, who said she's the "owner of the oldest business downtown."

"The courthouse is a good thing for downtown. It's our core. It needs to stay our core."

No one attending the meeting spoke up in support of the U.S. 90 location. However, Andrea McDermot of Navarre said, "People will have to use Garcon Point Bridge. I guess that's one way to get people to use that bridge."

separation between the federal government and the states," said Sam Mullins, co-founder of the Santa Rosa Tea Party Patriots.

Hudgens said the focus of this convention would be narrow and cover three things: setting fiscal restraints on the federal government, setting term limits on Congress and stopping federal encroachment on and usurpation of state powers by clearly defining items in the Constitution like the "welfare clause."

"It may take 18 months to three years to reach the 38 states required to pass the convention, and around nine months to 18 months to call the convention," Mullins

said.

Upon returning from Mt. Vernon, Hays and Metz introduced sisters bills (SM 476 and HM 381) petitioning Congress to call an Article V Convention of States for the limited purpose of proposing amendments to the U.S. Constitution. Florida's version of legislation for a commission on federalism, SB 480, filed by Sen. Greg Evers, R-Pensacola, is pending in committee.

But Mullins said another option is to let existing committees take up the responsibilities of said commission. He said the first role of a commission on federalism would be to watch how the

federal government encroaches on state rights. The second role would be to serve a committee of correspondence, a committee to contact other states for support on federalism.

Mullins gave two examples of federal usurpation of power: Montana's fight with the federal government about freeway speed limits and Louisiana's bout with the government about the drinking age. Mullins said the federal government can blackmail states to change local laws by removing federal funding.

"June 12 and 13 will be the next Mt. Vernon Assembly," Mullins said.

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



Jiu-jitsu: It's all about confidence and focus

Identified as a toddler with the nickname "Macaco," which is defined as a monkey in the West African language Fiot or an adjective by the Portuguese referring to the unfortunate, Master Joe Moreira began creating his legacy for changing society by the age of 5. He won his first title at age 6 for the Gama Filho University.

Coral Belt in Brazilian Jiu Jitsu, third-degree Black Belt, Ruas Vale Tudo Black Belt, fought in Ultimate Fighting Championship, founder of United States Federation of Brazilian Jiu Jitsu, more than 40 years of martial arts experience: Master Joe Moreira.

Born in a taxi cab in front of a Brazilian hospital, Moreira began life in difficult circumstances. His noticeable blonde hair and dark skin created an open target for ridicule. Those painful encounters created a desire within him to succeed. A legend in the martial arts world was created.

Now an American citizen, married with four children, Moreira and his family reside in Newport, Calif. Life was much different for Moreira during his youth. Around the age of 6, he began to study the art of jiu-jitsu, a self-defense system, combat sport and martial art. It focuses on grappling and most especially ground fighting.

Moreira has competed nationally as well as in the Olympics. Currently recognized worldwide as one of 12 individuals for his level of ability as a competitor and an instructor, Moreira is conducting hands-on seminars and private lessons across the globe, where he continues to inspire

black belts. He is considered a proven expert on jiu-jitsu.

Brazilian jiu-jitsu teaches the idea that the smaller, weaker victim can successfully defend himself against an assailant who is stronger and bigger. Leverage and proper technique are the two most accentuated skills.

Business owner and head instructor Alex Ruas of Alex Silva Ruas Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu, Thai-Boxing & MMA in Pace said fighting is actually easy, but it requires a bigger person to control his emotion and choose not to physically fight.

"It is all about confidence, focus and leverage," Ruas said.

Ruas, who recently hosted instructional seminar with Moreira at his Pace martial arts studio,

has experienced a young life of hard ship just as Moreira did.

"I am very thankful for who I am and what I am now," he said. "I have eaten from others' trash cans and slept under the bridges in Oakland."

His extremely poor, single mother sold everything they owned to bring Ruas to the United States. He did not speak any English when he arrived here, but he did have an amazing amount of internal drive and confidence despite all the odds.

"I believed in God, family and Jitsu," Ruas said. "Life in America was supposed to be easy, and it wasn't, but God has a purpose for bringing me here."

Ruas has a mission for his business and his own life: to pre-

vent violence and bullying.

"We all need the confidence to have eye contact in all our conversations and when confronted with evil the ability to hold our head up and use our voice to say no."

Men and women, boys and girls are participating in classes offered at Ruas' studio on Spencer Field Road.

"No one will ever hurt me," declared Emily Ernst, 7. "I am learning self-defense here." Both Moreira and Ruas have a passion for teaching more than self-defense to their students; they want to instill lifelong values against self-destruction, evil and violence.

"I have strong convictions about starting a program here to support our youth," Ruas said. "I

want to provide a place to keep them from trouble as well as being safe in their neighborhoods. My coach kept me out of trouble."

During the March 22 martial arts seminar, the spirit of friends and family was evident, as well as the reinforcement of confidence, skill and attitude.

"I just want to take care of myself," Eva Naig, 6, stated with the poise of a potential Miss America.

Moreira's childhood vision will continue to enable and strengthen those of all ages here in our own community through Santa Rosa County resident and Pace Chamber of Commerce member Alex Ruas.

"I care about this community," he said.

VISIT FLORIDA marketing dollars attracting tourists in record numbers

Florida hotel industry reports significant gains in last 4 years

The Florida Restaurant and Lodging Association recently released data supporting the efforts of VISIT FLORIDA and the millions of dollars spent on marketing tourism programs used to bring visitors to the Sunshine State. Florida currently enjoys a \$79.34 RevPAR rate, which is above the national average of \$68.69. Growth in revenue is 8.3 percent for Florida in 2013 over 2012 versus 5.4 percent for the United States.

“Gov. Rick Scott and

the Florida Legislature understand the critical need to fund VISIT FLORIDA's tourism marketing programs to keep our state as one of the top tourist destinations in the country,” said Florida Restaurant and Lodging Association President/CEO Carol Dover. “These Smith Travel statistics show that more and more visitors are staying in our hotels in recent years, and a direct correlation may be made that by increasing marketing dollars, more tourists are booking at our

Beach-nesting shorebirds need peace, quiet to survive

During spring and summer on Florida beaches, shorebirds build nests out of sand and shells and hatch chicks that can barely be seen. So well-camouflaged are the nests, eggs and chicks of shorebirds like the snowy plover that they can easily be stepped on or missed unless people know to watch out for them.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is reminding beachgoers to be on the lookout and avoid disturbing bird nurseries on the Atlantic and Gulf coasts of Florida. Among the state's beach-nesting shorebirds facing conservation challenges are the snowy plover, least tern, black skimmer, American oystercatcher and Wilson's plover.

“By taking a few simple steps, people can enjoy the beach without disturbing beach-nesting shorebirds and their chicks, which increases the birds' chances of survival,” said Nancy Douglass, who works on shorebird conservation at the FWC.

“While the populations of beach-nesting birds are declining, people's willingness to protect shorebirds and their chicks contributes to keeping them present on Florida beaches for generations to come,” Douglass said.

People at the beach, including those paddling canoes, kayaks and boards along the shore, can help beach-nesting shorebirds by following basic guidelines:

- Keep your distance. If birds become agitated or leave their nests, you are too close. A general rule is

- to stay at least 300 feet from a nest. Birds calling out loudly and dive-bombing are giving signals you need to back off.
- Never intentionally force birds to fly or run. They use up energy they need for nesting, and eggs and chicks may be left vulnerable to the sun's heat and to predators.
- Respect posted areas. Avoid posted nesting sites and use designated walkways when possible.
- It's best not to take pets to the beach, but if you do, keep them on a leash.
- Keep the beach clean and do not feed wildlife. Food scraps attract predators such as raccoons and crows. Litter on beaches can entangle birds and other wildlife.
- Spread the word. If you see people disturbing nesting birds, gently let them know how their actions may hurt the birds' survival. If they continue to disturb nesting birds, report their activities to the FWC's

Wildlife Alert hotline at 888-404-FWCC (3922), #FWC or *FWC on your cell phone or by texting Tip@MyFWC.com. You also can report nests that are not posted to Wildlife Alert.

Wildlife photographers also should follow the rules that protect beach-nesting shorebirds:

- Remain behind the posted area, with no part of you or your camera equipment extending beyond the string or signs.
- Don't exceed 10 minutes. Too much time photographing near the nest may stress the birds.
- Don't “push” birds around the beach. Stay far enough away so the birds do not change their behavior in response to your presence. They need to feed and rest without disturbance.

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Serving up healthy food and a healthier next generation

As Secretary of Agriculture, I take USDA's nickname of the "People's Department" — first coined by President Abraham Lincoln — to heart. Over the past five years, we have worked hard to build upon our tradition of service to the American people, supporting both the farmers and ranchers who grow our food and giving American families' confidence that the food they buy at the grocery store is safe, healthy and affordable.

We could not accomplish our mission without the contributions of partner organizations and individual volunteers across the country. While our work with volunteers is by no means exclusive to nutrition and nutrition education, volunteers

act as our boots on the ground in classrooms and communities to teach kids about where food comes from and why the diet and lifestyle choices they make today matter for their future. Volunteers, along with parents, teachers, school administrators, and school food service professionals, are absolutely critical to our efforts to improve childhood nutrition and help this generation of youngsters grow up healthy and strong.

Last year, we worked with 125 FoodCorps service members in schools across 15 states, including my home state of Iowa. FoodCorps is part of the AmeriCorps Service Network, and its volunteers spend one year terms in schools across the country, from Connecticut to California, helping schools bring local and regionally grown foods into the cafeteria and providing nutrition education to students.

The importance of that second

piece cannot be overstated.

The average elementary school student gets just an average of 3.4 hours of nutrition education each year, far less time than they spend watching television in a typical day. Studies show that kids exposed to healthy foods early on are more likely to try and like them, so one of the most important things that FoodCorps members do is work with teachers to expand the quantity and quality of nutrition and agricultural education available to students in the classroom.

One of the ways FoodCorps members do that is through hands-on learning experiences in school gardens. School gardens provide great learning tools for kids, teaching them to apply math, science and nutrition lessons outside of the classroom. Last year, FoodCorps members built or revitalized more than

400 school gardens. As an added bonus, those same FoodCorps members helped to harvest more than 29,000 pounds of produce, which was donated in their local communities.

I am also proud to say the spirit of service runs deep in all that we do at the Department of Agriculture. For example, through Feds Feed Families, a Federal government-wide initiative to supply food and hygiene items for distribution by food banks and shelters, USDA last year donated more than more than 4.3 million pounds of food.

Through our People's Garden Initiative — named in honor of President Lincoln — we've established a network of 2,014 gardens at USDA facilities, schools, faith-based centers and other locations across the country. USDA employees volunteer in the gardens to weed

and perform other upkeep, teach demonstration classes, and harvest fruits, vegetables and herbs, which are donated to local food banks.

Volunteers have given 211,884 hours of their time to People's Gardens across the country. This time alone is worth an estimated \$4.5 million dollars, which comes on top of the 3.8 million pounds of fresh produce volunteers have picked to donate to those in need.

Committed volunteers make a tremendous difference in towns and communities across our great nation. Their great ideas, hard work and innovation—whether on farms, in schools, or in the local community — improve the lives of everyone around them. If you're currently a volunteer, keep it up! Got joint pain? How to get relief

Achy joints? Join the club. Consumer Reports notes that more than 50 million adults in the United States have arthritis, and close to half of them say that the condition limits their daily activities, according to the national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. That makes arthritis the country's leading cause of disability.


But you can rein in the pain if you know what to do. Adding several non-drug options can cut the risk of dangerous side effects and result in better long-term control.

Get the right diagnosis

Check with a doctor to see if the pain stems from arthritis or another condition that causes similar symptoms, such as gout or Lyme disease. If it is arthritis, determine whether it's osteoarthritis, caused by wear and tear on the joints, or rheumatoid arthritis, a more serious form of the disease triggered by a malfunctioning immune system. Rheumatoid arthritis usually requires close medical supervision and a combination of prescription drugs. But many of the steps that follow, which are often enough to relieve osteoarthritis, can also help.

Use drugs carefully

Nonprescription



drugs such as ibuprofen (Advil and generic) and naproxen (Aleve and generic) can ease pain and reduce inflammation. But when used regularly, both can cause stomach bleeding and high blood pressure. So it's best to limit their use to short-term flare-ups. Acetaminophen (Tylenol and generic) helps with pain, but taking too much can damage your liver. So keep your daily dose under 3,000 milligrams. And Consumer Reports suggests avoiding alcohol, because that increases the risk of liver damage. Topical treatments, such as over-the-counter capsaicin cream (Zostrix and generic), might help people with arthritis in smaller joints such as those in the ankles, elbows, feet, fingers and toes. Or ask your doctor about the topical version of the prescription drug diclofenac (Pennsaid and Voltaren Gel). And last, injections might help. They include steroid shots,

which provide short-term relief but may cause joint damage if repeated more than three times a year, and, for knee pain, the joint lubricant hyaluronic acid (Hyalgan, Orthovisc and Synvisc), though it should be tried only if other methods have failed.

Exercise gently

Exercise helps by strengthening the muscles around your joints. A review of 32 studies found that exercise relieves knee pain as effectively as medication. Of course, exercising can be difficult if you have painful hips or knees. Biking, tai chi and water workouts provide good exercise without joint-jarring impact. Or consider an elliptical machine or indoor bike; go to ConsumerReports.org/cro/exercise0214 for reviews.

Consider alternatives

Alternatives include these measures:

- **Heat and ice.** Moist

heating pads, a warm, damp towel, or a warm bath or shower can soothe stiff joints. Ice packs can ease acute pain and swelling.

- **Acupuncture.** A review of 29 trials involving almost 18,000 patients, published in 2012 in the Archives of Internal Medicine, suggests that acupuncture may help some arthritis patients.

- **Massage.** The deep-tissue form of massage got high marks in a 2010 survey of Consumer Reports online readers with joint pain.

- **Healthy fats.** Research suggests that it pays to swap food high in omega-6 fatty acids (such as corn, safflower oil and meat) for food high in omega-3 fatty acids (including canola, flaxseed and olive oils, and cold-water fish).

Steer clear of supplements

Millions of Americans buy glucosamine or chondroitin, hoping that they will help with arthritis pain. But the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons says there's no reason to take those supplements, citing recent studies that failed to show any benefit from them. Consumer Reports' October 2013 report on those supplements reached similar conclusions. And to top it off, its tests of 16 products found that seven didn't contain the amounts indicated on the label.
