

## 'We need to instill a sense of urgency'

**Sheriff: Jail expansion needed as inmate numbers increase**

MILTON — Since Santa Rosa County Sheriff Bob Johnson took office Jan. 3, he has worked to stave off an ever-increasing jail population, which entered overcrowded numbers last summer.

Johnson and the county commissioners continue discussing expanding the jail but one-time costs to build and reoccurring staffing

costs continue to be sticking points.

Johnson and Major Randy Tift approached the Santa Rosa County commissioners at the May 7 Santa Rosa County Commission meeting with an update of a proposed county jail expansion.

The discussion included options to increase inmate capacity at the jail facilities.

Currently, the maximum capacity for inmates at the jail is 682. By 2025 Johnson estimates the average population to be 925.

One short-term solution is to create a work-release building, which would be able to house 120 inmates raising the max jail capacity to 802, according to Johnson.

**SRSO deputy had terminated pursuit of the suspect's car just moments prior**

PACE — A child and teenager were killed, and two more people were seriously injured, after a suspected DUI crash in Santa Rosa County on Sunday evening.

According to a report from the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office, a deputy spotted 35-year-old Kailen Alan Kelly driving recklessly on Quintette Road in Pace, going an estimated 80 miles per hour in a 35-mile per

hour zone. The deputy began pursuing Kelly with his lights and sirens and ordered him to pull over, but terminated pursuit after Kelly continued speeding and swerving between lanes and almost hit two cars.

The deputy continued following Kelly's car on Woodbine Road and alerted other deputies to look out for him, according to the SRSO report. But when he crested a hill at Woodbine Road and Dunning Drive, he saw "a cloud of dust and debris" on the roadway.

According to the Florida Highway Patrol, Kelly's car crossed the turn lane and collided with the front of a car driven by 39-year-old Melanie Harrell of Pace. Kelly's car, in which he was the only occupant, continued traveling in a southern direction before leaving the roadway, rolling onto its side.

The deputy pulled over and first checked on the four passengers in the SUV that Kelly had struck.

**Local teen raises support for veteran food pantry**

PACE — Pea Ridge Elementary student Jadlyn Minturn is working to aid local veterans in need by raising awareness of the Gulf Breeze food pantry Food for Vets. So far, through her efforts she has helped to collect over 66 pounds of food for the food pantry.

Minturn has been going to each grade at her school giving presentations on food pantries and why they are important to the community.

Her inspiration was a brochure for the pantry, according to her

grandmother, Navarre resident Chris Hinson.

"My husband and I are both Air Force vets," Hinson said. "We were donating and we brought a brochure to our daughter. Jadlyn saw it and was curious."

Minturn wanted to help. She started collecting food but decided that wasn't enough. So she developed a presentation and began speaking in classrooms at her school and at the Pace karate studio she attends, Martial Arts America.

"I thought maybe if I can make this big," Minturn said, "bigger things can happen. One small step makes the biggest difference. Think small, not big."

# Help the hungry through your mailbox

MILTON — On Saturday, the letter carriers of Escambia and Santa Rosa counties will join forces to help Stamp Out Hunger in the community.

In its 26th year, the National Association of Letter Carriers' annual food drive has grown to be the largest national single-day effort that benefits millions of Americans who struggle to put food on the table. In the last 25 years, communities across the nation have donated nearly 1.6 billion pounds of food.

Last year's food drive netted 75 million pounds of food to help feed those in need. Locally, organizations received nearly 85,000

pounds of food from the drive.

"Stamp Out Hunger is the most important food drive for many food pantries in the area," Manna Food Pantries Executive Director DeDe Flounlacker said. "The food collected by the letter carriers is critical to our ability to feed our neighbors in Escambia and Santa Rosa counties. The 2017 event was down considerably by about 50 percent, so we're looking forward to having an outstanding turnout this year to restock shelves and ensure the immediate needs of the hungry can be met in the coming months."

A donation of just one dozen cans provides three days' worth of food, or nine

meals for neighbors in need. Residents are encouraged to leave a bag of non-perishable food items, such as canned meats (chicken, tuna), canned fruit in 100 percent juice, dry breakfast items (oatmeal, grits, whole grain cereal), canned vegetables, peanut butter, rice, and dry beans next to their mailbox prior to regular mail delivery on Saturday, May 12.

"We rely on this food drive to keep our shelves fully stocked to help needy families, children, seniors and the homeless in Gulf Breeze and Navarre," ACTS Ministry of Holley Assembly of God Pastor Doug Barber said. "Without the help from the NALC and the community during the annual Stamp Out

Hunger food drive, ACTS Ministry would almost be non-existent."

Escambia and Santa Rosa letter carriers will collect food donations for local food banks including Manna Food Pantries, Warrington Emergency Aid Center, Feeding the Gulf Coast in Pace and Milton, ACTS Ministry of Holley Assembly of God in Gulf Breeze, and We Care Ministries of Navarre United Methodist Church.

"We are so thankful to the NALC and our community for their support in this food drive. This food will greatly help our one in six neighbors struggling with hunger," Feeding the Gulf Coast President and CEO Cathy Pope said.

Mail carriers will deliver a

limited number of bags prior to the food drive. Residents who do not receive a bag may use any grocery bag on hand to fill with donation items.



### Ask the Preacher

Dear Pastor Gallups,

"Does the Bible clearly prescribe a particular "way" of baptism? If I wasn't baptized by immersion, do I need to be re-baptized?" - K.L., Milton

Dear K.L.,

I think the answer to this question is best represented by the Greek word, "baptizo" translated in the Bible as "baptize". This Greek word means, "to dip or immerse." The word pictures of Romans 6:4 and Colossians 2:12, seem to strongly indicate that the original mode of baptism in the early church probably was a total immersion in water.

"Therefore we were buried with Him through baptism into death, that just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life." (Romans 6:4-6 NKJV)

"...Buried with Him in baptism, in which you also were raised with Him through faith in the working of God, who raised Him from the dead." (Colossians 2:11-12 NKJV)

When Jesus himself was baptized by John, the Bible says "He CAME UP OUT of the water." Again, seemingly indicating that Jesus was completely immersed.

Most New Testament, evangelical denominations believe that the biblical standard is believer's baptism by immersion. Believer's baptism by immersion is an important symbolic act of identification with Christ. However, because salvation is by grace through faith in Christ, it is not, in my opinion, absolutely necessary that you be baptized in a particular way in order to be "saved".

There are several historical evidences (archeological and writings) that indicate that the early church preferred and most often practiced immersion, however from time to time even they would sprinkle or dip when immersion was not possible or practical. They understood that it was the spiritual symbolism of the act that was important.

In the final analysis, you must follow your own conscience in this matter, before the Lord and in light of the teaching of the Bible. Many people, once they understand what I have shared here with you, decide that they should willingly demonstrate their symbolic union with Christ through baptism by immersion even if they have already been baptized by another mode of baptism and especially if it was in a denomination that did not recognize the necessity of the individual profession of a saving faith in Jesus at the time of the Baptism.

## A fake solution to fake news

Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg, under pressure from Congress and critics, now says he is going to protect the millions of people who use his social network from fake news.

Phew, feel better now?  
Not me.

I have never been an alarmist about the spread of fake news on social media. What's new about rumor, innuendo, distortion, lies and the other unsavory devices purveyors of bogus stories meld into the falsehoods they present as truth? They are as old as humanity. And fictitious stories — just like the fake news a lot of people are decrying now — have always ranged in degree from harmless joke to life-threatening weapon.

If we're gullible enough to believe something we read on Facebook — or read or heard anywhere else, for that matter — without considering the source or doing any independent research, maybe we deserve our just reward — or punishment. Isn't that the way life has always been? If you fail to research what might be wrong with your car, or the person you pay to fix it, are you more likely to be duped by a dishonest mechanic? If you eat that unfamiliar berry you run across on your camping trip, do you run the risk of being poisoned?

And who signed up for this social media thing anyway? Uh, I believe that would be us — the same people who could give it up any time we feel like it. And any time would include the point we become convinced that the threat of being duped by fake news outweighs the benefits of sharing selfies, collecting likes and feeling connected to hundreds of friends we hardly know.

What is fake news, anyway? You'll find varying answers, but many of the people in my life define it as anything with which they disagree or that upsets their preconceived sensibilities.

I talked about this stuff back in December 2016, when I cited some poignant observations by communications professor Jonathan Albright, formerly of Elon University and now at Columbia.

If we aren't vigilant," Albright wrote for The Guardian news outlet in London, "the result of fake news is likely to be yet another layer of filtering. And this time around, the filters won't be to segment audiences for advertising purposes or to target voting electorates; it won't be to display the news articles, "likes" and intra-thread @replies that algorithms think we want to see first.

"The filters in the future won't be programmed to ban pornographic content, or prevent user harassment and abuse. The next era of the infowars is likely to result in the most pervasive filter yet: It's likely to normalize the weeding out of viewpoints that are in conflict with established interests.

"This isn't a just problem limited to the center, the left or the right. Rather, this is a new reality. So, as everyone barricades themselves further into algorithmic information silos, encrypted messaging services, and invite-only social network sites, it's at least worth a thought. In the coming decade, AI-powered smart filters developed by technology companies will weigh the legitimacy of information before audiences ever get a chance to determine it for themselves."

## Are Americans crazy?

Has America simply gone crazy? We never want to think that we are a bit crazy or that people we love are experiencing craziness but it is reality. America has an overwhelming problem with craziness or I should say mental health issues.

Over a 12-month period, 27 percent of adults in the U.S. will experience some sort of mental health disorder, making the U.S. the country with the highest prevalence. Mental health disorders include mood disorders, anxiety disorders, attention deficit/hyperactivity disorder, and substance abuse. Over one's entire lifetime, the average American has a 47.4 percent chance of having some kind of mental health disorder. Yes, that's almost one in two. The projected lifetime prevalence is even higher: for people who reach age 75 it is 55 percent. World Health Organization data does not take into account eating disorders, personality disorders, and schizophrenia; the incidence of these disorders together is about 15 percent in the U.S.,

according to the National Institute of Mental Health.

The incidence of mental health disorders varies widely across the globe, and determining the patterns is tricky. After the U.S., Ukraine, Colombia, New Zealand, Lebanon, and France have the next highest rates of mental health disorders of any kind, all falling between 18.9 percent and 21.4 percent in a 12-month period. Japan, the People's Republic of China, Nigeria, and Israel have the lowest rates (between 6 percent and 7.4 percent), especially for depression. For substance abuse, the U.S. is up there, but not the highest: We are topped by South Africa and Ukraine. As with the U.S., when you look at lifetime prevalence in any country, the risk for any disorder goes way up.

Despite ongoing research, the predictors of mental health disorders are still evasive, even for the most common, like depression. While a nation's wealth factor would seem to have an impact, it's clear from the data that the relationship is complex. Ron Kessler, Ph.D., the Harvard researcher who headed much of the WHO's mental health research, says that by and large people in less-developed countries are less depressed: After all, he says, when you're literally trying to survive, who has time for depression? Americans, on the other hand, many of whom lead

relatively comfortable lives; blow other nations away in the depression factor, leading some to suggest that depression is a "luxury disorder".

There is a zero cure for mental health issues. However, here are some suggestions for improvement. Have a daily schedule. Get up and go to bed routinely. Get adequate sleep but you don't need more than seven to eight hours. Engage in meaningful activity daily. Work a job. Work in a garden. Clean your house. Mow grass. Pull weeds. Go to school. Have some type of daily exercise. Breaking a little sweat every day is healthy. Engage in meaningful relationships at church, a club, work or with friends and family. We all need real people in our lives. Limit your technology, television and social media time. Too much can drain and depress you.

If you have mental illness or family members suffering from mental illness get it out on the table and start talking about coping, a strategic plan, counseling and working together to make life manageable. Ignoring it only results in everybody going crazy.

In 2017, according to Reble, the department handled 199 fire related calls, 1,608 rescue calls and 70 hazardous condition calls, all of which accounted for a 10-plus percent increase in activity across the city.

Reble discussed ways to reduce fire hazards in the home, classes of fires, being prepared if a fire occurs in the home, as well as what to do.

Do you have a bicycle? More and more adults and kids are getting on their bikes and taking to the road, lane or path. Today, about 100 million Americans cycle. Some cycle more than others, but the number is growing.

May is National Bike Month. The Mini Page learns more about cycling and staying safe while riding.



**Why cycle?**

Many people think cycling offers a way to:

- get where you are going;
- stay healthy and keep in shape;
- save money on transportation;
- help planet Earth by not polluting the air;
- cut down on traffic congestion.

When kids or adults are cycling, they can notice things they miss from a car, such as sounds of the neighborhood and seeing friends.

**Who cycles?**

Workers in Oregon and the District of Columbia bike to work more than people in any other state, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

Police officers are using bikes to get around cities more easily and have more contact with people.

Pedicabs, or bikes with a small passenger

compartment attached, are popular in many cities around the United States. People hire the rider to deliver them to another location, just as a taxi cab would.

Some schools have started bicycle trains — groups of kids who bike together to school with adult supervision. Having a group to ride with can make parents feel better about letting their kids pedal to school.

**Cities stepping up**

In many cities, bicyclists have convinced the government to make changes that make biking safer and more convenient. For example, some streets may have bike lanes painted on the surface. Drivers of cars know that bikes may be in that lane.



Transportation such as buses and trains are providing bike racks so that bikers can ride part of the way to work or school and pedal the rest of the way.

The total cost for fully operating the jail annex annually, Johnson said, would be approximately \$1.7 million.

Tiftt said that they have to make sure that they have the funds required to hire the staff needed

for the needed expansion. This includes medical, maintenance, as well as security staff.

“We need to instill a sense of urgency,” Johnson said in a later interview. “Come summer, the numbers of inmates are going up.” Johnson and Tiftt said their ultimate goal is to see an expansion of the existing jail that would accommodate 500 more

inmates than the current maximum capacity.

The commissioners asked for more information before approving any option.

“We would like to like to see how the new federal government contract looks first,” Commissioner Bob Cole said. “Currently, federal government gives very little money to offset the cost of housing inmates.”

He observed the front seat passenger, later identified as 17-year-old Sidney Dowdy, deceased. A 7-year-old girl, later identified as Stormie Harrell, was severely injured and later died at the hospital, according to the Florida Highway Patrol.

The driver, 39-year-old Melanie Harrell, and another passenger, 18-year-old McKenzie Murphy, were both entrapped in the vehicle as well but were alive, with serious injuries. All four had to be pulled from the wreckage by

firefighters and EMS. Harrell and Murphy were taken to Sacred Heart Medical Center with serious injuries.

Two other deputies checked on Kelly and pulled him out of his wrecked car before it burst into flames.

While Kelly was sitting in the back of a patrol car, a deputy reported he could smell a “strong odor of alcoholic beverage” on his breath, and that he had bloodshot, watery eyes. He also appeared to be lethargic, according to the report. At one point, the deputy said Kelly asked him what had happened to him.

The deputy told Kelly he had been involved in a car crash and there were serious injuries, as

well as a possible dead person, but Kelly “didn’t appear to be remorseful or bothered by this information.”

Kelly was checked out at an emergency room for minor injuries before being transported to the Santa Rosa County Jail. He refused to submit to a breathalyzer.

According to jail records, he was booked into the Santa Rosa County Jail early Monday morning on two vehicular homicide charges, two moving traffic violation charges, three DUI charges and a fleeing/eluding police charge. He is being held without bond.

FHP spokesman Eddie Elmore said additional charges are pending.



# 12 tips for DIY interior design

For some folks, it's a dream — a house where "move-in-ready" means just that: Everything is perfect and the new homeowners don't have to lift a finger to design or decorate. And then there are the rest of us. We prefer to struggle with choosing (perhaps even installing) our home's features ourselves. Decorating blogs, Pinterest boards, and samples of upholstery fabric or ceramic tile are the stuff our dreams are made of. If you're one of us, you'll enjoy these 12 tips for successful DIY interior design.

**1. Research.** Learn as much as you can, as if you're getting a certificate in countertops or a degree in drywall. The internet's the obvious place to start, packed with ideas and available 24/7. But don't stop there. Visit home centers and suppliers to view furniture, appliances, and materials in the flesh. Why? Well, you may read a dozen articles on say, quartz vs granite, and possibly even make your choice — in theory — but when you actually see

and touch the two, that's when you'll fall in love.

**2. Take stock.** Look at your home as it is now. What do you love about it? What features could you love? For instance: There's a gorgeous view but no way to enjoy it from indoors. Can you possibly create a new window to frame it? Or to enlarge a minuscule bathroom, might you be able to steal some space from a linen closet?

**3. Decide whether you're ready to renovate.** "Renovate or adapt?" That is the question. What are your budget, time frame, and tolerance for chaos? Evaluate whether you're willing to undergo a full-scale home remodel (or a minor one) to get the look and the functionality you're dreaming of.

**4. Plan your intended use.** Go through the house, room by room, deciding what you'd like to use each area for. Function is the foundation on which you'll base every aspect of your DIY interior design, from traffic patterns to the right type of flooring.



**5. Think furnishings.** What furniture and appliances do you already own? How will various furniture pieces work together and fulfill your intended use of the room? Start with an accurate floor plan and take both measurements and clearance into account.

**6. Find a focal point.** Choose a central element to design around. This may be a feature already in place, such as elegant original wooden moldings, or something meaningful you yourself bring to the space, like a treasured antique carpet.

**7. Keep some empty space.** The true purpose of a home is living, not display. So leave some empty space for your family to fill. A small hallway alcove can become a beloved "cave" for children to play in, if it's not crammed with knickknacks.


**8. Coordinate.** Balance elements without being too



matchy-matchy; think a lamp in a subtle leaf pattern that harmonizes with your favorite philodendron. A unified theme in each room and throughout the house will avoid visual overwhelm. At the same time, a certain amount of contrast sparks interest — for example, that dainty vintage dresser on a modern concrete floor.

**9. Look at lighting.** How much natural sun comes into the room? How much light will you need for the space's intended purpose? To illustrate: A kitchen is likely to need more supplementary lighting than a home entertainment center.

**10. Choose colors.** The Rule of Three applies here. Select a maximum of three colors as the basis for your DIY interior design scheme, and combine them in a proportion of 60:30:10. Be sure to look at all colors — paint, upholstery, etc. — in appropriate light, to see their true shade.



**11. Bring in a touch of nature.** A natural element or two, like houseplants, rocks, or even a tree trunk will add warmth and charm. This could be a stand-alone decorative element (a tall vase filled with graceful branches) or incorporated into a larger whole — perhaps a slate fireplace surround.

**12. Delegate.** Know your limitations. Indulge in hiring a contractor, such as a professional landscaper or expert flooring installer, for part or all of the project, to make your vision come to life in the best possible way.

# Do listing tactics bring the best price?

**Reader question:** We will be listing our home for sale soon. We received three estimates from agents on our home's value, and they are all different. Also, each of the agents has different tactics about how the listed price is presented to get the best price. For example, one agent suggested we use "market range pricing" which is a new concept to us. We would

advertise a range of value starting at the list price, and state a lower amount we may accept to attract more prospects. Another agent suggested we set a low price to attract buyers who would then bid the price up. Do you know if any of these types of suggestions will bring a higher price?

**Monty's answer:** There are several considerations in setting the asking price for every home when the seller enters the market with a new offering. These considerations are the seller's motivation, the seller's financial condition, the condition of the property, and whether the demand for homes in your neighborhood and price

point indicates a seller's market, a buyer's market, or a balanced market. It is not uncommon for a certain price point to be languishing, while homes just above or below that price point are in high demand. This is why data is vital when considering value.

Because you have three different opinions of value, ostensibly, it is reasonable to consider those opinions as the range of value for your home. This comment assumes that each real estate agent prepared a document accurately stating the statistics in the market and that they chose the three or four best comparable sales to compare to your home, and adjusted

the feature differences.

Just as an example, if the three estimates were \$230,000, \$215,000, and \$200,000, the spread of \$30,000 is near 14 percent, which would not be an unusual range of value in a typical market. If you had only engaged one agent for an opinion, and you picked the agent that ultimately determined that \$200,000 was the right number, you may have left money on the table. The market will eventually decide, so different buyers could make any one of the three agents the most accurate.

## Nurses honored during National Nurse's Week



TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Department of Health recognizes May 6-12 as National Nurses Week, a time to honor the crucial role nurses play in keeping Florida's residents and visitors healthy and safe. The department commends the many nurses that volunteered to provide care in special needs shelters during Hurricane Irma for their hard work and sacrifice.

"Both of my parents are retired nurses, so I know firsthand how passionate and hardworking nurses are," State Surgeon General and Secretary Dr. Celeste Philip said. "Nurses are an integral part of the public health system in Florida, and I hope you will all join me in extending a special thanks to nurses across the state for their continued efforts to provide the highest quality care to their patients."

Nursing is a diverse field, and public health nurses can work in many different settings. They work in clinics to provide immunizations, conduct testing for diseases and infections, help people manage chronic conditions like diabetes and asthma and inspire people achieve a healthy lifestyle.

Public health nurses also help communities prepare for natural disasters and assist in disaster relief efforts. During Hurricane Irma, Florida's dedicated nurses and nurses

from other states volunteered to staff more than 90 special needs shelters in 53 counties, providing mass care for people who could not safely remain in their home.

Nurses continue to be high-demand in Florida. The Florida Center for Nursing estimates that by 2025 Florida will have a shortage of at least

50,300 registered nurses, or 56,000 registered nurses and 12,500 licensed practical nurses.

To respond to the growing nursing shortage, the department joined the enhanced Nurse Licensure Compact in January 2018, allowing registered nurses and licensed practical nurses who hold

licensure in one Compact state to practice in any of the 27 Compact states without having to obtain additional licenses.

Florida now issues a multi-state license to new applicants who meet the Compact licensure requirements.

Nurses who reside in Florida and hold an active,

unrestricted license will also have the option to convert from a standard Florida license to a multi-state license.

## New technique could bring earlier diagnoses for ALS and similar disorders

GAINESVILLE — A new blood test could reveal the genetic roots of muscular dystrophy, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis and other disorders caused by the expansion of DNA repeats, potentially helping doctors diagnose their patients' conditions sooner.

The findings by University of Florida Health researchers and their collaborators focus on the role of intervening, or generally non-protein coding, DNA sequences within a gene. In one type of inherited form of ALS and other so-called repeat expansion disorders, those DNA sequences — known as introns — accidentally get left behind during the genetic coding process.

For some of these disorders, the lingering mutant introns can be readily detected in tissue and white blood cells — creating a rapid and inexpensive way to detect repeat expansion disorders, the researchers found. Their

findings were published recently in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

The researchers tested their findings in a trio of disorders: myotonic dystrophy type 2, Fuchs endothelial corneal dystrophy and the most common (C9) familial form of ALS. ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's disease, is a fatal, progressive nerve cell disease that affects muscle movement. Some 30,000 people in the United States have the disease, according to the ALS Association.

The new testing method allows repeat expansion disorders to be identified earlier using accessible tissue, said Maurice Swanson, Ph.D., a UF Health genetics researcher. With current testing methods, patients may have advanced symptoms of a repeat expansion disease. The new findings change that, Swanson said.

"We now have a quick, affordable way of seeing intron retention that correlates with a patient having a certain type of repeat expansion disorder,"

Swanson said.

While ALS and other repeat expansion disorders are presently incurable, Swanson called the new testing approach an important step in fighting repeat expansion diseases. Early detection could effectively complement therapies now being developed to

"silence" a problematic gene by targeting and degrading its RNA — essentially switching off its rogue activity, he said.

This new screening approach, which was developed using myotonic dystrophy 2 as a model by Lukasz Sznajder, Ph.D., a postdoctoral fellow in the UF College of Medicine's Center for NeuroGenetics, also has the potential to be used to detect a host of presently unidentified novel genetic expansion mutations, Swanson said.

To establish their findings, the researchers collected muscle, brain and blood samples from living and deceased patients with two forms of myotonic dystrophy, ALS and spinocerebellar ataxia type 10, a hereditary disease that affects limb movement and speech. They then tested whether a specific type of repeat expansion mutation selectively induced intron retention. Ultimately, the presence of lingering introns is a clear biological marker for certain genetic repeat

expansion disorders, they found.

"This provides an experimental window to assess whether someone has intron retention in a particular gene that is known to cause disease or could cause disease," Swanson said.

Among the other potential advantages to this new approach: Patients could be diagnosed relatively early if they have a family history or show initial signs of a repeat expansion disease.

Next, Swanson said he wants to do further research using intron retention to search for other repeat expansion diseases that have yet to be identified.

The National Institutes of Health, Target ALS, the Muscular Dystrophy Association and the Myotonic Dystrophy and Wyck foundations provided funding for the research. Researchers at the University of Rochester, Houston Methodist Hospital and Adam Mickiewicz University in Poland collaborated on the work.

## Stretching is beneficial for everyone

Stretching. Everyone can do it. And everyone needs it.

Just imagine how tight and cranky we'd be without it.

Just as there are many levels of ability when exercising, the same goes for stretches. If you've done any style of yoga, or anything similar, you know this all too well.

Stretching relieves tight muscles when you first wake up in the morning,

gives your body a release before and after fitness, and is also beneficial after sitting/standing for long periods of time.

Our move today is a Warrior 1, a wonderful stretching pose for anyone.

All you need is a flat surface for this stretch. This move is pretty much a total body stretch but the focus is on the hip flexors and opening the chest.

Begin the move by splitting your stance, somewhat wide, with one foot forward, and the other toward the back. Rotate

the hips forward to engage the stretch in the hips.

Now, extend your arms up above your head, like you are reaching to the sky. Holding the chest tall, and keeping the neck neutral, proceed to reach the arms slightly back, creating more of a chest opening stretch.

Continue to breathe while holding this stretch and aim for at least 10 seconds or longer.

Release and switch legs. And repeat on your other side. You can continue numerous times side to side if needed.

This move is great after any cardiovascular workout. You will get the benefits of the stretch to release tension in your muscles, but you will also feel a cleanse inside after a few deep breaths while holding this pose.

There are variations to the Warrior pose but this is a good starting point.

## Milton’s Imogene Theatre is a local cultural treasure

MILTON — Stepping into the Imogene Theatre in the heart of downtown Milton is like stepping back 100 years in time.

The old wooden floors still creak when you walk, just as they might have during 1920s dance parties. The acoustics carry voices clearly, and you can almost still hear Hank Williams crooning “Move It on Over” like he did when he played the Imogene in the 1940s.

A backdrop hanging behind the original stage carries a banner of hand-painted advertisements from a fundraiser for the Milton High School senior class of 1941, including an ad for Joe T. Allen, Sheriff and Harrison Mercantile.

“You can’t build rooms like this anymore,” said Kyle Verner, the theater’s general manager, as he sat on the stage. “It’s just a really cool place, a unique place.”

The Imogene Theatre is

helping to lead a renaissance in downtown Milton by drawing big-name acts such as country music darling Lee Ann Womack, singer John Paul White of the Civil Wars and the band Confederate Railroad, as well as comedy and theatrical acts.

Since Verner was brought in to head the historic theater two years ago, he said he’s seen an increase of interest by artists wanting to play the intimate venue, which has just 350 seats, including a bar and balcony area.

MILTON — Country music megastar Lee Ann Womack will be stopping at the Imogene Theatre on Thursday, May 10 as part of a tour for her new album, “The Lonely, the Lonesome and the Gone.” The Billboard Hot 100, Grammy and Country Music Association-award winning artist says she plans to play some of her newer songs, as well old favorites. Womack took a break from her busy tour schedule to chat with the Northwest Florida Daily News about her music, her life and her love of all things Florida.

Tell us about the show that you’ve got coming up in Milton. What can people expect when they come see you at the Imogene Theatre?

Well, I always tell them if they miss real country music, that’s what we play, so come on out. I’ll play songs from the new record, which is called “The Lonely, the Lonesome and the Gone,” but I’ll do all the hits that they expect to hear as well, like “I’ll Think of a Reason Later,” “I Hope You Dance,” and “A Little Past Little Rock.” ... We have a little acoustic set we do in the middle of the show, which ends up being pretty much everybody’s favorite part. It’s stripped down. I grew up on church music, so we do a little bit of that right in the middle of the show, and so it’s mostly I would tell people is that it’s a great band full of musicians who know how to play great country music.

What are you looking forward to about playing such an intimate setting (with 350 seats) at the Imogene Theatre?

I tell people it’s kind of like being in my living room. My husband is in the music business and both of my daughters are in the music business, so we have a lot of

# Family thanks staff for saving newborn's life

PENSACOLA — Holly Harris planned to have a natural childbirth like her three previous deliveries. But when she went into labor on April 19 at the Studer Family Hospital Children's Hospital at Sacred Heart, a rare medical condition that only happens in 1 percent of all births took her birth plan off course.

Sacred Heart Hospital Ob/Gyn Dr. Shane Medlock quickly realized that the umbilical cord had slipped out of the birthing canal before the baby. This rare condition, called umbilical cord prolapse, can cutoff oxygen supply to the fetus and cause significant danger unless immediate interventions take place. Further complicating the delivery, the baby had changed positions overnight and was

now coming feet first.

Fortunately for Holly, Sacred Heart is prepared for emergencies like these. It has the area's only Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit for the most critically ill and premature newborns, and the area's only OB Emergency Department.

In a Facebook post, Holly's husband, Jake, recounted the chain of events that took place during the delivery.

"The amazing staff at the OB Labor & Delivery were just going through the normal 'everyday' when something went very wrong with our delivery," he wrote. "Dr. Medlock recognized the issue and gave the order, and just like that the nurses came out of everywhere and it was like they were a SWAT team that were coming into rescue hostages! They all knew their part and did it

with lightning speed!"

While a nurse used her hands to keep pressure off the umbilical cord, another set of nurses rushed Holly into the operating room on a gurney. Amidst the flurry of activity, Dr. Medlock stopped to briefly explain to Jake what was happening.

"I'm a 10-year combat veteran and I have never felt more vulnerable in my life," Jake said the day after his wife's delivery. "When Dr. Medlock spoke to me, I felt a sense of peace come over me. I knew God had his hands on them."

Jake said from the time Holly went into labor to the time their daughter, Haven Lynne, was born via emergency Cesarean section was a span of just six minutes.

Holly said most of the day was still a blur.

"I remember feeling very scared before I was put under anesthesia," Holly

said, who now shares her birthday with her new daughter. "When I woke up I saw Jake holding Haven. I felt a sense of relief when I held Haven skin to skin."

In his Facebook post, Jake wrote, "Sometimes, in the fog of what is going on in our own life we overlook the ones that have made our life possible and I just wanted to take a few minutes and truly thank the staff at this hospital for making the life of my beautiful baby Haven Lynne Harris possible. This is just the 'everyday' for them, but they had my everything!"

Although Holly's birth plan didn't go as expected, she's grateful she has a healthy baby girl. Holly and Haven were discharged from the hospital four days later and returned home to Pace where the rest of the family is getting to know their new baby sister.

musicians in my house all the time and we sit around and play, and so that's what these little small shows remind me of.

**What would you want the people of Northwest Florida to know about you?**

I think, focusing on the music mainly, is just that there are so many people out there who love traditional country music, and there's not that much of it anymore. So I just want to remind them that that's what I do. And I love it and I have a great deal of respect for it, so that's the main thing. Other

than that, I just want them to know how much I love Florida. I come to Florida as often as I possibly can, even between tours. My girls and I are down there all the time, so I just love it. "This theater is in a great location, just 2 miles off Interstate 10, so it's a terrific place for an artist who is maybe routing through to another destination," Verner said. "And when they find out the history of the building and how cool it is ... in the music industry right now, that's kind of a hot trend to play at these kinds of places, and we're just in the right place and it's the right time."

Though it may be enjoying a revitalization, a series of fires — both literal and metaphorical — threatened to destroy the theater before it was able to truly thrive.

Verner likes to recount the building's history to anyone he meets. In a nutshell, the building was constructed in 1912 — the same year the Titanic sank — after a fire in January 1909 leveled downtown Milton. It was built using six layers of brick, inside and out, to make it as fireproof as possible.

It opened in 1913 as the Milton Opera House and Auditorium, and entertained audiences with the likes of Hank Williams, Hank Locklin and Minnie Pearl.

The Gooch family purchased the theater in the 1920s and renamed it the Imogene Theatre after their daughter, Imogene Gooch, who loved music and dancing.

It thrived as a center of cultural life in Milton until the late 1940s, when

a novel "moving picture house" (now known as a movie theater) opened up across the street and effectively forced the theater to shudder its doors.

"The downstairs area was always retail, but the theater portion shut down until the late 1980s," Verner said.

"It was then that the city of Milton grew concerned that the building was a hazard because it had been vacant for a long time and kids were breaking in and so forth, so they decided they would tear the building down and build a parking lot for the courthouse across the street."

But the Santa Rosa Historical Society stepped in and was able to save the building.

They then put in the work to get the Imogene Theatre back up and running.

However, in January 2009, a fire that broke out 100 years to the week of the original fire, nearly destroyed the building again.

According to Daily News archives, a fire that started in a building behind the theater spread and destroyed four surrounding structures, causing nearly \$2 million in damage.

But the Imogene Theatre survived thanks to the help of local firefighters, and in 2012 it started to "come alive again."

The building served mostly as a wedding venue and a spot for community plays from then until 2016, when Verner took it over and brought in concerts, improvisational comedy, murder mystery dinners and concerts.

"The acoustics in here are so great, that it's just an awesome place to live

music," he said.

"But it's just a neat space for anything. It's flexible — we had a private banquet the other night, and a trade show ... it's becoming what the historical society wanted it to be, which is a really big source of community pride."

With talks of the Santa Rosa County Courthouse, which sits directly across the street from the theater, moving, Verner hopes the theater will serve as the new linchpin of Milton's downtown area.

"We're very confident that if the courthouse leaves and some of the affiliated businesses leave with it and those buildings become available, we believe this building will serve as the catalyst for revitalization,

again," he said.

Still, Verner said he's already seen a little bit of the renaissance happening just in the past year, with some longtime Milton residents saying they've come to the Imogene for the first time. Verner said one woman came in for a showing of the movie "Grease" with her granddaughter, and recounted how she used to attend the theater with her own grandmother when she was a young girl.

But the thing that makes the Imogene so unique, aside from its history and the nostalgia that emanates from it, is its intimacy, Verner said.

"The furthest seat in the building is 58 feet," he said. "It's like no matter where you sit, it's a front-row seat."
