SRSO: Man found in home, charged with sexual assault

Police say a Missouri man was arrested Friday after being found in a home in Navarre into which he was not invited; he was charged with sexual assault on a person 16 or 17 years old. A complaint

was made about Brandon Scott Larison, 30, having a relationship with a teenager that originated online. A witness told deputies he knew a guy named Brandon who was about 30 years old and secretly staying with a teenager. The witness also said Larison was expected to have

media photos had appeared with the teen and the man lying in a bed together. The witness said he was worried when the teen didn't show up for school.

Deputies reported when they arrived at the home, they were told by other witnesses they had never heard of a man named Brandon, and the teen was upstairs and stayed home because she was sick. When called out of her room,

the teen seemed upset when she came down to talk with authorities. Reports said she told them she did not want to talk with them. Noises upstairs caused deputies to investigate. After a quick surveillance, deputies found Larison hiding outside behind a chimney. Reports said Larison was placed in handcuffs immediately and placed in the back of a patrol car. Later during questioning, Larison

said he came to Navarre from Missouri after meeting the teen through Facebook last November, and he arrived May 15. He told deputies his truck was parked on U.S. 98. Larison was charged with sexual assault by a person 24 years or older on a person 16 or 17 years of age and burglary of an occupied structure unarmed. He is currently in the Santa Rosa County Jail with \$90,000 bond.

MAYOR ASKS TASK FORCE FOR COURTHOUSE PLAN

At Thursday's Downtown Redevelopment Advisory Board meeting, Mayor Guy Thompson asked Brad Johnson and Matthew Hargraves of Johnson, Green & Hargraves, P.A., pictured speaking with City Planning Director Randy Jorgenson, to lead a task force to study the viability of keeping the Santa Rosa County courthouse downtown in terms of the amount of public interest throughout the county as well as the cost to do so. "Their job is to build that case," Thompson said. In addition to Johnson and Hargraves, Thompson said Steve Williams, manager of the Wal-Mart on U.S. 90, and Clyde Anderson, president of the Lionsgate Homeowners Association, volunteered to join the task force. However, Thompson said he would like to see an architect and an engineer on the team as well. The team is slated to present its findings June 2 for the council to sanction.

Residents still awaiting answer on Wolfe Creek project

Residents still await news from the state in regard to two unlikely allies working together with the help of Santa Rosa County, those being Naval Air Station Whiting Field and the State of Florida through the Florida Forever Coalition, an environmental conservation organization. Commissioner Don Salter said when conservation works with the military to protect land from development, natural resources and wildlife are preserved as well as the air space above them.

Four elements are involved: military, state environmental conservation, Santa Rosa County and the local citizenry.

"The No. 1 issue that closes military bases is encroachment," Salter said. Encroachment means residences or businesses developing closer and closer to a military base. Bases need more than the land upon which they're built to operate and grow. Flying

aircraft from the base mean the necessity of accident potential zones, undeveloped land near a base where accidents may occur without harming nearby structures.

Salter cited Eglin Air Force Base in Valparaiso as an example of encroachment. In 2009, the city of Valparaiso under Mayor John B. Arnold Jr. sued the Department of Defense to stop the basing of several F-35 jets at Eglin based on future noise complaints. Though there was support from the community to have the fighters go to Eglin, the military ultimately relented and sent the jets to an Arizona base, Salter said.

According to documentation by the Trust for Public Land, available in backup documentation for the Santa Rosa County April 7 meeting, the Wolfe Creek project would protect a shrinking longleaf pine forest as well as 12 archeological sites such as the Wolfe Creek Mill.

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

Have we lost free speech in America?

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

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Overwhelmed by generosity

Manna receiving food at main facility

After losing all its food to recent flooding, Manna Food Pantries' main facility is once again receiving and stocking food. Staff and volunteers have been sorting 73,845 pounds of food collected during the Stamp Out Hunger Letter Carrier Food Drive last week. While that's only enough food to serve the hungry in the area for one month, Executive Director DeDe Flounlacker says it's a start.

"We're overwhelmed by the generosity of this community," said Flounlacker. "We're starting from scratch, but we hope to be able to resume partial service in 8 to 10 weeks. We ask that the com-

munity continue to give — there is still a great need."

The receiving warehouse is the only occupied building at the facility, and the staff has been temporarily working out of a trailer. Jay Bradshaw, president of the Manna board of directors, says the board is actively looking for a new permanent home away from the flood-prone area.

"Right now, the priority for Manna is to resume service to the hungry as soon as possible," said Bradshaw. "For the long-term, the board is committed to finding a more suitable location to serve the community."

Last year, Manna Food Pantries distributed nearly 900,000 pounds of food to the hungry and

helped 42,116 people. The non-profit has been serving the community since 1983.

Kea has staying power as he's spent 15 years with AT&T the same amount of time he's lived in City Ward 2. Kea also has given back to the school of his education with four years spent volunteering at Pace High School's track and field program with two years volunteering with the football program at the same time.

According to City Clerk Dewitt Nobles, five people had submitted their names for council consideration by the last Friday deadline of noon. Mayor Guy Thompson said the high number of interested individuals is proof that the city has many people willing to serve.

"I know this was a tough choice. We had a number of great candidates here," he said. "I am very proud we had five people willing to

serve the city on such short notice."

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Pastor Gallups, When I look at the Aurora Colorado shooting, for example, I ask 'what is wrong with America?' What is your response? W.R. Milton

Dear W.R.,
How can a young man, enrolled in a PhD program, walk into a packed out theater with the desire to randomly destroy as many lives as possible and then booby trap his apartment in the hopes of destroying even more lives in the aftermath? 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Keeping the car simple

Hometown hero leaving competition in the dust

Chris Escobar, born in Milton, races a street legal 1986 Ford SVO and is close to breaking a seven second average quarter mile in the Tremec True Street drag racing event. His character is telling of why he has not broken this mark yet. "I wasn't trying to beat a record," Escobar said regarding his last race in Mechanicsville, Md. He said the weather can alter the time by at least a tenth of a second. "The car was going fast and my goal was just to win the race. My strategy was to err on the slow side so I didn't spin. It would have been like tripping at the start of a footrace," he said.

Escobar has been winning these drag races since 2004, missing only 3 years along the way. Escobar said he's been racing since he was seven years old. He got his start on go-karts. Steve Sapp, general manager of Chris Escobar Racing USA, LLC, said Escobar averaged almost a full second faster than his closest competitor in the Tremec True Street race in Mechanicsville, 8.042 seconds versus 8.902 seconds. Sapp, who is also Escobar's stepfather, said he remembers him racing before the go-karts, referencing his actions on a Big Wheel. Escobar said in the first GT that he raced for the 15-second mark reaching speeds of 90 mph. "It was just all about having fun and being a kid." Now he races at 176 mph.

Escobar described the True Street race as one that people feel they could really take part in because the race is broken up by seconds, from the purely fastest car down to 15 seconds. "In the past," he said, "it was all about money. The most money meant the fastest car. If you're

going for 15 seconds, you've got to be consistent. Fifteen seconds is closer to stock," he said. The purses for True Street races demonstrate the low profile money has in the burgeoning sport. Escobar said they've only received \$250.

The race itself tests a driver's steadiness and the car's durability. The race begins with a 30-mile tour: "Sometimes they'd take us through a city," Escobar said, "where we'd average maybe 40 mph or it would be mostly

interstate." It leads directly into the three back-to-back quarter mile passes. Escobar noted a difference between True Street and other professional races saying True Street has virtually no cool-down time, while the pros may have the car towed back for the next pass. Escobar said True Street mimics a spontaneous red-light race.

Opening the hood, he said, or needing a jumpstart meant instant disqualification. "A lot of cars cannot make all three runs," he said. Escobar said he wins so consistently as a driver because for one, he examines the track before every race. "The track is always changing literally with every pass. If the track looks worse, I slow down. Most racers don't examine the track. They say, 'This is how I always do it,' so they don't change. Every car is fighting for traction. Golfers walk the whole course and that's what I do. I see what it can handle and tell the car how fast to go."

Escobar also said he's simplified his car as much as he can to reduce the number of buttons and switches he needs to activate before and during the race. "Commonly, racers will forget to do one of their switches or drop back into first gear after the burnout. I had a friend forget to set up his transmission. There are 100 things you need to do right. Forget one and you might lose

half a second." Escobar went on to say, "I never made those mistakes. That's a major part of my record. I kept the car simple, like a street car." Escobar said he prefers automation and simplicity.

"You also need good people to help," he said. Ford, he said, gave him the engine he has in 2011, a 5.0 liter, 302 cubic inch Coyote. Escobar said, "We tore it apart and added rods, pistons, springs, and oil pump gears." His engine builder, Kris Starnes, he said, was able to get him his rods and pistons free and recently got a new block by Darton. "This engine is going way beyond what it was built for," Escobar said. He also gave credit to Brian Macy of Horsepower Connection and his Master Mechanic, Jake LaMotta of LaMotta Performance for his car's abilities. "There are no limitations on engine or weight, but I built it like I thought a real street racer ought to look. I built it way below the rules. There is no carbon fiber in this all-steel body. Turbos and computers make this possible."

Sapp said locals may soon get a chance to see Escobar race as the team is looking to race in Atmore on the eighth mile track. Sapp said the Poarch Creek Indians revamped the track and it's like new. Escobar's next event is the June 12 to 15 McLeod Racing NMRA Ford Super Nationals at Summit Motorsports Park in Norwalk, Ohio.

DEP makes progress toward \$40 million in land sales to benefit conservation

Department remains committed to buying conservation lands in Florida

The Department of Environmental Protection's Division of State Lands is making great strides in turning a profit to benefit conservation efforts across the state. The division is in the process of selling many state-owned surplus non-conservation lands to increase the budget for future purchases of valuable conservation lands. Some of the recent and upcoming bids include five former prisons, with required minimum bids on those totaling more than \$17 million. The move supports the vision of the 2014-2015 legislature, which gave DEP the authority to sell \$40 million worth of non-conservation land. At this point, the division is on target to meet that goal.

"It is a priority of the department to acquire and manage lands needed for conservation and public purpose and to dispose of surplus, state-owned lands which are no longer needed," said Division of State Lands Director Kelley Boree. "We continue working hard to ensure Floridians and visitors are provided both the greatest conservation and rec-

reation lands."

The department currently has 15 surplus non-conservation properties in various stages of the disposition process with an estimated value of about \$44 million. In fact, in the past two weeks alone, bid openings have been held for four parcels of land in Hendry, Nassau, Broward and Palm Beach Counties. That includes more than 210 acres in Palm Beach that is the former site of the Glades Correctional Institute that is part of a \$1.2 million deal.

Four additional bid openings are being held in the next 30 days for land in Hillsborough, Broward, DeSoto and Indian River Counties, which will yield at least an additional \$15.5 million, if the minimum bid is met. The division also has contracts for three sales in the closing process in Highlands, Hillsborough and Palm Beach Counties for a total of more than \$16 million.

Of the remaining four potential sales, two of the buyers are local governments in Miami-Dade and Volusia Counties. The other two parcels are in Duval and Leon Counties and will be offered out for bid.

All parcels currently in the process are expected to close prior to or during fiscal year 2014/2015, pending successful bids, Board of Trustees approval and successful closings. All of the sales will count toward the \$40 million goal.

Carl Hudgens and Sam Mullins of the political action group Constitution and Coffee expressed concern at the April 7 meeting about the government's involvement in land ownership. Hudgens said he was concerned the state is taking land from the people's ability to buy and sell. He asked, "Will there be any more land for children to live?"

Salter said, "It's not about taking land out of the hands of private citizens. It's about protecting the largest economic engine we have in Santa Rosa County."

Though Salter said the

state is still in the process of working with the private owner of the Wolfe Creek parcel, he described how ownership of the land would work if the state bought a conservation easement over it rather than buying the land outright.

"If I own 40 acres and have a house on it and sell an easement to the state, and 10 years later someone wants to buy the 39 acres behind the house, they can, but they have to understand the easement still applies," Salter said. He said the easement means no development may occur on the land as far as building structures.

However, he said the land still may be used for economic development like agriculture or ranching. Whether the parcel of land is sold, just the easement or neither, Salter said, "It's always left up to the land owner."

The issue becomes a challenge to some conservative minded citizens who wish to support the military but also worry about property removed from the market. Regardless, Salter said, "We have no skin in the game," referring to the county, because any deals made would be between the state of Florida and the property owner.

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
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IT'S ALL HAPPENING AT THE ZOO

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

SRSO: Woman digs syringes in dirt to thwart deputies

A Milton woman was arrested last week when she was stopped by a Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office deputy for not having tail lights, according to the Santa Rosa Sheriff's Office.

According to reports, Robin Leigh Joyner, 22, was driving along Avalon Boulevard when she was stopped. Suspicious items were found when a search

was conducted of Joyner's vehicle, according to deputies. A spoon with burnt residue and a baby bottle with an unknown blue substance were found.

Dispatch was notified to send a Milton police female officer to search Joyner and another female passenger because deputies reported noticing Joyner fidgeting with a bulge in the front of her pants.

According to reports, Joyner was once again fidgeting behind her back while sitting on the ground and waiting for the female

officer. Deputies report finding four syringes pushed into the dirt with the end cap pulled off and stuck completely into the ground with the plunger down. Another spoon with burnt residue was found. A small plastic cellophane wrapper was found in Joyner's pants including two Hydromorphone, 8 mg, a prescription narcotic and a possible heroine rock that Joyner claimed belonged to her boyfriend, Brennan.

Joyner was charged with drugs-possession, drug equipment-possession and evidence destroying and was released on \$10,500 bail.

USCG recommends signaling devices

The Coast Guard recommends boaters have signaling devices on board their vessel in case of emergency during National Safe Boating Week.

All boaters should be able to signal for help. Boaters must have U.S. Coast Guard-approved day and night signals for vessels when required signaling devices are recommended while operating on the water.

Signaling devices consist of both pyrotechnic and non-pyrotechnic, such as pyrotechnic red flares and

orange smoke used for night and day distress signaling, respectively. Non-pyrotechnic devices include orange distress flags (day only) and electric distress signals (night only).

Each of these devices has an expiration date and a different operating/burning time. Check the label for currency and to see how long each pyrotechnic device will remain illuminated. Choose a device best suited to the conditions in the area where your vessel is typically used; other signaling devices include but are not limited to flashlights, whistles, signal mirrors and horns.

The Coast Guard also recommends boaters equip their boat with an emergency position indicating radio beacon. An EPIRB is an economical safety device that automatically transmits an emergency signal when it is placed or floating in the upright position. The signal allows the Coast Guard and other rescue agencies to pinpoint your exact location. Now small enough to be carried in your pocket, the device is designed to send an accurate location as well as identifying information to rescue authorities immediately upon activation.

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

Retirement – Not Resignation – of Robert Petzel

Last Friday's announcement regarding VA Undersecretary for Health Robert Petzel's resignation is the pinnacle of disingenuous political double speak. Petzel was already scheduled to retire in 2014, and President Obama has already announced his intention to nominate Petzel's replacement, so characterizing this as a "resignation" just doesn't pass the smell test.

Desperate to get ahead of delays in care crisis growing by the day, yet apparently unwilling to take substantive actions to hold any of its leaders accountable for negligence harming veterans, VA has resorted to what it does best: splitting semantic hairs to create the illusion of accountability and progress. After Secretary Shinseki's out-of-touch performance at the Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs hearing last week, I was disappointed. After receiving the announcement of Petzel's "resignation," I am even more disillusioned.

Dear Mr. President...

For almost a year, I have been asking for President Obama's personal involvement in helping fix the crisis at the VA and have been pleading with him and with top Department of Veterans Affairs leaders to take immediate steps to stop the growing pattern of preventable veteran deaths and hold accountable any and all VA employees who have allowed patients to slip through the cracks.

In response, we've received disturbing silence from the White House and one excuse after another from the VA. Right now, President Obama is faced with a stark choice: take immediate action to help us end the culture of complacency engulfing the Veterans Health Administration and compromising patient safety, or explain to the American people and America's veterans why we should tolerate the status quo.

House Veterans' Affairs Committee Oversight Mississippi Visit

One of the most important roles I have as Chairman of the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs is to conduct proper oversight of the Department of Veterans Affairs to ensure it is upholding its duty

June 1 marks the beginning of the Federal red snapper recreational fishing season and with the Gulf red snapper fishery more robust than ever before, one

would think that private anglers and for-hire businesses would be elated with the season's start just days away.

However, with the ruling earlier this month that drastically cut the federal recreational red snapper season from 40 days to 11 days, and an emergency ruling issued just last week by NOAA and the National Marine Fisheries Service shortening the season even further to just nine days, recreational anglers and those part of the for-hire industry are justifiably right to be outraged at the current federal management regime that keeps hitting them with the shortest recreational seasons on record.

Simply shortening the federal season, without addressing the failed management of the fishery (which is the real emergency), is just another attempt by the federal government to further kick the can down the road at the expense of the entire angling community and especially the livelihoods that depend on it. It is unfortunate that this seems to have become the norm, and it is simply unacceptable.

I have introduced legislation, H.R. 3099, the Gulf of Mexico Red Snapper Conservation Act, which would end federal mismanagement of snapper and place stewardship of this important resource in the hands of state authorities, and I am committed to working with stakeholders along the Gulf and my colleagues in Congress to ensure that we chart a new path forward for red snapper management.

FRANKLIN COUNTY

While conducting park patrol within the St. George Island State Park, Officer Nelson performed an oyster size tolerance inspection on a commercial oyster harvester who was returning to the vessel ramp from Apalachicola Bay. The inspection revealed that the harvester was in possession of 52% undersized oysters in the bag that was inspected. Officer Nelson issued the harvester a misdemeanor citation for the violation and 246 oysters were seized and returned to the water alive.

Officer Allen was patrolling Bald Point State Park when he noticed two vehicles in the parking lot. One of the vehicles was not displaying an entry pass. Officer Allen went down to the beach and made contact with the owners of the vehicle. When one of the individuals reached into a bag for some money to pay for the entrance fee, Officer Allen noticed a small bag of what appeared to be marijuana. The individual tried to quickly hide the contents. When asked about the contents of the bag, the individual said it was "weed." After consent was given to search the bag, Officer Allen found two small bags of marijuana. The individual then gave up a marijuana cigarette. The individual was charged with possession of less than 20 grams.

Officers Allen and Harrison were working in Apalachicola Bay when they noticed a vessel harvesting oysters in an area that was closed to the harvest of shellfish. There were two people harvesting oysters from

the vessel, one of which was a juvenile. Officer Harrison issued the adult a citation for harvesting oysters in a temporarily closed area.

Officers Allen and Harrison noticed a vessel with three people harvesting oysters near St. George Island. An inspection of the vessels revealed eight bags of oysters. During a size tolerance inspection of one bag, it was found to contain 52.6% undersized oysters. Each person was issued a citation for possession of undersized oysters. One individual did not possess a valid Apalachicola Bay Oyster License and was issued a citation for the violation.

Officers Allen, Anderson, and Harrison were on patrol in Apalachicola Bay when

they noticed several people fishing under the Highway 98 Bridge near Eastpoint. They noticed one individual carry an ice chest up the bank and then return to fishing. The officers conducted a resource inspection and found the individual to be in possession of 13 undersized redfish. Officer Anderson issued the individual a citation for over the bag limit of redfish. The fish were seized as evidence.

Officer Anderson was on patrol in Eastpoint near the Highway 98 Bridge when he noticed an individual fishing from the shore. He conducted a resource inspection and found the individual in possession of 13 undersized redfish and 1 undersized sea trout. Officer Anderson issued the individual a citation for

over the bag limit of redfish and undersized redfish. A warning was issued for the undersized sea trout.

Officers Anderson, Mallow, Harrison, and Allen were on land patrol in Eastpoint near the Patton Drive Boat Ramp when they observed a commercial oyster vessel with four people on board returning to the ramp. Officer Anderson conducted a boating safety and resource inspection of the vessel and found six bags of oysters on board. A size tolerance inspection of one bag of oysters showed 69.6% undersized and uncultured. Each occupant of the vessel was charged with possession of undersized and uncultured oysters. The six bags of oysters were returned to the water alive. One of the individuals had an active

warrant out of Gulf County and was booked into the Franklin County Jail.

GADSDEN COUNTY

Officer Johnson cited an individual for taking freshwater game fish by illegal method. The subject was catching bream with a cast net near the Jim Woodruff Dam.

Officer Forehand was on patrol at the Jim Woodruff Dam when he observed two subjects cast netting from the shoreline in a wooded area just south of the dam. With the water high, he knew there was a good possibility of numerous fish being stacked up in the backwaters near the dam. From a concealed position, he watched the subjects cast net numerous game fish and place them in a bucket. After approximately an hour, he made contact with the subjects and found them in possession of over 30 different freshwater game fish to include black bass, striped bass and bream. All evidence was seized and appropriate citations were issued.

LIBERTY COUNTY

Lieutenant Parker cited an individual for running deer with dogs during closed season in the Camel Lake area of the Apalachicola National Forest.

SANTA ROSA COUNTY

Investigators Schafer and Hughes worked a case regarding a group, known as the Gulf Coast Jeep Club, damaging public lands and driving off designated roads in jeeps within the Blackwater State Forest and Eglin Wildlife Management Area (WMA). The investigators were able to identify several of the

vehicles, drivers, and locations of the violations from surveillance videos obtained through several different sources. Six citations were issued to five individuals for operating a vehicle off of designated roads within the Blackwater State Forest and the Eglin Wildlife Management Area.

Officer Lewis was patrolling the Blackwater State Forest when he observed a large group of people on a sandbar. While approaching them, he observed one man pass something to a woman. Officer Lewis approached her and asked what she was holding. The woman stated that it was a joint. She further admitted that she had rolled several marijuana cigarettes for her canoe trip and had given several out to friends. Officer Lewis located a Ziploc bag containing 12 cannabis cigarettes along with two hydrocodone pills. The drugs were seized and the woman was issued a notice to appear for possession of not more than 20 grams of cannabis, possession of drug paraphernalia, and possession of a prescription drug without a valid prescription.

OKALOOSA COUNTY

Officers Tison and Yates investigated an incident involving illegal dumping activity along the Choctawhatchee River. They interviewed a subject after Officer Tison received information the subject had discarded building debris into the river. Some of the debris was located and identified as what had been discarded. The subject admitted to throwing the debris into the river. The subject was charged with criminal littering.

AccuWeather reports mild season

Two U.S. landfalls predicted

AccuWeather.com reported following a season with the fewest number of hurricanes since 1982, the 2014 Atlantic hurricane season is expected to follow suit as a below-normal hurricane season.

With roughly 10 named tropical storms, five hurricanes and two major hurricanes predicted for the Atlantic Basin this season, AccuWeather.com's long-range forecasting team anticipates two storms, either tropical storms or hurricanes, to make landfall in the United States.

Atlantic Hurricane Season Key Points:

1. AccuWeather.com is predicting a below-normal hurricane season.
2. Tropical development this season may be altered by the onset of El Niño in late summer or fall.
3. Areas from the central



and eastern Gulf of Mexico up through the East Coast will be most vulnerable for impacts from a tropical system.

The onset of El Niño, a short-term phenomenon associated with above-normal water temperatures in the equatorial Pacific, may alter weather patterns across the globe. At some point this summer, El Niño will likely increase wind shear across portions of the Atlan-

tic basin and thus suppress the development of tropical storms this season.

"If we have a robust El Niño develop, then the numbers will be much lower and this could be one of the least active years in recent memory," AccuWeather.com Senior Meteorologist Dan Kottowski said.

If the 2014 season falls short of normal, it would only be the fourth below-normal season in 20 years,

according to NOAA.

The official start of hurricane season, June 1, 2014, could be ushered in by one or two storms in June or July, according to Kottowski.

However, most storms and the best potential for landfall will be on the horizon for the basin during the heart of hurricane season, which occurs later in the summer and into fall, in the months of August, September and October.



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

A TRUE GO-GETTER

Bobelle Sconiers Harrell, a daughter of Northwest Florida who wouldn't take no for an answer during the most trying time in recent history, soon will receive a prestigious award for her bravery in the Civil Air Patrol, the Congressional Medal of Honor. It will be awarded posthumously, sometime in the coming months, to her daughter.

"She wanted to graduate early from school, and she did," said Tracy Ward of Milton, Harrell's daughter. "She wanted to be a pharmacist, and she did. She wanted to learn to fly, and she did. She wanted to own her own pharmacy one day. And she did."

Ward said her mother made decisions and saw them through. Harrell married her first husband, Ewart Sconiers, after high school.

"The last she saw of him was on the airplane shipping out," Ward said. Sconiers was a hero bombardier, saving many lives before his plane went down over Poland. He was a captured German prisoner of war. He died Jan. 21, 1944, while Harrell was in school.

"Before he left, he told my mother to go on to college and get her degree as they planned," Ward said. "But despite the hardship, she went to what was then Alabama Polytechnic Institute, which would eventually become Auburn University. She was the first graduating female pharmacist in that institution and graduated with the highest honors." It was during her time in Anniston, Ala., working in a pharmacy that she decided she wanted to fly, Ward said.

"Her first solo flight was April 5, 1945," she said.

Ward has a treasure from her mother, which is a hand written journal of her time learning to fly. Ward shared an excerpt, reading, "With all the hours behind us, we are doing landings and takeoffs now. Nine-four is my plane. I like it because it won't bounce."

Ward said her mother earned her pilot's license Aug. 20, 1945. It was just after reaching this goal she joined the Civil Air Patrol.

Ward said her mother

met her father while working in Moulton's Pharmacy in Pensacola.

"She was the first woman pharmacist in Northwest Florida," Ward said. "I'm one of five girls, and we all learned how to work." Her parents built and operated Harrell's Drug Store in what is now called Brentwood Shopping Center. Her parents owned the store from 1956 through 1982. Although not a lot is recorded about women pilots serving their country, Ward said because she has proof of her service, her mother will receive the honor.

"They (women in Civil Air Patrol) served this country, too," she said. "They kept the home front going, participating in wartime missions and were armed to protect."

She said it's sad her mother will not be able to receive it herself as she died two years ago. "She died Feb. 6, 2012."

Ward said more information has been uncovered about Sconiers, and they're trying to bring him home.

"My mother never knew the truth of what happened to him," she said. "She thought he was buried in a mass grave. Recently, they've found him, revealing that wasn't the case and will bring him home soon."

He played his collegiate years as an Argo before accepting his first coaching position at Jay High School, where he spent nine years as a Jay Royal, followed by accepting the head varsity coaching position for baseball at Pace.

He also serves as dean of students for the Patriots.

Warner has averaged more than 20 wins per season. His Patriots have been to five state final four tournaments and captured two state championships and one ESPN FAB 50 National Title.

The list of athletes he has influenced to play collegiate baseball is lengthy, as is the number of his players selected to play Major League Baseball.

In 2010, Warner was selected as the national coach of the year. He also has been selected twice as state coach of the year along with numerous other

recognitions.

"Other than actually playing the game I love, I can not think of a better profession to be in," he said. 'He is safe' 54 years later

Fifty-four years of anything is a long time for one person to remain committed. A 54-year marriage is a true blessing. Being employed at one position for that long is unheard of. Being an umpire for 54 years is nothing!

Fifty-four years of remaining committed to area youth and athletes all the while blowing the umpire whistle and determining if one is out or safe continues the commitment of Philip Brainard.

Brainard is full of stories, remembering the most unique details of ballgames from many years past. Not only does his recollection of athletes and games go on forever, he remembers the really important things as well. Brainard makes connections with the fans, the parents and the coaches. He links families from numerous generations together with stories of umpiring an uncle's game or specifically one's own game from more than 30 years ago.

He notices as the years pass and youth mature into adults and bring their own children to play a game that he still loves and umpires.

"I love doing this," he said. "I came to know my Lord under the pastoring of Dayton Hobbs."

Pastor and educator Hobbs, who died in 2006, was the inventor of T-ball. T-ball is played throughout the United States and other countries. Hobbs and his wife were the founders of Grace Bible Church, Santa Rosa Christian School and Gospel Projects Youth Athletic Club. Hobbs was a resident of Bagdad.

"I was introduced to this through his leadership, and here I still am," Brainard said.

Under Hobbs' guidance, Brainard grew and developed his own spiritual beliefs as well as the love for athletics and youth.

Brainard has remained true to the legacy Hobbs created, as have the children of Brainard.

Brainard umpired his first game in April 1960, and now, in 2014, he looks ahead to the 2014 Tee-Ball World Series, which will be June 12-17 in the ballpark of Gospel Projects.

Memorial Day typically means major fire for Florida Forest Service

When thinking of Memorial Day, some relate the celebration to beaches; others think of backyard cookouts or baseball games. For wild land firefighters and the personnel of the Florida Forest Service's Blackwater Forestry Center, however, the days and weeks around

Memorial Day typically mean a big fire or two.

Though Florida experiences wildfires year round, spring time traditionally is the height of the season across the state. In the three counties within the Blackwater response area, Escambia, Santa Rosa and Okaloosa, the window can be narrowed down even more.

"Right around Memorial Day, we usually see some pretty significant fire activity," said David Smith, operations administrator for the district. "We get rain in April and early May that will prompt new growth and add to the fuel on the ground, and then we typically get a drying period of a week, maybe two weeks, which usually

produces some of our more difficult fire conditions."

Current forecasts show no rain in the next week or so. In the past few days, moderate winds and low humidity helped dry out vegetative fuels after the recent rains. This lines up with historical patterns helping make Memorial Day week busy for the FFS.

During the past 10 years, Blackwater has an average of about 16 wildfires from May 20 to June 10, the 21 days centered on the holiday. During the past four years, each of the season peaks produced at least one fire larger than 50 acres causing a significant impact on residents, roads or the public in general.

Gulf recreational red snapper season opens May 24 statewide

The recreational red snapper season in Gulf state waters opens Saturday, May 24, and will remain open through July 14, a total of 52 days, closing July 15.

This season was set at the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission meeting in April. Opening the season the Saturday before Memorial Day will provide recreational red snapper fishing opportunities through an important holiday weekend, helping attract more visitors and bringing economic benefits to our coastal communities.

The federal season will be 9 days, starting June 1 and remaining open through June 9, closing June 10.

Florida state waters in the Gulf are from shore to 9 nautical miles. Federal waters extend from where state waters end out to about 200 nautical miles.

The daily bag limit for red snapper will remain two per person in Gulf state and federal waters. The minimum size limit is 16 inches total length. There is a zero daily bag and possession limit for captain and crew of for-



hire vessels.

Recreational anglers targeting reef fish such as red snapper in Gulf state and federal waters are required to use dehooking devices and non-offset, non-stainless steel circle hooks when fishing with natural bait. These devices are designed to help increase the likelihood a fish will survive if it is released. Venting tools are no longer required when

targeting reef fish. This requirement was removed to allow fishermen the freedom to use the methods or tools of their choosing when releasing reef fish.

Florida's 'big kids' just got a safety boost

For several years, Florida has been the most dangerous state for children between the ages of 4 and 10 traveling in vehicles. Florida is currently one of only two states in the nation that lacks a booster seat bill for older children and the only state that allows 4-year-olds to ride in an adult seat belt.

Booster seats are needed for the simple reason that seat belts are designed to fit adults — specifically the "average" adult male. When a child under age 8 (on average) or under 4-foot-9

and 80 pounds sits in an adult seat belt, the lap belt tends to ride up onto his or her stomach. In a crash, the belt tightens to keep the child from being ejected. It cuts through the soft stomach, and the first bone to stop it is the spinal cord. This is known as "seat belt syndrome." It can cause severe injuries including internal bleeding and even paralysis. A booster seat "boosts" the child up about 6 inches so the belt fits below the stomach and can restrain the child properly without causing injury. Using a booster seat reduces your child's risk of

injury by about 60 percent.

In Florida, some kids are about to get a safety "boost." The Florida House and Senate just passed the revisions to Florida Statute 316.613 with Bill 225. If signed by Gov. Rick Scott, the new regulations will take effect Jan. 1, 2015. The new law will require children aged 4 and 5 years old to travel in a car seat or booster, not an adult seat belt. Unpaid drivers who are not in the child's immediate family, children being transported for medical emergencies and children with a medical condition necessitating an exception

are exempt from the law.

Though this law by no means provides adequate protection for Florida's older children, it is at least a step in the right direction. By a slim margin, Florida will no longer be the most unsafe state in the nation for child passengers.
