## State clears city council

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MILTON — The state attorney has cleared members of the Milton City Council of possible Sunshine Law violations following an investigation, which closed on May 25.

Jimmy Messick, a former Milton city councilman, requested the state attorney investigate following a February council meeting in which newly appointed councilwoman Heather Hathaway made a motion similar to a

motion made by councilman Jeff Snow in May 2017. Both sought to give council the power to hire and fire city contract employees.

Messick said he had requested security video footage in which he says he witnessed council members engaging in possible hallway conversations which he believed included pending official council matters, a Sunshine Law violation.

Gregory Marcille, chief

assistant state attorney, wrote in a press release that based on their review, there was insufficient evidence to establish any crime had been committed. He said that as part of the review, investigators interviewed numerous witnesses and examined documents and video evidence. In a letter to Messick following the ruling, Marcille wrote, "While you have raised concerns about possible hallway conversa-

tions, there is no evidence that any pending matters were discussed. Likewise, a reasonable explanation has been given as to why language used in a motion by council member, Heather Hathaway, was similar to that used by different council member at a previous meeting." Messick said that his request was not an allegation of guilt but rather a request to see if there was evidence of violation of

law on the members' part. "I have to accept what the state attorney came up with" he said.

"Unfortunately, Jimmy and Theresa Messick, for political purposes, filed a frivolous Sunshine Law complaint against the Milton City Council," councilman Snow said. "It truly was a waste of time and tax payer dollars of our State Attorney's Office and their resources. I believe this was done as a distraction and an attempt discredit the current Milton City Council, who are working very hard on moving Milton forward."


once stood at Arcadia. The program is free and open to the public.

on June 6 and 13 in the Arcadia Classroom. Visitors can stop in and get their hands dirty while sorting through artifacts from the field school excavations. All participants under 18 years of age must be accompanied by an adult.

# Health department offers vaccination shots


Milton — Although summer is just beginning, The Florida Department of Health in Santa Rosa County would like parents to know it's not too early to get shots for school.

Students enrolling in Florida schools for the first time are required to have shots to protect against 11 vaccine-preventable diseases: diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough), polio, measles, mumps, rubella, chickenpox, haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib), pneumococcal, and Hepatitis B), as well as proof of a physical examination. Students entering the seventh grade must

have a Tetanus-diphtheria-pertussis (Tdap) booster.

DOH-Santa Rosa offers these vaccines by appointment, Monday through Friday during regular clinic hours, at its Milton and Midway locations. There is no fee for immunizations for eligible children ages 2-months through 18 years. Parents are requested to bring a copy of their child's shot record, and proof of any health insurance they may have, with them to the clinic. School physicals are also offered for a fee of \$56.

## LeBron - America's King James Version

A couple of million Americans will be watching closely as the Cleveland Cavaliers and Golden State Warriors compete for the 2018 NBA championship. LeBron James, a 6-foot-8, 250-pound man who plays for the Cavaliers is the King James Version of basketball.

I was recently in Cleveland, Ohio while the Indiana Pacers were in town. Interestingly the Pacers were staying in my hotel and I saw them often on the elevator or the hotel lobby. The evening I was there I went down to the lobby in search of a snack and then headed back to the elevator when two men walked across the lobby area briskly and entered into the elevator first. I followed them on and was a bit awestruck that one guy with a baseball cap was large. He was maybe 6-foot-8 or 6-foot-9 and very stocky. I never mean to stare but this man looked familiar. Two weeks later I was back in Cleveland and had the opportunity to watch James and the Cavaliers play the Boston Celtics in the third game of their series. He scored 27 points and had 12 assists, just another night's work for James.

While NBA television viewership doesn't sound big, the NBA reached a television deal with ESPN and Turner Sports for 24 billion dollars over a nine-year stretch in October of 2014. Thus, all NBA players earn very nice paychecks but especially King James. Forbes says James earned \$86 million in 2017, including a \$31.2 million salary and a whopping \$55 million in product endorsements. James penned one Nike endorsement deal for \$90 million dollars while he was still in high school. He has a net worth of \$400 million, according to Celebrity Net Worth. His salary for 2018 is \$33,285,709. His total earnings for 2018 are reported to be about 85.3 million dollars. His salary is actually the second highest behind Stephen Curry who reportedly makes \$34,682,550. This does not include Curry's endorsement money.


While LeBron's salary is mind boggling his stats as a player are whopping numbers as well. He has averaged 27.5 points, 9.1 assists and 8.6 rebounds every game in 2018. For his entire 15 year NBA career he has averaged 27.2 points, 7.4 rebounds and 7.2 assists every game. So far during the NBA 2018 finals he has scored over 40 points seven times putting him hot on the heels of Jerry West who scored over 40 points eight times in the NBA playoffs in 1965 when he was 26 years old.

# Cops arrest student on bomb threat charges

An unnamed student received a text message advising of a bomb threat to the school. According to the arrest report, the unnamed student received a text message saying "The bomb is active get out of there," followed by non-English

symbols then more text saying "10 minutes."

After a thorough investigation and within 30 minutes, a suspect was in custody.

The threat was unfounded, the SRSO says, and the individual who sent the text was discovered to be a student supposedly playing a joke.

After the unnamed student showed this message to a teacher, Rebecca Holley, then Principal Stephen Knowlton, staff evacuated the schools to the football field. Students returned to class after 30 to 45 minutes, according to the report.



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# 'It only takes one'

**Emergency officials urge residents to be prepared as hurricane season begins**

Another hurricane season is officially here.

Following a particularly tumultuous 2017 season, weather forecasters and county officials in Northwest Florida are banking on lessons learned last year as they head into preparations for the upcoming season.

"This year is expected to be either at the same level as last year or a little bit higher" in the number and intensity of storms, said Ken Wolfe, emergency management coordinator for Okaloosa County. "It could be a highly active season."

According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, 2017 produced 17 named storms. Ten became hurricanes, including six major hurricanes (Category 3, 4 or 5). The 2017 season also produced the first two major hurricanes to hit the continental United States in 12 years.

NOAA forecasters released their 2018 Atlantic Hurricane Season predictions on May 24. Forecasters call for an at- or above-average season, similar to 2017, with 10 to 16 named storms, including five to nine hurricanes. They expect up to four of those to be major hurricanes.

But Jeff Goldberg, emergency management director for Walton County, said he doesn't pay much attention to predictions.

"We're preparing this year the same way we prepare every other year," he said. "We don't rely on predictions to dictate how we prepare for the season."

## Items for your hurricane kit

It's best to be prepared long before a storm is even on the horizon. Because weather can change at the last minute, officials urge all households to have Disaster Readiness Kits handy in case of a weather emergency, including a hurricane. They say you should also have a "go plan" in case evacuation orders are issued, including an evacuation plan, preparations for pets and the elderly, and stores of gasoline.

## Here's a checklist of supplies authorities say you should have in your kit:

- Water — one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
- Food — at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert
- Flashlight
- First aid kit
- Extra batteries
- Whistle to signal for help
- Dust mask to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener for food
- Local maps
- Cellphone with chargers and a backup battery

Goldberg pointed out that the 1992 season, which produced Category 5 Hurricane Andrew, was supposed to have been a slow season. And, Goldberg added, "we've had a number of busy seasons where we've almost exceeded the alphabet and not one storm made landfall."

Tom Lloyd, operations chief with Santa Rosa County Emergency Management, agreed.

"Everybody always asks about the number of storms predicted," Lloyd said. "But in the world that we live in, it only takes one. One Dennis, one Ivan, to completely turn our community upside down. ... It's not that we dismiss any specific storm predictions, but we treat them all the same and

we prepare for anything."

Officials said they're looking to past experiences, not future predictions, to prepare for this season.

After Hurricane Irma battered South Florida and Central Florida in September 2017, teams from Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton County emergency management centers fanned out to aid officials in the cleanup and recovery process. Goldberg said his team gained valuable information about debris removal, donated goods distribution and shelter protocol.

One of the biggest issues facing emergency coordinators this year is finding people to volunteer in shelters and on Community Emergency

Response Teams, Goldberg said.

"Volunteerism is down state-wide," he said. "We're having to explore other potential avenues for shelter staffing."

Lloyd said his team gained experience with active water rescues, confined space rescues, and how to set up points of distribution to make relief efforts run more effectively.

"With that knowledge, hopefully things will run smoother with any situation that arises for us," he said.

In Okaloosa County, Wolfe said he is working closely with local nursing homes to help them draft preparedness plans in case of power outages from a hurricane. After Hurricane Irma, 12 people died in a Hollywood nursing home when its generators failed.

"That was the biggest lesson from last year's storms, the nursing homes," Wolfe said. "That was the biggest issue that they had ... caring for nursing homes and dealing with power failures, and how they were going to overcome those issues."

A new state law requires nursing homes to have generator and temperature control plans. Wolfe said he reviewed about 23 plans in the last 15 days from local assisted-living facilities.

Even before hurricane season

officially began, weather experts were closely watching the tropics on two occasions. On May 12, the National Hurricane Center issued its first tropical weather outlook of the season for a low-pressure system in the Gulf of Mexico that, at its peak, had a 40 percent chance at developing into a tropical depression or storm. It eventually dissipated and posed no significant threat to the U.S. mainland.

And then last week a new system in the Caribbean produced Subtropical Storm Alberto. The storm brought gusty winds and nearly 4 inches of rain to the Fort Walton Beach area over the Memorial Day weekend.

But as officials look to the coming months, they hope people will plan ahead and have their evacuation plans, hurricane kits and go-kits ready for whatever Mother Nature decides to do.

"Our emergency management team is in place. They've got the experience, knowledge and training necessary to help keep everyone safe, stay informed and communicate well," said Stefan Vaughn, Okaloosa County's new director of public safety. "We'll continue to do that for the public, to make sure that they are well informed with updated and accurate information."

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# Take precautions to prevent mosquito borne illnesses

MILTON — With warmer temperatures and heavy rains predicted in our area over the next several days, expect to see an increase in the numbers of mosquitoes. Mosquitoes can cause more than just annoying, itching bites. They can also carry diseases like West Nile Virus, Eastern Equine Encephalitis, Dengue Fever and Zika.

To avoid being bitten by mosquitoes and help limit exposure, The Florida Department of Health in Santa Rosa County reminds residents and visitors to “Drain and Cover”:

**DRAIN** standing water to stop mosquitoes from multiplying.

- Drain water from garbage cans, house gutters, buckets, pool covers, coolers, toys, flower pots or any other containers where sprinkler or rain water has collected.
- Discard old tires, drums, bottles, cans, pots and pans, broken appliances and other items that aren't being used.



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- Empty and clean birdbaths and pet's water bowls at least once or twice a week.
- Protect boats and vehicles from rain with tarps that don't accumulate water.
- Maintain swimming pools in good condition and appropriately chlorinated. Empty plastic

swimming pools when not in use.

**COVER** skin with clothing or repellent.

**Clothing** - Wear shoes, socks, and long pants and long-sleeves. This type of protection may be necessary for people who must work in areas where mosquitoes are present.

**Repellent** - Always read

concentrations of up to 30 percent DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide) are generally recommended. Other U.S. Environmental Protection Agency-approved repellents contain picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, para-menthane-diol, or IR3535. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), mosquito repellents containing oil of lemon eucalyptus should not be used on children under the age of three years. DEET is not recommended on children younger than two months old.

These products are generally available at local pharmacies. Look for active ingredients to be listed on the product label.

Avoid applying repellents to the hands of children.

Apply insect repellent to exposed skin, or onto clothing, but not under

clothing.

In protecting children, read label instructions to be sure the repellent is age-appropriate.

Adults should apply repellent first to their own hands and then transfer it to the child's skin and clothing.

If additional protection is necessary, apply a permethrin repellent directly to your clothing. Again, always follow the manufacturer's directions.

Cover doors and windows with screens to keep mosquitoes out of your house. Repair broken screening on windows, doors, porches, and patios.

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

## Closer mentality

**Navarre's Cronin locking down bullpen for Razorbacks ahead of NCAA regional**

FAYETTEVILLE, Arkansas — Through almost two full seasons as a Division I reliever, Matt Cronin has let his pitching do the talking.

A former Navarre standout, Cronin, now a sophomore at Arkansas, said he was shy when he first reached Fayetteville in the fall of 2016. He knew almost no one upon getting to campus and his role as a starter was pulled out from underneath him, despite a solid 1.73 ERA and 114 strikeouts over 60 2/3 innings as a senior for the Raiders. The Razorbacks instead viewed him as a potential closer.

Where some might falter in the situation, Cronin flourished, never surrendering the confidence that earned him the opportunity to throw for an SEC baseball program in

the first place.

"In my mind I kinda had a little bit of that swagger," Cronin said. "I'm kinda of a shy guy, so it takes me a little while to open up around new guys. I was just kinda quiet and to myself, but in my mind I knew I could do it."

The early returns have been overwhelmingly positive.

After Cronin pitched sparingly as a freshman, Razorback coach Dave Van Horn gave him the ball in the third inning of the team's 2017 SEC tournament matchup with Auburn. Along with pitchers Dominic Taccolini and Josh Alberius, Cronin and the Razorbacks combined for the team's 13th no-hitter in school history and first since 2006. Cronin threw three innings with six strikeouts.

After his efforts in the conference tournament, Cronin earned three relief appearances during the team's 2017 NCAA regional run. In 18 innings as freshman, he struck out 31 and held opponents to a team-low .136

batting average.

He credits his early success, in part, to what he was able to accomplish at Navarre. In playing for a class 7A program, he said he learned the skills it took to get college-caliber batters out.

"Knowing you can get those guys out gives you a little bit of confidence going into college," Cronin said.

When Cronin's sophomore campaign began, he found himself entrenched as the Razorback closer. He has again delivered for an Arkansas team ranked fifth

nationally with 39 wins and again finds itself on the cusp of the NCAA regionals. The Razorbacks play fourth-seeded Oral Roberts at 2 p.m. Friday.

Cronin has a 2.97 ERA over 39 1/3 innings with 47 strikeouts and a team-low .132 opposing batting average. Near the end of April, he was one of 41 candidates for the Stopper of the Year Award, which the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association awards to the nation's best closer, before a bout with mononucleosis sidelined him

for three weeks.

No matter the outcome Friday, Cronin has enjoyed his first two years wearing cardinal and white. Given the amount of success he's had, it's likely the Razorbacks have enjoyed having him, too.

"It's been a lot of fun," Cronin said. "I definitely have one of the better pitching coaches in the country, if not the best with coach (Wes) Johnson. He's just really helped me fulfill my potential, which I'm still working on. He's definitely been a huge help and it's just been a good two years."



## Blackwater Pyrates help boaters

### ASK THE DOCTORS

#### LETTUCE RECALL SERVES AS REMINDER TO PRACTICE GOOD HAND HYGIENE

**Dear Doctor:** Like practically everyone else in the United States, we threw out our romaine lettuce because of the E. coli outbreak. What is E. coli and how do we avoid it?

**Dear Reader:** E. coli is a type of bacteria that lives in the intestines of humans and some animals. It exits the body in feces and can survive outside of the intestines for several hours. Most strains of E. coli (Escherichia coli, for our fellow science nerds) are harmless. In fact, they're a natural part of our gut microbiome. The "good" E. coli perform helpful functions, like the synthesis of certain vitamins and keeping certain pathogens from colonizing the colon.

However, a few strains of E. coli cause disease, including gastroenteritis, which is what we're seeing with the present outbreak. And the potential dangers of the "bad" versions of E. coli don't end there. Pathogenic strains can cause illnesses outside of the gastrointestinal tract, including respiratory illness, pneumonia, urinary tract infections and neonatal meningitis.

When it comes to the current outbreak, laboratory tests show that the strain involved, identified as E. coli O157:H7, produces a particularly nasty toxin; in fact, the hospitalization rate has been higher than in previous outbreaks. As you noted in your question, this outbreak centers around romaine lettuce, which has been contaminated with fecal material containing the pathogenic E. coli.

Infection with E. coli begins anywhere from two to five days after exposure. The first symptoms are abdominal pain, cramping and tenderness, which within 24 hours are followed by diarrhea. As the infection progresses, the diarrhea becomes increasingly watery and -- this can be the scary part -- visibly bloody. That's because the toxin in this particular strain damages the lining of the small intestine. Nausea and headache may accompany the diarrhea, and some people may experience chills and fever. The disease typically runs its course in a week or so. However, in some vulnerable populations, such as young children, older adults and those with weakened immune systems, something called hemolytic uremic syndrome, which is a type of kidney failure, can occur.

The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has warned consumers against romaine lettuce grown in the Yuma, Arizona, region. Unless you know specifically where the romaine lettuce in your fridge originated, it is safest to throw it away. This includes whole heads, hearts, pre-packaged lettuce mixes and premade salads. These same precautions apply to romaine served in restaurant.

In general, the best precaution against infection with E. coli is good hand hygiene. Always wash hands after using the bathroom, changing a diaper or helping someone else use the toilet. Wash hands before handling and preparing food, and after contact with animals.

Always wash fruit and vegetables thoroughly under running water; cook meats to their recommended internal temperatures; and be careful about cross-contamination in the kitchen. 



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
