## Youth Program celebrates one year in Northwest Florida

*Editor's Note: This continues our Celebrate Community series on nonprofit organizations that improve Santa Rosa County residents' quality of life.*

MILTON — The National Youth Advocate Program — a national non-profit organization that recruits and educates parents on providing foster homes to children experiencing and array of challenges — is coming up on the one-year anniversary of its Northwest Florida circuit.

The local organization is based in Pensacola, but employees travel to all counties between Walton and Escambia to work with foster families.

"We are currently licensing homes for children and youth ages 10 to 17 with mild to moderate medical, mental health, behavioral and developmental needs," NYAP therapist Sara Passaro said. "We currently have three enhanced homes and a fourth that is about to open, spanning across Circuit 1."

NYAP staff are actively recruiting for homes. Foster homes are especially needed in Santa Rosa County, Passaro said, where there are currently no homes able to provide the level of care required for NYAP.

In the coming weeks, NYAP will hold informational sessions across all four Northwest Florida counties that will be posted on their Facebook page, NYAP of NW Florida. Staff will also meet one-on-one with individuals interested in becoming fosters.

When someone decides they are ready to become a foster parent, NYAP schedules trainings, assists with paperwork and helps the prospective foster parent complete all necessary background checks. Once licensed, NYAP staff supports placement stability by providing weekly in-home visits, 24/7 support for the foster families and in-home therapy for children and youth in the NYAP homes between one and three days a week.

"At NYAP," Passaro said, "we pride ourselves on being flexible and accommodating all types of different work and life schedules."

## School district changes transportation provider

MILTON — The Santa Rosa County School District recently signed a five-year contract with Student Transportation of America — a New Jersey-based company — for new school buses beginning July 1 prior to the 2018-2019 school year.

"I'm bringing to the board a change and recommend... moving to STA as our transportation provider," Superintendent Tim

Wyrosdick said at the March 15 school board meeting.

The contract will come with a fleet of 221 model year 2019 buses. The majority of the buses will be 77-seat passenger buses, with 50 wheelchair-equipped buses that seat 45. The new buses will have seat belts, GPS, radios, air conditioning and a state-of-the-art camera system.

According to the contract, the new buses must be ready two weeks before the first day of school in August.

The school district's

current transportation provider, Durham School Services has provided services since 2008. Their contract officially ends June 30.

Durham also submitted a proposal during the bidding process for a base cost of \$8.7 million. The District ranked Durham the top company, but the two were not able to reach an agreement.

"The district negotiations committee, comprised

## Not just for the dentist office

MILTON — Santa Rosa Medical Center has found a way to use nitrous oxide as an alternative to pain medication in the emergency room and in labor and delivery.

According to ER Director Jana Lyner, SRMC is the only hospital in the area to use this technology. The Pediatric Intensive Care Unit at Sacred Heart Hospital in Pensacola has the ability to use nitrous oxide on patients, but not to the scale SRMC does. Nitrous oxide is used more frequently on the east coast.

Arthur Sumrall, the previous emergency medical director, brought the technology to Lyner's attention a little more than a year ago. Lyner was on board with the idea, and brought Cardio Pulmonary Director Scott Perry in on the plan.

"We use it several different ways," Lyner said. "It's the safer alternative to medications, and for children. A lot of the medications can cause respiratory depression and can cause them to physically be ill."

Laughing gas isn't just for dentist offices anymore.

Nitrous oxide is given to patients who are undergoing procedures such as getting stitches, a close reduction on a broken wrist, or getting a cyst lanced. The ER uses the laughing gas with children mostly, and a respiratory specialist must be present. Lyner said the gas is effective with special needs children who have anxiety and experience pain differently.

"As soon as the procedure

is over and the patient breathes regular air, the nitrous [oxide] leaves their body," Lyner said. "The patient is ready to go a lot quicker. With medication, you would hold them 1.5-2 hours post medication. With nitrous [oxide], as soon as they breathe air for 5-10 minutes, they're back to normal."

After many meetings with physicians, directors and the SRMC board of directors,

and several months of clinical orientations with the company that provides the equipment, the hospital was ready to implement the technology. In fact, the ER was able to use nitrous oxide on a young patient just hours after training, according to Perry.

In labor and delivery, nitrous oxide is also used for pain control.



# Gulf Power to pass \$103M tax savings to customers

Gulf Power received unanimous approval from the Florida Public Service Commission to pass along approximately \$103 million in tax savings to its 460,000 customers. With the approval, the average residential Gulf Power customer using 1,112 kilowatt-hours per month can expect to see a \$14 drop on their monthly energy bill for 2018 — the largest decrease in company history. More than \$30 million in savings for customers will continue into 2019 and beyond.

“We’re thankful to gain approval from the Commission today so we can now quickly pass these savings on to our customers,” Gulf Power chairman, president and CEO Stan Connally said. “Gulf Power customers will benefit from this tax reduction in the form of lower energy prices beginning in their April bills.”

The tax savings are the result of federal tax

reductions under the new Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, which was signed into law on Dec. 22, 2017, and became effective on Jan. 1, 2018. The decrease in the Corporate Tax Rate from 35 percent to 21 percent reduces the amount of federal income tax Gulf Power will have to pay and allows the energy provider to pass that savings along to customers.

While the average residential Gulf Power customer who uses 1,112 kilowatt-hours per month will see a \$14 drop on their bills, customers who use more energy will see a larger decrease and those who use less, a smaller decrease.

Gulf Power worked together with the Office of Public Counsel, the Florida Industrial Power Users Group and the Southern Alliance for Clean Energy to reach a settlement on how to deliver these savings to customers as soon as possible.

The decrease comes on the heels of record consumption by Gulf Power customers during an

unusually cold January.

While Gulf Power will pass along the tax savings

to customers across Northwest Florida, the company will continue to invest in the

energy grid to maintain the safe and reliable service customers have come to expect.

# Smoke detector recall announced

TALLAHASSEE — There is a nationwide recall on roughly 450,000 Kidde smoke detectors, according to the the US Consumer Product Safety Commission. Models PI2010 and PI9010 of Kidde dual sensor (photoelectric and ionization) smoke alarms have a yellow cap that can cover one of the two smoke sensors and compromise the smoke alarm’s ability to detect smoke.

This poses an immediate and dangerous risk for Floridians

as properly functioning smoke alarms are a life-saving tool from the dangers of fire-related incidents and smoke inhalation. In 2016, more than 14,000 accidental structure fires were reported to the Florida Fire Incident Reporting System which resulted in 201 civilian fatalities.

According to State Fire Marshal Jimmy Patronis, residents should do the following:

- Remove any smoke alarms from the wall/ceiling and visually inspect it through the

opening on the side of the alarm for the presence of a yellow cap.

- Do not attempt to take apart the alarm, open the casing, or remove the yellow cap.
- If a yellow cap is present, immediately contact Kidde. Visit <https://kidde-smoke-alarm-recall.usen.expertinquiry.com/> They can replace it with a properly functioning smoke alarm.

As a reminder, smoke alarms should be tested monthly and batteries should

be changed at least once a year.

Dear editor,

Fentanyl is the strongest opiate on the streets right now and it's estimated to be 100 times more potent than morphine and 50 times stronger than heroin.

Not only is fentanyl sold on the streets as is, but it's also mixed into other drugs by dealers who have no regard for human life. All they care about is taking the addict's money. Fentanyl has recently been found not only in heroin supplies, but it's also been found in other illicit drugs like cocaine and marijuana.

Unsuspecting addicts consume the drug in the amounts they're used to, completely oblivious to the fact that they are about to ingest a lethal dose of fentanyl. Fentanyl affects the opiate receptors of the brain and crosses through the blood-brain barrier and creates an intense euphoria and addiction in the user much like heroin.

Fentanyl was originally only supposed to be indicated for cancer patients and for end-of-life pain. Fentanyl was rarely ever prescribed as a take-home medicine for chronic pain or painful disorders and never used outside of a hospital.

Not only is fentanyl available on nearly every street corner nationwide, it's also being widely distributed throughout the country after being imported from China.

In order to finally get a grip on the growing opiate epidemic, doctors need to stop over-prescribing opiates so as to not create new addicts and effective drug rehab needs to be made available to anyone who needs it.

Addiction doesn't care who you are, how you were raised or where you're from. It can affect anyone. Another person becoming an unfortunate statistic is one too many.



## Thoughtless policies lead to unintended consequences

She's so nice, they named her twice.

I met JuanJuan on vacation last week. She was incredibly sweet and her smile was kind and genuine.

I love people who have interesting stories. Maybe it's because my mother still lives in the same house she and dad owned for almost five years before I was born. I think that stability makes people whose lives have more twists and turns more interesting to me.

Knowing that most Mandarin names have important meanings, I asked JuanJuan how she got her name. I was glad that I did.

Her name means to give something, but it isn't a gift. It is more like a contribution or payment. There is a good reason she received that name.

All parents sacrifice for their children. Usually that sacrifice is a lot more indirect. In JuanJuan's case, the sacrifice was a direct contribution of more than \$3,000 United States dollars to the provincial government.

Her parents already had a son. Because of the one-child policy in China, families who stuck to the rule received monetary payments each year. If women didn't report pregnancies, a great penalty could be required. That could be a fine, imprisonment and often a forced abortion to keep the country's

policy intended to control its skyrocketing population that was threatening to destroy the country's economy and environment.

For those with the means to do so, a request could be made to pay a "baby tax" and carry the child to term.

JuanJuan's parents paid the price. Her name is a constant reminder of what she meant to her parents. That is a great story.

A couple of years ago, China expanded the one-child policy to allow an additional child for each family.

The policy wasn't changed because the country was no longer at risk to problems caused by overpopulation. In fact, the communist Chinese government learned that adjusting the policy after the population had already exploded was anything but effective.

With almost one billion people in the country, China took action. However, decades later the government saw the results of the experiment and realized they needed to change course and quickly.

The problem was as simple as 4-2-1.

Because people are living longer than ever before, having only one grandchild working in an economy to support two aging parents and four retired grandparents just isn't cost-effective. There was also the unintended consequence of Chinese parents placing a higher value on male children, thus making the world's most-populated country also its most gender imbalanced.

When governments make drastic policy changes based on one factor, they often find themselves

on the wrong side of the law of unintended consequences. If fixing overpopulation was as simple as forcing families to have no more than one child, the Chinese would have been right on target. Unfortunately, there is more than one factor at play and more than one issue that needs to be addressed. To avoid falling prey to unintended consequences, you have to understand the entire issue, be cautious in implementation of any changes and pay close attention to detail on how the changes are implemented.

That is why it is frightening to watch the current administration in the United States play with our economy like a boring video game. The Trump administration isn't thoughtful, cautious or careful.

Tariffs on steel, aluminum and newsprint are allegedly designed to protect American companies against foreign imports. The problem with protectionist tariffs is that the tariffs necessarily become inflationary by forcing increases in prices for raw materials. Increasing costs for materials increases costs for those who use them and those who become retail customers later in the supply chain.

Newsprint tariffs have already caused a 20 percent increase in the cost of the materials on which daily and weekly newspapers are printed. Increases like that will cause job losses at newspapers across the country. It will also force publishers to consider how frequently they publish print products and cause existential decisions for some smaller weekly publishers.

of Joey Harrell, Cindy Lambeth and myself was unable to negotiate an acceptable agreement with Durham," district director of purchasing and contract administration Jud Crane said in a March 15 letter to Wyrosdick. "The committee then began negotiations with STA and was able to come to agreement on an acceptable contract."

STA officials and district staff will meet next week to determine a plan for bus service for students in summer school, who will require transportation until the new fleet is available.

"The cost is more than we have paid in the past, but we believe we have mitigated the cost to a level that is appropriate and fair," Wyrosdick said.

The base cost for the STA contract's first year is \$10.4 million, and the following years will include a rate increase that cannot exceed three percent of the

base cost, according to the agreement. If both parties agree, they can renew the contract for another five years, according to Crane.

According to Wyrosdick, the school district has delineated specific performance parameters in the contract.

"Not only is there an increase in accountability, it is also really specific with regard to what our

expectations are," Wyrosdick said.

STA will be responsible for covering 201 routes for all 180 school days, and each route will need a bus. Spare buses are also a requirement.

The contract allows the district a four percent increase or decrease on the number of routes without altering the annual base compensation it pays STA.

According to Lauren Pennell, director of labor and delivery, many mothers choose this alternative when wanting to give birth naturally but wanting some pain relief.

Nitrous oxide can be administered at any point during labor, and the mother can control the dosage by bringing the mask to her face when she decides she needs it. The medication has no effect on the baby's heart rate and

is a safer alternative to the previously used intravenous narcotic Fentanyl.

If the mother decides the gas isn't working and she needs something more, within just two minutes a different medication can be administered.

"It's a fantastic option; it's very flexible," Pennell said. "It's not widely known, so we do a lot of education when they come in."

Nitrous oxide doesn't have the same side effects as other medications. Therefore, it lengthens the bonding time between the mothers and their infants by avoiding the nausea, fatigue or numbness

mothers feel with narcotics.

The amount of nitrous oxide needed depends on each patient's needs. Not everyone is able to utilize this technology, though. Those with preexisting lung diseases, abnormalities with the lungs or thorax area, open wounds on the face near where the mask would sit, and those with vitamin deficiencies are unable to use the gas.

Aside from being a safer alternative to medication, nitrous oxide is also cost effective. Patients only pay a procedure fee without having a medication fee, and their time spent in the hospital is shorter.

# Red flags keep lifeguards busy

Good Samaritan dies after trying to rescue 10-year-old

NAVARRE BEACH — The good Samaritan who attempted to rescue a distressed 10-year-old swimmer Saturday night has died, according to a press release from Navarre Beach Fire Rescue.

According to the release, crews were dispatched to lifeguard tower 3 on Navarre Beach to assist three distressed swimmers around 6:14 p.m. A firefighter tried to get to the swimmers by riding a personal watercraft, but the rough surf did not allow it.

Alexander Julio, a Navarre Beach resident and avid swimmer, helped pull the 10-year-old out of the water. The firefighter on the personal watercraft rescued three additional swimmers who were in distress and unable to make it back to shore.

The good Samaritan, who has not been identified, was pulled unconscious from the water by Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office and Navarre Beach Fire Rescue. Deputies and firefighters administered CPR on the man before he was transported to Fort Walton Beach Medical Center.

On Monday, it was confirmed that the would-be rescuer had died, the release said.

Navarre Beach Fire Rescue Chief Danny

Fureigh said it's never easy to face those tragedies.

"Visitors and locals need to know the flag system," he said. "Prevention is No. 1. Anytime we have a fatality it's like a punch in the eye."

On Saturday at Pensacola Beach, a Chipley man helped rescue a young girl from the water.

"I was there with my two daughters when I heard a little girl yelling for help," Anthony Johnson said. "I told my kids to go back to the edge of the water and I went to the girl. She grabbed me like she was holding on for her dear life. I told her to stay calm."

Johnson waded in the water with the girl, who was about 8 or 9, until lifeguards arrived. When the incident was over, Johnson said he felt good that he could help the girl. He also felt winded.

"The surf was strong that day," he said. "It would make even an experienced swimmer nervous."

It was a busy weekend for beach safety personnel with red flags flying across

the Emerald Coast.

Sunday, in particular, kept lifeguards moving in Walton and Okaloosa counties.

"At the end of the day, we had nine full-blown EMS water rescues and 35 public assists," said David Vaughan, beach safety director for South Walton Fire District. "That's just the number of incidents, not people we assisted, which is more."

Vaughan said it's a "community effort" to try and keep the 26 miles of South Walton beaches safe. Lifeguards work in tandem with code enforcement, Walton County Sheriff's Office and even locals to remind people to mind the flags.

Unfortunately, the message doesn't always hit home.

"Sometimes, we rescue people twice in the same day," said Joe D'Agostino, beach safety chief for Destin Fire Control District.

D'Agostino said Destin lifeguards work diligently to make contact with as

many beachgoers as they can to try and prevent incidents. On Sunday, Destin lifeguards made contact with more than 3,200 people. There were three assists and one rescue of a man in his 40s who was caught in a rip current on his boogie board.

"We would've had a lot more than one rescue if we didn't try to make those contacts," he said. "I'd probably say 80 percent of the people we talk to are compliant."

Okaloosa County Beach Safety Division Chief Rich Huffnagle said lifeguards had nine rescues in the Okaloosa Island area on Sunday.

The surf is expected to be rough for the rest of the week and swimmers should be extremely cautious. The safest bet is to not get in the water at all, Huffnagle said.

"There's no sense in getting in trouble while you're on vacation," he said. "Once those rips get started, there's very little time to mitigate that."







The grand opening celebration began with a ribbon cutting with the Pace Area Chamber of Commerce on Friday and a parking lot party lasting all weekend.



## FWC offers alligator advice

The American alligator is a conservation success story, according to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

Florida has a healthy and stable alligator population, which is estimated at 1.3 million alligators of every size. They are an important part of Florida's wetlands, but should be regarded with caution and respect.

Alligators become more active and visible during spring when temperatures rise and their metabolism increases. Although serious injuries caused by alligators are rare in Florida, the FWC recommends taking precautions when having fun in and around the water. Alligators inhabit all 67 counties in Florida and can be found anywhere there is standing water. Reduce the chances of conflicts with alligators by swimming only in designated swimming areas during daylight hours. Also keep pets on a leash and away from the water.

Because alligators control their body temperature by basking in the sun, they may be easily observed. However, the FWC urges people to keep their distance if they see one. And never feed alligators because it is dangerous and illegal.

The FWC places the highest priority on public safety and administers a Statewide Nuisance Alligator Program to address complaints concerning specific alligators. People concerned about an alligator should call the FWC's toll-free Nuisance Alligator Hotline at 866-FWC-GATOR (392-4286).

SNAP uses contracted nuisance alligator trappers throughout the state to remove alligators four feet in length or greater that are believed to pose a threat to people, pets or property. The FWC also works diligently to keep Floridians and visitors informed, including providing advice about living with alligators.

## Bubba Watson envisions the shots, just not the trophies

**Bagdad native's wins continue to grow**

AUSTIN, Texas — Bubba Watson sees golf differently from anyone else.

His most famous shot is still that gap wedge he hit from a forest of pine trees to the right of the 10th fairway at Augusta National in a playoff, the one he hooked some 40 yards to an elevated green. "If I have a swing, I have shot," is the credo he shares with longtime caddie Ted Scott.

It's what he often refers to as "Bubba golf."

What he still has trouble seeing is the amount of trophies that are starting to pile up.

He won the Dell Technologies Match Play for his second victory in his last four starts, the first time he has ever won twice in a season before the Masters. It was his second World Golf Championship and his 11th victory on the PGA Tour.

"A guy named Bubba from Bagdad, Florida, never had a lesson," said the Santa Rosa County native, a story he repeats often because part of him still can't believe all he's done. "All I had is dreams and creativity. I enjoy playing golf because that's what I'm doing as a kid. I'm a kid who happens to be 39 now, and somehow I keep getting trophies."

His victory at Austin Country Club was remarkable for a number of reasons.

He doesn't like this format. Watson reached the semifinals his first year of the Match Play, but he never got beyond the fourth round in his next six appearances. That might explain why he booked a vacation starting Sunday.

Even when he reached the final round, he never imagined he would be playing for the title. His

semifinal match was against Justin Thomas, who could have reached No. 1 in the world with a win. Watson saw that match going differently.

"Justin Thomas making every putt and me losing, him looking at me and going, 'I'm No. 1.' Truly, he's playing so good," Watson said.

Watson caught him on a day when Thomas couldn't buy a putt, and Watson made his share of them in a 3-and-2 victory that sent him into a championship match that wasn't much of a contest. He faced Kevin Kisner, who survived a 19-hole semifinal victory over Alex Noren. An hour later, Kisner couldn't hit a shot where he was aiming and lost six of the first seven holes. The only reason he didn't lose all seven was because Watson missed a 4-foot birdie putt.

What satisfies Watson the most is where he was headed last year. He was not in a good spot.

Watson still keeps to himself the health issues last year that caused his weight to drop to 160 pounds. He won't attribute his worst year on the PGA Tour to playing the different colors of a Volvik golf ball, which he no longer uses. And he doesn't get into details of the conversation he had with his wife and those closest around him, when he contemplated retirement.

Watson stays plenty busy with two children and business interests that

range from a candy shop to a car dealership to a minor league baseball team.

"There's a lot of time I could be wasting — not wasting, but improving those businesses," Watson said. "Or I could be struggling to make cuts on the PGA Tour. So that was my option. Which one?"

It goes back to his vision, and the reason he was attracted to golf in the first place.

"I want to be creative," Watson said. "I want to let my mind run wild on the golf course. That was my passion. And the other things are my passion, but right now I still feel like I have the ability to play golf."

He played it as well as anyone at the Match Play.

Watson played 109 holes over five days, and only once did he get to the 18th hole. What pleased him the most was staying focused on all but about four or five shots for the week, most of those exceptions on the 13th hole that didn't suit his eye.

Fittingly, that's where the trophy presentation took place when he finished up his 7-and-6 victory over Kisner.

And now he heads to Augusta National, where the two-time Masters champion is sure to be one of the favorites. Watson was No. 117 in the world when he left Pebble Beach six weeks ago. He delayed by his vacation, delayed by one day, at No. 21 in the world.

"A favorite? That's stuff that we don't care about," Watson said. "We want to try to go out

and do our jobs. And if we do our job well, we think we're good enough to beat the other guys."

He can see that happening, especially at the Masters, because it's already happened twice.

### The work continues

After he died, Dr. King's influence did not end. On April 11, President Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act of 1968, which promised fair housing for all people, no matter their race, religion, color or nationality. He also sent officials to Memphis to settle the garbage workers' strike.

### The King Center

Before 1968 ended, Dr. King's widow, Coretta Scott King, had started the Martin Luther King Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change in Atlanta. Mrs. King said: "We need ... to develop new and flexible strategies based upon the bedrock of Dr. King's philosophies."



### Dr. King's ideas

The King Center shares his principles, or beliefs, and steps for nonviolent change:

1. **Information gathering:** identifying and understanding a problem.
2. **Education:** sharing the problem with others.
3. **Personal commitment:** working steadily toward a solution.
4. **Discussion/negotiation:** working with your opponent to agree to a solution.
5. **Direct action:** acting to increase pressure on your opponent when negotiating doesn't work.
6. **Reconciliation:** developing a plan of action that solves the problem for both sides.

unfairness. He wanted the protests to be peaceful, but that was not always possible.

### His famous speech

In 1963, Dr. King organized a March on Washington. He delivered a moving speech, known as the "I Have a Dream" speech, to the crowd. Along with 250,000 marchers, he hoped to convince Congress to pass President John F. Kennedy's civil rights bill, which made discrimination illegal. The next year, President Lyndon Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

### Dr. King's death

The famously nonviolent civil rights worker was in Memphis, Tennessee, in 1968, to support a strike, or work stoppage, by African-American garbage workers. On the evening of April 4, Dr. King was standing on a balcony at the Lorraine Motel when he was shot by James Earl Ray. Ray was convicted of killing Dr. King and died in prison in 1998.



The Lorraine Motel in Memphis is now the site of the National Civil Rights Museum.

In the United States, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. is honored each year in January for his work toward equality for all people. But this year, we'll also commemorate a sad anniversary.

Dr. King was assassinated, or murdered, on April 4, 1968 — 50 years ago next week. This week, The Mini Page learns more about that tragic day and how Dr. King's nonviolent approach to change has lived on.

### Martin's life

King was born on Jan. 15, 1929, in Atlanta, Georgia. He had an older sister, Christine, and a younger brother, A.D. He was named after his father, Michael King Sr.

When Dr. King was a little boy, his father changed his own name and his son's to Martin Luther King Sr. and Jr. The boy was called M.L. by family members and friends.

Martin was smart, and he thought a lot about how to improve things for African-Americans as he was growing up. Like his father, he became a pastor.

In the 1950s and '60s, black people were joining in the fight for their civil, or citizens', rights. Dr. King started the Southern Christian Leadership Conference to help organize and support protests against discrimination, or

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## ‘The fair is blooming,... starting to bear fruit’

MILTON — In addition to creating an annual destination for agriculture education and family fun, the Santa Rosa County Fair Association gives back to the community that has served them for nearly three decades.

The SRCFA is a nonprofit organization that has developed into a community impact-driven group in recent years. The organization designs the yearly fair to make a positive impact on the community, according to Kyle Holley, volunteer and project manager.

The fair serves as an educational experience for children and adults to learn about agriculture and livestock, as well as a place to have good, clean fun. The profit generated from the

event has always gone back to the Santa Rosa County community, Holley said, but this year the SRCFA is able to give more.

Last year, the association received a grant from the state for construction of the Santa Rosa County Fairgrounds, and \$393,000 of that money has been allocated to building an event and exhibit hall on the 20-acre parcel of land. Construction is set to begin after this year’s fair ends.

The 2017 fair was profitable, allowing the association to put aside \$7,500 for awards and scholarships for the youth participating in the agricultural events this year.

“Now we are beginning to see we can raise money throughout the year,” Holley said.

On March 20, the SRCFA donated \$2,600 to

community partners comprising Santa Rosa County 4H program; Vision of Hope; Second Chance Outreach; NAS Whiting Field Moral, Welfare and Recreation; and Boy Scout troop 427.

According to Holley, the fair association runs on 100 percent volunteer efforts. The money made by the sale of tickets, food and beverages goes toward the community impact, while the grant from

the state goes solely toward infrastructure.

Recently, the Santa Rosa County Board of County Commissioners gifted the SRCFA new animal pen equipment totaling \$38,000 for youth agriculture programs that go on throughout the year. According to Holley, the equipment will be stored in the infrastructure built by the state grant, thereby depreciating at a slower rate.

While most fairs are in the summer, the Santa Rosa County Fair celebrates agriculture by holding the fair in the spring — the last frost and the time to plant.

“We are not losing sight of the work that needs to be done, and why it needs to be done,” Holley said. “The fair is blooming into a community

## Garcon Point Bridge: ‘It’s not over’

GULF BREEZE — Efforts to resolve the issues surrounding the Garcon Point Bridge were unsuccessful in the 2018 legislation. But Florida State Senator Doug Broxson said he’s not done trying to find a solution for the bridge that has been in default since 2011.

“This is not over,” he said. Earlier this year, the House

and Senate proposed bills turning the bridge over to the state and placed in the Florida Turnpike System requiring a new bond issuance and allowing the retirement of bonds issued to bondholders.

In a letter to William Bloom, trustee for the Garcon Point Bridge bondholders, Broxson wrote that both bills “appeared to be in position of passage” by both the House and Senate. But then the House’s last committee

made late changes to the bill. Those included removing all language from the feasibility study, mandating a price certain of assets of Authority, arbitrarily re-set toll rates and required that the State offer cash for the purchase. “The House leadership got nervous about the bonding and changed the bill,” Broxson said Thursday afternoon.

## Rental assistance program needs more landlords

MILTON — The Tenant-Based Rental Assistant Program officially began this January after the Santa Rosa County School Board approved it in December 2017. The program has been successful, but is still in need of additional landlords.

The Santa Rosa County School District, the Housing Finance Agency, the Milton Housing Authority and Opening Doors, NWFL (formerly EscaRosa Coalition on the Homeless) together created the transitional housing program that started with a \$750,000 grant from the Florida Housing Finance Corporation. The grant period is Jan. 12, 2018 to Jan. 11, 2021.

According to Karen Barber, director of federal programs for the school district, the program has housed eight families since its inception. The goal for the first year is 20-25 families.

“We feel terrific about [reaching our goal],” Barber said. “We are having difficulty finding units that are affordable in the south end of our county.”

Barber said the program has flooded the market with new potential tenants, and will continue to cultivate getting new rental units. The program is looking for more landlords in the Gulf Breeze area so students

located there can stay in their community while participating in the program.

Bell Ridge II and Magnolia Crossing in Pace are among the apartment complexes housing program families.

Hope Church at the Moors has collected new household items to stock the kitchens of the homes. Dawn Church rented a storage unit and takes in donated furniture to store for the families, as well as inventorying the donations and coordinating with Friendship Baptist Church, which has helped deliver the furniture to the tenants.

“We have great support from our local faith-based community,” Barber said. “We have used those donations to set our families up to be successful in their new... homes.”



# Vaping on the sly

## New devices are making it easy to vape at school

**H**igh school administrators are increasingly warning parents about teens using e-cigarettes or vapes.

Battery-powered vaporizers allow youngsters to inhale vapors from nicotine mixed with liquids in flavors such as bubblegum, cookies-and-cream or Mountain Dew. They also can be used to inhale marijuana and other drugs.

It's illegal for unaccompanied minors to use or possess the devices, but high schools and some middle schools across the country have been updating tobacco policies to prohibit e-cigarette use on school property.

School officials say confiscations of e-cigarettes have grown from about two or three a year to at least a couple a month.

According to a 2014 youth tobacco survey, nearly 41 percent of high school students had tried e-cigarettes, compared with 7.7 percent in 2010.

In 2014, nearly 22 percent of high schoolers were current users, meaning they had used the devices within the previous 30 days.

Teens are smoking e-cigarettes at a rate higher than young adults and adults, of whom 5.7 percent are current users, said Mandy Burkett, director of the Tobacco Program at the Ohio Department of Health.

A number of youngsters, and even some parents, don't see the harm in e-cigarettes because they don't contain many of the carcinogens found in traditional cigarettes.

And some vape the flavors only, without added nicotine.

A report released in January by the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine found conclusive evidence that replacing traditional cigarettes with e-cigarettes reduces a user's exposure to numerous toxicants and carcinogens.

However, the report also found that most e-cigarettes emit potentially toxic substances.

And it found substantial evidence that use of e-cigarettes by youth and young adults increases the risk that they will at some point use traditional cigarettes.

That concerns Dr. Judith Groner, a Nationwide Children's Hospital physician who chairs the American Academy of Pediatrics section on tobacco control.

Nicotine use in the short-term, she said, can cause cardiovascular issues.

In the long-term, it can lead to increasing levels of addiction most easily satisfied by smoking traditional cigarettes.

Once a brain develops an addiction pathway, Burkett added, teens are more susceptible to becoming hooked

## Teens and JUULing



The relatively inexpensive Juul (\$35) has become the preferred e-cigarette for underage teens. This is mostly because of its design and convenience: the device looks like a USB flash drive, recharges in any USB port and its pods come in enticing flavors (fruit medley, mango, creme brulee).

A survey by Truth Initiative (a nonprofit tobacco control organization) of 1,018 15- to 24-year-olds in the U.S. revealed that 37 percent of teens were uncertain that when using a JUUL they are inhaling nicotine, although it clearly states on the JUUL website that each pod is equal to 200 cigarette puffs (equivalent of a pack).

on other things, including drugs.

Additionally, Groner said, flavorings, which are approved by the FDA

for use as food additives, have not been tested for safety if inhaled.

Charlotte Hickcox, statehouse lobbyist for the Ohio Vapor Trade Association, said the typical vapor store customer is not a teenager but someone who has used traditional tobacco products in the past and has made a decision to switch to a non-combustible form of nicotine delivery.

Vapor stores agree that minors should not be vaping, she said, and make it a practice to keep minors out of stores.

School administrators say that underage students are getting the devices from older students.

Administrators updating handbooks try to stay broad enough to include various types of vaporizers and, hopefully, stay a step ahead of technology, said Tim Freeman, a retired high school principal.

At a January conference, he said, e-cigarettes were a hot topic.

But administrators and health officials are fighting a tobacco industry that spends big bucks on advertising and promotions, Burkett said.

While traditional cigarettes have become largely socially unacceptable among teens, the concern now is that "all the cool kids have a vape," Freeman said.

## TODAY'S WORKOUT

### Inner thighs get some attention with this move

**W**e all have those hard-to-work areas that need a little extra TLC.

Every body shape is different, so for some it's the tummy, on others it's the arms and, of course, the rear end.

Then there are the dreaded thighs. You would think they get what they need just from squats and lunges, but I think most of you agree they need a little more work.

Our move today is an

inner thigh ball squeeze. You will need a yoga ball and a place to sit.

Begin this move by placing your yoga ball between your knees and thighs after you have comfortably seated yourself on the edge of your bench or chair. Hold your chest tall, engage your abdomen and you are ready to squeeze.

Start by pressing your knees inward, applying pressure to the ball. Squeeze until you feel the fullest amount of tension in the inner thigh area. Once you reach that point, only release to the halfway

point, keeping constant tension in your focus area.

Continue this squeeze and half release movement for at least 20 to 30 times. Take a small break, wiggle the legs, and continue for three to five sets.

This exercise is perfect on its own or even better when added into a lower-body routine.

## City revisits bid for new attorney

MILTON — The city is once again in the process of searching for a new attorney. After a motion made last month to end the city's contract with Lindsay and Lindsay, the city is currently accepting bids for new legal representation.

The council originally decided to search for new legal representation after Councilman Alan Lowery brought the item to the June 22, 2017 Executive Committee meeting. On July 7, the council voted on the item and it failed, ending the search for an attorney.

The item came to the council again at the Feb. 13 City Council meeting, this time from Councilman Jeff Snow.

City Manager Brian Watkins provided the council with a draft request for proposal (RFP) at the March 22 Committee of the Whole meeting that outlines the criteria for a new attorney and how to submit a bid. Since the council did not have the opportunity to read the draft prior to the discussion, the item was moved forward to the April 2 Executive Committee meeting where the council will discuss the election process.

According to Watkins, if the council comes to an agreement at the Executive Committee meeting on how to proceed with the selection procedure, he can issue the RFP the next day. It will take approximately 3-4 weeks to collect bids.

Firms interested in providing services for the city can obtain full bid documents on the city's website and submit one original and four copies of all documents to the city's purchasing department.

The city will then review the bids, conduct interviews, and send the most qualified applicant to the City Council for decision.

"If we get one or two, then it's easier to just [interview] them all at one time," Watkins said. "If we get 15, then what I'd recommend to you is to get a review committee together, look at them and down select to a smaller group."

Factors such as capability, experience and the ability to work within established time and budget constraints will be taken into consideration, according to the RFP.

The RFP details the format of the submitted content, the attorney qualifications, possible conflicts of interest, indication of fees, the scope of services and a criteria rubric.



Because the budget had already been done, there was no money set for the provisions, according to Broxson. The bill died.

The bridge has never been

able to generate enough traffic to pay its debts. A projected 7,500 vehicles drive across everyday. The toll was originally \$2 and has since risen to \$3.75. Bondholders have discussed raising the toll to \$5, which Broxson addressed in his letter to Bloom.

"We respectfully request you continue tolls at their

current price and not seek injunctive relief in forcing your proposed increase of \$5. It is our intention to convene a conference between the parties to discuss proposals for resolving this issue," the letter said.

Broxson said he doesn't know what the price of the Garcon Point Bridge would be. According to a Daily

News story from January, the bridge debt is at \$135 million.

"No one knows," he said about the bridge price tag. "I'm hoping to be away from setting a price. I believe that's the Department of Transportation's responsibility."

Broxson said discussions about the bridge will begin again this summer. The

Senate is not in session again until March 2019. Broxson said his preference would be to purchase the bridge and work toward buying off the bonds.

"It's an area of contention," he said. "Certainly we want to pay off the indebtedness and get the toll cost down...maybe even free. But that's a long ways away."
