Santa Rosa Democratic Party supports women

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MILTON — The Santa Rosa Democratic Party works to empower local women, during Women's History Month and all year long, according to chairwoman Sarah Coutu.

"Women right now are the ones that are out there screaming the loudest," Coutu said. "We're the ones running for office more right now, and I think our current administration is to blame for that. The Democratic Party is excited about it."

According to Coutu, the SRDP hopes to level the playing field and see a more diverse group of representatives within the government.

"Right now we have so many men representatives that I don't think they're representing the entire population," Coutu said. "We would like to see minorities. We would like to see women, women of color and have what our country looks like representing us."

For the month of March — Women's History Month — Coutu and the SRDP decided to reach out to Santa Rosa County's teacher of the year, Erin Cosky of Gulf Breeze High School, to be the guest speaker at their March meeting.

"I wanted to find someone in Santa Rosa County that we could celebrate for doing something that was a woman," Coutu said. "Sure enough, the last two years [at least], teacher of the year were both women."

Locally, the SRDP supports teachers and their push for a salary increase. The organization collected more than 1,100 local signatures last year in support of the salary increase.

"We feel that teachers shouldn't have to work part-time side jobs to afford doing what they love as educators," Coutu said.

In addition, the organization started a Feed the Kids program last year by reaching out to local schools, finding out how many homeless children they had that weren't able to receive help from other programs to receive food, and donating backpacks of food.

Report: Santa Rosa County drops five ranks from previous year

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MILTON — Santa Rosa County ranks 12th of the 67 Florida counties for overall health outcomes, according to the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute's recently released 2018 County Health Rankings. The county has fallen five spots from No. 7 in 2017, according to this data.

Premature death is up to 6,900 per 100,000 residents,

up from 6,500 in 2017. While the number of deaths under age 75 caused by cancer has decreased, the number of deaths from heart disease, accidents, chronic lower respiratory diseases and suicide have all increased.

In 2017, Santa Rosa County ranked fifth for quality of life. According to the report, the county currently ranks 10th due to a rise in reported poor physical and mental health days.

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PACE — Five years after deciding to start a faith-based private school, L.E.A.D. Academy's founder and Principal

Frank Lay stood in a 30-acre plot of land, surrounded by friends and family, prepared to continue serving the students who share his same vision.

On the morning of March 17, Lay gathered with his employees, students and their families

for a groundbreaking ceremony on the 30-acre parcel of land on the southwest corner of Joppa Road and Chumuckla Highway in Pace — the future home of L.E.A.D. Academy's newest campus.

The school currently has

two campuses on Berryhill and Woodbine Roads, but the newest project will include an additional seven classroom pods, athletic fields, a gymnasium and an agricultural field.

County completes first half-cent sales tax project

Sweet Bay Bridge is open for traffic

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PACE — Santa Rosa County held a ribbon cutting March 16 for the newly built Sweet Bay Bridge, the county's first large infrastructure project funded by the Local Option Sales Tax. Sweet Bay Drive is scheduled for repaving in the

coming weeks.

The bridge — which is 125 feet long — the county built to replace a series of culverts on Sweet Bay Drive at the crossing of Barnett Mill Creek. The estimated cost for the project was roughly \$250,000.

Workers began on-site construction Jan. 5, and the county's public works staff put in more than 2,500 hours of labor to install the bridge, according to a press release.

Religion's 'celebrities' ignoring first obligation

So, two Corinthians and a porn star walk into a bar ... Stop me if you've heard this one.

During a recent TV interview, the Rev. Robert Jeffress, a mega-church pastor from Dallas, declared that he didn't give two shekels, so to speak, about revelations the president had an affair with a porn star then paid her \$130,000 right before the 2016 election to keep quiet.

It was in keeping with some evangelicals' (mostly men) carte blanche defense of Trump's uncharitable behavior and statements — from the "Access Hollywood" scandal to his constant name-calling and bullying on Twitter as president of the United States.

But it isn't in keeping with Christianity's roots as a trouble-making, world-shaking faith that is supposed to challenge rulers not enable them.

If you've positioned yourself as a religious leader, isn't your first obligation to that which you espouse?

Miracle of mulligans

Because some evangelicals have convinced themselves that Trump shares their values, he's gotten mulligans that seem to multiply like loaves and fishes.

The same people who would have stoned Barack Obama in his tan suit had he paid a porn actress hush money didn't blink or blanch at Trump's declaration during the campaign that he has not necessarily felt the need to ask God for forgiveness — the very foundation of the faith.

But it really isn't about Donald Trump. He is who he is, and we're all hypocrites in some measure or another.

The difference is most of us know it.

The larger problem is an unwillingness of some religious leaders to do what they're being paid for, namely to tell the truth "though the heavens fall."

But truth gets us pushed outside of the tent. Saying that habitual lying is wrong, no matter who does it, is not how you get invited back to the Oval Office.

Such willful blindness instead has been couched in a victim mentality by which some Christians have convinced themselves the church is being attacked because of their beliefs.

And it isn't only Christians. While it is tempting to relegate Minister Louis Farrakhan to "Grandpa Simpson yells at cloud" status, his creaky anti-Semitism and ridiculous claims that Jews secretly run the FBI can't be ignored, not when words can encircle the world in a click.

Such demagoguery puts people in harm's way.

The first Christians, by the way, weren't martyred because they believed in Jesus. The Roman Empire included hundreds of deities; they couldn't have cared less. The early church

was attacked and martyred because its members publicly declared their first allegiance was to Jesus, not to Caesar.

Loved after death

That meant telling the empire the truth about itself, its injustices, abuses and greed, and its subjugation of weaker nations and their people.

It's what real prophets do, and why no one likes them.

Jesus himself is proof that everyone loves you once you're dead. In life, his most ardent followers were the poor and powerless, not the religious leaders who had everything to lose.

For every Christian celebrity like the Rev. Paula White and Jerry Falwell, there are millions of clergy who never will be featured on cable news nor do lunch at Mar-A-Lago. They are overworked and underpaid, and news about their good works rarely makes it beyond the neighborhoods and parishes they serve.

Some people are floating the theory the Rev. Billy Graham's death was a prophetic sign, though his being 99 more likely had something to do with it.

Lost in all the accolades were Graham's regrets over keeping quiet during the civil rights movement and for involving himself in politics.

If Graham's death was indeed a sign, it appears he got out just in time.

The project will officially begin in the coming weeks after permitting from the county is complete. The construction will cost approximately \$7.5 million and take over 18 months to complete. In the meantime, L.E.A.D. Academy will look for additional space in local churches to accommodate the number of children they serve.

Lay, the former principal at Pace High School, has always had strong beliefs about the inclusion of faith in education. In 2008, those beliefs landed him and the Santa Rosa County School District, in the middle of a legal battle against the American Civil Liberties Union. The ACLU accused Lay and the district of promoting their religious beliefs in an academic setting.

In 2010, Lay retired from the school district and began his journey to promote leadership,

enthusiasm, attitude and discipline – L.E.A.D.

L.E.A.D. Academy began with just 30 students in 2013 and has grown to approximately 400. Their motto "laus deo simper," Latin for "Praise be to God Always," reflects their mission of allowing students to grow in adulthood with a Christian worldview.

The SRDP supports a "livable wage" of \$15 per hour, and equal pay for equal work.

"We feel this will help lift families out of poverty," Coutu said. "No mother or father should have to work two full-time jobs to support their family."

The SRDP is a political organization that supports democratic candidates to run for office.

The organization offers campaign training for candidates and volunteers interested in helping elect democrats. According to Coutu, the organization has a greater number of women than men.

Democratic Executive Committee has a current membership of about 70 percent women. Each of the four democratic clubs, caucuses and committees in Santa Rosa County – Democratic Women's Club, Democratic Black Caucus, Democratic Executive Committee and

Young Democrats – are all led by women, as well.

However, there are a number of men in leadership positions.

"We want to support equality across the board," Coutu said. "We hope to encourage, inspire and empower women to aspire to reach their dreams."

The SRDP recently encouraged two local women to start and become presidents of two local chapters of the Santa Rosa County Democratic Black Caucus and Santa Rosa Young Democrats.

"Our current administration has inspired women and minorities nationwide to run for office. We... could not be more excited about that," Coutu said. "We need to realize as a community and as a country that women and minorities are not second-class citizens."

Pace business owners offer aura photography, hypnosis

PACE — It wasn't a single, defining moment in Sue Heiney's life that inspired her to begin practicing a spiritual lifestyle and holistic health, but a series of incidents that led her there.

Heiney runs her business, Celestial Inspirations, with her daughter, Taryn. They offer new-age products such as aromatherapy candles, healing crystals and essential oils as well as services like hypnosis, aura pictures and chakra readings.

Heiney is a certified hypnotist from the Edward Cayce Association for Research and Enlightenment.

"I've always been interested in the questions that could not be answered in Sunday school," Heiney said.

When Heiney's mother was gravely ill, Heiney decided to get a crystal reading at a local shop. The things Heiney heard from the medium, a stranger, couldn't have been known without some sort of celestial power, according to Heiney.

"From there, I just started going by the shop more often, and I'd... go for a class here and there, and I'd read books, everything under the sun I could get my hands on," Heiney said. "I decided I was going to do hypnosis, so I went to Virginia Beach to the Edward Casey Society."

Heiney, a former educator, opened her first shop in 2004. Her daughter ran the business while she continued to teach school. About three years later, she closed the shop, she said, due to the poor economy.

Her husband passed away approximately five months later, and Heiney said she couldn't return to the shop. She brought all of her goods to her home and stored them in the garage. Later, Heiney's brother helped her close in half of the garage once used for their RV and turn it into a shop.

Now, Heiney and Taryn go to fairs and provide spiritual services there as well as in the shop.

"What I tell people when I'm looking at their aura pictures is not necessarily what comes out on the printout," Heiney said. "I tell them what my angels are telling me to tell them... I don't hear angels talking to me. It's like the thoughts just pop into my head."

According to Heiney, it was a customer with the ability to read auras that alerted Heiney to get her throat examined by a doctor. She soon found out she had an issue with her left thyroid gland and had half of it removed.

"I never saw that lady again," Heiney said. "I honestly do not know if that was a real person or an angel."

Kirlian photography involves converting a person's aura — energy — into a visual format, according to Taryn.

Auras have different colors with associated meanings, according to Heiney. Violet relates to magic. White means peace and balance. Blue means tranquil. Green has to do with hard work. Yellow means joy. Orange relates to creativity.



Nice, France's fifth-largest city, has a storied past. Suffice to say its food, architecture and culture have been influenced by Greeks, Italians and Spaniards before ending up in the hands of the Emperor Napoleon III of France in 1860.

Nice makes a worthy base for exploring the Côte d'Azur, with its combination of clean air from nearby mountains and sea spray from the Mediterranean coast.

I wholeheartedly began my immersion into this sunny French melting pot with a lesson in Niçoise.

In Nice, restaurants that have earned the certification Cuisine Nissarde may adorn their front doors with an official sticker to alert diners to a truly authentic menu. The recipes prepared are meant to preserve the area's culinary traditions stemmed from economic struggles of years past, when head-to-tail cooking was essential and ingredients were more likely to come from the land rather than the sea.

Lou Ballico is one such restaurant. In a nod to its Spanish-influenced food, the interior walls are filled with bull and bullfighting art.

Lunch began with

a Niçoise version of a mesclun (which means "mess of everything") salad, topped with Niçoise olives, celery, tomatoes and radishes.

It was followed by a dish that typified Niçoise homemade cooking: daube du boeuf accompanied by delicious herb ravioli. Dessert, worth every calorie, was a torte de blette: Blette is a type of spinach the chef combined with sweet apples.

When in Nice, a promenade at sunset will allow you to absorb the exquisite beauty that surrounds you on all sides. But once the sun sets, you'll want to head into the lounge at Nice's most storied and stunning Hotel Negresco for a glass of wine and a carafe of ambiance.

If luxury had a scent, it would be of polished burled wood, the kind that lines the bar at this historic five-star hotel, where one sip of a balanced and buttery grand cru Chablis will surely lead to another.

Food shopping is yet another luxurious activity, especially inside the majestic Patisserie Confiserie Henri Auer, a dreamy dollhouse filled with confections. Outside is a marketplace of fresh-cut blooms as well as bins of candied flowers for consumption.

Remove bats before bat maternity season starts

TALLAHASSEE — For those with bats roosting in their attic, eaves or chimney spaces, now is the time to give them an eviction notice, according to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. Bat maternity season begins April 15 and runs through August 15. Exclusions of bat colonies must be completed before the season starts.

"During bat maternity season, bats gather to give birth and raise their young," Terry Doonan, an FWC biologist and mammal conservation coordinator said. "The season lasts until the young bats can fly and feed themselves. In Florida, this occurs from mid-April through mid-August for most bat species."

Bat exclusions are illegal during this maternity season to prevent young bats that cannot yet fly from being trapped inside structures and dying.

Florida is home to 13 resident bat species, including threatened

species such as the Florida bonneted bat. Some bat species roost in artificial structures, including buildings and houses. Although it is illegal to harm or kill bats in Florida, guidelines have been developed allowing for the legal exclusion of bats outside of the maternity season.

Exclusion guidelines on how to remove bats from buildings can be found at MyFWC.com/Bats. Materials and methods to exclude bats can affect the success of that process.

Bats are beneficial to people and are an important part of the ecosystem, according to the FWC. The state's native bats help keep insect populations under control, with the average bat eating hundreds of insects a night. In addition to the benefit of keeping mosquitoes and other insects at bay for residents enjoying the outdoors, the value of insect suppression by bats to U.S. agriculture has been estimated to be in the billions of dollars.

Here are three ways Florida residents and

visitors can help bats:

- Preserve natural roost sites, including trees with cavities and peeling bark. Dead fronds left on palms can also provide roosting spots for bats.
- Put up a bat house.
- Report unusual bat behavior to: MyFWC.com/BatMortality.

Bats can carry rabies. Although infected bats may not become aggressive, like any other wild animal, they can bite to defend themselves if handled. Don't touch or go near any wild animal, especially one that's not acting normally. For more information about rabies, visit the Florida Department of Health website at FloridaHealth.gov.

FWC staff members are working to learn more and share information about Florida's bats. For more information on Florida's bats, go to MyFWC.com/Bats. For assistance, contact the closest FWC Regional Office to speak with a regional wildlife assistance biologist for more information.

Plank move will give you challenge

When working out, everyone has their own style and ideal of what it should consist of. Many do only cardio activities, others flock to weightlifting exclusively. We have our cross-trainers, cross-fitters and yogis, as well. Bottom line is if it's

working for you, then you are on the right path to fitness. It's great to cover all your bases. A little bit of everything keeps the body guessing and not becoming complacent.

Our move today is a plank with alternating levers, a challenge no matter your level of fitness. All you need is a flat surface to lay your

yoga mat on. This move will focus on your whole core, but by adding alternating levers, you will be working your upper and lower body as well. This move focuses on balance, too and everyone will benefit from that.

Begin this move by positioning yourself on your hands and knees. If your balance is compromised, keep your

starting point here and add your levers in. Otherwise, you will extend your legs out on your toes, and hold your body in a planking position for your starting point.

Lift your left arm and right leg at the same time, reaching your arm straight out in front of you and extending your leg straight behind. Keep this extension

slow and methodical. Once you reach and extend, return to starting position and proceed with the opposite arm and leg. Continue this alternating move for at least eight to 10 extensions on each side.

Take a short break then move on to your next set. Give yourself at least three sets of 10 extensions to really feel

this move. This exercise is great on its own, but even better added to a routine for variety and to keep your body changing for the better.

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County to begin search for courthouse design-build team

MILTON — The Santa Rosa County Board of County Commissioners approved March 15 to move forward with a timeline of events for hiring a design-build team to start work on the courthouse project.

At February's planning workshop, the board agreed

to move forward with the courthouse project via a design-build project delivery, according to County Administrator Dan Schebler.

According to a memo from Schebler, the county will select a design-builder using price and non-price qualifications.



In this specific type of project, the design-builder is responsible for managing the details of the design and construction. The design-builder also accepts risks for designing and constructing the project in accordance with the owner's criteria.

The county staff recommended the advertisement of a request for qualifications for a design-build team to take on the courthouse project,

based solely on qualifications.

County staff put together a timeline for finding a design-build team, which includes:

- Publishing an RFQ by March 30
- Allowing a 6-week response period for proposals, ending May 11
- Having the Evaluation Committee review and short list the proposals by June 8
- Presenting the short list to the BOCC for approval

June 11
• Holding a special meeting for presentation and selection

June 19
• Negotiating and finalizing a contract by July 26
• Submitting a notice to proceed for the courthouse design by August 1

The board voted to move forward with the plan and submit an RFQ.

Transportation services for vets to end

MILTON — Transportation services provided by the nonprofit group Santa Rosa Vets to VA Clinics will be discontinued at the end of March.

For the past five years Santa Rosa Vets to VA Clinics

has provided transportation for Santa Rosa County veterans to and from the Joint Ambulatory Care Center and the Veterans Affairs Clinic in Pensacola. The program will end March 31 due to lack of funds.

Shawn Ward, the transportation planner for Santa Rosa County, said the program was eliminated after the county's Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund grant was cut by \$87,917. According to a press release

from the county, the funding cut was due in part to the new distribution formula used by the state for Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund allocations. Direct costs to Santa Rosa Vets to VA Clinics averaged \$2,000 to \$4,000 monthly, so it could no longer afford to operate.

"It was a trickle-down effect," Ward said.

The Vets to VA Clinics provided free rides twice a week to some 90 registered veterans. It originally was funded by an Elk's Lodge grant before it became a 501(c)(3) nonprofit.

"Veterans either had to take a taxi cab — which cost about \$100 — to the clinic or they simply weren't going," Ward said.

The group made 395 trips totaling 15,297 miles last year.

Santa Rosa County does have a transportation system, but it is unlike Escambia County Area Transit or Emerald Coast

Rider in that the county offers a door-to-door service. Residents must call to reserve a time, and the program stays booked out at least a month. Veterans will now compete for those rides, Ward said.

"We've had some calls from clients who were worried about their rides," he added.

Ward said there are other options for veterans. One possibility is the local Disabled American Veterans shuttle bus, which takes veterans from Eglin Air Force Base to the VA Clinic in Pensacola three days a week.

"If they can add a stop in Santa Rosa County, veterans may have an easier time getting a ride to the stop," Ward said.

Veterans needing transportation to the clinic are eligible for the Transportation Disadvantaged Program and should contact Santa Rosa Transportation at 850-626-6806.

place April 10. Two public hearings are required to pass an ordinance.

"If Mayor Meiss had been here tonight, I was going to read to him from the city charter that gives him the power, after you pass an ordinance — which is basically what you're attempting to do with this overlay — to veto it," Milton resident Mary Golden said.

Golden was going to

personally ask the mayor to veto what he knows is not right, she said, because the north end of Elmira Street is not a bar district. It has churches and historic homes.

"North Elmira is not a place for stand-alone bars," Golden said. "Don't take our way of living away from us. We've spent a lot of money restoring our historic homes. Leave us alone."

Milton resident Frances McDonald said she will work hard to change the ordinance if it passes.

"You don't understand

because you don't live there," McDonald said. "I'm speaking for the whole historic district. It needs to be protected... preserved...enjoyed."

None of the properties on North Elmira Street are in an area where a bar or tavern could be established, according to Jorgenson, without a religious institution first opting out of the 500-foot-separation law.

Several residents approached the council opposed to the overlay district, and City Attorney Heather Lindsay read a letter

by Barrie Bamberg of Milton with suggestions for success in the city.

"Let's work to prove we have something better to offer than drunks on barstools, which is what the drinking-only establishments of the area have," Bamberg said in her letter.

According to Milton resident Theresa Messick, she has a petition signed by more than 60 people located in and around the historic district opposing the overlay district.

Resident and busi-

suggested giving existing investors in the area the opportunity to opt out of allowing bars or taverns near their property, like the churches. Jorgenson said he would need to look into whether that is allowed.

Lowery called the question — a vote to end discussion — after more than an hour. Snow seconded and the motion passed.

The council then voted on the original motion, to move forward with the overlay district and hold a public hearing, which also passed.
